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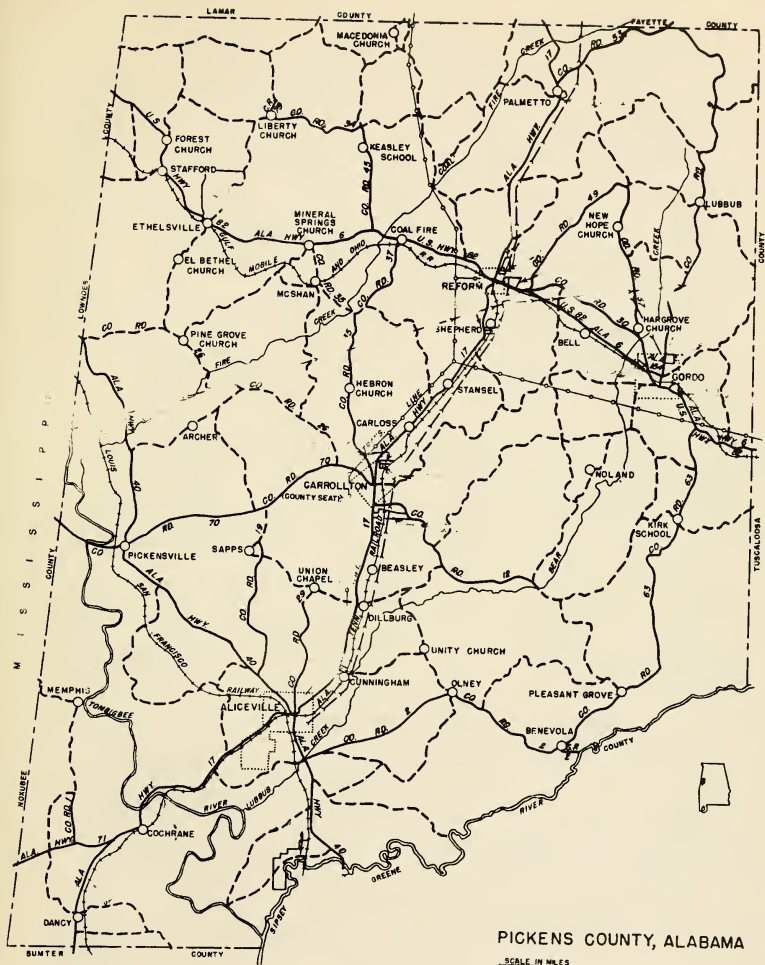

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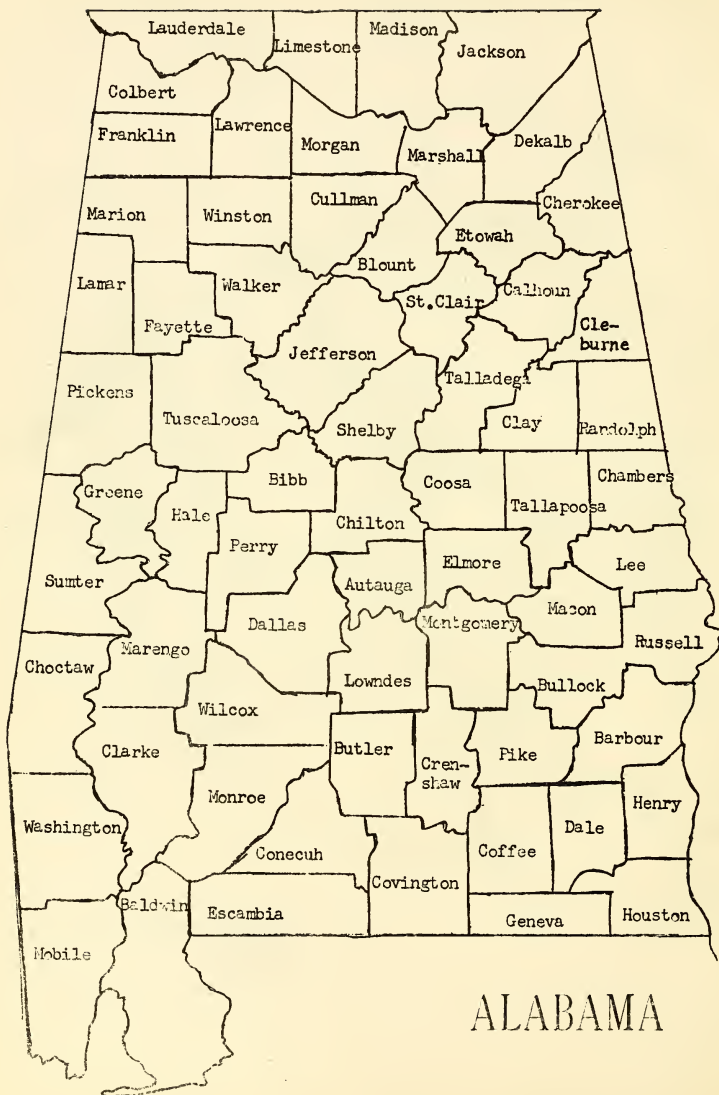


PICKENS COUNTY, ALABAMA

## HIGHWAY MARKERS IN PICKENS COUNTY, ALABAMA

The present northern boundry of Pickens County is the original boundry seperating the Choctaw and Chickasaw Indian Tribes. The Creeks had a town on the site of Tuscaloosa, within the Choctaw Territory and contested the Choctaw title to this land and in 1800 defeated the Choctaws in a battle between the Tombigbee river and the present State boundry, one mile south of Pickenville. The Choctaws refused to give up their Claims and held the territory until 1816 when they ceded the land east of the Tombigbee River to the United States. Now Highway Markers show the locations.

### CHOCTAW NATION:

These were the ancestral hunting grounds of the Choctaws ceded in 1816. The Choctaws were one of the four great civilized tribes occupying the Southeast frrom aboriginal times.

### CHOCTAW INDINAS. 1830

This territory west of the Tombigbee was ceded by the Choctaws at the Treaty of the Dancing Rabbit Creek in 1830.

Alabama #17, between Cochrane and Dancy.

### CHOCTAW-CHICKASAW INDINA BOUNDRY

The present county line between Pickens and Lamar Counties is the same as the boundry between these two great civilized Indian Tribes which occupied these parts until 1816.

Alabama #17 on Pickens - Lamar Line.

### CREEK-CHOCTAW BATTLE 1800      5 miles west

The Creeks invading the Choctaw lands and contesting their title defeated the Choctaws, but were not able to eject them or settle this section.

Alabama #17, between Aliceville and Carrollton.

