DANIEL RODNEY'S DIARY.

Mr Alex Stewart has request^d from Mr Saunders and other Pilots informⁿ relative to the number of shal^{ws} the alteratⁿ if any in the shoals near the Cape &c—As the Pilots are so often in the City, an are not much in the habit of writg, some of the answers to the quest^{ns} prop^d could be obtained there In Lewes Creek there are 10 or 12 Coasters, most of them owned about Ind River, in the Shingle trade from Suffolk to Phil & N. York and abt the same number of River Shallops and Pilot Boat belongg to Lewes—The next Creek B Kill has abt 20 that trade to the City—Egg Harbor, &c

The Survey of the Shears and adjacent Shoals made by Captⁿ Hewit some years ago, is thot to be correct, and no alteration is known to have taken place since

Col. McClane, the Collector is supposed to have obtained a good survey of the Brandy^e where the Light is now established, and also of the Brown, Cross Ledge &c where Light Boats and Buoys have long been anchored

I recd some time in Jan^y some of the memor^{ls} in favor of the Breakwater near the Cape, which were promptly attend^d to and sent to Mr Johns our Rept at Washingⁿ

It is probable Congress will make an appropⁿ, sufficient at least to author^e the commencement of the Work

If they should, the great question for the Merchants and others to decide will be where to begin it—I have conversed with Pilots and others on that subject, who think the situatⁿ in the Cove near the Pitch of the Cape will not answer, for several reasons—When the ice is making with the Wind at N. W & N. N. W as it generally does—it lodges in the Cove and fills it entirely when the Road is clear—and even the Shore above the Whale Boat landing

2nd Vessels in the night, in thick weather, or in Easterly Storms would not run on a lee shore, in the Breakers and risk getting in this harbour, where they could not anchor, nor fetch out to sea again

There are other reasons that appeal to me to exclude this situation tho I would not set up my Opinⁿ ags^t that of others, who may be more interes^d, or better qualif^d to form a correct Judgement—This harbour recover^d by Gen Bund &c would be but a half mile from the Bar in the Cove—I am persuaded it would fill up with mud—I remember the British Sloop of War Brach* was upset inside the Cape, in a squall, the next year 1798, the Hind Frigate and a Schooner from Halifax attempted to raise her, but failed, I was on board the Frigate with C. Bennett, and they ascertained the fact as they told me that the Brig was filled with mud—

Another situation is that proposed by Captⁿ Hewit on the inside the Shears, this I should consider much preferable to the first, tho objections would be made to it, that it is too far off the Road, or Shore,

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and too bleak and exposed to Winds coming from the sea, as well as to N. W Winds ranging down from Mispillion, and would consequently lose the advantage of the natural Harbour, referred to by the Engineer, in all Winds coming off the Land from S E. to N. W.

If those two situations should be abandoned the 3^d that has been suggested would be a little outside the Pilot Boats roadstead, so as to secure 4½ or 5 fathom or so much as may be thought sufficient for the largest ships of War to haul in occasionally

This Site would be about N. N. E. from Lewes, would be in the best holding ground—would be generally free from ice, would not cost much if any thing more than Captⁿ Hewits estimate, unless it should be made more capacious, and what is of great importance, could be found, or approached in thick and Tempestuous weather with more safety than any other, by taking soundings round the Shears when the Light House could not be seen

From my acquaintance with you, and knowing you to be interested in any measures that may improve the navigation of the Delaware, I have taken the Liberty, of furnishing those hints some of which may be found useful in commencing a work of such importance—If it should not be too troublesome I shall thank you to mention to Mr Stuart what I have said in relation to inquiries of John Saunders Senior Pilot, I have also talked with W^m Marshall Senior and Jas. West and some other Pilots on this subject—You will please to mention also to Mr Ralston what I have said in relation to the Memorial which he directed to my care

Our Citizens are all anxious that this work should succeed and most of them signed it

I presume the Chamber of Commerce have Captⁿ Hewits survey—or it may be purchased in the City, it is certainly the best we have ever had of our Shore, and Road, the Shears &c up to Boyds Shoal, it was done from actual survey, by an able hand, and should be preserved

I suppose Mr John Leamy the Merchant is still living, I recollect in the Winter of 83-4 He came from Cadiz in a Ship—Capt Cole it was a cold Winter and calm, this ship (with 15 or 20 others driving in the ice) 3 miles to the S of the Cape drove ashore, landed her cargo in good Order, and the ice took her off again without injury—4 years before this was the hardest Winter we ever had since my memory and no ice was seen in the Bay, the Wind continued 5 weeks at W. N. W. and blew the ice to sea as it made, so that a ship could have laid in our road all Winter perfectly smooth and safe

1813. March 14. Sunday a British Ship of the Line came in and anchored opposite Lewes.

Monday a Frigate and a Tender came in and all anchored below the Brown 7 or 8 mile from Lewes, this day they took a Ship, sent her out, a Schooner and two Sloops, also sent two Boats and ran a Shallop of Sam^l. Paynters on shore at plumb point also one of Jⁿ Smiths, Cap. Robins, the last of which they burnt. The Town of Lewes was alarmed and the Whale Boat sent down, and near 100 men on the Cape to keep the boat of.

Tuesday 16 March 1813 this morning a Schooner from Charleston loaded with Cotton & Rice anchored close in with the bar. Pilots

went on board and carried her over the bar at Lewes Creek. flats were sent down and got out some Cotton, 2 four Pounders, there baggage &c upwards of 100 men from Lewes also went down to her. the British Ships sent 4 of thier boats, and after a sharp engagement with 1 four pounder and small arms, the British succeeded in burning the Schooner—for more than 3 Weeks there has been a Guard kept of 12 men and for the last 3 nights from 20 to 30.

the Schooner that was burnt was the Fancy. Cap. Denton of Philadelphia

Wednesday 17th March 1813 on Monday last an Express was sent to the Governor Haslet requesting him to send a Detachment of Militia to Lewes, and last eveng another Express to send us some Powder, and Ball, which we hear had been procured in Milford—I sent for a Keg of Powder yesterday to Geo. Robinson—We have yet had no supply from our own or U. S. Govern^t except the musquets, and cartridges, that came last Sum^r all our preparations, and services performed here have been at the expence of the inhabitants who are now preparing to throw up some batt^s for defense of the Town—this eveng 15 or 20 of the Militia from Millsborough came in and Dav^d Paynter, John Parker and afterwards Jn^o West were app a committe to procure provisions, houses &c for the men, and to keep an acct of their expences, and of building the batteries, the attend^s of the men &c

Captn^s Davis, and Rodney app^d to Superintend build the Batteries &c—G. McCrachen, and John Ware to have charge of the Magazine—the Express to the Gov^r ret^d with 4 kegs of Powder and a letter to Coll Hall that he had ord the whole of Sussex Militia out, part of Kent & a Troop from N. C.

Thurs^y 18 An alarm last night by Sam Maulls firing his piece at Pilot Town—the Pilot Boat Tender came with a flag of Truce this day at 12—They were met by Cap Davis Cap. Rodney & Mitchel Derickson bore the Flag—on the beach Opps^t Pilot Town, 50 men under Arms escorted them to the Cape, where they remained—the flag rec^d an Officer and Letter from Adm^l Sir J. B. Beresford of the Poictiers 74 directed to the C. Magistrate of Lewes requested a supply of 25 Bullocks and a proportionate quantity of vegetables and hay—and if he refused he should adopt measures to Destroy the Town—in the afternoon Cap Davis, and Rodney met the flag again and gave for answer that we could not comply and that we had sent express to the Governor but had not rec^d an answer from him

Friday 19th Gen. Fisher, Coll Painter, Major Harris, Cullen, and Waples—with 11 Companies arrived—heard nothing from the fleet except that they took a ship & sloop—express to and from Gov^r Haslet ans^r that his family were unwell. Coll Hall went to Gov^r found him in Milford

Satur^y 20 Last night acct^s by Pilots from Philad^a that a land^s was made at Morris River, and a single house burnt some sheep &c taken—express Sent by the Gen^l with a pressg request for the Gov^r to attend this morn^g answer that he could not attend before Mon^y

A Ship and brig, also two Schooners Captured but supposed to be Licensed or Neutrals

Saty 20 This day employed in the Batteries &c

11 Companys came in say 500 men—alarm at night in consequence of one of the Tenders com^g to Creeks Mouth

Sunday 21st Friday, Saturday and Sunday 1000 of the Militia have arrived those three days viz. Coll Kershaws, Coll Longs Coll Paynters and Cap. Adams from Milford—10 Oclock were alarmed by 2 or 3 Rockets discharged we suppose from a boat near the bar, came over the Creek, one descended near the shore Apst Longs house, the other passed over the white house, and fell in my field or Batsons.

the Troops amt^g to 1500 were formed &c

22nd Mon^y the Governor came down, the Militia formed to meet him, consist^g of 1500 men viz. Coll Wilson 1 Battalion, Paynter, Longs and Kershaws Reg^t—a Troop of Sussex horse and Captⁿ Harringtons Troop from Kent, escorted him, arrangements were made to discharge a part of the Troops—

Tu 23^d The 3 Regim^{ts} and 2 Troops Horse were paraded and Reviewed by Gov^r Hazlet and 6 or 700 without arms dismissed. A letter was agreed on and sent with a flag by the Gov^r under the care of Cap. Davis, Majors Waples, and Cullen who ret^d at 10 Oclock with an answer from the Commodore Vindictory of the measures he threatened, and persisting in the same—The Lights were this night discontinued by order of Secy Gallatin to A Hargess, dated the 18th

The Militia were all discharged except 330 or 40 Volunteers, including the inhabitants of Lewes—Warners N. C. Troop—& Shanklands Sussex Troop of Horse say 30 or 40

Wed 24 The Poictiers and Belvidere went to sea in the afternoon. Another ship seen off, and Schooner ran ashore near the Light House. Gov^r H. ret^d Home ys afternoon

Thur 25th A Spanish Schooner from Havanna with Coffee, Sugar Tobacco and Cocoa ran on near the Pitch last night. the cargo will be saved in good Order—Coll Paynter, Maj^s Cullen & Hill Gen Fisher, his aid Mr. Wells, & General Green remain here with the detachment.

Frid^y 26 Ships not ret^d from sea—nothing material occurred

Sat. 27 The Governor dismissed Cap Adam's Comp of Milford—G. Fisher, Mr Wells, Major Hill, Gen Green & M Cullen ret^d home. the Tender Paz took the Montesquieu Cap Wilson 28 men out—went round Cape Horn &c to Canton & ret^d by Cape G. Hope with a cargo of Tea & Silk say 3 or 400000\$ heard nothing of War till taken 7 miles from the Cape

Sun 28th Cap Warners Troop dismissed by Gov. and Coll Paynters. Gov^r ret^d home last wy C Pay—this morning Coll Davis remains in comm^d—Captⁿ Hunter of the Horse promoted to Major of Horse by the Gov^r

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Span Ship with 2100 bls flour bound out—and also Paz in the Road—in the afternoon the Poictiers with the prize, Montesquieu came in and anchored below the Brown—the Span Ship & Schooner Paz joined them there

Mon 29th A Boat from the Span Ship Jno Bapt came in shore with a note to comg officer signed by the Com^r with the mate and son of Span Cap for his papers which had been given by the Com^r of the Paz, to Cap Wilson—the papers were sent off—at 11 Oclock A. M a flag with Cap Wilson, Major Hunter, Doct^r White, Ho^{ra} Davis was sent to the Poictiers by Coll Davis at Cap Wilson's request, as tis said, to endeavor to Ransom the Montesquieu

Tues 30 Flag retd report that the Com^e will accept \$180,000 as Ransom for the Montesquieu

Wed 31 Gov^r Gen^l Fisher, Green, Mr Wells &c came to Town yesterday Belv^e & Tender off the Cape this morn^g The squadron has a shingle loaded Sch^r supposed to be Marvel along side. Belvd returned

Thursdy Apl 1st Gen^l Green, Wells, Cullen, and Hill went Home this day. A Boat with a flag was sent by the Gov^r with Maj^r Hunter & Cap Harrington at the request of Mr Guire & the Supercargo of the Span Schooner to obtain permission to get her off the Beach and take the Cargo to Philad^a which request was granted—the Com^e informed the Officers on board he wanted water and must have it somewhere, also that he had a message prepared to send on shore, but should postpone it a few days.

