PREFACE.

THIS is not the place in which to attempt to give any history of Horringer, but one or two things may be jotted down.

I. ITS NAME.—Horningsworth, Horningserth, Horninger, Horringer. These forms of the name will be found in successive use during the last 800 years. As time runs on names, like other things, will undergo slight changes, and those changes generally follow certain unwritten laws. In the change from Horningsworth to Horningserth, and from Horningserth to Horninger, and from Horninger to Horringer, the usual law is followed. There are other cases in which worth is corrupted into er. I have heard my father say that Ickworth used often to be called Icker, and I have heard it so called by an old man within the last few months.

But apparently in the course of the 18th century the form Horningsheath came into use, and it still more or less survives and holds the field with Horringer.

Now Horningsheath is as bad as it can be, and the sooner it is got rid of the better. For it is neither the original name, nor is it a legitimate, natural, and regular corruption of the original name. It proceeds from a mistaken idea and from false etymology. When the old English word worth dropped out of the language and people ceased to know that there had been such a word in it, then they began to think that the last syllable of Horningserth represented heath, and so they took to calling it Horningsheath. But the Domesday book of 800 years ago, and other early documents show positively that the last syllable of the name was worth and not heath. Therefore Horningsworth is right, because it is what men originally called it: Horningserth, Horninger, and Horringer are right because they are the natural and regular corruptions of the original name; but Horningsheath is wrong because it is neither the one nor the other, but the result of a false notion.

II. MEANING OF THE NAME.—The first two syllables must represent the name of some early owner. I presume that his time lay between the rather wide limits of A.D. 500 and 900. Possibly he was an emigrant from the shores of the Baltic, and Horningsea in Cambridgeshire may be another of his possessions. The last syllable, worth, is an early English word meaning an estate of some sort.

There are certain syllables one or other of which will often be found at the end of the names of villages, such as worth, ton, stead, field, ham, and others. And it

is curious to notice how these syllables will often be found in groups. Without going out of this immediate neighbourhood one can see this. In Hawstead, Whepstead, Stanstead, and Boxsted we have a group of steads. In Cockfield, Stansfield, Stanningfield, and the three Bradfields we have a group of fields. In Cavenham, Icklingham, Tuddenham, Heigham, Saxham, Denham, Dalham, we have a group of hams. And in Ickworth, Horningsworth, and Bedericksworth we have three contiguous worths. The force of this last instance is not weakened by the fact that Bedericksworth has changed its original name for that of Bury St. Edmunds.

- Horringer was divided into two, Great and Little. There were two halls or manor houses, two churches, two rectors. Mr. Gage says that this division seems to have been made at some time between the Norman Conquest and the death of Henry II, i.e. between 1066 and 1189. The two parishes were consolidated in 1528. In Appendix VI I have given a list of the rectors of each Horringer from 1300 to 1528, and of the rectors of the two amalgamated Horringers from 1528 to the present time. The church of Great Horringer which is still doing duty today is dedicated to St. Leonard. The church of Little Horringer which is clean gone was dedicated to St. Peter. It stood not far from Little Horringer hall, and I imagine that a spade and a pick axe could easily discover what was its length and breadth and shape.
- IV. THE OWNERS. Of that early owner whose name remains embedded in the name of the village, like the bones of an extinct animal embedded in a rock, I can say nothing. Perhaps he was a Viking, who sailed from the shores of the Baltic, landed somewhere on the coast of Suffolk, and fought his way inland as far as the worth which still bears his name.

The earliest owner whom one can see with any distinctness is Theodred, an East Anglian Bishop and afterwards Bishop of London. He died somewhere about A.D. 960. Mr. Gage prints his will in full. By it he gave his land at Ickworth, Horringer, Nowton, and Whepstead to the newly-founded abbey at Bury St. Edmunds.

The next owners then are the Abbots of Bury. When once lands got into the possession of an abbey, there they remained as long as the abbey went on, for the

abbey neither died nor sold nor gave.* So the manors of Great and Little Horringer remained in the possession of the Abbots of Bury for nearly 600 years after the death of Bishop Theodred.

In 1537 the monasteries were dissolved and their vast landed possessions came before long into the market. The reformation changed the religion of the people and the services in their churches. But it did more than that. It set free an enormous quantity of land which had been locked up for centuries in the possession of the Church, and sent it into the market.

After the dissolution of the monasteries in 1537 the manors of Great and Little Horringer did not keep company but got parted for a time, and so we must follow them separately.

GREAT HORRINGER.—In 1546 this manor and advowson were granted by the Crown to Sir Thomas Darcy, afterwards Lord Darcy of Chick. In 1549 Sir Thomas sold it to Sir Robert Southwell, Master of the Rolls, whose grandson, Sir Robert, sold it in 1583 to Sir Robert Jermyn of Rushbrooke, so that henceforth it became part of the Rushbrooke estate.

The Jermyn family possessed it for the next 125 years, their representatives being as follows:—

- 1. Sir Robert who first obtained it was he who made that curious marriage with Judith Blagge of Little Horringer. (See Blagge in Biographical Notes.) He died in 1614 and was succeeded by his son
- 2. Sir Thomas. This was he who was the friend and patron of William Bedell. (See Bedell in Biographical Notes.) He had two sons, of whom Henry the younger was created Earl of St. Albans, and is said to have been privately married to Queen Henrietta Maria, the widow of Charles I. Sir Thomas died in 1644, and was succeeded by his eldest son
- 3. Thomas. This Thomas had two sons, Thomas No. 4 and Henry No. 5, and died in 1659.
- 4. Thomas. This Thomas became Baron Jermyn on the death of his uncle, the Earl of St. Albans, in 1683. His only son Thomas was killed in 1692 by the mast of a ship falling on him on the Thames. (See Diary of John, Lord Bristol, under Dec., 1692.) Lord Jermyn died in 1703 leaving five daughters and co-

^{*} Ickworth was an exception to this rule. It only remained in the possession of the abbey for about an hundred years, and then was exchanged for Elvedon and became private property. See Gage's Thingoe Hundred, p. 275.

heiresses, of whom Mary, the eldest, was married to Sir Robert Davers of Rougham, and brought the Rushbrooke estate to the Davers family.

5. Henry, the younger brother of No. 4, was created Lord Dover in 1685, and succeeded his brother as Lord Jermyn in 1703. He died in 1708 without children, and both baronies then became extinct. The article on him in the Dictionary of National Biography says that "most of his property passed to Sir Jermyn Davers, who had married his niece." This is incorrect, as it was Sir Robert, the father of Sir Jermyn, who married his niece. It is not quite clear whether Horringer passed to the Davers' family on the death of Thomas, Lord Jermyn, in 1703, or on the death of Henry, Lord Jermyn, in 1708.

