That as this State must account with the U. S. for these articles, it would be well to endeavour to find out what Companies, and what individuals are chargeable with them, in order that deductions may be made equal to their value.

Thursday, April 17th 1777.

Resolved, That General Schuyler be empowered and directed to draw warrants for the payment of the arrears due to the Pennsylvania and Delaware militia, as well as to the Maryland militia, who were called into the service of the Continent during the course of last winter.

Friday, April 25th 1777.

The committee appointed to devise ways and means for speedily reinforcing General Washington's army, brought in a farther report, which was taken into consideration: Whereupon,

Resolved, That the president and council of the State of Delaware be requested forthwith to call out one thousand five hundred of the militia of the said State, well armed and accoutred, to rendezvous at Chester on Delaware.

That a committee of three be appointed to confer with the president and council, to enforce the necessity of this measure, and that General Mifflin be requested to join the said committee for the purpose aforesaid.

Tuesday, April 29th 1777.

The committee appointed to confer with the president and council of the Delaware State, on the necessity of calling out one thousand five hundred of the militia thereof, well armed and accoutred, to rendezvous at Chester, on Delaware, reported,

"That they, together with General Mifflin, met the president and council at Wilmington, in the said State, and conferred with them on the business aforesaid; that the said president and council gave assurance to your Committee that they were willing and desirous to comply with the requisition of Congress for the aid of the militia aforesaid, and that every mean in their power would be used to draw forth the number required: but they apprehended that this might be more probably effected, by fixing the place of their rendezvous near the Delaware, within the said State, and which would not be more than six or seven miles distant from the general rendezvous proposed at

Chester: that your committee, with the approbation of General Mifflin, acceded to the proposal of fixing the place of rendezvous for the militia of the said State within the same as the most probable means of obtaining their aid and service, and beg leave to recommend the same to Congress as equally advantageous to the public service;" (Whereupon))

Resolved, That the said report be accepted and agreed to.

"That Mr. President write a letter to Governor McKinley expressing the sense this Congress entertain of the spirited alacrity shewn by the militia of the State of Delaware, to comply with the resolve of Congress of the 25th of April last; and to inform Governor McKinley that from present appearances, Congress are of opinion there is no immediate necessity for the Militia of Delaware to be called into the field, and therefore desire the execution of the said resolve may be suspended until the further Request of Congress thereupon; and that the said militia hold themselves in readiness to take the Field on the shortest notice."

Monday, May 19th 1777.

Resolved, That Mr. President M'Kinley be informed that the independent company ordered by Congress to be raised and stationed at Lewistown, and the places adjacent in the Delaware State, was intended as a relief to the militia of that State; and that Mr. Fisher being thought a proper person to command, had the offer of being appointed the captain; but, on account of his declining it for the sake of expedition, power was given him to nominate officers, measures of a similar nature having been repeatedly taken in other States, especially for particular and local purposes, and no offence meant to or taken by the governments of such States:

That the commissary general has been directed to appoint a person to supply the company with provisions; and that orders are given to the captain to obey any directions he may receive from the Government of the Delaware State: that the president be informed, that the captain of the company is directed to apply to him for the 1,500 dollars, agreeable to his request; and that he, the president, be informed, Congress consent that the encampment of the militia for the present be in the Delaware State, at or near

the place pointed out in his letter, below Chester; and that they be held in readiness to march out of that State, if the service shall so require it; but that, if no provision has been already made by law for that purpose, that it be recommended to the legislature immediately to make such provision.

An Act for Embodying part of the Militia to Co-operate with the Army of the United States.

Whereas the Commander in Chief by his Letter of the fifth Day of March last to the President has Represented, that the Executive powers of the Several States should be, if they are not already vested with sufficient authority to call forth, properly equipped, such a body of the Militia as the Exigencies of the Service may require, in order to co-operate with the Army of the United States, and that the longer term the Militia can be drawn out for, the more beneficial & less expensive will the services be. Therefore be it enacted &c. That upon a Requisition during the present Campaign of the Commander in Chief of the Army of the United States of a Body of the Militia of this State to co-operate with the Army under his Command, the President or Commander in Chief of this State shall have full power & authority to call into service such part of the Militia by Classes as to him shall seem necessary, in the same manner he is impowered to do by the Act entitled "an Act for the Establishing &c." in case of actual Invasion of the State of Maryland, New Jersey, Pennsylvania, or the Eastern Shore of Virginia, and that the Militia so called out shall continue in service for the space of

If the Commander in Chief of the Army of the United States shall judge it necessary for the public welfare to retain them so long in service, during which time they shall be entitled to the same Bounties & receive the same pay & Rations, & be subject to the same Rules & Regulations as if they had been called out by virtue of the Act aforesaid in Case of an actual Invasion of the State of Maryland, New Jersey, Pennsylvania, or the Eastern Shore of Virginia aforesaid—and that every part of the said Act except what Relates to the Time & Place of service, shall be in Force with respect to such Call upon a Requisition as aforesaid, as fully as in any case of Invasion as aforesaid.

REQUISITIONS FOR MILITIA IN 1777.

26th

March for a guard at Lewistown. A company was placed there for some time until Superseded by a company of regular troops. No charge appears for it and therefore I suppose Capt Peery who commanded both the Militia & regular company paid them and charged it in the accounts he settled at the Treasury.

25th

April. for 1500, to rendezvous at Chester. Several were ordered to march to Naamans creek so as to arrive on the 15th of May but in consequence of a verbal message that president McKinly received from Genl Mifflin by Jonan Rumford he on the 14th sent orders for those on their march from Kent to return home claims for these now appear and he paid & discharged 3 companies of the Newcastle militia that had arrived at Christiana bridge: he says he drew on the continental loan officer for the purpose.—Note But had not arrived at the place of rendezvous the were only entitled to milage.4

10

June for 1500 to rendezvous at Wilmington or Chester. It appears that on the 23d several had arrived at the first mentioned place and president McKinly requests Congress to permit them to be discharged and to furnish him with a draught for 10,000 dollars to pay them & the expence of those that had been lately called out. Accordingly on the 24th Congress ordered them to be discharged and a warrant to be drawn on the commissioner of the continental loan office in the State of Delaware in favor of said president McKinly for 10,000 dollars to pay said militia he to be accountable. Yet the Kent militia who are on the last requisition are now charged to the U. S. Note B.

3

July for 200 militia to cooperate with col Richardson, changed by a resolution of the 15th of August to 20 light horse. On the 22 of August it appears gen Rodney who was appointed to command them was on his way with the light horse to join col Richardson but it does not appear that they ever did and if they did they could have staid but very few days for on the 23d president McKinly issued his orders to array the whole militia, those of Kent & New castle to rendezvous

at Middletown under the command of gen Rodney. And I see the payroll for the troop of light horse that rendezvoused there commences the 22d of Augt which is the day they marched as above mentioned so that if they were any horse on this service it is charged in that roll and therefore there can be no separate charge for this service, and none appears.

31,

July for the militia immediately to be called forth to repel any invasion. Previous to this requisition coming to hand guards had been fixed to prevent depredations, this seems to be only for the ordinary defence of the State and I have seen no charge for it

Notes

A As they had not arrived at the place of rendezvous they were only entitled to mileage for the distance they had marched agreeable to the regulations of Congress.—

Those that were paid it seems were paid out of cont. money by the Loan officer on order of presid. McKinly & whatever was paid them more than the mileage should be charged to the State therefore.

Query on what principles were they paid?

B. The militia of Kent not having arrived at the place of rendezvous could only be entitled to mileage for the distance they had marched (if they had marched at all) yet the charge in the rolls is for 5 days, and is so paid by the State. it is therefore probable those paid by pres McKinly were paid more than their mileage would have come to & therefore the United States ought to be credited for the surplus.

August the 22nd 1777. Congress request 1000 of the Delaware Militia to rendezvous at Newport & Christiana Bridge there to wait the orders of Gen'l Washington, to be in the pay of the Continent until the 30th of November unless sooner discharged.

On the 23rd of August, before he had received this requisition the President had ordered the whole Militia of the State to be arrayed, those of Sussex to remain in the County for the defence thereof against internal foes & depredations of the enemy.; and those of New Castle and Kent to rendezvous at Middletown under the command of Gen'l Rodney.

I presume it is not expected that the whole of the Militia of the State, thus arrayed, are to be in the pay of the United States under the requisition and as I am not informed what orders were afterwards given to comply more particularly with the requisition, it becomes a matter of inquiry what part of this Militia were in the service of the United States and ought to be paid by them. The Militia required were to obey the orders of General Washington. He ordered them, the Delaware Militia, to march to the Head of Elk, therefore those that marched to the Head of Elk were in the service of the United States. The Militia who marched out of the State were allowed a bounty of 30/ per man. Colo. Duff's, Colo. Patterson's & two Companies of Colo. Cantwell's Batt'n were allowed the bounty therefore I suppose they marched to the Head of Elk & consequently are the Militia.

The Militia required were to obey the orders of Gen'l Washington, he ordered them to Elk. Colo. Duff's & Colo. Patterson's Battalions & two Companies of Colo. Cantwell's marched to Elk, Those therefore, I presume, are the Militia that were in the service of the United States agreeable to the above requisition and consequently ought to be paid by them. The next inquiry is the time they were in service. Admitting it to commence agreeably to the pay rolls, unless the contrary should appear, I must presume when they left the army after being attached to it they left the service.

THE UNITED STATES IN CONGRESS ASSEMBLED

MAY 31st 1781.

Whereas the British King, regardless of the Rights of Mankind, and of the United States in particular, continues the ravages of War with relentless fury: And whereas the Enemy's force is principally operating in the States of Virginia, the Carolinas and Georgia; Whereas the Deficiency of the Continental regular Lines makes it absolutely necessary to call forth a respectable Body of Militia till those lines be compleated * * * It is therefore earnestly recommended to the State of Pennsylvania immediately to raise, Arm, Accoutre and equip for the Field, four Battalions of Infantry, each Battalion to Consist of nine Companies of Sixty-four rank and file each, also a Company of Artillery consisting of thirty two Matrosses and a Corps of Horse consisting of Sixty-four Troopers, each Corps to be officered as near as may be to similar Corps in the Continental Army according to the Establishment of the 3rd and 21st of October 1780.

It is also earnestly recommended to the State of Delaware to immediately raise, arm, equip and Accoutre for the Field, one Battalion of Infantry, consisting of nine Companies of sixty four rank and file each, and a Corps of Horse consisting of thirty-two Troopers, to be officered in the manner aforesaid. It is also earnestly recommended to the State of Maryland immediately to raise, arm, equip and accoutre for the field two Battalions of Infantry, consisting of nine Companies of Sixty-four rank and file each, and a Corps of Cavalry of sixty-four Troopers, to be officered in the manner aforesaid. And it is farther recommended to the States of Pennsylvania, Delaware, and Maryland to cause the said Troops as soon as raised, armed, accoutred and equipped as aforesaid, to be marched by Detachments or otherwise to such place or places as the Commander in Chief shall direct. To remain in service for and during the space of three months from the time of their respectively rendezvouzing at the place or places directed unless sooner discharged by Congress or the Commander in Chief, and to be subject to the Orders of the Commander in Chief. And be it Ordained by the United States in Congress assembled, that the Troops aforesaid shall receive the same pay, rations and subsistance as the Troops of the Army of the United States.

The Militia Officers of above twenty Companies, chosen in the several Districts throughout the County, met together at Dover; and that the business of the day might be conducted with order and regularity, they chose Captain John Haslet, Chairman, and Lieutenant Mark McCall, Clerk.

The following Association was then drawn up, and unanimously approved and subscribed, viz:

"We, whose names are hereunto written, Military Officers, duly elected and chosen by the good people of the several Hundreds and Districts of the County of Kent upon Delaware, pursuant to the direction and recommendation of the Committee of Inspection for said County, do hereby jointly and severally, for ourselves and each of us, solemnly promise and engage, by the sacred ties of honour and love for our Country, that we and each of us will, to the utmost of our abilities, well and faithfully execute the important offices conferred upon us by our fellow-subjects, and in our military and in every other capacity, at the risk of our lives and fortunes, defend the liberties and privileges of America, as well natural as constitutional, against all invaders, or such as may attempt any the least violation or infringement of them.

And we do further, in manner aforesaid, promise and agree, that we, and each of us, will subject ourselves to such pains, penalties, military punishments, and disgrace, as Courts Martial, to be constituted from time to time of the officers of our own body, shall or may inflict on any of us offending against the rules of military discipline. or contravening, in word or deed, the true interest of America, or the spirit and principle

DELAWARE COUNCIL OF SAFETY.

On Monday, the 11th of September, 1775, the Council of Safety for this Colony met by appointment, at Dover, in the County of Kent, and unanimously chose John McKinley, Esq., President, and James Sykes, Esq., Secretary.

The Council continued to sit for six days, and, amid a great many useful measures for protecting and defending the Country, proceeded to regulate the Militia of the several Counties, consisting of nine Battalions; three of which, in Newcastle County, under the respective commands of Colonels John McKinley, Thomas Cooch, and Richard Cantwell, Esquires, were formed into one Brigade, under Brigadier-General John McKinley, Esq.; two in Kent County, under the respective commands of Colonels Caesar Rodney and John Haslet, and the Western Battalion of Sussex County, were formed into a second Brigade, under Brigadier-General Caesar Rodney, Esq.; and there-maining three Battalions, under the respective commands of Colonels John Dagworthy, David Hall, and Jacob Moore, Esquires, were formed into a third Brigade, under Brigadier-General John Dagworthy, Esq. Commissions were made out for all the officers, and the seniority and command of each precisely ascertained. There are about five thousand effective men in this Government associated and determined to defend their just rights and liberties with their lives and fortunes.

