## INTRODUCTION

For years it has been my desire to see published a history and genealogy of the descendants of Thomas Stanton of Connecticut.

In 1882 "An Incomplete Record" was printed for private distribution by Hon. John D. Baldwin of Worcester, Mass. In his preface Mr. Baldwin expressed a hope that some one would enlarge his collection of notes, and publish it for circulation.

Realizing that each passing year made it more and more difficult to secure old family records, and to trace the posterity of those born before the Revolutionary War, I was led to undertake this work in 1885. Since then I have devoted to it all the time that could possibly be spared from a busy pastor's life.

The work is not complete, it could be continued through a long lifetime, passed on to a succeeding generation, and then be incomplete. There are Stantons among the earlier generations of whom nothing more will ever be known than that they were born at a given time. Others, of whom nothing is now known save name and birth-date, will undoubtedly be traced through generations now unrecorded, and found to be ancestors of numerous but at present unlocated families.

For those of the tribe of the house of Thomas Stanton, who have aided me in this work, cheerfully furnished the required facts, and in every way tried to make the work a success, I have the warmest feelings of gratitude and the heartiest words of thanks.

For those who have refused all information, who have shown a total lack of any family historic spirit, and who have been repeatedly but vainly written to for facts in their possession, I have but this warning: Your refusal to aid in this work, just to that extent has made it a failure. When you discover the absence of your name or your family, or the inaccuracy of such items as could be "picked up" about you and your's from others, have at least the grace to place the blame where it belongs — on your own negligent head, and not on the author.

Information of families known to belong to this line of Stantons, and not recorded here, corrections of errors and supplied omissions will be gladly received by me, and if a future edition is ever demanded they will be included therein.

Trusting that this book will be an incentive to the future preservation of family records, that it will foster a spirit of honest American pride in an ancestry for two hundred and fifty-six years faithful to the spirit and institutions of our country, and that no future cause in the interest of religion, patriotism, morality and good government will ever lack supporters and defenders among us and our descendants,

# HISTORICAL PART.

## CHAPTER I.

A SKETCH OF THOMAS STANTON, THE FIRST OF THIS FAMILY IN AMERICA, 1635-1677.

#### Part I.

A compilation of such facts relating to our first Stanton ancestor in America, as have been gathered from a multitude of sources, will form a proper introduction to this genealogy and history of his descendants.

From the New England Historical and Genealogical Register (vol. ii, p. 113), we learn that January 2, 1635, Thomas Stanton took passage for Virginia in the merchantman Bonaventura, and that he recorded himself as being twenty years old. The ship's record shows no other passenger named Stanton. is certain, therefore, that he came unattended by any relative bearing the same name. There was a John Stanton in Virginia prior to 1635; from 1652 to 1688 there are records of a Robert Stanton of Dorchester, Mass., and another Robert Stanton, a Quaker, was a resident of Newport, R. I., prior to 1645. This Robert of Newport died in 1672, aged 73 years. His descendants are now very numerous in the United States, and many of them are still Friends or Quakers. As Edwin M. Stanton, Lincoln's great Secretary of War, has been thought by many to be a descendant of Thomas, I will state here that he is in direct line from Robert of Newport. Savage and many of the older New England genealogists quessed that Robert was an older brother to Thomas, but there is not the slightest evidence to that effect, nor, so far as records go, do they seem to have even known each other or ever inter-visited.

There is no proof that Thomas was related in any way to any person in America, or that any relatives ever followed him to this country. There is a family tradition that before his death he received a legacy from his former home across the sea, but there are no records to prove even this. Undoubtedly there were on record in New London, Conn., many records and documents that would have been invaluable witnesses as to Mr. Stanton's origin, ancestry and youthful life. His will was probably recorded there and no other copy of it has as yet been found. But these New London county records were destroyed in 1781 by the traitor Benedict Arnold when he sacked and burnt New London town.

Our family history has thus been robbed of much that would be interesting and important; much still remains, however, and to this we will now address ourselves.

Evidently Mr. Stanton's stay in Virginia was very short. In 1636 he appears on record in Boston, Mass., serving as a magistrate. He may have traded and mingled a little with the Indians in Virginia, acquired some knowledge of their language, and then sailed for New England. We know that he subsequently visited the Indians in Virginia, for there was in the New London county records a curious document, without date, but apparently entered in 1668 or 1669. It reads as follows:

"Whereas Capt. Morrice hath reported and informed the King's Commissioner that Mr. Thomas Stanton, Senr. did, in Virginia, some 20 odd years since, cause a massacre among the Indians, whereby to gain their Beaver to himself, and the said Morrice named Richard Arve, mariner, to be his author:

"These may certify all whom it may concern that the said Arye being examined concerning said report, doth absolutely deny that he knew or reported any such thing to Morrice nor ever heard of any such thing about Mr. Stanton in Virginia to his remembrance." This document was acknowledged in court by Richard Arye, and attested by David Wetherell, recorder.

The next we know of Mr. Stanton is in connection with the Pequoit War. Just before the war he had been serving Winthrop as Indian interpreter, while the latter was in command at Saybrook. July 4, 1636, Mr. Fenwick, Mr. Hugh Peters and Mr. Thomas Stanton bore instructions from Boston to Winthrop at Fort Saybrook, Conn. (going overland), as to the Pequoits.

The war followed immediately. From Caulkins' Hist. of New London, Conn. (p. 296), I copy the following tribute: "The services of Mr. Stanton, as interpreter during the Pequoit War, were invaluable. He was moreover a man of trust and intelligence, and his knowledge of the country and of the natives made him a useful pioneer and counselor in all land questions, as well as difficulties with the Indians." In DeForest's Hist. of the Indians of Connecticut (p. iii) is another record of a second visit to Fort Saybrook, near the end of the war, when its commander was the historic soldier, Capt. Lion Gardner. DeForest says: "Sometime in April (1637) a small vessel arrived at the fort, having on board Thos. Stanton, a man well acquainted with the Indian language, and long useful to the colonial authorities as interpreter."

Mr. Stanton served through this war. Special mention is made of his bravery in the battle of Fairfield Swamp, where he well nigh lost his life.

He must have returned to Boston very soon after peace was secured, for Drake, in his History of Boston, names him as one of the magistrates in the trial of John Wheelwright, which took place Oct. 3, 1637.

The next seventeen months of Mr. Stanton's life were eventful ones, for in them occurred his marriage and settlement in Hartford, Conn. In June, 1636, Rev. Thomas Hooker and 100 other persons came from Newtown (Cambridge), Mass., and founded Hartford, Conn. In February, 1639, there were 127 property-holders in Hartford, and among them were Dr. Thomas Lord and his son-in-law, Thomas Stanton. It is not known whether Dr. Lord and his family came to Hartford with Hooker or at a later date. The time of Mr. Stanton's arrival and mar-

riage is not known, but we do know that his wife was Ann, eldest daughter and third child of Dr. Thomas and Dorothy Lord.

#### THE LORD FAMILY.

#### Part II.

Dr. Thomas Lord was b. 1585; Dorothy, his wife, was b. 1589. They were married in England in 1610, and came to America April 29, 1635, in the *Elizabeth and Ann*. Mrs. Lord died in 1676, aged 87 years. She sealed her will with the arms of the "Lord alias Laward" family. The arms are thus described:

"Ar. on a fess gu. between three cinque foils az. a. hind pass. between two pheons or."

The following copy of the first medical license granted in the New England Colonies will be full of interest to every reader, and especially so to us who are descendants of the herein licensed Doctor Lord.

"Courte in Hartford, 30th of June, 1652.

"Thomas Lord, having ingaged to this Courte to continue his aboade in Hartford for the next ensuing yeare, and to improve his best skill amongst the inhabitants of the Townes uppon the River within this jurissdiction both for setting of bones and otherwise, as at all times, occassions and necessityes may or shall require; This Courte doth graunt that hee shall bee paid by the Countey the sum of fifteene pounds for the said ensuing yeare, and they doe declare that for every visitt or journye that hee shall take or make, being sent for to any house in Hartford, twelve pence is reasonable; to any house in Wyndsor, five shillings; to any house in Wethersfield, three shillings; to any house in Farmington, six shillings; to any house in Mattabeseck, eight shillings; (hee having promised that hee will require no more,) and that hee shall bee freed for the time aforesaid from watching, warding and training; but not from finding armes, according to lawe."

It will be of interest to learn a little as to the brothers and sisters of Mistress Thomas Stanton nee Lord. They were all born across the sea, and as follows:

Richard, b. 1611; Thomas, Jr., b. 1619 (Ann, who m. Thos. Stanton, b. 1621); William, b. 1623; John, b. 1624; Robert, b. 1626; Aymie, b. 1629; Dorothy, b. 1630.

As this book is not a Lord Genealogy, I have made no effort to follow the fortunes of these brothers and sisters. A few facts, however, as to the senior brother Richard have an historic value. He was a merchant in Hartford, and was one of the body corporate to whom King Charles granted the Connecticut charter, April 20, 1662. He seemed to be of rather a pugnacious disposition, for on Oct. 12, 1643, he engaged his brother-in-law, Thomas Stanton, in a quarrel about trading for Indian corn. He used very threatening language, and drew his sword, but before he could use it he was arrested and fined five pounds by the Hartford Court. It would be interesting to know how Mr. Stanton conducted himself in this little broil, but we only know that the Court Record makes no case against him.

In 1658 the first troop of horsemen in Conn. was organized, and Richard Lord was chosen captain. He died in New London, May 17, 1662, and was buried in the old burial-place there. A table of red sandstone covers his grave, cracked and sunken below the surrounding soil; it is, nevertheless, still there; probably the oldest inscribed tombstone east of the Connecticut river. The inscription is legible, and reads thus:

# AN EPITAPH ON CAPTAINE RICHARD LORD, DECEASED.

May 17, 1662, Ætatis SV. Æ 51.

- "The bright starre of our cavallrie lyes here.
  Unto the state a counselore full deare
  And to y\* truth a friend of sweete content.
  To Hartford Towne a silver ornament.
- "Who can deny to Poore he was releife And in composing paroxysmes was cheife. To Marchants as a patterne he might stand Adventring dangers new by sea and land."

Capt. Lord left a son Richard, Jr., who was half owner of the ship *America*, valued at £230.

The descendants of Dr. Thos. Lord's sons are a large and honored family in and out of Connecticut, and this book tells who and what his posterity is by his daughter Ann.

#### THOMAS STANTON AGAIN.

#### Part III.

He is now married and residing in Hartford, Conn. In what follows I wish to acknowledge my indebtedness to "The Public Records of the Colony of Connecticut from 1636-1677," as published by J. Hammond Trumbull at the order of the General Assembly of Connecticut, May, 1849.

In said records the name of Thomas Stanton is found over 60 times; his son John is referred to 14 times; reference is also

made to his sons Thomas, Jr., and Joseph.

There was not then even as much uniformity in the orthography of proper names as there is now. Court clerks exercised a delightful freedom in such matters, and I have found in records of the same court the name spelled in three different ways—Stanton, Staunton, Steynton.

The name is a compound of two Anglo-Saxon words — Stan meaning stone, and Ton meaning town. Stanton, often spelled Staunton, therefore means stone town, and was probably assumed by a remote Saxon ancestor, who lived in a place called Stonetown, or as it would then have been called Stan-ton. Surnames originally designated occupation, estate, place of residence or some particular thing or event related to the person. In this case it was place of residence. Where the people in certain districts pronounce their "a" broad, it would be natural in time to spell the word according to pronunciation, therefore, we have the spelling now common in some parts of England and the United States (in Mass. and Virg. particularly), and which indicates a broad "a," Staunton. Many of the families recorded in this book spell their name with an "u," as a rule I find that

they or some of their ancestral line have lived in Massachusetts long enough to earn the extra letter. For the sake of uniformity and because the common ancestor of them all did not use the "u," I invariably omit it except in quotations.

The following autograph is proof of the way in which Thomas spelled his name as well as of the sturdy character of the man.

A fac-simile of the signature of Thos. Stanton of Hartford,



Conn., to the Constitution of the Colony of Connecticut. Signed by him during the session of

"A gen<sup>r</sup>all Cort at Harteford. 5th Apr 1638."

At said term of court the following record was made:

"It is ordered that Thomas Staunton shal be a publicke officer for to attend the Corte uppon all occasions, either Generall or priculer, as also any meetinge of the Magistrates to interprett between them and the Indians, as also is to have for it 10l. pr Annum."

At this same session of Court he, with others, was sent on a mission to the Warranocke Indians. The same year (1638) Mr. Stanton was a delegate to an English and Indian Council-meeting at Hartford. Among other delegates were Roger Williams of Providence, Uncas of the Mohegans and Miantinomo of the Narragansetts. He also received ten pounds for past services to his country, and was given authority to represent Hartford in all trade for beavers at 1s. per skin.

Nov. 24, 1638, we find him at New Haven acting as interpreter for the Yorkshire colonists of Quinnipiac (New Haven) in their purchase of the land, where the city now stands, from the Indians. To the deed of said land is added the following declaration:

"I, Thomas Stanton, being interpreter in this treaty, do

hereby profess in the presence of God that I have fully acquainted the Indians with the substance of every article and truly returned their answer and consent to the same, according to the tenor of the foregoing writing, the truth of which, if lawfully called, I shall readily confirm at any time.

(Signed) THOMAS STANTON."

This year Thos. Stanton, Jr., was born in Hartford.

In 1641, the second son, John, was born.

In April, 1642, Mr. Stanton and his brother-in-law, Mr. Richard Lord, make a voyage to Long Island to trade and collect old debts. It would seem that these two were then in business partnership which may have been dissolved the next year by the quarrel already referred to.

In 1643, the eldest daughter, Mary, was born in Hartford,

and in 1644 Hannah was born.

The third son and fifth child, Joseph, was born in 1646. That same year Mr. Stanton violates his license and sells some lead beyond the jurisdiction of Hartford. For this he pays a fine of five pounds. Because of his trading trips or for some other reason he is so long absent from Court as an official that a successor to him is appointed for one year, but in 1648 Mr. Stanton is re-engaged as Court Interpreter at a salary of five pounds per year.

The same year his sixth child, Daniel, is born in Hartford. In connection with that birth it is inferred that some trouble arose, for shortly after we find Mr. Stanton entering suit for 200 pounds in an action of slander against one Joane Sipperance, "to the utter undoing of his wife's good name, and almost taking away her life." Since he got judgment for only 20s. we conclude that while he had cause for complaint it was not quite so serious a matter as he thought.

We now find a possible explanation for the long absence from Court of Thomas in 1646. In 1648 he has decided to remove his business from Hartford to the south-eastern corner of the Colony, and the following record is a result of his decision.

## "A Session of the Generall Courte, 6th of Febr. 1649.

This Courte, taking into consideracon the petition of Thos. Staunton presented to them, have graunted to him and doe order, that hee shall have libberty to erect a trading house at Pawcatuck, with six acres of planting ground, and libberty of feed and mowing, according to his present occasions, and that none within this jurisdiction shall trade within that River for the space of three years next ensuing; provided hee submitt himselfe to such other exceptions and cautions as the Governor and Deputy shall judge meett."

As soon as possible after receiving permission to do so Mr. Stanton built and occupied his trading-house on the Pawcatuck river, but for the time his family remained in Hartford. When they did move they went first to Pequot and then to what is now Stonington, Conn.

He probably went to Pequot with his family in 1651, and to his permanent residence at Stonington in 1658. If these dates are correct, his seventh child, Dorothy (b. 1651), was born either just before leaving Hartford or just after reaching Pequot. The three other children were born in Pequot, Robert in 1653, Sarah in 1655, Samuel in 1657.

About the time of the removal from Hartford, an interesting act of the General Court was recorded, which I now copy. "Code of Laws, May, 1650.

"This Courte, judging it necessary that some meanes should bee used to convey the lighte and knowledge of God and of his Worde to the Indians and Natives amongst us, doe order that one of the teaching Elders of the Churches in this jurisdiction, with the helpe of Thomas Stanton, shall bee desired, twise at leaste in every yeare, to goe amongst the neighbouring Indians and indeavor to make knowne to them the Councells of the Lord, and thereby to draw and stirr them up to direct and order all theire wayes and conversations according to the rule of his Worde. And Mr. Governor and Mr. Deputy, and the other Magistrates are desired to take care to see the thinge attended,

and with theire owne presence so farr as may be convenient incourage the same."

### THE STANTONS IN STONINGTON.

#### Part IV.

Every student of words will be struck with the fact that Stanton and Stonington have the same etymology and meaning. When the final name was given to Stonington (for it was first known as Southertowne), did the prominence and numbers of the Stantons there decide the name, or is it a mere coincidence?

This question is respectfully referred to the family debating club for decision.

Miss Caulkins, New London county's painstaking historian, says that in 1656, Mr. Stanton sold to George Tongue the grant of 6 acres of planting ground, etc., made to him in 1649.

She records in her County History this very pleasant reading for the descendants of Mr. Stanton:

"On the Pawkatuck River, the first white inhabitant was Thomas Stanton. His trading-house was probably coeval with the farming operations of Chesebrough (at Wequetequock Cove, 2½ miles east of Stonington), but as a fixed resident, with a fire-side and family, he was later upon the ground. He himself appears to have been always upon the wing, yet always within call. He was required to be present wherever a court, conference, or treaty was to be held. Never, perhaps, did the acquisition of a barbarous language give to a man such immediate, wide-spread, and lasting importance. From the year 1636, when he was Winthrop's interpreter with the Nahantic sachem, to 1670, when Uncas visited him with a train of warriors and captains to get him to write his will, his name is connected with almost every Indian transaction on record."

In March of 1652, Mr. Stanton received a grant of 300 acres, laid out in a square upon the river, next to his former grant from the Court of 6 acres. Looking forward a few years, it may be said here that in 1659 Chief Cassawashitt deeded to

Thomas Stanton the whole of Pawkatuck Neck and the small islands that lay near to it, known as "The Hommocks." This deed or grant was confirmed by the Court in 1671.

Soon after Mr. Stanton went to his new trading-house, the General Court of Connecticut elected him its Deputy Magistrate. This occurred May 15, 1651, and on Oct. 6 he was commissioned "to make a rigid inquest whether any of those murtherers of the English before the Pequett warres" could be found that they might be "brought to condign punishment."

He was also to demand £40 of Ninigrett for payment of Eltwood Pomrve's mare that had been killed by the Indians.

The next we know of him is under date of June 20, 1656, when he with Capt. Denison, Mr. Brewster and Hugh Calkin are to make a list of the state of the towne and the inhabitants, and to make the County rate of Twenty pounds. The same year the Commissioners of the United Colonies advised the preparation of a catechism in the Narragansett or Pequot language, and appointed Rev. Mr. Pierson of New Haven, and Mr. Thomas Stanton to do the work. Mr. Pierson's removal prevented its execution however.

In 1657 Mr. Stanton did something or said something that greatly roused the wrath of the General Court, and led to a warrant for his arrest. The cause of offense is not clear to me, because I have been unable to find out what is meant by the "cast of Uncas." It may be that the record was intended to read that the Commissioners had cast off Uncas, and that Mr. Stanton had proof in his pocket of some such insult to his noted friend, the Indian sachem. However, here is the record of the Court verbatim:

"COURT AT HARTFORD, 12th of August, 1657.

"James Morgan, ages about 50 years, testifyed upon oath before this Court that he being last winter at Jacob Waterhouse his dwelling house, in company wth Mrs. Brewster, Goody Waterhouse and Capt. Denison, Thomas Staunton also being prent, hee heard the said Staunton say that the Comission had cast of Uncus, and hee had it in his pockett to shew.

"This Court orders and appoints that Leiftent Wm. Lewis should tomorrow goe to Gilford, & if upon inquiry there hee understand that Thomas Staunton is gone to Branford and not returned, hee is to goe to Mr. Leet, and desire he would take order that Thomas Staunton, in that jurisdiction, at Branford or elsewhere, shall be forthwth sent to Mr. Wells, Deputy Governor, or else take security for 40 l. that hee will appeare before the Gen: Court at Hartford, on Tuesday next, & abide the judgmt of the Court, in reference to such things as shall be testify against him by Major John Mason.

[84] Copia.

"You are to bring or cause Thomas Staunton to bee brought before the Gen: Court in Hartford, on Tuesday next, then & there to answere vnto such things as shall bee alleadged against him by Major John Mason & for so doeing this shall be yo<sup>\*</sup> war<sup>\*</sup>."

Lieutenant Lewis does not seem to have been successful in his effort to bring Mr. Stanton before the Court, and the following records give all the further light to be had upon the subject.

"By order of the Gen: Court in Hartford, J. C. Secty.

To Leiftent Wm. Lewis:

"This Court ordered the Secr<sup>t</sup> to write to the Comission<sup>rs</sup> in refference to Thomas Staunton, w<sup>ch</sup> letter was read & approved, & the Sec<sup>r</sup> ordered to send the same.