Either in 1703 or in 1708 the manor of Great Horringer passed by inheritance from the Jermyns to the Davers family, who had it for just 100 years. I have given some account of the origin of this ill-fated family in the Biographical Notes. Their representatives as owners of the manor of Great Horringer were as follows:—

- I. Sir Robert Davers, 2nd Bart., married Mary, one of the five daughters and co-heiresses of Thomas, Lord Jermyn, and died in 1722. He was succeeded by his son
 - 2. Sir Robert, who died s. p. in 1723, and was succeeded by his brother
 - 3. Sir Jermyn, who died in 1742, and was succeeded by his son
- 4. Sir Robert. This Robert is always ignored, but at p. 320 I have given my authority for his existence, which is supported by the fact that the Institution books at the Diocesan Registry at Norwich set down Mr. French as being presented to the rectory in 1758 by Sir Robert and not Sir Charles. (See p. 254.) He died in America in 1763 and was succeeded by his brother
- 5. Sir Charles, who was in the army and represented Bury St. Edmunds in Parliament continuously from 1774 to 1802, and died without legitimate issue in 1806. Sir Charles had two sisters, Mary and Elizabeth. Mary died unmarried in 1805 at her house on the Angel Hill at Bury St. Edmunds, adjoining the Abbey gate. Elizabeth was married to Frederick Hervey, Earl of Bristol and Bishop of Derry (see Fred: Hervey in Biographical Notes), and died at Ickworth Lodge in 1800. This marriage brought the Rushbrooke estate (including Great Horringer) to the Hervey family. On the death of Sir Charles in 1806 his nephew, Frederick William Hervey, 5th Earl and afterwards 1st Marquis of Bristol, by right of his mother succeeded to it. He sold Rushbrooke hall to the

Rushbrooke family who now possess it, but Horringer has since then kept company with Ickworth, and belongs to-day to his grandson.

So much for the manor of Great Horringer, which for now over 300 years has passed by right of inheritance from owner to owner. As the Abbots of Bury had previously possessed it for nearly 600 years, it will be seen that its changes through a thousand years in this world of change have not been many, and that the auctioneer has not had many opportunities of pointing out its merits.

With regard to the hall or manor house, in the days of Bury Abbey the abbots occasionally resided there. But I imagine that since it became part of the Rushbrooke estate it has been a farm-house. The present tenant, Mr. Moore, has kindly shown me over every corner of it, but I cannot see anything that I could put down to the times of the abbots. There are some indications of a moat, but they are not very clear. Mr. Gage mentions John Pryck as being a tenant of it in the latter days of the abbots. Pryck, recently always spelt Pryke, is an old Ickworth and Horringer name which has only lately died out there.

LITTLE HORRINGER.—We must now pass on to notice the successive owners of this manor. The complications of land tenure in the middle ages are so fearful that it is sometimes difficult to make out who is the real owner of land. But apparently the Abbots of Bury owned Little as well as Great Horringer. They certainly presented to both livings, and one of them built Little Horringer hall. This hall was built by John Melford alias Reeve alias Noel, the last of the abbots, who only survived the fall of his abbey a few months, and died at Bury in 1540. It was pulled down by George, 2nd Earl of Bristol, and nothing remains of it but the moat and that indescribable something which always remains, even though every brick be hauled away.

Mr. Gage tells us that after the dissolution of the monasteries Little Horringer was granted by the Crown to Sir Thomas Darcy, who in 1549 sold it to Sir Robert Southwell, who in 1550 sold it to John Moore of Peckham, Co. Kent, who in 1552 sold it to Thomas Lucas of Horsecroft, who in 1562 sold it to Sir Ambrose Jermyn of Rushbrooke, the father of Sir Robert Jermyn who bought Great Horringer.

It is curious that though both Great and Little Horringer were in the possession of the Elizabethan Sir Robert Jermyn and are now in the possession of the Victorian Marquis of Bristol, yet they have not gone together but have travelled from the one to the other by totally different routes. While Great

Horringer has always passed by right of inheritance Little Horringer has been frequently coming into the market. The auctioneer may have had chances of puffing the one while he has had no chance whatsoever of puffing the other.

From Sir Robert Jermyn the manor passed by some process or other, gift or exchange or purchase, to the Blagge family, with whom he was connected by more than one marriage. The Blagges have helped to fill the registers, and some account of them will be found in the Biographical Notes. They were there from about 1570 to about 1640.

After the Blagges came the Gipps family, who I presume bought it. They were there from about 1640 to about 1720. Some account of them will be found in the Biographical Notes.

After the Gipps family came Admiral Thomas Davers, a younger son of Sir Robert Davers of Rushbrooke, who I presume bought it, though possibly he may have inherited it. Some account of him will be found in the Biographical Notes.

In 1752 the widow and son of Admiral Davers sold it to George, Lord Bristol, who gave £6,600 for it. He pulled down the hall, and with the materials built the present farm-house just outside the moat.

Since then Little Horringer has kept company with Ickworth, which it joined some 50 years earlier than Great Horringer.

Of its church nothing is visible above ground, but the site is known, and I presume that the foundations remain untouched.

In following the descent of these two manors it must not be supposed that they included every house and every acre in the parish. They included the advowson, the mansion house, a certain amount of land, a certain number of houses, and various manorial rights, but there was a certain amount of land which either never had been part of the manor or had got detached from it at some time or other, as planets have been detached from the sun, as comets have been detached from the earth. One of the charges brought against the last Abbot of Bury was that he spent too much time at his granges and that he converted divers farms into copyholds.

Both John, 1st Earl of Bristol, and his grandson and successor, George, bought up such of these smaller estates in Horringer as they could, and I imagine that some of them were thrown into Ickworth park. In a manuscript book George, who succeeded his grandfather in 1751, has entered an account of "Purchases made by me since the death of my grandfather."

To Mr. George Boldero for houses and lands belonging to Mr. Moyle in the Parish of Horringer, £840.

To Mr. Johnson for his house in the churchyard at Bury, which house I afterwards exchanged with Lady Ann Hervey for her house and estate in Horringer Parish, £,525.

To Mr. Symonds for his estate in Horringer, £4,500.

To Mr. Sparke, Mrs. Sparke and Mrs. Kedington for their lands in Horringer, £850.

To Mr. Neville, Mr. and Mrs. Syer for their lands in Horringer, £1,950.