Friddy Apl 2 Two alarms last night 1 abt 9 or 10 Oclock by a Trooper, young Loockerman, from seeing a flat in the Creek which he supposed was En. Boats appg. 2^d 11 Oclock by one of the Guards Muskets having been accidentally discharged on the Cape

Saty Apl. 3^d 1813 Schooner Paz went out & Pilot B came in has been we suppose to Chest^r

Sun 4th Two Boats seen along shore last night by the Watch A flag sent off this morn^g by Captⁿ Wilson respectg the Montesque Major Waples came in last evening

Mon. 5. Sugar Coffee &c the Cargo of Span Schoon^r Anⁿ Maria sold this day amtg to 15 or 18000\$

Tues. 6th Ap^l The Poictier &c sent her boats in the forenoon and put buoys on the Shears, in the afternoon Belvedere 2 Sloops, Pilot Boat and several Ships Boats came down anchored close in to Lewes fired 2-32lb shot over the Town, and sent a flag renewing their Demand of the 16 ult.—it was agⁿ refused

Cap Biron then sent a flag to request the womⁿ & children to be removed, the cannonade then commenced and contind till 10—their shot pitched beyond the Town and did but little Damage—firing ceased untill day light—

Wed^y 7th When it again began and cont^d 5 or 6 last night The firing of Bombs 12, 18, & 32 Shot and Rockets till 1 O'clock in which time 537 shot were sent ag^t the Town 6 or 8 Bombs and 2 or 3 Cong^r Rockets—Gen^l Fisher ordered Major Harris' Battalion out, the Gov^r, Coll Paynter &c arrived in the eveng—

Thurs^y 8th The Ship and Tenders hauled off, a number of Houses were damaged by their Cannonade yesterday tho no lives were lost—the Houses that Suffered most were P. H—Geo. P—Jno Ry^s—E. T.—

Friday 9th Wrote to Mr Bayard Chairman of the Committee of Safety Wilmingⁿ with an account of the Cannonade of Tu & Wed^y—and request^{sg} them to interest themselves in procuring from Com^e Murray, or Gov^t 6 heavy Cannon & 2 field pieces with a supply of Amⁿ

Sat^y 10 Captⁿ Dills Company of 51 men came in from Kent—Coll Davis at the Shifs request detached Cap Kolloch and 20 men to attend the Execution of Henry Brereton & — Griffin on Tuesday next at Geo Town—for the murder of — Ridgell of Carolina.

Sunday 11th A Gale at N. E.—above 300 Cannon Balls beside Bombs & Rockets were picked up in Town since the Cannonade, 40 or 50 of which were 32lb—

Monday 12 Flanagan's boat came down with a flag brot Coll Sterret, aid to Gen^l Bloomfield, and informed he had brot 180000S down to ransom the Montesq, also pilots and crews to take said Ship up to Philad^a

Tues^y 13th The Montesq went up the Bay—Brereton and Griffin were hanged this day at Geo. Town ab^t 12 O'clock a great concourse of People attended from this and the adjoining Counties.

Wednes^y 14th one of the Sloops that had been employed in the cannonade of Lewes was seen drifting down the channel full of water & her mast gone except the Stump, a boat came down with her, and with the Tender Paz, was observed to anchor outside the Cape. Col Davis & Major Hunter ordered on the Cavalry and Captⁿ Dills Company, to prevent their landing to destroy the Light House (at 9 O'clock) Cap Dills comp^y was marched up without cartridges, and were detained a $\frac{1}{4}$ or $\frac{1}{2}$ an hour before Jno Saunders, who had the key, could be found—They saw no enemy and ret^d ab^t 12 O'clock. the wreck came ashore before they returned

15 Thurs^y Captⁿ Harrington's Troop left Leyes on their return to Kent County

16 Friday Nothing of consequence occurred—from the best calculation there is 140 Houses within the bounds of Lewes, upwards of 20 of which will average ab^t \$2000 each, 20 small \$100 ea. 50 at 1000 & 50 at 500 amt^g at this estimate to \$117000 and containing 150 families & 1000 inhabitants also 3 places of Public Worship say 5000—total 122000

Sat^y 17th of Apl 1813 The Belvidere and a Brig came in this morning 9 O'clock and anchored with the Poictiers—Coll Painter and Coll Davis requested the Brigadier Gen to call out one Comp^y from ea of Coll Longs, Wilsons and Kershaws Reg^t to supply the place of three comp^{ys} whose time has expired—Coll Painter also rode up to the Governor to prevail on him to adopt some expeditious plan to get the Guns and amⁿ from Gen^l Bloomfield which Mr Boyd informed us had been promised if the Gov^r would find a conveyance for them in the Gun Boats or otherways

Sund^y 18 The Gov^r and Coll Painter came to Lewes

East^r Mon 19th The Paz and 5 Barges came down in chase of a Schooner that escaped to sea—ab^t 10 O'clock the Schooner Spencer, Capt Moss 40 days from France came into the Road, sent her Boat, was informed the ships were En and that 7 boats and the Tender Paz was com^g down. She was advised to put to sea and end^r to get to N York—made sail with a good Breeze at S. near High Water she soon distanced the Boats that were 4 or 5 miles to Leward and the Poictiers called them back.

Our Whale Boat with 8 Pilots left Lewes for Philad^a to Pilot the Gun Boats and assist in getting the 32 pounders from Philad^a which the Governor sent an order for on Gen Bloomfield

Tu. 20th The Term of one Month for which 3 Comp^{ys} of the Troops volunteered having this day expired—many of them returned home—Major C. Comegys M Sykes, C. Onions and Captⁿ Bell came down to obtain a flag to go to the Poictiers to treat for the ransom of a Sloop of Captⁿ Bells taken on Friday in Duck Creek and a small boat of Capt Onions taken at the same time—They expect to go on board tomorrow

The Belvid has two sloops & came down and anchored opposite Town Cap Laws with 18 Horse & Cap Polk with ab^t 30 Grened^s came in Town—likewise Capt Short from Dagsbur^y with 50 men

Wed^y 21st Blowing hard at S. W. Major Comegys &c could not go off with the flag

Thurs 22^d Another Sloop dismasted came drifting down from the Squadⁿ will soon go on shore outside the Cape I suppose.

No Guard last night at fort till Miler &c volunteered

This day received a letter from Gen^l Gurney informing that Com^e Murray had put 4 Eighteen pounders on board a Schooner to be conveyed down by 5 Gun Boats to D Creek or Mpillon and thence by land to Lewes

Cap Dill bore the flag to Com B. today Maj^r Comegys Ja^s. Sykes & Jno Bell sitters. Cap Onions and Pilot Rowers None but Cap Dill admitted on board, did not succeed in ransoming her. Ja^s Stout was on board—went off with a private flag to ransom his Sloop

Fridy 23 A Comp^y of men from Kershaws reg^t came in last night—Belvid and Paz still out—Gun boats with 4 Guns at Duck Creek not determined how low they will come down—500 lbs Powder arrived this evening

2 negro men yesterday ran away from Coll Wood & Primrose to Poitiers it is supposed

Sat 24—Jacob Stout came into the bar in his sloop which he had ransomed—wanted provisions—was brot over and detained untill the Governor's opinion was taken whether he should proceed home or not on acct of his having been off to the Squadron with a private or unauthorized flag to ransom his Shallop—Thursday last a boat said to be under a flag went in to Little Creek to obtain provisions

Mr Phillips, Masters Mate. or Lieutenant of the Poitiers and Capt Prior of the Pilgrim sd to be a prisoner on board were taken at Little C Landing, sent down to the Governor, and from thence to Lewes. They are at Mrs Orrs

Sunday 25 The Gov^r sent Lieut^s McClement & Loockerman to the Poitiers with a message respecting the prisoners—the Come replied that he consid^d the flag at the mast head of the Schooner Pilgrim protected the Boat that went into Little Creek, that Prior was paroled to get provisions for the prisoners on board but that he blamed the officer for taking arms with him.

The boat brot 40 Dolls for Mr Phillips and a trunk of Clothes—also some papers for Mr Stout

Mon^y 26 Cap Farbell who came from Dover arrived here on Sat^y with his wife and two children pretended he was of the Navy and formerly command^d the John Adams left Yesterday—he was suspected to be an Imposter and Swindler of the name of Twibell—Some Horse were sent after him and he was bro^t to Lewes this morning

The British Landed yesterd^y morn^g at Mispilⁿ killed 12 or 15 head of Cattle, and took them off—were at Coll Woods House—as supposed—

One of the 18th field pieces came in this eveng to the Battery 3 more are on the way from Smyrna with apparatus 25 sett of Harness 3600 W^t Cannon 600 lb of fine Powder and 600 shot with a quantity of Grape

The Sloop Black Duck belonging to J Stout was siezed yesterd^y by A Hargess on acct of 2 Boxes of Oranges and 4 or 5 of Salt which he says he found on board she was taken into B Kill and Mr Stout and his 2 men ret^d without her—Stout and his two men were taken in custody on their stepping on shore and had no opportunity of making an entry if necessary

Tues^y 27 Preparation was making to fire the 18^{lb} field piece at a hh^d at the request of the Gov^r I waited on him and suggested the impropriety of firing till the other three arrive and that the County would be alarmed &c. upon which he agreed to suspend it.

Coll Long rec^d orders from the Gov^r to call out 150 of the Detach^d Militia, and issue orders for Cap Burton, Cap Kollock and Cap Wrights Comp^s to repair forthwith to Lewes—Gov^r Hunter-Leonard &c left Lewes also Cap Prior and Mr Twibell were taken along towards Philada, by Cap Harringtons Troop. Mr Phillips Masters Mate of the Poitiers will I hear remain under Coll Davis direction Cap Shorts Comp^y returned home except 8 men without orders

Wed^y 28 Doctr Wiltbank took a challenge, it is said from S. Davis pilot to Jas McIlvaine who did not accept it but challenged the Doctr—who with his second atten^d at the time and place—McIlvaine did not appear

Mr Swartout with 2 boats a waggon and 3 or 4 men came down this eveng with his torpedos—how he will succeed I cannot say but I have no confidence in the scheme

Thurs^y 29th Met Mr Philips, the Officer of the Poitiers on parole, between Mrs Orrs and W^m Lanks, says he was born in Greenock, left school at 15 & went to sea—Com Beresford a year or two younger than Gen^l was born in Dublin

Captⁿ Dill's Comp^y is preparing to leave Lewes tomorrow, after which there will not be 50 men in Town besides the inhabitants, till the arrival of Coll Longs detachment.

Belvidere returned to her Station at 1 O'clock

Frid^y 30th Ap^l Belvid & a Pilot Boat went to sea.

Cap Dill, Liet Alex Mc Clement, Ensign Tho^s Payne with their Comp^y of 50 men and a waggon after serv^g 31 days returned Home.

Coll Long rode to Milton to meet the Gov^r Gen^l Fisher &c—his orders to call out 150 men to Lewes was countermanded, but afterwards the Gov^r & Officers present agreed to take the responsibility on themselves provided Coll Long chose to call them out.

5 comp^{ys} of 100 men ea 2 of them artillery, were ordered by the Gen^l Gov^r through the Gov^r to repair to New Castle under the Com^d of Coll Long, and none having been ordered to Lewes the Governor &c sent an express to Gen^l Bloomfield representing the propriety and necessity of send^g some of the drafted Militia to Lewes, there being but abt 50 men there

Saturday May 1st 1813 The Paz came in, and a few, say 10 or 12 of Cap Wrights Comp^y

Sunday 2^d May. A ship came in last night which I suppose is a store ship from Bermuda or a Cartel from Phila to Jamaica, and a Shallop set adrift from the Poitiers friday came ashore tow^{ds} the Creeks mouth.

Tues^y 4th May Two ships, I suppose a frigate & Sloop of War came in this even^g and anchored by the Poitiers. Gov^r ret^d Home.

Wed 5th May. A flag from the Squadron in the Com^e Brig called "Death" came on shore to bring Major Peterkin who went off from

Milford with Mr Primrose to recover his negro that ran away with Coll Woods, the Com^e said he was authorized to give them up, but if Primroses boy was willing. The Officer that he expected to relieve him would let him go ashore. The boy objected to returning.

A flag has been down from Mr Barclay the consul at Phil^a to obtain permission for the Neptune to pass to Russia with an Embassy but Sir Jno objected till his Officer Mr Phillips was ret^d to him—

The two ships that came in yesterday were the Spartan frigate, and Martin Sloop of War—

Thur May 6th The Spartan, and Martin went to sea. Captⁿ Ingram, Cap. Jones, and a part of Lieut Hills Comp^y came in yesterday and Cap. Elliotts today.

Fri. May 7th The Spartan, & Martin at anchor this day to the South of the Cape—

Sat 8th Poict^{rs} alone in the Bay—on their last we hear the British burnt Geo. Town on Sasafra and last week they burnt French Town and took the Packets.

