Ten per Cent. is added to the feveral rates of duties, in refpect to goods imported in foreign veffels, except in cases where an additional duty is specially laid on goods so imported.

A Drawback of 99 per cent. on the duty, for exporting

any of the aforesaid articles to foreign countries, (except, Spirits, the drawback of which is mentioned under that

head).

A Bounty is paid on dried and picked Fish, of the fisheries of the U.S. and on other Provisions salted within the States, when exported to a foreign country, viz — On dried Fish, 10 cents per quintal—On pickled Fish, and other salted Provisions, 10 cents per barrel.

By Veffels of the United States, are underflood veffels built in the United States, and wholly belonging to a citizen or citizens thereof; or veffels built in foreign countries, but belonging, on the 16th of May 1789, to a citizen or citizens of the United States, and so continuing until the time of importation.

ALL Masters of Vessels from foreign ports are, within 24 hours after their arrival, to make report at the nearest Custom-house office, and within 48 hours, a surther report to the Collector, of the name, burthen and lading of his vessel, whether stowed loose or in packages, the marks, numbers and contents of each, the place and person to whom configned, and the place where taken in, of what country built, from what place she last sailed, and who was and is master: At the time of delivering the manissist, the master is to declare to the truth thereof, and that no part of her ladings since her departure from the place she last sailed, has been landed, unladed or otherwise removed from on board her; and surther, that in case he shall afterwards know of any goods, other than reported, he will forthwith make report to the Collector.

Mafters of veffels neglecting to report, delivering their manifests, or taking the oath, are liable, for every offence.

to forfeit the fum of 1000 dollars.

Vessels of war, and public packets carrying dispatches,

are exempt from making report.

No Goods to be unloaded but in open day, or without a Permit, under penalty of 400 dollars, dilability from holding office for the term of feven years, and being advertifed in gazette, and for feiture of goods, and if above the fum of 400 dollars, of veffel, &c.

If any part of the cargo shall be unladen, for any purpose whatever (except in distress the commander on board forfeits 1000 dollars, with the goods remaining on board.

Goods to be unladen in fifteen days, or delivered to the

Collector, except falt or coal, which may be continued lenger, on the master or owner paying inspectors.

Goods not agreeing with manifest, or manifest with

delivery, the mafter to forfeit 500 dollars.

No Goods of foreign growth or manufacture to be brought into the U.S. unless by sea, and not in vessels under 30 tons, on forseiture of goods and vessel (except with-

in the diffrict of Louisville.)

Vessels in distress to report in 48 hours from arrival, to protest before a Notary Public or Justice, in 24 hours, and if it appears necessary to the Collector, he may permit to unload, on payment of the duties on goods necessary to pay expences; necessity to be made appear to wardens, or others for the purpose authorized.

Duties to be paid before permit, unless they exceed 50 dollars, in which case, they may be secured by bond with one or more sureties, payable for West-India goods in four months, Madeira wines in twelve-months, other goods in fix months; or the importer may deposit double the value of the duties in goods to fecure the payment of duties.

which, on failure of payment, are to be fold.

Goods ad valurem to be valued by adding 20 per cent. to the actual cost, if from the Cape of Good-Hope or beyond, and 10 per ct. if from any other place, exclusive of charges.

Goods damaged, or without invoice, to be valued on oath or affirmation, by two persons, one chosen by the

Collector, and the other by the party.

No person whose bond for duties is due and unpaid, to

be allowed credit for duties.

Bonds for duties, when due, to be profecuted; and in

case of infolvency, to have preference.

Goods removed before weighed or gauged, without confent of the Collector, or other proper officer, are forfeited.

Perfons knowingly buying goods liable to feizure, forfeit double value; goods found on fearth, which have not paid duties, forfeited.

Drawback allowed at the place of entry only, on all goods exported to any country without the United States in the original packages, and within fix months after payment made, or fecurity given, for duties, retaining one per cent. of duties paid, and excepting where duties do not amount to 20 dellars at the leaft.

Bonds with one or more furcties to be given, that fuch

Goods not entitled to drawback until after 6 menths, and until the exporter produce certificate in writing of two respectable merchants at the foreign port or place where landed, together with the oath of the master and mate of the vessel, certifying the delivery thereof.

Officers may feize within or without their diffrict.

Persons giving or offering bribe, forseit from 200 to

Captain or owner making falle oath of entry, fuffers a fine not exceeding 1000 dollars, and not more than 12

months imprisonment.

Collector, Naval Officer and Surveyor, or person specially appointed by either of them for the purpose, may enter any vessel in which they have reason to suspect goods subject to duty are concealed, and if they have cause to suspect concealment in any dwelling house, store, or other place, on application on oath or affirmation, to any justice of peace, have warrant to enter, in the day time only, and seize.

All penalties, fines and forfeitures, are to be one moiety to the United States, the other to be paid in equal parts to the Collector, Naval-Officer and Surveyor of the port where the fame had occurred; in diffricts where there is one Officer, he has the whole moiety. If the forfeiture is recovered by information given by any other than a Cuftom House officer, one half of faid moiety to be given to the informer, the remainder to be disposed of as aforesaid.

In case of vessel cast away, or other accident, to produce a protest in due form, and in case such protest cannot be had, the oath or affirmation of the experter, or other proof

to the fatisfaction of the collector.

Goods exported for drawback, and re-landed, subject to seizure, together with the vessel, boats, &c. and persons

concerned to fuffer fix months imprisonment.

In order to secure the collection of these duties, boats or cutters are to be equipped, not exceeding ten, to be employed for the protection of the revenue, the expence not to exceed 10,000 dollars, to be paid out of the duties and tonnage on vessels. Each of said boats or cutters to have one Master, and not more than three Mates, four Mariners and two boys; the Master to be allowed 30 Dollars per

month, 1st Mate 20, 2d Mate 16, 3d Mate 14, each Mariner 8, and each boy 4 dollars. The Officers of these boats or cutters to be Officers of the customs, with authority to go on board any vessel within 4 leagues of the coasts of the United States. Small-open row or fail boats with a requifite number of perfons, are also to be provided for the use of the Surveyors and Inspectors in going on board yesfels. for the better detection of frauds.

Substance of the Coasting Act.

ALL veffels to be intitled to the benefits of American veffels, must be registered or enrolled, and have their names and the names of the places to which they belong, painted on their sterns, on a black ground with white letters, at least three inches in length, on forseiture of paying foreign tonnage.

Registers to be granted to none but American built veffels, owned wholly by citizens thereof-or owned by citizens on and fince 16th May 1789, and commanded by citizens of the United States. The Surveyor having first certified their exact tonnage. Bonds to be given for preservation of Registers.

All veffels built in the United States for foreigners, to

be recorded in the Collectors Office, on oath.

American veffels (of the above description) of less than 20 tons, and not less than 5 tons (qualified as before) shall annually procure a licence, which will exempt them from entering or clearing for one year. Masters or owners to give bond, that fuch veffels shall not be concerned in any illicit trade. And before they can renew fuch licence, must make oath that they have not been concerned in any illicit trade.

Masters and owners of American coasting vessels of 20 tons or upwards, shall have licence to trade or fish for one year, tonnage being first paid, and bond given that the veffels shall not be employed in any illicit trade -on failure to procure a licence must pay foreign tonnage.

Masters bound to foreign ports, to deliver a Manifest of the cargo, on oath, before cleared out. Commander or owner ferfeits 200 dollars, for failing without clearance.

Mafters of American coasting vessels having on board foreign goods, &c. of 200 dollars value, or 400 gallons of rum, and bound from one diffrict to another, must deliver duplicate regular Manifests of robole cargo, on oath (one of which manifests shall be returned certified to the master) before permit can be obtained to depast. If not having foreign goods or rum on board, no manifests are required, but they may proceed to any district in the same state or next adjoining state.

American coasting vessels, if bound to any other than adjoining state or district in the same state, and if having American goods or produce on board, must deliver duplicate regular manifests on oath, (one of which will be returned certified) before permit to proceed can be obtained.

Coasting vessels (as before described) from same, or adjoining state, before permission to land the cargo can be obtained, must deliver a manifest thereof on oath, within

24 hours after arrival; Sundays excepted.

In all cases masters of coasting vessels, must within 24 hours after arrival, Sundays excepted, deliver the manifest which was received from the Collector authenticated, be-

fore permit to land goods can be obtained.