Cadwalader's Philadelphia Troops, then stationed at Bristol. Joined in the expedition against Bordentown (Dec. 25th 1776.) which was abandoned after the troops had accomplished a perilous crossing of the Delaware river. Reached Allentown after four days of forced marching, in which time they had only six hours of sleep. From thence they marched to Trenton and joined the regular troops, under Gen. Washington, in time to take part in the famous nocturnal retreat from that place and the capture of Princeton next day. Remained in service in the Jerseys until the latter part of January 1777.

General Collins on the 18th of June 1782, made a return of 62 Muskets 16 Bayonets, 6 Bayonet belts 170 Flints 25 lbs of powder & 300 lbs of lead at the Post of Dover.— & of a few Muskets in bad repair—a parcel of Bayonets without ? or belts— & 1 half barrel of Powder in the Generals own care.

General Patterson informs that there is no public powder or lead in New Castle County, worth mentioning. He thinks there are 300 stand of public arms in the Hands of individuals in the first Battalion—but very difficult in not impossible to ascertain them.

No other returns made of public Military Stores, or of Private Arms or Accoutrements, than are now sent But on the best information that could be obtained on the spot, & by conversation with many persons of Judgement, whose Sentiments were to be respected it appears, that there may be about 300 stand of Arms fit for Service in each county, It is apprehended, that this is a large computation tho the number is commonly said to be much greater.

DELAWARE MILITIA.

REPORTS OF THE AUDITOR OF ACCOUNTS, JOINT COMMITTEES OF THE ASSEMBLY, ETC.

The Committee appointed to confer with a Committee of Assembly to adjust and settle the Accounts of the Military Treasurers of the several Counties in this State, and to settle and adjust the pay and Accounts of the Officers appointed in the GBattalion proposed to have been raised by the late Convention (in September last) in this State: Likewise the Accounts of the Signers of the last Emission of Paper Currency, and of those Persons who attended the Press &c. Report , &c. &c.....

.....
Your Committee do further Report, that they have considered the pay & Accounts of the Officers appointed in a third Battalion proposed to have been raised by the late Convention for this State in September last and do find that Colonel Samuel West as Col. of Said Battalion did receive at twice from the Military Treasurer for Kent County the sum of One hundred Pounds. That the Pay of the sd Coll. West, Rations &c for two thirds of a Month together with the Expences of several Persons whom he employed to recruit Soldiers or Privates for sd Battalion, and for Bounties paid to about twenty five Persons who inlisted into sd Battalion amount unto £86:07:4 and that the Ballance remaining in the Hands of Col. West & from him due to the Public is thirteen Pounds twelve shills & eight pence, and that Col. West is to pay out of the afsd £86:7:4 the following sums to wit, unto Elijah Berry of Kent County twenty nine Pounds and to Thomas Cheers of same Place fourteen Pounds ten shills To Samuel Freeman seven Pounds To George Dickinson three Pounds five shills & eight Pence and to Edward Burke of the County afsd two Pounds ten shills, also unto James Armstrong of four Pounds five shills of New Castle County and unto Abraham Liston of same County five Pounds Ten shills.

Your Committee further Report that they find due to the other Field and Staff Officers in sd Battalion the sums following to wit,
To Lieut. Colonel Latimer his Pay & Rations for two thirds of a Month £14 and for Waggon hire to transport his Baggage from Amboy £4:12:6 in the whole Eighteen Pounds twelve shills & six Pence.

To Major Benjamin Caton for Pay and Rations ten Pounds thirteen Shills & Four Pence.

To Lewis Howell Surgeon Pay & Rations Eight Pounds thirteen shills & four Pence.
To James Thompson Quarter Master for Pay & Rations six Pounds six shills and eight Pence.

To Crooks Adjutant for Pay and Rations six Pounds six shills and eight Pence.

Report of Committee appointed to confer with n Committee of Assembly to Adjust and settle the Acc'ts of ye Military Treasurers in ye several Counties in this State.

In the Council of the Delaware State. October 29th 1777.

The Committee of Council to whom a Letter from the Honorable Thomas McKean Esqr. late Speaker of the House of Assembly, President and Commander in Chief of the Delaware State was re-committed, do now report,

That the present Situation of public Affairs in this State requires that 600 Militia be raised as speedily as possible for the protection and Defence thereof, who are to continue in service for two Months, unless sooner discharged by the Commander in Chief and be furnished in the following proportions, (viz) 300 Non-commissioned Officers and Privates in New Castle County, to consist of 6 Companies of 50 Men each, (viz) 2 Sergeants, two Corporals, 1 Drummer, 1 Fifer, and 44 Privates, to be Commanded by 1 Captain, 1 Lieutenant, and 1 Ensign—200 Ditto in Kent County—and 100 Ditto in Sussex County, to be Officered in the same manner.

And Whereas the Representatives of the several Counties in the State have not and in appearance cannot form themselves into a House for transacting of the Publick Business therefore from the necessity of immediately providing for the payment and support of the afd Troops the Committee—report the following Resolutions to be entered into by Council (viz) that it be recommended to the President or Commander in Chief to draw the sum of £5000. out of the Hands of the Trustee of the Loan Office of Kent County, and be by him applied for the Uses afd and that the Council on their part do promise and engage that they will hereafter concur with the Assembly in providing a Fund for the Replacing the said sum.

Your Committee do further report a Resolution to be adopted by Council, recommending it to the President to draw the Ballance of the £10,000 emitted for the support of this State, and apply the same in discharge of the Debts due to the Militia heretofore called out. —

Your Committee do further report that in their Opinion a Committee of three persons be appointed to receive examine and adjust the Accounts of Expences which have accrued and become due to the Militia of the Counties of New-Castle and Kent for former service, (viz) Robert Bryan, Robert Armstrong, and Thomas Montgomery Gentlemen—And Also that a Committee of three Persons (viz) John Jones, John Rodney, and John Clowes Gentlemen, be appointed in the County of Sussex to receive examine and adjust the Accounts of Expences which have accrued and become due to the Militia of said County for former Service, and make Report thereof to the President who is to pay the same accordingly.

Your Committee do also recommend that a Certified Copy of the foregoing Resolutions be made out and the Approbation of such of the Members of the House of Assembly as are or may be in Town signified by their Subscribing the Same. On Motion Ordered

That a Copy of the Preceding Report and Resolution be made and delivered to the Members of Assembly now in Town to be signed by them—signifying their Approbation of this Proceeding of the Council and that Mr. Vandyke and Mr. Bassett attend them for this purpose.

Messrs Vandyke and Bassett having returned delivered at the Table the copy of the Report and Resolutions afd with the following Subscription to wit

We whose names are hereunto subscribed being members of the Assembly for the Delaware State Do Approve of the foregoing Report and Resolutions and do engage to support the Measures proposed therein at all times hereafter both in our Private and Publick Capacities. Sir,

I have recd Information, which I have great Reason to believe is true, that the Enemy mean to establish a Post at Wilmington, for the Purpose of countenancing the Disaffected in the Delaware State, drawing Supplies from that Country and the lower Part of Chester County, and securing a Post upon Delaware River during the Winter. As the advantages resulting to the Enemy from such a Position are most obvious, I have determined, and shall accordingly, this Day, send off Genl Smallwood with a respectable Continental Force to take Post at Wilmington before them. If General Howe thinks the Place of that importance to him, which I conceive it is, and as the Force which I can at present spare is not adequate to making it perfectly secure I expect that you will call out as many Militia as you possibly can, to rendezvous without loss of time at Wilmington, and put themselves under the Command of Genl Smallwood. I shall hope that the People will turn out cheerfully when they consider that they are called upon to remain within and defend their own State &c &c.

A MESSAGE FROM THE VICE-PRESIDENT TO THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY.

Gentlemen,

The day after the Rising of the General Assembly in December last, I received a letter from his Excellency General Washington, of the 19th of the same month, requesting me to call out as many Militia as I possibly could to reinforce a Detachment from the Continental Army, under the Command of General Smallwood, then ordered to take Post at Wilmington, which Station His Excellency thought of such Importance, that probably General Howe would attempt to dispossess General Smallwood of, unless well supported by the Militia. In consequence of which Requisition, I immediately issued orders to Major-General Rodney and Brigadiers Dagworthy and Patterson, to reinlist and compleat the Companies, allotted to their several Counties, of the six Hundred Militia ordered by the General Assembly at their last Sitting to be continued for other two months; and to the Generals Rodney and Dagworthy, to examine into the State of the Arms and Accouttrments of the Militia in the Counties of Kent and Sussex, and have the same put into the best order that their Circumstances would admit; and that the Militia of those two Counties should be held in Readiness to march to the aid of General Smallwood on the first notice of an attempt made by the Enemy, on the Post aforesaid;—and to General Patterson that he should call forth the whole Militia of his Brigade, and form a Junction with General Smallwood as soon as possible, either with the whole or Part, as the Enemy's Ships or other Circumstances might in his opinion require. My reason for ordering the immediate March of General Patterson's Brigade of Militia only, was their being much more convenient to the Post to be defended, and that if any attempt should be made there by the Enemy, it must be in a short time from the advanced State of the Winter's season; however to my Mortification and Disappointment I found by General Patterson's Report, that not more than twenty Privates of his Brigade did join the Army under General Smallwood, and as to the Six Companies of the Six hundred Militia, ordered to be reinlisted and compleated in New Castle County, he found it an impracticable measure, and the same hath not, or cannot be carried into Execution. From the Report of General Rodney it appears, that three of the four Companies of the Six Hundred Militia afsd., allotted for Kent County, have been nearly compleated; two of which I have ordered to Wilmington and they are now on duty under the Command of General Smallwood.—As the General Dagworthy, I have had no Report from him as yet. General Smallwood still occupies the Post of Wilmington, and represents the Insufficiency of the Force under his Command to man and defend the works he has erected there, and persists in the Requisition made by His Excellency General Washington of the aid of our Militia. In Compliance with this Demand, I have with the advice of the Privy Council, issued my further orders to Generals Rodney and Patterson, to draw forth, at least five Hundred Militia from the Counties of New Castle and Kent, and direct their march to

Wilmington before the 23d of this Instant, there to be under the Command of General Smallwood.

I have also to inform you, that I received another Letter from His Excellency General Washington, dated the 19th of January last, expressing his Hopes that the Legislature of this State had fallen upon some Mode to fill up the Battalion allotted to it against the ensuing Campaign, but if not done, the necessity of some immediate steps for this purpose, which he thinks impracticable by any other means than Drafting. This I laid before the Privy Council, and upon a consideration of the Importance of its Contents, and also the Deficiency of the Militia Law to compel the appearance and march of the Militia upon General Orders, it was the opinion of the Board of Council, that the Vice-President should issue Writs for the Call of the General Assembly on the Seventeenth Instant, which I have accordingly done, and do recommend your immediate attention to these two important objects.

As to the filling up of the Battalion, upon my first Interview with General Smallwood, I pressed him to order out a set of Recruiting Officers into each of the Counties of the State, that no means might be left untried, or time lost, in this Business; This at length was done, and a number of your Battalion Officers are now on this Service; but the allowance, made by Congreee towards their expences while on this duty, is so small, that they must be great sufferers, unless some addition shall be made thereto, therefore I do recommend that some further Provision for their Encouragement be speedily made by the General Assembly.—

I have ordered Copies of those two letters to be laid before you, for your further Information, and a weekly Return of the Delaware Battalion by which it appears that four Hundred and nineteen Rank and File were wanting to compleat the Battalion on the fifth of January last.

A MESSAGE FROM THE VICE-PRESIDENT TO THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY.

Gentlemen:

In my message to you on the 21st ulto I informed you that a Detachment of the Continental Army under the Command of General Smallwood had taken Post at Wilmington so early as December last, and of a Requisition made by General Washington for a Reinforcement of Militia from this State which I had not been able to comply with by a Disobedience of Orders on the part of the Militia in New Castle County. I am not to inform you that my second Orders for the march of five hundred Militia from the Counties of New Castle and Kent to the same Post before the 23d ultimo mentioned in my said Message have been treated with the same neglect, and that the time of Service of the two months Militia is expired and they are disbanded and we

have not a man with General Smallwood, whose Force is not equal to the Extensiveness of his Works if attacked by the Enemy which he daily expects; and should he be forced from or abandon this Post, this State and the Rest of the Peninsula between the two Bays of Delaware and Chesapeak will lay open to the Ravages of the Enemy, therefore I do earnestly recommend your adopting some effectual Mode of sending forth a Reinforcement of, at least, five hundred men, without delay.

I have directed the Secretary to lay before you divers Resolutions of Congress which only came to my Hands on the Tenth of February last,—that of the 17th of November recommending the taking into consideration the Plan of Confederacy for the United States was not accompanied with a Copy of the Plan, an Omission I cannot account for, but which I have informed our Representative in Congress of. Those Resolutions of the 22d of November respecting the raising this State's Quota of five million of Dollars in the current year by Tax on the Inhabitants of the State, the Regulating the Price of Labor, Manufactures, internal Produce and Commodities imported from foreign Parts and the future Supply of Cloathing for the Battalion belonging to the State seem to be necessary objects of your immediate attention and providing for.

I am called upon by Lieut. Col. Pope for a Supply of Monies to enable him to proceed in the procuring Cloathing for the present Wants of the Battalion as he says he hath expended the Two Thousand Dollars delivered to him for that Purpose, and more, and without such Supply shortly he cannot go on; I think with a little more Exertion this Business may be completed, and it is an object of Consequence.