## ORIGIN OF PICKENS COUNTY, ALABAMA

When Alabama became a State in 1819 what is now Pickens County was in Tuscaloosa County, but the settlement on the Tombigbee River was too far from the county seat of Tuscaloosa County, so a new county was formed December 19, 1820 and named PICKENS in honor of ISRAEL PICKENS, the third Governor of Alabama. The first seat of Pickens County was in the home of Jacob Dansby, who lived where Pickensville now is, with three electoral precincts, one at the home of Mr. Mullins, another at the home of James Heflin, in the Garden community and the third at Ezekial Nash's

The first settlers were mainly from South Carolina, down the trail from Ditto's Landi Ditto's Landing on the Tennessee River to "Mud Town". Later named Elyton. Even more settlers came in, with the section of the Choctaws land in 1830, causing some of the earlier settlers to move on west, as they had only "squatter's rights" to the land in Pickens County.

Pickensville was the first county seat when Government gave 80 acres in 1830 to establish a county seat. The county seat was moved to Carrollton later. Carrollton was incorporated as a town January 15, 1831, with Robert Jemison as member of the Board of Commission to locate and lay off the town.

The Acts of the State in 1821 established an election precinct at the house of Mr. Cox, near Cole Fire Creek.

December 20, 1824 Bayette County was established from part of Pickens and Tuscaloosa and Marion Counties. In 1832 two Beats on the west side of the County, were added from Greene County.

In 1819, Rev. Lorenzo Dow, and Itinerant preacher, came into what was later - Reform, Pickens County, to try and convert the many vandals and saloons there. He had no result at all in his undertaking, and as he was leaving someone was suggesting a name for the town - he yelled back: "Name it REFORM" and left!

The first white settler in Pickens County was Josiah Tilly, and Indian Trader who came into Tuscaloosa in 1817, to the east bank of the Tombigbee River, half a mile above the rpresent town of Pickensville. He is said to have been born in North Carolina or Tennessee and married in Tuscaloosa County to a daughter of Patrick Scott, who came to Pickens County from South Carolina. Tilly is said to have gone to Texas with the Choctaws.

The second settler was Jonothan York, who lived on the road from Pickensville to Columbus, Mississippi. His daughter, Catherine, was the first child born in Pickens County.

The first male child born in Pickens County was Edward L., son of Stephen P. Doss, about 1818.

The first marriage in the county was that of Elizabeth Cox and Lewis Christopher in February 1820, she being the daughter of Daniel Cox.

The first Methodist preacher in the community was Rev. Ebenezer Hearn, who came in from Tennessee in 1819.

Rev. Charles Stewart, a Baptist preacher was preaching at the Big Creek Baptist in the year 1823.

The early Presbyterian preachers were not permanent ones, though several of that faith preached there in the early days.

## THE FIRST JUDGE OF PICKENS COUNTY, ALABAMA

The first Judge was Solomon Marshall elected in 1821. "Old Sol" was the soubriquet bestowed upon the Judge and was considered an indication of popularity in the community. Mr. Marshall came originally from the State of Georgia, at a very early period in the history of Alabama, he had been a member of the General Assembly of the State. He was a man of some prominence in his county, before he moved to North Alabama. He first settled in Madison County and resided there several years. Being unsuccessful there, in business he removed to Pickens County. The Old Judge was, however, a thriving man while he resided in Pickens County. In 1830 Judge Marshall resigned and removed to Panola County, Mississippi, where he resided to the time of his death.

Hon. Martin L. Stansell was elected Judge 1849 - 1850 and served for a few months. His father, Rev. William R. Stansell came to Pickens County in 1824 from Washington County, Georgia, when his son was seven months old. Martin L. Stansell was born in Savannah, Georgia in April 1824, being the son of William R. Stansell and Jane C. Riddle (Riddell). His father came to South Carolina with the Huguenots. Rev. Stansell's father was a Captain in the Revolutionary War. Rev. Stansell was in the War of 1812 and died in Pickens County in 1860; his wife died there October 16, 1868. He married Olivia, daughter of James C. and Mary C. Sherrod. Judge Stansell was a graduate of the University of Alabama. The Stansell home still (1959) stands in Carrollton.

HON. TRISTAM SHANDY THOMAS

From THE PICKENS REPUBLICAN 1854

Hon. Thristam Shandy Thomas was the first Judge of Probate of Pickens County, was elected by the people in May 1849, after having been clerk in the County Court. He was also a licensed Baptist preacher. He was born 1800 in Wythe County, Virginia, whence he removed to Kentucky, when a boy, resided one year in Tennessee, then to Pickens County in 1818. He died June 7, 1854.

In this family was: David Thomas born Tenn. aged 22.

From the family names - Thristam & Matthew Cother Thomas, there must be a descent from the THOMAS family of Maryland, thru George Thomas who married Elizabeth Cother. George Thomas said to have lived a short time in Christain County, Kentuck, then to Warren County, Tennessee. No record that he owned land in Wythe County, Virginia and the early records of Warren County, Tennessee were destroyed.

William Thomas, brother of Tristam, also lived in Pickens County for a while then moved into Jefferson County where he died. The settlement of his estate in Ophan's Court states that he died June 24, 1843.

SAMUEL B. MOORE, 6TH GOVERNOR OF ALABAMA

Samuel B. Moore was born in Franklin County, Tennessee in 1789 and died in Carrollton, Pickens County, Alabama November 7, 1846. He had received a limited education and settled first in Jackson County, Alabama, where he represented that county in the Legislature as early as 1823. After serving several terms in the Lower House, he was elected to the State Senate in 1828, being President of that body in 1831.

He succeeded Judge Flournoy by election at the session of 1834 and 1835. He held his first County Court in July of the latter named year. He served out the full term of six years. He fills too important a place in the history of Pickens County and the State to receive a mere passing notice, He was State Senator from Pickens at the time of his election. When Governor Gabriel Moore (Governor of Alabama) resigned to take his place in the United States Senate, Samuel Moore succeeded him in the Executive office and Administered until December of the same year. Gabriel Moore resigned March 3, 1831.

At the end of his term he returned to Pickens County, which he represented in the State Senate 1834 - 1838, serving as President of the Senate in 1835

He was Judge of the County Court of Pickens County from 1835-1841. He was never married and made his home in Carrollton.

## THE FACE IN THE WINDOW

The Courthouse in Carrollton, seat of Pickens County, Alabama was burned on Tuesday, November 16, 1876. A negro - Henry Wells was arrested, two years after as being the one who started the fire. In the meantime a new courthouse had been built.

Henry was, also suspected of other crimes and to save him from the enraged mob, he was hidden in the garret of the new Courthouse. Just at that time an electrical storm occurred and as Henry was looking down at the mob, his face was stamped on the window by the electricity.