If a mafter of any vessel having goods, &c. on board of 200 dollars value, sails without certified manifest and permit, he forfeits 400 dollars and goods: Vessels bound to a district in same, or adjoining sate, and having on board American goods, &c. rum, or other ardent spirits, excepted.

Licenced vessels, if bound to a foreign port, must deliver up their licence—and in case of neglect, the master forseits

100 dollars.

Veffels not intitled to Register or Enrollment, and frau-

dulently using either, are forfeited.

Falle fwearing to be punished, as wilful and corrupt perjury. Persons forging or altering official documents, to forseit 500 dollars.

By an Act of Congress, for the government of Seamen in the Merchants Service, — It is enacted, That

Masters of Vessels bound from a port in the United States to a foreign port, or if the vessel be burthen fifty tons or upwards, bound from a port in one State to a port in any other State, other than an adjoining State, shall, before proceeding on such voyage, make an agreement in writing or print, with the seamen (except they be apprentices) de-

claring the voyage, or time, for which they are shipped on neglect, are liable to give the highest wages given at the port where said seamen shipped, and also sorfeit 20 dollars

for every fuch feaman.

That at the foot of fuch contract there shall be a memorandum of the day and hour on which such seamen shipped. And if any such seamen shall neglect to render himfelf on board the vessel at the time mentioned in such memorandum, and if the master of such vessel, shall on the day on which such neglect happened, make an entry in the log book of such vessel, of the name of such seaman, and note the time he so neglected to sender himself, such seaman shall forseit for every hour, which he shall so neglect to render himself, one day's pay. And if he wholly neglects to render himself on board of such vessel, so that the vessel proceed to sea without him, such seaman shall forseit a sum equal to that which shall have been paid him by advance at the time of signing the contract, over and besides the sum so advanced.

That if the mate or first officer under the master, and a majority of the crew of a veffel bound on a foreign voyage. shall, after the voyage is begun (and before the vessel has left the land) discover that the vessel is leaky, or otherwise unfit in her crew, tackle, provisions, &c. and shall require fuch unfitness to be enquired into, the master shall, upon the request of faid mate, &c. forthwith proceed to, or stop at, the nearest or most convenient port or place where such enquiry can be made, and there apply to the diffrict judge, if he shall there reside, or if not, to some justice of peace of the place; and thereupon such judge or justice is authorised and required to iffue his precept directed to three perfons in the neighbourhood the most skilful in maritime affairs. requiring them to repair on board fuch vessel, and to examine the fame, and make report to faid judge or justice, in writing, in what respect said vessel is unfit to proceed on the intended voyage, and what addition of men, &c. and what repairs, &c. will be necessary: and upon such report the faid judge or justice shall adjudge and determine, and shall endorfe on faid report his judgement, whether faid veffel is fit to proceed, &c. and the master and crew shall conform to faid judgement; and the master or commander shall, in the first instance, pay all the costs-to be taxed

and allowed by the judge or justice. But if the complaint of the crew shall appear upon the report and judgement, to have been without foundation, then the mafter or the owner, or confignee of fuch veffel. Thall deduct the amount thereof, and of reasonable damages for the detention, (to be ascertained by the said judge or justice) out of the wages growing due to the complaining feamen or mariners. And if after such judgment, such vessel is fit to proceed on her voyage, or after procuring fuch men, provisions, stores, repairs or alterations as may be directed, faid feamen shall refuse to proceed on the voyage, it shall be lawful for any justice of the peace to commit by warrant every such seaman or mariner, who shall so refuse, to the common gaol of the county, there to remain without bail or mainprize, until he shall have paid double the fum advanced to him at the time of subscribing the contract for the voyage, together with fuch reasonable costs as shall be allowed by the faid inflice, and inferted in the faid warrant.

That if any person shall harbor or secrete any seaman or mariner belonging to any ship or vessel, knowing them to belong thereto, every such person, on conviction thereof, before any court in the city, town or county, where he, she or they may reside, shall forfeit ten dollars for every day which he, she or they shall continue to harbor or secrete such seaman or mariner, one half to the prosecutor, the other half to the United States; and no sum exceeding one dollar, shall be recoverable from any seaman or mariner by any one person, for any debt, contrasted during the time such seaman or mariner shall actually belong to any ship or vessel, until the voyage, for which such seaman or mariner.

engaged. Shall be ended.

That if any seaman or mariner, who shall have subscribed such contract as is herein before described, shall absent him-self from on board the vessel in which he shall so have ship ped, without leave of the master, or officer commanding on board, and the mate, or other officer having charge of the log-book, shall make an entry therein, of the name of such seaman, on the day on which he shall so absent himself, and if such seaman or mariner shall return to his duty within 48 hours, such seaman shall forseit three day's pay, for every day which he shall so absent himself, to be deduc-

ted out of his wages; but if any framan or mariner flall absent himself for more than 48 hours at one time, he shall forfeit all the wages due to him, and all his goods and chattels which were on board said vessel, or in any store where they may have been lodged at the time of his desertion, to the use of the owners of such vessel, and moreover still be liable to pay to him or them all damages which he

or they may fuftain. That every feaman or mainer shall be entitled to de mand and receive from the mafter of the veffel to which he belongs, one third part of the wages which shall be due to him, at every port where such veifel shall unlade her cargo, before the voyage be ended, unless the contrary be expressly Appulated in the contract; and as foon as the voyage is ended, and the cargo or ballast be fully discharged at the last port of delivery, every seaman or mariner shall be entitled to the wages which shall be then due; and if not paid in ten days after discharge, or if any dispute shall arise between the master and seamen touching the said wages, it shall be lawful for the judge of the district where said vessel shall be, or, in case his residence be more than three miles from the place, or of his absence from the place of his residence, then, for any judge or justice, to fummon the master of fuch veffel to appear before him, to shew cause, why process should not iffue against such vessel, her tackle, &c. to answer for the said wages; and if the master shall ne glect to appear, or appearing, shall not shew that the wages are paid; in fuch case, the judge or justice shall certify to the clerk of the court of the district, that there is sufficient cause of complaint whereon to found admiralty process, and thereupon the clerk of fuch court shall iffue process against said vessel, and the fuit shall be proceeded on in the faid court, and final judgment be given, according to the course of admiralty courts in such cases used : and in such fuit all the feamen or mariners (having cause of complaint of the like kind, against the same vessel) shall be joined as complainants, and it shall be incumbent on the master to produce the contract, and logbook, if required, to afcertain any matters in dispute, otherwise the complainants shall be permitted to frate the contents thereof, and the proof of the contrary shall lie on the master, but nothing herein contained shall prevent any seaman or mari ter from having from immediate process out of any court having admiralty jurifdiction, wherever any ship or vessel may be found, in case she shall have left the port of delivery where her voyage ended, before payment of the wages, or in case she shall be about to proceed to sea before the end of ten days.

That if any feaman, who shall have figned a contract to perform a voyage, shall at any port or place, defert, or shall absent himself from such vessel without leave of the matter. it shall be lawful for any justice of peace, within the United States (upon complaint of the mafter) to iffue his warrant to apprehend fuch deferter, and bring him before fuch inflice, and if it then shall appear by due proof, that he has figned a contract within the intent and meaning of this act. and that the voyage agreed for is not finished, altered, or the contract otherwise diffolyed, and that such seaman has deferted or absented himself without leave, the said justice shall commit him to the house of correction, or common gaol of the city, town or place, there to remain until faid veffel shall be ready to proceed on her voyage, or till the mafter shall require his discharge, and then to be delivered to faid mafter, he paying all costs, and deducting the same out of faid feaman's wages.

That every vessel belonging to a citizen of the United States, of the burthen of 150 tons or upwards, navigated by 10 or more persons in the whole, and bound on a voyage without the limits of the U.S. shall be provided with a chest of medicines, put up by some apothecary of known reputation, and accompanied by directions for administering the same, and in default of having such medicine chest so provided, and kept sit for use, the master of such vessel shall pay for all such advice, medicine, or attendance of physicians, as any of the crew shall stand in need of, in case of sickness, at every port or place where the vessel may touch at during the voyage, without any deduction

from the wages of such fick feaman or mariner.

Every vessel bound across the Atlantic ocean, to be provided with 60 gallons of water, 100 wt. of meat, and 100 wt. of bread, for every person on board, and in preportion for shorter or longer voyages—on penalty that the master or owner shall pay to each of the crew one day's wages for every day they shall be put to short allowance.

Treasury Department, September 28, 1790.