[86] This Court orders that if Tho: Staunton comes in the vacancy of this Court, hee shall bee required to put in security for his appearance at the Court in Hartford in October next.

[88] Tho: Staunton, for contempt of the last Gen: Court, in not appearing when sumoned thereunto, for w<sup>ch</sup> offence the Court fines the said Thomas ten pounds."

It would be interesting to know how Mr. Stanton appeased the wrath of the Court and the Commissioners, but adding this to other impossible things we learn that the next year he and his family moved to Wequetequock Cove, two and a half miles east of Stonington. This was in 1658. The first settler upon the shores of that cove was William Chesebrough, in 1649; the next was Walter Palmer, who came to Salem, Mass., from Nottinghamshire, Eng., in 1629. The third settler was Mr. Stanton.

In October, 1658, this territory belonged to the Massachusetts Plantation, what is now Stonington, New London Co., Conn., was then Southington, Suffolk Co., Mass. The court ordered it managed by Capt. George Denison, Robert Park, William Chesebrough, Thomas Stanton and Walter Palmer.

In 1662, Charles II gave Connecticut a new charter that included Southington, in 1665 the name was changed to Mystic, and in 1667 the final change was made to Stonington. The first meeting-house was built in 1661.

Here, then, Mr. Stanton settled down as a permanent resident, and in Drake's "Boston" is found the following account as to the location of his house: "From Wekapauge to Mr. Stanton's is 3 miles, 300 rods; from Mr. Stanton's to Wm. Chesebrough's is 2 miles, 123 rods; from thence to Misticke river, by Capt. Denison's house, is 4 miles." Mr. Stanton's farm lay on the east side of Pawcatuck river, near its mouth. He also owned another farm at Quanacontaug, where Major Tallcott had his headquarters in 1676. Quanacontaug was a neck of land five miles east of Pawcatuck river.

The following record gives an idea of some of the official duties that fell to Mr. Stanton's lot. At a Commissioners' meeting, September 6-17, 1660, this action was taken:

The Commissioners, upon consideration of premises, and of similar complaints preferred by the English residents of the new plantation at Mohegan, resolved "to require and force the Narrogansetts to a just satisfaction," and for that end commissioned Capt. George Denison, Thomas Stanton, Thomas Mynor and others to repair to Ninigret and the Narragansett sachems, and require of them the punishment of the offenders, and full reparation of injuries done to the English; that "at least foure of the chiefe of them that shot into the English house at Mouhegin should be proceeded with and punished according to justice, and

in case they cannot be drawn thereunto," that five hundred fathoms of wampum should be exacted in expiation of the offense, and that speedy payment should be made of a quantity of wampum which the Commissioners, the year before, had required of the Narragansetts, "for insolencies committed at Mr. Brewster's, in killing an Indian servant at Mrs. Brewster's feet, to her great affrightment, and stealing corne, and other affronts."

Three years after this we find Mr. Stanton appointed to apportion 8,000 acres of land to the Pawcatucks, and in 1664 he is appointed to magisterial office by the General Court. The record reads as follows:

## COURT AT HARTFORD, Octobr 13th, 1664.

[202] This Court doth hereby impower Mr. Wm. Cheese-brooke, Mr. Thomas Stanton and Mr. Thomas Minor to issue and determine all cases that shall be brought before them, to the value of forty shillings, to grant summons according to lawe to any that desire it, to summon men to appeare before them or at any Court in this Colony, and to marry persons, and punish for criminall matters to the value of forty shillings, or by stocks.

In 1665 he becomes a Commissioner of Stonington, and has authority to hold a semi-annual court at New London, the county seat.

The first court ever thus held in said county assembled Sept., 20, 1666. The commissioners or judges upon the bench were Major Mason, Thomas Stanton and Lieutenant Pratt of Saybrook, the clerk was Obadiah Bruen.

Among other court duties that year, one that fell to Mr. Stanton was the administration of the freeman's oath to his two sons, Thomas, Jr., and John. Honors now came to him thick and fast. In 1666 he was re-elected Commissioner or County Judge, he was also appointed Overseer-General of the Coassatuck Indians; a Commission of Appeals on Indian Affairs was created this year, and Mr. Stanton was made a member thereof. As a County Commissioner he evidently was a great success. He was

annually re-elected to the office until his death in 1677, a continuous term of twelve years.

The last honor to come to him in 1666 was his election as a member of the General Assembly of Connecticut. With all this, however, he does not neglect his private business, for we find him entering suit (Oct. 11, 1666), against Chief Cuskatome and the chief's brother-in-law for "stealing a considerable estate" from him. Mr. Stanton got judgment in this case for £27 12s. 2d., to be paid within fourteen days. If not so paid, the Court authorized him "to dispose of these Indians by selling or sending them to Barbadoes or any other English Island."

Whether he secured his money, or whether he sold the debtors, is unrecorded history. It is to be hoped that the red men paid the cash and kept their freedom.

For many years one of Mr. Stanton's warmest friends was Mr. Walter Palmer of Stonington. Their children intermarried, and in many ways they had much in common. In 1662 Mr. Palmer died, and Mr. Stanton was appointed by the court to take an inventory of his "goods and chatels."

#### FROM 1667 UNTIL 1677.

#### Part V.

In 1667 Mr. Stanton was again elected a member of the General Assembly of Connecticut, and he continued uninterruptedly to be elected to said Assembly until 1674.

For his services to the Colony the General Court granted him, in October of 1667, 250 acres of land on Pachaug river, in what became the town of Preston. It was specified that 30 acres of the 250 should be in meadow.

As Indian Commissioner he was called upon this year to settle some difficulties that were threatening trouble between Uncas, chief of the Mohegans, and the Niantic tribe. The following year Mr. Stanton was reappointed Commissioner of Indian Affairs.

In those Colonial days serious differences often arose between rival towns and between towns and the General Court or Assembly. Some such trouble existed between Stonington and the General Court at Hartford. Thomas Stanton's second son, John Stanton, was then Stonington's Town Recorder. On May 4th, 1668, Thomas drew up a petition on behalf of the town and addressed it to the Court.

The petition was signed by John as recorder, but his father was the author. It seems that the dignity of the General Court was greatly injured by this appeal, and, either for this presentation of it or for presenting another one just like it in 1670, two or three of Stonington's leading officials got into serious trouble.

Thomas seemed to escape, but John was fined ten pounds, which, however, was revoked (it being yet unpaid) at the close of King Philip's War on account of John's service in that war. The settlers along the Connecticut and Rhode Island line had a good deal of disputing, and the same month this petition was drawn up, just ten days after it, Thomas Stanton and John Allyn were authorized to go to Rhode Island, confer with the Governor and Council, and demand satisfaction of them for Rhode Island's aggressions and insults.

The 3rd of June these two men undertook their commission, but their demands were not met. They were reappointed Sept. 8th, but with what results the records do not show. The petition of Stonington to the court reads as follows:

"May 4, 1668.

"PETITION OF THE TOWN OF STONINGTON TO THE GENERAL COURT AT HARTFORD FOR PROTECTION AGAINST THE ENCROACHMENTS OF THOSE OF R. ISLAND.

"A Companie of personnes from Road Islaud, whoe threatned the east side of Paquatuck River (we seemed at first to vs but as rediculos) yet have built, fenced, improved & forsibly settled & ar growing numerovs, & doe noe less threaten the west side of Paquatuck River and wee know not but they may as well take all as a part, nay, our houses over our heades, by as much right as w<sup>t</sup> thay at present injoye, for any thing the Pattent priveledges more to one side of the River then the other.

"Least multitude of busines might overwhelme you, & our beeing remoat & as ovt of sight might too much burie us in oblivion, or want of information might render you the less ensible of our condition, wee make bold to remind you, & if it maye bee to add a litell breath to the saylls and fethers to the winges of your solicitous indeavours in our behalfe."

In all probability it was this touch of irony and facetiousness that was more than the gravity of the old Puritan legislators could stand, and that induced them to punish their Stonington brethren. But to continue with the petition:

"They complain of the conduct of their neighbours, the intruders east of the River, 'neither can any true harted & fellow-feeling Christians choose but mourne to see & heare of our neighbouring disorders, & acknoledg our condition is trulie deplorable to have personnes of such corrupt principalls & praktises to live so near vs, and on our owne.

"Tis not of small concernment, the bad example y is given to the Indians. "Tis to the griefe of parents & others, observed how these fire brands too much inflame youth.

"May not parents heartes bleed when about to leave the world to thinke how thay leave their deer children in the mouth of the Lion & paw of the Beare, and worse, as being daylic tempted by exampells to folow after & imbrace lies, to live as riotous, wanton, luxsurious, and even no better than to bee said vnto, Serve other Gods or no God?

"Surelie if this case be made as your owne, you will not spare for cost or paynes or bee unwilling to run hassard in the indeavour of our speedie redres."

The petitioners recapitulate the grounds on which the Conn. right of jurisdiction is based,—the priority of Charter, the decision of the Royal Commissioner, first possession, &c.; in conclusion they refer to several recent acts of the Rhode Islanders.—Mr. Thos. Stanton had been prohibited from mowing land granted to Mr. Willis, and threatened with the cost of £1000 if

he persisted; "they take in newcomers contrarie, vis. Goodwife Seager, James Walklie, and the tinker &c.

"Signed by order of the Town, by

"JOHN STANTON,

"Town Recorder."

These inter-colonial feuds continued for a long time. Three years after this petition while Mr. Stanton and Mr. Thos. Miner were one day laying out lands east of Pawcatuck river they were met and opposed by Tobias Saunders, John Crandall and some other Rhode Island men armed with clubs. Afterward Crandall was arrested, tried and imprisoned at New London for the above assault.

In 1669 Mr. Stanton's son Joseph, was appointed Assistant Magistrate of Stonington, and he held court with his father in New London. On the 8th of July, 1669, we find Thomas Stanton and his son John reporting to Major Mason at Norwich, their suspicions of a plot against the English, led by Uncas, Hermon Garrett and a daughter of Ninigret. Not long after, Thomas goes to Robinstown where the Indians are having a great dance and arrests Ninigret.

In 1672 he is sent to the Niantic Indians to demand the surrender of Mowweam for a double murder, that of an English girl and of a squaw.

In 1675 Mr. Stanton and Major Winthrop are authorized to effect the ransom or exchange of a son of James Rockwell, who was held captive by the Indians.

This year the Indians became very aggressive, and in June, Mr. Stanton sends word to the Governor at Hartford, of the first act of hostility in King Philip's war. This act was the burning of houses and killing of men at Swansey. War was immediately declared. Mr. Stanton and his sons bore no unimportant part in this conflict. Under the biographies of John and of Joseph will be found further details as to their experiences. It may be here said of John, however, in addition to what is otherwise recorded, that in 1676, he made an exchange with Abachick-

wood and other "Narrogancetts" for some Indians, giving for them other Indians that he had captured in war. He then sold to a Major Palmes the Indians he got in exchange.

This was undoubtedly in harmony with the code of warfare in that century, but it illustrates the fact that the world is getting better. Capt. John Stanton's descendants would not now do what he conscientiously did in 1676.

That was in February; later in the season he is ordered to distribute among his men the spoils taken in war, and in November he goes to the Indians and instructs them as to the laws passed for their conduct.

All of the sons of Thomas Stanton seem to have inherited their father's ability to speak the Indian dialects, and they were in much demand as interpreters. Joseph Stanton served in this capacity in the treaty made between the English and the Narragansetts at the close of King Philip's war.

The father was then too old to engage in much active service, but we find him acting with Major Winthrop and Hon. Samuel Willys as a commission to negotiate peace, if possible, between the English and Indians.

That was in April of 1676, and in May he is granted £20 for his good service and expense in securing the fidelity of Chief Ninigret to the English, and as partial recompense for damages of war to his estate.

In August we find him authorized to return to Mamawhow one of the several guns that he had taken from him the year before.

We now come to

#### THE DEATH OF THOMAS STANTON.

#### Part VI.

In the year of his death we learn that he returns to the Indian, Robbin Cassacinamon, all the wampum that he holds in trust for him from Ninicroft. We also know that his is the first name on the roll of the First Congregational Church of

Stonington, which he was instrumental in organizing June 3, 1674. Mr. Stanton's son-in-law, Rev. James Noyes, was ordained as the first pastor of this church Sept. 10, 1674, and remained its pastor for more than 55 years.

The cause of Mr. Stanton's death is unknown. He died Dec. 2, 1677, and his will was probated in June, 1678. His wife lived eleven years longer, making her home with her daughter, Mrs. Dorothy Noyes of Stonington. She died in 1688, aged 67 years. Mr. Stanton was 62 years old.

In this day people are not old until they are 70, but in those days, after 42 years of a pioneer's hardships, we may presume that this worthy couple were regarded as having lived to a good old age. They were husband and wife for 40 years, and the parents of ten children, all of whom lived to have children of their own.

Mr. Stanton's prominence in the affairs of colonial Connecticut can be best estimated by the possibility of so much about him being secured from contemporaneous history after a lapse of two and a half centuries. As interpreter for Connecticut and for Gov. Winthrop, as Interpreter General of the New England Colonies, as County Commissioner and Judge for twelve consecutive years, as a member of the Conn. General Assembly for seven years, as Indian Commissioner for many years, as a successful, all around man of affairs, as a worthy husband, father, citizen and Christian, the descendants of Thomas Stanton have every reason to be proud of their emigrant ancestor.

As to his burial place, the following from Caulkins' History of New London (p. 285) is full of interest. On the east side of Wicketequack Cove, half way between Stonington, Conn., and Westerly, R. I., is the old family burying-ground, and Miss Caulkins says: "Here undoubtedly Mr. Chesebrough and all his sons were buried. Here lies Walter Palmer in the midst of a throng of descendants. Here Thomas Stanton lies near the stones bearing the names of his sons, Thomas (d. 1718, aged 80), and Robert (d. 1724, aged 71).

"Here also were laid to rest the remains of Thomas Minor and

of his son, Deacon Manaseeh Minor, the first-born male of New London.

"The Rev. James Noyes, Hallam, Searle, Thomson, Breed, and other ancients of Stonington repose in this hallowed ground."

After the death of Mr. Stanton his widow lived with the family of her daughter, Dorothy, who married Rev. James Noyes. Whether the homestead was the place of abode or whether Mr. Noyes had a dwelling-house of his own I am unable to tell.

It will be of interest to members of the family having the historic spirit, and who may at any time be in Hartford, Conn., to know that the site now occupied by Jewell's Leather Belting Co. and covered with their large factory buildings on Ford street was in 1639 the location of the first home of Thomas and Ann (Lord) Stanton.

### CHAPTER IL

## SOME GENERAL NOTES OF FAMILY HISTORY.

WAR RECORDS — STONINGTON CHURCH RECORDS — THE LEATHER-BREECHES LAW SUIT.

# General Notes of Family History.

1738. June 11, before the Court at Norwich, Thomas Stanton gave testimony in favor of the Indian John Uncas with reference to the possession and ownership of disputed Indian lands. This was probably a grandson to Thomas, 1st.

1745. In the expedition that sailed from Connecticut to fight the French in Nova Scotia, Cape Breton Island and New Foundland were some of this family. After the historic Siege of Louisburg the English suffered severely from sickness and many of the Colonial troops died on board ship. Among them was Thomas Stanton from New London. He died July 29, 1745, when his ship was at anchor off Cape Canso, Nova Scotia, and his remains were buried on Burying Island.

Benjamin Stanton was a member of Capt. Samuel Hale's company of Louisburg soldiers, he was probably from New Hampshire, as this company was made up chiefly of New Hampshire men.

713 Col. Joseph Stanton was a member of this Expedition.

## 1776. Revolutionary Items.

In the summer of 1776 a Row Galley was built at Chelsea for the State of Connecticut, by Captain Jonathan Lester. Her dimensions were "60 feet keel, 18 feet beam, 5 feet hold and 7 in. dead rising. Her cost was £861, 16s., 6d." She was named "The Shark," and was put under the command of Theophilus Stanton of Stonington, Conn. (One account gives the name of the commander as Capt. Thomas Stanton.)

July 19, 1776, at the earnest request of Gen'l Washington, the Gov. and Council of Safety of Conn. sent to him at New York Capt. Stanton in command of "The Shark," bearing 9 pounder guns and to be subject to Washington's orders.

Col. Stanton is mentioned as having fought with bravery in the battle of Bennington, Aug. 17, 1777. No details are given to identify him, but he probably was 725 Joseph 5.

The Continental Congress appointed Joshua Stanton a captain

in Col. Seth Warner's regiment, July 5, 1776.

July 9, 1777. Col. Barton, Col. Stanton, Ensign Stanton, 6 other officers and 38 privates went into the midst of the English camp, four miles from Newport, R. I., and captured Gen. Richard Prescott who was afterward exchanged by Gen. Washington for Gen. Charles Lee.

Oct. 16, 1777. An old muster-roll is in the office of the Town Clerk of Ballston, Saratoga Co., N. Y., from which the following was copied:

"A Role of Capt. William Stanton

"Capt. William Stanton,
Lt. Ichabod Brown,
Serg't James Stanton,
Lodwick
Do privates.

"Som totall 83.

<sup>&</sup>quot;Groton, April 13th, 1777."

How this came there is not known, but probably these men fought in the battle of Stillwater, and were present at Burgoyne's surrender, Oct. 16, 1777.

It will be noticed that they came from Groton, Conn.

# The Massacre at Fort Griswold.

Early in September of 1781, the British Gen. Clinton sent the traitor, Benedict Arnold, upon an expedition along the Connecticut coast. On Sept. 6, after capturing and burning New London, Arnold crossed the Thames river to seize Fort Griswold at Groton. It was defended by 150 men under Col. Ledyard. About 100 of the defenders were farmers and artisans who had come from the surrounding districts with what arms they could lay hands on to assist the small garrison of 50 men. Arnold sent a flag of truce and called upon them to surrender. On p. 558 of Cauklins' Hist. of New London, is the following record of results.

"Col. Ledyard sent Captains Elijah Avery, Amos Stanton and John Stanton, three brave volunteers from the neighborhood, all unconsciously wrapped in the awful shadow of the coming slaughter, to meet the flag and refuse to surrender. The attack began. Capt. Stanton was sent out to compel all volunteers to come within the fort. There were many who wished to fight outside, thinking the chances to escape were better. The fort was captured and a most barbarous massacre followed.

"Out of 150, 85 were slain, 35 were dangerously wounded, and 30 who were slightly wounded were taken away prisoners."

In this massacre at least four of our family were victims. Capt. Amos Stanton was killed; he was from Groton. Lieut. Enoch, son of Phineas Stanton, was killed; he was 35 years old and had a wife and seven children.

Daniel and Mary Stanton, of Stonington, had two sons in the fort. The eldest was Sergeant Daniel, aged 25, whose body was found bearing twenty-six wounds. He had fought like a tiger at bay before he fell. The younger son, Edward, also fought bravely; he was but 20 years old. He received a terrible wound

that exposed his neart to view, but recovered and lived to a good age, dying July 27, 1832, 71 years old.

A monument in memory of the slain has been erected at Groton Heights. As you enter it you will see confronting the door this inscription upon a large marble slab:

#### "THIS MONUMENT

was erected under the patronage of the State of Connecticut, A. D., 1830, in the 55th year of the independence of the U. S. A. In memory of the brave Patriots who fell in the massacre at Fort Griswold, near this spot, on the 6th of Sept., A. D. 1781, when the British, under the command of the traitor, Benedict Arnold, burnt the towns of New London and Groton, and spread desolation and woe throughout this region. List of men who fell at Fort Griswold, Sept. 6th, 1781.

At the head of this list are found 4 Averys and next 3 Stantons, with Scripture names, Amos, Enoch and Daniel, followed by 78 others.

# 1812. War of 1812.

The following Stantons of Stonington are on record as having served in the war of 1812: Thomas B., 847 Elias, Nathan, Ezra, Samuel, Jr., 85 Azariah, Jr., 890 Andrew P., James, 902 Charles T.

Among the Major Generals in this war was Phineas Stanton, later of Wyoming, N. Y.

Aug. 9, 1814, Stonington was cannonaded by four English ships of war. Among its defenders, as members of the 8th Inf't Co., 30th Reg't of Conn., were Corporal Azariah Stanton, Jr., Andrew P. Stanton and James Stanton.

In Feb., 1815, while rejoicing at Stonington because the war had ended, young Thomas Stanton of Pawcatuck was killed by the premature discharge of a cannon.

Other Stantons who served in this war are, 754 Joseph, 733 Thomas, William Jr., b. 1793 (see Appendix).