Sun^y 9th May This morn^g Lieut Lavert with a flag brot a Letter from Com B, inclosing a Let to him from Mr Walker agent for the exchange of prisoners in Philad^a of the 6th a letter from Gen^l Bloomfield to Com^e and a letter or List of exchange of Mr Shields Masters Mate of the Vicar for Mr. Phillips and also included 6 other officers and 12 or 15 men which Sir J^{no} had d^d and rec^d but as Coll Davis had not yet rec^d an order from Gen Bloomfield he answered that he would immediately send or deliver Mr Phillips upon rec^t of s^d order

Mon^y 10th May The Poictiers went to sea yesterday, the 3 ships lay outside the Cape last night 150 men and a field piece was sent down to prevent their taking water out of Newbolds pond but they did not land and were out of sight this morning—Cap^t Jno Kollock and Cap J^{no} Booths companies of Detached Militia came in last even^g one of 70 men the last of 50 which are to me made up 100 each—The Gov^r came yesterday he told me he rec^d acc^t of the exchange of Mr Phillips on friday. Sat^y he could not send down orders to deliver him and Sun he did not get to Lewes till the even^g Gen Green and Major Peterkin also came—the Torpedo boats were moved from the Church Yard, and our Whale boats went off to take up the Buoy of the Brown &c—no ship or Tender in sight—

Mr Greenfield it is said took Mr Phillips to Geo Town.—each were Disguised or changed clothes.

Tu 11th May A flag with Mr Phillips set off & put him on Board the Spartan Capt Brenton, the Ship Neptune, with Mr Bayard, Galatin our Ambass^{rs} went out this day bound to St Petersb^g to endeavor to negotiate a peace with En—

Ing^m, Jones, Warrington and Elliotts Comp^{ys} of Militia were discharged today—

Gov^r went home yesterday after ordering a Court Martial to try Cap Jones & Cap Ingram.—the flag returned and brot from the Spartan

Cap^{tn} Denton a prisoner, on parole and S. Flanagan a Pilot that came down in the Neptune Mr Phillips was left on board.

Wed^y the 12th The force here now consists of Cap Kollocks & Booth's Comp^s of Detach^d Militia abt 150 men, Cap Polk's say 40 or 50 Cap Greshams & Hollands say 100 and Cap Laws Troop say 20—

The Comiss^{rs} viz^t An Barratt—Jas. Black and Edw^d Dingle Esq^{rs} app^d by the Legislature to adjust the accts for Services and expenses at Lewes, were to have met this day Mr. Barratt only attended—

A Court of enquiry sat yesterday on Cap W^m Jones and today on Cap Anthony Ingram by order of the Gov^r

A ship came in to the Squadron this eveng and anchored said to be the—— Cap Davis left Lewes—— Cap Loughton a native of Rho Island who was taken out of a Spanish Vessel which was taken and sent by the Spartan to Bermuda, came on shore yesterday, he was a week or two on board and says the Spartan has a scant complement of men—

Gen^l Green at the request of the Gov^r ordered the arrest of Mr —— Greenfield who belonged to Capⁿ Harringtons Troop—for taking Eng Officer from Lewes to George Town on Monday last—

Thurs^s 13th May The Gover^r wrote last evening to Gen Green that he had rec^d orders to call out the residue of the Detached Militia which orders he should bring to Lewes with him tomorrow—the 1st Battⁿ not yet made up Quere. Whether the Court Ordered by the Gov^r to consist of Coll Paynter the Com^r of this Port and 4 Cap^{ns} to try Cap Jones on Tu, and a Court of inquiry to try Cap Ingram yesterday is legal or Correct—Also whether Mr Greenfield not being on service can be tried by Martial Law—especially without 10 days notice.

Frid^y 14th 1813 Coll Long ret^d yester^y from it. Castle informs that the Compan^{ys} of Cap Bennett and Cap Gibbs amt^g together to 100 men were inspected by Gen^l Duane—that he did not expect the Troops at Lewes would be inspected or taken into Pay untill the complement of 200 were made up—

Sat^y May 15th 1813 This morning a Swedish or Danish Schooner from Carthegenas S. Am with Hides and Fustick parted her Cables near the Spartan, and came on shore oppos^t Lewes, had a british crew on board which was taken out by the Frigate when she parted—The above Schooner is call^d the Adolpus Capt Richard Beal from Carthagena Bd to N. York—this evng Gen^l Green brot a Letter from Post Office addressed to Coll Davis from Gen Armstrong which came by mail Thurs^y

Sund^y 16th Gov^r and Major Peterkin came down with Order^s from Sec^y of War to call out in case of emergency another Battalion of Detach^d Militia

Monday 17th This day the Troops here have been in great disorder occasioned by the Conduct of the Recruits. A flag was sent off to obtain permission of Cap Brenton to ship 6 or 7 hands on board the Span. Sch. Anna Maria to assist in taking her to Philad. the sailors having refused to go in her because the Cap threat^d to put them on board the En. Man of War—The Gov^r left Town this even^g after having issued Orders for the residue of the Militia detached to repair to New Castle & Lewes The first requisition is not yet made up, reported, or received by the U. States tho orders were rec^d by the Governor 1st of this month

Tues^y 18th Commiss^{rs} Doct^r Dingle and Mr Barratt met agreeably to their appt—Ja^s. R. Black came Wed 19th Two frigates are now off the Cape and 1 Sloop of War The Anna Maria sailed this day for Phil^a and a Whale Boat with Purnel &c and a Canoe with three men that left their Brig from La Guira to Baltim^e in East River Chesapeake—Coll Long arrived here yesterday

Wed 19th The two frigates and 1 Sloop hove up and stood to sea, the wind blowing hard to the N. E.

Coll Long came in yesterday and will sett off in the morning for N. C. to report the 350 men app^t Staff Officers &c as he supposes—

Gov^r came down this day to meet the Comiss^{rs} &c

A Recruiting Lieutenant who has behaved unruly and made several attacks on the Officers and men of the Garrⁿ was bound to the Peace by W^m Wolfe Esq and for want of surety went to Gaol last night—he was an Ensign called Smith son of Geo. Smith Vendue Cryer Phila

Thurs 20 No Ships in sight—Gov^r here—and Commiss^{rs} sitting—a part of Cap Burtons comp^y came in yesterday

Friday 22nd Gov^r ret^d home—no ships in sight. Commiss^{rs} sitting

Sat 22^d Gov^r came down—do————do——

Comss^{rs} adj^d to meet on Mon^y next at Dover—all the Militia were discharged except 12 or 15 for the fort and ab^t that number of Cap Shankl^{ds} Troop were ordered out by the Gov^r two or three days ago—

Sun^y 23^d The Spartan came in, has been out since Tues^y last—also the Martin or another Ship.

Mon 24 Nothing Material except that a number of the 2nd Requesⁿ came in.

Tu 25th The two frigates only in the bay (yestr^y Mr Hudson p^d me 30/ for flat to that time, she is below with wood for Johnson & Harris, an oar broke, and Rails lost)

Wed 26th One of the Ships exercising her men by firing at a target today 10 Oclock—about 400 men in Town in Koll^{ks} Booths, Burtons, and Reddins Comp^s Shankland ab^t 10 or 12 Troopers, and 33 men kept by the Gov^r at fort

This day I paid Geo. Robinson twenty dolls for a Keg of Powder which I got of him the 17th of March last for Public use and which is allowed the Commiss^{rs} in my bill—

Thur 27th The Whale boat ret^d from Phila with the Crew that went up in Span Schooner and the other Boat with Rich^d Bebe &c ret^d from Smyrna—

Fri 28 Another frigate came in—the force now is supposed to be the Spartan, and Statira frigates & Martin Sloop—and also one ship off—

Sat 29th One of the ships supposed to be the Martin has gone up the Bay out of sight—

Sund^y 30th Coll Long came down last even^g—saw Gen Bloomfield at Dover who I hear told him he had no command for him there being but 300 men at N. Castle and 300 at Lewes which should be com^d by Majors—

Major Comegys ret^d home this morning—is to come to Lewes again this day week—and Coll Long to remain in his stead—Coll Davis arrived here yesterday who is to raise *it is said* 300 twelve Mo. men—to be kept here

Mon^y 31st Gresham, Lentner, &c who expect Comss^{rs} from the U. States, are endeav^{rs} to enlist men and have made great uneasiness among the detach^d Militia

The Martin Sloop that went up the bay with a Tender Sat^y last ret^d with two Brigs, a schooner & 4 or 5 Shallops

Tu June 1st This morn^g the Spartan & Statira sent some of their Barges to the Pitch, set a Sloop on fire which they had taken, and one of the frigates got under weigh stood to sea, and ret^d again with a Brig

Cap Harrington who came down this day to see the Gov^r informs that the Martin was up at Reedy Isl^d on Sunday and took 4 Shallops from Thorofare & 3 from Cohansey

Wed 2^d June The Martin went out to sea this eveng

Thurs 3 June Coll Long ret^d home his right to command was disputed by Coll Davis—

Fri June 4th Coll Davis has inlisted ab^t 40 recruits since Mon^y—were furnished with Clothes & blankets this day—Cap Reddins Comp^y were marched to Ced Creek on Wed^y for the defence of the shore—

Sat^y 5th Coll Davis required Cap Burton to give up the Com^d to him—as Gen Bloomfield in a letter recognized him as Command^r—Cap Burton refus^d till he had orders from Gov^r

Sun 6 Cap Burton sent Jno Milby to Gov^r. with a letter—not find^s him at home ret^d it, Major Comegys arrived—refused to give up the Com^d to Coll Davis, and wrote to Secretary Hall for his opinion

Mon^y 7th Two frigates, Martin Sloop 6 Brigs 1 Schooner Tender & 1 shallop at anchor—Coll Davis went to Spartan with a flag to get a man released. Cap Brenton promised not to take him away and treated them politely

Tu 8th A ship came in last night—Coll Long arriv^d Wed The Paz (we suppose) came in, Span Ship went up agn.

Thurs The Spartan moved up to the Brown yesterday—and Major Comegys ret^d to attend the review Friday

Fri 11 Great dissatisfaction respectg the Command—Coll Davis ordered a man out of the Guard house that had been put in for disorderly conduct, fighting &c by Cap Kollock—he was given up after some threats, tho Coll Long had not heard them *it is said* Coll Davis demanded of the Cpts the countersign and ordered a Guard of his men. Cap Burton did the same but no serious disturbance took place in the night tho it was expected by some—

Sat^y 12 Major Steng (or Stessy) came last eveng to inspect the Troops today—The Plough Boy A shallop taken from M River by the British was sent by them with a flag and 25 prisoners this morning for 18 of which a rect was given as Amerⁿ Prisoners—and some provision sent off for officers & men in the Sloop

The Gov^r and Major Comegys came to Lewes—Captⁿ Kollocks Comp^y of 100 was inspected by Major Stessy (or Steng) and Cap Burtons of abt 60 Cap Reddins to be inspected at Cedar Creek of 100 men—

Sun 13. Mon^y 14. Tu 15th. & Wed^y 16th one of Cap Kollocks Comp^y Len^d Curwen of L Creek died in the Hospital yest^y & Len^d McIlwaine ffer died abt a month ago

Thur^y 17—Holland died in the Hospital today. A firing of cannon yesterday above the Brown, the Spartan hove up and ran to the Brown, some supposed the Gun Boats were firing

Fri 18th June The Martin came in yesterd^y

Coll Davis received Gen^l Bloomfields orders to take the Com^d of the recruits and Detached Militia for the defense of Lewis and the Shores of Kent dated 14th signed by L^t Duane

Sat 19th The Spartan frigate and 8 or 9 Brigs and Schooners stood out this morn^g

Coll Davis who has abt 60 recruits here and 20 in Kent rec^d orders yesterday from Gen^l Bloomf^d dated the 14th to take the com^d at Lewes and of the shores of Kent and of Detached Militia of Delaware

Major Comegys will submit to his taking com^d of the Garrison &c at least till he has rec^d answer from Gen B. to a statem^t he made to him relative to the Subject This day two men viz^t Levin Vaughn of the Militia and——Kelley a recruit died in the Hospital

Sund^y 20—Mon^y 21^s Jno Layton of the Militia died at his Barracks—The Statira frigate and 1 brig is all the force that has been in the Bay since Sat^y

Mon 21 Tue 22^d & Wed 23^d Nothing Material except Contention between Coll Davis and Officers of Militia—The Court Martial organized by order of the Gov^r Gen Green & Coll Long ordered by Coll Davis to separate, after some contention, drew his sword on Cap Shankland—centinels presented Bayonets at him Sam^e afternoon 22nd he refused to give orders for rations and Commiss^y Painter told Major Comegys, he would not issue unless he or Cap Burton would be

responsible, but next morn^g agreed at length to Major C. orders Coll Davis wanted to know by what authority

The Statira only in the road

Thur 24th Friday 25 This afternoon 8 Gun Boats 2 Prawns 1 P boat came down, the frigate got under W and hauled the boats to the E.