THE following regulations, which have been adopted towards carrying into execution the act, making provision for the debt of the United States, are announced for the information of the public creditors.

WHEN a transfer is to be made from one person to another, the certificate or certificates of the debt to be transferred, must be produced at the proper effice, in order that the same may be cancelled, and a new one, or new ones.

iffue, as the case shall require.

When a transfer is defired from one office to another, application must in the first instance be made to the office, where the credit exists, whereupon the certificate or certificates of the debt to be transferred will be cancelled, and a special one granted, as a voucher to the Secretary of the Treasury; upon the production and delivery of which to him a warrant will issue to the office, to which the debt is to be transferred, where the business will be completed. The form (A) at soot hereof, has been adopted for letters of attorney, to make transfers, which, and the directions for compleating it, it is expected will be carefully observed.

In every case of a transfer of the subscribed or funded debt, the new certificate will bear interest, only from the first day of the quarter, in subicb the transfer is made. The unpaid interest which may have accrued prior to that quarter, will be paid only to the person, who was stockholder at the time it accrued, or to his special assignee.

Fourteen days before the expiration of each quarter, the books of each office will be closed; fo that no transfers will be made, nor except at the Treasury, will any subscriptions be received, or old certificates exchanged for new ones, on the application of non-subscribers, during that period. This, the proper distribution of the funds, and the preservation of order render indispensable.

On the subscribed or funded debt, interest as it becomes due, will be paid without production of the certificates is sued for the same. On the unsubscribed debt, if any there shall be, the production of the certificates will be necessary, in order to the receipt of the interest, and an indossement of the payment of it upon the certificates. This

however, in confideration of the rifk and inconvenience of transmission, will not be required of those who hold certificates of the Register of the Treasury, and reside out of the United States. The form (B) at foot hereof, of a letter of attorney for receiving interest, and the directions therewith, it is expected will be carefully purfued.

The bank shall take charge of the cash of all those who chuse it there (free of expence) and shall keep it subject to their order, payable at fight; and shall receive deposits of ingots of gold, bars of silver, wrought plate, or other valuable articles of small bulk, in the same manner, and return

them on demand of the depositor.

Ordinance relating to the Bank-continued.

The bank shall receive all specie coins, according to the rates and value that have been or shall hereafter be estab-

lished by Congress.

That until offices of discount and deposit shall be established, there shall be at least two discount days in every week, when meetings of the board of directors shall be assembled.—Discounts shall be made at a rate not exceeding six per cent. per ann. on notes or bills of exchange that have not more than fixty days to run, and with at least two responsible names, and under such modifications as the board of directors in their discretion, shall deem satisfactory and expedient.

The president shall have power to convene the directors on special occasions, and with the approbation of the board of directors, to affemble and fix the feal of the corporation—the faid seal shall always remain in the custody and safe

keeping of the Prefident.

A committee of the board, confifting of at leaft three members to be elected monthly by ballot, shall visit the vaults, in which the cash and other effects shall be deposited, at least once in every month, and make an inventory of the same, to be compared with the books, in order to ascertain whether they perfectly agree therewith.

No notes of the bank shall be firuck or figned, or bank

paper made, but by the direction of the board.

In case the board of directors shall at any time make a dividend exceeding the profits of the bank and thereby diminish the capital stock, the members affenting thereto, shall be liable in their several individual capacities for the amount of the surplus so divided.

The board of directors shall, previous to the first day of December in every year, call a general meeting of the stockholders to be affembled, within three days after each

annual election.

The board of directors are authorifed to afcertain and determine in what manner the remaining portions of the capital flock, due on the shares subscribed, consisting of specie and public debt, shall be paid and received.

They are also authorised to fix and establish requisite, safe, and convenient forms for transferring bank stock;

Ordinance relating to the Bank—continued. for receiving yearly half dividends; for conveying a right to proxies to represent flock holders at any general meeting; for the certificates of capital flock of the bank; for the circulating and post notes of the hank; and for the oath or affirmation of the officers of the bank, previous to their entering on the execution of their respective duties.

The board of directors are authorifed to establish a common feal, with suitable devices; to ascertain and mark out the various duties and employments of the officers, clerks and servants of the bank, and to direct them accordingly—as well as to determine the amount of securities they shall respectively give for the saithful discharge of their duties; to assign to the president such additional functions, as are not already designated by law—and to re-issue or renew at their discretion the notes in circulation.

The directors shall have power to make loans to the government of the United States, or of any state, to such extent, and on such terms as they shall deem expedient, not contrary to law: provided that a board constitute of directors shall less than a majority of the whole number of directors shall

be necessary to decide in all such cases.

Articles of Contract with the Post-Riders.

THE Mail shall be conveyed three times a week from the first of May to the first of November, and twice a week from the first of November to the first of May, from Portland, in Massachusetts, to Suffolk, in Virginia t And from Suffolk to Savannah, in Georgia, twice a week, from the first of May to the first of November, and once a week from the first of November to the first of May.

I hat in case any accident shall happen to the stage to delay it, the mail shall be forwarded so as to arrive at each office at the stated hour, at the expence of the

contractor.

By the laws of this State, every person who belongs to the Infantry Companies, are required at all times to be furnished with a well fixed mustet, the barrel not less than three seet and an half long, and a bayonet therete, with a sheath and belt or strap for the same, with a ram-rod, worm, priming-wire and brush, a cartouch-box carrying 16 rounds of cartridges, made with good musket powder and ball, fitting his gun, fix good flints, one canteen holding not less than three pints, on penalty of 3s. for want of fuch arms and ammunition as is hereby required, and 1s. for each defect, and the like fum for every four weeks he shall remain emproyided.

And that every light dragoon shall always be provided with a good serviceable horse, not less than 14 hands high, to the acceptance of the two chief commissioned officers of the company, covered with a good saddle, with housing and other proper furniture, bitt bridle and holfters, a case of good pistols, a sword or cuttas, not less than four set in length, and also a cap made of jirk leather, a stask or cartouch-box, one pound of good powder, three pounds of sizable bullets, 12 slints, a good pair of boots and spurs, on penalty of £.3 for want of such horse, and the value of each other article in which he shall be deficient.

FREEMEN's-MEETINGS in Connecticut, are by law held annually the third Monday in September, and on the Monday next following the

first Tuesday in April.

The following paragraphs of an all, entitled, "An All for regulating the Election of the Governor, Lieutenant-Governor, Affilants," &c. are by law to be read in Freemen's-Meeting previous to the Votes being given in: and in the April Meeting is likewife to be read the Freeman's Oath, and the names of those who stand in Nomination:

Be it enacted, &c. That if any Perfon finall endeavour unduly to persuade or influence any other Perfon or Perfons, in giving their Vote or Suffrage for any Member of the Legislature, by offering to any Person or Persons any written Vote or Votes for that Purpose, without being first thereto requested; such Person so offending, shall pay a fine of Forty Shillings, for the use of the Town Treasury.

And be it further enacted, That no Person or Persons shall offer, accept, or receive any sum or sums of Money, or other Matter or Thing, by way of Gift, Fee er Reward, for giving or refusing to give any Vote or Suffrage for electing any Member of the General Assembly of this State, nor promise, procure, or any ways confer any Gratuity, Reward, or Preterment for, or on Account of any Vote or Suffrage given, or to be given in any Election: And every Person so giving, offering, accepting or receiving as asoresaid, shall in every such Case, for eit and pay the sum of Five Pounds; one Half to him or them that shall sue for and prosecute the same to Esset, and the other Half to the Treasury of the Town where the Offence is committed.

And any Person who shall be convicted a second Time of

the like Offence thall be disfranchifed.

And every Perfon who shall be elected by means of such evil and illegal Practice as aforefaid, shall be, and hereby is declared to be incapable to ferve as a member in such Affembly; unless fuch Person shall be able to satisfy said Affembly that the fame was done altogether without his Privity, and that he was not directly or indirectly concerned therein.

The Freeman's Oath.

JOU A. B. being by the Providence of God, an Inhabitant of this State of Connecticut. and now to be made Free of the same, do swear by the Name of the Everliving GOD, that you will be true and faithful to faid State, and the Constitution and Government thereof, as a free and independent State, and whenfoever you shall be called to give your Vote or Suffrage touching any Matter which concerns this State, you shall give it as in your Conscience you shall judge will conduce to the best Good of the same, without respect of Persons or favour of any Man. So help you GOD.