The reasons inducing the Council to propose to your Honourable House the Amendments to the Report of the Committee for Adjusting the Accounts of the Militia of NewCastle and Kent Counties for past Services, herewith sent, are as follows to wit—

As to the 1st Amendment for that the charge, as stated in the General Account, is not warranted by the Voucher, it being for pay and retained Rations instead of a bounty in Jerseys.

As to the 2d Amendment the Council conceive it necessary to shew upon the face of the General Account the sum that the party charging hath already received, otherwise he may receive a Certificate from the President for the whole sum there carried out, which will intitle him to the payment thereof, therefore he will be in part twice paid for the same Service.

The said Captains and Lieutenants to be appointed & Commissioned by the President or Commander in Chief.
2. That the said Officers and Men shall be intitled to receive Continental Pay and Rations and shall be subject to the Rules and Articles of War, provided for the regulation of the Militia, of this State, during their Continuance in this Service.
3. That the President or Commander in Chief be impowered to discharge the whole or any one or any part of the said Companies when he shall think proper.
4. That the said Companies be stationed near to or along the Shores in the respective Counties in this State in such places and in such manner as the President or Commander in Chief shall from time to time think fit to order and direct.
5. That the duty of the said Companies respectively shall be to prevent the enemy and refugees from landing in the State, to apprehend, take up & secure any person or persons going to, coming from, or trading with the enemy or the said refugees, together with all their goods merchandize & Provisions and the Teams or Boats in which the same may be and to render a true account thereof to the President or Commander in Chief and deliver the same to his Order or Appointment.
6. That the President or Commander in Chief be impowered to appoint one or more suitable persons in each County to furnish the Company of such County with the Rations allowed.

And that it be recommended to the House of Assembly to make Provision for the execution of the afsd. Plan.

22d of August for 1000 militia to rendezvous at Newport & Christiana bridge then to be in the pay of the Continent until the 30 of November unless sooner discharged, to wait the orders of genl Washington. On the 23 before he received this requisition, president McKinly ordered the whole militia to be arrayed, those of Sussex to remain in the county for defence thereof against internal foes & depredations of the enemy: and those of Newcastle & Kent to rendezvous at Middletown under the command of genl Rodney. And I am not informed whether any orders were afterwards given to comply more particularly with the requisition: Yet the the accounts for the whole of the New castle & Kent Militia them embodied, and part of them continued to October are now exhibited to form a charge against the United States. I never understood that the Kent militia Joined the continental army or acted under the orders of the commander in chief: but some of those embodied in Newcastle whose numbers were equal to the requisition I am informed did act under the orders of the commander in chief in concert with the continental army, but I am not informed that all of them did and for the whole time charged in the rolls; the contrary appears more probable from the face of the rolls, especially with respect to Col Cantwells battalion, some companies of which appear to have been in service at Port Penn, & Bombay hook, where it is probable they were not ordered by genl Washington: And only two companies drew the bounty which it seems those who marched into Maryland were entitled to by act of Assembly,* and I cannot suppose (without authority for so doing) that any part of them were continued in the service of the United States, after the army moved to Chester without them. If then any part of the service is to be charged to the United States, some evidence to discriminate it from that which ought not, is necessary. And if the whole is, other evidence that I am possessed of is necessary to prove it.—Four thousand dollars on account of the United States was advanced in this service by president McKinly on the 28th of August to George Latimer esqr. who was appointed to pay these militia.

The Council according to the Order of the Day met the House of Assembly in the Council Room, and having prepared Tickets for the Election of Lieutenants and Sub-Lieutenants for the several Counties of this State, under the Militia Law, and having put the same into a Ballot Box, the Speakers of the two Houses in the presence of the Members examined the Box, and it appeared as follows; That there was a Majority of Votes in favour of George Evans, Esquire, for Lieutenant of the County of New Castle, and a unanimous Vote in favor of Henry Darby and Samuel Smith, Gentlemen, for Sub-Lieutenants of the said County of New Castle—And that there was a unanimous Vote in favor of Samuel West, Esquire, for Lieutenant of the County of Kent, and a Majority of Votes in favor of Francis Manny and Benjamin Coombs, Gentlemen, for Sub Lieutenants of the said County of Kent.—And that there was a Majority of Votes in Favor of Henry Neill, Gentleman, for Lieutenant of the County of Sussex and a Majority of Votes in Favor of Nathaniel Waples and Charles Moore Gentlemen for Sub-Lieutenants of the said County of Sussex.

Thereupon resolved,

That the said George Evans be recommended to His Excellency the President to be commissioned Lieutenant and the said Henry Darby and Samuel Smith to be commissioned Sub-Lieutenants under the Militia Law, for the County of New Castle; and that the said Samuel West be recommended to the President to be Commissioned Lieutenants, and the said Frances Manny and Benjamin Coombs to be Commissioned Sub-Lieutenants under the said Law for the County of Kent, and that the said Henry Neill be recommended to the President to be commissioned Lieutenant, and the said Nathaniel Waples and Charles Moore to be commissioned Sub-Lieutenants under the said Law for the County of Sussex.

Honoured Sir,

We the Subscribers now Officers in the Delaware Reg't. beg the favour of your returning our thanks to the Hon'ble the House of Assembly for the gratuity already confer'd on us, and also of informing the Hon'ble House that unless such provision be shortly made that will enable us to continue in the service, we have unanimously agreed to withdraw ourselves therefrom on the 20th day of July next, and in justice to our Country, and our own reputations, we give this notice that they may appoint others to fill our present stations:—

In a Remonstrance dated in October 27th 78 we gave them our reasons why such provision was necessary, therefore it needs not a repetition as their own reflections must be sufficient if they only consider the cause that made it requisite for to add to the allowance made by a former Assembly for the support of its members whilst on publick service and as the stipulation of our pay was prior to that affixed allowance, we are equally affected by the extravagancies of the times, and the depreciation of the Continental Currency, and undoubtedly our pay now is as insufficient to support us as Officers, as that allowance was to maintain them as Gentlemen and members; for experience has fully convinced us that such an additional support was and is absolutely necessary, and only wish to have their views extended to us who are acting for the Publick, and in a station that renders us as liable to expense, as those gentlemen that are hardly drawn from the sight of their farms.—

We likewise can assure the Honble House that it is not through the least dislike for the cause in which we are engag'd, nor for any lucrative views that we have come to the above resolution but are reduc'd to it by real necessity and only ask to be put on equal terms with Officers from other States; for if past Services entitle them to the favour, we undoubtedly have a right to a similar claim; and should we be oblig'd to withdraw ourselves from the service of our Country, it will be with the greatest reluctance,

That Agreeable to a Law, passed by your Authority at Dover the 21st day of June, now last past, an additional Reg't was levied to serve in conjunction with the Army of the United States of America, under the immediate Command of His Excellency General Washington, and to continue in such service from the time that the above Reg't embodied (which was the tenth day of July now last past) till the first day of this Instant November, unless sooner discharged by proper authority.

That by the afd law, the said Reg't is entitled to Equal Pay & Subsistence with any regular Troops in the Service of the United States.

That the Officers & Soldiers of the said Reg't have chearfully & faithfully discharged their respective Duties in the Field, as more fully appears in the General Orders of His Excellency the Commander in Chief, which orders I beg leave to insert for the better Information of your Honorable Body, Vizt "Head Quarters near Passaic "Falls Octor ye 12th 1780. Sir, As there is no immediate occasion for the further "services of your Reg't of Militia with the Army, it may Commence its Return to the "State of Delaware as soon as all the Arms Accoutrements and Camp Equipage drawn "from the Public are returned to the Commissary of Military Stores, and Quarter "Master at Camp.

"You will then apply to the Quarter Master General for Tools necessary to repair the Roads from hence to Trentown and receive his Instructions on the subject—"As you will give your own Receipt for the tools you will be pleased to see them delivered to the Quarter Master at Trentown and take his Receipt for the same—Any "Arms, Accoutrements &c which may have been carried off by the sick or Deserted "you will also use your endeavours to have recovered and returned into the Public "Stores.

"After the before mentioned service is performed the Regiment is to be discharged, and I have nothing further to add but to request that my thanks may be "communicated to them for the Alacrity and spirit with which they took the Field, "and for their orderly and Soldier like behaviour while in service.

After receiving the honorable testimonials of our Services as above mentioned and strictly and honestly complying with every Requisition contained in the aforesaid Orders the Regiment was discharged, and have now returned to this State to receive the just reward of our Labors,—but unfortunately for the Reg't your Honble Body thro' the hurry of other Public business and the multitude of Avocations, have not yet adopted conclusive measures in the Case of Your Petitioners

Your Petitioner begs leave further to assure your Honors, that besides several large sums of money which he, with the Other Officers of the said Reg't have expended at sundry times for the Equipment of themselves and Men, as well as for the absolute necessities of life without any equivalent we received no Pay for our Military services either from the States, which employed us, or from the Paymaster General of the Army—or from any other persons or Persons whatsoever: This therefore Gentlemen is the Grievence which the Officers and soldiers of the above Reg't beg leave to lay before your Honors—not doubting that you will take immediate Order on the Premises:—I have the Honor to be in behalf of my self Officers & Soldiers—Gentlemen

LITTLE CREEK 18th December 1780

Sir,

Observing by the inclosed Notice, which appeared early in the present Month, that Colo. West's Remonstrance to the Honorable House of Assembly, at their last Session, is to be considered on the 10th day of January next, I beg leave to make the following Representation, as well to inform the House, as to justify my conduct while I acted as Commanding officer of the Little Creek Company of Militia, if any part of it should be called into question.

I was on Business at Philadelphia at the time the Commanding Officers of the several Companies of Militia in this State were required, by notice from His Excellency the President, to Muster their Men in order to procure one out of every twenty to March as a reinforcement to the Army under the Command of General Washington.

On my return, the 6th July, I was informed that but few of the Little Creek Company had attended on the Governor's Notice—that nothing had been done, and that another notice was set up, signed by Joseph Taylor, for the Company to meet on Monday the 10th July, the very day I had previously fixed upon for removing to the Cross-Roads. I had determined on this measure early in the Spring, it had already been delayed too long, and the approach of Harvest made it the more necessary for the sale of such articles as I had provided for that season. I therefore no longer considered myself a resident in the district of the Little Creek Company, and conceived my Commission of First Lieutenant in that Company was vacated by my removal. I thought proper, however, on my way to Duck Creek, to call at the place of meeting to inform the Company of it, and also went to the House of Mr. Taylor, where Colo. West was to call the same afternoon, in order to give him notice of it. The Colo. did not come as soon as was expected; but called upon me at Duck Creek late that evening, and informed me that all the officers of the Little Creek Company had Resign'd, except myself, and that unless I should act, that rich district would go Scot-free. My desire of promoting the service induced me, greatly to the prejudice of my private concerns, to undertake the Business. The Colo informed me it must be finish'd that week, as he should muster the men in Dover, on Monday the 17th Therefore, instead of opening my Store, I returned next morning to Little Creek, and immediately set about it. I first offer'd two thousand dollars bounty, and to give my own Bond for the payment

of the month before the Men March'd. I applied to Messrs John and Henry Bell who I judged had considerable influence over that class of Men, from which I was to expect Recruits, and offer'd them one hundred dollars each, for inlisting three men. I had the assistance of Joseph Taylor—of Mr. Irons—of Mr. Bellach, and rode out every day myself, but to no purpose, tho' on friday and saturday I offer'd one thousand pounds bounty. There was but one Man (Timothy Swaney) who was willing to go on the Service, and he only on condition that some of his acquaintance would go out with him. On Saturday the 15th July I called upon Mr. Joseph Taylor, and in the evening, with his assistance drafted three men out of the Company. The Lots fell upon John Clifford, Samuel Jenkins, and Robert Hirons jun. The same evening I sent them written notices of their being drafted, desiring them to attend the orders of the County Lieutenant in Dover on Monday the 17th. I also with the assistance of Mr. Taylor, levied an assesment of one dollar in the Pound on the Taxables of the district, to make up a bounty of one hundred and fifty Pounds each for the drafted men; and set up Advertisements requiring the payment of the assesment by the Wednesday evening following. On Sunday John Clifford called and informed me that he was so circumstanced he could not possibly go out in the service, but would pay the fine. Samuel Jenkins, being a Quaker would not even receive the notice, and Robert Hirons proved to be lame, and unfit for duty, a circumstance utterly unknown at the time of drafting. On Monday I went to Dover, and waited great part of the day in expectation of seeing Colo. West, but was disappointed. Finding the first draft had proved abortive, I called again upon Joseph Taylor, and on tuesday the 18th with his assistance, made a draft of the whole Company, when the three first Lots fell upon John Wheelton, James Aaron and William Voshell. On Wednesday or thursday I made a report of my proceedings in writing to Colo West, and left it with Colo. Battell to be delivered when Colo. West came to Town—I also put the List of Taxables, with the money I had collected being between four and five hundred dollars, into the hands of Nehemiah Tilton, Esquire, desiring him to issue his Warrant for the collection of what remained unpaid. I had an opportunity of seeing Colo. West, at Mr. Irons's on Sunday the 23d July in the evening and on Monday Morning ask'd him if he had any farther commands for me? He told me he believed not. We then parted—He set out to Mr Wheeltons and I to attend my Business at the Cross-Roads.