## Revolutionary or Other Military Pensioners.

The following were copied by me from the official Pension Lists. All except Paul of Maine are believed to be of our family. They were pensioners, of age indicated, June 1, 1840:

- 1. Hannah Stanton of Stonington, Conn., aged 72. She lived with Charles P. Stanton.
- 2. Elijah Stanton of Little Falls, N. Y., aged 85. He lived with John Eaton.
- 3. Thomas Stanton of Stockbridge, Madison Co., N. Y., for Ebenezer Hills, aged 100, who lived with him.
- 4. William Stanton for Abraham Hitchcock, aged 75, who lived with him in Mt. Pleasant, Westchester Co., N. Y.
- 5. Moses Stanton for Wm. Davids, aged 75, who lived with him in Mt. Pleasant, N. Y.
- 6. Sarah Stanton of Charlestown, R. I., aged 92, who lived with Lodowick Hoxsie in Charlestown.
- 7. Paul Stanton of Poland, Maine, aged 82, lived with his son William.
  - 8. Jason Stanton of Clinton, Wayne Co., Pa., aged 79.
  - 9. Robert Stanton of Rome, Crawford Co., Pa., aged 78.
- In 1818 Congress granted pensions for service in the Revolutionary War to the following:

Edward Stanton, Corporal, of Connecticut, \$96 per annum. Daniel Stanton, Private, of Connecticut, \$72 per annum.

James Stanton, Private, of New York, \$72 per annum.

Jonathan Stanton, to his widow, of New York, \$48 per annum. These lists of Stantons who have served in different wars do not pretend to be complete, but have simply been compiled from official records. A study of the Genealogy will show many others who rendered gallant service and whose service is recorded under their personal and family records. It is worthy of note that from the Pequot War in 1636 to the Civil War of 1861 there was no Colonial nor National War in which our family was not well represented among its country's defenders.

The following is a partial list of those who served in the late Civil War from Connecticut.

## STONINGTON CHURCH RECORDS.

The First Congregational Church of Stonington, Conn., was organized June 3, 1674. "Thomas Stanton" is the first name on the roll, the sixth name is "Thomas Stanton, Jun." Ann, wife of Thos. Stanton, Sen., became a member in 1675. Some pastors failed to leave on record their baptisms, marriages, etc.; this fact will account for periods during which the family are apparently not represented in this church, but it is a well-founded claim that at no period for 217 years has this church been without descendants of Thomas Stanton among its members.

In these Records I will give only the Christian name in every instance where the surname is Stanton.

THE CELEBRATED LEATHER-BREECHES LAW SUIT.

This story is taken from *The Providence Journal* of R. I. Adam Babcock is a son of 712 Hannah<sup>4</sup> Stanton. The Stantons who were party to the suit were 871 Phineas and his son 882 Phineas, Jr.

#### Babcock v. Stanton - Stanton v. Babcock.

The story which, in the following article, we have undertaken to tell, will interest many readers in the southern counties of Rhode Island and Connecticut. For five score years it has been a fireside tale in all the region—of course many variations have crept into it—and our plain narrative will, in many respects, differ from the popular tale. But we have drawn our story from the report of the trials published at the time, and which, by lapse of years, has now become exceedingly scarce. Probably very few people now living ever saw a copy. The one we used is the property of one of the learned judges of our supreme court, who kindly loaned it for our purpose.

We do not fancy litigious men, those who will vex the court with little matters. But we do confess to a sort of liking for

the persistence of the elder Stanton, in defending the honor of his son. Had he paid the shillings demanded, he would have branded his son as a thief; he chose the other course, and paid thousands of silver dollars in his son's defense. Verily, "honor was not with him a sort of paper credit, which those who are deficient in the sterling cash of morality trade in."

It is a century since there lived in New Haven a merchant who carried on a shipping trade with the West Indies and other foreign ports, whose name was Adam Babcock. He was the son of Dr. Joshua Babcock, who lived in Westerly, and who was one of the most cultivated and well-known country gentlemen in all the section lying between Boston and New York -- a physician. a conversationalist, a well-read, scholarly man. An excellent account of him, written by Dr. Levi Wheaton, may be found in Updike's history of the Narragansett church. From it we are

tempted to extract a little picture of his family life:

"One of the most striking features of Dr. Babcock's character was his observance of method in every thing in his business, his type of living, amusements or devotions. He was an early riser, and gave the early hour to his farm. His breakfast was bread and milk with some apple pie or fruit of the season. While his housekeeper and I were taking a cup of excellent coffee with buttered toast, he would often rally us on our want of taste: 'better live as I do,' he would say: 'out of this old silver porringer and with this spoon I have taken my breakfast for forty years.' At dinner - and he kept an excellent table - he ate heartily, but always of one dish, be it roast or boiled, fish or flesh; as he began so he ended. He took cider as his common beverage, and a temperate glass of good wine. At tea, of which he was very fond, he drank exactly three cups. At a regular supper table, the fashion of those days, whatever company he might entertain, after due attention to his guests, he confined himself invariably to his porringer of bread and milk. He was a person not above the middle size, of a rather spare habit, light and active, for a man of his years. He could mount a horse sixteen hands high with the agility of a boy. In his dress

and manners he was a gentleman of the old school; scrupulously polite, often quoted Chesterfield, who was then in his zenith. He perhaps laid too much stress upon trifling ceremonies; to eat cheese with bread and butter, or to drink more than three cups of tea, he would consider ill-bred. At the close of the week, his family were called into the sitting-room to hear a chapter read from the common language of the Bible, I had the curiosity to look into the one he made use of, and found it Greek."

Mr. Babcock had three sons, Henry, Luke and Adam. was a colonel in the Revolutionary army, Luke was a clergyman, and became a Tory; of him we speak hereafter. Adam was a merchant and the plaintiff in the leather breeches law suit, about which we now write. He owned a brig which he was about dispatching to the West Indies and thence to the bay of Honduras; being in want of sailors and learning by his brother Henry of the virtues in that line of a young man who lived at Stonington by the name of Phineas Stanton, Jr., he wrote to him a letter, and the result was the engagement of young Stanton in Babcock's brig as mate for the voyage. The vessel arrived at St. Croix, where Stanton wished to land, and also wished some money to expend on shore. For that purpose he asked of Babcock a portion of his wages. High words ensued and a quarrel began, which lasted during the remainder of their lives, and cost each of them thousands of dollars.

On his arrival at New Haven, Stanton had considerable difficulty in effecting a settlement with Babcock, and claims finally to have been cheated out of about twenty pounds. Still the matter was settled, as the Stantons supposed, finally. But scarcely had young Stanton arrived at his home, near Stonington, than the sheriff, in the person of Capt. Simon Rhodes, came with a process to arrest him, upon a charge made by Babcock of embezzling the following articles, to wit: A pair of leather breeches, a glass mustard pot, a bottle with gunpowder, and a quantity of old iron. The sheriff was authorized to settle the matter with Stanton upon his paying the small sum of perhaps twenty shillings. In the course of the trials, it appeared that

young Stanton had bought some pieces of firewood of Babcock while on the voyage, and the old iron was the nails, etc., which had remained in the ashes. Babcock had evidently not read the decision of the case Shylock vs. Antonio, else he would not have set up the claim that he sold the old wood, yet sold no old nails which the old wood contained. But there being some question whether the title to the old nails did not remain in Stanton, Babcock withdrew this charge. In regard to the old glass mustard pot, worth, according to the statement, one shilling, it was proved to have been taken by young Stanton from Babcock's house to Babcock's brig, for the use of Babcock's employees, on Babcock's table, and to have been there left when the young man left the brig, and so Babcock withdrew that charge. In regard to the gunpowder, it was proved to have been bought and paid for by young Stanton before he left New Haven on the voyage, and so Babcock withdrew that charge. Babcock's bill was now reduced to the single item of one pair of leather breeches, worth in the first place sixteen shillings, but which, being very dirty, needed a washing, which cost three shillings; that would reduce their value in the first place to thirteen shillings, and on these breeches the tremendous law fight took place.

To unravel the story of these breeches, from the prolix narrative of the elder Stanton, who, according to his own statement, was "neither a grammarian, an attorney, nor indeed so much as a pettifoggere," has been our laborious task, with what success we leave our readers to judge. And we rest easily in belief that if it takes them as long to find an original copy with which to compare our story as it did us, our punishment will be far distant, if we have misstated the case or stated it unfairly.

Babcock practically charged young Stanton with having stolen certain things belonging to him (Babcock), and Stanton could not pay the paltry sum which Babcock demanded without acknowledging himself a thief. The elder Stanton was one of those stern old fellows who, rather than see his son disgraced, would expend thousands in his defense—and he joined his son in the fight.

The report of these celebrated trials (there were nine) is comprised in a stout pamphlet of 168 pages, closely printed, in very small type, enlivened with copious extracts from Shakespeare, Hudibras, South's sermons, Pope, Machiavelli, The Spectator, The Bible, and many other authors. The pamphlet is not divided into chapters: there is no break in the subject from beginning to appendix, and thence to the end; the various trials are not separated; the evidence runs along, then comes a decision; and then the same repeated. As we have before stated, it has been with the utmost difficulty that we have unraveled the story, but we believe we have finally accomplished it,

The story of these various trials and their results is briefly told as follows: Babcock commenced proceedings by serving an artachment upon young Stanton for embezzling certain things, to wit: A pair of leather breeches, a glass mustard pot, some old iron and a half a pound of gunpowder - the verdict declared Stanton not guilty. Stanton now sued Babcock for defamation of character. Babcock pleaded justification. The jury gave Stanton a verdict with one hundred pounds damages and costs. Babcock appealed to the superior court at Norwich. The case was again heard and again went against Babcock with a verdict for seventy-five pounds and costs, but the court considering the damages too much, returned the case to the jury for a second consideration which resulted in reducing the amount of damages awarded to Stanton to fifty pounds. Babcock moved an arrest of judgment, but the court adjourned without a hearing on the motion. Two or three months after, the court heard the argument on this motion, decided the plea insufficient, and issued execution. Babcock now petitioned the court to give him a new trial of the first case against Stanton for embezzlement, which had been decided in Stanton's favor. The court granted a new trial, the result of which was in Babcock's favor; the jury declared Stanton guilty, and gave damages thirty-six shillings and costs. Upon this result Stanton petitioned for a new trial:

This petition was continued along for four years and was finally granted. In the meantime Babcock petitioned the court for a new trial of the case of Stanton against him for defamation, which case had been decided against Babcock; this petition the court refused to grant. Babcock then petitioned the general assembly of Connecticut to re-open the whole case. This petition the general assembly refused to grant. Babcock had also meantime sued Stanton to recover certain moneys he had paid in connection with the suits. This case came on for trial at a time when Stanton, supposing it was to be continued, was not present. It went by default in Babcock's favor, with ten or eleven pounds damages.

Now came on the new trial which had been granted to Stanton. It was a trial of the original case against him for embez-The first result was in Stanton's favor: the second result was in Babcock's favor; the third and final result was in Stanton's favor. A special session of the superior court was held for its trial. Every effort was made to produce evidence and witnesses on the part of the Stantons. Messengers were sent hundreds of miles on horseback to take depositions, and by sea to St. Croix: leather breeches were brought from Philadelphia, the Jerseys, New York, Norwich, New London, and even those made in England, the minute stitches were compared, whether made of one or two deer-skins, what kind of buttons were used, and every particular which could be thought of in connection with breeches was discussed. Thus ended the litigation. The cases had been nine years before the courts in various phases, and the best legal talent of Connecticut had been employed on either side.

The names of many of the counsel are historical. Among them were Ingersoll, of New Haven; Woodbridge, of Norwich, whose life has been written by Charles Lanman; Richard Law, of New London, a member of the old congress; James A. Hillhouse, of New Haven (a member of congress for twenty years); Jesse Root (a member of Congress and a prominent jurist, author of Reports of Connecticut Court of Errors); Titus Hosmer, a scholar, a statesman and a poet, and finally Samuel Huntington, one of the signers of the Declaration of Independ-

ence, judge, governor, president of the old Congress, etc. found in the pamphlet a story of a Sam. Huntington, which we have in our day heard related of Nathaniel Searle. defended a case in which, when the plaintiff's testimony was all in. Huntington saw his client had no case, whereupon he arose and said if that was all the case the plaintiff had, he (Huntington) would say nothing, but would allow the defendant, his client, to plead his own case, upon which the plaintiff withdrew the action. Besides these men, a great many leading families along the borders of Rhode Island and Connecticut, were in the case in the way of witnesses, jurors, etc. Babcock's family was a prominent one; they were connected by marriage with Stanton's. According to Stanton's opinion, Adam belonged to a class, unfortunately not yet quite extinct, who consider themselves by the "grace of God and the accident of birth" to be a trifle better than the common herd. Adam Babcock had a brother Luke, an Episcopal clergyman whom Stanton thought did not espouse his brother's cause with much warmth, and whom he complimented on that account. After Stanton's compliment was printed, the Rev. Luke gave his brother more assistance, and Stanton recalled the compliment he had previously given. The Rev. Luke afterward became a Tory, was arrested by the Continental forces, held in confinement four months, finally dismissed and ordered within the lines of the king's army, where he sickened and almost immediately died.

Stanton's summing up of the causes which led to the law suits

and their results is not without interest. He says:

"If I may speak the honest sentiments of the heart, the affair happened thus: Babcock, whose temper is excessively haughty, could not curb my son as he had done others in his employ. Captain Sherman had a secret spleen against him, and my son's calling on Babcock for his wages when he had not the money to spare, though it was high time it was paid, raised Babcock's resentment to a high degree. Captain Sherman spirits him on, tells of the old iron, and about the pair of leather breeches. which were a much better pair, and unlike any breeches he ever knew he owned. A suit was commenced by Babcock; he fails in it. Douglass, his counsel, I affronted, so they all join forces against my son, make specious pretense of great iniquity in me and my family, and have actually prejudiced the minds of many honest people against us," etc.

In the following unique paragraph, Stanton closes his story: "Good heaven! what a labyrinth is this! must inconsistency twine, incompatibles unite; nay, must palpable contradictions combine, absurdities be dispensed with, the law mocked, truth sacrificed, and justice banished! nay, must the world be turned upside down, and all rule and order in it be reversed! for no other purpose than that a pertinacious coxcomb may gorge his savage, his inhuman appetite on the ruin of one who never injured him, at least with design, unless the not tamely submitting to be kicked, was injurious."

Thus ended these vexatious suits at law which Stanton says cost him in damages and costs \$2,000 more than he received, besides an immense amount in indirect claims from anxiety of mind "lest they were unjustly cast," thirteen thousand five hundred miles travel on horseback, and three thousand seven hundred miles of water, and the taking of more than two hundred depositions.— Providence Journal.

# CHAPTER III.

#### STANTONS IN ENGLAND.

An honest effort has been made, and to the full measure of my ability, to trace Thomas Stanton's English ancestry. This effort has not been successful. Traditions as to his origin have been carefully investigated, but none of them are able to prove themselves of certified historic value. Some undiscovered documents or records in America or England may yet be found that will re-

veal his English connections, but until such is the case let us be satisfied with his American record and trust that the rootage was worthy of the fruitage. It is my hope that some member of our family may be led by the publication of this book to prosecute a successful search among English records and archives for the line of Thomas Stanton's descent.

To stimulate such a search, to collocate and preserve records already secured, to gratify a commendable interest on the part of my readers, but not for the purpose of making any unwarranted claims, this chapter finds a place in this book.

At least three traditions are to be found among Thomas' descendants.

1. The Welsh Tradition.— The best documentary evidence for this is a record written in an old family Bible belonging to the Gere family of Syracuse, N. Y. This Bible was the property of 322 Sophia<sup>5</sup> Stanton, whose parents were both Stantons, and whose mother's parents were both Stantons. Sophia's Bible and her mother's Bible bear record that Thomas<sup>1</sup> Stanton was born in Wales.

The mother, Anna' Stanton, was born in 1758, at Stonington. It is safe to say that Anna was informed as to this tradition by her father, 871 Phineas, who was born in 1719, 42 years after Thomas' died.

Half a century is not time enough for history to go very far astray, and I am inclined to think that either he or his wife, Ann Lord (alias Laward), was born in Wales. Even if this be true however, he was not of Welsh ancestry, for "Stanton" is a Saxon name. Wales is bounded on the east by Herefordshire and Shropshire. In Hereford are the following places: Staunton Park, Staunton on Arrow and Staunton, all near the Welsh borders. In Shropshire are to be found the towns of Stanton, Stanton Lacy and Long Stanton.

Would it be strange that a Thomas Stanton should be born only a few miles at the farthest from some of these places, and if west of them his birthplace would easily be in Wales.

Since writing the above I have had correspondence with 533b

William J. Stanton of North Danville, Vt., who was born in 1808. He says that his grandfather, 189 Isaac Wheeler Stanton, often affirmed in a most positive manner that Thomas' Stanton was born in Wales. His grandfather was born in 1743, at Stonington.

Now what opportunity did 189 Isaac W. have of knowing this? His grandfather was 138 Joseph<sup>3</sup> Stanton, who was born before Thomas<sup>1</sup> died, and lived until after Isaac W. was eight years old

Wm. J. Stanton then has his information from his grand-father, who was contemporaneous with those who in their youth had personal knowledge of Thomas', and whose parents were children of Thomas'. This is even more direct testimony than in the case of 322 Sophia<sup>6</sup> Stanton's Bible. In addition to the above testimony is the following: Isaac Wheeler Stanton, when he moved from Connecticut to New Hampshire and Vermont, took an old desk with him in which was found a genealogical outline of Stantons, descendants of Thomas'. It was written on coarse, dark-colored paper, in old-fashioned letters and style of writing, and testified that Thomas' was born in Wales. W. J. Stanton says "it looked to be a century old." The desk was moved in 1784. I believe the Welsh tradition is true.

2. The Lancashire Tradition.—809 John's Stanton of Hope Valley, R. I., has in his possession records received from his father, 766 John Stanton, who was for some time town clerk of Charlestown, R. I., and who wrote quite a record of historical and genealogical information as to the Stanton family. These records assert that Thomas' of Stonington, Ct., and Robert' of Newport, R. I., were brothers, and came from Lancashire, Eng. This same tradition is found now among descendants of Robert' of Newport. It does not necessarily conflict with the Welsh tradition, for Thomas may have been born in Wales, then moved northward to Lancashire and come thence to America. Mr. Stanton can produce no authority for this record and does not know where his father got it. I have followed up this tradition far enough to learn that there are Stantons now living in Lan-

cashire and that the family is an old one there. Members of the family now in Preston, the county seat of Lancashire, have testified to me that they can find no record of a Thomas who came to America. (Preston, Conn., is built on land that belonged to Thomas' Stanton. Query,—was it named for Preston, Eng., by Thomas in memory of his boyhood home?)

3. The Longbridge Tradition.—The Hon. John D. Baldwin of Worcester, Mass., in 1882, printed his incomplete notes of Thomas Stanton and his descendants. Baldwin says of Thomas, "It is supposed, with strong probability, that he was the son of Thomas and Katherine (Washington) Stanton, of the Longbridge family." This supposition was suggested to Mr. Baldwin by Mr. B. I. Stanton then of Albany, N. Y., but now of St. Paul, Minn. Mr. B. I. Stanton for years has been preparing genealogies of the descendants of Robert Stanton of R. I. and of Paul' Stanton of Maine. He is a descendant of Paul. In his search among English records he found a Thomas Stanton, born 1616, in Wolverton, Warwickshire, Eng., son of Thomas and Katherine (Washington) Stanton.

Thomas, the father, was born 1595 and was in turn the son of Thomas Stanton who was the son of John and Elizabeth (Townsend) Stanton of Longbridge, Warwick Co. No further record of Thomas, b. 1616, has ever been found than the one made in the Visitation of the County of Warwick in 1619. He was then

three years old.

Mr. B. I. Stanton thought this *might* be Thomas Stanton of Connecticut. Mr. Baldwin adopted the suggestion and so printed it.

It may be true, but it is not proven. If this was our Thomas he would have been 19 when he embarked at London in 1635, but he gave his age as 20. This could be explained however by the existence of a law forbidding emigration, without parent or guardian, under 20 years of age. It was not uncommon therefore for young men to "borrow time," as they termed it, and add a necessary year or two to their true age. Thomas may have "borrowed time" to make himself 20 years old in 1635.

This family of Stantons came to Wolverton from Longbridge, near the city of Warwick, in 1576 and became extinct in the first half of the 18th century.

As to the Stantons of Longbridge more will be told farther on.

# THE HISTORIC ORIGIN OF THE STANTON FAMILY.

In chapter ii, part iii, the origin, orthography and meaning of the name is discussed. It must be borne in mind that in different ages and in different parts of England the name has been and is now spelled in different ways. In the genealogical part of this book I have adhered to the oldest and simplest spelling. In the historical parts I have spelled it as I have found it in the sources of my authority. The reader must not therefore be surprised to find variations, and he must bear in mind that Stantons and Stauntons are the same.

The historic origin of Stantons in England was in the time of William the Conqueror and in the southeastern corner of Nottinghamshire and the northern end of Leicestershire. There lived Sir Malgerus (another spelling is Mauger) Lord of Stanton. He seems to have been a Saxon and nothing is known of his ancestry. Five miles southeast of this lordship was Belvoir and the early history of the Stantons has such close association with Belvoir castle that we must now know something of the history of that castle.