As the following AET is to be read at the Town Meetings in December-it is bere inserted for the conveniency of those

nobom it concern, and for the information of others.

An Act for the more effectual putting in Execution the Laws against Vice, Immorality and Profaneness, and

for promoting Christian Knowledge.

WHereas putting in Execution the good and wholesome Laws for restraining, punishing and suppressing profane, immoral and irreligious Practices in this State, and promoting Chriftian Knowledge, will greatly tend to the bonor of Religion, the Peace and good Order of buman Society, and to suppress Vice and Wickedness: Therefore, that the same may be more generally and effectually done,

BE it enacted, &c. That all Judges and Justices of the Peace in the respective Counties in this State, be, and they are hereby required to be diligent and careful in putting in Execution all fuch Laws and Acts as are or shall be made in this State, for the punishing, restraining or suppressing any Profa eness, Immorality, or irreligious Practices or Disorders, that thereby the good Ends proposed in

fuch Acts and Laws may be attained .

That the Select men from Time to Time, shall make diligent Enquiry of all Housholders within their respective Towns, how they are furnished with Bibles; and if upon such Enquiry any Housholder be found without one Bible at least, then the Select men shall warn the said Housholder forthwith to procure one Bible at least, for the use and benefit of their Families respectively: And if the same be neglected, then the said Select men shall make Return thereof to the next Authority, who may deal with such Housholder's Family according to the directions of the Law relating to the educating and governing of Children.

And all fuch Families as are numerous, and whose Circumstances will allow thereof, shall be supplied with Bibles according to the number of Persons of Capacity to use the same in such Families; and with a suitable number of orthodox Catechisms, and other good Books of practical

Godliness, and the like.

That the Constables, Grandjury-men and Tything men in the respective Towns in this State, shall, and they are hereby required to make diligent Search after, and Presentment make of all the Breaches of the Laws, which relate

to their Office or Offices respectively.

And the Constables and Grandjury-men in the respective Towns shall, on the Evenings after the Lord's-Day, and other public Days of religious Solemnity, walk the Street, and duly search all Places suspected for harbouring or entertaining any People or Persons aftembled contrary to Law.

Be it further enacted, &c. That the Justices of the Peace, Grand-jurors, Constables and Tything-men in the respective Towns in this State, shall annually meet in the respective Towns to which they belong, on the first Monday of January, and on the third Monday in June, at the Place where their annual Town-Meetings are held, or at some other Place by them appointed, there to advise, consider, and use their joint Interest in suppressing Prosaneness,

Vice, and Immorality, and for the due Execution of all the Laws of this State, to which their Offices have Relation.

And be it further enacled, &c. That the Town Clerk of each respective Town in this state, at the opening of the public Town Meeting for electing Town-Officers in December annually, if present, and in his Absence the Selectmen for the Time being, who shall be present, shall read or cause to be read this Act, and every Paragraph thereof publicly in this Meeting. And if such Clerk, being present, or such Selectmen present in the Clerk's Absence, shall neglect or resuse publicly to read, or cause to be read this Act; then the said Clerk or Selectmen in resusing or neglecting, shall sorseit and pay the Sum of Twenty Shillings; one half to the Complainer, who shall prosecute to Effect, and the other half to the Town-Treasury.

And the Conftables and Grandjury men are directed to enquire after, and due Prefentment make of all Breaches of this Act, to some Assistant or Justice of the Peace; who are hereby impowered to hear and determine the same.

SCHOOLS.

Y the law of this State for establishing public schools, it is enacted, " That every town within this State wherein there is but one ecclefiaftical fociety constituted, or that shall be constituted by the general affembly, wherein there are the number of 70 housholders or families, or upwards, shall be at least 11 months in each year constantly provided with, and shall keep and maintain one good and sufficient school for the teaching and instructing of youth and children to read, and write; which school shall be fleadily supplied with and kept by a master sufficiently and fuitably qualified for that fervice. And every fuch town and feciety wherein there is not the faid number of 70 housholders or families, shall be provided with, and maintain a school and a school-master as aforesaid, at least one half of the year annually. And also there shall be a grammar school set up, kept and constantly maintained in every county town of the feveral counties that are, or shall be made in this State; which shall be steadily kept by some discreet person of good conversation, and well skilled in and acquainted with the learned languages, especially Greek and Latin."

The law makes it the duty of the civil authority and felect-men to visit the schools from time to time, particularly once in each quarter of a year, and enquire into the time faid schools are kept-the qualifications of the masters, and proficiency of the children: and they are to give fuch directions as they shall think needful to render such schools more serviceable for the increase of knowledge, religion and good manners.

Drawbacks not payable until fix months after exportation, nor until a certificate in writing is produced, by the exporter, from two reputable merchants at the foreign port or place where landed, together with the oath of the mafter and mate certifying the delivery thereof; except diffilled for its, in which a certificate from an American confulit fuch there be; or from two American merchants, refiding at fuch foreign port: or of there be neither, then a certificate from reputable merchants of the place, & the oath of the mafter & mate as above, and an oath is further required that on diligent fearch no fuch conful or American merchants could be found refident there. Goods ad val. to be valued by adding 20 per cent. to the actual cost, if from the Cape of Good Hope or beyond, and 10 per cent from any other place, exclusive of charges.

WHEN a transfer is to be made from one person to another, the certificate or certificates of the debt to be transferred, must be produced at the proper office, in order that the fame may be cancelled, and a new one, or new ones

iffue, as the case shall require.

When a transfer is defired from one office to another. application must in the first instance be made to the office where the credit exists, whereupon the certificate or certificates of the debt to be transferred will be cancelled, and a special one granted, as a voucher to the Secretary of the Treasury; upon the production and delivery of which to him a warrant will iffue to the office, to which the debt is to be transferred, where the bufiness will be completed. The form (A) at foot hereof, has been adopted for letters of attorney, to make transfers, which, and the directions for compleating it, it is expected will be carefully observed.

In every case of a transfer of the subscribed or funded debt, the new certificate will bear interest, only from the first day of the quarter, in which the transfer is made. The unpaid interest which may have accrued prior to that quarter, will be paid only to the person, who was stockhold-

er at the time it accrued, or to his special assignee.

Fourteen days before the expiration of each quarter, the books of each office will be closed; so that no transfers

will be made, nor except at the Treasury, will any subfcriptions be received, or old certificates exchanged for new ones, on the application of non-subscribers, during that period. This, the proper distribution of the funds, and the prefervation of order render indispensible.

On the subscribed or funded debt, interest as it becomes due, will be paid without production of the certificates iffued for the same. On the unsubscribed debt, if any there shall be, the production of the certificates will be necessary, in order to the receipt of the interest, and an indorsement of the payment of it upon the certificates. however, in confideration of the rifl; and inconvenience of transmission, will not be required of those who hold certificates of the Register of the Treasury, and reside out of the United States. The form (B) at the foot hereof, of a letter of attorney for receiving interest, and the directions therewith, it is expected will be carefully purfued.

Spirits are not to be transported by land or water unless ac-

companied with the necessary certificates.

The following articles are to be inspected, and certificate of inspection produced at the customhouse, at the time of clearing, viz.

Pork--beef--fish--butter-lard--flour--tobac-

co-pot and pearl ashes-staves-shingles, and boards.

"I certify, that twenty barrels of pork have been inspected by me, agreeable to law, and ac-

" cording to the brands affixed to the fame."

ALL Mafters of Veffels from foreign ports are, within 24 hours after their arrival, to make report at the nearest Custom-house office, and within 48 hours, a further report to the Collector, of the name, burthen and lading of his veffel, whether stowed loofe or in packages, the marks, numbers and contents of each, the place and person to whom configned, and the place where taken in, of what country built, from what place she last failed, and who was and is mafter; At the time of delivering the manifest the master is to declare to the truth thereof, and that no part of her lading, fince her departure from the place the last failed, has been landed, unladed or otherwise removed from on board her; and further, that in case he shall afterwards know of any goods, other than reported, he will forthwith make report to the Collector.

Masters of vessels neglecting to report, delivering their manifests, or taking the oath, are liable, for every offence,

to forfeit the fum of 1000 dollars.

Veffels of war, and public packets carrying dispatches,

are exempt from making report. No Goods to be unloaded but in open day, or without a Permit, under penalty of 400 dollars, difability from holding office for the term of feven years, and being advertifed in gazette, and forfeiture of goods, and if above the fum of 400 dollars, of veffel, &c.