Sometime after this I was inform'd that Colo. West had procured three Men to go out of the Little Creek Company, on the promise of a Bounty of one thousand pounds each, Viz William Webley, who was in the service of John Wheelton, and is supposed to be under Indentures to him, James Aaron, who was drafted, and Timothy Swaney, who was mention'd before. Whether the two first, the one going out in the room of his supposed Master—the other in consequence of his being drafted—(for the same bounty was offer'd him before any draft was made, and refused,) are entitled to the full amount of the Colonel's promise,—and whether it is reasonable that those who have run the risk of being drafted themselves should be tax'd as high as if no draft had been made, are matters which the Honorable House will consider and determine. For my own part I shall make no objections against paying my quota of the Tax; but I am well informed Colo. West intends to have me appointed to collect the whole money. To this I shall beg leave to object. Having fully done my duty, as far as the Law under which I acted would support me, I think it unreasonable that I should be burden'd with additional trouble in consequence of the Colonel's private Bargains. Besides it

would ill suit the business I am to follow. I consider myself as having only a temporary residence in this district, purposing to remove to Dover and enter into Trade in the Spring. There are many from whom the assessment must be collected by distress, and of these a number who, like children, will not make a sufficient distinction between the Rod, and the Hand that directs it. With such, ill will and loss of Trade, would be the consequence. This is an apology I should not have made, if the welfare of my Country could be affected by it; but, in the present case, the service is performed and nothing remains but to do Justice to individuals. The part of the Business which the Colo. wishes to have committed to my care, may as well be performed by the Collector of the district, or by any other person. I therefore hope I shall be excused from it.

In making this Representation I have paid the strictest regard to impartial Truth, as far as my memory, assisted by some memorandums in my possession, would serve me. If I have deviated in anything, the Report I made to Colo. West at the time, to which I shall adhere, will serve to point out my errors.

Agreeable to a command of his Excellency General Washington Your Memorialist was ordered to be annexed to the Delaware Regiment and by a Resolution of your Honorable House dated June the first 1779 consequential to a previous resolve of Congress to the same effect, your Memorialist felt himself fully comprehended as a Delaware Officer no positive resolution to the contrary appearing, nor any other opposition to the Arrangement, save only the clamors of two or three disatisfied Officers—Now your Memorialist having nothing in view but the Independence and Happiness of his Country (to which he had sacrificed all the pleasures of private life) and ever willing to prevent even the appearance of a mutinous spirit, or dissatisfaction in his Brother Officers, he took the Liberty of suggesting to his Excellency General Washington a plan by which your Memorialist conceived he could do equal service to his Country in general and to your State in particular and without incurring from his fellow officers even the shadow of censure—his plan was communicated to the Honorable John Dickinson and Thomas McKean then representatives in Congress for the Delaware State, who with the Commander in Chief fully approved of it—all deeming it quite

consistent with the nature of Citizenship to any one of the States—Your Memorialist was in consequence appointed to the Command of the Infantry of Colonel Lee's Legion, then as to an individual State a separate un-attached Chore, but yet in general comprehended, (agreeable to the conception of your Memorialist) as Quota troops of the respective States where they were raised and as such he made no doubt they would be recognized—In this view of circumstances your Memorialist remain'd happy and contented, until by an Act of your Honorable House bearing date the 31st of October 1780 by which the Delaware Officers were to be furnished, your Memorialist to his surprise and regret found himself neither nominated or provided for—This unacknowledged and undecided state as an Officer must necessarily, as your Honorable House will readily see, deprive your Memorialist of that resort for the recompence of his services to which the certificate from his Excellency and which is now offered for your inspection, gives him the justest title—Now the purport of this Memorial is to ascertain as far as your Memorialist can, how far he is considered by your honorable House as a member of their Community, or an Inhabitant of the Delaware State—And as the Determination of your Honorable Body will necessarily point out the line he is to pursue with respect to the reward of his services, he makes no doubt, but he will be indulged with as speedy a decision of his business as possible

Begs leave to Report

That by a Resolution of Congress of the 24th November 1778, all Supernumerary Officers were entitled to receive one years pay of their Commissions respectively—And it was recommended to the several States to which such Officers belonged to make such farther provision for them as their respective circumstances and merits might entitle them to.

That under this Resolution Lieut. Armstrong was dismissed the service, as supernumerary, on the 1st May 1779, as appears from the certificate of Colo. Malcom in whose Regiment he served.

That it appears from a Resolution of Congress of the 4th March 1779, that Congress did not consider the Retiring Officers as entitled to any farther gratuity from the United States—for on a question proposed by the Board of War, “Whether they were entitled to 12months subsistence as well as Pay” it was resolved that they were not entitled to subsistence from Congress.

That Lieutenant Armstrong not being in service on the 10th of April 1780, when the Resolution of Congress for making up depreciation passed (the same being restricted to the Officers and soldiers then in actual service, and who should continue in service to the end of the War) is not entitled to the depreciation of his pay.

And finally that he hath no other dependence for any further consideration for his services than what results from the favorable impression which the latter part of the Resolution of Congress of the 24th of November 1778, may make upon the Legislature of this State.

Sheweth

That whereas your humble petitioner enlisted in the Delaware Regiment in the year 1777 and marched with the said Regiment when it was sent to the Southward, in which he served until he was unfortunately made prisoner at the Battle of Camden in the year 1780. and remained prisoner with the Enemy until the conclusion of the War. When the Rest of our Regiment was exchanged in Charlestown I was told by a British doctor under whose care I was that if I had a mind to lose my life I might go, being then broke out with the Leprosy. I lay nine months in the Hospital in Charlestown, I then was removed in an Hospital Ship to New York, for which time I had fifteen Guineas to pay, and had I not have found a friend who lent me the money, they would have sent me to Nova Scotia, then I had to pay my friend the money which he lent me by working at my trade in New York. Thus has your Petitioner laid before you a short sketch of the difficulties which he had to go through and that it was not of Choice but necessity that he remained so long with the Enemy, and he humbly petitions that this Honourable House, would serious think of, and commiserate his Case, and adapt such mode as your Wisdom may think most suitable to enable him to receive the Arrearage of his Pay for the time which he was in the service, and your petitioner an in the strictest duty bound shall forever pray.

Vigilant off Bombay Hook 14th decemr 1781

Sir,

In mine of the 27th Ult. I informed you of my intention of going up Duck Creek to take on board those men that had Engaged and could not attend at Wilmington before we sailed. On the 30th we went up the Creek & Received the Men. On the 1st Inst. Mr. Brown of Appoquinimink informed me that Six vessels was loaded and lay blocked up in that Creek, by two Barges, the same day Mr. McClemmins of Dover informed that his Vessel & three others lay in Jones & murtherkiln Creeks & waited my Coming down, that his had on board a Lieut. & Thirty six men belonging to the Congress Regiment, and had been attact by a Barge the day before & had one man wounded, he say'd the Officer was very desirous of geting up by Water as all their baggage was on board. I let Mr. McClemmons know that if the Officer would send me a Serjant & Twelve men I could insure his passage against all the barges in the Bay, he complied with my request, & on the 2d at night the men came on board, we amedia tly proceeded down the Creek, having gave previous Orders to the oners of three loaded vessels then in the Creek to move down over the shoals, the next morning we got out of the Creek and at 8 A. M. we made sail and proceeded up the Bay. Wind at N. W. at 10 we tact and stretched in for Appoquinimink Creek and gave the signals (which had been agreed on) for the vessels in that Creek to come out, After which we proceeded up with the Duck Creek vessels as high as Reedy point, & then returned to cover those from Appoquinimink at 4 P. M. we anchored off that Creek at 6 spoke two small vessels from Brandywine, bound up the Creek on the 4th at noon made sail for Jones's the wind at E.S.E. at 6 P. M. Wind shifted to N. East with snow & very dark at 7 off Mawhons ditch we espyed a light under our lee bow, I bore down for it and when within pistol shot discovered it to be on board of a Topsail schooner which was under sail & then in stays, I hailed them they answered follow us up the bay as there was Refugees below—I let them know that we where in no dread of Refugees & was then in search of them, as she loomed large I judged her to be some merchantman bound up, therefore continued my Course under easy sail untill 8 and then anchored about four miles above Jones's Creek, at 12 the Wind shifted to N. West and blew very hard on the

5th at day light I saw a Vessel at anchor to leeward and shortly after discovered her to be a topsail schooner, Then judged her to be an enemy & the same Vessel we spoke off Mawhons ditch at 8 A.M. being about a quarter flood, she got under way and stretched in to the Westward we made sail at the same time & stood down for the flats off Jones's, when they got within Hail of us they fired a gun to leeward under Continental coulers but finding we hauled our wind they ordered us to strike to them or they would sink us (to which we bid defiance) at the same time Shew British coulers & fired a broad side at us, I saw she mounted ten guns and appeared much superior to us who had only Two—as we did not comply with their Orders they kept up a Constant fire, It not being in my power to return the compliment with satisfaction choose rather to decline it than make a faint attempt, Judging that the preserving the Vessel and crew was of more consequence that the gratification of Revenge at the risque of booth, previous to our making sail I ordered the crew to keep secreted below (except such as was necessary to work the vessel) and cover'd our guns in expectation if an enemy they would send their boats to board us, but this they carefully avoided, we both stood down the bay a parallel course with the shore & as near as the water would admit, untill we grounded on Kitts Hammocks Bar, & they within Hail of us, after sometime their fire ceased and they began with scurrilous language which they where better masters of than the art of gunnery—By moving some ballace forward we soon floated and sail'd into Jones's Creek having rec'd but little damage, except in our sails & riging. they shortly after floated and anchored without the Bar, we there retook a small sloop loaded with corn & flour the property of one Morris of Murtherkilm, the Prize master informed that the schooner was from N. York & was called the Fox mounted Ten guns Six & four pounders Commanded by Joseph Hews Burton, & had taken McClemins and the other vessels on the 3d. . . . ? and that the Lieut. & Soldiers where then prisoners on board Decem'r the 6th. One of the vessels that had been taken came into the Creek with the soldiers & several other prisoners on board Nothink of consequence happend untill the 12th when a Mr. Berkey from Duck Creek came on board and informed that the Fox lay off the lower End of Bombay Hook & several Barges was above, and had taken and Plundered several Vessels belonging to that place & Appoquinimink.—

I then determined to leave Jones's and get above the Fox in order to fall in with the Barges, at 5 P. M. wind at West and High Water we made sail & got out of the Creek and proceeded up the Bay being tide of Ebb and a light wind was obliged to anchor off Ceasars ditch Early next morning we espyed a Barge under sail standing for us, but liking our appearance they bore away, we got under way and gave chase the wind at W.N.W. a brisk gale we soon came up with & took her, she proved to be the Barge Hazard from New York Commanded by the noted Miles Hurion having only four men on board, they informed me that they spoke the Fox (about twelve hours before) on her way to N.York with a Prize Brig under convoy—The first opportunity I shall deliver the prisoners to some civil Officer to be accounted for, I shall cruize in the Bay untill the Navigation is stoped by frost unless prevented by the Fox or some worse Enemy—

Neal who refers me to the State of Delaware for whom the purchase was made—Being unwilling to sue Col. Neal as it might be hurtful to his Credit he being a Gentleman in Trade—and the Debt being properly owing for & by the State—induces me to lay the matter before your Excellency intreating you will be pleased to take cognizance thereof and that I may receive my full Money & interest thereof

In addition to this Consideration The Delaware State recollects with sincere satisfaction the antient and affectionate Intercourse that has for such a length of time connected Pennsylvania & herself so closely and advantageously together. An union of sentiments and interests, which it is heartily wished, so far from being ever dissolved, or even diminished, may be continually & carefully cultivated & improved.

The Commonwealth maybe assured that the Delaware State entertains the most favorable Dispositions toward her neighbour & sister State and will on all occasions be pleased with a Reciprocation not only of mutually beneficial, but also of amicable Offices.

I have been honoured with your Excellency's Letter of the 14th last.

I sincerely congratulate your Excellency on your appointment to the Government of the State of Delaware, & felicitate that part of the union on having furnished you with so extensive an opportunity of promoting the general interest.

The Subject matter of your Excellency's Letter was laid before our Legislature in May last, on the application of President Rodney, I was in hopes that the encouragement given by your State by the Act entitled "An Act for the Protection of the trade of this State on the river and bay of Delaware," which I transmitted to the house with my Message, would have been an additional inducement to them to have fitted out some naval armament to cruize against the Enemy's Privateers which infested that river; but the assembly did not adopt the measure. There is perhaps less probability that they will do it the next sitting in May, as they have since provided that such part of our State Regiment as is destined for the protection of the Counties of Salem, Cumberland & Cape May is to act either by land or water. It being however a very humiliating consideration that the refugees should so long triumph on the Delaware, & give such material interruption to the trade of three of the States, the united exertions of which might so easily prevent their depredations, I shall again urge the matter to the Assembly tho' rather with the wish than the hopes of Success.

Agreeable to your Instructions I waited on the Naval Commissioners for the State of Pennsylvania and offered to Transfer to them by way of sale such part of the Armed Schooner Delaware as they should think proper to Purchase. After a Treaty of three days I found they where not disposed to be connected with us. I then requested them to give me their determination in writing, and for that purpose would Forward them my past proposals of sale in the same way—a copy of which with their answer I send enclosed. I have to add that during the above Treaty the Creditors of the State appeared very anxious to hear the determination of the Commissioners, And when they found that we did not agree, they where outrageous and declared they would put the Law in force against me, as Contractor, to prevent which I prepared to cut and run for it. But previous to my getting underway, I was boarded by Mr. Lewis who declared that unless I accepted his Order in favor of John Ackroyd for £150 payable in three or four weeks he would stop my going down—to Prevent further trouble I agreed to it—And now Sir, must beg you to assist me to comply with this forced Promise, and Likewise to use your endeavours to free me from my very disagreeable Circumstances in Respect to the Money due for the Schooner.

Correspondence between Naval Commissioners & Chas Pope, Esq. Jan. 1783.