Leland thinks that the first owner and builder of the castle was Robert de Todeni who died about 1088 A. D. It is certain that Belvoir has been the site of a castle since the Norman conquest. From Todeni it passed to Albencius, from him to Ros and from Ros to Manners, the present owners. In the latter part of the 15th century it had fallen into great decay and was repaired by the Earl of Rutland whose family name was Ros. In 1816 a fire destroyed a large portion of the ancient part of the castle. A full history of this castle can be found in Timb's "Abbeys, Castles and Ancient Halls of England and Wales. Timb says, "It is one of the most elegant, castellated structures in the kingdom, in many respects resembling majestic Windsor."

Its builder, Robert de Todeni, was a great lord; he had fourscore lordships and some of them by uninterrupted succession continue to be the property of the Duke of Rutland. Nine of these lordships were over the county line in Northampton, among them was the Stanton Lordship. When William the Conqueror attacked Belvoir Castle its stronghold, the tower, was successfully defended by Sir Malgerus, Lord of Staunton. When William was firmly seated on the throne he had won he allowed the Lord of Staunton to keep possession of the lands he had so nobly defended and he and his descendants have ever since held the Lordship of Staunton "by tenure of Castle Guard." This lordship is seven miles from Newark and five miles from Belvoir. It is said to have been in the possession of a family of the name of Stanton or Staunton for more than 1,300 years. If that be true then it was the family estate for 500 years before the days of William and Malgerus.

The date thus fixed would be about 500 A. D. or contemporaneous with the Saxons' conquest of the Britons. The inference therefore is that the family came into Britain with the Saxons.

To return however to Belvoir Castle; the tower defended by Sir Malgerus of Stanton against William of Normandy has ever since been known as Staunton Tower. In this century there have been two royal visitors at the castle. King George IV, then Prince Regent, visited it in 1814 and in 1843 Queen Victoria and the Prince Consort were there. Upon each of these occasions the ceremony of presenting the key of Staunton Tower to the Sovereign was observed by Rev. Dr. Stanton. He offered it upon a velvet cushion and to him it was afterward graciously returned.

The Stanton Arms were derived from Albini or Albencius who received the castle from Todeni.

The arms of Albini of Belvoir were a shield with a gold back-ground upon which were two chevrons and a red border. He gave to the Lord of Stanton a shield with a silver back-ground upon which were two black chevrons within a curved or indented black border.

Later a helmet crest was adopted and was a fox standing and of the natural color.

There are two mottoes. One, below the arms, is "En Dieu ma foy" (In God my faith); the other, above the crest, is "Moderata durant" (Moderate acquisitions are lasting).

The arms thus described are to be found in Burke's Heraldic Illustrations and are now borne by the Stauntons of Longebridge, who are a branch of the Stauntons of Staunton in Nottingham. As this is undoubtedly the basis of all Stanton Arms and represents the original family it will be of interest to reproduce it here.

#### THE STAUNTONS OF STAUNTON.

Malgerus' son and heir was Galfridus' de Stanton who m. Beatrice de Muschamp and had Sir William' whose wife was Atheline de Musters. Their son was Sir Geoffery'; his, Sir William' who m. Isabel Kirketon and d. in 1326. These five were all Knights. The next one was Sir Geoffery<sup>6</sup> de Staunton who was Sheriff of Nottingham. Soon after this the "de" was dropped and when we come to later times we find the heir to be Colonel William<sup>15</sup> Staunton of Staunton who served in the army of Charles I and who married Anne Waring. His son was Harvey<sup>15</sup> Staunton, Esq., "who was the last male heir of this ancient family after a continued male succession of five hundred years. Harvey's daughter and heiress was Anne<sup>17</sup> Staunton who m. Gilberto Charlton Esq. Their son and heir was Job Staunton<sup>18</sup> Charlton who m. Mary Greenwood and whose daughter and heiress was Anne Staunton<sup>19</sup> Charlton. In 1703 she married Rev. J. Aspinshaw, I.L. D., rector of Elton Super-montem. In 1807 he, with wife and children, assumed by Royal License the surname and arms of Staunton. Their son and heir was Henry Charlton<sup>20</sup> Staunton of Staunton Hall in 1858.

This is undoubtedly the original Stanton family. From them have sprung numerous branches. In the 15th century a Sir George Stanton went from this family to Ireland and became the progenitor of a numerous Irish posterity. The following from the Boston (Mass.) *Pilot* of May 5, 1888, shows a still

earlier departure into Ireland:

"In England the name de Staunton dates from the Norman conquest, while in Ireland it appeared with the English invasion. In 1220 Adam de Staunton granted lands to Christ Church, Dublin, and in 1373, in a summons to a great council to meet in Cork, Milo Staunton and Daniel Fitz-Thomas Roche were returned for County Cork. The attainders of 1691 include one Patrick Stanton, Great Island, County Cork."

Another branch of the Stauntons of Staunton settled in Warwick Co. prior to 1450 and bore the arms of the Nottingham family. Their hall is at Longbridge, a few miles from the city

of Warwick and they are known as

# THE STAUNTONS OF LONGBRIDGE.

The Encyclopedia Britannica (9th edition) says, "Of families holding knightly rank in Warwickshire before the commence-

ment of the 16th century there now exist only ten, viz.—Staunton of Longbridge," etc.

This family as a distinct branch runs thus: Thomas<sup>1</sup>, John<sup>2</sup>, Thomas<sup>2</sup>, John<sup>4</sup>, Thomas<sup>5</sup>, Humphrey<sup>6</sup>, John<sup>7</sup>, John<sup>8</sup>, John<sup>9</sup>, John<sup>10</sup>, William<sup>11</sup>, John<sup>12</sup>, William<sup>12</sup>, the heir in 1858.

Let us look a little into some interesting facts concerning John's Staunton of Longbridge. He m. Elizabeth dau, of Townsend of Wales, they had three sons and two daughters. The eldest son was Thomas's. Thomas's had a daughter Judith's Stanton who married Shakespere's friend and patron Hamnet Sadler. Shakespere's twin children, Judith and Hamnet, were named for Hamnet Sadler and his wife Judith's Stanton. Sadler was a subscriber to Shakespere's will and was bequeathed a mourning ring.

See also in The Life of Wm. Shakespere (Duyckinck edition, p. xxvi) further reference to Mr. Staunton of Longbridge House and to Thomas Stanton, the English sculptor, as sculptor of Shakespere's bust in the church at Stratford upon Avon placed there between 1616 and 1623.

An interesting description of this bust will also be found in Irving's Sketch Book.

It was in 1576, at the time of the above John<sup>4</sup> Stanton, that another son of his moved to Wolverton between Warwick city and Stratford on Avon. He m. Maria Pudsey and had five children. The eldest of these was Thomas<sup>6</sup> Stanton who 30th July, 1616, m. Katherine dau. of Walter Washington of Radway, and had Thomas<sup>7</sup>, b. 1616 in Wolverton, who is thought by Baldwin to be the Thomas Stanton who came to America in 1635. This Wolverton branch became extinct in the male line during the first half of the 18th century and the estate reverted to John<sup>10</sup> Staunton of Longbridge who was born in 1704 and died in 1748.

The last known record of said Thomas Stanton b. 1616 in Wolverton, Warwick Co., Eng., is to be found on p. 277 of the Visitation of the County of Warwick in the year 1619. Taken by William Camden, Clarencieux King of Arms. (Harl. Mss.

1167.) Edited by John Fetherstone. F. S. A. London, 1877.

The above book is Vol. 12 of the publications of the Harlian Society established in 1869.

#### MISCELLANEOUS ENGLISH NOTES.

These notes are printed here as a possible clew to future research, and as facts of family and historic interest.

- 1. In March, 1635, the pastor of The Church of St. Mary, Aldermanbury, London, was a Rev. Dr. Stanton (see N. E. Hist. and Gen. Reg., Jan., 1889).
- 2. In Aug., 1635, Jo: Staunton, aged 27, sailed from London for Virginia, in ship George Jo: Severne, master.
- 3. Feb. 18, 1657, a Thomas Stanton of Mowlton, Suffolk Co., witnessed the will of Samuel Moody.
- 4. In 1610, near Wolverton, Warwick Co., there was b. a Thomas, son of Henry Stanton who m. ——— Rogers, Feb. 6, 1608.
- 5. There was a Thomas Stanton at Little Eastcheap, London, in 1657. M. Middlebrooke, of Leeds, writes a letter to his ucphew, Rev. Michael Wigglesworth, at Malden, Mass., and orders it left at Mr. Thomas Stanton's, in Little Eastcheap, to be conveyed to America. Said Wigglesworth was b. in Hedron, East Riding, Yorkshire, Eng., in 1631, and in 1638 came to Quinnipiae, Conn.
- 6. Dorothy Stanton, widow of Richard Wiseman, of Wigborough, Essex Co., about 1625 m. Rev. John Rogers, of Dedham, Essex. Their grandson was Rev. John Rogers, D. D., who came to America with his father, Nathaniel, in 1636, and in 1682 became president of Harvard.
- 7. In the n. w. part of Leicestershire, some thirty miles from Belvoir Castle, is Staunton Harold. Its former owner was John DeStaunton, whose daughter and heiress, Margaret, married Ralph Shirley, and thus transferred the Staunton estate to the Shirley family. The present owner is Sir Sewallis Edward Shirley, 10th Earl of Ferrers and Viscount Tamworth. For further

history of this family see Timb's "Abbeys, Castles and Ancient Halls of England and Wales"—Waren & Co., London.

- 8. In Oxfordshire, about five miles west of Oxford, is Stanton Harcourt. Here is the ancient manor of Stanton. It was among the vast estates that fell to the lot of the Bishop of Bayeux, a half brother to William the Conqueror. Queen Adeliza, second wife to Henry', granted the manor of Stanton to her kinswoman, Milicent, wife of Richard de Camville, whose daughter married Robert de Harcourt. Since then the manor has been called Stanton Harcourt.
- 9. An examination of Wills and Records at Bury St. Edmunds, Suffolk Co., shows in 1370 an Ada, widow of Henricus de Stanton, and their son Henry. In 1499 is mentioned a Robert, in 1504 a Roff and in 1554 a Walter Stanton.

#### ABBREVIATIONS AND EXPLANATIONS.

In addition to the ordinary abbreviations common to all literary work these will also be found, namely, b. for born; d. for died or dead; m. for married; unm. for unmarried; s. p. for sine posteritati, meaning "without posterity;" dau. for daughter.

The small number at the upper, right-hand corner of a name indicates the generation in America, beginning with Thomas' as

the first; his children are the second, etc.

Roman numerals — I, IV, X, etc. — are prefixed to names merely to indicate the number of children in a family.

Arabic numerals —1, 4, 10, etc.— before the name of a child indicate that said child will be found in the next generation as the head of a family. By these numbers any descendant can quickly trace his or her ancestry back to Thomas'.

If no number precedes a name, except a Roman numeral, the reader will understand that no further record of that person is

given,

In order to find yourself and your ancestry, first, if you are a Stanton, look for your Christian name in the index of Christian names of Stantons; if not a Stanton, look for your full name in the index of names other than Stanton. Then turn to the page

indicated and you will find your record. Note the number of your parent, and turn toward the front of the book until you find the same number repeated in smaller figures. There your parent will again appear in connection with his or her brothers and sisters. Then note your grandparent's number, and follow it toward the front of the book in the same way; continue thus until you have reached 1 Thomas', the first in America of this family.

To find your posterity, first find your own name as above, then work toward the back part of the book by the numbers of your children and grandchildren.

Remember that I have had to read hundreds of perplexing handwritings, to decipher blotted, defaced, faded, torn, misspelled manuscripts. Sometimes names and dates have had to be almost guessed so unreadable was the writing. Many errors that readers will discover are to be accounted for by the above facts.



# GENEALOGICAL PART.

# CHAPTER I.

THOMAS STANTON OF STONINGTON, CONN., AND HIS CHILDREN.

1. Thomas' Stanton, of Stonington, embarked at London, Eng., Jan. 2, 1635, in the merchantman Bonaventura. Herwent first to Virginia and then to Boston. In 1637, he settled in Hartford, Conn., where he married Ann Lord, daughter of Dr. Thomas and Dorothy Lord of Hartford.

In 1650 he established a trading house in Stonington, Conn., on the Pawcatuck river. His family lived in New London for a few years until finally their permanent residence came to be on the Pawcatuck. Thomas died Dec. 2, 1676. Ann, his wife, died in 1688. They had ten children.

Mr. James Noyes aged 80 years who after a faithful living of the Church of Christ in this place for more than 55 years deceased Dec. ye 30, 1719-20. Retiring from active work in Feb., 1805, he went to Reading where he died, July 4, 1807, at the home of

Thomas' died in Stonington, April 11, 1718. He with his bro. John's received from their father his lands in Preston, Dr. Savage, in his Genealogical Dictionary, has this note: "Thomas Stanton, Jr., had shown, before the removal of his father from Hartford, such an aptness for the language of the Indians, as to be desired, in 1654, by the Commissioners of the United Colony of New England to be employed in the public service with his younger bro. John, by training at Harvard College for interpreter, and seven years the Colony made grant of land and money to the father for the benefit of him and them."

Thos.<sup>2</sup> Stanton, Jr., Nov. 11, 1698, bought of Owaneco, chief sachem of Mohegan, a tract of 650 acres, "lying in the North Parish in New London, adjoining to a pond called Obplmtksok (now Gardiner's Lake) a mile or more long." This he sold to Lieut. James Harris and in 1721 Harris sold it to Joseph Otis of New London.

Sarah (Denison) Stanton is remembered in her father's will which is dated Nov. 20, 1693. In addition to her marriage gift he gives to her in said will ten pounds and one silver spoon of II

10s. price, marked G. D. A. To his dau. Borodell (Denison) Stanton, wife of Thomas' bro. 11 Samuel<sup>2</sup>, Capt. Geo. Denison gave, besides what he had given her, five pounds and a silver cup that was sent from England by Uncle John Borodell to Geo. Denison's wife — Lady Ann Borodell. William Denison, third son of Capt. George, who married 10 Sarah<sup>2</sup> Stanton, ninth child of 1 Thomas, inherited his father's homestead in Stonington.

For further records as to 2 Thomas<sup>2</sup> and his wife see Historical Part. The date of their marriage has not been found and the list of their children has been secured with difficulty. The following is believed to be nearly or quite correct. See however Appendix for (D) John.

The value of Mr. Thomas Stanton's apparel (£56-6-5) and his plate (£58-15-10) would indicate a style of living more after the manner of his English cousins than the prevailing style of that

day in the colonies. This was also true of his brother Robert. These brothers always styled themselves and were styled by others "Gentlemen." Their tombstones have inscribed after their respective names the word "Gent."

# A SKETCH OF (102) MISS MARIA E. B. STANTON'.

#### A MISSIONARY TO AFRICA.

(By her sister, Mrs. Mary Sophia Stanton Stewart.)

Maria was born in Monson, Mass., Sunday, Sept. 16, 1832. As a child she was unusually attractive, having a bright face, large expressive eyes, and an easy manner. Her winning grace, dignity, and maturity of judgment were unusual in a child. educated, Christian mother influenced her home life, and her education was in a New England school and the Monson Academy. At the age of eighteen, during a revival, she was converted. Her conversion was marked by an entire surrender of self, and a personal consecration to God and to His work.

1851 she joined the M. E. Church in Monson. She immediately began seeking to win souls to Christ. The cry from bleeding Africa smote upon her heart; she heard the Father say, "Go, comfort those that mourn." She came into possession of the spirit of the lamented Cox, "Though a thousand fall, Africa must not be given up." A favorite poem of her's was Dr. Brown's, "The Missionary's Call." She made application to the Board of her Church, for an appointment as missionary to Africa. She believed that the American people had a peculiar duty to that country as an atonement for the wrongs of slavery. I will now quote from her diary:

Sept. 7, 1854. "In obedience to Thy commands, O my heavenly Father, I am preparing to go to benighted Africa. But my heart bleeds at the thought that I must leave the sweet scenes of my childhood, the friends that I love, for a foreign land, and an uncongenial clime. O America, my dear native land, must I bid thee farewell forever? Yes, adieu, to all that I love on

earth.

But the brightest beams of love divine Shall ever 'round my pathway shine; Come, O my soul, and lean on God, He hath for thee the wine press trod."

She left home and Monson for New York, Oct. 20, 1854. Her sea voyage began Oct. 25th, and Dec. 17th she reached Monrovia, in Liberia, West Africa. There were other missionaries who sailed with her, and on the voyage several of the crew were converted; among them was the first mate, who attributed his conversion to Miss Stanton's influence. She believed that wherever souls were to be saved was her place to work. Her appointment was to a seminary at Cape Palmas, in Liberia, but the building was not then up. She, therefore, remained in Monrovia a few months, and then with another lady missionary went to Millsburg, forty miles up the St. Paul's river, where they had a school. I think they had no help in Sunday or other services, except such as the natives could give.

After a few months she returned to Monrovia, where she taught in the academy until the climate undermined her health.

Seeking recovery she took a sea voyage down the coast and back. As the seminary at Cape Palmas was still unfinished she obtained permission to go there and begin her school in the church. Her companion in the charge of this school was a lady who sailed with her from New York, and whose husband had died during a former sojourn in Africa.

Miss Stanton's labors were brief. African fever soon struck her down; she lingered for several weeks in much patient suffering, kindly cared for by missionary friends. Among the companions of her voyage from America to whom she had become endeared, was the principal of the orphan asylum of the Protestant Episcopal mission at Cape Palmas, and his family. They invited her and her colleague to their home, thinking she would be more comfortable with them. After going there she lived six weeks. Her last words were, "I know whom I have believed." She died in April, 1856, and her body rests in the Cape Palmas Mission Cemetery, awaiting the resurrection from the dead.

She had but a year and a half of labor on the field, but the highest testimony of her efficiency came to us. Patiently and unselfishly, with prayers and tears, trusting in the promise, "Lo! I am with you alway, even to the end," she toiled.

Let one of the last entries in her diary close this sketch. "Dear Jesus, stamp upon my soul Thy image. O set anew upon my whole being the seal of Thy everlasting love. Holy Father, keep me through Thy own Name, and enable me to glorify Thee."

The following poem was written by Miss Stanton a short time before she left America.

#### AFRIC'S CRY.

A piercing cry is on the air, It comes from Afric's plain; Columbia's youthful daughters, hear That pleading voice across the main,

Their hearts respond — we'll go and save Dark Africa's benighted race; Then stretch thy arms far o'er the wave, Fold us in thine embrace. We'll hasten on to Afric's strand, For dark and lone it cannot be, Since God hath said, "In every land Light and salvation thou shalt see."

Dangers and death we gladly brave, Constrained by Jesus' love;— Strong in the Lord, who died to save, And now, for sinners, pleads above.

# CHAPTER III.

THE DESCENDANTS OF THOMAS' STANTON'S SEC-OND SON, CAPT. JOHN' STANTON.

3 John<sup>2</sup> Stanton, b. 1641, in Hartford, Conn.; m. 1664, HANNAH THOMPSON; d. Oct. 31, 1713, in Stonington, Conn. 3 John<sup>2</sup> Stanton was a pupil of that famous old school-teacher of the Puritans, Elijah Corlet. In 1654, he and John Minor, son of Thomas Minor, were selected by the Court of Commissioners to be educated for teachers of the Gospel to the Indians. Both young men, however, ultimately left their studies, and devoted themselves to other pursuits.

In 1664, John<sup>2</sup> Stanton became the first Recorder of the town of Southertown (now Stonington). The same year he married Hannah Thompson. She was, undoubtedly, either a daughter or sister of Rev. William<sup>2</sup> Thompson, Jr., whose father was Rev. Wm.<sup>1</sup> Thompson of Braintree, Mass. The younger William was appointed in 1657, to be a missionary to the Pequots, and resided in Stonington and New London until 1663, when he went to Surry Co., Virginia. He is believed to have returned and died in Stonington, as his grave is in the old burial ground at Wicketequack Cove.

Feb. 18, 1675, John<sup>2</sup> Stanton was commissioned captain of one of the four Connecticut regiments in <u>King Philip's War</u>. He served with distinction in this war, and was in command at the time of the capture of Canonchet, the chief sachem of all the Narragansetts. This service was acknowledged by the "Courte" in the remittance of a fine imposed in 1675. The circumstance

was as follows: He, as agent of Stonington, with five selectmen (of whom Thomas¹ Stanton was one), presented a petition and protest to the General Assembly of Connecticut, on behalf of the town. They protested against certain laws deemed by them unjust to their rights, peace and liberty. For so doing, one of them, Capt. Denison, was fined 10 pounds, and forbidden to hold office. Another one, Mr. John Stanton, "the towne's agent, for management of his agency, is fined ten pounds for that boldness, to be paid at the latter end of summer, at Boston, in money or corn, according to order." Meanwhile came the war, and in May, 1677, the fine not yet paid, was revoked.