Through all the years, in spite of hail and storm, which destroyed all other windows in the Courthouse, that particular pane, with the striking image, remains.

The glass has been scribbled with soap and gasoline as well as other means, but still that pane has met all tests and to this day, (August 1959) the face remains unchanged.

Henry died in jail from effects of wounds he received as he once tried to escape.

## METHODIST CHURCH OF ALICE, PICKENS COUNTY, ALABAMA

The church was organized in 1879, during the ministry of the Rev. W. M. Ripper, 5 miles south of Aliceville, a few hundred yards east of the present Aliceville-Eutaw Highway. The church was named the Emory's Chapel and was on the Carrollton demominational circuit.

Another church, on the same Circuit, was located at Olney, eight miles east of the present site of Aliceville.

In 1900 when the Rev. John W. Norton was pastor of the Circuit the two churches were torn down, and the lumber taken to Bethany, six mile southeast of Aliceville and a new church was constructed there. There had already been a Methodist congregation in Bethany, so the combined congregation formed a flourishing church which went by the name of Bethany and remained in the community for about six years.

In 1906, when the Rev. Samuel N. Burn was pastor, the church building in Bethany was sold and the congregation moved into Aliceville and constructed a new church. On Sunday, the 3rd one in May 1909, Bishop H. C. Morrison preached the dedicatory sermon in the new church in Aliceville. In 1923, the Aliceville Methodist Church was taken into the Carrollton Circuit and made a full-time station. During the pastorate of the Rev. J. E. Jenkins, 1923-1927 an annex was added for Sunday School rooms.

In 1944 a building fund was started for a new church building and manse. The first service in November 1948, was held in the new building which cost approximately \$45,00.000

BETHESDA PRESBYTERIAN CHURCH, ROUTE 2, PICKENS COUNTY, ALABAMA

The pioneer Presbyterians in the southern part of Pickens County, many of whom came in from the Carolinas planned to organize a church. On the 29th of September 1838, the Rev. Thomas Morrow of the Tuscaloosa Presbytery organized the church, near Crawford, with fifteen Charter Members,

## BETHESDA CHURCH - Continued

Mr. and Mrs. W. S. Morrow came into the church several years later. She descends from the A. E. Going family and Mr. Morrow was a descendant of Rev. Thomas Morrow. They being the only ones of the congregation descending from one who was present at the organization of the Church one hundred years before.

Rev. John K. Spence who was a well known Presbyterian Minister of Alabama, was at one time an Elder of this church. He being the only person who had once belonged to this church - to enter the ministry. The early churches were a sort of court - where grievances of its members were threshed out.

As was custom in the South, before the War between the States, quite a number of slaves were regular members of this church. In later years, the younger generation preferred an organization of their own. The cemetery at BETHESDA, where the older members were laid to rest, is well cared for. A Revolutionary war Soldier - Thomas Lofton lies buried in this adjoining cemetery.

Early Presbyterian Churches were located at Carrollton, Pickensville Reform, Franconia, (2) Bradfords, over Sipsey and Sipsey Turnpike.

## BIG CREEK BAPTIST CHURCH

This church is said to have been the oldest congregation in Pickens County and was organized in 1823, at the Garden (Enon), then moved to Aliceville.

Its second organization was at Yorkville (now Aliceville), by Elder Jacob Crocker in 1829.

Then at Big Creek on January 10, 1829, with fourteen members, with Rev. Charles Stewart as pastor; first Deacons were Notley Gore and Dempsey White. In two months, the congregation had increased to twenty members - one - " a black woman, Melly". At that date, slaves were given the opportunity to attach themselves to that church. In the next ten years, there were thirty-four black members, out of the whole list of one hundred and sixty four. In 1848 it was agreed to build a separate building for the black population. This church was the scene of a break in the Baptist denomination, in 1837, the Missionary Baptists continued in this church and the Hardshell Baptist established a new organization.

From the Big Creek Church, a Baptist church was organized in Carrollton in 1846 by Mrs. Candace Bostick, Mrs. Caroline Sherrod, Matthews Lyons and others.

The UNITY GROVE CHURCH was the place of the beginning of an Assembly known as "CAMP MEETING", where people from even nearby states have camped and held religious services for over fifty years.

## MT. OLIVET PRESBYTERIAN CHURCH

This church was located about sixteen miles west of Tuscaloosa in Pickens County, in the Davidson Settlement of Tuscaloosa County.

Saturday, January 6th, 1838, Rev. Joseph B. Adams, organized this church. The fifteen charter members were:

Thomas H. Wier and William Archibald were elected as the first ruling elders of this church. Rev. William Williams was the first pastor and served for eleven years.

The seats were arranged so the slaves would have a place to sit in the church.

Mr. Ninian Steel, a native of Iredell County, North Carolina, was one of the early members in 1839 and remained a member until his death, October 15, 1842, at the age of 62 years and his body was the first to be buried in Mt. Olivet Cemetery. One corner of this cemetery was reserved for the slaves.

Thomas H. Wier was the first clerk of the Church, until his death when Thomas W. Falls was elected to serve in that place. William Archibald was appointed to attend the Presbytery in Tuscaloosa, October 2, 1838. Rev. James Somerville succeeded Rev. Williams as pastor of this Church in 1850, where he served faithfully for twenty-nine years. Rev. Somerville was a great-uncle of Mrs. T. C. Border of Reform. The church building was well constructed and even the wooden pegs in the benches were in use one hundred and one years later.

PRESBYTERIAN CHURCH OF REFORM, PICKENS COUNTY, ALABAMA

The SESSION BOOK of the early records of this church was lost, so this record was given by some of the pioneers of this church.

March 20, 1898. Rev. B. F. Bedenger, Evangelist of the Tuscaloosa Presbytery, organized the church at Reform, Alabama with fifteen charter members. As the original list was lost, the following is a partial list:

## REVOLUTIONARY WAR SOLDIERS WHO LATER LIVED IN PICKENS COUNTY

From U. S. Pension List of 1834. These Pensions began March 3 1831

MAYFIELD CRANE - Private in South Carolina State Troops

Born North Carolina, moved to District 96 South Carolina when a child with his parents, then to Rutherford County, North Carolina, then back to South Carolina where he served in the Revolutionary War in 3 different tours with South Carolina troops. After the war moved to Pickens County, Alabama where he lived 16 years; moved to Jefferson County, Alabama 1836-1837, then to Mississippi.

THOMAS HARPER - Private, age 76 in 1834. Born Lancaster County, Pa., January 2, 1758; enlisted in 3rd Pa. Regiment March 1, 1777; was in Burks County, Pa during the Revolution; to Monroe County, North Carolina then to Lincoln County, Tennessee; to Mississippi, then to Pickens County, Alabama where he lived 12 years.