Sat^y 26 This day a Merchant Ship and another sup^d to be the Martin came in

Major Comegys rec^d Gen Orders from Gen Bloomfield dated 21st to take command of Reddins Comp^y at the Cedars, and Greens at Little Creek—Coll Davis to have the Command of the recruits and Militia at Lewes, and Capⁿ Bennet his company at New Castle, Major Potter will command in Jersey, and Coll Rush the Militia in Pennsylvania—

Sun. Mon—Tues^y—Wed^y 30th June The Torpedos at Broadkilm obtained a crew and were to make an attempt yester^y eveng to destroy the frigate Statira; but gave it up or postponed it—

July 1st 2^d 3^d 4th Sunday the Statira only in the Bay, a flag with F. Marriner went off Friday to take up the Brig Fanny owned by Jno Coulter. Com^e Stackpole informed them he had one man wounded in the wrist, the day before in taking a shallop from Mispillion sd to be Jno Mitchels which they burnt—Coll Davis now in com^d Cap Kollock next—

Mon^y July 5th A Company of 14 or 15 dined at Kollocks

51 Cannon were discharged in the course of the day & 100 lbs of Powder burnt to celebrate the 4th July—at night abt 11 Oclock an alarm in consequence of a Pilot boat from Phila stand^g close in which was fired on by the Guard on the Beach

Tues 6th to Tues 13th This week the Statira and Spartan only in the bay, the Gun boats were at Cedar Creek yester^y—and 21 recruits were brot here from Dover by Lt Mash^l Clark 5 or 6 days ago

Wed^y 14th This day the 9 Gun Boats that were at C Creek yester^y came down to the Lower end of Boyds Shoal the frigate and the Sloop of War weighed and ran into the Westward of the Brown. abt 3 Oclock the Boats when 5 or 6 mile from the Ships fired 3 or 4 Rounds apiece the Bore away with the flood tide and a fresh Southerly wind up the Bay

Frid^y 16th The Statira, Martin and a Merchant Ship hove up and stood to sea, a Pilot boat Tender that came in two days ago, we suppose from Chesapeake, went out with them. Nothing now remaining in the Bay

Fri 23rd Statira and Martin that came in the first of the week went again to sea—abt the same time a Major Charles C. Hunter came from Phila who is one of Gen Bloomfield's Aids and on Tues^y 27th he and Coll Davis by Gen^{ls} order as tis said discharged all the detached Militia at this Station, after they had been inspected—The Pilots Comp^y and recruits were retained in service

Wed^y & Thurs^y 28 & 29 Cap Kollock Comp^y and a part of Cap Burtons under Lieut Hazzard left Town for their respective Homes 2 or 3 of them enlisted There are abt 100 recruits and 50 of the Pilots Comp^y here—

Thurs^y 10 oclock the Martin Sloop got under Weigh hove to the Eastrd and ran on Crows Shoal the Gun Boats came down but could or did not fetch her, the Ebb tide sweep^d them down—The frigate Junon is stand^s in to defend the Martin, one of the Gun Boats after drifting towards Cape May was separated some distance from the others and approached the Pilot Boat Tender, when the frigate sent 7 or 9 boats, boarded and carried her—

Sun Aug 1st Another frigate supposed to be the Belvidere came in— Mon^y the Martin went to sea after the frigate had been employed send^s ballast on board to supply the place of that she had thrown over when ashore on Crows Shoal Thurs^y last

Wed^y 4th The Belvidere stripd the Gun boat and fired 50 or 60 shot at, and Sunk her—

Thurs^s 5th 1813 Junon Cap Saunders, and Belvidere went to sea Nothing within the Capes now—

Friday eveng 6th Aug 1813 Abraham Hargess the Keeper of the Light House died, was buried on Sat^y 7th

Monday 9th Put 41¼ bu Corn on board the Delaware, Recd of G. Hickman \$16.50 for the above at 40 cents pr bu—

Mon^y 16th The ships are yet at sea. Jos Hall and his wife both dyed at the Acad^y last week and Geo Walker died last night at same place— Of the 100 recruits 30 or 40 are said to be on the sick list at this time—

Fri^y 20th recd 30/—of W^m Bailey for 2 loads of flat

Thurs^y 26 Aug^t Coll Fottrel arrived here last eveng with Coll^s Davis and Hall the last having been to Dover as a Conferree where 10 from each County, 2 from Sussex excepted, met Tu last the 24th and fixed on James Riddle of New Castle as the Dem^{to} Candidate. it is said the Recruits abt 100 will be ordered to Wilming^{tn}. No Ships are in sight for several days they have not been on the Bay since the 5th—

Mon 30th Aug^t the Troops say 100 under Coll Davis & Cap Clark &c embarked on board Cap Milby and Marshalls Schooner for Wilm^a they were p^d 4\$ a pc^s

Thur 23^d Sep^r 1813 Cap Phillips the Paymaster of this District accomp^d by Cap Bennet came to Town yester^y tis s^d he p^d Green & Reddens Comp^y on his way down and discharged Reddens they left Lewes this morn^g

The 12 Mo Men that have been at Wilming^a and Chester since the 1st of this Month are said to be order^d to the Lazaretto on their way to New York or Albany

Sat^y 25 Sep Cap Greens Comp^y of 80 men came in this day from Little Creek

The 12 Mo men are now encamped at Darby

Friday 24 of Septemb^r the Paymaster Cap Phillips and Cap now Major Bennett came down, returned next day and left the money with Major Comegys to pay the Militia 2 months pay up to 31st of July for the Pilots Company—which was p^d by Major Com Sat^y the 9th Oct^r

The Election took place Oct^r 5 when I was elected over Mr Riddle by a majority of 1114 votes in Sussex 665 in Kent and 875 in the State

Cap^{tn} Greens Comp^y were discharged and retd home to Kent Oct 30th 1813. The Pilots Corps of abt 50 men were retained in service by Gen^l Duanes Orders—

Cornel^s Wiltbank Esq^r died on Tuesday the 9th of Nov^r 1813 was buried the 10th

Nov 25 1813 Thurs This morn^g 9 Oclock an En arriv^d Brig came in anchored in the Road and unbent her topsails, perhaps to bend new ones—at 11 Oclock sent a boat with U. S. Colours in the Bow, and En Col^s in the Stern, with the Cap of a New York Sloop & a Super Cargo and a letter to the Com^r of U. S. Troops at Lewes from Cap Geo. E. Watts of the Brig Jassure informing that the Amb came to get permission to Ransom the Sloop & Cargo—and they to land some prisoners and enquire the fate of a Schooner they took and manned but did not know what had become of her. Doc^r White, John Parker, Isaac Fisher and John Dean went over and met Lieutenant West with a flag, an answer was prepared by Coll Hall and Lieut Miles and sent over, in the mean time, the two Amer^s came to Lewes and Rich^d Howard, Jas Nicholson, Anthony Thompson, Harry McCracken, and Jo^s West with his gun, went over without permission

Howard tis said insulted the Officer and shook his fist in his face Thompson and Howard encouraged the men tis reported, to run away 3 of them escaped from the Officer, two crossed the Creek & went down in my field $\frac{1}{4}$ mile away from the Bank when Jacob Lentner and some (W^m Russell I believe) went to them and Lentner sent Guides with them to his house where the other man who came of the Cape joined them in the evening—Lieut West who had been near an hour alone, except one man in the boat, was at length joined by Messrs Fisher and Parker, and the Amer Cap appeared much agitated complained bitterly of the disrespect to his flag and the law of Nations, that he had been insulted by Howard, and his men encouraged to desert, said he would not return without his men. However after it was dark he and one Amerⁿ and one Sailor put of in his boat—When the boat was com^s ashore in the morning a number of persons wanted to fire an 18 Pounder at her, Doct^r White and Coll Hall said to be of the number, from the persuasion of Cap Hunt and others it was at length prevented

Fri 26th Nov^r the Jassure sent her boat and landed the Cap of the N. York Sloop to negotiate for her ransom, in the afternoon Doct^r White, J Parker, and David Paynter went off with a boats crew to settle the ransom Geo Hickman was to assist them the flag retd the

Sloop being at sea, left the Cap & Jno Saunders on board to take possⁿ when she came in

Early this morn^g we started a Whale boat to meet the Shallop She met the Sussex below cedar C and came down with her & got in the Creek at 1 or 2 O'clock, the two Tenders started to cut her off from the creeks mouth but gave up the Chase

Sat^y 27 The New York Sloop not yet in sight—Messrs White & Hickman who each advanced \$500 and Jno Parker 300 to Cap—being uneasy sent off again, was informed by Cap Watts that the Sloop came in sight of the Jassure—Cap paid him the money, and his pasport being given, he with Jno Saunders prepared to take possessⁿ but waiting for her to come nearer. She at length disappeared and he supposed the Amerⁿ Mate had persuaded the 3 Marines on board to assist in bringing her in to some of our ports, if however she should be found by any of our Squadron he would send her in, but would not refund the ransom money—Cap Watts also sent his Master and 5 men last night to capture 2 of our Shallops that hove in sight below Mispillion in the evening

Sund^y 28 The Jassure hove up and went to sea this morning with the Sloop belonging to the Eastward with Onions, Potat^s—Apples—Cider &c after taking out part of said cargo and send^g 10 prisoner^s and neutrals ashore last even^g we hear this morning from Milford that the Sail^g Master 5 men and the Boat arrived there yesterday The Jason has lost altogether 13 of her men since she came in.

Jan^y 1st 1814 Paid Jehu Stockley \$5 to send to the Editor of the New York Herald being one years' pay in advance, W^m Wolf Esq^r is to take the paper with me and pay half the expense

Mr Ashbel Strong takes half the Freemans Journal from Oct^r last

Jan^y 17. 1814 I arrived in Dover and the 18th met the Senate and House of Representatives and took the Oath prescribed by the Constitution and Laws of Delaware, admin^d by the Chancelor, after which deliv^d the Speech to a large Assembly

Mar 24 Jan Signed One hundred Marriage Licenses and sent them by Mr Brown to the Secretary

Wed^y 26th Wrote to Gen^l Armstrong the following Letter and deliv^d it on the 27th to Secretary Peter Robinson for the purpose of enter^g it on the State Register, after which he was to seal and mail it, Vizt

I have taken the earliest opportunity since the duties of Gov^r of the State of Delaware devolved upon me, to represent to you the Exposed and defenseless State of our Coast, every point of which, from the Ocean to New Castle inculd^g above 100 Miles of sea, bay & river shore, is assailable by the Maritime forces of the enemy, by which the last season from the 14 March till the 28th Nov^r—we were very much harassd. I do therefore Sir, earnestly request, you will make our situation known to the President of the U. States, and that

he may authorize me to call in to service for the next six months, one Battalion of Infantry with a small proportion of Artillery and Cavalry, or such am^t and description of force as you may deem proper, and the President may think he can grant for our protection and security, having respect at the same time, to the more preparing demands on the resources of the Gen^l Governm^t from other parts of the Union—

If Sir this applicaⁿ should be favourably rec^d, our Fellow Citizens would be much gratified to know that some measures would be speedily adopted for their Secury I would further suggest for the Consⁿ of the Pres^t the propriety of employing a part of the Flotilla in the Del. to protect our trade with Philad^a from the numerous Creeks, or small Rivers, which empty in to the Bay and River, Between Reedy Island and Lewes. The Gun B. and Gallies, are peculiarly fitted for that service in the Shallop, or Western Channel, extending 40 miles above Lewes Creek, no vessel of force, or drawing more than 6 feet water, can approach them, and their small tenders or Barges would not risk an attack upon our Boats that are well manned—

With the assurance that all the assisst in my Power, will be given, to insure success to our Military and Naval operations on the Coast, I have the Honor to be &c & Hon Jno Armstrong Esq^r Sat 10

You will also direct Cap^t Derickson to have his Comp^y call^d forthwith to the head of Ind River, there to be organized, mustered and held in readiness to march the moment he receives further orders

It is not expected that either of those Comp^{ys} will continue longer at the places of rendezvous than may be necessary to organize and form rolls or returns of their effective force—preparatory to their taking the Field

They will be entitled to receive pay and rations while at their rendezvous in the same manner as if they were actually call^d into the service of the U. S. agreeably to the act of Congress of the 18th of April 1814

As the Commander of the District desires this detachment if call^d out, should be furnished with arms, you are requested to direct the

It will be proper for the Officers of Comp^{ns} to keep a particular and correct acct of the arms they receive, from whence or what Company of Militia they were furnished & make a return thereof to the Brig^r Genl or the Military Commissary Mr Batson, in order that the Capt^{ns} of Militia, to whom arms were distributed in the Spring & Summer and who gave Sectys or bonds for their safe keeping and return when called on may have a credit for the same

THE AFFAIR AT LEWES.