May 10, 1710, a deed of trust was executed in favor of Capt. John Stanton and four others, by which the eastern part of the Mohegan lands was forever settled on the Mohegan tribe, under the regulation of said five and their successors, "so long as there shall be any Mohegans found or known of alive in the world."

"A few years before his death, Capt. John<sup>2</sup> Stanton gave his real estate to his sons by deed, as follows: to Joseph<sup>3</sup> he gave the homestead farm in Stonington; to John<sup>3</sup> and Thomas<sup>3</sup> he gave all his lands in Preston. Theophilus<sup>3</sup> was not living then. John<sup>3</sup> and Thomas<sup>3</sup> settled on the lands in Preston. His will, dated in 1713, confirms these gifts of land. In 1737, his son John<sup>3</sup>, then

of Preston, applied to the Probate Court in New London, for an equitable division of the Preston lands between him and his brother Thomas<sup>3</sup>." The homestead farm in Stonington is on the banks of the Mystic river. The site of Capt. John's mansion is still to be seen. His farm of 300 acres adjoined John Gallup's on the west and Capt. George Denison's on the north. A map of it, made by Capt. Denison in 1661, in connection with his own and other farms, is still in possession of the Denison family living on their ancestral homestead. The Pe-quot-se-pos brook was the dividing line between the Stanton and Denison lands. The present owner of Capt. John's lands is Joseph Stanton Williams whose mother was a Stanton. It has never passed out of possession of the family. A few years ago, in opening a gravel bank near the site of Capt. John's house, the laborers came to a space about six by eight feet, well stoned, containing a few portions of bones. Dr. Geo. D. Stanton visited the place and is of the opinion that it was the burying place of Capt. John and his family.

Samuel lived in Preston for three years after marriage. In June, 1789, he purchased a large tract of land in Wayne Co., Penn., and became the first actual settler in Mt. Pleasant township of said county. He had previously done some surveying in that section for Mr. William Cooper of Cooperstown, N. Y. His purchase was 322 acres, for which he paid £322 to Thomas Rogers of Philadelphia, for whom Cooper acted as agent. next day, June 30, 1789, he bought nearly 3,000 acres of Wm. Cooper, who in that sale acted as agent for Thomas Franklin, Wm. and Andrew Craig and others. In June of 1790, he began to work the land, and he brought his family there April 10, 1791. The next winter he and his whole family nearly perished through starvation and sickness, but relief came at last in the person of a hunter, Mr. Frederick Coates, whose dogs chased a deer near Samuel's cabin. When, in after years, Samuel kept a tavern, the horns of that deer were nailed to the top of his sign-post. In physical aspect Samuel Stanton was tall, broadshouldered, heavy, but not corpulent. He had a light complexion, soft blue eyes, very light-brown hair and whiskers verging a little to the sandy shade.

In temperament he was sanguine, his imagination was lively and his intellect well developed. His powers of concentration were almost too well developed, for if absorbed in a book he became oblivious to all the rest of the world.

He was said to have read over 2,000 volumes, concerning the contents of which he could converse intelligently.

Socially he was free, affable, entertaining, and serious rather than jovial; he was very inquisitive, desiring to learn all he could, and he always had a great variety of anecdotes to tell. In 1796 he was appointed justice of the peace, his home then being in Northampton Co.; in 1798 Wayne Co. was organized and he was one of the commissioners to locate the seat of justice and build the court-house. In Oct., 1814, he was appointed associate county judge, and held that office until he moved away.

Mr. Stanton had some aspirations toward poetry, and he wrote more than fifty hymns, some of which had a place in the hymn books used by the Free Communion Baptists, of whom he was one. Near the close of his life he moved to the western part of Penn. He had been appointed commissioner of a State road in that section; this office gave him some business in Harrisburg. Taking his family he went to the west branch of the Susquehanna; left them to proceed on their way while he went to Harrisburg, expecting to meet them later. He stopped in Bellefonte, Center Co., to visit his friend Judge Burnside, and there suddenly died, April 15, 1816.

Mr. Prentice was a Kentuckian by adoption, and a "Yankee" by nativity. His parents were comparatively poor, but his fondness for learning was early evinced, and he graduated at Brown University, Providence, R. I., in 1823, just as he had attained his majority. He then studied law and was admitted to the bar, but was driven to literature for the obtainment of present needs, and in 1828 he took charge of the New England Review, where he quickly attracted attention by his terse, incisive and epigrammatic style. Two years later he left the charge of the Review to John Greenleaf Whittier, the sweet poet,

Who sang the chains of slaves away,

and went to Kentucky to write the life of Henry Clay. "Old Harry of the West" was then the pride of the Whig party, and its bright particular star. The leaders of his party had chosen him as their candidate for President, and Mr. Prentice, being an ardent admirer of Mr. Clay, began the biography for the laudable purpose of showing the American public the greatness of the map.

In November of 1830, Mr. Prentice went to Louisville to take charge of the *Journal*, a newspaper which had been started by Whigs especially for him, and quickly he was in the foremost focal fires of the political battles of those days, and hand to hand with Shadrock Penn, the editor of the Louisville *Advertiser*, the ablest journalist then in the west.

It was expected by Penn's partisans that he would overwhelm the youngster at once, but he didn't. They fought like giants for eleven years, and at last Penn yielded before the stinging shafts of Prentice's satire, wit, sarcasm, irony and logic. Prentice became famous throughout the land, and Penn retired to St. Louis. Then Prentice wrote of him one of the most graceful, touching, grand and beautiful things that ever appeared editorially in the columns of a newspaper. By excessive writing Mr. Prentice brought upon himself, in 1840, an affliction called "writer's paralysis." He tried to learn to write lefthanded, but failed; he attempted to write with both hands, and would wrap his pen or pencil with bandages to enlarge it, indeed, all sorts of remedies, methods and contrivances were resorted to in order to overcome the difficulty, but none were satisfactory - the typewriter of to-day would have been a blessing - so he employed an amanuensis thenceforward, though he could, little at a time, manage, with both hands, to write a few sentences when imperative necessity demanded.

In dictating to his amanuensis he usually walked the floor, or sat toying with a kitten or something else, and spoke as though he were talking to himself, and his voice, which grew in his later years to be piping, had a nasal twang. He always punctuated his matter while dictating, and it was amusing to hear

him call between his stops, "comma," "semi-colon," "full-

stop," etc., as the sense of the matter required.

When the sentiment of secession began to grow in the South Mr. Prentice was a strong Unionist, though both of his sons, his only children, Courtland and Clarence, went into the Confederate army. Courtland was killed early in the struggle, at Augusta, Ky., and Clarence, who lived near Louisville several years after the war, was killed by being thrown from a buggy. George D. Prentice, Clarence's son, is a lawyer in California. His mother was a Hungarian lady of noble lineage, and he is the only living descendant of the great poet and wit.

Despite the fact that Mr. Prentice was one of the hardest political fighters, and said such bitter and cutting things that they made him many enemies, he never allowed his political feelings to affect his personal likes or dislikes. He deeply admired Horace Greeley, who for many years was his bitterest political enemy. Once, when Mr. Greeley came to Louisville to lecture, Mr. Prentice occupied a seat on the stage near the speaker and listened attentively to every word that fell from the old philosopher's lips. Mr. Greeley afterward called on Prentice at his editorial rooms, and was received by the poet and wit with every manifestation of pleasure and hospitality. Shortly afterward Mr. Prentice wrote for the New York Ledger his poem beginning

> I send thee, Greeley, words of cheer, Thou bravest, truest, best of men, For I have marked thy strong career As traced by thy own sturdy pen.

Sometimes it is said by those who knew but little of the man that he wrote verses simply for recreation, and that he estimated lightly all poetry. The truth is that he was peculiarly of a poetic temperament, and wrote poetry because he loved it. Yet he used, often, to advise others not to bother about it, saying: "It is the most unmarketable article in all the booths of Vanity Fair." This, however, it is thought, he did only in the cases of those who he felt could never produce creditable poetry; for 'tis

certain that he was patron and encourager of numberless poets and poetesses, many of whom became famous, among them the sweet singer "Amelia," and Sallie M. Bryan, who is now Mrs. J. J. Piatt. Besides these he used to doctor up and make presentable the halt and lame and limping verses of many who rode a ring-boned and spavined Pegasus.

Concerning Prentice's greatest poem, which is one of the finest in the language, a strange story is told. It is said that one New Year's Eve, somewhere along in the '50's, the carriers of the Journal came into the editor's room, complaining bitterly that they had no "Carrier's Address" for the next morning. This was a serious matter to them, for in those days this annual poem was a rich perquisite to the boys, and the dimes and dollars which came to them from the patrons of the paper for the "Address" had much to do with making each carrier's New Year a happy one. Mr. Prentice knew this, and, prompted by that warm kindliness which was ever a distinguishing trait of his remarkable character, he at once determined to help the youngsters, and so, to some one present, he said: "Please write for me and I will dictate a 'Carrier's Address." The result was the "Closing Year," the grand poem which begins:

'Tis midnight's holy hour — and silence now, Is brooding like a gentle spirit o'er The still and pulseless world.

Mr. Prentice was peculiarly a happy person in the days of his youth and strong manhood, and wit and humor were the strongest pillars in his temple of fame. He compiled a book of his own paragraphs, which was called "Prenticeana." In the preface of that book he excuses himself for the volume by saying that as others were inclined to make the compilation he preferred doing it himself, as some one else might not be so careful in the elimination of matter calculated to hurt the feelings of persons with whom he was then on terms of friendship, acquired subsequent to the time when the painful paragraphs were written.

There is a sort of general idea that Mr. Prentice was "a bad man with a gun," a duelist, and all that. Nothing could be more erroneous. The fact is he never fought a duel, but was sometimes, from the nature of his business, forced to personal and sudden encounters. He once said that he was naturally a timid man, but that he knew when he went to Kentucky he would find it necessary to "show fight" to keep from having fights, and per consequence he made a great many successful "bluffs," He was frequently challenged to duels, but always made fun of the belligerent messages. Once he wrote his challenger that it only took one fool to send a challenge while it took two to fight, and he didn't wish to be classed in the category. Although Mr. Prentice had remarkable command of the language he nearly always used the smallest and most commonplace words in writing; nevertheless he frequently consulted the dictionary. On one occasion when he found that valuable tome had been stolen from the editorial room he forthwith directed that another be supplied immediately, remarking at the same time, "Any one who would attempt to edit a newspaper without an unabridged dictionary is a shameless egotist."

In 1868, Henry Watterson became editor and part owner of the *Journal*, and Mr. Prentice, who had then grown prematurely old and feeble, did very little work. In the course of six months the *Journal* was consolidated with the *Courier* and became what is now known as the *Courier-Journal*. About a year afterward Mr. Prentice died at the residence of his son, Col. Clarence Prentice, a few miles below Louisville on the Ohio river.

He was a powerful editor and the most brilliant paragrapher of the age—indeed, the first one of any note. His wit was bright and sparkling, his satire keen, his eloquence grand, his poetry beautiful, his logic unanswerable. A deep thinker, a profound reasoner, genial, hopeful, humane, and, therefore, sometimes erring, he had the best of friends, the bitterest enemies, and he was, all in all, a great and gifted man—a genius.

### WILLIAM STANTON CLARK.

The following obituary notices and parts of notices, selected from scores, will present the private character and public services of the subject of this sketch, as seen by his neighbors and friends:

### [From Albany Argus, Monday, Sept. 10, 1888.]

A special despatch to *The Argus* from Sloansville states that Hon. William S. Clark died there at his home yesterday morning.

William S. Clark was born in Carlisle in 1826. In 1858 he was graduated from the Albany Law School, and then entered upon the practice of law. In 1850 he was elected superintendent of schools for the town of Carlisle, a position which he held with great credit for ten years. When the rebellion broke out he at once took the Union side, which he supported with great ardor, and during the war he addressed many recruiting meetings in Schoharie, Montgomery and Otsego counties. Not only in this way, but by the expenditure of no little time and money he upheld the cause of the government, never losing his enthusiasm even at the most discouraging times.

From 1862 to 1864 he was excise commissioner. On December 18, 1866, his distinguished abilities and his patriotism received the further recognition that they deserved by his election as a Democrat, to the Assembly of the State of New York. He was chosen without opposition at a special election to fill the place made vacant by the death of Daniel Shaver. In that term he served with honor on the committees on privileges and elections, erection and division of towns and counties and canal management. So satisfactory to his constituents was his service that, in 1867, he was re-elected to be his own successor.

During his whole career Mr. Clark has held the respect of men of both political parties, and his death removes one of Schoharie's best known and most high-minded citizens.

#### [From Schoharie Republican, Thursday, Sept. 13, 1888.]

On a bright Sunday morning, September 9, 1888, the Hon. William S. Clark of Sloansville, in this county, passed peacefully from the present to future life. His often-expressed wish was that when the time of his departure should come he might pass away without lingering disease or trouble and care of friends, and, as was his wish, so he died. As appeared, he was attacked with apoplexy and died without a struggle; no displacement of the bed covering in which he lay, no distortion of features indicated other than an instantaneous and painless death.

The career of our deceased friend has been extremely varied, industrious and useful; the sick and afflicted of his neighborhood have lost an ever capable and willing friend, and the community one of its most active and valued citizens.

He was born August 19, 1826, in the town of Carlisle in this county, being the fifth of nine children. His parents moved into this county from Coeymans, N. Y., in 1813, to subdue and

cultivate a farm but lately a wilderness.

At an early age the deceased developed a robust and healthy constitution, coupled with a mind of remarkable intellectual activity. At the age of thirteen years he was a student in the Schoharie Academy, and at fourteen he was a teacher. Later he attended this and other academic institutions of learning, but finally resumed a teacher's position for about ten years. In 1850 he was elected town superintendent of schools, but studiously devoting every spare hour to the study of the law, and finally graduated from the Albany Law School in the spring of 1858. He then came to Sloansville where he opened a law office and gradually filled it with one of the finest law libraries in the county, to which he added a miscellaneous library numbering many hundred volumes of choice works by the best authors, with the contents of which he exhibited great familiarity. In 1862 he was appointed commissioner of excise, and filled that office three years. In 1867 he was elected Member of Assembly, and was re-elected the following year. During this incumbency Mr. Clark fought bravely in behalf of the Albany and Susquehanna railroad bill, that gave his constituents a boon for which they were very grateful. As a Member of Assembly he filled positions on many very important committees, and was a member of the select committee to investigate the actions of canal officers, and made a manager in the long investigation which followed. In his own county he has long filled the office of the clerk of the courts, and in the political field he has for many years been called to fill positions as chairman, secretary and dele-For ten years he has been a member of the Democratic county committee, and was its secretary at the time of his death, Mr. Clark was a scholarly, accurate, eloquent and agreeable orator; but to enumerate the occasions of his addressing his fellow-citizens in this and other counties would enlarge this tribute too much. Almost his last public duty was to attend the great gathering of the American Educational Association in July last at San Francisco, Cal. His letters written en route and from that city, published in *The Republican*, were widely read and appreciated.

To sum up all the good qualities of our departed friend, none will shine brighter than his tender and sympathetic care of the sick and afflicted within the circuit of his acquaintance. No persons or families were too poor or too obscure for him to permit them to suffer without his best efforts being exercised for their relief, and nearly every family of that vicinity have been under obligations to him for his timely, efficient and untiring assistance to them in days of suffering and grief.

Now he sleeps. May he rest in peace.

In the same issue a correspondent at Central Bridge writes:

The Hon. Wm. S. Clark is dead! Sunday morning the Old Time Scythe came in his strength and took from among us Wm. S. Clark, a citizen of long standing in Sloansville. There is much good to be said of the eloquent and distinguished man that now lies silent in death. As a neighbor we cannot mention his equal. The little quiet town of Sloansville will miss him most, for in the past thirty years it has been his home. Born in the town of Carlisle, near Grosvenor's Corners, in the year 1826, and when quite young moved to Sloansville where he resided up to the time of his death. But not only will they miss him there, but the whole of Schoharie and Montgomery counties, where he was well known in a legal way. He was a lawyer by profession, always interested in the courts of the county, and an able speaker on the political issues of the day. We have many times heard it remarked that Wm. S. Clark would settle the little difficulties that naturally arose in his place of residence. We can but say he was kind-hearted, benevolent, generous to a

fault. He leaves a brother, Benjamin F., in the mercantile business at Sloansville, and a sister living at Reusselaerville; but they will not weep alone—there will be weeping by many. Upon the street, in all our quiet rooms how oft it will be repeated, William S. Clark is dead!

God in His goodness has taken a dear friend and brother from us; we shall miss him. Tears bedew our eyes. He has gone to that "undiscovered country from whose bourne no traveler returns." We draw the curtain.

[From The Wide-Awake Courier, Canajoharie, N. Y., Sept. 18, 1888.]

Saturday night Wm. S. Clark said "Good night" to the members of his family, and "drew the drapery of his couch about him, and lay down to pleasant dreams." Sunday morning, September 9, his sleep deepened into eternal rest, and his freed spirit will bid "Good morning" to kindred and friends in a brighter clime. Among the tributes in the county papers, one friend has said: "As a neighbor we cannot name his equal," and another: "He was a regular attendant upon Sabbath services and was his aged mother's staff each morning," and another: "His reverence for his mother, love for his sisters, and affection for his brother were living examples which it would be well for all to emulate," and still another closes with these words - words that all in Sloansville know to be true: "No person or families were too poor or too obscure for him to permit them to suffer without his best efforts being exerted for their relief, and nearly every family of that vicinity has had his timely, efficient and untiring assistance in their days of suffering and grief." Truly, "He was a man, take him for all in all, we shall not look upon his like again." His heart was tender as that of woman, and when he had cared for the sick and dead, his pen was ever ready with tributes of sympathy and words of consolation. These are the closing words of one of his later tributes:

"Ah, the tears are love's offering and tribute. Check them not, they are sorrow's antidote. There is a better land, knowing which, shall we not say: Wife, daughter, sister, rest; thine the waiting, ours the toiling; thine the peace, ours the struggle, till we too shall behold the Everlasting day." On Tuesday, September 11, under a bright sky and a genial atmosphere, friends came from far and near for their last farewell to William S. "Farewell, a word that must be, and had been—a sound which makes us linger; yet, farewell."

CLARK — Died at Sloansville, N. Y., Sept. 9th, Hon. William S. Clark, aged 62 years.

Converted while a student at Hamilton; graduated from the Albany Law School in 1858; left with the care of his mother and three sisters, he devoutedly fulfilled the trust. Strong in friendship, public in spirit, self-sacrificing and helpful to all, he studied the things which make for peace and the good of a people; loyal to his country in her darkest days of strife, sympathizing with the afflicted, ministering often to the sick, caring for the dead, a regular attendant, and more than liberal contributor to the Baptist church, his decease drew to the funeral solemnities a great concourse, including some of the most distinguished men of the county; a judge, an ex-senator, an ex-member of Congress, members of the bar, and seven clergymen. A sister and a brother alone survive him who has entered into rest.—Rev. A. Waterberry.

BENJAMIN F. CLARK, youngest child of William Clark and Sarah Stanton, born in the town of Carlisle, N. Y., July 4, 1831, brother of Wm. Stanton Clark, owed his education mainly to his brother who inspired him with a love for study and reading.

After leaving the district school, he attended Schoharie and Hamilton academies, and also Carlisle Seminary, one of whose promoters and stockholders he was — having invested his entire patrimony to establish the school, and it was finally lost as the school went down after a few years. After the death of their father in 1849, the two sons continued farming for some years, each attending school away from home alternate winters.

Benjamin, like his brother, engaged in teaching, in which profession he continued for fifteen years in union schools and academies, in his native State and in New Jersey—spending his vacations in travel.

In the early years of the war he and his brother addressed meetings, aided in raising local town bounties to promote the enlistment of men for the Union armies, and in 1864 he received a commission from Gov. Seymour to go south to enlist men for the Union service.

November 12, 1873, he married Mary C. Lawyer, a daughter of John S. Lawyer of Fultonham, N. Y. Miss Lawyer was a graduate of the Albany Normal School, and had been for ten years one of the best teachers in the State. She had three times declined offered situations in the normal schools of the State, because she could command larger salaries in union schools.

In the autumn of 1874, Mr. Clark engaged in the mercantile business, at which he and his wife continued until the fall of 1889, when he sold out and retired from business with a moderate competence.

No children were born to them, otherwise the union was a most happy one, both having a cultivated literary taste, being genuine book-lovers. They are now residing in the house in Sloansville which was for many years the ideal home of the aged mother, two sisters and the two brothers.

Still interested in education, and in the education of their nephews and nieces, highly respected by all who know them, in their pleasant home with a well-selected library (the life-time collection of the two brothers), Mr. and Mrs. B. F. Clark are peacefully approaching the evening of their days.