FREEMAN JONES - Private, age 71 in 1834. Born Virginia 1763. Served under Capts. Neville, Lytle, Whiteside; Cols. Hampton and Armstrong. From North Carolina to Pickens County, Alabama. Died 1835. D. A. R. Vol 115, page 14. Served in Virginia Continental Line.

THOMAS LOFTON - Private, age 73 in 1834. Served as Sgt and Captain in South Carolina troops. Acts of S. C. Vol 3 page 106. "South Carolina in the Revolution" by Ervin, page 119-List of Revolutionary War soldiers-to Alabama THOMAS LOFTIN. To Pickens County, Alabama in 1828 from Pendleton District, South Carolina. In Alabama the young people of his neighborhood called him "Grandsire Lofton" and loved him for his kind and genial disposition; many remembered his interesting stories of the War. He was a member of the Presbyterian Church and is buried at "Bethesda" Presbyterian churchyard near Benevola. No stone marks his grave, he died May 28, 1840. Had 2 children.

JOHN MANGUM - Private, age 71 in 1834. Served in South Carolina Militia. He was born in Medlenburg County, North Carolina, January 19, 1763. When he enlisted he lived in Newberry District, South Carolina. He removed to Warren County, Ohio in 1805, where he resided until 1815, from thence he removed to Saint Clair County, Illinois and in 1823 or 1824 removed to Pickens County, Alabama. He married Rebecca-----?

ANDREW PHILLIPS - Private age 75 in 1834. Served in North Carolina Continental Line; received 640 acres of land for 84 months service. See North Carolina Records Vol. 16, page 1133. He was born in Orange County, Virginia, moved to Pickens County, Alabama 1823-24. Lived in Hillsboro District, North Carolina.

# REVOLUTIONARY WAR SOLDIERS WHO LATER LIVED IN PICKENS COUNTY

CULLIBER CLEMENTS was a partisan soldier under General Marion in South Carolina. Came to Tuscaloosa 1818 then to Pickens County 1819. Had a son, Jesse Clements. He died 1840. Was maternal grandfather of Dr. F. B. Wilson of Pickens County.

JOHN JOHNSON, Private-Annual Allowance \$30.66. He was born January 2, 1762 in Halifax County, North Carolina. In 1782 he was a resident of Rowan County, North Carolina. He removed to Rutherford County, Tennessee after the Revolution and later to Lawrence County, Alabama. He was living in Pickens County in 1836.

THOMAS MCDEARMAN. He was born June 12, 1752 in Anson County, North Carolina. He was 82 in 1834. Annual allowance \$34.44. When he entered the service he was residing near the Cheraw Hills in South Carolina. After the war he resided in Tennessee, Mississippi and Alabama. He was residing in Pickens County, Alabama, December 11, 1833 and in Lauderdale County, Mississippi July 12, 1839.

ISHAM GURLEY He was denied a pension as he served less than 6 months. Born Johnston County, North Carolina January 13, 1757. Isham Gurley received land in Pickens County, July 18, 1836.

OBADIAH HOOPER. He was born Lunenburg County, Virginia December 15, 1755, enlisted October 1775, was Life Guard to LaFayette. Married March 24, 1805 to Sarah B, daughter of Moses Saunders in Franklin County, Georgia. Annual Allowance \$42.00. Widow applied for a pension July 7, 1838.

ROBER COZBY - Died October 7, 1825 at Trianna.

MARSHALL FRANKS. Private. Born in 1752 in Charlotte County, Virginia. He volunteered in the fall of 1775 and served 1 month as a private in Cpt. James Williams Company, Col. Robert McCrary's South Carolina Regiment. In 1779 he served 3 months as a private in Capt. James Williams South Carolina Regiment and was in the battle of Brier Creek. Served 3 months about the time of the fall of Charleston as a private in Capt. Charles Sexton or Saxon's Company, Col. McCrary's South Carolina Regiment; next served for 3 months as a private in Capt. Lewis Duvall's Company, Col. Levi Chasey's South Carolina Regiment and was in the siege of Ninety-Six. On Sept. 24, 1781 he was commissioned 2nd Lt. in Capt. Lewis Duvall's Company, Col. Joseph Hayes South Carolina Regiment. He lived in 96 District South Carolina and in 1775 removed to Giles County, Tennessee, and after the Revolution he moved to Pickens County, Alabama.

JACOB ODOM. Private, age 72 in 1834; served in North Carolina Militia. He was born in Edgecombe County, North Carolina in 1760, died 1835 Pickens County, Alabama.

JOEL VAUGHAN. Private, age 95 in 1834. Testified in Pickens County, 1833 that he had served in North Carolina Continental Line. Had annual allowance of \$48.32 had received \$144.96.

GEORGE WIGGINGTON. Private age 72 in 1834. Born January 17, 1762 in Kershaw District, South Carolina. He served as a private for 9 months. When he first enlisted he lived in Burke County, Ga., but early in 1778 he removed to Laurens District, South Carolina. In December 1819 he moved to St. Clair County, Ala. and from 1830 to 1841 he lived in Pickens County.

PETER WILLIAMS. Private. Born in October 1756. He was living about 25 miles from Augusta, Georgia when he volunteered and served at different times for 15 months as a private in the Georgia Troops. He lived in Georgia until after the Revolutionary War except for about six months spent in Pendleton District, South Carolina. About 1817 he moved to Pickens County, Alabama.

MEREDITH TAYLOR. Age 78 in 1834. Lived with James Bonner. Private. Service not shown. Annual allowance \$46.66. Transferred from South Carolina. Pension Book, State Branch Bank, Mobile. He lived in Pickens County, June 1, 1840 with family of Bonner. Buried at Bethesda Presbyterian Church. Born North Carolina, near the Virginia line from which place his father moved to South Carolina; in 1833 he moved to Alabama. At the age of 16, he entered the American Forces as a substitute for his father, under General Green, engaged in battle of Eutaw Springs.

RICHARD TALIAFERRO. Captain in Infantry. In 1841, his widow, Mildred received a Pension on his service, her age in 1841 was 72. She lived with John A. Taliaferro.

JAMES ROGERS. Age in 1841 80. He was born July 2, 1760 in Culpepper County, Virginia. He was drafted in January 1777 and served for 3 months with Virginia troops under Lt. John Combs. Volunteered in 1778 and served 3 months. At the time of his enlistment he was living in Farquier County, Virginia but moved to what was then called "New Virginia" when he was 24 years of age. Moved to Servier County, Tennessee in 1811. Moved to Limestone County, Ala. and after 17 years he returned to Tennessee and 4 years later returned to Alabama settling in Pickens County. In 1842 he was living in Mississippi 70 miles from his former residence in Pickens County.