I cannot identify any of these estates, but as both Mr. Moyle and Mr. Symonds were connected by marriage with the Jermyn and Davers families, their estates may have been detached portions of the manor of Great Horringer.

And besides those estates there was that one, now represented by Horringer house, which belonged to the Covels in the 17th century, and others of various sizes. Horsecroft (see Lucas in Biographical Notes) appears never to have formed part of the manor of either Horringer.

V. THE INHABITANTS.—These registers show us little more than their bare names and their duration of life, but I presume that during the whole period their occupation was mainly agricultural. For about ten years, viz., from 1695 to 1704, both in the register of Baptisms and of Burials, the occupation is given, farmer, labourer, woolcomber, shepherd, as the case may be. But except during those ten years no occupation is mentioned till 1813, when in the register of Baptisms it begins to be given regularly. The building of the great house at Ickworth, which was begun near about 1790, must have brought a large number of carpenters and bricklayers into the village, some of whom seem to have permanently settled there, and I presume their children are there to-day. The bricks required for that building must also have given considerable employment for a time, as they appear to have been made on the spot. Sixty years earlier, in the time of John, Lord Bristol, Horringer hands had made Ickworth bricks for the Court house at Bury St. Edmunds. Thirty years earlier still, viz., in 1702, Ickworth bricks were needed for Ickworth Lodge, but as there was then a village of Ickworth, Horringer hands need not have been required to the same extent. (Letters of John, Lord Bristol, Nos. 204, 206, 1019, 1021, 1023.)

The population of Horringer as given in the decennial census returns is as follows. I have not got the figures for each return.

VI. THE RECTORS.—I have given a list of the Rectors in Appendix VI and of the Curates in Appendix XI, and have added there and in the Biographical Notes anything that I could find out about them. It will be seen that three of the Rectors became Bishops, viz., Bedell and Womack in the 17th century and Lord Arthur Hervey in the 19th. The view of the old Rectory house here given shows it as it is to-day. I imagine that in its general outline and appearance it does not look very different to what it did when Bedell entertained his parishioners there and planted and grafted and inoculated and dug in its garden. The sash windows of course belonged to a later date. It ceased to be the rectory house when the new one was built in 1873, and is now a Village Club and Institute.

VII. THE VILLAGE.—It must be enough to say under this heading that the centre of Horringer is about two miles from the centre of Bury St. Edmunds. On its boundary line lie successively Bury St. Edmunds, Westly, Little Saxham (?), Ickworth, Whepstead, Hawstead, Nowton, Hardwick, and so back to Bury. (See Appendix V.) The church standing on the Green which affords a healthy play-ground for the neighbouring school, Ickworth park peeping in through the park gates, the wide village street with wide margins on either side, the comfortable looking cottages set well back from the road and standing in ample gardens, everything wide, ample, fresh, airy, and clean, make it at any rate in its outward appearance a model village. The squalor which disgraces many English villages, the narrow, cribbed, confined, unhealthy look which some of them have and which makes them more like the slums of a town than like a country village, every bit of ground within the minimum legal number of feet from the centre of the road grabbed by somebody's greed, the squalid gardenless houses touching the very road, so that open windows, if such there should be, receive within not air but dust, all this is happily not to be seen in Horringer street.

VIII. THE ORIGINAL REGISTERS.—These are mostly in fair condition and have been fairly well kept. From the beginning in 1558 to 1622 the writing is very fine and as fresh as if done yesterday, the regnal year of the sovereign being given on one side of the page while the year of our Lord is given on the other. I have left off printing with the end of 1850, so that we have in these volumes the record of three centuries, or to be exact 293 years. In the Baptisms there are no gaps. In the Marriages and Burials there are one or two short gaps during the troublous times of the 17th century. But though there are

hardly any gaps of whole years, it is clear that many entries have been omitted. When entries were not made in the Register at the time but only jotted down on any scrap of paper and copied into the book at the end of the year, it is very likely that the scraps of paper would be lost and the entries never be made. And it is clear that this has often happened. This carelessness went on even to within this present century. However, we have got a good deal and must be thankful for that.

As the contents of the two earliest existing volumes are rather mixed, I will set them out here. The letters are of my giving.

It will be seen that for a few years on either side of 1700 there are duplicate copies of entries, which do not always exactly agree. This is what I refer to when I mention "duplicate."

In 1679 an Act of Parliament was passed for the encouragement of the woollen trade. By the Act an affidavit had to be sworn to and brought to the Minister within eight days of burial, declaring that the deceased had been buried in woollen. The penalty was £5. Accordingly every entry of burial from 1679 to 1760 or soon after states that the affidavit had been received. Now and then it is stated

that it was received after the specified time. I have not thought it worth while to print the words "affidavit received," but content myself with saying here that the words are there in every case.

From 1776 to 1785 the date of birth is given as well as that of baptism. I have printed this at the end of each entry.

Towards the close of the last century it appears to have been the common custom for children to be privately baptized at home immediately after birth, and afterwards (sometimes 2 or 3 years afterwards) received into the Church. Sometimes the entry was made at the time of the private baptism, sometimes at the time of reception, and sometimes at both times. I have left out the second entry when I happened to notice it. There is a good deal of confusion in the chronological order of the entries, which I have tried to diminish.

In 1789 begins the very useful custom of giving the mother's maiden name. This I have printed in brackets in the Register of Baptisms.

When there are two surnames in brackets the other one is hers by a former marriage.

It must not be forgotten that till 1751 the year is reckoned to begin at March 25.

There only remains for me to express my thanks to the Rev. James Giddens for the help he has given me in many ways.

ABBREVIATIONS AND EXPLANATIONS.

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These abbreviations will be found in the Marriage entries from 1725 onwards:—L for licence. P for parish. S for single. W for widow or widower.

In the Baptismal entries 1776 to 1786 the date at the end of the entry is the date of birth.

In Baptisms and Burials from 1789 onwards the surname in brackets is the mother's maiden name.

In Marriages 1837 to 1850, "single," "of this parish," and "labourer," are implied where it is not otherwise stated. Also, the profession after the bride's name is that of her father.

A quotation is there given from Pepys' Diary:—

"1661. June 30. To church, where we observe the trade of briefs is come now up to so constant a course every Sunday that we resolve to give no more to them."

APPENDIX II.

MONUMENTAL INSCRIPTIONS WITHIN HORRINGER CHURCH.

Nos. 1, 2, are flat stones in the Chancel; Nos. 3, 4, 5, 6, 7, 8, are flat stones in the Vestry; Nos. 9, 10, 11, 12, are on the West wall of the North aisle; No. 13 is in the Tower; Nos. 14, 15, 16, 17, 18, are in the South Chapel. Originally Nos. 1 to 12 were all in the Chancel, and No. 13 on the West gallery.