Erastus H. Stanton was born at Durham, Greene county, N. Y., November 13, 1816. His grandfather removed from Connecticut to New York in 1790. The family is of Welsh descent. His mother was a daughter of Henry Niles, a descendant from a Scotch family belonging to the sect of Quakers or Friends. They were persecuted for their opinions under the reign of Charles II, and fled to a new continent that they might enjoy that freedom of opinion denied at home. Mr. Stanton was educated in the common schools and academy of his native town. An early developed taste for reading was gratified by access to a circulating library. At the age of sixteen he was placed at his own request with a mercantile firm at Rensselaerville, Albany county, where he acquired a knowledge of the business. He began business for himself in 1837 at Greenville, Greene county, where he remained twelve years. Here he was married September 2, 1840, to Miss Mary Sanford, who survives him. Owing to the ill-health of Mrs. Stanton he removed to Illinois, purchasing a farm near Rockton, only a mile from the Wisconsin line. He remained there engaged in farming, banking and mercantile pursuits until 1867, when he came to Ionia, and again embarked in mercantile pursuits, in which he remained until he began lumbering operations at Sheridan. This business occupied his time and personal

attention until within the past three or four years, when he gave up the cares of active business life.

In 1838 Gov. Marcy of New York commissioned Mr. Stanton quartermaster of the 37th Brigade of State troops, a position he held for four years. In 1861, being then in Illinois, Gen. Yates. afterward Governor of the State, appointed him as his military aide, in which capacity he visited the several Illinois regiments in the Department of North Missouri, his duty being to see that the troops were properly equipped with arms, clothing, etc. During his residence in New York and Illinois he was several times elected supervisor and held other positions. Always a public-spirited and enterprising citizen, the people of Ionia were not slow to recognize his character. In 1872, when the Ionia and Stanton Railroad project was inaugurated, Mr. Stanton was elected a director and the first secretary and treasurer of the company, which positions he filled until the road was consolidated with the Detroit, Lansing and Lake Michigan Company. He took a lively interest in the completion of the road, taking upon himself many arduous duties, and as an officer of the company, he proved himself a capable and energetic official.

In politics Mr. Stanton was a staunch Republican, severing his political ties with the Democratic party as early as 1856. 1879 he was elected Mayor of Ionia, his competitor being James M. Kidd, and the following year he ran against A. F. Bell and was re-elected. In 1880 he was elected te represent the then Twenty-fourth District in the State Senate, in which body he was a leading, influential member. In 1882 he declined to be a candidate for renomination. He was the soul of political honor himself, as he was an exemplar of business integrity. He never failed to carry out his own pledges, or held out false hopes to his friends. But he was perhaps of too confiding a nature, and placed too much stress upon talk, judging others by his own high standard of morals. He was often spoken of as an available candidate for other and higher positions, and there was no man in Ionia county, to say the least, who had a warmer personal following, based on genuine good will and respect for his high

qualities of manhood. But he was modest and retiring in his disposition and lacked the ability, not to say the disposition, to push himself to the front.

As a neighbor he was kind and considerate to others; as a citizen upright and just; as a business man honest and honorable in all his dealings; as a legislator incorruptible and fearless; as a friend ever true. He was childlike in his faith, his implicit confidence in others, and it shocked him to find that all men were not as simple, as direct and ingenuous as he was himself. He had many friends who were knit to him by bonds of steel.

The funeral of Mr. Stanton was held in St. John's Church at 4 o'clock on Tuesday afternoon. The services were conducted by Bishop Gillespie, assisted by Rev. Mr. Nock, pastor of the church. The impressive burial service of the Episcopal church was read, but there was no sermon. The pall-bearers were H. Rich, L. B. Townsend, Geo. W. Webber, A. J. Webber, J. L. Taylor and W. C. Page. A large concourse of citizens accompanied the remains to Oak Hill Cemetery where Bishop Gillespie also officiated. Mayor Doyle and the council as well as the other city officers attended in a body.

#### IN RESPECT TO THE DEAD.

At a special meeting of the council on Saturday evening the following resolutions were proposed and adopted:

Resolved, That in the death of Hon. Erastus H. Stanton, the nation has lost one of its truest statesmen, the State one of its best citizens, the city he has repeatedly honored one of its wisest and most faithful officials, his bereaved family a loving husband and affectionate father.

Resolved, That we tender to the bereaved wife and relatives the sympathy which those alone can truly feel who have learned to love him well, and beg of them to accept with us consolation which springs from the belief that the true and good can never die.

Resolved, That the city building be appropriately draped in mourning for the period of ten days, that the city flags be placed

at half-mast until after the funeral, and that the Common Council attend the obsequies.

Resolved, That, as a tribute to the memory of our distinguished citizen, we especially request and respectfully recommend that secular work or business in the city be suspended during the hours of his funeral.

Resolved, That an engrossed copy of these resolutions be, by the City Clerk, furnished to the widow and family of the deceased.

The Mayor appointed Aldermen Bailey and Bedford as a special committee to offer assistance at the funeral.

At a special meeting of the vestry of St. John's Church held on Monday, the following resolutions were passed on the death of Hon. E. H. Stanton:

WHEREAS, It has pleased Almighty God to take from our number the Hon. Erastus H. Stanton, therefore, be it

Resolved by the vestry of St. John's Church, Ionia, At a special meeting thereof, that during the long term of years in which Mr. Stanton has served upon the vestry of said parish, he has been foremost in its deliberations and doings, and that by his death the vestry loses a wise and efficient member, the church a zealous and liberal supporter, the community a leading, public-spirited and exemplary citizen, and the family a devoted, prudent and honored head. That in all our relations with the deceased, his sterling integrity, cool wisdom and pure life have won our highest admiration and confidence, and that in testimony of our profound regret for his loss to this body, to his family and the community, these resolutions be spread upon the records of the vestry and a copy thereof delivered to the bereaved family.

said land all which forementioned land, with all the appurtenances belonging thereunto, we do firmly sell and deliver to Thomas Stanton and his heirs forever to enjoy and possess quietly without disturbance from us or our heirs or assignes, and do bind ourselves to free the said Thomas Stanton from any molestation or claims or demands whatsoever in or about the aforesaid land to the true performance hereof we bind ourselves, heirs, executors administrators or assigns firmly by these presents this second of January 1656.

### CHAPTER IV.

# THE DESCENDANTS OF THOMAS' STANTON'S THIRD SON, JOSEPH<sup>2</sup> STANTON.

6. Joseph<sup>2</sup> Stanton was b. 1646 in Hartford, Conn.; he was bapt. March 21, 1646. He removed with his parents to Stonington. He settled on a great tract of land which his father had bought of a Narragansett sachem for a half bushel of wampum. The sachem's child was a captive and was redeemed by the aid of Thomas', and so the Indian sold the land as part payment of the price.

In ancient Boston records, Joseph is described as "Joseph Stanton of Squanicot, Narraganset county, King's Province;" and in a lease recorded in Boston he describes the land leased as "half the farm or neck named Quannecontague, where I do now live." This land was where Charlestown, R. I., now is, formerly a part of Westerly. The lease was dated Nov. 20, 1685.

In 1669 Joseph lived in Stonington and was appointed assistant magistrate to hold court in New London with his father who was magistrate.

In 1714 Ben Uncas and fifty-four other Mohegans signed a paper, dated in May, affirming that Oweneco had wrongfully sold a great part (western part) of their lands, and they then consigned what was left to Joseph Stanton and four others. This was probably Joseph<sup>2</sup>, though as he d. in 1714 it may have been another Joseph.

William Mead's will was made at Roxbury in 1683; he gave half of his estate to his wife and half to Joseph Stanton; there was also a charge of £20 against Joseph for Mead's supply of clothing, etc., to Joseph's daughter Hannah. Baldwin "conjectures" that "Miss Prentice" was a fourth wife. Savage thinks she was the third wife. "Honnored Sur these with grief com to Inform your Honner that yester day Robart babcock of this town departed this life and it Is to be feared that the caus of his deth came by abuse or hurt that he Reseved: Sur the Jury of Inqueest have sat on him and viewed the outward and Inward part of his body and they find his body brused and his blader broked.

"Sur it is susspected that John Ross of westerly Is the man that hath dun the hurt and committed the fact and I am Informed that he is gon out of this town In a bote of Mr. Christopher Champlins bound for newport the bote hath tow masts the man hath offen bin att newport and Is known there:

"Sur I nede not In struct your Hounor butt hope that If he be at newport you In your wisdom will take Care that the said Ross be seccurred: Sur I humbly pray your advice Consarning the premeses and whather the Evidencers ought to be bound over to Cort before the Ross be Taken: no more att presant but Remain

This Abigail (Sheffield) Stanton, wife of 723 Joseph4, seems to have been a woman with a very unfortunate temper, who must have made some lively times for the church and the rest of 720 Daniel's4 family.

THE CENTENARIAN AT REST.

"On the 29th of April, 1784, a daughter was born to Amos and Sarah (Stanton), residents of Shaftsbury, Vt., whom the parents

named Anna. Five years after her birth the sturdy farmer removed his family to the State of New York. After a few changes he finally located on Paris Hill, in 1806. Three years later the daughter became the wife of Curtiss Stiles Parmelee, an enterprising young farmer, who took the fair bride to his home, about one and a half miles south-east of Clinton, on the Paris Hill road. Here the happy couple lived nearly sixty years, when the husband died, leaving his widow in the care of a son, Curtiss S., Jr. About fifteen years ago the son went to Iowa to live, where he died about two years ago, leaving a wife and four married daughters, the eldest of which resides on the homestead referred to, the wife of H. A. Payne. By these grandchildren Grandma Parmelee has been tenderly cared for, until she peacefully departed on the early morning of Jan. 26, 1888, to join the family above. Her advanced age of 103 years and 9 months is not more remarkable in this restless, migratory age, than the fact of her living under the roof that sheltered her in her bridal days to the end of her life, a period of about four score years. The deceased was the mother of only two children, Amos and Curtiss S.; the former died at the age of 13 years. She retained her mental and physical faculties to a remarkable degree up to two years previous to her death. On the 13th of July last, the centennial celebration day of the settlement of Clinton, this venerable representative of a previous century rode in a carriage with several octogenarians in the procession, and greatly enjoyed the occasion.

"She was brought up by Baptists and believed in immersion, and was thus baptized by request, and joined the Congregational church, under the administrations of Rev. Dr. Norton, the first pastor, and continued a member of the same forty years, when she joined the Methodist church, of which she was a member when she died. She remembered the great eclipse, and how many believed that the earth would be burned. Three of her mother's brothers, named Draper, were in the Revolutionary War, and one of them lived in Holland Patent. She sang in the Clinton church five years and attended singing school in the old Park House.

"Miss Thankful Stanton, her sister, who had lived with her some years, died at the age of 99 years and 9 months, just two years previous to her sister Anna's death. As a Stanton, a brother, is still living at Cassville, in his nineties. The old lady astonished all interviewers during the centennial of last year by her vivid remembrance of trivial as well as of important events.

"By her request her death was announced by the ringing and tolling of the church bell, as was formerly the custom. Funeral services were held in the Methodist church on Saturday, and called out a large number of people. Rev. R. Flint, the pastor, preached a sermon from the words, 'Well done, good and faithful servant; thou hast been faithful over a few things, I will make thee ruler over many. Enter thou into the joy of thy Lord.' The bearers were J. O. Gridley, M. W. Martin, William Billingham, and R. N. Martin. Mrs. Parmelee's remains were consigned to the vault until spring, when they will be buried beside those of her husband, in the old burying ground on Water street."

792. Henry Brewster Stanton (Joseph, Lodowick, Joseph, Joseph, 6 Joseph), b. June 29, 1805, in Pachaug, Conn.; m. ELIZABETH CADY, in Johnstown, N. Y., May 1, 1840. She was b. Nov. 12, 1815, and was well-known as the celebrated lecturer and president of the National Woman Suffrage Association. He d. Jan. 14, 1887, in New York city. The following is from the New York Tribune of Jan. 15, 1887:

"Henry Brewster Stanton, who was one of the early antislavery agitators and who won many honors in journalism, died yesterday of pneumonia at No. 116 East Twenty-third street. His illness was known to but few friends, and his vigor of intellect and physical activity were retained up to the time he left the office of the Sun a week ago. He had sat in the office without laying aside his overcoat and in going out into the air he caught a cold that speedily brought on the disease which ended his life. Even after his sickness he continued to do work for several days, editing the proof-sheet of the fourth edition of his autobiography, entitled 'Random Recollections,' and up to within a few hours of his death he did not consider his condition serious. His sons, Henry and Robert L. Stanton, were at his bedside when the end

came. His wife is now in London.

Mr. Stanton was born in the hamlet of Pachaug, New London county, Conn., now the town of Griswold, on June 27, 1805. Thomas Stanton, the first of the family in New England, came from England in 1635 and was Crown Interpreter-General of the Indian tongues and subsequently Judge of the County Court of New London. On his mother's side Mr. Stanton's ancestry ran back to Elder Brewster, of the Plymouth Colony. His father was a woollen manufacturer and a trader with the West Indies. A little red school-house in Pachaug and a rickety academy in Jewett City, a place on what is now known as the Thames river, furnished Mr. Stanton his education before he entered public life. George D. Prentice was one of his teachers and by him the field of newspaper work was laid bare to the young student. 1826 Mr. Stanton went to Rochester to write for Thurlow Weed's newspaper, the Monroe Telegraph. This sheet advocated the election of Henry Clay, and Mr. Stanton, attracted into political life, took the stump for John Quincy Adams, making his first political speech in Rochester. For three years he was Deputy County Clerk of Monroe county. He studied for a short time under the Rev. Ferdinand Ward, father of Ferdinand Ward, of Grant & Ward fame. In 1832 he went to Cincinnati to finish his studies at Lane Seminary.

"His first anti-slavery speech was made at a debating club at the date of 'Nat' Turner's insurrection. He became one of the most effective platform orators who defended human rights in the great controversy preceding the war, and in 1834, at the anniversary in this city of the American Anti-Slavery Society, of which he was secretary, he faced the first of the two hundred mobs he battled against in his devotion to the cause of freedom. As a public speaker he was ranked with Wendell Phillips, but his taste for politics early drew him into the Liberty party. He took sides with the Democracy in New York local contests at this period, but was an ardent Republican when the issue of slavery and secession became paramount in National affairs. In the early anti-slavery contest Mr. Stanton spoke for the relief of the oppressed in the principal cities of England, Scotland, Ireland and France. He was a member of the Free Soil party and

served in the Massachusetts Senate for two terms. He was a member also of the New York Senate in 1850. He helped to launch the Republican party in 1855, and took the stump for Governor Seward. He made his home in 1847 at Seneca Falls, N. Y., and being admitted to the bar there, soon acquired repu-

tation as a successful lawyer in patent cases.

"He did a great deal of valuable work on newspapers. He wrote for the *Tribune* when Mr. Greeley was its editor, and subsequently for the *Sun*, with which he had a close connection up to the time of his death. He published a book called 'Sketches of Reforms and Reformers in Great Britain and Ireland,' after his trip to Europe in the forties. His autobiography was engaging his attention when his fatal illness began."

The following letter from Henry B. Stanton's son, Theodore,

in Paris, to the Chicago Inter-Ocean, is quoted entire:

#### Special Correspondence to The Inter-Ocean.

"PARIS, Jan. 21.—My father has passed away rich in years and not poor in honors. Henry B. Stanton was no ordinary man, and I know you will not consider it unbecoming in me to devote a letter to his memory, especially if I do little else than transcribe a few of the tributes of others which are coming to

me by every post.

"Mrs. Elizabeth Cady Stanton writes me from England: 'Your father was an eloquent speaker, a forcible writer, and an admirable conversationalist. Those who possess oratorical gifts are seldom able with their pen, and it is rare that a good writer is also a good speaker. Phillips was fine on the platform, so was Gerrit Smith, but neither could put his thoughts on paper without discovering a certain lameness. Garrison, on the other hand, could write better than he could speak. None of them were equal to your father in conversation. I never knew any one who could on the spur of the moment rise and express himself more appropriately on all subjects and on all occasions, whether he was called upon to deal with temperance, anti-slavery, education, agriculture, religion, politics, science, art or music. Sometimes when I have been serenaded or expected to say a few words I have pushed him forward to express what I could not without preparation, and, at such moments, he was always happy in speaking from my standpoint as well as from his own. was asked one evening to respond to a toast on music. Now, said I to myself, for once he will be at a loss for something to say. But after a few general remarks on national aptitudes for music, especially among southern nations, he went on and spoke charmingly of the beauty of the negro melodies and the solace music had been to our slaves in their weary bondage. It being in the days of our anti-slavery excitement, he always seized every opportunity that offered to call public attention to the irrepressible conflict.

""No man was better acquainted with the politics and politicians of the last century, both in England and America, than he was. Very conversant with history and literature, he had an inexhaustible fund of anecdotes of the living and the dead, authors, statesmen and artists. His memory was really wonderful, and he never forgot what he saw, read or heard. In another respect he was also very remarkable: he was uniformly in good spirits. Although of a nervous temperament and capable of the highest enthusiasm, he never suffered corresponding depression, but was always ready for cheerful conversation. His industry was truly praiseworthy. He was continually busy reading, writ-

ing or working outdoors.

""When speaking before an audience, he was very quick to turn to account any unexpected occurrence. On one occasion he was delivering a temperance lecture on a platform covered by a thick oil-cloth that protruded two or three inches over the edge of the boards in front. In the midst of one of his most eloquent passages, he was comparing the inebriate's downward course to the Falls of Niagara, and the struggle with drink to the hopeless efforts of a man in the rapids. Just as he reached, in his description, the fatal plunge over the precipice, he advanced to the edge of the platform, the oil-cloth gave way under his feet, and in an instant he went down headlong into the audience, carrying with him desk, glass, pitcher and water. Being light and agile, he was quickly on the platform again, and immediately remarked with great coolness: 'I carried my illustration further than I had intended to. Yet even so it is that the drunkard falls, glass in hand, carrying destruction with him. But not so readily does he rise again from the terrible depths into which he has precipitated himself.' The whole house cheered again and again, and even Gough never struck a more powerful blow for temperance.

Your great delight, when a little fellow 4 or 5 years old, was to have him make speeches to you, he pretending that you were a judge and himself an advocate. He used to seat you on the piano and then, with vehement gestures and pirouettings, would argue the case. Not one word of the speech did you understand. But you remained spellbound by the passion that was displayed,

by the denouncing of witnesses and opposing counsel, by the laying down of the law to the judge—yourself—and by appeals to the jury—your older brothers, who were not less amused than you were by the whole performance. You never smiled nor took your eyes off of him for ten minutes on the stretch, when the court adjourned. One day in your father's absence I tried to amuse you in the same way, but I had scarcely uttered two sentences when the judge coolly clambered down from the bench and walked off, whether because moved by a masculine dislike of a feminine advocate, or the comparatively lifeless presentation of the case, I have never learned to this day. I never repeated the

humiliating experiment.

"'Your father had a strong taste for agricultural pursuits. He enjoyed planting trees, grafting, raising fruit and vegetables, and never a day passed in summer that he did not go the round of the garden. He once made a wager with a friend that he could raise the largest melon and won. He watched the growing fruit day after day, and when the big fellow was ready for the table invited his friend to dinner. At dessert the much-praised and long-cared-for melon was brought in, and the host, knife in hand, was about to cut it open when it fell apart of itself. One of Erin's daughters, who had been serving us for several days with muskmelons, and had never seen a watermelon, had kept the edible portion in the kitchen, and had sent in to us the rind! General surprise was followed by as general a laugh, and your father, turning to his guest, asked: 'Bascom, why am I at this moment like that melon? We are equally crusty.'

"Theodore Tilton in a letter to me, says: "My chief recollections of your father date back to the anti-slavery days, when he and I were sometimes speakers on the same platform. I was always struck with his cogent style of argument and appeal, particularly when the subject had a political interest. It was in political discussion that he excelled. He was a splendid campaigner — full of fact, logic, anecdote, wit and passion — and with a voice as clear as a clarion. He was a born orator and

debater.'

"A fortnight ago Mr. Frederick Douglass told me how and when it was that he first heard my father speak in public. 'When I was escaping from bondage I was received under the humble but hospitable roof of Nathan Johnson, an old colored man who died at the age of 90. He it was, by the way, who gave me my name. He was reading the 'Lady of the Lake' while I was with him, and suggested that I take Scott's Douglas as my last name. I did so, adding an 's' for some reason or another, or for no

reason at all; I don't now remember why. Nathan Johnson also told me all about Henry B. Stanton's wonderful oratorical powers, and took me one evening to hear him denounce the slave system. It was one of the first abolition lectures I ever heard, and this circumstance, combined with the eloquence of the speaker, left an ineffaceable impression on my mind. Your father was then unquestionably the best orator in the anti-slavery movement. I listened to him on many other occasions, but this first one, when I was fresh from slavery, naturally touched me

the most deeply.'