If any part of the cargo shall be unladen, for any purpose whatever (except in diffres) the commander on board forfeits 1000 dollars, with the goods remaining on board.

Goods to be unladen in fifteen days, or delivered to the Collector, except falt or coal, which may be continued longer, on the mafter or owner paying inspectors.

Goods not agreeing with manifest, or manifest with de-

livery, the mafter to forfeit 500 dollars.

No Goods of foreign growth or manufacture to be brought into the U.S. unless by sea, and not in vessels un der 30 tons, on forfeiture of goods and veffel (except with-

in the district of Louisville.)

Veffels in diffress to report in 48 hours from arrival, to protest before a Notary-Public or Justice, in 24 hours, and if it appears necessary to the Collector, he may permit to unload, on payment of the duties on goods necessary to pay expences; necessity to be made appear to wardens, or others for the purpose authorized.

Duties to be paid before permit, unlefs they exceed 50 dollars, in which case, they may be secured by bond with one or more surgices, payable for West India goods in four months, Madeira wines in twelve months, other goods in fix months; or the importer may deposit double the value of the duties in goods to seture the payment of duties, which, on failure of payment, are to be fold.

Goods ad walorem to be valued by adding 20 per cent. to the actual cost, if from the Cape of Good Hope or beyond, and 10 per ct. if from any other place, exclusive of charges.

Goods damaged, or without invoice, to be valued on oath or affirmation, by two perfons, one chosen by the Collector, and the other by the party.

No person whose bond for duties is due and unpaid, to be allowed credit for duties.

be allowed credit for duties

Bonds for duties, when due, to be profecuted; and in case of insolvency, to have presence.

Goods removed before weighed or gauged, without confent of the collector, or other proper officer, are forfeited.

Perfons knowingly buying goods liable to feizure, forfeit double value; goods found on fearch, which have not paid duties, forfeited.

Drawback allowed at the place of entry only, on all goods exported to any country without the United States in the original packages, and within fix months after payment made, or fecurity given, for duties, retaining one per cent. of duties paid, and excepting where duties do not amount to 20 dollars at the leaft.

Bonds with one or more furettes to be given, that fuch goods shall not be re-landed within the United States.

Goods not entitled to drawback until after 6 months, and until the exporter produce certificate in writing of two respectable merchants at the foreign port or place where landed, together with the oath of the master and mate of the vessel, certifying the delivery thereof.

Officers may feize within or without their district.

Persons giving or offering bribe, forseit from 200 to 2000 dollars.

Captain or owner making false oath of entry, suffers a fine not exceeding 1000 dollars, and not more than 12 months imprisonment.

Collector, naval officer and furveyor, or person specially appointed by either of them for the purpose, may enter

any veffel in which they have reason to suspect goods subject to duty are concealed, and if they have cause to suspect concealment in any dwelling-house, store, or other place, on application on oath or affirmation, to any justice of peace, have warrant to enter, in the day time only, and seize.

All penalties, fines and forfeitures, are to be one moiety to the United States, the other to be paid in equal parts to the collector, naval-officer and furveyor of the port where the fame had occurred; in districts where there is one officer, he has the whole moiety. If the forfeiture is recovered by information given by any other than a custom-house officer, one half of said moiety to be given to the informer, the remainder to be disposed of as aforesaid.

In case of vessel cast away, or other accident, to produce a protest in due form, and in case such protest cannot be had, the oath or affirmation of the exporter, or other proof.

to the fatisfaction of the collector.

Goods exported for drawback, and relanded, subject to feizure, together with the vessel, boats, &c. and persons

concerned to fuffer fix months imprisonment.

In order to fecure the collection of these duties, boats or cutters are to be equipped—each to have one master, and not more than three mates, sour mariners and two boys; the master allowed 30 dollars per month, 1st mate 20, 2d mate 16, 3d mate 14, each mariner 8, and each boy 4 dols. The efficers of these boats or cutters to be officers of the customs, with authority to go on board any vessel within 4 leagues of the coasts of the United States. Sma'l open boats are also provided, to go on board vessels, for the better detection of frauds.

By a subsequent ast—no vessel arriving at any port within the U. S. where a post office is established, shall be permitted to report, make entry or break bulk, till the master shall have delivered to the post master, all letters directed to any person within the U. S. which, under his care or within his power, shall be brought in such vessel, other than such as are directed to the owner or consignee: except said vessel, shall be bound to another port, than that at which the may enter. The master is entitled to two cents for each letter or packet—to be paid by the post-master. Collector to require an oath of such master &c. that he has delivered such letters, &c.

Substance of the Coasting Act.

ALL vessels, to be intitled to the benefit of American vessels, must be registered or enrolled, and have their names and the names of the places to which they belong, painted on their sterns, on a black ground with white letters, at least three inches in length, on forseiture of paying foreign tonnage.

Registers to be granted to none but American built veffels, owned wholly by citizens thereof—or owned by citizens on and since 16th May 1789, and commanded by citizens of the United States. The surveyor having sirst certified their exact tonnage. Bonds to be given for pre-

fervation of Registers.

Vessels built in the United States for foreigners, to be

recorded in the collector's office, on oath.

American veffels (of the above description) of less than 20 tons, and not less than 5 tons, (qualified as before) to procure a licence annually, which will exempt them from entering or clearing for one year. Massers or owners to give bond, that such vessels shall not be concerned in any illicit trade. And before they can renew such licence, must make oath that they have not been concerned in any illicit trade.

Masters and owners of American coasting vessels, of 20 tons or upwards, shall have licence to trade or fish for one year, tonnage being first paid, and bond given that the vessels shall not be employed in any illicit trade—en failure to procure a licence must pay foreign tonnage.

Mafters bound to foreign ports, to deliver a manifest of the cargo, on oath, before cleared out. Commander or owner forseits 200 dollars, for failing without clearance.

Masters of American coasting vestels having on board foreign goods, &c. of 200 dollars value, or 400 gallons of rum, and bound from one district to another, must deliver duplicate regular manifests of wibble cargo, on oath (one of which manifests shall be return'd certified to the master) before permit can be obtained to depart. If not having foreign goods or rum on board, no manifests are required, but they may proceed to any district in the same state or next adjoining state.

American coasting vessels, if bound to any other than adjoining state or district in the same state, and if having

American goods or produce on board, must deliver duplicate regular manifests on oath (one of which will be returned certified) before permit to proceed can be obtained.

Coasting vessels (as before described) from same, or adjoining state, before permission to land the cargo can be obtained, must deliver a manifest thereof on oath, within

24 hours after arrival, Sundays excepted.

In all cases masters of coasting vessels, must within 24 hours after arrival, (Sundays excepted) deliver the manifest which was received from the collector authenticated, before permit to land goods can be obtained.

If a mafter of any vessel having goods, &c. on board of 200 dollars value, fails without certified manifest and permit, he forfeits 400 dollars and goods : Veffels bound to a district in same, or adjoining state, and having on board Imerican goods, &c. rum, or other ardent fpirits, excepted.

Vessels not intitled to Register or Enrollment, and frau

dulently using either, are forfeited.

False swearing to be punished, as wilful and corrupt perjury. Perfons forging or altering official documents. to forfeit 500 dollars.

A President and Vice-President are in future to be chosen every fourth Year from the sirft Wednesday in December, 1792.—The Electors are to be chosen in each State within thirty-four days preceeding said first Wednesday in December, to meet at such place as the Legislature shall direct.—Congress is always to be in Session on the second Wednesday of February after such Elections; and the four years (the term for which a President and Vice-President are elected) is always to commence on the sourch day of March after the choice is ascertained and declared by Congress.

Three Certificates of the number of Votes for the President and Vice-President, are to be sent, sealed up, one to the President of the Senate at the Seat of Government before the first Wednesday in January by Express; another to him by the Post; and the third to be delivered to the Judge of the District in which the Electors shall assemble.—The Names of the Electors are to be annexed to each of the lists of their

votes.

At a Convention of the Committees of the General Assembly of the Presbyterian Church in the United States of America, and of the General Association of the State of Connecticut, on Wednesday the 14th of September, 1791, in the Chapel of Yille-College:

Onfidering the importance of univerfal harmony in the Christian Church, and the duty incumbent on all its pastors and members to assist each other, in promoting, as far as possible, the general interests of the Redeemer's kingdom; and considering further, that Divine Providence appears to be now opening the door for pursuing these valuable objects, with a happy prospect of success:

"This Convention are of opinion that it will be conducive to these important purposes, that a standing Committee of Correspondence be appointed in each body, whose duty it shall be, by frequent Letters, to communicate to each other whatever may be mutually useful to the Churches under their care, and to the general interest of the Redeemer's kingdom.