1. Here lie the remains of Peter Gedge who died Jan. 7, 1818, aged 59 years. A tablet to his memory is erected in St. Mary's Church, Bury.

The man of benevolence, integrity, and Christian piety.

Also of Ann his wife who died April 16, 1840, aged 70 years.

Ann daughter of the above died Dec. 14, 1824, aged 27, and was buried in the churchyard.

- 2. The upper part of this stone is concealed by the choir seats. All that can now be read is as follows:
 - said Christian Lucas. This stone was laid by Mr. John Lurkin and Mr. Thomas Roper, the executors of Mrs. Sach.
- 3. Here lyeth the body of William Lucas Esquire who departed this life Jan. 1639.
 - Here lyeth the body of Elizabeth Lucas wife of Dr. Lucas, who dyed June 24, 1668.
 - Hic jacet Dr. Lucas qui obiit May 24, 1698, ætat: 83.
- 4. Here lyeth the body of Ann the wife of Mr. Abraham Kedington and eldest daughter of Mr. John Ewin of this Parish who departed this life Sept. 30 anno dommini 1728, ætatis 27.

Also Abraham their son who died an infant.

- 5. H. S. E. Edvardus Foster A.M. Ecclesiæ Badeliensis Pastor per annos xiv, fidelis, pius et indefessus, qui studiis assiduis & exinde morbis exhaustus gregi æquue ac amicis flebilis omnibusque desideratus, obiit (heu præmature) v Kal. Oct. anno salutis MDCCIV, ætatis xxxvii. Uxor moerens posuit.
 - Here lyeth also the body of Mrs. Ann Foster, daughter of Mr. Edward Foster and Hester his wife, who dyed April 1, 1705, being fifteen weekes old.
- 6. Underneath this stone are interred the remains of Henry Cameron Cherry, son of the Revd. Henry Curtis Cherry M.A. curate of this parish and Anne Alicia his wife. Born Aug. 13, 1823. Died June 11, 1824.
- 7. Catharine Maria daughter of the Revd. Edward Gould and Mary Ann Penelope his wife. Died Jan. 5, 1832, aged 2 months.
- 8. This inscription is on a small brass let into the stone.
 - Here lyeth the body of Mary Lucas the eldest daughter of William Lucas of Horscroft in Horninger esquier, which departed this life Oct. 13, A.D. 1618.
- 9. To the Memory of Woodward Bidwell Esq. who died June 6, 1826, in the 74th year of his age.
 - Also of Susanna his wife, daughter of the late Gregory Sparke Esq. of Risby in this County, who died July 11, 1837, in the 70th year of her age.

Their mortal remains are deposited at the north side of this church.

Blessed are the pure in heart, for they shall see God.

The memory of the just is blessed.

- This tablet is erected by an affectionate friend and near relation as a grateful memorial of their virtues and of the constant proofs of their kindness and friendship experienced for many years.
- 10. Valentine Munbee Esq. departed this life Sept. 24, 1750, aged 55 years. He was a person of great good sense, learning, knowledge and integrity, qualities which made him beloved and esteemed when alive, and bewailed when dead, by those who were always dear to him, his family and his friends.
 - Mr. Gage thus describes the arms: Azure fretty Or, on a canton gules, a cross formè Argent.

- 11. Here lyeth the body of Dame Elizabeth Gipps relict of Sir Richard Gipps of Horrenger. She departed this life Nov. 11, 1715, in the 67 year of her age.
 - On a lozenge-shaped shield are the arms of Gipps impaling Poley.
- 12. Here lyeth the body of Sir Richard Gipps of Little Horninger in the County of Suffolk Knight, who marryed Elizabeth the eldest daughter of Sir Edmund Polly of Badly of the same County Knight, who dyed Sept. 28, A.D. 1681, in ye 36 yeare of his age.
 - This stone has two shields, one of which has the arms of Gipps, and the other has Gipps impaling Poley.
- To Arthur John Brooke Esq. by whom this church was completely repaired and beautified; the pulpit, desk, pews and gallery erected; the East window framed with coloured glass; the bells, with the addition of a new one, recast; and the clock presented; the inhabitants of Horningsheath (his native village) inscribe this tablet as a memorial of his munificence. MDCCCXVIII.
- 14. Sacred to the memory of Elizabeth relict of William Wigson Esq. of Colchester, Essex, who died Aug. 2, 1830, aged 79 years.
- 15. Sacred to the memory of Adelaide Jane, youngest daughter of William Bacon Wigson and of Mary Ann his wife, who died Oct. 15, 1846, aged 15 years. Also of Emma their second daughter, who died June 23, 1848, aged 27 years.
- Mary Ann Wigson. Born Feb. 4, 1819. Died Jan. 14, 1824.
 Thomas Wigson an infant, died Nov. 1, 1824.
 Henry Cooke Wigson, died Jan. 17, 1826, aged 2 years, 4 months.
 Frederic Turnor Wigson. Born July 3, 1829. Died Nov. 7, 1830.
 Septimus Seaber Wigson. Born Jan. 1, 1833. Died April 20, 1833.
- William Bacon Wigston. Born Jan. 30, 1787. Died Feb. 7, 1872.
 Mary Ann Wigston. Born Oct. 16, 1793. Died Aug. 28, 1879.
- 18. DOMS Surgite, mortui. In te, Domine, speravi, non confundar in æternum.
 - Hic jacet corpus Johannis Cooke generosi, qui obiit Julii 12, anno salutis 1653, ætatis suæ 72.

APPENDIX III.

MONUMENTAL INSCRIPTIONS IN HORRINGER CHURCHYARD.

Nos. 1 to 33 inclusive are in the triangular space between the two paths leading up to the Chancel door and South porch respectively.

Nos. 34, 35, 36, 37, lie flat at the East end of the South chapel.

Nos. 38 to 79 are on the South side of the Church between the path leading to the chancel door and the East hedge.

Nos. 80 to 96 are on the South side of the Church between the path leading to the South porch and the West hedge.

Nos. 97 to 119 are under the tower.

Nos. 120 to 220 are on the North side of the Church.

I have left out the words "Here lies" or "In memory of," and have sometimes put [died] instead of its longer equivalent. With such exceptions the inscriptions are given exactly. Occasionally differences will be found between the tombstones and the Register, both as to the age of the person buried and as to the year of burial. Owing to the foolish and exaggerated use of thin strokes by stonecutters, the difference between 1 and 4 is sometimes very soon annihilated.