"I might go on and give some of my own recollections. might tell how father used to like to talk of these early antislavery days, to which Mr. Douglass has just referred, and especially to a lecture tour that he once made through New York State in the company of Whittier, who had not then won an honored place in literature. I might even cite a letter that the Quaker poet wrote last summer to father, in which he recalled in words tinged with sadness this joint anti-slavery crusade. I might describe his ardor for the collection of the engraved or photographed portraits of the great men of all times and countries, how he had them framed, hung in groups on the wall, and how he would dilate upon the virtues and their vices of the originals to the circle of children whose eyes were riveted on the pictures and their ears wide open to all that was said. admirable way to teach history and biography, and how vividly those faces and lives still come back to me now! I might mention, as an example of his large acquaintance with American political history, the many hundred pages of notes that he once furnished me when I was preparing a series of lectures to be delivered at Hobart College, but which a sudden call to Europe interrupted. I might relate the enthusiasm that he created in New Jersey during the Tilden campaign when he stumped the State for the Democratic candidates, and after many years of absence from public life returned to it with all the old fire and success. 'Why, we didn't know that we had such a stunner amongst us,' the old Dutch farmers used to say, and if Tilden carried the State it was due in no small manner to Henry B. Stanton. I might touch upon these facts and many similar ones, but as I wrote at the beginning of this letter, I have preferred to-day to transcribe only what others have said."

For about three years he was in the counting-room of his father's cotton mill, and for three years was in the cotton mills of his uncle, James S. Treat, at Voluntown.

About 1854 he went to Norwich, Conn., and became cashier for J. A. Fay & Co., manufacturers of wood-working machinery. In 1860 he became a partner in the business, moved to Cincinnati, Ohio, and is now president and general manager of the company, their entire plant being in Cincinnati. In connection with his business Dr. Doane has been elected a member of the American Societies of Mechanical and Mining Engineers, also of the American Geographical Society and American Society of Science.

He is a chevalier in the Legion of Honor of France, and was knighted by the government of France, by special act of its

Congress.

Dr. Doane is a prominent Baptist. For 19 years he has been superintendent of the Mt. Auburn Baptist Sunday School. He is a trustee of Dennison University, of the Baptist Ministers' Aid Society and Home at Fenton, Mich., and of the Cincinnati Y. M. C. A. He was chairman of the executive committee of the Baptist May Anniversaries held in Cincinnati in 1891.

Beyond all these honors, however, Dr. Doane will be longest remembered as a musical composer. In 1875 Dennison University conferred upon him the degree of Doctor of Music. has composed more than 600 Sunday school songs, at least 150 church and prayer-meeting hymns, and 250 other songs and bal-

lads, besides anthems, cantatas, etc.

Some of his best-known compositions are those beginning: "Safe in the Arms of Jesus;" "Rescue the Perishing;" "More Like Jesus Would I Be;" "Near the Cross, a Trembling Soul;" "Pass Me Not, O Gentle Saviour;" "Jesus Keep Me Near the Cross;" "More Love to Thee, O Christ;" "Tell Me the Old, Old Story."

Dr. Doane lives at Mount Auburn, Cincinnati, and has two

# CHAPTER VI.

# THE DESCENDANTS OF THOMAS' STANTON'S FOURTH SON, DANIEL STANTON.

7. Daniel Stanton (son of 1 Thomas'), b. in Hartford, Conn., in 1648 and d. in the island of Barbadoes before 1688. He left but one child:

RICHARD<sup>3</sup>; this son is mentioned in the will of Mrs. Ann (Lord) Stanton, his grandmother. She made her will in 1688 and refers to Richard<sup>3</sup> as "the fatherless child in Barbadoes." This indicates his father's death at a prior date.

The only further record of Richard is that his son, Richard4, Jr., came to Stonington, Conn., Feb. 12, 1735-6, and sold his right to certain inherited estates. He probably returned to Barbadoes.

7 Daniel<sup>2</sup> had willed to him by his father in 1678 two hundred acres of land; this he authorizes his mother to sell for him. She sold it, Sept. 18, 1682, for £24 to George Denison. In the New Eng. Reg., Vol. 15, p. 64, is a note to the effect that "Joseph Wells of Westerly in 1681 built the Alexander and Martha (dimensions, 40 ft. by 16 ft. midship) for Alexander Pygan, Samuel Rogers and Daniel Stanton." The letter from Daniel to his mother authorizing her to sell the two hundred acres of land was written at Barbadoes in 1682. The inference is that he sailed in said ship in 1681 or 1682. This, however, may not have been his first voyage, and we have no means of knowing whether it was his last.

There is much room for discussion as to Daniel's2 marriage. Savage thinks he lived in Westerly, R. I., and by a wife Elizabeth had five children. This cannot be; these five children were born from 1678 to 1687, and are recorded in the Friend's Meeting House at Newport, R. I. They are the children of Daniel',

son of Robert Stanton, of Newport, R. I.

Baldwin, and other genealogists, thinks that 7 Daniel<sup>2</sup> mar-

ried in Barbadoes.

Judge Richard A. Wheeler, of Stonington, Conn., in a letter

written April 14, 1886, discusses this subject thus:

"I have searched in all the old records of Stonington, Westerly, New London and all of the Rhode Island and Connecticut archives and I am satisfied that this Daniel Stanton married \* \* \* I cannot prove it but my here and not in Barbadoes. opinion is that Daniel Stanton married Eliza Wheeler.

"Thomas Miner's Diary says that this Miss Wheeler married some one, but provokingly omits the name of the groom. This Miss Wheeler had a bro. Richard, who was my great-grandfather

Wheeler's father."

In the same letter Judge Wheeler has this to say of Daniel's son Richard: "A portion of the estate of Thomas Stanton, Sen., was set out and assigned to Richard Stanton of Barbadoes. Subsequently this Richard, in 1781, June 11, sells a part of the land so set out to him, describing himself as Richard Stanton of the Parish of St. Phillips in the Island of Barbadoes, Planter, etc. Later, Sept. 5, 1789, he sells the balance of the land to Joseph Denison and then describes himself as of 'St. Georges in the Island

of Barbadoes.' I have somewhere seen it stated that this last deed was given by Richard Stanton, Jr., but cannot just now give my

authority."

If the reader will go back of these quotations from Judge Wheeler's letters he will see that Richard, son of Daniel, was born at least before 1688; the first of these deeds was dated in 1781 and the second in 1789; my conclusion would be that both of them were given by a Richard Stanton, Jr. The Scotch verdict of "not proven" must be rendered as to

the descendants of 7 Daniel' Stanton until more light is secured.

Since writing the above I am able, through the kindness of Dr. George D. Stanton, of Stonington, Conn., to give further information as to Daniel's2 transfer of property to his brother Thomas<sup>2</sup> in 1681. Dr. Stanton has in his possession the original deed; it is witnessed by Daniel's mother and three others.

There are some curious acknowledgments on the back of it,

and I hereby give a literal copy of the deed:

#### DEED.

"To all Christian People wherever these presents shall come —

Daniell Stanton sendeth greeting.

"Know you that I Daniell Stanton of Stonington in the County of New London in the Colony of Connecticott: have and do fully and absolutely enfeofe sell Alienate and pass over to my Loving brother Thomas Stanton of the same town countie and Collony A Certayne tract of Land willed to me by my honored father Mr. Thomas Stanton deceased in estimation three score acres more

or less.

"Bounded as followeth: on the North by A small Run of Water - adjoining to Land belonging to the Said Thomas Stanton & on the East bounded with Pawcatuck River, and on the South to A Small brooke commonly called the Hott house brooke: & on the West bounded all along by the West Side of the Swamp out of which swamp the Northermost brook runneth: the Aforesaid upland meadow ground with the swamp and all the several and singular privileges and appurtenances thereunto belonging with whatever benefit doth arise therefrom. Declaring myself to have good and lawful Right in the above sayed tract of Land, and that it is free from any incumbrances, mortgage, Lease or entanglement or Any otherwise before the signement hereof: unto Thomas Stanton To have and To hold to possess and injoy peacably and quietly without Any Lett hindrance molestation (—) by me or by Any other person or persons by my orders & doe fully exonerate discharge & Acquitt the Aforesaid Thomas Stanton of all farther claims & debts or demands in and about the Aforesaid purchase myselfe Acquiessing fully satisfied and contented to my good satisfaction— And for more Ample consideration of the Aforesaid premises with all the contents thereof specified, I Ratify & confirm unto the sayd Thomas Stanton his heirs, executors, Administrators and Assigns for ever the Aforesaid tract of Land: from me my heirs executors Administrators and Assigns for ever to all interests and purposes According to the genuine tener hereof.

"And I the sayd Daniel Stanton do covenand and promise at all times to be ready and willing to give more Ample deed for the sure making strengthening & confirming of this my present Act & deed as witness my hand & seale this 33d & of his majisties Reign Charles King of England france Ireland & Scotland de-

fender of the fayth: and in the year of our Lord 1681.

Signed, sealed and delivered in presence of as witnesses

John Stanton

Samuel Stanton

(Note here that Daniel's mother spells her name Aanna; the impress of the seal was on wax which has been broken, rendering obscure some characters in the upper left-hand over the D; the star with the dot in its center is undoubtedly a mullet and the seal is very significant from a heraldic standpoint.)

The above deed was not acknowledged before a magistrate and the probability is that it was signed just before Daniel departed for Barbadoes. This failure to have the deed acknowledged seems to have given rise to questions as to its validity and it bears this indorsement:

"Mr. Samuell Stanton and Mr. Nicolas Cotterell personally appeared and acknowledged that they assigned the above writen

as witnesses.

It appearing to this Court that Mr. Samuel Stanton and Mr. Nicholas Cottrell made oath before Sam<sup>II</sup> Mason Assis<sup>e</sup> ffeb<sup>e</sup> y<sup>e</sup> 9<sup>th</sup> 169<sup>th</sup> that they signed as Witnesses thereunto and further the said Nicholas Cottrell made Oath before Thomas Hiscox Justice of Peace in Westerly in the Colony of Rhode Island Octo. 8<sup>th</sup> 1715 that he did verily believe that he saw Dan<sup>II</sup> Stanton the subscriber to the afores<sup>d</sup> deed sign and seal the same and that he Together with Mr. John Stanton, Mr. Samuel Stanton and Mrs. Anna Stanton set their hands to as witnesses, which was ordered to be Indorsed and signed Secretary

"Be it thereupon Enacted by the Governor, Councill and Representatives in Generall Court assembled and by the authority of the same that the said Deed before Taken as good and affectnett to all Interests and purposes in the Law as it might or could have been if the 3<sup>d</sup> Deed had been acknowledged by the grantor as the Law directs and that this Act be Indorst upon the said Deed and shall be signed by the Secretary and received as a good sufficient Testimoniall of the Authentication of the said Deed—

HEZ: WYLLYS Secry!".

Notwithstanding the pains taken to authenticate the deed, Richard Stanton, Jr., of Barbadoes came to Stonington, Feb. 12, 1735-6, and by virtue of a power of attorney from his father quit-claimed all interest in the land conveyed by "my Honored Grandfather Daniel Stanton (for the consideration of £46 cur-

rent money) to Thomas Stanton."

This quit-claim was to Samuel's, son of said Thomas', who inherited and occupied the homestead. Dr. G. D. Stanton says of this: "¿Whether this consideration of £46 applied to the amount originally received by Daniel from Thomas, or from his son Samuel for the quit-claim deed from Daniel's heirs, I am unable to determine, probably the former, insomuch as the general court had already made the title secure."

One thing is evident from this note as to Richard Stanton, Jr., namely, that Richard, Sen., had more than one child, for Richard, Jr., acts not as heir, but under power of attorney for his

father.

The house on the land conveyed in the deed was occupied by Samuel, son of Thomas, Jr., and stood until 1883. It became uninhabitable and was finally taken down to make room for a highway. "It was two stories in front and one in the rear; the front stair railing and easings were beautifully carved and evidently the work of foreign artizans; the window frames" (one of which Dr. Geo. D. Stanton has and whose description of the house is now being quoted) "were made of sassafras wood; on one of the plates of the frame are the letters 'S. S.' without any date. I am of the opinion that the house was constructed by Thomas Stanton, Jr., and that his son Samuel employed some leisure moment in carving his initials in the place mentioned."

The deeds alluded to, Daniel's (1681) and Richard's (1735) in the possession now of Dr. G. D. Stanton, were always kept by the successive generations occupying the house. Dr. Stanton says: "The fact that Daniell was for many years engaged in business with his father" (the business was carrying on a trade

with the West Indies from their "trading house" in Pawcatuck, on the Pawcatuck river) "and continued it after him, and finally just before his departure to Barbadoes, conveyed it to Thomas, with other facts, leads me to the conclusion that it was the homestead site of Thomes!

# CHAPTER VI.

THE DESCENDANTS OF THOMAS: STANTON'S FIFTH SON, ROBERT'S STANTON.

9. Robert' Stanton (son of Thomas'), b. 1653, in Pequoit Conn.; m. JOANNA GARDINER, Sept. 12, 1677; she was the dau. of Thomas and Lucy (Smith) Gardiner of Roxbury, Mass., and sister to Dea. Thomas Gardiner of Roxbury. Robert' lived and d. in Pawcatuck, Stonington, Conn. He was a soldier in King Philip's War, as were his older brothers Capt. John' and Joseph'.

The following story has Robert for its hero:

"Canonchet, chief sachem of all the Narragansets, was an active ally of Philip's in his war. While camped on the banks of the Pawtucket, the Indians were attacked by a force of English and Indians. Canonchet's warriors fled. Left alone, he too sought safety in flight. The Indian allies of the English and a few of the fleetest-footed whites pursued him. As he ran he threw off his blanket, then his silver-laced coat and belt of peag. Seeing these, his pursuers knew whom they followed, and increased their efforts. In crossing the river ford he fell and wet his gun. This so discouraged him that he surrendered to those who first overtook him. Being questioned by the young man who first came up to him, and who was not yet 22 years old (this was Robert Stanton), the warrior looked with lofty contempt upon his youthful enemy and answered: 'You are a child—you cannot understand matters of war; let your brother' [Captain 3 John'] 'or your chief come; him will I answer.' Canonchet was taken prisoner to Stonington and shot."

Robert d. Oct. 24, 1724, and was buried in the old family burial ground on the east side of Wicketequack Cove, half way between Stonington, Conn., and Westerly, R. I. Robert's wife

survived him.

He was graduated at Harvard College in 1712; was master of the Roxbury Grammar School several years; he served for a time as chaplain of the Castle in Boston. April 9, 1719, he was ordained pastor of the East church in Salem, Mass., Rev. Cotton Mather, D. D., preaching the ordination sermon. The same celebrated minister married him, May 5, 1719, to Katherine Simpkins, of Boston. She was the daughter of Thomas Simpkins, of Boston, whose other children were James, Thomas and William; she was b. Dec. 23, 1698.

Rev. Robert Stanton d. in Salem, Mass., May 3, 1727, and May 5 (his eighth wedding anniversary) he was buried in Boston,

After her husband's death Katherine moved to Boston; she was admitted to the Second church there Dec. 24, 1727. She had considerable property. From her mother's father, James Barton, she received property on Ann st., Boston. She inherited property, also, from her father's father, Pilgrim Simpkins, whose will was made in 1714 and admitted to probate in Jan., 1720. He was a wealthy man and gave his property to his sons John and Nicholas, to his daughters Marian, Rebecca and Sarah, and to the children of his son Thomas, who d. in 1706.

Katherine's husband's estate was settled by her brother William. In 1754 she mortgaged her property on Ann st. to this brother, William Simpkins, in security for a loan of money "for her support." She d. in 1760 and letters of administration on her estate were granted Dec. 25, 1760. The estate was settled by her brother William; the inventory was only £84, which

barely sufficed to pay debts and expenses.

Oct. 31, 1766, William Simpkins sells her land in final settlement of the estate. Her sons, if living, would have been old enough to have attended to this settlement, but there is no mention of her children. One of three conclusions is inevitable; (1) That they were dead by 1760; (2) that they were at a distance and the estate was not worth their attention; (3) that her land was heavily mortgaged and the mortgage held by her brother William, who simply foreclosed it by advertising; if so, there really was no necessity for the appearance for her children's names in the record. At the sale in 1766 Robert', her son, would have been 43 years old. The following notes found in a Boston church record may refer to him and his:

"Robert Stanton admitted to New North Church, April 12,

1741."

"Robert (son of Robert and Elizabeth Stanton) baptized in Christ Church, Boston, July 5, 1747, and buried Sept. 13, 1748." "Dr. Robert Stanton dismissed from N. Church, Boston, to Stafford, Ct., Sept. 16, 1770."

"Robert Stanton m. Elizabeth Ballard, dau. of Phebe (Mitchell)

Ballard, who was dau. of Capt. John Mitchell."

The Roberts admitted to North Church in 1741 and dismissed to Stafford in 1770 are evidently the same. This Dr. Robert d. at Stafford in 1817 and was said to be 104 years old, i. e., b. in 1713. But Robert was b. in 1723 and cannot be Dr. Robert if Dr. Robert's age at death was 104.

The child Robert who d. in 1748 was clearly the son of Robert and Elizabeth (Ballard) Stanton, but it cannot now be proven that Robert married Elizabeth Ballard. Time may reveal something to solve this problem. This additional item appeared so late as May 17, 1889, in the Boston Transcript:

### OLD GRAVESTONES AT COPP'S HILL.

In tearing down the old Robert Newman house on the corner of Sheafe and Salem streets, the contractors for rebuilding, Holmes Brothers, of 22 Congress street, found an ancient gravestone in the foundation of the oven, bearing the following inscription:

ANNA
GREENOUGH
Aged 5 yeares
3 months
Deceased the
18 Day of May
1674.

The stone was in all probability taken by the masons from the Copp's Hill ground, and the contractors very properly placed the stone in the hands of Superintendent McDonald, who has found a place for it near the Greenough family stones in the grounds. A day or two since Mr. Patrick B. Maguire noticed on the lower side of the old cemetery, between the Jones monument and the Sarah Rule stone, what he imagined might be the top of an old gravestone. On digging, his supposition was found to be correct, and a good-sized stone was unearthed, standing upright, which had sunk into the ground or been covered by washings from the hill. It contains the following inscription:

ROBERT STANTON
Son of Mr.
Robert and Mrs.
Eliz'th Stanton,
Aged 1 year and 3
mo. died
Sept. 10, 1748.

Neither of these stones is mentioned in Whitmore's volume.

Of his children two, Daniel and Roswell, became ministers; the latter of these Rev. Roswell Burrows, was b. Sept. 2, 1768, at Groton, ordained there in 1806, and associate pastor with his father, whose place he filled after 1818; he m. 1789, Jerusha Avery and had 7 children; he d.

May 28, 1837. One of his sons was Hon. Roswell S. Burrows, b. Feb. 22, 1798, at Groton, Conn.; in 1824 he moved to Albion, N. Y., where as a banker and business man he became very wealthy; he was a member of Congress; he gave to Rochester Theological Seminary the celebrated Neander Library valued at \$20,000. Roswell S. Burrows d. about 1884; one of his sons is William Burrows who now lives in Albion, N. Y.

"NEW YORK, Feb. 2.—Ex-Senator Stiles T. Stanton, of Connecticut, died here of pneumonia at 4 o'clock this afternoon at the Grand Union Hotel, where he generally lived during the winter months. His age was 39 years, and he leaves a wife, no children.

"The deceased was a native of Stonington, this State, a graduate of the late General William H. Russell's Collegiate and Commercial Institute, this city. Many of his class-mates most affectionately remember him and he was a gentleman who all along won many friends. He was a journalist by nature and from choice, and his labors on the Norwich Bulletin added greatly to the popularity and success of that newspaper. His witty paragraphs were extensively copied. For a time he was connected with the Worcester Press and prominent in political life in this State. He was secretary of the Republican State committee in 1880, and an alternate delegate to the national convention of that year, was executive secretary during the administration of Governor Andrews, representing Stonington in the Legislature in 1881 and 1882, and the ninth district in the State Senate in 1884, 1885 and 1886, when he was president pro tem. He was an aide-de-camp on the Brigade staff of the National Guard in 1875 and 1878, and candidate for Secretary of State in the State election of 1882."

# APPENDIX.

A RECORD OF A FEW FAMILIES NOT YET IDENTIFIED WITH THE DESCENDANTS OF THOMAS STANTON OF STONINGTON, CONN.

[With the exception of (H.) Asahel and (I.) John, these families have their origin in Connecticut, and I believe them to be descendants of Thomas', through lines the intermediate records of which have been lost.]

(A) James Stanton. I believe this to be James' Stanton, b. Feb. 17, 1745, son of 870 Daniel' Stanton. My information is meager and unsatisfactory. One grandson thinks the name is Alexander instead of James. This undoubtedly is an error arising from the fact that his wife's surname was Alexander, and that the eldest son was given his mother's surname. The son Elisha has a son William, who says "Alexander was given his mother's family name, and his father's name was James." Believing this to be correct, I record the facts as follows:

James Stanton was born in Connecticut, and married Hannah Alexander. He lived for a time in Hartland, Hartford county, Conn., and moved from there to Essex county, N. Y. His wife died about 1808, in the town of Moriah, Essex county, N. Y. He died about 1824, in Crown Point, Essex county, N. Y., with small-pox, and at an advanced age. He had a brother Daniel.