JAMES GALASBY (Gillespy) Served in the Infantry, head of his family in 1840.

REVOLUTIONARY SOLDIERS WHO LATER LIVED IN PICKENS COUNTY

JAMES BLAIR (1761-1839) received a pension for service as a private, orderly sergeant, ensign and Indian spy in the North Carolina troops. He was born in Augusta County, Virigina; died in Pickens County, Alabama. See D. A. R. Lineage Vol 155 page 74.

-----WILSON. The paternal grand-father of Dr. B. F. Wilson came from Tennessee to Tuscaloosa with his son, William in 1818. Wilson was at Guilford Court House battle see Vol 6, page 673 Alabama Historical Quarterly.

JAMES MCCRORY. (1750-1840) Ensign. Annual allowance from pension \$240.00 Had received by 1834 \$2,160.00. Placed on Pension roll June 13, 1829. Served in the 9th Regiment of the North Carolina Continental Line. He was born in Ireland. He is named on 1841 Pension list as age 82 living with Robert McCrory. He died in Pickens County November 24, 1840 and was buried at "Old Betheny" (Primitive Baptist Church) near Vienna, with this inscription on stone:

"In memory of James McCrory who died at age 82 years, 6 months and 9 days. The deceased was a soldier of the Revolutionary War and was at the battles of Germantown, Brandywine and Guilford Court House. He was one of George Washington's body guards at Valley Forge and he served his Country faithfully during that war. Peace to the soldier's dust."

These troops engaged in the Creek Indian War, and later fought the

## CONFEDERATE SOLDIERS OF PICKENS COUNTY, ALABAMA

### Brief Biography of Mackerness W. Bouchillon.

He was born October 29, 1825. He was married on the 1st of October 1846. He died July 30, 1863 in the Confederate Army at Strawberry Plains, near Knoxville, Tennessee. He served four months and died at the age of 38. He was in Company "E" of the 20th Alabama Regiment in Petus Brigade. Descendants lived in Reform, Pickens County, Alabama.

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William David Stuckey: Born Pickens County, Alabama on June 18, 1839, died Pickens County, Alabama Feb 10, 1873. Married in Pickens County, December 19, 1858 to SALLIE CATHERINE KENT, born Cherokee County, Alabama, September 16, 1838. She died in Carrollton, Pickens County, Alabama, August 4, 1900. They had:

WILLIAM DAVID STUCKEY was in Company "E", 40th Alabama Infantry Regiment age 26 when he enlisted in Pickens County, Alabama March 29, 186\_\_ and was mustered in as a private on April 20, 1862. In the casualty list of May 1864 for Company "G", 40th Alabama Infantry, which shows he was wounded at Resacca, Georgia on May 15, 1864.

The Alabama Auditor's report of 1867 shows his application #179 of August 26, in Pickens County, Alabama that he had received an artificial limb, for the right leg which had been amputated above the knee.

"The first relief Act by Alabama in aid of former Confederate soldiers, who were maimed during the War between the States. Artificial limbs were furnished by the State of Alabama to maimed soldiers and sailors who served between 1861-1865 together with a statement of the facts leading to Legislation. The Acts of Legislature required such limbs be named; list of names of the person to whom such aid was extended. This was shown by counties for the years 1867 to 1879, both inclusive, applicants to furnish sworn statement with the Probate Judge of his county, setting forth his age, place of residence, what Company-Regiment or Battalion he served; where and how he was wounded; by what surgeon or surgeons when the amputation was made and that he was an actual resident of the county on February 19, 1867 - also that it was his intention to remain in that county indefinitely; statement to be sworn to before the Probate Judge and be accompanied by an affidavit from someone that the facts were true. When the limb was delivered, the applicant had to sign a receipt that he had received the limb and that it was satisfactory in every way. For an arm - \$50.00, for a leg - \$75.00 and blinded - \$150.00. In 1878 the plan was changed - a flat sum of \$75.00 was to be paid every cripple who hby some means or reason - could not wear such a leg or arm and who had not received any previous aid. On totally blind was to receive \$150.00, \$70.00 for loss of a leg above the knee and \$50.00 for a leg below the knee. If mutilation was of such a nature, that no limb could be used, they to be paid \$100.00" Approved by the Acts of Alabama February 19, 1867.

## JOHN A. BILLUPS

Hon. John A. Billups was a well known man of Pickens County, Alabama. He was born in Georgia March 25, 1831. He was the son of Col. Richard Billups, born South Carolina 1796 and married Eliza Humphries also born in South Carolina 1801.

The father of Col. Richard Billups was a Virginian by birth and his wife's father - William Humphries, a native of Ireland and a school teacher by profession, being a teacher of General Jackson.

Hon. Billups was educated in Pickens County, and went out with the first Company from Pickens County in the Confederacy, being a private in the company called "Lane Guards" in the Infantry commanded by Col. Henry Maury. Some of the battles he fought in were: Fort Morgan; Corinth; Vicksburg; Lookout Mountain; Missionary Ridge and others. Surrendering in April 1865, he returned to Pickens County and was married December 26, 1867 to Miss Helen Garrett, a native of Summerfield, Alabama.

In 1866 he began the study of law, which he practiced in Carrollton. In 1874-75 he represented Pickens County in the State Legislature. Mr. Billups and his wife had no children; they were members of the Carrollton Presbyterian Church of which he was made an elder in 1881. His brothers and sisters were: Hermione; Dr. William of Grenada, Mississippi; Ann; Richard; John A.; Octavia; Eliza; Alonzo; Robert; Myrtis was the first wife of James A. Goings.

# FRANCIS W. BOSTICK

Francis W. Bostick settled in Pickens County in 1826 and was originally from Abbeville District, South Carolina when he removed in 1815 at the age of eighteen. In 1834 he was elected Major General of the Second Division of the Alabama Militia. He also served as Clerk in the County Court in 1826 defeating John Moffett, who was a candidate. He served five terms of four years each, of the unusually long period of 20 years and was clerk during the Judgeship of Governor Moore.

Francis W. Bostick, born Abbeville District, South Carolina, December 8, 1798 - to Alabama in 1815, Madison County, remained there until 1822 then to Erie, Greene County, Ala. In 1825 to Pickens County and in 1832 took up permanent residence at Carrollton, where he died January 22, 1855. He married Candace M. Wood in 1809 in York District, South Carolina. She was the daughter of Aaron and Dorothy (Moreland) Wood. They had ten children.