AFRICA, AT SANDY HOOK
August the 3^d 1794

SIR The treatment I received at Lewiston since your departure from the mouth of the Delaware, has been so extraordinary and so contrary to what one of his Majestys Ships is entitled to receive from the Inhabitants of a neutral Power, that I think it my duty to state to you the particulars

Having been told upon our arrival there, that we should meet with a friendly reception, and that I could purchase any quantity of water I stood in need of for the Ship's use, I agreed with a man who keeps one of the Schooners for a certain quantity at a dollar p^r Butt. and he came and received our empty casks to fill, but next morning he returned the casks assuring me that it would give him great pleasure to be of any use to the King's ships, but that the people on shore had threatened to burn his boat, in case he supplied us with a drop of water—that they had heard we were in distress for that article and were resolved that no boat from that town should supply us with a single cask.

By this time we also found our supply of fresh beef and vegetables was stopped, and that nobody durst engage to procure us any thing for fear of incurring the rage of the people in the Town, however this same man beforementioned, and whose name I shall give you, undertook to procure from his Father's farm in the country a single Bullock for the sick, who were much afflicted with Scurvy, and he brought it into Town, but not on time to get on board that night, so that it was the Sunday Morning before we could receive it into the Ship

This the Justice of the Peace construed into such an offence as to fine the poor man forty shillings under pretence of breaking the Sunday, and he was otherwise beat, and so ill treated by the People on shore, that he did not reckon his life in safety, and I gave up all thoughts of a supply, when our friends were to furnish us at such a risque; but as I had received no accounts from the Officer I had occasion to send to Philadelphia, I was obliged to run the risque of sending my own boat for water, as you know I had not sufficient on board to last me round to a more friendly Port, in case I was detained any time in the Delaware.

Accordingly, I sent the long boat, which by great exertion was just enabled to bring off sufficient for our daily expence, and in doing so, although I used every precaution, the people (not, as were given to understand, the mob or common people, but the most respectable part of the Inhabitants) so waylaid and watched our boats crew, that they enticed away three of my men.

One man, who in particular came down to the boat, decoyed away two men, and offered money to the rest of the crew to desert also, is

named Hall, and is a housekeeper in Lewiston; this was the more ungrateful in Hall, as one of his negroes came and offered himself to my officer, to enter on board the Africa, which request he very properly declined, and it happened to us also, that a slave belonging to another man had found his way on board, whom I delivered up the instant I knew it, although the poor wretch claimed our protection in the most moving terms, hiding himself under the guns and clinging to every thing he could lay hold of when he was dragged away to his old master.

During all this time, I can assure you, that the Africa's Crew and Officers, who were obliged to go on duty, conducted themselves with the greatest caution, and though receiving personally every insult from the mob that language can express, could never be prevailed upon to commit themselves by departing in a single instance from the line of conduct prescribed to them to follow. As to any personal insult being offered to myself, I put it out of their power, because no persuasion, and I had it often from Col^o Neil, could induce me to put my foot in a country where we were received as enemies rather than as friends, and no officer of the Africa, was ever on shore but on the duty of obtaining water for the Ship

SIR I have the honor of submitting to you the copy of a letter from Captain Homes of his Majesty's Ship Africa to Rear Admiral Murray, from which it is manifest that the Officers and Crew of that vessel have suffered from the inhabitants of Lewistown the same "unfriendly treatment as that which his Majesty's Ships of War and Officers in his Majesty's service have, since the commencement of the present hostilities uniformly experienced in the American Ports"

On this last instance it is not my intention to expatiate, but merely to add to it the other facts of a similar tendency that I have at different periods communicated to you, and to repeat the conviction expressed in my letter of the 30th ulto (which I hope you have received, that "unless this government can devise some preventive mode of protecting from insult the Officers of his Majesty's Ships in ports of the United States, the assurance of their experiencing a friendly and hospitable treatment, contained in your predecessor's letter of the 9th of September 1793" and reiterated in yours of the 7th of last month "will be rendered absolutely useless and nugatory"

NEW CASTLE October 7 1794

GENTLEMEN The Secretary of State for the United States has communicated to me, that Mr Hammond his Britannic Majesty's Minister Plenipotentiary to the United States, has complained that the hospitable treatment which public Ships of War and officers in the british service, as well as the Ships and officers of every other nation, have a right to expect in the American ports from usage and courtesy, and which has therefore been assured to them by the Government of the United States, is often withholden from them; the liberty to procure water denied; and the British Sailors encouraged to desert.

This conduct is deemed by the Government of the United States as contrary to its declaration of Neutrality, and so reprehensible impolitic, as to require suppression, in order that the honorable course which the General Government has pursued may not now be sullied by the refusal of any act due to the belligerent Powers

The Secretary of the United States at the same time, forwarded me a copy of a letter of the 14th of Augt from Mr Hammond, the British Minister, founded upon Captain Homes of the 3^d, complaining of such treatment received at Lewestown, by the Officers and Crew of the Ship Africa, and has requested that Enquiry be made concerning these transactions, and the result transmitted to him.

I must therefore request, that you will make an accurate enquiry into the facts alledged in the letters above alluded to, copies of which are herewith inclosed; and that the testimony which may be taken, will be committed to writing, and forwarded to me, in order that it may be communicated, without delay, to the Secretary of State for the United States

SIR:

I have the honor to acknowledge the receipt of your letter of the 20th ultimo, in further relation to the desire of the Reverend C. H. B. Turner, of Lewes, Delaware, for information concerning the treatment of the officers and crew of H. B. M. AFRICA at Lewes, in August, 1794.

A most careful search has been made of the files of the Department. The substance of the documents brought to light is as follows:

The British Minister under date of August 14, 1794, enclosed a complaint of Captain R. Home of the AFRICA relative to ill treatment of his officers and crew by the inhabitants of Lewes, Delaware. (British Notes, Vol. I.)

The Department of State on August 22, 1794, sent a circular to the Governors of States calling attention to complaints of improper treatment of British war vessels, etc., by inhabitants of States, and asking that proper protection be accorded to all vessels, officers, and crews. (Dom. Letters, Vol. VII, p. 174.)

The Governor of Delaware was informed on the same date of the complaint with reference to the AFRICA, and requested to cause an inquiry to be made, and to report the result of the inquiry to the Department. The British Minister was informed that this request had been made. (Dom. Letters, Vol. VII, p. 176.)

There is no record indicating that any report was ever received from the governor of Delaware, or that any was communicated to the British Minister.

D. Bush to Thomas Hopkinson, 1745

WILMINGTON July 5

DR. SIR

You may believe when I tell you, that your Letter of 29th last month has given particular satisfaction in that of your Sympathising with my misfortune, and let the success in what I request of you prove my desire or not, I shall ever retain a respect for your Generous Disposition.

The affair I have requested has oblig'd my keeping it private, fearing some opposition.

However, I have learned the footing the present Ferry is kept on, which is as follows: This County sixty years agoe, particular on the Creeks & River Side, was settled by Dutch & Sweads which seldom went from their Settlements, and when they had occasion to cross the Creeks, their usual method was to Swim over their Horses while the cross'd in a Canoe; between forty and fifty years agoe, the English beginning to settle and make a figure in the County, and perceiving a real necessity for the safety of Travelers that a Ferry should be Erected, Application being made to the Court, then held at Newcastle, for liberty of a ferry on Christeen, The Court granted it, and made an order that Johannus Jaquet (he being in possession of the Land where the people go on shore at the other side of the Creek,) do keep a ferry Boat, and for his True Attendance obliged him to enter in Recognizance of forty Pounds, about Ten or Twelve years after, the said Jaquet, thinking the advantage of the ferry not answerable to the Expense of keeping a Boat & Attendance, gave a Grant of it to John Stalcup which liv'd on this side of the Creek, at the death of John Stalcup his son Israel took Possession, and after the Death of Israel his* Widow Marry'd Daniel †Turner, who kept it untill the son of Israel, nam'd John Stalcup, was of Age, and now the said John keeps the Ferry.

Wether the Advantage I am going to mention will be of any real service to the Publick, must submit, and can only say if the Ferry is here, and a Road over the Marsh, it will shorten the distance from hence to Newcastle near two miles, and of Consequence will bring many People that Travel from the Lower Countys & Maryland this way, which now goes by the way of Christeen Bridge, not only so, but as the People here are got in a strain of Draining the Marshes on the Creek to make dry Meadows, will of course in a few years answer the Drovers that Drives Cattle from the Lower Countys, &c., were they can meet with good Pasturage, likewise the Inhabitants of this Town must reap some benefit more than they do at present by Travelers, there is I do not doubt other Advantages wch do not occur to me now,

except one, wch is that the Lowering the price of 3½d for Ferrying Man & Horse over, wch I judge is full much.

I am much at a loss should I succeed to fix any Terms, fearing it might seem unreasonable, but this much must say, the expence of a Causeway across the Marsh, will be above a mile long, & clearing some Wood Land for a road, with Wharfs Boat, &c., (without an Act of Assembly can be procured for a Public Road,) must be very Expensive, which I compute on a moderate Computation £160, to complete the whole.

I declare I hardly know what Proposals to offer, but incline to leave it to you, being confident you will endeavour to procure as good Terms as if the benefit was to yourself, as you expect I would mention some Terms, I have made two Proposals, but desire you will lay no stress on them.

1st I am willing to pay an acknowledgmt every year providing to have it to my Heirs & Assigns for a Term of Years not under 60, and no other Ferry to be admitted on Christeen without liberty of me.

2^d To take it for 50 Years without paying any acknowledgmt, and at the expiration to deliver the Ferry up with the same Proviso, & no other Ferry &c.

As the Prop^r has received no benefit hitherto from the Ferry, and Application now to him for a grant, am of opinion he will not be unreasonable, for he will receive an Advantage now he had not before, I beg you will make such Proposals as you will judge most conducive for the Interest of

APOQUINIMINCK, Feby 4th. 1760

REVEREND SIR:

I wrote you in November last in relation to a scite of land for the purpose of erecting a commodious Church-on, and at the same time inclosed a petitioning letter to Mr. Osborne, for obtaining the said lot of ground, agreeable to your advice and directions.

Since writing as above I have never heard any thing from you, except a verbal Message delivered by Mr. Jones, assuring us of which

we never entertained the least doubt, that you was ready to exert your best endeavours with Mr. Osborne, in behalf of our Congregation.

About ten days ago, Mr. Osbornes tenant, one Samuel Davis, son of the Sheriff of Chester County, sent me word that he had orders from Mr. Osborne to lay out a lot of ground for the use of a Church, &c., and this day was appointed for a meeting of the principle members of our Congregation to fix upon a proper place for the said purpose.

A good number accordingly met, but when they came to view the place proposed, they found it every way so inconvenient as will, unless remedied by your kind interposition, quite disconcert all our measures.

The place pitched upon by our Congregation, and agreed to last Summer by Davis himself is situated at the south-east corner of a little field on the north side of the road leading from Drawyer's bridge to Mr. Witherspoons; the land itself is sandy and barren, lying on the edge of a road laid out by Act of Assembly, and which, from the nature of the trade in these parts, can never admit of an alteration, so that the tract itself cannot be prejudiced by a grant in that place.

Mr. Osborne, I am confident, is imposed on by misinformation.

Many, who heard what passed this day suspect Davis, the tenant.

I am afraid it may too justly be observed to you, that your kind endeavours to serve us are opposed and thwarted by one, whose family is indebted to the Government of Pennsylvania for a post of great honour and profit.

As Davis desires to fixing us on the extremity of the tract in a low, uncouth place, and vouches Mr. Osbornes positive orders for his obstinacy, I must beg of you once more to renew your application, and endeavour to obtain a lot from Mr. Osborne in the place above described, which is about the centre between the northwest courses from Apoquiniminck to Drawyers Creek, but at the same time upon the edge of a road which can never be varied from its present direction.

I am sorry this affair creates so much importunity, but as the prosperity of the Church is concerned, I know you will be good enough to excuse it.

Affirmation of Solomon Truit, Senior, 1759

SUSSEX ON DELAWARE,

Of the County aforesd, yeoⁿ, aged sixty five years or thereabouts; Taken at Lewes in the said County, this seventeenth day of May, in the year of our Lord one thousand seven hundred fifty and nine,

This affirmant did solemnly and sincerely declare and affirm, In the presence of Almighty God.