1. Richard ye son of Richard and Martha Elsden, who died June 23, 1756, aged 4 years.

Also Jane their daughter died July 26, 1756, aged 16 months.

APPENDIX IV.

CHURCH RATES—1693, 1699.

The parish chest in Horringer Church not only contains no medieval accounts, but is also very poorly furnished with those records, rates, and accounts of the last two centuries which most parishes possess, and which often throw much light upon what was done and how and when.

There is a volume containing only the barest summary of what was received and what spent every year by the Churchwardens from 1723 to 1842. This volume contains the signatures of those who were present at each annual Easter vestry during that time, and the names of the churchwardens who were then appointed. Two questmen were also appointed at each Easter vestry as well as two churchwardens. No questmen seem to have been appointed after 1765. Questmen are in some parishes called sidesmen. Other parish books have I presume got into private hands, and either wrongfully remain there or have been lost.

There are two pieces of parchment, both imperfect, containing portions of rates made in 1693 and 1699 respectively. These I print here. The later one is the least imperfect. The original manuscript gives in parallel columns what each man's rate is at a farthing in the pound and what he actually has to pay when that rate is multiplied by 5 or 20 as the case may be. I have omitted the former column, which of course in the one rate is one-fifth and in the other rate is one-twentieth of the column which I have given. In the heading to the rate "doubled" means multiplied. Lady Gipps who heads the list pays for Little Horringer Hall. She was the widow of Sir Richard Gipps. John Ewen who comes next pays for Great Horringer Hall, which then belonged to the Jermyns of Rushbrook, whose tenant he was. The Lucas family pay for Horsecroft, which they then owned. What the college was for which they pay I know not. It was probably some medieval religious house which had been abolished at the Reformation, and it may be the College Farm in the Horringer of to-day.

APPENDIX V.

PERAMBULATION OF HORRINGER.

This account of the bounds of Horringer is written in pencil in a note book which is in the parish chest. Apparently it was scribbled as the perambulation was going on. The date of it would appear to be early in this present century. The churchwardens' accounts show that there was a perambulation of the parish made in 1821. Possibly it was scribbled then. I presume that the starting point "the 1st plantation in the park" is the grove that lies across the footpath that leads from Horringer gate to Ickworth Lodge, half way between the two. From thence they proceeded across the present cricket ground, which seems to be partly in Ickworth and partly in Horringer. The pond and (I think) the marked tree near the cricket ground are still there. The pestle that they came to soon afterwards must be what is now a wood called Pestle wood. Bayard's meadow, reached soon afterwards, deserves a word of explanation.

In an old Ickworth parish rate-book of the last century I have noticed that that part of the stream which flows near Bayard's meadow is called Bayard's water. Bayard was an old English word meaning originally a bay horse, afterwards any horse. Bayard's water must mean the horses' watering place.* And as the high road from Bury to Chevington passed by this spot, and the blacksmith's shop formerly stood here, it is easy to see the possibility of the suitability of the name.

Lady Gipps' road must be a road leading to Little Horringer Hall. I have not exactly identified the acre called Gospel acre, nor do I know why the Gospel was read there. There are several Gospel oaks in the country, which were mark or boundary oaks where the Gospel was read at perambulations. In Walker's "Sufferings of the Clergy" we read that Mr. Bond, Vicar of Debenham, was sequestred in or

about 1644 "for observing the orders and rules of the Church, reading part of a Gospel at the cross in a perambulation," etc. p. 209.

Foaming Sea is still so called, being where the brook goes under the road (Poulter's Lane) between Horringer and Chedburgh. That brook afterwards enters Ickworth park and flows through it, coming out of it near Bayard's meadow, and flowing on to Bury.

Starting mark an oak in the 1st plantation in the park H, bear N.W., mark a tree opposite the pond, the pond on the right, mark a post in the park pales, cross the ley to a style, mark a tree, turn to the right, cross the pestle to a pollard, last but one marked, turn west down the pestle to Bayards meadow, mark a tree, thro the hedge into the meadow, point to the brook, mark an oak tree, leave 2 trees on the left, thro' the hedge into the open field, brook on the left by the road half way up 16A, mark in the ground on the right hand, turn down to Westley bottom, cross mark in the ground at the bottom, turn to the right sharp, mark in the ground to the right of the cross road, cross the bottom, take in all the Westley bottom to the top of Chalk hill, ground mark, turn to the right upon the ridge, at the end turn to left 4 rod, turn to the right 10 rod, turn to the right up the hill, mark on the mear, turn to the right at the end at Westly road, to a mark on the mear at the cross roads, turn to the right, turn to the right at the road to Saxham to a white post, mark in the ground, cross the bottom to Gosple acre, mark in the ground, up to Lady Gipps road, read the Gospel, mark in the ground 2 rod beyond B [Bury] bounds, turn to the right up the land, towards the mill, to the road to Horringer hall, turn to right 4 rod, mark, turn to the left down the meres, mark close to Bury road above the stone, 4 rodd, down to the stone, thro the hedge cross Nunns 20 acres up to Bury post on the road to Hargate [Hardwick] heath, leave the post on the right 12 rod, mark on the right of the road, half the road in B., down to cross road, turn to the right towards Horsecroft to the stone, turn to the left, cross the land, mark in the ground 6 rod to the right of Bury stone, turn to the right, leave the hedge on the left, over stile, mark a tree in Millers field, thro 3 of Millers field, turn to the right down the lane to the stile on the left, over the stile to a stile to J. Nunns, mark a tree, cross the park to J. Nunns house, pass between the house and backhouse close to the dwelling house thro a gate into the rack yard between the house and the stable, leave the barns on the left, take in a cart lodge, over the hedge into a pasture, mark a tree at the end of a ditch,

leave the pond on the left, mark a syccamine, into the road, cross Gags Green, mark a timber oak, cross the road, mark in the ground, over hedge into a field I. Nun, mark a tree ash, mark an oak at the [sic] of a plantation, go at the head of Horsecroft lands, take in Hawsted grove, cross the drift to Hawsted place, mark a sycamine, into a triangle peice, turn to left over a stile beside the Whepstead road, mark a tree, over into the road, under the hedge to an oak tree the corner of a plantation, cross the road under the hedge on the right, turn the corner into the lane to a post, over the left into Whymark field, mark an ash, leave the pond on the left, lane on the right, cross at a stile, ground mark in the lane, down the lane to a gate into a field, mark a pollard 4 rod from the gate, leave the wood to the right, mark a tree, into the wood, cross the wood to a [?], go by the head of the land to foaming sea, marked a maple up the road, turn into the grove at a marked post, cross into the glade up it, into the park thro the great gate to a timber marked, turn to the left to the brick kiln, leave the brick kiln on the left, marked a tree near the corner of the park pales, cross [to] the marked tree from whence we began.