## AARON WOOD, REVOLUTIONARY SOLDIER OF YORK DISTRICT, SOUTH CAROLINA

Aaron Wood was born in Loudoun County, Va 1757. While still young he was taken to Halifax County, North Carolina by his parents. In 1776 he went back to Maryland to visit relatives. He stayed 2 years. He married (1) Dorothy Moreland; (2) Matilda Mayhew, who had a brother, Rezin, their mother being named Charity Mayhew.

THOMAS GREEN BUSH

T. G. Bush, merchant, manufacturer and publicist was born in Pickensville, Pickens County, Alabama on August 19, 1847, the son of Albert P. Bush and Sarah A. Williams, who came from Georgia to Alabama about 1835; settling in Pickens County, where he was in the mercantile business until he moved to Mobile, Alabama in 1852. Sarah A. Williams was daughter of Curtis Williams, Jr. (Member of Alabama Legislature) and his wife, Nancy, King. They came from Georgia to near Oxford, Alabama in 1830. Curtis Williams, Sr. also served in the State Legislature.

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ROBERT JEMISON

Robert Jemison, Sr., lawyer, business man, member of the State Legislature and State Senate; also a member of the Alabama Succession Committee. He was born in Lincoln County, Georgia September 17, 1802 and died in Tuscaloosa, Alabama October 17, 1871. He was the son of William Jemison and Sarah Mims of Twiggs County, Georgia and grandson of Robert Jemison and Margaret Kirkman of Philadelphia, Pa., who moved to Augusta, Georgia before the Revolutionary War. Robert Jemison, Sr. attended the University of Georgia and to Alabama with his family, about 1826, locating first in Pickens County, until 1836 when he moved to Tuscaloosa, where he married Priscilla Cherokee, daughter of Greenberry Taylor and Elizabeth Virginia Meter of Mobile, Alabama.

ROBERT JEMISON, IV, business man was born in Tuscaloosa on September 12, 1853; nephew of the Confederate Senator. He received his education in private school in Carrollton, Pickens County, Alabama and graduated at the University of Alabama and moved to Birmingham in 1884.

GEORGE W. DOWNER

Mr. Downer has played an important part in the social and political life of Aliceville and Pickens County. He has served on the school board, the City Council and has been Commissioner from the Aliceville District for over 24 years. His father, John C. Downer came to Aliceville from Cooksville, Mississippi, before the town was no more than a cross roads community. Mr. George H. Downer married Miss Lillie Mae Windham of Pickens County, also a member of a prominent family of the county. They had six children. Mr. Downer was a member of the Methodist Church for 46 years. Probably no man in the county has a wider acquaintance and it is said "if George Downer said he will do a thing, you can count on it."

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ELMER L. GRAHAM

He was one of the successful men of Aliceville who came up the hard way and made a success, despite limited education and financial aid. He was born on a little farm in southeast Pickens County, son of Samuel A. and Mary V. Graham, lifelong residents of the Benevola Community and members of the Presbyterian Church. Elmer Graham has been a member of the Presbyterian Church for 34 years and an officer in the church for 18 years. He was elected member of the Twon Council in 1944. He began business first in Reform in the automobile business then moved to Aliceville.

MRS. ELIZABETH GARDNER - OBITUARY

Died at Reform, Alabama on the morning of the 31st day of March 1857, after a protracted illness, Mrs. Elizabeth Gardner, consort of Daniel Gardner, Esquire. The subject of this obituary was born the 9th of March 1792 in Fairfield District, South Carolina and removed to Pickens County in 1832, where she has since resided. She was a member of the Baptist Church for the last 26 years, and had the privilege of seeing all her children embrace religion with the exception of one who died young. In the death of Mrs. Gardner, her husband has been deprived of a kind and affectionate wife--her children of a fond and devoted parent--her servants of a good Mistress and--Society of a useful member. The Church, on earth, has lost a praying member, but the Church Triumphant has received a New Leaf and a New Voice in singing the praises of the Lord.

She was Elizabeth Taylor, born South Carolina 1792, married 1812 to Daniel Gardner who was born March 9, 1792. He was buried in the Gardner's family graveyard at Reform, Pickens County, in the City limits, on Highway 17, about one block south of the Highway. Elizabeth Taylor was the daughter of Meredith Taylor born 1763 and who died 1830; her mother was Ann Duke Taylor born 1774, died 1834 Pickens County. Daniel Gardner lived at Bridgeville, Pickens County from 1832 to 1841; in Reform from 1841 to 1858. He died at the home of his son, Thomas Gardner in Shannon, Mississippi and had lived in Shannon from 1868 to 1872, but was buried at Reform; 9 children.

## HARGROVE FAMILY OF PICKENS COUNTY, ALABAMA

The first will probated in the county was the nuncupative will of DUDLEY HARGROVE, who was killed in 1823 by a log falling on him as he was building his own gin-house, October 1, 1823.

DANIEL J. HARGROVE took out Letters of Administration on the estate of Dudley Hargrove, November 7, 1823. Witness to this will were: Benjamin Persons, Willis James and Daniel Lowe. At the sale of his estate, corn sold for 25¢ on a twelve month credit. He was buried in the old Sand Hill Cemetery known as the Lowe-Hargrove. He was son of Thomas Hargrove, who was born in Virginia in 1736.

Dudley Hargrove born Virginia ca 1760, died Pickens County, Ala October 1, 1823, married 1st- Polly Coleman (Mary Coalman) born Virginia, died Hancock County, Georgia ca 1814. Married 2nd Mary de Jarnette of Hancock County, Ga Sept. 27, 1814.

The first printed record of Dudley Hargrove was in the 1790 Census of Halifax County, North Carolina, page 64: 1 white male over 16, 2 white females over 16 and 2 slaves. Whoe these females were, we do not know. Next we find him in Hancock County, Georgia. From "Tax Digest of Hancock County, Georgia, Page 56: "Dudley Hargrove-12 slaves; 287½ acres on Fort Creek." Adjoining Brantley's land; 2 wheeled carriages." See Tyler Quarterly Vol 2, page 60 and Virginia Quarterly, Vol 24, page 305 for the record of his first marriage and "Marriages of Hancock Co., Georgia" by Martha Houston for his second marriage.

Dudley Hargrove was an unlicensed Methodist Preacher and became a historic character in 1819 when he went from the Tuscaloosa Quarterly Conference to the Tennessee Conference at Nashville, October 1, 1819. He was one among others expected to be ordained as Ministers but this Conference was pronounced in its standing against slavery and these men were slave owners, so they were rejected. Five years afterward, Mr. Taylor, one of these men was taken into the Conference, but Dudley Hargrove did not live to receive this correction. Family data states that Dudley Hargrove killed 23 bears in Pickens County, also that he served in the Revolutionary War, though nothing has been found to that effect. In the Methodist records, it is stated that all of Dudley Hargrove's children - except Benjamin came to Pickens County with him from Georgia.