Gentlemen of the General Assembly,

The Trade of this State on the Bay and River Delaware, at the Time I entered upon the Administration, evidently required every possible Exertion for its Protection and the Insufficiency of our Funds prevented the Equipment of the State Schooner for that purpose. I therefore judged it most advisable to fit out the said Vessel, if practicable, in Concert with the State of Pennsylvania, whose Interests were equally affected by the Depredations of the Enemy. Accordingly, with the Concurrence of several Members of the Council and Assembly, on the 13th of November last, I issued Instructions to Charles Pope, Esq; Commander of the said Schooner, to contract with the Marine Commissioners of Pennsylvania for transferring to that State, by Way of Sale, a Part of the said Vessel; and generally, to concur with them in adopting such Measures as might be requisite for her speedy Equipment for the Protection of the Trade. The Secretary will lay before you a Duplicate of these Instructions and the Correspondence between the said Commissioners and Charles Pope, by which you will perceive, that he has been unable to effectuate the Measures recommended to him.

This State having incurred a considerable Debt in building and arming the said Vessel, and our Funds at this Time being inadequate to her present Equipment and regular Maintenance, I beg Leave to suggest it as expedient, that Application be made to the State of New Jersey to employ the said Vessel jointly with this State for the Protection of the Trade of both, which is similarly circumstanced and equally exposed. If this Measure is unattainable, or does not meet with the Approbation of the General Assembly, I think it would redound to the Interest of the State, that she should be sold.

The Committee of Conference to whom was referred the Letter of Mr. John Pringle relative to the fitting out the State Schooner called the Delaware now lying at the port of Philadelphia do now report,

That the sum of 1500£ will be necessary to discharge the ballance of the cost and expence due on said vessel and to compleat and equip said vessel for the service of the Bay. And that the monthly expence in cruising will amount to 250£ provided the marines can be obtained from the Secretary of War, but if those persons are to be procured on Hire 150£ more pr. month will be necessary for that purpose. Your Committee are of opinion that it is not in the power of the State to furnish the above sum

Gentlemen of the General Assembly,

In pursuance of the Act for the Protection of the Trade on the Bay and River Delaware, with the Advice of the Privy-Council, shortly after your last Sessions, I appointed Charles Pope, Esq; to fit out the Schooner Delaware. In that Business he proceeded so far as to obtain a Grant of Money from some Merchants in Philadelphia, which by the happy Event of Peace became unnecessary; and I believe, but a small Part thereof has been received. In the further Execution of that Act, with the Advice of the Council, I impowered George Latimer, Esq; to make Sale of the said Vessel, and directed the Monies arising therefrom, to be applied in Discharge of the Sums due for the building and equipping her. It appears by Mr. Latimer's Letter of the tenth of May last, that the said Vessel sold for Eleven Hundred and Thirty Pounds; her Guns and other Articles, useful only in War, and therefore unsaleable, I have directed to be delivered to Captain Delaplain, Armourer for this State, at Newport. I shall take the earliest Opportunity, after a Receipt thereof, to lay before you an Account of

the Application of the Money arising from the Sale; but from the best Information I can obtain, I believe, that the Money thus produced will not be more than sufficient to discharge The Debts due on Account of the said Vessel, exclusive of Six Hundred and Sixty-four Pounds Five Shillings, the Balance of a Sum and the Interest thereon due to the Bank of North-America on the tenth of this Month; and for the Payment whereof His Excellency John Dickinson, Esq; late President of this State, stands bound. That Gentleman having thus engaged his private Credit to serve the State, Justice to him, as well as the Honor and faith of the State Require, that Measures be taken for a speedy Payment of the same.

Sir:—

The frequent and very urgent importunities of those to whom the State of Delaware is indebted for the Schooner built and equipped in this City for that State, compel me to take the Liberty of again addressing your Excellency respecting those Debts of which enclosed you have as good an estimate as I can make, for even yet I have it not in my power to make an exact list, owing to the backwardness of some of the creditors who say tis unnecessary to deliver their accts. as there is no money to pay them. Other say they do not look to the State as either Col. Pope or Captn. Parks bought and shall pay for their goods;

You'll see that I have supposed the ball. will be three thousand dollars, I am well persuaded it will not be less; I have no doubt that your Excellency will so soon as the General Assembly rise inform me what measures may have been taken to discharge this debt, so that I may be enabled to give an answer to the creditors many of whom I know to be in *real distress*, and from whose violent clamors I have only the short respite of the time the Legislature may be sitting and should no provision be made during their sitting for payment, I am certain some of these to whom the State is indebted will, so soon as Col. Pope may come to this City, enter actions against him for their debts.

Copy of a Letter from the Chevalier de La Luzerne addressed to his Excellency John Dickenson Esq. President of the Delaware State. Dated at Philada the 14th of Oct. 1782.

Sir

I take the Liberty to request of you that you'll be pleased to lay before the Honorable Assembly or the Council of the Delaware State the Petition of a certain Luke Shield, formerly an Inhabitant of Lewes Town in the County of Sussex where he has

an Interest in some Possessions now occupied by his Mother in Law—His preceeding Conduct may have merited the animadversions of his Countrymen. The Eagle, a Frigate belonging to his most Christian Majesty having captured an English Brig in sight of your Coast, in which Brig he served in the Capacity of a Pilot, he was from thence put on board the Eagle—All the Officers who were in the Frigate at that time agree in ascribing to him the Merit of having exerted himself to the utmost for the preservation of the Frigate, & Captain de La Touche himself gives the most favourable account of him, but as the English Officers have been apprised of his good endeavours to assist us on that occasion, they will not fail to punish him for these his good offices in our favor if ever they can lay their Hands on him. In this Situation he solicits in consideration of his Conduct on board the Eagle, that he may be permitted to return to the State of Delaware & he promises for the future to conduct himself in every respect as a Good Citizen. I cou'd not refuse my interposition in his behalf & I hope that your Excellency will use your Influence for the Obtainment of his request & whatever measure the Council may adopt for his Interest will be esteemed as a particular favour conferred upon myself.

LEWIS 5th March 1783

May it please Your Excellency

You may remember my being taken Prisoner on board his Brittannic majesty's Brigantine, or Sloop of War, Raccoon Capt Neagle, by his most Christian Majesty's Ship L'Agle—Capt L'Touche, who upon the appearance of the british Ships in the Delaware, obliged me to take charge of L'Agle and pilot her up the Bay,—that after she grounded in the Delaware I was conveyed from thence a prisoner to Philadelphia where in a short time discovered a Publication in a New York Paper respecting my Conduct on board L'Agle in Delaware from which I concluded it unsafe for me to return upon exchange to York, nor did I expect I could be permitted to reside without in safety,—under these disagreeable Circumstances I applied to your Excellency for your assistance in my behalf and to know what might be effected for me.

Your excellency was thereupon pleased to furnish me with a letter to the Governor and Assembly of the Delaware State with a representation of my care and requested them to reinstate me in my former Residence and such other matters in my behalf that should be esteemed requisite etc—Upon which with the advice of my friends in Philadelphia I left that place on my way here, but was stopt as soon as I came 'nto the County by one of its Magistrates and compelled to give security for my appearance at the then next Court of Oyer and Terminer to be held at this place, but for what purpose I did not then know—but to my mortification I have been since informed it is to be tried for my life for high treason and which seems yet to be the determination; the Governor and Assembly not having done anything for me.

Hard therefore is my lot indeed, that I dare not return to York, there my life is at stake for my conduct on Board L'Agle,—here, if I am kept, I am at stake for high treason—Where therefore can I fly for Refuge and escape the impending Ruin—both sides seeking my life—

I have therefore to beseech your Exzellency's Speedy interposition in my behalf and snatch Me from the Fury of my Enemies—My troubles are all brought upon me for my services on Board the L'Agle a Ship belonging to the King of your Excellency's

Nation and to whom I am undoubtedly a Prisoner and as such I am persuaded your Excellency has an absolute and undoubted Right to demand me from this place and dispose me where you see proper, which humbly beg you will do as soon as possible after this comes to hand, (or otherwise prevent my being reduced to the ignominy of a trial of that kind) as the Court will be held for that and other purposes in next Month

Your excellency's favor in this very particular, and to me, interesting case shall be ever gratefully acknowledged by

12. Adjutant Lucas's no vouchers, not authenticated or signed.
13. Captain Patten's charges for 85 recruits for which no other vouchers are produced than 2 imperfect muster rolls, for 56 only. The time he and the other officers employed in the recruiting service and included in his account is not mentioned.

Captain Learmonth's for 1778 hath no vouchers or authentication, With that for 1780 there are muster rolls for 7 and a report from the Auditor which mentions his having seen attestations and muster rolls for all that are nam'd in the account except one.

They all want certificates, depositions, or other documents tending to prove, that the officers were employed in the recruiting service by some superior during the time charged, that they recruited the men, & actually paid the bounty and subsistence charged, that they received no money of any person for or on behalf of the public but what they have credited, and that no part of the subsistence charged was received from the public stores, or taken up on the credit of the United States or any of them, and in general to be arranged agreeable to the printed form, or at least in such manner as to point to the particular allowances of Congress, as such only can be admitted as charges against the Union.

He produced a Receipt sign'd John James for £100 dated 23d Dec'r 1777—in part pay for his Company in the Whig Battallion—On the 29th of the same month Capt. James acknowledges the receipt of £201:13:1, the full amount of his Company's pay roll, from George Latimer, Esqr. Paymaster, for which sum Mr. Latimer charges the state.

He also produced another receipt dated 29th Dec'r 1777, sign'd George Latimer, acknowledging the Receipt of £100 by the hands of Capt. Thomas Watson. Mr. Latimer has charged the State with £1000 pd. at two payments on Genl Patterson's orders, to Mr. Wm. McClay; but does not give Credit for the said sum of £100—On the same day Capt. Watson sign'd a Receipt under his Company's pay roll, acknowledging the Receipt of £177:2:5—the amount of the same from George Latimer, Paymaster.

An Act passed Novr. 13, 1781 directs all public officers to pay over the money in their hands by the 1st of Dec'r then coming. Mr. McClay pd. the money in his hands on the 18th, Dec'r 1781.

That in lieu of rations, each person be allowed 10s. per week for his subsistence, and the commanding officer to have double that sum.

Ralph Walker, of the Borough of Wilmington, be appointed Fort Major (instead of Mr. Charles West, late Fort Major, who is rendered incapable of that office), and that he be commissioned by the President and Commander-in-Chief accordingly; which said Fort Major shall forthwith inlist the number of persons above mentioned, who, from the time of inlistment, shall receive the pay and subsistence aforesaid.

Resolved, That the said Fort Major take under his care and direction any fire-rafts that may be built or brought into this State, and be subject to the command of the President or Commander-in-Chief.

David Hall to President of Congress.

[Read July 8. Referred to the Delegates of Maryland.]

LEWIS, DELAWARE, July 5, 1776.

Sir: I have the honour to enclose sundry depositions, containing, as we think, a true state of the general disaffection that prevails among the people in the County of Sussex. Sundry gentlemen from the neighborhood of Broad Creek, and Wicomico, have been qualified to the truth of it, on whose attachment to the cause of America we very much depend. The Council of Safety have ordered down part of an Independent Company now under their direction. A company of the Delaware Battalion is also preparing to march. The most alarming circumstance is, the danger of Lord Dunmore's recruiting with success among the disaffected, who repair to him without reserve, and supply him with the produce of the country. We earnestly entreat that Congress may take the matter into their serious consideration, and order what may be thought necessary to fix the minds of the wavering, and secure the common safety.

SUSSEX COUNTY, BROAD CREEK, DELAWARE.,
July 5, 1776.

Gentlemen: The situation of the part of the country in which we live having of late appeared to us rather critical, and a number of armed vessels lately appearing in our rivers, occasion us to think ourselves bound in duty, both to our country and our families, to lay our case before you, both for advice and assistance. We need not inform that a large majority of the people in the lower part of this country appear disaffected, which, being lately fully demonstrated by these hostile appearances, occasions troops to be sent from above to quiet them; and we are sorry to say, that it is our opinion that they (viz: the enemies of the cause) are not better affected than they were before those troops came, (we mean in the parts near us,) although we are fully of the opinion that the gentlemen appointed and sent down as heads of that business thought proper to have a few hundred riflemen sent amongst us at that time, who took up some of the most insolent, and put them in confinement, disarmed the offenders of less note, and left a few troops as a protection to the well disposed. Things at this time should have worn a face much more in favour of the country than it now does.