Appendix VI.

THE RECTORS OF HORRINGER.

Mr. Gage in his History of Thingoc Hundred gives a list of the Rectors of Great and Little Horringer. But finding some errors in his list I have had a fresh one made out from the Institution books in the Diocesan Registry at Norwich. All the Rectors of both Horringers before 1550 were presented by the Abbot of Bury, excepting James Hert in 1484.

Of the pre-Reformation rectors there is not much to be said. In many cases their names show some village with which they had some family or personal connection. Barton, Battisford, Elmswell, are villages in Suffolk; Tottington, Drayton, Saham Toney, Lexham, are in Norfolk; Lowthorpe is in Yorkshire. The only name among the early ones which is from a trade and not from a place is that of Richard le Sauser in 1305. I know not what trade that may be unless it is a bit of careless writing for Chaucer, which is thought to represent the Norman-French word for shoemaker. The grandfather of Chaucer the poet is believed to have been a Robert Chaucer of Ipswich, whose widow married a probable cousin, Richard Chaucer. (Dict: Nat: Biog:)

Short accounts of some of the Rectors will be found in the Biographical Notes at the end of this volume.

The title "apostolicus" applied to John of Lexham in 1374 is believed to imply that he had been on a mission of some kind to Rome.

Those of whom it is said "primam habens tonsuram clericalem" are called "shavelings" by Blomefield, having as yet only been admitted to the first tonsure.

The dates 1535 and 1548 are both given as the date of the union of the two Horringers. Probably the first date is that of a temporary union, and the latter date is that of a permanent one. The site of Little Horringer Church is known, and I presume that its foundations are still in the ground, and its dead still lie where they were.

In 1836 the Archdeaconry of Sudbury was transferred from the diocese of Norwich to that of Ely. After the death of Mr. Hasted in 1852 the parishes of Horringer and Ickworth were united.

APPENDIX VII.

POLL TAX PAYERS OF 1381.

In the year 1380 Parliament determined to obtain funds by means of a poll tax. Three groats or twelve pence were to be paid for every lay person male and female of 15 years and upwards, beggars only excepted. Each township had to find as many shillings as it contained residents over 15 years of age. But within certain limits the rich were to pay more than the poor. The limits were that no one should pay more than 60 groats nor less than one groat for himself and his wife. This tax was very unpopular and caused a rising of the peasantry. An account of this rising so far as it affected the East of England has lately been written by Mr. Edgar Powell,* and in an appendix he has given lists of those who paid the tax in about 50 Suffolk villages. From this book I take the names of those who paid in Great and Little Horringer. It gives us the names of all the people in the two parishes just 200 years before the Registers begin. From it we see that there was no resident gentleman, the lord of both manors being the Abbot of Bury. There is one farmer, one draper, two carpenters, and the rest are labourers and serfs. It is possible that there may have been some who somehow avoided payment, and so are not in this list. In Great Horringer there were 53 persons of 15 years and upwards, and so they paid 53 shillings between them; in Little Horringer there were 21, and so they paid 21 shillings. In the original Poll tax document Hornyngesherth is the form which the name takes.



APPENDIX VIII.

DOMESDAY BOOK.

Having in the last Appendix gone back 200 years before the Registers begin and shown how the population of Horringer was made up in 1381, I must go back another 300 years from then and show how it was made up in 1081 or thereabouts. Apparently at that time it had not yet been divided into two parishes, though it was so not long afterwards. This is what Domesday book says of it. The first of the two following paragraphs shows the land in Horringer held under the Abbot of Bury; the second shows the land held under Richard son of Earl Gislebert.

- 1. At Horningsworda St. Edmund held in King Edward's time 4 carrucates of land as a manor. There were always 3 villani, and 15 bordarii: always 4 plough teams in demesne, and always 5 plough teams belonging to the men: always 7 servi, and 3 acres of meadow; wood for 5 hogs: and now 5 rouncies, and now 14 beasts, and 30 hogs and 45 sheep; and 15 socmen with a carucate of land and a bordarius; always 4 plough teams. These men are under the Saint [Abbey] by sac and soc and all that is customary, and they could not give or sell the land without the Abbot's licence. A church with 6 acres of free land. Then this manor was worth 6 pounds, now 8. It is 9 quarentenes long and 8 broad; and pays 20 pence in gelt. Others have holdings there.
- 2. In Horningeserda a socman under Wisgar with 20 acres and 2 bordarii.

 Always 1 plough team, and worth 4 shillings.

In these two paragraphs I have mainly used the translation made by Lord John Hervey for his privately printed Suffolk Domesday. A few Latin terms I have left untranslated. Possibly the two paragraphs foreshadow the two Horringers.

In the first paragraph we seem to see a population of 3 villani (servile tenants), and 15 bordarii (cottagers), and 7 servi (bondsmen or serfs) as being there in the time of King Edward the Confessor, A.D. 1042 to 1066: and in 1086 when the Domesday survey was made 15 socmen are mentioned and (apparently) 15 bordarii.

In the second paragraph we see a socman and 2 bordarii.

Rouncies are ponies. A quarentene is a furlong. A carucate is the variable amount of land that may be tilled by one plough.

APPENDIX IX.

SUBSCRIBERS TO THE SUFFOLK SHIP.

A general meeting of the County of Suffolk was called by the High Sheriff and held at Stowmarket on Aug. 5, 1782, at which it was resolved "That the County of Suffolk sensible of the inferiority of the naval force of Great Britain compared with that of other European powers with whom we are at war, do undertake by voluntary subscriptions to build a man of war of 74 guns for the service of the public." This plan was taken up with great warmth. Over £4000 was promised in the room, Lord Bristol (Bishop of Derry) heading the list with £1000. A committee was appointed to receive subscriptions, and £19,766 was promised. Nearly all this came from the County, but there were a few subscriptions from outside. Among these was £600 from the clergy of the diocese of Derry. It is evident that the Bishop of Derry had taken up the idea warmly, which had been first proposed by his brother-in-law Sir Charles Davers. The Rev. Dr. Young writing to his brother Arthur at Bradfield says, When your silly Suffolk scheme of building a ship was first mentioned to Lord Keppel, he said, If they could find him seamen he should be obliged to them, for he had ten more ships ready if he had seamen to put into them. If your Suffolk gentry would take care of their own duty and suppress the smuggling on their coast, it would be well. (Autobiog: of A. Young, p. 108.) Lord Keppel, however, appears to have promised £300. The scheme was attacked in the "Bury Post" by some very long letters from Mr. Capel Lofft of Troston, while Mr. Arthur Young wrote to defend it. Lord North is said to have approved of it, while Mr. Fox condemned it as illegal. Peace being soon afterwards declared the scheme came to nothing.