That he was born in the County of Somerset in the Province of Maryland (as it was heretofore called but now known, By the name of Worcester County.) He further saith, that he hath lived in Cedar Creek Hundred, in the County of Sussex aforesd, for about thirty eight years last past, He likewise affirmeth, That soon after

his coming to be an inhabitant within the Hundred aforesd, He become acquainted with a certain William Townsend, who was then also an inhabitant of the said Hundred, and upon some conversation with the said William, He told the affirmant That he had taken up a piece or parcel of Land, at a place called Beaver Dam Branch, By virtue of a Warrant from the Honourable the Proprietaries land office for the Province of Pennsylvania and Countys on Delaware; The which said land was surveyed for the sd William by Mr. Robert Shankland, decd, formerly deputy surveyor of the County of Sussex aforesd, and the affirmant further sayeth, That he knoweth that the aforesd William Townsend sold his right in the land aforesd to a certain Elizabeth Watson of Sussex aforesd, widdow; For that he the affirmant filled up a Bond for the conveying and making over the sd land, according to the laws and usuages of the Government of the Countys on Delaware. He likewise saith, that he heard, that a certain Abraham Ingram, who held land under a Maryland survey, near unto the land so as aforesd taken up by the aforesd William, Pretended to claim a right in the sd Williams land, or some Part thereof, But he the affirmant knoweth not, That the said Abraham ever brought any suit for the establishing of his said claim; But he the affirmant doth further declare, That he knoweth that a certain Bethuel Watson (son to the aforesd Elizabeth Watson) Brought his action of Ejectment for the recovery of the land aforesd, From a certain David Smith, who had got into possession thereof, and the sd Bethuel obtained a judgement on his said suit, in his Majesty's Court of Common Pleas, in and for the County of Sussex aforesd. and was put into quiet and peaceable possession of the said land, by virtue of his Majesty's writ of Habere facias Possessionem, issuing out of the sd Court, for that purpose. The affirmant further saith, that he hath been told, that the aforesd Abraham Ingram, having an intention to get a Maryland warrant of survey for some part of the land, so as aforesaid surveyed, by Mr. Robert Shankland aforementioned He the affirmant heard severall antient inhabitants of Sussex aforesd, highly blame the said Abraham, for that the whole of the said land did indisputably lay within the reputed bounds of the said County of Sussex; The affirmant further saith, that he hath no particular knowledge of the plantation whereon John Willey (now a prisoner at Lewes) lately dwelt, But he hath heard it reported by the inhabitants of Cedar Creek Hundred aforesd, That it is situate within the limits and reputed bounds of the said Hundred, and further this affirmant saith not.

Deposition of Richard Coverdell, 1759

SUSSEX COUNTY ON DELAWARE,

The Deposition of Richard Coverdell, of the County aforesd, yeom^a, aged seventy years or thereabouts, Taken at Lewes in the said County, this seventeenth day of May, in the year of our Lord one thousand seven hundred fifty and nine; This deponent being solemnly sworn

on the Holy Evangelists did depose and say, That he was born in Bucks County, in Pennsylvania, and that he was brought by his parents into the County of Sussex aforesd, when he was a sucking child, in the which County he hath lived the greatest part of his life time, and for sixty years thereof, in Cedar Creek Hundred, in the County aforesd, and that the plantation that he is now settled upon, he doth hold under the rights granted to him from the Land Office of the Proprietaries of Pennsylvania and Countys on Delaware; He further saith, that his son John Coverdell, about eighteen years agoe had some intentions of taking up a piece of land toward the upper end of the neck in Cedar Creek forrest, commonly called and known by the name of the Great Neck, but since that time, the place his said son had pitched upon to take up, hath been surveyed by Mr W^m Shankland, now deputy surveyor of Sussex County aforesd, for a certain Ephraim Polke who afterwards (as this Deponent is informed) sold all his right and title in the said land to one John Willey (now a prisoner at Lewes in the County aforesd,) and the deponent further saith, That the plantation of him the said John Willey, is situate to the best of his belief and knowledge, within the Hundred aforesd, it lying South Easterly from the place of Deponants present dwelling near upon a mile, and upon which place, he the deponent hath, quietly and unmolested lived for many years last past; The which places the deponent saith, constantly hath been reputed, to be within the bounds and limits of the hundred aforesd, nor doth he the deponent know, of any riots or disturbances made on or near the present place of his present settlement, or the rights thereof, or any of the neighboring places unto it contested until what hath lately hapened at the plantation of the aforesd John Willey, and he the deponent further saith, that he hath known the aforesd John Willey ever since he came to settle upon the plantation aforesd, and that he hath behaved himself in a quiet peaceable and neighbourly like manner, an as an industrious young man ought to do:

Deposition of Jared Hutchins, 1759

SUSSEX COUNTY, ss

Jared Hutchins, of Worcester County, in Maryland, aged thirty years, or thereabouts, being solemnly Sworn on the Holy Evangelists of Almighty God, Deposeth and Saith:

That on the fifth day of February last, he, this Deponent, being at the house of Moses Timmonds, a Messenger came to him to let him know Mr. William Outten, under Sheriff of Worcester, was at his house; Upon which he, this Deponent, and said Timmonds, went to this Deponants house where Mr. Outten was, who immediately pressd this Deponent and said Timmonds, in his Lordships Name, to assist him in taking John Willey, Mullenex, Coverdale, & others, which he

said he had precepts for, informing this Deponant that he had already pressed some Men, which he left at Capt Collings & Mr. Holstons; That this Deponant, Timmonds, & Outten went to Mr Holstons, which place they left one hour in the night, and as they went to Mr Outtens pressed John Kelly and William Winwright, that late in the Night they came to Outtens, that next morning before sunrise, the whole Company, vizt., John Dennis, Coll Moses Timmonds, John Kelly, Peter Dolby, Levin Disheroon, W^m Conoway, Elisha Long, William Winwright, Benjamin Wooten, and this Deponant, went with Mr Outten to take the men; when they came to the Road that went to Mullenex's, they made a stop to conclude what to do, and they agreed that Conoway & Dolby was to go to Mullenex's, and Conoway, who had a warrant from Capt Collings to take Mullenex, was to take him, then Dolby was to give them notice, and they were all to ride up; That Conoway & Dolby rode off to Mullenex's, that after they were gone Outten said that their taking Mullenex might alarm the neighborhood, and by that means Willey Escape, he therefore ordered Colonel Dennis to stay there and assist Conoway and Dolby, and he and the rest went to Willey's, that they went on till they came to Willeys road, Outten (having before deputed this Deponant) then gave him the writ, saying, if Willey disputes your authority show his this, often repeating he would have Willey and Coverdale, and be satisfied with the ill usage he before had from them; That Timmonds and this Deponant went on, (being ordered) that if Willey was at home Timmonds was to go out to the well, pretending to drink, and take off his hat and put it on again, which was to be a sign to Outten and party, who was then to come up, and that when they came in sight this Deponant was to execute the precept; that this Deponant and Timmonds rode up into the yard and enquired the way to W^m Laws's, Willey then asked them to Light and warm themselves, which they did, went into the House and sat down; that they talked some time, during, during which this deponant being loth to serve the precept, protracted the time so long, that Timmonds going out saw Outten and his party coming; Willy likewise seeing them Coming, said, yonder comes the Sheriff of Worcester and a Company of Men, I guess what they are after, this Deponant then going to the door Willy shoved it to, and shut him out; when Outten came up, he asked this Deponant if he had taken Willy, he said he had not; Outten then seemed very angry, and said he would not for Five Pounds that he had acted in that manner; Outten then concluded to leave the House, and this Deponant and Timmonds was to go in again, then Outten and party was to come up, and this Deponant was to take Willey; when Outten and party was gone, Willey opened the door and asked this deponant and Timmonds if they were of Outten's party, Timmonds said they were not, and they immediately went in, Timmonds then asked Willey if Outten had anything against him, Willey answered he supposed he had, and several others; this deponant and Willey sat down, Willey stayed in the house, and his wife brought up his Creature, Willey said he was sorry he could not stay and desired to be excused; this deponant said we are going with you, Willey said I will show you the way to Lews's; as they all went to the door, Timmonds took a stick out of Willey's hand, pretending

to look at it, but this deponants thinks to prevent Willey from striking with it: as Willey went out this deponant arrested him, Willey said what do you mean, this deponant said I will show you, a scuffle ensued, Timmonds laid hold, but Willey by his wife's assestance got loose, and he and wife got into the house and shut the door, Outten then came up, and being informed how the Case was, run to the door with a Grubbing Hoe, and first wrenched the door with the Hoe, and then by striking two or three Blows with the Hoe burst the door open; that Outten went in, followed by Wooten and Disheroon, and Willey then took to his loft; Outten then desired Willey to come down, Willey said he would not; he said he would have him, dead or alive; Outten then threw up the Grubbing Hoe at Willey, and ordered his men to get sticks and back him, which they did; as they came in with their sticks Dennis, Conoway, and Dolby came, that Conoway brought a sword, but where he got it this deponant knows not, but supposes at Mullenex's; Dennis said, Willey come down; Willey said he would not: he said he had that would fetch him down (though the deponant says he believed he had no pistols, for they called at Paris Chipman's to borrow Pistols, but could get none;) they then shoved up the loose planks with their sticks, during which Willeys wife laid hold of Outten, begged he would not kill her Husband, and others taking hold of her they all Tumbled out of doors; That while they were shoving up the planks Willey stept at last on some fast ones, Outten then threw a Chair at Willey, seeming to be in a great rage, often swearing he would have him dead or alive; Willey told him he could not serve two Masters, Dennis said if you serve us you have no need to serve them, which introduced a parley, Dennis then proposed that Outten, and the great Men in Maryland concerned, should come to Sussex and leave it to the Magistrates there; Willey said if the Magistrates of Sussex gave him up he would submit, but Outten said he would not agree, that he was an Officer, and would go to the extent of his Office.

About this time one John Sharpe came to the yard, saying, what are you all here after, where is the dam^d Sheriff, Outten said here I am, and stept out of the door; that Outten and Sharpe met, that Outten struck at Sharpe, who held up his stick to defend himself, that Outten soon cut Sharpe's stick in two with the sword brought by Conoway, on which Sharp turned to run; that Outten struck him and cut him much in the Shoulder, Sharp said you have murdered me; Outten replied it is what you deserve; that this deponant dressed Sharps wounds and put some sugar in it, that Outten followed him afterwards, but Sharp avoided him; Willey still stayed in the loft.

Outten as last concluded to go home and gave this deponant the Scabbard, but kept the Sword, said I am warm and offering to pull off his coat; somebody said Willey is coming after you with his gun, Outten said never in a better time, that he turned about with his Sword drawn in his hand, and went towards Willey in a menancing and angry manner; that this deponant, conscious of his deceitful usage to Willy at first, expected Willy would shoot at him, and drew his Mare between him and Willy to Cover his Body from the Shot, but when Willy and Outten advanced near each other Willy shot, and Outten immediately fell; this deponant then mounted his Mare

and fled. This deponant further saith, that Outten, in private conversation the night before, told this deponant that he was to have Twenty Shillings p^r Man, that he took (vizt., Willy and others) over & above his legal fees. This deponant further saith, that during the whole time there was a violent uproar and tumult, Outten swearing frequently he would have him dead or alive, and that Disheroon, Dolby & Wooten, stripped and threatened to tear the house down.

John Vining to Gov. Penn, 1764

SIR:

I take the Liberty to inform your Honour, that Jacob Vanbeber Departed this life some time last Spring, and John Clowes on Thursday or Friday last, two of the Justices of the Courts of Oyer and Terminer & Gaol Delivery & Supreme Courts of this Government, and that there now remains but two persons in those Commissions, a number too small to pretend to transact business of such Consequences and importance as must necessarily come before them; Besides, in Case those two persons should sit, & divisions in opinion happen in any matter respecting the Court, such matter must rest for a time undetermined, whereby the business will be greatly impeded.

Precepts have been Issued for some time for holding Courts of Oyer & Terminer & Gaol Delivery, at Dover, on the Eighth day of May next, it seems therefore absolutely necessary that a New Commission should Issue before that time, least some thing might happen to prevent the Court from sitting, which would be attended with a considerable expense & a Disappointment to the Public.

I have presumed to make a list of such persons in Kent & Sussex as occur to me to be the most proper to put in those Commissions, indeed in Sussex no other persons are known to be so well qualified; but least I may be mistaken I beg leave to recommend Mr. Benjamin Wynkoop, Merc^t, a resident in your city, who lived long in Sussex, and is perfectly acquainted with the people of that County, and I am Confident will give your Honour more satisfaction than any other person whatever. I have long thought that the Supreme Court of this Government should be Conducted with greater advantage to the Public, and fewer disappointments, if two persons residing in Kent were put in those Commissions (this place being the centre of the Government) who might, one or the other of them, attend in the other Countys with much less inconvenience and with greater certainty. The Law Establishing these Courts is altogether Silent respecting the residence of the Supreme Justices.