The night before last, we sent an express down to Vienna, a small town in Maryland, upon Nanticoke River, to give information of what men-of-war or tenders were in the rivers. Yesterday our express returned, and gave an account, that in the mouth of the River Nanticoke, there lay the Fowey ship-of-war and four tenders; in the River Wicomico were three tenders. Those up Wicomico had run far up the river into the heart of the country; but we had no account of any great damage they had then done. They had landed, and attempted to rob some plantations; but were driven back to their vessels. Although the Militia were about ten miles below the mouth of the river, they went on shore, and robbed the most wealthy man in the neighbourhood of his cash, and all his negroes they could lay hands on; after which, they tied the gentleman, and took him off on board their vessel. We also may inform you, that parties from tenders and other vessels supposed to belong to Dunmore's Fleet, have taken large quantities of cattle and other stock from what is called the Islands, which lie just below the mouth of the Nanticoke River; and we have reason to believe that they have taken stock out of the river they left, which they might easily have done, as great part of the inhabitants upon the river, from the mouth to the head, would be glad to have an opportunity to deal with them, and would take great pleasure to supply them with anything in their power. This much, gentlemen, you may depend on, that vast numbers of the inhabitants of Somerset and Dorchester Counties, in Maryland, and of Sussex County, in Delaware, have men on board of these men-of-war and tenders, either trading, inlisting, taking the oath of allegiance, or something we really are not informed of; but we have it from such authority, that we do really believe that they purchase some sorts of goods from the tenders, very low; and also, that the captain of the tenders registers the name of every person who goes on board of them. We are also fully convinced that numbers of the inhabitants have actually voluntarily entered into the service under Dunmore; some of whom, we have reason to believe, now bear command on board these tenders, and we look upon them as a more dangerous enemy than the Europeans. They know our country, and are able to carry the vessels they command to the heads of the rivers; and it is reported (and we believe it to be true) that these traitors have sent word (by their neighbours, who have been down on board trading) to their relations, who live in the heart of the country, that in a very short time they, with their armed vessels, will pay them a visit. It would be impossible for us to relate to you, gentlemen, on paper, every threat that has been thrown out by the disaffected amongst ourselves, as well as the people on board the tenders and ships-of-war, and therefore shall only add, that, from the disaffection amongst ourselves, which we conceive to be so great, that there is, at least, six disaffected to one firm man for America,—we say, from that melancholy appearance, and from the arrival of these armed vessels, we think it our duty to make application to you for assistance of men; and make no doubt but that, if it is in your power, we must be candid enough to inform you, that self-preservation will oblige us either to leave our livings, or fall in and run with the current, either of which will be hateful to us. But we believe it cannot be required of us to offer ourselves sacrifices for our country, without there being some prospect of benefit arising therefrom.

If, gentlemen, upon reflection, you judge it practicable and expedient to grant us men, we beg they may continue stationed amongst us, until we shall appear able to protect ourselves; and for that purpose, we pray you will, in our behalf, make applica-

tion to Congress that we may not be liable to have them called away, and again be left destitute; for if we should have them only for short time, and then taken from us, our case would be worse than now, as revenge might prompt our enemies to more desperate actions. Although we represent our case to be distressing, we do not mean to represent it as past hope; for we are of opinion, if you favour us with only three or four good companies, with prudent officers, we shall not only be able to defend ourselves, but also that it will be a means to reclaim a considerable number of the disaffected, and bring them to their duty, as it will enable our officers to pursue such steps as is necessary to accomplish this purpose so much wished for. Not doubting but that you will do everything for us that may appear to you necessary,

Testimony of Each Scudder, July 4, 1776.

Enoch Scudder, being duly sworn on the holy Gospel, doth depose and say: That on the third of this instant July, in travelling down from Philadelphia, he was overtaken by four men near Cedar Creek, who asked him if he had heard that Lord Dunmore had landed an armament of men in Maryland, and whether he (this deponent) was going to join him; upon which this deponent asked them if there were any men there that would join Dunmore, and how many, and whereabouts they were to be gathered: upon which, they informed him that fifteen hundred might be collected about Cedar Creek, and between that and the place where Dunmore had landed; and that he (this deponent) in several harvest-fields, heard the people converse to this purpose; and that they were determined that the gentlemen who had been busy in calling the Tories to account should not be suffered to pass without a guard; and they further told him that Boymer Lloyd was actually with Dunmore.

PHILADELPHIA, August 3, 1776.

Sir: I Received yours of the 30th July, and shall endeavour to answer it. Captain Gordon might have had the place you mentioned, but, on talking with me, he very prudently declined it. The history of your manoeuvres, procession, &c., pleased me, and the more so, as I heard of the choice, without knowing the principle on which it was made.

With respect to the return made me by the Field-Officers, they have neglected to send me the dates of their commissions or appointments in the Militia; I have therefore written to them to return me dates, before commissions can be made out. As to the subalterns, their being placed with an older or younger Captain does not affect their rank, as that will be preserved by the commission made out for them; and as that will be the case, it is better that they should be fixed in such companies as best please them. I showed Captain Gordon the return made me by the Field-Officers, showing the order in which they choose to be placed with respect to companies, which Mr. Gordon said was agreeable to their desire, so far as he had knowledge in it; that he was sure it was right as to Caldwell's company.

With respect to the choice of a Convention, I would leave it to you and your friends, whether, when you have fixed on such ticket as meets your approbation, it

would not be better to pursue, and endeavour to impress the utility of such choice being made by the people, (especially at a time when the establishing their rights and privileges as freemen depends on such choice,) upon your former plan, I mean of true Whigism—true patriotism. This plan, if pursued with diligence, and such cool argument and reasoning as the case will point out and justify, I think must carry with it persuasion and conviction. It certainly will with all such as are not governed by a party spirit. If any person or persons be proposed in opposition to your ticket, who have heretofore been unfriendly to the cause, point out to the people their former conduct, and submit to them the propriety of trusting to such men at such an important crisis. Your scheme ought to hold out more of the patriot than partyman. I will again submit, as before, whether the inquiry and examination proposed to be had before the Committee will not tend so to irritate, as to occasion many people, by taking sides in that matter, to lose sight of the cause—their true interest; for if they are led to believe that you and your friends are governed more by a party spirit than by the true interests of America, they will hold you in the light of all other party men, and deal with you accordingly. You say the Committee are about to make this inquiry: Are there a sufficient number of patriots in that Committee to answer your expectation? Are there a considerable majority of them that wish the inquiry should be had? Will they, if matters turn out as you expect, publish their opinions to the County, so that the friends of liberty may benefit by it? It is an inquiry that ought to have been made; but it is an inquiry that ought to be made by men of understanding only. Do such make a majority of the Committee—the good men? By what authority do they take it up? Are not many of the members principals in the matter of inquiry? All these things I submit to the prudence and good sense of you and your friends, though you seem to have determined on the measure, by your letter, before my opinion was asked. In short, it is difficult to give an opinion in this case, as I am a stranger to the present complexion of the Committee. However, as this Convention is undoubtedly the most important Assembly that ever was chosen in that Government, would advise the avoiding every kind of violence; and, on the other hand, the utmost diligence and persuasion, to procure as many friends to liberty on the return as possible. By this means, men who have heretofore been unfriendly to liberty, if properly pointed out, cannot prevail. The people, when uninitiated, generally hearken to reason, and make prudent choices. But you may be able to let me know about these things by the next post.

Yesterday came to town a ship belonging to the Congress, from France, with ten drums of powder, about forty drums of lead, one thousand stands of arms, &c., &c., and the same day an armed vessel taken by Captain Barry at sea. I have put your thread in the hands of a weaver.

Sir: Since I finished my other letter, have been up at Congress, where we receive d intelligence, by letter from Captain Wickes, in the Congress ship the Reprisal, that he has, at sea, on the 13th of July, taken two prizes, a ship and a schooner, bound for Liverpool, loaded with cotton, sugar, rum, &c. The letters came by the prize schooner, which arrived in an inlet near Egg-Harbour; and the ship prize has been seen off the Cape of Delaware, and supposed by this time got in.

This day's post is not yet come in from New-York. It is past its usual time of coming, and therefore imagine there will be something important, which delayed him. I wish it may be good. The Delaware battalion came to town this morning, and there passed an order of Congress yesterday morning for Captain Darby and his company, now at Lewis, to come up and join the battalion, or at least to follow them; for as the Congress has now got arms, I imagine they will not stay here long. Let not the contents of my other letter be seen by any, unless a friend in whom you can confide.

I believe I shall never be able to get that scoundrel to make Betsey's and Sally's shoes I have not time to say anything about my plantation affairs; but hope you will have an eye to them, that they may not suffer. Without the least expectation of being gratified, I have a strong desire to be at home once more.

PHILADELPHIA, August 8, 1776.

Sir: As I have received no letter from you by the last post, and have little or no intelligence except what you will find in the papers, am at loss what to write you.

The Delaware batallion is under marching orders for Amboy, subject to General Washington's further orders. They are completely armed—as fine guns as you could wish to see.

Having a few idle moments, I have enclosed you a paper containing a few queries, and submit to you whether that, or something like it, taken and copied in an unknown hand, and secretly distributed, so as to become publick at this time, might not be of use, by drawing the serious attention of the people at this important crisis. But as I know very little, or rather nothing, of the present politicks or the disposition of the people at this time, wholly submit the matter to you, and wish the people may consider their true interest.

Mr. McKean is still in the Jerseys, and not likely soon to return. The terms of Confederation now before the Congress, and our Colony not represented without Read and me both, therefore cannot expect to see you in Kent very soon.

Notice of Meeting of Delaware Convention.

We are informed by authority that the honourable the Convention of the Delaware State, which was elected on the 19th day of August last, for the special purpose of "ordaining and declaring the future form of Government of that State," met at New-castle on the 27th day of the same month, and having furnished their quota of the Flying-Camp, and ordered another battalion to be forthwith raised, under the command of Colonel Samuel West, to reinforce the army of the United States of America, and having also finished the work for which they were particularly chosen, they dissolved themselves on the 21st. instant.

Colonel Patterson to Caesar Rodney.

HEADQUARTERS, AMPBOY, September 27, 1776.

Sir: Agreeable to promise to write you, now in part, have sat down, having this opportunity by way of journalizing.

I arrived here last Monday morning, with six companies, my battalion. Both have been exceedingly polite to me since here, and admire our battalion much. This has added much to my pride; also the General has chosen our Light-Infantry for his body guard.

The evening before last I was officer of the day. About sun-down a boat of Hessians came over to our shore, opposite a large marsh above the mill guard, and stuck stakes there, with a number of bills, which were taken down. Enclosed is a copy of each sort. The General had the rest delivered him.

This morning a flag was sent over to the Island, with Captain Hamilton and a lady, Mrs. McMonty's daughter and child, opposite my door. They ordered them not to come near, which our people not beating the parley by drum so soon, they, Hessians, were near firing over our flag for want. They sent a boat off; would not let ours land. Since I have been here they have been fortifying opposite to us by batteries and small lines, all masked by bushes, as also the same done to their tents, which were open here when I came. It is the opinion here they are afraid of us. I hope we shall make them so on trial. The battalion is kept busy on duty. About twenty-seven sick, owing principally to the water, but are somewhat mending. I suppose about four thousand men here. I am happy in my situation, and hope to continue here if I can. Fine quarters, great plenty of oyster, fish, &c.; no ladies, to be sure. God help us; I hope for better times soon. Please to let Mr. Read know I am well, and any part of this; and, for God's sake, don't let the people choose the officers in Colonel West's battalion—if so, a poor figure.

PHILADELPHIA, October 2, 1776.

Sir: I received your letter yesterday about three o'clock in the afternoon, by post. Lake, who set out from the creek's mouth on Monday morning arrived here yesterday afternoon about one o'clock; but did not call on me until the evening. However, this could be no fault of his, unless it had pleased God to have endowed him more under standing, for I really believe (as he says) that he had been hunting from the minute he came, and could not find me or the house where I lodged. If he had been lucky enough to have blundered on the house he would have found me, as I happened to be at home all that afternoon. This turned out to be the case at last; for strolling about the street he saw Monsieur standing in my door, which relieved him. I shall sell the vessel as

soon, and for as good a price, as possible. Mr. Read is not yet come up. However, I shall set out for Kent on Saturday or Sunday at farthest, whether he comes or not. Yesterday I received a letter from Doctor Tilton. The officers are in pretty good health, except Colonel Haslett, who had been unwell with the flux for a considerable time past, but getting better. One paragraph in the old man's letter is very full of the great honour obtained by the Delaware battalion, in the affair at Long-Island, from the unparalleled bravery they showed in view of all the Generals and troops within the lines, who alternately praised and pitied them. By General Howe's return of the prisoners to Congress, Lieutenant Stewart and Lieutenant Harney are both alive and well.

General Mifflin came to town the day before yesterday. He brought letters from General Washington informing Congress that Mr. Moylan, the Quartermaster-General, had resigned his commission, as unable to conduct the business of so many troops. That in consequence thereof, the General says he had prevailed on General Mifflin to accept, confident that there was not another man in the army who could carry on the business upon the present large plan. Under these circumstances, Mifflin has with reluctance accepted. General Mifflin says our army is numerous; mending fast as to their sickness; in high spirits; well fortified, and wish for nothing more than a general engagement. There is seldom a day but some prize or some French trading vessel comes into this port—some days two or three. I hope the children will get better of their sickness soon, and am glad Sally is better.

Colonel Haslett to Thomas Rodney.

CAMP AT MOUNT WASHINGTON, October 4, 1776.

On Sunday, the 25th of August last, my regiment was ordered to Long-Island, in Lord Stirling's brigade, composed mostly of the Southern troops, by whom we were much caressed, and highly complimented on our appearance and dexterity in the military exercise and manoeuvres. On Tuesday, the 27th his brigade, consisting of five regiments, and a few of Sullivan's, not exceeding five thousand men, were ordered to advance beyond the lines and repulse the enemy. To oppose this small band were seventeen thousand regulars, much better furnished with field-pieces and every other military appointment than we. Several of the regiments were broken and dispersed soon after the first onset. The Delawares and Marylanders stood firm to the last; and, after a variety of skirmishing, the Delawares drew up on the side of a hill, and stood upwards of four hours, with a firm, determined countenance, in close array, their colours flying, the enemy's artillery playing on them all the while, not daring to advance and attack them, though six times their number, and nearly surrounding them. Nor did they think of quitting their station till an express order from the General commanded their retreat through a marsh and over a creek, the only opening left, which they effected in

good order, with the loss of one man drowned in passing. The Delawares alone had the Honour of bringing off twenty-three prisoners.