The promised subscriptions were printed by parishes. From a copy in the Library of the Suffolk Archæological Institute at Bury I take the subscriptions that were promised from Ickworth and Horringer. Dr. Knowles who was then Rector of Ickworth promised ten guineas, which comes under Chedburgh.

APPENDIX XI.

THE CURATES OF HORRINGER.

Horringer is a pleasantly situated village, with some advantages and attractions and only two miles from Bury St. Edmunds, and therefore has not suffered so much in the past from non-resident rectors as many parishes have. Consequently the number of curates that have been here is comparatively small. I take the following list which is more or less complete from the Registers, where they appear either as fathers of children brought to be baptized, or as officiating, or as signing their names at the foot of a page. In many cases I cannot say much beyond giving their college and the date of their B.A. degree. I give the dates of their being here so far as I can.

UNDER DR. WOMACK.

Dr. Womack was rector from 1662 to 1683. I imagine from baptisms and burials of members of his family that he was a resident rector, but being an archdeacon he may have required the services of a curate.

JOHN HARRIS in 1672. Signs a page in the Registers as Curate. Probably of Caius Coll: B.A. 1662.

HENRY GRAY in 1674. He was probably of Clare Coll: Cambridge, B.A. 1666.

UNDER DR. SYMONDS.

Dr. Symonds who was rector from 1725 to 1758 was resident till about 1741, but not afterwards.

BERNARD MILLS in 1743. He was a native of Bury, fellow of Trin: Coll: Cambridge, B.A. 1736, D.D. 1758. From 1745 to 1757 he was reader, from 1757 to 1766 he was lecturer, at St. Mary's Church, Bury. He was appointed to Wordwell in 1750. He was also Rector of Hitcham, where he died in 1787 aged 72 years, and was buried at St. James', Bury. His portrait by Ralph was engraved by Singleton.

- STUART GUNNING in 1745. He was fellow of St. John's Coll: Cambridge B.A. 1741. He was afterwards Rector of Ufford in Northamptonshire, a college living, and died in 1774.
- ABBOT UPCHER in 1746. He was of St. Catharine's Coll: Cambridge, B.A. 1745. Mr. Tymms in his account of St. Mary's Charities mentions one left by him. He is there described as "of Sudbury."
- ROGER STURGEON in 1747. He was son of Robert Sturgeon, carpenter, of Bury St. Edmunds; educated at Bury Grammar School and Caius Coll: Cambridge, B.A. 1740; Vicar of Waterbeach 1749-1759. His other preferments and two marriages are given in Venn's Biog: Hist: of Caius Coll: He died in 1759, and was buried at St. Edward's, Cambridge.
- WILLIAM TONG, 1748 to 1757. He was of St. John's Coll: Cambridge, B.A. 1747. He had two daughters baptized here, in 1756, 1757.

UNDER MR. FRENCH.

Mr. French was rector from 1758 to 1767, and I think was entirely non-resident, though not far off.

- JOHN CULLUM takes a wedding in 1758 and 1759 and writes Curate after his signature, but I am not certain that he was Curate of Horringer. He was born at Hawstead, educated at Bury Grammar School and St. Catharine's Coll: Cambridge, B.A. 1756, became Rector of Hawstead in 1762, Vicar of Great Thurlow in 1774, succeeded his father, Sir John, as sixth baronet in 1774, and died in 1785 aged 52. He was a scholar and antiquarian and wrote a history of Hawstead.
- ROBERT LEMAN puts Curate after his signature in 1758, but he too may have been a curate in the neighbourhood. He was of Caius Coll: Cambridge, B.A. 1756, D.D. 1778. He was Rector of Pakefield, inherited Wingfield Castle from the Catelyns, and died in 1779.
- ROBERT JEGON from 1762 to 1765. He was of Jesus Coll: Cambridge, B.A. 1761.
- GEORGE ROGERS from Nov. 1765 to Feb. 1767, when he became Rector. (See Biog: Notes.)

UNDER MR. HASTED.

Mr. Hasted was rector from 1814 to 1852. His non-residence was of a very mild kind, as he lived at Bury St. Edmunds, and preached and ministered and was well known here.

- GEORGE JOHN SKEELES, 1815 to 1819. He was the only son of Preb: Skeeles of Peterborough: was at Rugby School and Christ's Coll: Cambridge; Bell scholar 1810, B.A. 1813. He was appointed Rector of Kirkby Underwood, Co. Lincoln, in 1831, Vicar of Cranwell in 1833, and I think died not long afterwards.
- HODGSON RICHARD SHEPHERD, 1820 to 1822. He was son of Rev. Henry Shepherd, a Chaplain at Calcutta, and grandson of Richard Shepherd, Rector of Wetherden and Archdeacon of Bedford. He matriculated at St. Alban's Hall, Oxford, in 1819, aged 21 years, served with 24th Dragoons in India, Chaplain H.E.I.C.S. at Dacca 1823, died 1866.
- HENRY CURTIS CHERRY, 1822 to 1826. He was of Clare Coll: Cambridge, B.A. 1821; appointed Rector of Burghfield in 1827, and Vicar of Beenham Vallence in 1840, which livings, both in Berkshire, he held together. He had three children baptized here. He published in 1844 a volume called "Illustrations of the Saints' Days and Festivals."
- GEORGE HUGHES, 1827 to 1829. I think he was of Christchurch Coll: Oxford, and died in 1830, aged 43 years.
- EDWARD GOULD, 1830 to 1836. He was the son of Colonel William Gould of Bury St. Edmunds, and was educated at Christ's Coll: Cambridge, B.A. 1822. In 1836 he was appointed Rector of Sproughton and died in 1849. He had three daughters baptized here. He married Mary Anna Penelope Heigham, who was the daughter of Rev. Henry Heigham, of Hunston Hall, by his wife Elizabeth, a daughter of Captain Thomas Symonds. (See Symonds in Biog: Notes.)
- HENRY THOMAS COOPER HINE, 1836-37. Of C. C. Coll: Camb: B.A. 1833. Reader at St. James' from 1839 to 1845, when appointed to a living in Lincolnshire. His father was a linen draper in Abbeygate St., Bury.