Mr John Rodney, of Sussex, is by much the most proper person in that County, his Character is unexceptionable, the only misfortune he labours under is that his hearing is some what impaired. John Caton, Esquire, being very infirm, and Doctor Charles Ridgely engaged in a vast deal of business, I beg leave to recommend Caesar Rodney, Esquire, as a person well Qualified to fill this Station who has leasure to give his attendance regularly. If your Honour sends

a new Commission the Bearer, William Manlove, will take Charge thereof, and what other Commands you may have, and discharge his engagements faithfully

Upon reading the petion of the Inhabitants of kent County, setting ftuh that quaras there is a certain peel of land in ye sd County, of 200 acres, on the south side of dover river, neer the bridge in the king's road, qron the Court house now stands, wch ye sd Inhabitants Latelie pchased from W^m Southbee, for the publick use of the sd County; and qras the sd Land being convenientlie accomodated in all respects for ye good and benefit yrof, and it being highlie necessary that a township, with all other privileges and benefitts, be erected and established for the good of the said County, with Fairs att Convenient times, &c, and the sd Land being convenientlie situated for yt purpose; And yrfor Requesting yt ye sd Land May be from hence forth erected into a township, and called by the name of Canterburry, and that they have a fair yrin twice a year, and that the same may be Laid outt into Lotts, a Comon and market place, as the County Court and grand Jury shall order and appoint, with streets and publick Landings, and yt the freeholders of the said Countie may have their Lotts yrin proportionable to what they have paid towards it, and that whatsoever else may be necessary and Convenient for ye good and benefit yrof, may be left to the Court and grand Jurie from time to time, as ye same shall be needfull to be done.

Upon reading the within petion, the Lieut Governor and Council granted the same as is desired, & that after ye 20th of June next, the within town shall be called Dover.

We, therefore, humbly beg Leave to represent to the Gov^r, in Behalfe of our selves & the County of New Castle, our Desires that some fit p^{sons} of Capacity living & residing among Us, according to our Laws & Constitution, may, in case of Death of the s^d Coll French, be appointed as usual for executing the offices of Clerk of the Peace, Prothonotary of the Common Pleas, & Register for the Probate of Willes & Granting Letters of Administration for the County of New Castle: and in this We are well assured the Gov^r will very much oblige the Magistrates & Inhabitants of the County of New Castle, and likewise the People in General of these Three Counties. Cecil County in Maryland, came to the House of this Depont^t, in Appoquinaminck Hundred, in this County, which is within a Mile of the Kings Road leading thro the County of New Castle, attended by seven Men, who as this Depont^t hath since been informed were Constables of Cecil County, & that the sd Under Sh'ffe & the other Men with him, entered into this Depont^{ts} House and askd for Jared Rothwell, son of Thomas Rothwell, & the sd Jared Rothwell coming down stairs the sd Under Sh'ffe immediately arrested him at the suit of James Heath, of Cecil County afd, & that the sd Under Sh'ffe took the said Jared away with him from this Depont^{ts} House. And this Depont^t further Saith, that on the same day he went to the House of Col John Ward, in Cecil County, at which Place Perry Ward, Sh'ffe of the sd County, keeps his Prison, & that he there saw the afd Jared and Thomas Rothwell, Jun., (whom the sd Under Sh'ffe had likewise taken at the suit of the sd James Heath) in close Confinement, and that he, this Depont^t heard the sd Sh'ffe say he would carry them to Anapolis. MY DEAR MR. TURNER:

In the Brinckloe-Beswick pedigree, which I sent you last Spring, I desire to make a correction. I stated therein that "Curtis Brinckle was descended, as were all of the Delaware Brinckloes, from William Brinckloe, who died 1722." My correction—verified by the search of Rev. Joseph Brown Turner, & John C. Gooden, as well as by my own investigation, is as follows: The first comers of the Brinckloe family numbered four, namely, John Brinckloe, born about 1644, member of W^m Penns Council, Member of Assembly, Associate Justice, Capt. of Colonial Militia &c and died 1721; and his cousins, John Brinckle, who died 1748. Peter Brinckle, a legatee of Capt. John, married Elizabeth Curtis (daughter of Richard and Ann Curtis and granddaughter of John and Elizabeth Curtis) and died, intestate, 1728—his widow, Elizabeth, died, testate, in 1743; William, Associate Justice, who died 1722. The last three, John, Peter and William, were brothers, and the male line descended from them, their cousin, Capt. John Brinckloe who died 1721, leaving no male issue—his daughter was the wife of Arthur Meston, his granddaughter was the wife of Rev. Thomas Crawford and one of his great granddaughter's was the wife of Caesar Rodney, father of Caesar, the signer.

and Elizabeth Curtis, his wife:*

Curtis Brinckle, who married (1st) Mary Manlove, daughter of Matthew, and Susannah Williams Manlove, and (2^d) Sarah,—and died 1767; Daniel, who died, without issue, 1754; William, who died, without issue, 1748; Peter, who married Mary—and died 1764, leaving three sons and 1 daughter; Richard, who died 1788, no children; and Elizabeth, who married (1st)—Van Burkalo and (2^d)—Davis. (Note: Curtis Brinckle was survived by widow, Sarah, who married (2^d) Geo. Ogle.)

*Child of said Curtis Brinckle
and Mary Manlove, his first wife,
and heiress of said Mary Manlove-Brinckle.*

Phoebe Brinckle, born 1733, married John Beswick (son of Robert Beswick and Susannah, his wife) settled on "Mt Pleasant" tract, on the Mispillion River, and said John Beswick dying in 1771, survived by children, said Phoebe, his widow, married (2^d) Smith Fassett, by whom she had no issue. She died in 1801.

Another correction, or rather addition, is:

Susannah Loockerman Beswick, daughter of Curtis Beswick and Susannah Nancy Minors, his wife, married Nathaniel Luff, ancestor of the Luff family of Felton.

These Lines of myne I am afrayd will be the intelligence of sad tydings, the 17th Day of this moneth here Depted from hence three English men and one Dutchman there names I have not William—— John Norden, Mr Hack a Dutchman and a Cooper, both at Mr Stocketts and one Walter at Mr Rights which persons we feare are murthered by the Indians in their Journey home as yo^w may further be resolved if yo^w please to enquire The Indians say their bodyes lay at a place calld Squasehum the 19th Day here came abt 20 Indians Soe by some of them discovered And I have caused two Indians to be secured in the Corte of Guard, one of them is sett free to informe their Sakim And this Day wee suppose he will be here both Dutch and Indians are very much Displeased at itt but I Demanding Justice of the Governor he knew not well how to deney me my desire is yo^r Wors^p will be pleased to advise and alsoe send some person or persons which may make further Enquiry into the matter As for me I thinke it is pitty such barbarous actons should soe passe It will be as much for me to tenne of to be English men and I pray be Active in this matter of soe greate Concernmt Thus with my respects I rest Yo^r wors^pt to Command

Yors 15th may ould Style recd, the 26th of New Style out of which wee have seene that upon advice of Mr Hollingsworth yo^w are come to the Island of Nathanill Uetye for to examine the Lamentable murder done by the Sanhikan Indians unto foure English men; (It is thus) forasmuch as hath appeared to us that here have been foure persons, out of the Province of Maryland, which after two dayes stay departed from hence to their plantatons as they sayd And by the way are mett by the said Indians by whome they are murdered, And on Marettico or the iron hill mett them two Indians comeing from the Minquas Country to one of them they did give a hatt and nothing elce, to the other they gave nothing. The same two Indians came to the Towne, imagining noe thing, but the Murtherers which killd the man did very secretly and speedily pas this place up the River; Two or three Inhabitants of New Amstell did in the meane while lay hould on those two Indians, And I caused them to be brought to the Forte, but after many Examintons found them not Guilty but that it was done by another naton wherefore wee have released them, because the Ignorant cannot suffer for the Guilty otherwise it would be a case grounded on noe reason, besides there is some tyme past betweene, And would have occasioned betweene us and the Indians a Difference which might engage Us with them, to an open Warre, were by the Cultiture of the Country, and the advancemt of the Collony would be much hindered in which apparently y^r hon^r would take noe Comfort nor Content with the two Indians which have not beene actually in the facte,

And therefore lett your honor be assured that the releaseng of the two Indians hath not been done out of any ill Intent nor to the p^rjudice of soe Good Christians our Neighbours in favour of the Heathens which have Comited from tyme to tyme divers murthers and Robberies upon our owne naton also, Wishing that wee could lay hould of this Good oppertunity in revenging our selves upon the Murtherers alsoe, to Conclude yo^r honor may be confident that the Shedding of Christian blood is most detestable unto us assuring yo^r selfe that wee shall Contribute in all thinges to the p^rservacon of freindship with neighbours of our beleife for as much as might be done without p^rjudice to our own naton, Soe I Committ yo^r Honor to Gods keepeng whoe will give his blessings to yo^r Governt Soe I rest

NEW AMSTELL 20th May 1661

RIGHT HONORABLE

Stilo novo

My last the six and twentyth of May was in haste because the Indians would not staye by the same I Did assume yo^r Honor of the upright affecton which wee have for the keepeing of a good Neighbourship I have by this occasion

Abraham Van Nas goeing that waye by Instructon ordered and authorized for to declare by worde of mouthe that Licence to departe to the two Indians that were apprehended was not in favor of the Barbarous Heathens nor to the p^rjudice of soe Good Neighbours they haveing not been accessory to the Murther wherefore I could not keepe them Such proceedings not being agreeable with our natons Custome being a Case that will bring us into greate Danger of a Warre and a Quarrell with the Indians It being now 16 Dayes past before wee had any Intelligence from the Province of Maryland in that behalfe

Wee therefore Doe assure yo^r honor that wee will be upon all occasions willing wee hope that in tyme to come there will be a good traffique Betweene us through this present difference Betwixt yo^w and the Indians of this Rivor are something Disfavourable to itt Yett wee hope that the Almighty God will shoue an expedient waye that those differences might be composed for the warres are pr^r judiciall to the Commons and uncertayne how they might fall out nor what tyme they may take that the whole naton for five or six evell Doers Should suffer, is a thing to be Lamented yett needefull that the Murtherers should be punished for an Example I have in Generall understood from the Indians that they with the English upon very advatagious Conditons with the English make peace that such ugly faults be noe more Committed In case I can serve yo^r Honor in the like business I shall be willing to incline to itt and soe wishing Yo^r honor a happy Governmt and a Good end of these troubles shall rest

ALEXANDER DHYNOIJOSSA

After which was called in Abraham Van has in the said Letter menconed whoe being desired to declare what he had in Commis-

sion to say from the Governor Alexander Dhinoijessa. Declared that they had done their Endeavor to detevne the Indian Murtherers but could not for want of power to defend themselves any longer keepe them, that in Revenge of what they had done the Indians had burned them a Mill which they were forced to passe by for the p^resent till they should be better able to avenge themselves of the Injury that the Governor had of the Sandhooke Did send for the King of those Indians that had Comraitted the aforesaid murder. And Demanded of them the reason why they did it Answer was made that it was done by a Company of Vagabone Rouges that delighted in mischeife and run from naton to naton which if they could catch they would deliver them up to Justice, but that since they had done it they were fledd

AT A COUNCELL HELD AT APPOQUIMMIN

Thursday 19th Sept 1661

Present.

Philip Calvert Esqr Governor
Henry Coursey Esqr Secretary
and Mr John Bateman Councill

Came Pinna King of Pickhattonmitta in Delaware Bay shewing that whereas there had been divers men slayne by the English belonging to the Passayoncke Indians now under his Command and amongst them his oune brother in revenge of which divers English had been slayne by those Indiaus Yet that as he did believe all those outrages were committed by the English without order from the Governor and Councell soe he did assure the Governor and Councell that those revenges were taken by his Indians without his or any of his greate mens knowledge therefore he did desire that all might be forgotten and that from henceforward his Indians might live in peace with the English To which the Governor answered that as he did desire peace soe he did Desire Justice alsoe and provided that they would deliver up those Indians that killed John Norden and Sepherin Hack with his Companions to be proceeded against according to our Justice he would come to Articles of peace with him.