Note that James' Stanton, born in 1745, would have been 79 years old in 1824; that he had a brother Daniel, born in 1743, and another brother Daniel, born in 1750, and a third brother Daniel, born in 1757. His father's name also was Daniel. Note also that James', b. in 1745, had two brothers and two sisters, whose names are reproduced in the names of the children of James of Essex county, N. Y.

The following sketch of Capt. Oscar F. Stanton is taken from Appleton's Encyclopædia of American Biography:

"Capt. Oscar Fitzalan Stanton entered the navy as acting midshipman, 29 Dec., 1849. He was graduated by the U.S. Naval Academy at Annapolis in 1855, promoted to Master, 16 Sept., 1855, and commissioned Lieutenant, 2 April, 1856, servéd in the steamer Memphis, on the Paraguay expedition, in 1858-9, on the coast of Africa in 1859-60, and in the sloop St. Marys, of the Pacific squadron, from Dec., 1860, till April, 1862. He was commissioned Lieutenant-Commander, 16 July, 1862, commanded the steamer Troga in the special West India squadron, in 1862-3, and the steamer Panola on the Western Gulf blockading squadron, in 1863-4. In 1865 he was on ordnance duty at New York, after which he served at the Naval Academy until May, 1867. Promoted to Commander, 12 Dec., 1867, and had charge of the steamer Tahoma, of the North Atlantic squadron, and the Purveyor, on special service, in 1867-9. He commanded the receiving ship at Portsmouth, N. H., in 1871, the steamer Monocacy, on the Asiatic station, from 1872 to 1874, when he was transferred to the Yantic. Promoted to Captain, 11 June, 1879, and in Nov., 1881, went on duty at the Naval Asylum in Philadelphia, where he was until 1884; then he commanded the flagship Tennessee, of the North Atlantic station. Since 31 Oct., 1885, he has had command of the New London naval station."

I am strongly inclined to believe that (D) John Stanton, who m. Ann Huchison, March 10, 1702, and lived in Groton, Conn.,

was a son of 2 Thomas<sup>2</sup>.

The baptismal record of 2 Thomas's children is irregular and incomplete; there is no baptismal record of a son John, but my belief is based upon these reasons. The date of his (D John's) birth was certainly not later than 1682 since he m. in 1702. No grandson of Thomas' was old enough to have a son in 1682. Therefore I argue that (D) John was himself a grandson. Now our records are accurate of all the grandchildren of Thomas' except those through the son Thomas', where there has been a confessed difficulty and lack of records. If (D) John was a descendant of Thomas', he was a grandson; if a grandson, it must have

been through Thomas<sup>2</sup>. Is not the way he names his children significant? His first one for his wife, his second one for himself, his third one for - was it not for his father?

Until there is proof for this sonship, however, that cannot be

disputed, I place this record in the appendix.

# ATTY. W. H. LEE'S SUDDEN DEATH

WAS OLDEST MEMBER OF WAYNE COUNTY BAR—BORN IN CLINTON TOWNSHIP — TAUGHT SCHOOL IN COUNTY — WAYMART ALUMNI.

## HONESDALE BORO ATTY.

Former Chairman of Republican Party—Survived By Wife and Two Daughters—Funeral To-Day—Interment Made In Glen Dyberry.

The sudden and unexpected death of Atty. Wm. H. Lee at a few minutes past noon Saturday, Nov. 6th, 1920, was a great shock to countless friends in Wayne and surrounding counties. It seems but a few days ago when his familiar figure was seen upon the streets of Honesdale, and one can hardly realize that he has passed through the portals of death, and that this gentleman, scholar and counseller has departed forever from our midst. He was taken to the Wayne Memorial Hospital eight days before his death, and underwent there a serious operation in the hope

of aiding in his recovery. He seemed to be getting along nicely after the operation; then a period of depression set in, from which he rallied. A relapse followed, and death came at 12:15 Saturday noon. The news spread rapidly about town, and there was general mourning in Hones dale over the passing of this good citizen and attorney whose integrity has never been questioned.

#### Born In 1849.

William Henry Lee was born Jan. 1st, 1849, in Clinton township, being the eldest child of Samuel Lee and Anna M. Allen, early settlers in Wayne county and English decent. The grandfather of Atty. Lee, whose name was also Samuel, was a resident of England, marrying Mary Trou-body, Atty. Lee's father being the third child of a family of 11 children His father was born Nov. 27th, 1816 at Lincoln Horn, Cornwall, England and came to America in 1842, accompanied by James Giles and George Fitz, who also settled in Wayne county. He landed at Quebec, Canada, and reaching the Hudson river, came and reading the radian fiver, came of own that stream as for as Newburg, and totk the D. ard H. Canal to Honesdale, arriving here Saturday, June 11th, 1842. He first turned with an uncl. and lant, the late Samuel and Jane Troubody Brooking, and then went to Mt. Pleasant township, where he secured work with farmers and lumbermen, and by industry and frugality saved enough to purchase 100 acres of forest land in Clinton, which he cleared, and where William H. Lee, the subject of this sketch was born.

#### Drove Ox Team At 7 Years.

The early life of Wm. H. Lee was similar to that of boys in those pioneer days of the county. He early learned to do his share of the farm work, and at the age of seven could He attended drive an ox team. school three months in summer and three in winter, and the school house being a couple of miles away made winter attendance a difficult matter. At the age of 12 he purchas ed with his own money Webster's Unabridged Dictionary, the first book he ever owned, the purchase of which indicated his desire for knowledge and his interest, in language and words which he always retained. At the age of 12 he and his mother operated the farm alone one winter while his father was employed at Washington, tempted there by high

By study outside school, coupled with a bright mind, he was able to secure a teachers certificate from E. O. Ward, March 9th, 1866. The same year he attended the Wayne County Normal School at Waymart, then founded there by J. E. Hawker. His first school was at Cold Spring, Lebanon township, which he taught when he was seventeen years of age. He taught at Starrucca in 1868, mak ing his home that winter with the late Major Strong. An incident hap-pened while at Starrucca which had a bearing upon his whole life. While there he was persuaded to join the Good Templars Lodge, signing a pledge to abstain from the use of intoxicating liquors as a beverage. When he finished the term at

Starrucca, young Lee, ready for adventure, went on a rafting trip down the Delaware. That fall he entered the Delaware Literary Institute at Franklin, N. Y., and passed the New York State Regents' examination, and taught at Meredith Square, Del. Co. in 1869. Sept 11, 1871, found Mr. Lee teaching as principal of the Waymart school, having received a professional certificate from Dr. D. G. Allen, then county superinttendent of schools.

#### As A Lawyer.

Atty. Lee began the study of law with the late Atty. Samuel E. Dim-mick, at that time attorney general of Pennsylvania, and continued his studies under Waller and Bentley, and was admitted to the bar on Dec. 10th, 1874, being the oldest member and therefore the dean of the Wayne County Bar at the time of his death. He was deputy coun-ty treasurer under Paul Swingle, and luring that time he instituted severul reforms in the administering of county finances which have been coninued until the present time. It was at this time that the famous or infamous anti-court house movement began, under which several were brought by citizens of the county against the county commissioners and treasurer, which resulted, how-ever, in the defeat of the instigators and the sustaining of the county officers.

#### Republican Chairman.

Mr. Lee was a life-long Republigon but had a host of friends among the Democrats. He was elected canty chairman of the Republican when Wayne county was Dem-Eductic, and within five years time he was instrumental in making the county Republican, and was active as a speaker in every important campaign for many years. In 1888 he was appointed by Court as a director of the poor board of the district of Texas and borough of Honesdale, and at that time instituted many im-

#### Family Life.

June 19th, 1878, Atty. Lee was married to Miss Louisa Electa Wentz, of Wilkes-Barre eldest child and only daughter of Hiram G. and Electa K. Wentz, by Rev. W. H. Swift, then pastor of a well-known presbyterian church of that city. Two children were born to Atty. and Mrs. Lee, Louise, a graduate of Vassar, now a teacher in Jersey City, and Miss Ethel at home. In early life Mr. Lee was a member of the Baptist church but in after years was identified with his wife and two daughters with the First Presbyterian church of Honesdale where he has been a faithful usher and acted as clerk for congregation, and has been substitute for Dr. Swift's Bible class in the latter's absence. He was referee in Bankruptcy cases in Wayne County and has settled many important estates. He has been attorney for the Honesdale borough for over 20 years He is survived by the members of the family mentioned, also by the following brothers and sisters: John L. of Detroit; Eugene K., of Clinton; Mary Elizabéth, wife of John B. Payne of Orson; Artie, wife of JW. D. Brown of Marlette, Mich.; Jennie S., of Honesdale; Harriet W., wife of Geo. H. Hurlburt of Lakewood, N. J..; Isabel, wife of E. Clapper of Lanesboro.

The funeral was held from his late home this afternoon at two o'clock, Dr. Wm. H. Swift officiating. Those who were chosen to carry the casket were Wm. Krietner, Wm. Ward, Frank Varcoe, Geo. Penwarden, O. M. Spettigue, John Romaine. Interment was made in Glen Dyberry ceme

William H. Lee was born on Jan-uary 1, 1849, in Clinton Township. Wayue County, Pennsylvania. His parents were good representatives of the sturdy pioneers who, nearly a century ago came into this section to develop our county and build up its institutions. His early environments were conductive to probity and strength of character. In his youth!

he worked on his father's farm and laid the foundation of the remarkable physique which he possessed. was a diligent student and obtained a good education in the public schools of his native county, which was subsequently supplemented by a course in a higher institution of learning. He became a teacher, and ranked well as a member of that profession. Early in life he manifested the desire to become a lawyer. His appointment as deputy County Treasurer afforded him an opportunity to pursue his studies and realize his ambition. On December 10, 1874, he was admitted to the Wayne County Bar. Upon his admission to the bar, he became a colleague of the Dimmicks, the Wallers, Crane, Seely, Smith and other members of the Wayne County Bar who were known throughout the entire state of Pennsylrania. Through his association with those eminent lawyers and his own intense application to study and research, he acquired a knowledge of law which enabled him to become one of the leading members of our bar. He was thoroughly reliable and none of his colleagues ever doubted his word. He was faithful to his clients and courteous to his opponetts. He displayed no jubilation in victory nor morose in defeat. He prepared his cases carefully and presented them logically. Owing to the multiplicity of cases in which he participated during his many years of practice, he had a wonderful knowledge of the details connected with the practice of law in our state. When called upon by his fellow-at-torneys for information relative to some of the legal propositions which they encountered, he never hesitated to help them. He will be missed in Wayne County Courts for a long time. It was his proud boast that he had attended almost every session of court since his admission to the bar. His pleasant and affable disposition and polite demeanor made him very popular among his coworkers.

# HIRAM WENTZ DEAD

### Was One of City's Oldest and Best Known Residents.

DEATH CAME AFTER SEVEN
WEEKS' ILLNESS, WHICH BAFFLED PHYSICIANS.

Hiram Wentz, one of the oldest and most respected citizens of this city, passed to his reward at 6:40 Wednesday morning, at the old homestead on North Washington street, after an illness of seven weeks. Surrounded at his bedside were his children and grandchildren, and when the end came he peacefully closed his eyes as if he had yone to sleep.

end came he peacefully closed his eyes as if he had gone to sleep.

Though he suffered severely during his illness, he bore his troubles quietly and complained but very little. His death, which was a sudden one, was not unexpected, as he had been for the past two weeks growing weaker, and recovery was impossible. The physicians who attended him said that his ailment was an obscure one, and not until an autopsy was made were they able to tell what had caused it. It showed that the deceased suffered with a tumor, and had undergone most severe agony.

agony.

Deceased, who was 77 years of age last December, was a staunch Republican, and since his arrival in this city in 1863 had held many offices. He had been an active city father for several terms, during which time he was the prime mover of many ordinances, which were introduced for the advancement of the city. He was a member of the school board, and it was through his efforts that many of the movements in public school affairs bore fruit. At nearly every election he took somepart, and was always ably supported by his many friends. He was considered a competent man and his advice in many matters was often sought.

During the past few years of his life he had been connected with the screen works at the corner of Union and North Canal streets, and his energy was inval-

Canal streets, and his energy was invaluable to the firm.

Mr. Wentz was born in Binghamton, N. Y., and was educated in the schools of that city until he was 12 years old. He had few opportunities and it was at that age that he started out in life to make his living. With his brightness and activity he soon secured a position as clerk in a dry goods store of Mr. Hart. He proved a valuable employe and when his employer moved to Carbondale, Pa., he took Mr. Wentz with him. His shrewd business principle proved a great advantage to him and shortly after his arrival in Carbondale had accumulated enough money to embark in the mercantile business, and with Jasper Stark he purchased Mr. Hart's interest in the establishment.

He came to this city on Oct. 15, 1862, and there is no man living here who had a wider circle of acquaintances.

His first venture here was superintendent for Hosie, Gray & Co., coal dealers. Later he entered the service of the late J. H. Swoyer as assistant superintendent of the Port Bowkley mine. Some years after that he embarked in the retail coal business for

himself and a few years later asso-ciated himself with F. J. Leavenworth in the same business under the firm name of Leavenworth & Wentz. He finally retired from the coal busi-ness and he and the late Prothonotary Peter Seibel opened a meat market in

The deceased was a graduate of the Binghamton public schools and was a well educated man. He was active in politics and took great pride in having been a life-long Republican. In 1861 when war was declared between the North and the South he was living in Covington, Virginia doing a thriving Covington, Virginia, doing a thriving business. He learned that he would be drafted into the Confederate army and he and his wife and daughter, Mrs. Lee, who was but a child, managed to get away to the North on the day the first gun was fired on Fort Sumter, leaving his business that later on was confiscated.

Shortly after, he located in Pittston with his family, and there his son James was born. In 1868 he came to this city and moved into the house where he died, having been a voter in that ward thirty-four years.

The road on which they did the most work is now known as the Chesapeake & Ohio. The most of his time, however, was taken up in superintending a company store his firm had in conjunction with their business.

Resided in Preston and Norwich, Conn., and in Wayne Co., Pa.

He was a techer of navigation and civil engineering. He purchased land in Norwich of John White, Sept. 13, 1779. He was a man of more than ordinary ability, and had quite a gift for writing poetry.

Asa Kimball<sup>5</sup> (Jacob<sup>4</sup>, John<sup>3</sup>, John<sup>2</sup>, Richard<sup>1</sup>) born in Preston, Conn., March, 1743-4; died Oct. 12, 1821; married Nov. 17, 1763, Esther Meech; married 2d, Jan. 1, 1780, Hannah Williams. Resided in Preston, Conn.

Elisha Kimball (Jacob4, John3, John2, Richard1) born in Preston, Conn., May 7, 1748; died May 18, 1833; married Jan. 3, 1771, Hope Capron, born July 1, 1741, died June 9, 1834. By his father's will he received the home farm. Mrs. Kimball was noted for her sweetness of character, her learning and piety. They are buried in the Avery burying-ground, Preston, Conn.

Daniel Kimball<sup>5</sup> (Jacob<sup>4</sup>, John<sup>3</sup>, John<sup>2</sup>, Richard<sup>1</sup>) born in Preston, Conn., Sept. 15, 1752; died in New York state, 1835; married June 24, 1773, Mary Starry. Resided in Preston till after the birth of his son Starry. He sold land, probably belonging to his wife, in Norwich, Conn., Aug. 17, 1781. Shortly after this date he removed to New York state.

From "History of the Kimball Family" by Leonard Allison Morrison and Stephen Paschall Sharples, published in Boston in 1897

The common ancestor of the great majority of Kimballs in this country was Richard Kimball , who with his family embarked at Ipswich, in the county of Suffolk, England, April 10, 1634, in the ship Elizabeth, William Andrews, master. After braving the dangers of the ocean voyage he arrived in Boston harbor, and from thence went to Watertown, Mass. ... He settled in a different part of the town from that occupied by Henry Kemball 1. According to Bond and other writers Richard and Henry were brothers. There is but little evidence to support this supposition, end it seems to be mainly founded on the fact that they both came over on the same vessel. Richard is said on the shipping list to be thirty-nine years old, but he was probably somewhat older. He was, however, in the prime of life, and soon became a prominent and active man in the new settlement. ...

Richard Kimball was of the parish of Rattlesden, county of Suffolk, England, as is shown by the following entry on the parish register:

Henry Kemball ve sonne of Richard and Vrsula his wife baptized 1615 12 of August.

Ursula was the daughter of Henry Scott of Rattlesden, as appears from an extract from Henry Scott's will.

Richard Kimball married second, Oct. 23, 1661, Margaret Dow, widow of Henry Dow of Hampton, N. H.

(Here follows a copy of his will taken from Ipswich Deeds, Vol. IV, p. 12. It is quite long, so I am omitting it with the single comment that to my ancestor, Richard, he left fforty pounds, while to your ancestor, John, he left only twenty pounds!) (The will was proved in court held at Ypswich the 28th of Sept: 1675. by the oaths of Deacon Penery And Aron Penery.)

Having thus made his will he waited for the coming of the messenger who would sunder all earthly ties and take him on his eternal journey. The angel delayed not long his coming. On the twenty-second of the following June the earthly pilgrimage of Richard Kimball ended, and, aged more than eighty years, he joined the great majority.

His wife did not long survive him, but died the succeeding spring, March 1, 1676. Richard Kimball was well to do for those early days. The inventory of his estate, which was taken July 12, 1675, and returned to court Sept. 28, 1675, amounted to 1737 3s.6d. He had already given to his children at their marriages.

- \_ John Kimball<sup>2</sup> (Richard<sup>1</sup>) was born in Rattlesden, county of Suffolk, England, in 1621. and came to America with his father. He settled in Ipswich, Mass., and died there May 6, 1698. In a deposition made in 1666 he says he is 35 years old. In a deposition made in 1684, when he was 53 years old, he and his nephew. Philip Fowler, testify "that Mary wife of Thomas patch, Abigail Bosworth, (probably wife of Haniniel Bosworth, who Richard, Sr., calls cousin in his will), and Elizabeth Spofford were daughters of Thomas Scott Sr." In 1656 he was appointed attorney for Thomas Scott of Stamford, Ct., son of Thomas Scott, Sr., late of Ipewich, and brother-in-law of his father, Richard Kimball, Sr. Thomas Scott's will was approved March 8, 1653-4, and mentions children Thomas, Elizabeth, Abigail, Hannah, Sarah, Mary, and brother Richard Kimball. Thomas Scott, Jr., was in the Indian War. under Capt. Lathrop, when he was killed at Squakeheage (Northfield, Mass.) Sept. 8. 1675.
  - By trade John Kimball was a wheelwright, but by occupation he seems, like his brothers, to have been also an extensive farmer. He frequently bought and sold land, and there are a number of deeds on record at Salem bearing his name. October 16. 1665, he was appointed one of the executors of the will of Bridget Bradstreet. In her will she mentions her oldest daughter, Martha Kimball. (This is evidently a clerical error, as Martha was the wife of William Beal.) She gives to her "the gound she now hath now in her possession, and my greine hood, a peuter dish, and Mr. Morton's Bocke and on sheet and on peliber (Pillowbear). To my daughter Mary Kemball my ould bible, my cloth waskate, my stamell peticot, on boulster and on palow, on peuter dish and on candlestick.
  - John Kimball<sup>2</sup> Married Mary Bradstreet about 1655. He came over in the same ship with her and her father and mother. She was born in England in 1633. Most historians say that John married for his second wife Mary Jordan. This is an error. (See John 3. Henry 2. Richard 1.) On March 8, 1673, he united with the church by taking the covenant. His will was made March 18, 1697-8. In it he mentions his sons Richard, John, and Mosis. to whom he gives sixe shillings a peece in money. which is all I intend to for them having by deed of gift giuene before what I them intended out of my estat. He mentions his sixe dafters Mary Sarah, hanneh. Rebekah Elizabeth, and Abigail. His sunes Beniamin and Joseph kimbal have all the personal property divided between them, except one steer that he gives "to my sun beniamin, and my best cubbard I give toe my sun beniamin's wife; in consideration of what they have dune or may doe for me in my eage and weaknes." His real estate had all been given away before this time, and his personal property which was estimated at 5131.9s.11d. consisted mainly of "Quick Stock" as follows Six Oxen b24. Eight cows b26. 13 young cattle b18.10s. 29 shepp b6. 12 swine b5.

On Aug. 4, 1726, he and his wife Sarah sold their home in Ipswich and later in the fall of that year they removed to Stonington, Ct. On the 11th of July, 1726, he for 1700. Connecticut Bills of Credit, bought of Joseph Morgan, of Monmouth Co., New Jersey, two hundred acres in Preston, Conn., and to that town he moved in the spring of 1727, and spent there the remaining years of his life.