BISHOP ROBERT KENNON HARGROVE (Methodist Denomination)

Robert Kennon Hargrove born Gordo, Pickens County, Alabama, September 17, 1829, died 1905, married 1st Harriett Cornelia Scott, daughter of David Scott on November 10, 1852 in Tuscaloosa, Alabama. Married 2nd Ruth Elizabeth Scarriet June 20, 1895 Kansas City, Missouri. He was son of Daniel Jones Hargrove, born North Carolina 1791, died Nov. 3, 1869 and Lodecia Brantly, she was born June 30, 1787, died Nov. 23, 1870. Daniel Jones Hargrove and Lodecia Brantly were married in Hancock County, Georgia December 13, 1813. Bishop Hargrove was a grandson of Dudley Hargrove. He graduated at the University of Alabama. His life history is given in several Methodist publications, one of which shows his picture. He was pastor of the First Methodist Church in Columbus Mississippi in 1860. His only child that we have the name of was: Mrs. T. B. Johnson of Franklin, Tennessee. His mother was the Daughter of Thomas Brantly, born North Carolina in 1754, died in Dallas County, Alabama in 1822. Thomas Brantly married in North Carolina in 1775 to Rachael Hill, born North Carolina 1755, died Dallas County, Alabama 1822. Thomas Brantly was a soldier under General George Washington in the Revolution, moved to Hancock County, Georgia about 1785; then to Alabama where he died and was buried on the Alabama river, one mile above Selma, Dallas County, Alabama. September 16, 1931, plans were made in Gordo, Alabama to celebrate the birthday of Bishop Hargrove at HARGROVE METHODIST CHURCH, Pickens County, one of the oldest Methodist Churches in West Alabama, which was organized by Dudley Hargrove in 1829 (?). The following families were charter members of this church: Hiram Glass; David Hargrove; J. D. Lowe; Joel Graham; Jesse Corr; Seth Byars. This church has sent out more preachers into the North Alabama Conference than any other church.

Cherokee Jemison married on December 5, 1865 in Tuscaloosa, Alabama Andrew Coleman Hargrove, who was born Tuscaloosa, Alabama, December 18, 1839, died Tuscaloosa, Alabama December 6, 1895. He was the son of JOHN HARRIS HARGROVE and grandson of Dudley Hargrove of Pickens County, Alabama. She was the daughter of R. W. Jemison and Priscilla Cherokee Taylor. Andrew Coleman Hargrove was a lawyer and graduated at the University of Alabama and Harvard University. He served in the Confederate Army as a Lieut. in Lumsden's Battery; was a member of the Constitutional Convention of 1875, which framed the present Constitution of the State of Alabama. He entered the Confederate Army as a private in Company I of the Warrior Guards. During the War he was shot in the head, which wound was said to have been the cause of his death. He was wounded at Atlanta, also at Spanish Fort and was discharged on April 9, 1865.

John Harris Hargrove had a sister; Martha Hargrove. She married Dec. 31, 1822 Hardy Clements. He was born Edgefield County, South Carolina October 16, 1783 and died at Tuscaloosa, Alabama April 29, 1918. He married 2nd Maria Ann Pegues on May 15, 1832. Hardy Clements was the son of Reuben Clements and Elizabeth Stuart of Pendleton District, South Carolina. Reuben Clements was a large slave owner. Another sister of John Harris Hargrove was Mary Hargrove. She married Dr. John Neilson. Their daughter married W. Cloud Beard of Columbus, Mississippi. An older Clough Beard Moved to Spartanburg, South Carolina while his two brothers, William P. Beard and Wesley J. Beard moved to Pickens County, Alabama.

Rev. George M. Lyles of Pickens County, Alabama delivered a message to the Baptist Delegates of the Union Baptist Association, held at Big Creek Church in 1863. This Association was composed of churches in Lamar, Greene, Hale and Pickens Counties in Alabama. In this message he referred to the (then) War Between the States:

"First, in a National Point of View, we were at one time the happiest nation on earth, but not content with our position in life, we have become jealous of each other's rights and interests. . . . in a Nation sense, we have sinned as a Nation, God has seen proper to lay the chastening rod, by suffering to come upon us--one of the most bloody wars that American History has ever known."

Rev. Lyles was born in Charleston, South Carolina in 1819. He married in South Carolina and came to Alabama about 1840 and bought a farm near the present Liberty High School.

He was twice married and had thirteen children, in two sets. Two of the second set--Georgia Bullock and B. F. Lyles were living in 1958. He preached all over Pickens County for forty years and in one year was paid only \$3.75.

He also was partner with Mr. Stringfellow in a store in Pickensville in 1870. He also worked hard on his farm. He would have his dinner sent to him in the field and read his Bible as he ate.

He trained one negro man to be a great preacher.

To the Editor of the Birmingham News:

James Alston McKinstry, who died a few days ago in Birmingham, Alabama was, at the outbreak of the Civil War in 1861, an ideal exponent of the South, which, in the fashion of miracles, transformed boys into men-inspired with heroic purpose. Among the first of the cadets of LaGrange Military Academy to volunteer in the Army of the Southern Confederacy, it fell to the lot of this regiment to re-enact at the battle of Corinth, Mississippi, a tragedy more fatally mis-directed than the "Charge of the Six Hundred at Balaklave." Glad only in shirt and trousers and barefooted, that they might more readily climb up the steep earthwork--of the fourteen who escaped the carnage of the assault and who reached the interior of the Fort, this gallant lad-alone-survived the finishing volley of the garrison. With minnie-ball through his shoulder, another through an arm and a third through the muscle of the thigh, refused to surrender; he found shelter in the trench with his dead comrades, whence with the fall of darkness-he made his escape.

At college, Jim McKinstry was a general favorite and noted as adept in mathamtics. He had not his equal, even in the advance classes and later in life, had he but aspired to fame, he could have found a place in one of our great universities, in this first of the sciences. With that fatal and inexplicable modesty so often characteristic of a genius, he chose the path of life.

"Far from the maddening crow's ignoble strife, he trod, ever in sympathy with his fellows and ever true to his convictions. Requiescat in pace." So may he swweetly sleep that death will seem a dream of life which itself is a dream.

OBITUARY OF REV. JAMES P. MCMULLEN OF GORO, PICKENS COUNTY, ALABAMA

by Col. Thomas Lanier of Bethesda Presbyterian Church

Copied from an old church record on file in the Presbyterian Historical Foundation, Montreat, North Carolina.