44 That each body should, from time to time appoint a Committee conflicting of three members, who shall have a right to sit in the others general meeting, make such communications as shall be directed by their respective consituents, and deliberate on such matters as shall come before

the body: but shall have no right to vote.

"That effectual measures be mutually taken to prevent injuries to the respective churches, from irregular and un-

authorized preachers.

"To promote this end the Convention judge it expedient, that every preacher, travelling from the limits of one of these churches into those of the other, shall be surnished with recent Testimonials of his regular standing and good character as a preacher, signed by the moderator of the presbytery, or of the association, in which he received his

licence; or of a minister, of his good standing and charac ter as fuch, from the moderator of the profbytery or affociation, where he last resided; and that he shall, previously to his travelling as a preacher into diffant parts, further receive a recommendation from one member, at least, of a standing Committee to be hereafter appointed by each body, certifying his good qualifications, as a preacher; also that the names of this standing committee shall be mutually communicated; and also that every preacher travelling and recommended as above, and submitting to the stated rules of the respective churches, shall be received as an authorized preacher of the gospel, and cheerfully taken under the patronage of the Presbytery, or Association. within whose limits he shall find employment as a pleacher."

ffue, as the case shall require.

When a transfer is defired from one office to another, application must in the first instance be made to the office where the credit exists, whereupon the certificate or certificates of the debt to be transferred will be cancelled, and a special one granted, as a voucher to the Secretary of the Treasury; upon the production and delivery of which to him a warrant will issue to the office, to which the debt is to be transferred, where the busines, will be completed.

The form (A) at foot hereof, has been adopted for letters of attorney, to make transfers, which, and the directions for compleating it, it is expected will be carefully observed.

In every case of a transfer of the subscribed or funded debt, the new certificate will bear interest, only from the sirft day of the quarter, in which the transfer is made. The unpaid interest which may have accrued prior to that quarter, will be paid only to the person, who was stockholder at the time it accrued, or to his special assignee.

Fourteen days before the expiration of each quarter, the books of each office will be closed; for that no transfers will be made, nor except at the Treasury, wil any subforiptions be received, or old certificates exchanged for new ones, on the application of non-subscribers, during that period. This, the proper distribution of the sunds, and the preservation of order render indispensible.

This however, in confideration of the risk and inconvenience of transmission, will not be required of those who hold certificates of the Register of the Treasury, and reside out of the United States. CONNECTICUT MEDICAL SOCIETY.

At a Convention of the Medical Society, bolden by adjournment at Hartford, on the 15th day of May, 1793.:

E it ordained, That the Secretary of faid Society shall be record all the transactions of the Convention, and conduct their correspondence, and have the custody of the seal of the society.

Be it ordained, That the treasurer shall keep the monies of the society, subject to their orders, and shall annually render an account to the Convention of all the monies re-

ceived and paid by him.

Be it ordained, That an Auditor of Accounts shall be annually appointed, who shall examine all claims upon the society; and if allowed, shall draw orders on the treasurer for the amount; and no money shall be paid on any account without such orders. And said Auditor shall annually lay before the convention, the several accounts so examined and allowed, with the amount of the orders he shall draw upon the Treasurer.

Be it ordained, That it shall be the duty of the examining committees in the several counties, to make an annual return to the secretary of the seciety, of the several persons by them licensed, and the date of their license, and an entry shall be made in the records of the society, of every license granted, containing the name of the person licensed, and of the President and examining Committee signing the same.

Be it ordained. That all communications from members of this state, shall be made to the Clerks of the county meetings, and by them shall be laid before such meetings for examination, and if approved by the county meetings, shall be transmitted to the secretary of the society, to belaid before the convention.

Be it ordained, That it shall be highly diffreputable for any member to affume or hold the knowledge of any noffrum, or palm any medicine or composition on the people as a fecret, and that any fuch member shall be deemed unworthy to belong to the Medical Society; and that the members of the society shall hold no medical correspondence with such characters, nor consult with them in any medical case whatever; and that all pretenders to nostrums, shall be deemed and considered proper subjects for expulsion from this society.

Refelved. That the Prefident and Fellows of the Connecticut Medical Society, shall receive fix shillings per diem for each Member, while attending in Medical Convention; and fix pence per mile while travelling from their feyeral

places of abode, to the Convention.

be re-exported to a foreign Pdrt, in the Verlel in which they shall be imported; and all Articles of the growth, product or manufactures of the United States.

The Duty on Horses, Cattle, Sheep, Swine, and other

useful Beasts, imported for Breed, is repealed.

Foreign Goods, subject to duty, are sorfeited, together with the vessel, if imported in any vessel under 30 tons. Captains of Vessels are to deliver their Letters at the Post-Office, before they can make Entry.

By Act of Congress regulating Vessels employed in the Coasting Trade and Fisheries.

TO licence granted to any veffel shall be considered in force any longer than such weffel is owned, and of the description as set forth in such licence; no wessel can carry on any other employment than that for which she is specially licenced, under penalty of forfeiture of weffel and cargo; every weffel of 20 tons and upwards must be enrolled and licenced, and every weffel between five and twenty tons muß be licenced, and if found trading between diffrict and diffrict, or between different places in, the same diffict, without being thus enrolled or licenced, if laden with goods not duriable, or in ballast, shall be liable to fees and tonage as foreign wessels; and if dutiable goods are on board the veffel and lading is forfeited ; any enrolled or licenced veffel proceeding on a foreign voyage without being duly registered, is forfeited; every licence is to be given up within three days after it expires; if any licenced wesself is sound without her name on her stern, the owner forfeits 20 dollers; when an en-rolled wessel shall be sold in whole or in part, or altered in form, burthen, or denomination, the faid weffel shall be enrolled anciv, and in case of a transfer, there must be an instrument in writing, in nature of a bill of fale, reciting, at length, the enrollment, which inftrument is to be produced at the cuftom-boufe, in order to obtain a new ennollment, the bond for the enrollment, or for the license is to be given, by the owner or mafter and one or more securities; a change of the master must be endorsed by the collector on the carollment and licence, and the master or owner must be present at the time; a licenced wessel arriving from one district to another in the same or adjoining state, having on board more than 500 gallons of spirits, or 250 gallons of wine, or 3000lb. Sugar, of or 500lb. tea, or 1000lb. of coffee, or

or foreign merchandize exceeding in value 400 dollars, or any kinds of dutiable articles exceeding in value 800 dollars, must clear and enter; and if destined from a district in one state to any other than in an adjoining state, must clear and enter in all cases; when a wessel licenced to carry on the fisheries, intends to touch and trade at any foreign place, the master must previous to bis departure obtain a permission for that purpose; if the master of a wessel employed in the transportation of goods from district to district shall put in o a port, other than the one to which he is destined, he shall make report of his arrival within 24 hours; every weffel, before being enrolled or licenced in the first instance, must be measured by a surveyor.

DY the last REGISTERING ACT it is provided that, when any Veffel shall be fold in whole, or in part, or al. tered in form, burtben or denomination, the faid veffel shall be registered anew; and in case of a Transfer, that there shall be an instrument in writing, in nature of a bill of Sale, reciting at length the register-which instrument is to be produced at the custom-bouse, in order to obtain a new register, and if the former register shall not be delivered up as required by Said act, the owner forfeits 500 dollars --- the register bond is to be given by the owner, master, and one or more sureties. That, upon the entrance of every weffel of the United States, from any foreign port, the owner shall make oath that, to the best of his knowledge and belief, the Register of such vessel contains the names of all the persons who are then owners of faid wessel, or, if any part has been transferred, that fuch is the case; and that no foreign subject or cuinen bath any share, by way of trust, considence, or otherwise, in such wessel and, if the owner does not reside at the port of entry, the master shall make outh to the like effect. If any weffel is found without her name, and the name of the port to which he belongs, painted on her flern, the owner for feits 50 dollars, one balf to any person giving the information.

If any Register shall be knowingly used for any wessel not then actually entitled to the benefit of it, such wessel shall be for seited.

The owner or master must be present at the time of endorsing a change of the master.

The law is the same with respect to enrolled weffels.