I must also do Colonel Smallwood's battalion the justice to say, that the spirited attack made by them on the enemy, at the time the Delawares and themselves were retreating, greatly facilitated the escape of both. Twenty-seven of the Delawares next morning were missing. In that number were Lieutenants Stewart and Harney; the latter a prisoner, the other not yet heard of. Major McDonough was wounded in the knee; a ball passed through the sleeve of this coat without wounding the arm or his body. Lieutenant Anderson had a ball lodged in his throat; Lieutenant Corn a ball still in his back; they are recovered. The standard was torn with shot in Ensign Stephens's hand, who is now in his element, and a most excellent officer. Such is our fate. The Delaware battalion, officers and men, are respected throughout this army. We are now in General Mifflin's brigade, who a few days since was appointed Quartermaster-General, and by a special order we encamp on the lines, near the General's house. In the retreat from Long-Island, which was conducted with great prudence, Colonels Shee, Smallwood, Hand, and some others I do not recollect, were called into Council, and requested to take the defence of the lines upon us, while the main body of the army crossed the East River to New-York, which was accepted; and last of all crossed ourselves, thank God, in safety.

Colonel Patterson to Caesar Rodney.

HEADQUARTERS, AMBOY, October 6, 1776.

Sir: Your three favours came to hand last evening. For answer, I am extremely sorry for your situation, and fear your disorder. As soon as I received yours, went about the inquiry for the root. There is so few of the inhabitants in town, that it was some time in the night before I got to hear of such. At last found an old lady who I gave money to, to send off this morning for some. As yet she has not arrived, or should have sent it by this hand, Doctor Spencer, of New-Castle. She says it is never got till November, and then used to be brought into town to sell; used as a tea; and to her knowledge has cured many that came here on purpose. I shall not fail of forwarding it to-day to Woodbridge; to go by post.

As to the other parts of your letters, have not full time to answer. As to Mr. Watson, have not seen him. Shall let him know the answer to his; but believes he does not want to resign, as he begins to know, like all the rest, that money can be made in that way; and if so, believes he will acquiesce in small bluffs.

Captain Caldwell's company and Colonel Hodgson arrived here about the 1st instand. They are all here now but what Captain Mitchell's men are to follow him.

I received a letter from the Hon. George Read, acquainting me another battalion is to be raised with us. I cannot see the propriety of such an attempt, when mine is not near full and full officered, to save expenses. I should thought, as we are not more than four hundred and fifty men, officers included, instead of six hundred, and at this season, so far advanced, is, in my humble opinion, hurting the intention. If any

such should come, they must be mostly of the Militia kind; and half a month will cure them for ever going again, and persuade others not, if you should be ordered to raise one in the spring. They can only say they go up the hill and down, at this season, as the time is so short.

We left Captain Mitchell's drum at the maker's, by accident. I can sell all our drums and I believe colours, at the end of our campaign, if ordered. This you can consult, and let me know.

CAMP AT MOUNT WASHINGTON, 8th Oct. 1776.

Dr. Sir

This is to congratulate you on seeing your name at the head of the Convention for N. Castle, it is with the greatest pleasure I make it. if the N. Castle People go on, I shall begin to worship them, & were I a Roman Catholic, should say, Ora pro nobis—to see the Greatest Partisan in our Government, (impassioned as far as pale faced Ire cou'd carry him) stand up & declaim against party & Party passions, gave me such offence, that I cou'd not help replying with a degree of acrimony never to be forgiven—

I am informed from Kent, ye People are non-satisfied, they failed in their whole Ticket only from having fixed it too late, & are now determined to begin in time & vote unanimously. God grant it may be so, say I; but make the artifice of the Grand Patron of Whig Tories, Scurvy Justices &c in all their Dirty Doings, but as fixed the day of the Election on the Day of Noxonton fair, in hope that paltry Domestic Considerations will take off the attention of ye People from the Grand Concern. But the artfull Politician will certainly find himself mistaken; I hope better things of you, my Brethren; ye People have their Eyes too open to give up their Birth-right for a peice of Ginger Bread. they will certainly leave the fair to the Ladies, in order to serve them fairs & Liberty to go there with their own property forever. I insist upon it every Lady, who understands the matter, will make a point of this. In this I speak assuredly, because so far as I know, the Ladies are ten to one of the Right side, & their Inspiring virtue is sufficient to save the Colonies. You know, I abhor Flattery and speak my Sentiments, if this was'nt true, I shou'd have been a Justice of peace long, long ago, Dr. Tilton writes Mr. Wm Clark on the same subject—you & he publish & proclaim Our Letters, if you please they are wrote in the spirit of freedom, & the confidence of Friendship gives your Discretion Leave to publish them on the House tops, if you think, it will do any Good to the people. I cannot quit without expressing the warmest approbation of the Conduct of yr people in leaving out the Genl. (who would have been at this hour without the Title but for you & me, a man, who had great merit in settling the Loan Office accompts, but like the Goat, (a homely comparison) kicked the Bucket, & overset all in the End.

In my Principle I have spoke my sentiments with freedom, have endeavored to do it with Decencey, where I have failed, must plead to you, Homo Sum—

But you will expect some news from camp, & I have tried ye Patience already. I shall give you my sentiments as concisely as possible. In my opinion, (you will consider it as mine only.) the Original Plan was wrong. L: Island with a fleet of 400 Sail, & 35,000 menagt it was Indefinsible, & New York Island equally accessible, by their fleet & to me.

Both, I think, shou'd have been striped of everything valuable & abandoned—Our Lines formed at the turn of the N River, where we had a large & friendly Continent behind us, & ships were useless, Instead of that our Lines are on N. York Island, about $1\frac{1}{2}$ miles from River to River, the shipping can pass them on each side, unless our Batteries on the N. side prevent them, on the East, are none—We have Harlem River in half a mile of our Rear, passable only at two places, if our Lines should be forced: tis said they have been mortally afraid of an attack from us some days past, & that they think our lines too strong to be attempted; tis thought probable, they may land farther up the East River & by entrenching between us & the country, oblige us to abandon these Lines, as the Works at N. York have been before. In this I hope, they will be disappointed, tho' I dont think our Situation the best. By five Deserters who came in yesterday we are informed they are much afraid of an attack from us, yt. some of the Massachusits People, have gone on the East End of L. Island, & pillaged Jamaica a Nest of Tories: be this true or false, two Brigades of the Regulars went this day from N. York Island to support them—many are sick & in want of necessaries: the Rest Spirited, hearty & Enow for the purpose, we lost on L. Island 27 men 2 officers Stuart & Harny—23 men & both officers are Prisoners, only two private Killed— Our Brigadar Genl. Lord Sterling this Day arrived in camp exchanged for Govr. Brown. I this Day wrote Mr. Stuart, his son is safe, you may perhaps sooner give him the welcome news.

But I must have done, hightime say you: have nothing more than to assure you, my Best wishes wait on Mrs. VnDyke & family, & that I am your

Dear Sir:

We came over from the hights of Harlam the 21st of last month and incamp'd near the Genls. House where we have lay'd unmolested till this morning when the Rhoabuck, Phoenix, Repuke and three Tenders, which has lay'd for some time with two other ships about two miles below our Lines came up here—They pass'd all our Forts Tho' there was a very heavy fire kept up from them all without discharging one Gun, till they got opposite Fort Washington when the Rheobuck discharged about ten

or Twelve and then proceeded with the other two & the tenders up the river but how far they have got up or where they are going I cant Learn as yet——

Yesterday there came in four or five deserters, two of them came in with Coln Bedford who was stationed at our Lines, they belong to the thirty seventh Ragemt but brings no material news—I ask'd them if the English intended to attack us they answer'd that they were affraid we would attack them before they were ready for us, having none of their cannon mounted as yet—There was another come in to-day which gives the same accot.

This is all the news I have therefore I conclude Dr. Sir with my kind love to Mrs. Read and the children—

CAMP ON VALENTINE'S HILL, October 22, 1776.

Sir: * * *
* * *

I have the pleasure to inform you that a detachment of our men, under the command of Colonel Hazlet, surprised Major Roberts and his regiment last night, at Marinack. They brought off thirty-six prisoners, and about sixty muskets. The number of slain is not ascertained. It is said that a good many of them fell; and further, that if the guides had pursued strictly their instructions, the whole would have been cut off. We has two men killed and twelve wounded; among them Major Greene, of the First Virginia regiment, an officer of great merit.

Extract of a Letter from Colonel Haslet to General Rodney,

Dated October 28, 1776.

On Monday night Lord Stirling ordered me, with seven hundred and fifty men, to attack the enemy's outposts, ten miles from this place, at the village of Mamaroneck; which was done, and their guards forced. We brought in thirty-six prisoners, a pair of colours, sixty stand of arms, and a variety of plunder besides. The party we fell in with was Colonel Rogers's, the late worthless Major. On the first fire, he skulked off in the dark. His Lieutenant and a number of others were left dead on the spot. Had not our guards deserted us on the first outset, he and his whole party must have been taken. On our side three or four were left dead, and about fifteen wounded; among the latter is Major Green, of the Second Virginia Regiment, wounded in the shoulder, and Captain Pope, who acted as Major, and behaved with great bravery, wounded in his leg; both likely to recover. As this was the first effort of the kind, and a plan of his Lordship's, he was so highly pleased with our succedd than he thanked us publicly on the parade.

Colonel Haslet to General Rodney.

November 12, 1776.

I received his Excellency's orders to take possession of the hill [Chatterton's Hill] beyond our lines, and the command of the Militia regiments there posted; which was done. We had not been many minutes on the ground, when the cannonade began, and the second shot wounded a militia-man in the thigh, upon which the whole regiment broke and fled immediately, and were not rallied without much difficulty. Soon after General McDougall's brigade took post behind us. Some of our officers expressed much apprehension from the fire of our friends so posted. On my application to the General, he ordered us to the right, formed his own brigade on the left, and ordered Brooks' Massachusetts Militia still farther to the right, behind a stone fence.

The troops being thus disposed, I went up to the top of the hill, in front of our troops, accompanied by Major McDonaugh, to reconnoitre the enemy. I plainly perceived them marching on the White-Plain, in eight columns, and stop in the wheat-fields a considerable time. I saw their General Officers on horseback assemble in council, and soon their whole body face about, and in one continued column, march to the hill opposite to our right. I then applied to General McDougall again to vary his disposition, and advised him to order my regiment farther onward, and replace it with Colonel Smallwood's, or order the Colonel forward, for there was no dependance to be placed on the Militia. The latter measure was adopted. On my seeing the enemy's march to the creek begin in a column of their main body, and urging the necessity of bringing our field pieces immediately forward to bear upon them, the General ordered one, and that so poorly appointed, that myself was forced to assist in dragging it along the rear of the regiment. While so employed, a cannon-ball strick the carriage, and

scattered the shot about, a wad of tow blazing in the middle. The artillerymen fled. One alone was prevailed upon to tread out the blaze and collect the shot. The few that returned made not more than two discharges, when they retreated with the field-piece. At this time the Maryland battalion was warmly engaged, and the enemy ascending the hill. The cannonade from twelve or fifteen pieces, well served, kept up a continual peal of reiterated thunder. The Militia regiment behind the fence fled in confusion, without more than a random, scattering fire. Colonel Smallwood in a quarter of an hour afterwards, gave way also. The rest of General McDougall's brigade never came up to the scene of action. Part of the first three Delaware companies also retreated in disorder, but not till after several were wounded and killed. The left of the regiment took post behind a fence on the top of the hill with most of the officers, and twice repulsed the Light Troops and Horse of the enemy; but seeing themselves deserted on all hands, and the continued column of the enemy advancing, we also retired. Covering the retreat of our party, and forming at the foot of the hill, we marched into the camp in the rear of the body sent to reinforce us.

Caesar Rodney to Colonel Patterson.

DOVER, November the 18th, 1776.

Sir: At the request of the members of Council and Assembly, delivered me by Mr. Collins, I sent to the care of Thomas McKean, Esq., in Philadelphia, by John Palmer, shallopman, sixty blankets and all the clothes of any kind whatsoever that could be procured here suitable for the Delaware battalion. They were packed in three hogsheads and accompanied with a letter to Mr. Whean. But as the collector of those articles had not then made me their return in proper order, I could not send them invoice and account of them. I have now enclosed you a general account of them and the charges thereon, all which I have presently charged to this Government as directed by Mr. Collins.

* * *

Yesterday and the day before, I had two letters from General McKenley, with copies of other letters enclosed, informing that a great number of vessels had sailed from New-York; that it was expected that they intended up Delaware, to pay Philadelphia a visit. On the receipt of this piece of intelligence I immediately issued and sent orders to all the Field Officers in this and Sisssex County, to see that their several battalions were immediately prepared, with their arms, accoutrements, &c. to march when and where they should receive orders for that purpose. This I did in discharge of my duty as commanding officer; but between you and I, I no more believe they are coming at this season of the year to attack Philadelphia than I believe they intend besieging the moon.

Gentlemen: I have just the pleasure of receiving yours of yesterday. I shall give the Deputy Quartermaster-General orders to have the clothing, both new and old, brought up to the Army, and have it distributed as it is most wanted; but you may depend, if the old clothes which have been so charitably contributed by the inhabitants of Philadelphia can answer the present necessities of the other regiments, that the new shall be all applied to the regiment particularly belonging to your State.

I am glad to find the Militia from the eastern parts of your Province, the lower parts of Jersey, and the Delaware Counties, are turning out with proper spirit. I hope, with their assistance, we shall be able to check the enemy, if they should still determine to pass the Delaware.

John M'Kinly to Committee of Kent County, Delaware.

WILMINGTON, the 19th of December, 1776.