"In January 1864 he entered the Confederate Army as a missionary to General Baker's Brigade and remained as such in the discharge of this duty until the 14th day of May 1864, in the Camp Bivouac on the march. In this charge on the 14th of May, this great and good man-fell-a martyr to the cause he so earnestly espoused. He fell in the midst of a heavy fire and his God-like soul returned to the God who gave it. He was already ready to administer to the wants of the sick and wounded. The wounded soldiers from the battlefield found in him a true friend and many a soldier will bless the day he was sent to the Army. He had the respect and confidence of every man in the Brigade. His preaching was of example as well as precept and never shall the writer forget the manner in which he applied the truths of the gospel during a protracted meeting, near Dalton, Georgia in the spring of 1864. Early in May, the spring campaign opened and after some heavy fire our army, gradually falling back, made a stand at Resaca, Georgia. On the 14th of May, our Division was ordered to charge the enemy on our front. Here the many and impulsive nature of the deceased could not be kept out of the charge. When remonstrated with he replied: 'Colonel, my Country is as dear to me as it is to any soldier you have.' He was as true a patriot as he was a Christian Minister. He believed conscientiously that the South was right, and that religion, as well as Civic Liberty was involved in the contest and whether he was right--time will tell. Death is a terrible necessity and a dreadful calamity when such men have been sacrificed in the prime of life--in their days of usefulness. May the good fruit-seeds sown by him during his life, take root, spring up and produce fruit." He married 1838 Martha Leonora Fulton 1817-1869.

# MCSHAN FAMILY

The town of McShan in Pickens County, Alabama was named for this family.

The first known of the name, lived in Fish Dam Post Office, Union District, South Carolina. Celia McShan married 2 time to William Prude in Jefferson County, Alabama April 5, 1823. Thomas McAdory was buried first near Sloss Furnace, Reburied Nov. 24, 1900 in Cedar Hill Cemetery, Bessemer, Ala. Celia was buried first in the McAdory Cemetery, then reburied in Cedar Hill Cemetery.

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Dr. Peyton King was born in Halifax County, Virginia 1795. His parents moved to Georgia, then to Jefferson County, Alabama in 1818, where he lived for ten years, then moved to Pickens County, Alabama in 1833. He was in the State Senate in 1838 and 1841.

One of the oldest homes in Pickens County in 1959 is the Stinson Home, located in the Spring Hill Community. This house was built around 1840 by a "Mr. King" and bought by the Stinson family before the War between the States. The third and fourth generation of the family live there now. It was built of heart pine and poplar and put together with pine and oak pegs.

WILLIAM G. ROBERTSON

Mr. W. G. Robertson was born in Tuscaloosa, Alabama September 25, 1839 and lived to celebrate his 92nd birthday. He was the son of John Robertson of Georgia and Martha B. Walser, who came to Tuscaloosa County, Alabama in 1836. His father was son of Loddick Robertson of Virginia, who fought in the Indian Wars. John was born in Georgia on November 4, 1814; his wife was also born in Georgia, she died on February 9, 1862. John lived in Lincoln County, Tennessee with his parents, then to Alabama, where in married in Tuscaloosa County, October 29, 1838. He married the second time in 1845 to Sarah Thompson, who died in 1848 and he died February, 1885.

W. G. Robertson enlisted in the 18th Alabama Infantry at the age of 18 years; was Orderly Sergeant and 2nd Liet., in 1862 under Col. E. C. Bullock in Company "E". He was captured at Missionary Ridge in Tennessee and a prisoner at Johnson's Island.

W. G. Robertson married August 28, 1841 to Sarah A., daughter of James T. Gardner (born South Carolina, 1818) and Rebecca Cureto, who was born 1825. They had six children. Mr. Robertson lived in Tuscaloosa for a while after the war, moving to Pickens County in 1866. He was Superintendent of the Carrollton Baptist Sunday School for 60 years.

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LEWIS MAXWELL STONE, a well known lawyer of Carrollton, Pickens County, was born in Baldwin County, Georgia in 1834; educated at the University of Alabama and read law at Harvard College. He was a member of the State Legislature in 1849-1853 and in the Upper House 1859-1863; was also a member of the Constitutional Convention of 1861. He married the widow of Gresham Kelly.

#### OBITUARY OF MEREDITH TAYLOR

Died of cancer of the mouth, at the residence of his oldest son, THOMAS TAYLOR, in Pickens County, Alabama on the evening of the 29th ult., in the 81st year of his age - MEREDITH TAYLOR- who was born in the State of North Carolina, near the Virginia line, from which place his father moved to South Carolina--while he was a child and where he remained until the winter of 1833, when he came to this State. (Ala.) He had been an exemplary Christian for the last forty years and was a regular and consistent member of the Baptist Church, almost since the year 1827--having witnesses in the previous year--in October.

During his protracted and loathsome disease, he often expressed a desire to depart that he might be with Christ. He frequently remarked, to the writer, as well as to others, that he had been a great sinner, but that his trust was in the Crucified, Arisen and Exalted Savior, whose blood he conceived to be sufficient to cleanse from all sin, therefore, his friends and relations who are left to mourn his loss, may not sorrow, as those who have no hope, for as much as their loss was doubled. He died March 29, 1844.

The deceased was among the few remaining spirits, who--in the days of the Revolutionary War, stood in the defense of our rights and boldly contended for the rescue of these United States--from the British Tyranny and oppression--in his 16th year--as a substitute for his father--he served in the command under the direction of Col. Lincoln on the Carolina side of the Savannah River, at Black Swamp (now Hamburg) and after three months in the Low Country of South Carolina, at a place called Four Hole.

In the 17th year of his age, he was in the Army under General Greene, on his own account and actually engaged in the memorial battle which occurred at Eutaw Springs, in which the Americans gained an important victory over the British, under Stewart--which really finished the war in South Carolina.

As a reward for his labors and privations, the deceased, as were many of his contemporaries, was spared to see many days to enjoy the many blessings of our free Institutions, so dearly purchased for us, at the expense of the blood of the Whigs of 1776.

He and his departed comrade reared seven children, five sons and two daughters--all of them, except two, live in this state and were to witness his dissolution. His remains lay in the graveyard of the Baptist Church of the Garden, Pickens County, Alabama, he to wait the shrill summons of Gabriel's trumpet, on the Morning of the Resurrection.

## OBITUARY

MR. J. H. WIER

On the 10th day of July, 1885, at 11:30 P. M., Mr. J. H. Wier died at his home, near Carrollton, Alabama in the sixtieth year of age. Mr. Wier was born in Abbeville, District, South Carolina on the 25th day of August 1825. When he was eleven years of age, his parents removed with him to Pickens County, Alabama and where he regarded as his home, with the exception of a few years spent in Mississippi.