Rates of GOLD and SILVER COINS,

As established by an Act of Congress, Feb. 9, 1793.

THAT after the 1st day of July 1793, foreign Gold and Silver Coins shall pass current as Money within the United States, and be a legal tender for the payment of all debts and demands, at the several rates as sollows,

and not otherwise, viz.

The gold coins of Great-Britain and Portugal, of their present standard, at the rate of one bundred cents for every twenty feven grains of the actual weight thereof; the gold coins of France, Spain, and the dominions of Spain, of their present standard, at the rate of one bundred cents for every twenty feven grains and two-fifths of a grain, of the actual weight thereof. Spanish mill'd Dollars, at the rate of one bundred cents for each Dollar, the actual weight whereof not to be less than 17 pennyweights and 7 grains; and in proportion for the parts of a dollar. Crowns of France, at the rate of one bundred and ten cents, for each Crown, the actual weight whereof not to be less than 18 pennyweights and 17 grains, and in proportion for the parts of a Crown. But no foreign Coin that may have been, or shall be iffued subsequent to the first day of Jan. 1792, shall be a tender as aforefaid, until famples thereof shall have been found, by affay at the Mint, to be conformable to the respective Randards required, and proclamation thereof that have been made by the Prefident of the United States.

That at the expiration of three years next enfuing the finds when the coinage of gold & filver shall commence at the Mint of the United States (which time will be amounced by the proclamation of the President of the United States) all soreign Gold Coins, and all foreign Silver Coins, except Spanis mill d Dollars, and parts of such Dollars.

are to cease to be a tender.

That all foreign Gold and Silver Coins (except Spanish mill'd Dollars, and parts of such Dollars) which shall be received in payment for Monies due to the United States after the said time, when the coining of Gold and Silver Coins shall begin at the Mint of the United States, shall, previously to their being issued in circulation, be coined anew, in conformity to the Act for establishing a Mint.

fall into the St. Lawrance from these that fall into the Atlantic Ocean; by upper Canada, the river Iroquois or Cataraquay, the Lakes; (viz.) lake Ontario, lake Erie, lake Huron, lake Superior, the Long Lake, the Lake of the Woods; and a line drawn due west from the north-westernmost angle of the last mentioned lake to the river Missippi: On the west by the river Missippi: On the fouth, by West-Florida, East-Florida, and St. Mary's river: On the east, by the Atlantic Ocean, the river St. Croix, and Nova-Scotia: Comprehending all islands with-

in twenty leagues of the coaft.

The late geographer of the United States, Mr. Hutchins, has computed that the surface contained within the above boundaries is one million of square miles; which amounts to 640,000,000 of acres. Of this, agreeable to his computation, 51,000,000 of acres are water. So that the land within the United States amounts to 589,000,000 of acres. About three fifths of which is comprised within the States that now compose the Union. The remainder, to wit, 220,000,000 of acres, lying west of the northern and middle states, and northwest of the river Ohio, and extending to the river Missispi, together with an extensive territory south of the Ohio, originally ceded to the United States, by North Carolina, South Carolina, and Georgia, forms what is usually denominated the Western Territory.

A great proportion of this territory is yet claimed and

occupied by the aboriginal natives.

UNITED STATES.

Treasury Department, Sept. 28, 1790.
THE following regulations have been adopted towards carrying into execution the act, making provision

for the debt of the United States.

When a transfer is to be made from one person to another, the certificate or certificates of the debt to be transferred, must be produced at the proper office, in order that the fame may be cancelled, and a new one, or new ones iffue, as the case shall require. --- When a transfer is defired from one office to another, application must in the first instance be made to the office where the credit exists, whereupon the certificate or certificates of the debt to be transferred will be cancelled and a special one granted, as a voucher to the fecretary of the Treasury; upon the production and delivery of which to him a warrant will iffue to the office, to which the debt is to be transferred, where the business will be completed. The form (A) at foot hereof, has been adapted for letters of attorney, to make transfers, which, and the directions for compleating it, it is expected will be carefully observed.

In every case of a transfer of the subscribed or funded debt, the new certificate will bear interest, only from the first day of the quarter, in which the transfer is made. The unpaid interest, which may have accrued prior to that quarter, will be paid only to the person, who was stockholder

at the time it accrued, or to his fpecial affignee.

Fourteen days before the expiration of each quarter, the books of each office will be closed; fo that no transfer, will be made, nor except at the Treasury, will any sub-

fcriptions be received, or old certificates exchanged for new ones, on the application of non-subscribers, during that period.

On the subscribed or funded debt, interest as it becomes due will be paid without production of the certificates iffued for the same. On the unsubscribed debt, if any there mall be, the production of the certificates will be necessary in order to the receipt of the interest, and an indorfement of the payment of it upon the certificates. This however, in confideration of the rifk and inconvenience of transmiffion, will not be required of those who hold certificates of the Register of the treasury, and reside out of the United States. The form (B) at the foot hereof, of a letter of attorney for receiving interest, and the directions therewith, it is expected will be carefully purfued.

RATES of GOLD and SILVER COINS, As established by Act of Congress, Feb. 9, 1793.

THAT after the 1st day of July 1793, foreign gold and filver coins shall pass current as Money within the United States, and be a legal tender for the payment of all debts and demands, at the seveal rates as sollows,

and not otherwise, viz.

The gold coins of Great-Britain and Portugal, of their present standard, at the rate of one bundred cents for every twenty feven grains of the actual weight thereof, the gold coins of France, Spain, and the dominions of Spain, of their present standard, at the rate of one bundred cents for every twenty-feven grains and two-fifths of a grain, of the actual weight thereof. Spanish mill'd Dollars, at the rate of one bundred cents for each Dollar, the actual weight whereof not to be less than 17 pennyweights and 7 grains; and in proportion for the parts of a dollar. Crowns of France, at the rate of one bundred and ten cents, for each Crown, the actual weight whereof not to be less than 18 pennyweights and 17 grains, and in proportion for the parts of a Crown. But no foreign Coin that may have been, or shall be issued fubsequent to the 1st day of Jan. 1792, shall be a tender as aforefaid, until famples thereof shall have been found, by affay at the Mint, to be conformable to the respective standards required, and proclamation thereof shall have been made by the Prefident of the United States.

That at the expiration of three years next enfuing the time when the coinage of gold and filver shall commence at the Mint of the United States (which time will be announced by the proclamation of the President of the United States) all foreign gold Coins, and all foreign silver Coins, except Spanis mill'd Dollars, and parts of such Dollars,

are to cease to be a tender.

That all foreign gold and filver Coins (except Spanish mill'd Dollars, and parts of fuch Dollars) which shall be received in payment for Monies due to the United States after the said time, when the coining of Gold and Silver Coins shall begin at the Mint of the United States, shall, previously to their being issued in circulation, be coined anew, in conformity to the Act for establishing a Mint.

about 173,000 millions be living upon earth: and as the continent of the world contains, at least, 1587 billions of square feet, there would still be for each inhabitant groofquare feet.

Counting three generations for an age, and taking for certain, that the world is 5700 years old, we find there were fince the creation 171 generations, 124 fince the deluge, and 53 fince the birth of Christ.

The number of the inhabitants of a country or of a city is renewed almost every thirty years, and in one hundred years the human race is re-

newed 3 1-3 times.

the charge of a strange nurse, 500 perish.

Of 115 deaths there may be reckoned one woman in child bed, but one only out of 100

dies in labor.

It is observed that more girls than boys die o the small pox in the natural way.

In the small-pox hospital in London out o

3434 inoculated children 10 only died, where out of 4656 children that had at the same time the small pox in the natural way, there died 1634.

From calculations founded on the bills of mortality, there is only one out of 3,125 that

reaches the age of 100.

Men live every where to the age of 90 and 100 if their life is not shortened by external accidents.

More people live to a great age in elevated

lituations than in those that are lower.

From divers bills of mortality, a calculation has been made, how long a perfon of a certain age may with probability hope to live. The following refult of that calculation will be found useful to tontines.

The age of 7 years is that, in which we may hope yet to live the greatest number of years.

At the age of 12—14 we have passed one sourth part of

our life, at 28 and 29 we are in the midft of life, with 50 we have passed away-three fourths of it.

It appears from the bills of mortality that the women

after having passed a certain age, generally live longer

than men.

Comparing the numbers of deaths we find that the number of men is to that of women, as 27 is to 25.

Married women live longer than those who are not

married.