Whereunto Pinna answered that the English had begun the warre and first killed one of his men as he was peaceably comeing by their plantaton oversett their Canowe out of which they lost three Gunns afterwards pursued them into the woods and there shott at them, that as his Indians fledd (haveing lost one man and their Goods) on their way home they mett the said Norden and Hack and Companions and contrary to the advice of an ould man of the Company that stood weepeing by and perswadeing them to speake with the greate men of the English first Did kill the said Norden and Hack and Companions saying that the English would have warre but that se^rce that tyme the English had sett upon two Canowes of Indians and killed five of them and amongst them his own brother all which notwithstanding he was willing and desirous to make peace between us and his Indians forgetting the blood of his oune brother Then did the Governor demand satisfaction for the Cattle and hoggs of

John Taylor To which he answered yt they were not killed by his Indians for they immediately fled, but by Minquas or Sinigos

Whereupon was taken into consideracon the Informacon of John Taylor Thomas Overton and others taken at Spesutia 13th May last and finding the Relaton of Pinna in the maine to agree with the said Informations and the Governor and Councell calling to minde that the said John Taylor after his Informaton in wryting taken had often sayd that John Forster whoe shott att the Indian (as p Informaton) affirmed that he had killed him

Resolved to come to Articles with the said Pinna upon this Consideraton that the English had begun the warre by the said John Forster killing the said Indian upon Easter daye

And forasmuch as it is certaine that the said Indians whome Forster shott at immediately fledd after they killed Forster in the woods and upon the 17th Day of Aprill mett Norden and Hack neere the Iron hill upon the Easterne Shoare and there murdered them and that the Minqua or Sinigo Indians were aboute that tyme doeing mischeife and killing Cattle aboute Patapsco Rivor and those Quarters as appeares by the Informaton of Robert Gosserch taken 13th May aforesaid.

Resolved that all further Demand of satisfacon for those cattle be waved and that sufficient provision in the Articles be made for the Security of our stocks of Cattle and hogs for the future, and that the treaty be immediatly begun least Generall Styvesant at the Manhatans make an advantage by those Indians against us It being doubted whether there be a warre betweene Holland and England or not

William Eltonhead gent made oath that about the beginning of June in the year 1642 in fetter lane London, in the hearing of this dept Jane & Elean^r Stevenson did contract wth Sr Edmond Tloydon Kn^t in certaine conditions of service to this effect, viz that they were to serve him for 5 yeares from that time in New Albion in delaware Bay & were to have 50^s sterling P annum & they to find themselves clothes, & other conditions betweene them he remembreth not

ASSEMBLY PROCEEDINGS MAY-JUNE 1674

To Capt Howell for his march to the Whorekill Two thousand pounds of Tobacco to the said Howell for thirty five men at foure hundred pounds of Tobacco p man foureteen thousand pounds of tobacco.

To the same Howell for his Lewetent^t seaven hundred pounds of Tobacco for his ensigne six hundred pounds of Tobacco, and for his sargeant five hundred pounds of Tobacco.

In all eighteen hundred pounds of Tobacco to the said Howell for provision and necessities seaven hundred seaventy and six pounds of tobacco for his attendance upon a prisoner at warr.

The case of Henry Ward of Caecill county gentleman

Whereas Complaint hath been made to the Burgesses & Delegates of the Lower house of Assembly & there Sufficient proved That the

said Henry Ward being Elected a Member to serve in the Lower house of the Last assembly & being there sitting did Informe the said lower house that he had a very good horse lost in the Country service in the Expediton to the Whorekills And that the Lower house giving Credit to such Informaton did thinke fitt to allow him out of the Publick Leavy Eighteene hundred pounds of Tobacco to which his Lordshipp the then Capⁿ Generall & upper house did assent unto And itt being now made evidently appeare to this house That the said Ward lost noe such horse in the Publick service and that the said allegaton was most egregiously false & that thereby he had Exceedingly abused his Lordshipp & both houses of Assembly & the whole Country, &c. Fined 4000 lbs of tobacco

At a Council held at St Mary's the two and twentieth day of October One thousand six hundred & sixty nine

Ordered that from the Whore Kill to the degree forty Northerly Latitude be erected into a County and called by the Name of Durham County and that from the Hore kill to Mount Scarborough be likewise erected into a County &c.

Charges against Baltimore 1676

"The exployet of the wherekill in Delewar Bay. when the inhabitants powder and shot, guns, pistolls, shoes stokkins and cloaths from the peoples fete pressed off, provision taken by force and vyolence, contrary to the liberties and priviledges of the King's Maj^{ties} free born subjects of England.

The Hee did press 500 men, by Capt Howell from the head of the Bay, to goe in the very winter a hundred and 40. or 50 miles down to the wherekill A^o 73 to burn a few poore inhabitants out off all their houses, corn and everything els they hath, leaving poore weemen with child naked, to the mercy of a desperat hard winter when no botes nor reliefe could com to them, divers perished in that very misery &c

He tells me that the air of New Castle does not agree with his health and obliges him to seek a settlement in his native country Maryland, You will permit me to give him this testimonial of his behaviour and to recommend him as a sensible worthy man to your notice and favour.

That the said Jacob Young in the Year 1675 did not live and Inhabit in Cecil County nor in any Places within this Province, but did then live & inhabit in Delaware untill August 1676 about which time the said Jacob Young rece'd a writing Dated the 14th Aug^t 1676 in these Words foll. (Suffer the bearer hereof Jacob Young the Interpreter together with the Embassadors of the Susquehannah Nation to pass freely to St Maries in this Province of Maryland, and from thence Safely to return to New Castle &c

At a Councill held at St Maryes the 5th day of Aprill 1688

Their Hon^{rs} haveing been informed of a murther comitted at the Hore Kills, and the murtherer fled into Dorchester County and by the Comiss^{rs} of Said Dorchester County Deld back for his Tryall at the Hore Kills, it was debated whether the said Com^{rs} of Dor: County had performed their duty in soe doeing; it not as yet being otherwise determined but that the said Hore Kills ought to be under his Lo^{ps} Governm^t & resolved that noe notice be taken of this present, but that his Lo^{ps} opinion in things of this nature be prayed

NEW CASTLE

These are by the King and Queens Authority, and in the Proprietors Name to will and require thee Henry Vanderburgh to be and appear before the Justices of the Quarter Sessions to be held at New-castle the twentieth day of September next as well as to answer for withholding one thousand Pounds Sterl due to their Majestys as to abide the Judgement of the said court and hereof fail not at thy Peril Given at New Castle August 8th 1692

Bee it Remembered that this 16th day of August 1692 at New Castle in Delaware River Henry Vanderburgh of the sd place Merch^t Declares that on the 8th of this instant Edward Randolph Esq did Summon him the said Henry Vanderburgh to appear at the next Quarter Session to answer for withholding 1000^l Sterling due their Majestys he being as Surety bound in a bond with Matthias de Hart Mas^r of the Sloop Unity of New York for the said sum to their Majestys but the said Edward Randolph told for twenty pieces of eight and paying the Fees he would withdraw the Action and prosecute the Bond agt Matthias de Hart the Principall to which the said Henry Vanderburgh Cumplied and the action was accordingly withdrawn whereupon the said Esq^r Randolph gave him a paper which he thought to be a Receipt for the money a Copey whereof is above

Edward Blake one of the Justices of New Castle declares that about the 8th of August 1692 at the request of Mr Edward Randolph Surveyor Generall he went into a room at the house of John Cann in Company with Henry Vanderburgh and discoursed about the 1000^l bond to the King wherein the said Vanderburgh was security and told him if he would be civill and Genteel he would endeavour to indemnify him from the said bond whereupon the said Vanderburgh offered 8 or 10 pees of eight which the said Randolph would not accept of but said if he would give him his note for 20 pees of eight he would do it, upon which they went to the attestants house where the said Vanderburgh paid the said Edward Randolph the money

Godwins Company and was personally acquainted with P. Townsend know decst and that said Townsend was a member of Capt. Godwins Company and was on duty at the attact upon the Town in April 1813 and also states that he (said Pretymen) has received a warent for 160 acrs of land for said services and that John Bennet has recd a warrent for 160 acres of land and answers? Wilson Sharkeys widow has recd a warent for 160 acoers of land all belong to Capt. Godwins Company.

Whereupon the Councell tooke a viewe of his Lo^ps Com^{on} to the said Captaine James Neale Granted for the leavying of men to make warre upon certain enemies Piratts, and Robbers that had usurped a parte of Delaware Baye lying within the fortyeth Degree of Northerly Latitude as followeth (vizt)

And upon Consideraton had first that it is very doubtfull whether the Towne of New Amstell doe lye within the lymitts of this Province or not, and that his Lo^p Doth not authorize a warre with any but such as have usurped some parte of this Province or shall abett or ayde such as have usurped some parte of this Province. And next that his Lo^p hath left it as appears by the words of the letter to us to finde the waye to reduce the supposed Intruders and Usurpers

upon Confidence and of Assistance from Virginia and New England that might be given us which doth not at all seeme likely the Dutch Trade being the Darling of the People of Virginia as well as this Province and indeed all other Plantacons of the English, and this Province alone not being able to beare the Charge of the Warre that will thence insue with the West Indian Company in Holland upon any Attempt upon that place which not only from their Protestacon first of September last made at Amsterdam but also by late letters from Holland appears to be resolved on by them in case any force shall be used by us against the Towne of New Amstell Resolved that all Attempts be forborne against the said Towne of New Amstell till such tyme as letters from his Lo^d may againe be had in answere of what hath been written to his Lo^d concerning this Affaire and that Observacon may be taken at the head of the Baye of Chesepeack thereby to finde certainly whether the said Towne of New Amstell Doe lye within the fortyeth degree of Northerly Latitute or not and further that tryall be made whether Assistance from Virg^a may be had and from New England for the Reducing and mayntenance of that place against the Dutch

Letter to the Governor of the New Netherlands

SIR

Some servants being lately fledd out of this colony, into yours, as is supposed, we could not but promise o^rselves from you the iustice & faire correspondence betweene the two governments so neerly bordering & w^{ch} are shortly like to be nearer neighbors in delaware bay, as to hope that upon the receiving of these o^r lres & the demand of the pties interested you will remand to us all such apprentice servants as are or shall run out of this govermt in to yours; and will compel such other persons, as shall flie to you without a passe, being indebted or otherwise obnoxious to the iustice of this place, to make such satisfaction to the parties endamaged by their unlawful departure, upon their complaint & prooffe thereof as you shall find iustice to require. And you may promise yo^r selfe the like helpe & concurrence from this government in that or any other thing shalbe in the power of it; And so we bid you heartily farewell & rest

By the Lieutenant &c of Maryland

Whereas Capt. That in case he find opportunity he insinuate unto the People there seated that in case they make theyr application to his Lordships Govern^r heere they shall find good Condicons, According to the Conditions of Plantatons granted to all Commers into this Province w^{ch} shall be made good to them; & that they shall have protection in theyr lives, libertys, & estates w^{ch} they shall bring with them

Letter sent by Coll Vtie to Delaware

I receaved a letter from you directed to me as the lord Baltmores Governor & lieutenant of the Province of Maryland wherein you suppose yourselfe to be Governor of a people seated in a part of Delaware Bay wch I am very well informed lyeth to the southward of the degree forty & therefore can by no meanes owne or acknowledge any for Governor there but myselfe who am by his lop appointed lieutenant of his whole Province lyeing betweene the degrees 38 & 40: but do by these require & command you presently to depart forth of this his lops Province or otherwise desire you to hould me excused if I use my Vtmost endeavor to reduce that part of his Lops Province unto its due obedience under him

Murders by Indians

The Informcon of Peter Meyer touching the death of foure English men killedd in their Passage Betweene Delaware Bay and the head of Chesepeack bay by Indians upon Wednesday in Easter Weeke last Vizt.

That upon Fryday in Easter Weeke being at the Sand hooke there came unto him one Fobby Yanson and tould him that he feared that some English men were killed by the Indians because seekeing his horse in the Woods he sawe an Indian passe by wth a Grey hatt with Ribbons tyed upon a Packe at his back that a while afterwards the said Fobby Janson shewed him the Indian that had the hatt at his backe that by the assistance of Mr. William Hollingsworth of New England and some others he did apprehend the said Indian with his Companion whome upon demand of Justice the Governor of the same place Comitted to Prison Whereupon the rest of the Indian's in the Towne fledd and left one packe behinde them in which packe he

found an English red Wastcoate with a hole in the back wett, and a Canvass bagg all bloody and an english paire of shoes: That one of these Prisoners were released that night to goe and fetch their King and that the next day the other were released, but upon what Ground he knowes not

And the said Peter Mayer further informed that demanding of the said Indian how he came by that hatt he answered it was Given him by another Indian called Ocomecha who had killd an English man

That he had Desired the said Packe of Goods in which the Wastcoate and bloody bagg was found to be arrested which was accordingly done, but that coming the next day to enquire for itt the man of the house where it was deposited answered that it was given to the Indians againe And that he was told by the Dutch that the Indians did threaten him as being an English man for to kill him