Gentlemen: The branch of the Council of Safety for this County has met almost every day since their return from Dover. The business of their meetings has been principally to procure and provide for the marching of the Militia of this County, to reinforce the Army under General Washington. Several companies have already marched; several others are getting ready to march, and sundry others are expected very soon to follow their example. This business appears to be of such importance, and this critical and alarming situation of our affairs, as to require the closest attentions of the Council, and is likely to engage this branch for some considerable time longer. These considerations, as likewise that nothing material has happened since the last meeting of the General Council, as also that the meeting of the General Assembly is no near, have prevailed with the members of the Council in this County to resolve not to attend the proposed meeting at Dover, on the 23d instant; and I am ordered by them to inform you of their said resolution, and the real motives which induced them thereto, so as to prevent any misapprehension, trouble, or disappointment. I am further ordered earnestly to recommend that the most speedy and effectual measures be taken to procure and provide for as many as possible of the Militia of your County, to march and join in the American Army. As so much depends on a timely reinforcement for these purposes I have send this by express, who will likewise deliver to you a similar letter to the branch of this Council in Suzzes County, which I would request you would be pleased to forward by express as speedily as possible.

New-Castle County (Delaware) Committee.

Wednesday, December 21, A.M.

The Committee met according to adjournment.

Resolved, unanimously, That pursuant to an intimation given by the said Continental Congress, as well as from a full persuasion that a well regulated Militia, composed of the gentlemen, freeholders, and other freemen, is the natural strength and stable security of a free Government; therefore it is recommended by this Committee to such of the inhabitants of this County as are from sixteen to fifty years of age, that they assemble themselves on the second Tuesday in January next, at such places as shall be appointed by the Committees of their respective Hundreds, and then and there associate and enroll themselves into Companies of not less than fifty, nor more than seventy-five men, according as the several Districts will admit, and choose a Captain, two Lieutenants, an Ensign, four Sergeants, two Corporals, and one Drummer, for each Company; and use their utmost endeavours to make themselves masters of the military exercise. That each man be provided with a well fixed Firelock and Bayonet, half a pound of Powder, two pounds of Lead, and a Cartouch-Box or Powder-Horn, and Bag for Ball, and be in readiness to act on any emergency.

Resolved, unanimously, That the Committee of the respective Hundreds do divide the same into suitable Districts, as they severally will admit thereof.

Resolved, unanimously, That contributions from this County, for supplying the necessities and alleviating the distresses of our brethren in Boston ought to be continued in such manner and so long as their occasions may require; and that it is the duty of the Committee of Correspondence of the said County to collect and transmit the same as soon as possible.

Relying on your Friendship & Love of Justice I trouble you, to hand this to the Assembly, who (I think) won't dispute Payment, seeing they have already set the example by paying the Person above mentioned.

Gentlemen

I have according to your order Paid the Officers of the Delaware Regiment, the Present Granted them by your Honourable Houses, in Consideration of their Past services, Except Lt. Roche, and I do herewith Present the accounts & vouchers for your approbation.

I have Paid for the Cloth Taken by Coll. Pope from the Fulling Mills for the use of said Regiment, agreeable to your direction—Except Jacob Anderson, which Coll. Pope hath taken to Camp.——

Ellso. I have laid out the sum granted for Purchasing of Linens for the use of said Regiment, in Towlinen for *Overalls*, for the Soldiers as I found them Destitute of Breeches & Stockings, and have sent one sett, by Lieutt. Bennet, and expect to have the second made by the last of this month; I found abundance of Trouble & expence in geting the Linnen, by Reason of the Qr. Masters Deputys and the Ingrosers having got to Purchas before me, and their Perpetual Raising the Price, so that I had to send over the Sisquahanah, to get a sufficiency and by that means have got it Lower.

It hath not yet ben in my Power to get (if I had even cash) a sufficient Quantity of Fine Linnen, for the Officers; yet have Ingaged some, and seventy nine yards of Cloth (white) for Jacots and Breches, for them; and have Delivered some made, the Price to be for as is sold in Market, when I Pay for them.

I find the Officers in Extream want of Coats, stockings & shoes, and even shirts, Jackets & Breches, and without which, they must sink into Contempt with the other Officers of the Army; as their Pay Cannot Purchase them; but shall Refer to Coll: Papes Letter;—

I have had to advance 135£ to Purchase Binding, Trimings &c., for Hatts for said Regiment, a Number of which is don, and the Rest is making with Possable speed which I hope your Honourable Houses will approve, as the work could not so well go on without it, and as they are Delivered, he will Expect Pay, or a Larger Price.

It hath been a loss to this State, that I had not money to Purchase Shirting with, as the Price seems Dayly Rising: and Ingrossers verey Bussey. I find by Captn. Patten, that Two shirts of Home made Linnen for each soldier, will be sufficient for them untill next spring (Barring Accidents) which at the Present State of the Regiment, will take near Two Thousand yards; The cloth for their use, I apprehend may be got in this State, if set about Immediately, and it will ware Better, and Come Cheaper than Imported, as also the Cash being laid out amongst us will have its advantages.

I find that the Regiment hath *Suffered*, for want of Blankets, and had it not ben for the Cair of Captain Patten, in Detaining their Tents, must have ben in much worse Circumstances.

The Factory at New Ark being Broke up, will make the Purchasing of Shoes verey Dificult:

It would be of advantage to this State that Coll. Hall would send four or six of the best Taylors in his Regiment to assist in making the Clothes; I can have them Put under the Cair of Good Workmen that will take Cair of the Cloth, and it will make the Clothes come Cheaper; They might Draw Rations Willmington.

I have got Two Pieces of Brown Druget French from Coll. Darby, the Property of this Sta'e, but think it would be Best to sell them and those Remnants at Coll. Pope's.

It is almost Needless to mention the Necessity of Orders for a Large sum of Money to Provide the above Articles for the Regiment as your Honours will see by my accounts that their is none in my hands; and as to the sum it is not Easy to say what it should be, from the unhappy situation of our money; But I would be much Pleased If some way was Provided for me to be supply'd when out, and that the Public Buisness might not suffer.

Stockings is scarce and Dear.

I herewith Present a Letter & account from Lieutt. McKannon, when Wounded, If Either of your Honourable Houses, finds it Needful I shall Readily attend and Give any further Information Concerning the Regiment and supplying them that I am Possest of.

Dear Sir,

I received your last by Lieutenant Quenauault, by which I was informed it was out of your Power, to Settle my Acct of Expences in being detained by conducting the Cloathing for the Regiment from Wilmington to Camp, & exprest your sorrow therefore;

You promis'd me the laying it before the Honble House of Assembly at their next Meeting: I have not the least objection to this Measure, only could have wished a Remittance by you was in your Power, as the Cash expended in the above Service was borrowed, for the Payment of which I've been obliged to borrow from one of the Officers, an equal Sum, who now calls on me for it. I have scarce any Doubt but the Honourable House will order the Payment of it at first Sight: They have already generously allowed me One Acct. & I trust, upon a Reflection of the Insufficiency of my Pay & the Equity of this an Order will be passed in my favour, if so, you will please to receive it for me & send it me by the earliest Oppertunity, as I am in want of it, for the Reasons before mentioned. It gives me trouble to think of having Occasion to render such accmpts & could wish that Necessity did not dictate the propriety of the Measure.

We have no News here, but expect some shortly, as there is an order for the Generals & Officers Commanding Brigades to meet next week at his Excellency's Quarters, upon Business of the greatest Importance.

To Frans Wade late D Q M Genl—

Sir

Having Received Ten Thousand pounds, in part of the order Granted me for Fifteen Thousand pounds last December, by the Honorable Houses of Assembly, I Proceeded Immediately to Philadelphia, with the mainder of the Cloathing and there Purchased Stores, for the Officers in the Regiment, for the months of August, September & October, also some Fine Linnen Stockings & shoes, for their use and went on to Camp with those Cloathings & Stores—

When I arrived there, I found that a Number of those Gentlemen, were gone a Recruiting, and I apprehended it best, for Lieut. Roche, to Deliver their share of the Stores, to the officers present, in part of their next Three Months allowance; and that I would Pay the Gentlemen absent, for their shares, when I returned; But the Price of every Article was Raised to so Extravagant a Rate; with the distressing Depreciation of our money—and my not yet having Received the Remainder of said Order that it hath as yet put it out of my Power to pay them.

I was much Distressed to find that the Cloathier General of the United States could not supply the Regiment with that part of the Cloathing he Promised (as he had it not) and having Examined that the Cloathing was Delivered according to the Order of Congress, and got it Fixed that Lieutt. Roche, on my order, should Draw the Quota of Cloathing for our Troops, that might come into the Continental Stores, for this year; since which he hath Drawn a smalll Quantity,—yet are they still in want. of some Blankets & Overalls| I thought it my Duty to Return as soon as possible, as my staying there must be attended with great Expence to the State, there being no Proper Directions Given, either there, on the Road, or even in Philadelphia, for my Drawing Provisions for myself or Horse.

I herewith beg leave to Present the account of my Expences to Camp, allso my accounts of the Purchases made for the Delaware Regiment, and of the money put into my hands for the same; which I hope will meet with the approbation of your Honourable Houses.

Together with Lieutt. McKannon's account of his Expences when Going to Camp with Sodliers Cloaths, and his Letter to me on that Head: Allso Lieutt. Roche's account for Delivering out the officers stores.

And Sir, as Like Expences must Frequently attend such service I shall be much obliged to the Honourable General Assembly, for their Directions concerning the same.

Most of the Hatts for the officers are Ready; but some of the Tradesmen are not willing to Receive their Pay as agreed; But want the money made equal to what it passed for when they made agreement.

I must beg leave to mention, That the Regiment being wholly Depending on the State for Every Article of Cloathing, for the ensuing year. That this is the season, both to Purchase and have them *made* to prevent our being obliged to Give every man his Price, or Run the Risque of Going without them. I hope therefor that the Honourable Houses of Assembly will Please to Give me the Necessary Orders, that I may be Enabled to Compleat so Essential a Work in Time.

I herewith beg leave to Present to the Honourable Houses of Assembly an account of the Purchases of Cloathing for the Delaware Regiment made since my last in April.—The Scarcity of Cash has prevented my compleating the Officers Cloathing for the year 1779, and obliged me to get Goods on Credit for some of those Gentleman as they passed to the southward in lieu of a part of their Cloathing, and to Pay Cash to others;—The Prices being Calculated as I could then purchase at, and to get Watch Coats for some for the year 1780, which I have Paid out of the Cash last received.

Lieutt. Roche left with me One Hundred & Ninety Six Uniform Coats and ten Hatts much worn.—I delivered to Major Patton ten Coats for Recruits and four to Soldiers now come from Camp, which are all the Cloathing I have on hand.—Major Patton not having made a Return of the Cash I paid him by Order of the General Assembly, preventeth my Ascertaineth what Stores it purchased; but I apprehend it must have compleated them for the month of January last.—

I purchased four Shirts, four pairs of Linen Overalls and two pairs of Shoes for two Soldiers who remain'd in the State, by Order of his Excellency the President—

Gentlemen of the General Assembly,

I Last Evening received Intelligence from Capt. M'Kennan, commanding that Part of the Delaware Regiment which have been doing Duty in the Southern Army, that he is on his march to this State, and may be expected by the Twentieth Instant. Lieutenant Hyatt has been sent forward with this Information, and to assist in making Preparations for the Reception of those Troops. As I am not informed from any public Authority that they are destined for any Service immediately, it will be necessary that Provision and Quarters should be had and made for them forthwith, and therefore I recommend this Business to you. The Secretary will lay Capt. M'Kennan's Letter before you; and should the General Assembly wish to be further informed of the Numbers and Condition of the returning Troops, Lieutenant Hyatt will attend them. As the other Part of the Delaware Regiment is quartered in the City of Philadelphia, I think it right to transmit the Account of the Advance of those under Capt. M'Kennan to the Secretary at War, or this State's Delegates in Congress, that I may certainly know whether Quarters for the Winter or only temporary Ones ought to be provided for them in this State; but of this Measure I shall be glad to know the Sense of the General Assembly.

The Minister at War has enform'd Capt Moore, & myself, that immediately on the Arrival of the Pennsylvania Troops (which will be in ten Days at farthest) our Detachment must march down to the Delaware State: the General likewise requested us, to enform your excellency, that Preparation might be made; & a Place appointed for our Reception—This Place is now much crowded, and in the course of a few Days there will be more Pennsylvanians' than the Barracks can possibly hold, consequently our Quarters must be very disagreeable; we shall therefore be extreamly oblig'd to your Excellency, for your Orders as soon as possible.

Capt. Moore wuo presents this will enform your Excellency of every particular.

Sir

Your favour dated the 6th to hand Just now observe the contents, and Mrs. Hollands Situation. I bleive as you say, the acts I have and well know her Demand, but the Situation of the funds, in my oppinion was never in so bad away, as to promiseing an order on Mr Bryan I do not think I did.

The Situation of the Delaware Regt. & to the Public in my oppinion every method should be used to have them immediately dischargd and without some money to give them at that time, point the Issue &c—

The Commissary, that I employd. is now above £300, due him and says he must quit as his stock is run out sent him to Collo. Bryan for cash, his answer was he had none, nor expected none this 2 mo. I have since furnishd him to go on; with my own private cash for fear of the consequences. Mr. Vining has about £300 this I intend, for the Commissary and Mr. Perry, by last accts none. I must have £1200 for the Troops as being about 2 mo. pay to enable to discharge them and get up the Financirs notes, if that sum I had they should not remain 3 days as an expence, the paymaster may I sepose now, be also ready to settle with them next week, but for want of the cash, they will not be dischargd. Therefore on the above representation and within Mrs Holland must wait, and soon as that business is compleated she may depend on every thing in my power.