By observations made during the space of 50 years, it has been found that the greatest numbers of deaths have been in the months of March, September and August; and the fewest in the months of November, December, and February.

The half of all that are born, die before they reach the age of feventeen; so that those who out-live that period more or less, enjoy a preserence, which one half of the

human race does not attain.

The number of old perfons who die during cold weather, are to those who die during the warm feason, as seven to four.

The first month, especially the first day after birth, are marked by the greatest number of deaths; of 2735 infants, who die young, 1292 die on the first day, and the remainder during the first month.

The most healthy children are born in the months of

January, February and March.

The number of those who die annually is to the births

as 10 to twelve or 13.

The married women are to the whole female inhabitants of a country as one to three. The married men to all the males as three to five.

The number of boys above 13 years is to the whole

number of inhabitants of a country as 4 to 33, and the

girls above 13, to the whole as 3 to 25.

If the whole number of inhabitants is divided into two parts, one part is old 27 years and above, and the other, which is however a little more numerous, is under that age.

The number of males, born annually, is to the number of females as 21 to 20, but as in their infancy 2.25 more boys die than girls; the number of males and females is towards the age of maturity again equal.

The number of twins is to that of the whole number of

fingle births as 1 to 65.

The number of marriages is to that of the inhabitants of

a country as 175 to 1000.

In a well peopled country we may count but one out of

fifty annually that marries.

In country-places there are on an average 4 children born of each marriage; in cities we can reckon but 35 children to 10 marriages.

We may always reckon one fourth of the male inhabi-

tants of a country to be able of carrying arms.

The number of widows is to that of widowers, as 3 to one, but that of widows who re-matry to that of widowers as 4 to 6.

The number of widows is to the number of the whole inhabitants as 1 to 51, that of widowers as one to 15.

The number of widowers, and widows is to that of

marriages as a to 7.

It is confirmed by experience, and by the observations of physicians, that in large towns out of 100 persons, there are through the year never more than 20 sick for the space of a month, or 24 for a fortnight.

Of the whole number of female inhabitants of a country, the eighteenth only is brought to bed annually.

Births that happen before 9 months, are more frequent

FEES of Confuls from the United States. For authenticating under feal, every protest, deposition or other act, which captains, mariners, paffengers, merchants, or others may chuse to make, two dollars.

For taking possession of and fettling the personal estate of any citizen of the U. S. who shall die within the limits of his consulate five per centum on the gross amount.

For taking into poffession, settling and paying the balances due on the personal estate lest by any citizen of the U.S. who shall die within his limits five per cent.

For delivering fuch estate to legal representatives before a final fettlement, if in money, two and an balf per centum.

They are to notify the death of any person, and to take measures in regard to stranded vessels of the U.S.

TO licence granted to any veffel shall be confidered in force any longer than such vessel is owned, and of the description as set forth in such licence; no vessel can carry on any other employment than that for which the is specially licenced, under penalty of forfeiture of veffel and cargo; every veffel of 20 tons and upwards must he enrolled and licenced, and every veffel between five, and twenty tons must be licenced, and if found trading between diffrict and diffrict, or between different places in the same diffrict, without being thus enrolled or licenced. if laden with goods not dutiable, or in ba laft, shall be liable to fees and tonage as foreign vessels; and if dutiable goods are on board the veffel and lading is forfeited; any enrolled or licenced veffel proceeding on a foreign voyage without being duly registered, is forfeited; every licence is to be given up within three days after it expires ; if any licenced vessel is found without her name on her stern, the owner forfeits 20 dollars; when an enrolled wessel shall be fold in whole or in part, or altered in form. burthen, or denomination, the faid veffel shall be enrolled anew, and in cafe of a transfer, there must be an instrument in writing, in nature of a bill of fale, reciting, at length, the enrollment, which inftrument is to be produced at the custom-house, in order to obtain a new enrollment, the bend for the enrollment, or for the licence is to be given, by the owner or mafter and one or more fe curities; a change of the mafter must be endorsed by the collector on the excellment and licence, and the mafter or owner muft be prefent at the time; a liceneed veffel atriving from one district to another in the fame or adjoining state, having on board more than 500 gallons of spirits, or 250 gallons of wine, or 3000lb. fugar, or 500lb. of tea, or 1000lb. of coffee, or foreign merchandize exceeding in value 400 dollars, or any kinds of dutiable articles exceeding in value 800 dollars, must clear and enter; and if destined from a district in one state to any other than In an adjoining state, must clear and enter in all cases; when a veffel licensed to carry on the fisheries, intends to touch

and trade at any fereign place, the master must previous to his departure obtain a permission for that purpose; it the master of a vessel employed in the transportation of goods from district to district shall put into a port, other than the one to which he is destined, he shall make report of his arrival within 24 hours; every vessel, before hein enrolled or licenced in the sirst instance, must be measured by a surveyor.

(REGISTERING ACT.)

By the last Registering Ast it is provided that, whe ed in form, burthen or denomination, the faid veffel sha be registered anew; and in case of a Transfer, that ther shall be an instrument in writing, in nature of a bill o fale, reciting at length the register-which instrument i to be produced at the custom-house, in order to obtain new register, and if the former register shall not be deliver ed up as required by faid act, the owner forfeits 500 do. lars—the register bond is to be given by the owner, ma ter, and one or more fureties. That, upon the entrance of every veffel of the United States, f.om any foreign por the owner shall make oath that, to the best of his know ledge and belief, the Register of such vessel contains th names of all the persons who are then owners of faid ve fel, or, if any part has been transferred, that fuch is the case; and that no foreign subject or citizen hath any shar by way of truft, confidence, or otherwife, in such vesseland, if the owner does not refide at the port of entr the mafter shall make oath to the like effect. If any ve fel is found without her name; and the name of the po to which she belongs, painted on her stern, the own forfeits 50 dollars one half to any person giving the info formation.

If any Register shall be knowingly used for any vest not then actually entitled to the benefit of it, such vest

shall be forfeited.

The owner or master must be present at the time of endorsing a change of the master.

The law is the same with respect to enrolled vessels.

For every coach the yearly fum of 10 dollars.

For every chariot 8 dollars.

For every phæton and coachee, 6 dollars.

For other four wheel, and every two wheel top carriage, 2 dollars.

All retail dealers of wines and foreign diffilled spirituous liquors, are yearly, by a late law of Congress, after the 30th of September 1794, to take out a license from the Supervisor of the revenue for retailing the same, for which they are to pay for each 5 dollars, on forseiture of 50 dollars if they fell without having a license therefor.

And the editor takes this opportunity to express his wishes that the Captains and Brigade-Inspectors would make their returns seasonably, the year ensuing, to the Adjutant-General, that the public may, for once at least, have a compleat lift of the military officers in the State. If such a lift can be obtained, the editor proposes to enlarge on his plan another year, and to publif at an earlier period.]

Extracts from an Act of this State, entitled, "An ACT providing in case of sickness."

"Be it further enacted by the authority aforesaid, That when it shall happen that any ship or vessel shall come from any place where the small pox, or other

contagious fickness is prevalent, it shall be the duty of the master of such vessel, and in case of inability in the mafter, it shall be the duty of the next officer success fively upon their arrival in any harbour, road or creel in this state, forthwith to give information to one of more of the felectmen of fuch town where fuch vel fel shall first arrive, from whence they came and the true circumstances of the people and cargo or board. And whatever mafter or other officer, on board fuch vessel shall for the space of twelve hours after him arrival as aforefaid, neglect to give information as a forefaid, or faail neglect to wait for and punctually of bey fuch orders as shall be given in such case according to law, or shall suffer any of the people belonging tell fuch ship or vessel to go on shore, (except to give in formation as aforefaid) shall forfeit to the treasurer of fuch town where such offence shall be committed, the fum of fifty pounds lawful money, to be recovered by bill, plaint or information in any court proper to try the fame.

"And if any passenger or other person on board such vessel shall presume to go on shore from any such vessel (except as before exempted before information as associated, has been given, and order thereon made) such person shall incur upon himself a sine of ten pounds law-

A fum not exceeding 140,000 dollars, is annually to be appropriated to compensate and support such persons as may be appointed by the President, to serve the United St. tes in foreign parts; but the annual salary of a Minister Plenipotentiary is not to exceed 9000 dollars; of a Charge des Assaires, 4500 dollars; of a Minister Plenipotentiary, 1350 dollars; the sum to be advanced to either of them is not to exceed their salary.