WILLIAM HALL, 1837 to 1844. Also Rector of Tuddenham from 1829 to 1852. Rector of Little Saxham from 1852 to 1885. He was land steward of the Ickworth estate for many years till 1859. He died in Jan. 1885 and was buried at or near Brighton, from whence he had come.

ARTHUR CHARLES HERVEY, 1844 to 1852, when he became rector. (See

Biog: Notes.)

THOMAS MURRAY COOKESLEY, 1850-1851. He was at Eton and Oriel Coll; Oxford, B.A. 1833. From 1866 till his death in 1877 he was Rector of Broughton, Northants. His elder brother, William Gifford Cookesley, was assistant master at Eton from 1830 to 1854.

FORSTER GEORGE SIMPSON, 1851 to 1860. He came here shortly before Mr. Hasted's death, and remained with Lord Arthur Hervey. He was the son of Richard Simpson of Norwood; was of St. Edmund's Hall, Oxford, B.A. 1843. From 1860 to 1866 he was Rector of Shotley in Suffolk. In 1871 he was appointed Rector of Sidestrand, near Cromer, where he died in 1892 aged 73 years. He published in 1852 a volume called "Lectures on the typical character of the Jewish Tabernacle."

UNDER LORD ARTHUR HERVEY.

Lord Arthur Hervey was rector from 1852 to 1869, and during his time there was generally a curate residing at the old Horringer Rectory.

After Mr. Simpson left there came Rev. Henry S. Mott, 1860 to 1863; Rev. Simeon Dowell Brownjohn 1864 to 1870.

And there I will stop.

I give in this Appendix a list of the Christian names given to those 3422 children, with the number of times that each name occurs in each of the three periods of 100 years. I have taken no count of second and third names given to children. That custom has sprung up within this present century. It will be seen that in each period John has an easy majority amongst the boys, whilst Elizabeth and Mary stand highest among the girls. In a few cases, e.g., Mary Ann, Anna Maria, where the second name seems to be almost a part of the first, I have put down the two together in the list as though they were one.

The name Jermyn as a Christian name was of course given either as a compliment or by reason of relationship to the Jermyns of Rushbrook, who were Lords of the Manor of Great Horringer from the time of the dissolution of the abbeys to about 1700. The name Henrietta Maria may come from the same source, Henry Jermyn, Earl of St. Albans, being supposed to be married to Henrietta Maria, the widow of Charles I.

It has occurred to me that possibly the name Sherman may come from the same source. This name was given in 1658 to a son of John Manteau, or Mantua, as it is sometimes written. I take it that he was a foreigner, possibly brought over to England by the Earl of St. Albans, or a retainer of Queen Henrietta's, and settled in a house at Horringer belonging to the Jermyns. And then wishing to call his son after his patron, and being told by the clergyman, Name this child, he replied with his foreign accent, Sherman (for Jermyn), and was misunderstood by the clergyman, and so a new christian name arose out of a misunderstanding or mispronounciation.

I will give another instance of the accidental creation of a new name. There is in Ickworth Park a small wood called "Downter's Wood." When it was being planted in or about 1820 the then Earl of Bristol used constantly to be going to look at it, and when his children were asked where he was they used to say, "He is gone down to the wood." And so gradually and imperceptibly the wood got to be called "Downter's Wood," and so it is called to-day.

The name Delariviere will be found several times in the following list, and this name also is owing to the connection between Horringer and the owners of Rushbrook. Thomas, Lord Jermyn, who died in 1703, left no son but five daughters. One of these daughters was Delariviere, who married Sir Symonds D'ewes, grandson of the better known Sir Symonds. She had a sister Merelina, who married in 1691 Sir Thomas Spring of Pakenham. They had a daughter Delariviere, and the name was kept up in the family for several generations.* From this time it constantly appears in the Horringer Registers. The first there to have it was a daughter of John Ewen baptized in 1705. John Ewen was a substantial farmer who occupied Great Horringer Hall, and so was a tenant of the owner of Rushbrook. The next in Horringer to receive the name, 1732, was a daughter of Mr. Symonds, the Rector of Horringer, and she got it owing to her mother being a sister of Delariviere Spring. And then during the following hundred years it appears in the families of Bunting, Brown, Willingham, and Orridge. I do not know whether anyone living to-day bears it, but as a boy I

^{*}Delariviere was also one of the names of Mrs. Mary Manley, authoress of the New Atalantis, who was born in or about 1672. She also wrote a poem which so pleased John, Lord Bristol, that he said he would as soon think of mending the Magnificat as of mending it. Letter 529. The poem is printed at the end of his Diary.

recollect a Delariviere (or Dilly as we called her) Willingham, and I see in the Register that a Delariviere Willingham was buried in 1876 aged 95. Another life of equal length joined on to hers would carry one back to the original Delariviere Jermyn.

The name Merri-woe given to a girl in 1589 may have some reference to the state of affairs at the time, either political or religious. It was the year following the defeat of the Spanish Armada, and a time also of religious changes.

In two cases Matthew is a woman's name. (Marr: 1807. Bapt: 1798. 1803. 1809.)

This list does not include all the names in the Registers, but only those entered as being given at Baptism. There are others which occur as parents' names and in the Register of Burials and Marriages.

REV. TIMOTHY ADAMSON and Mary his wife were both buried here in 1716, and it would appear that they had been living here for about 40 years previously. Whether he was curate here or not I can't say. In 1701 he seems to have been rector of Wordwell. He was of Jesus College, Cambridge, and took his M.A. degree in 1662. From the arms on his tombstone in the church-yard, No. 8, he would appear to be one of the Adamsons of Wereham or Wireham in Norfolk. (See Blomfield's Hist: of Norfolk, vii. 507.) Mr. James Oakes, who died in 1829 aged 87, married one of the Adamsons of Wereham, and these same arms are impaled on his monument in St. Mary's Church at Bury. The above Mary must have been Timothy's second wife, as in January, 1667, he

obtained a license to marry Martha Feltham, widow. They are both described as being of Bury St. Edmunds, his age about 27, and the marriage to take place at Westley, Hessett or St. Mary's in Bury. (Foster's London Marriage Licenses.)


REV. JOSEPH ALEXANDER.—The index to the Baptisms show three children of Joseph Alexander baptized respectively in 1693, 1695, 1702. These children are also entered in the Ickworth Registers, from which the blank in 1702 may be filled up with the name Marget. Their father was Rector of Ickworth from 1692 to his death in 1719. Ickworth parsonage house was in a bad state of repair and uninhabitable when Mr. Alexander came there; he rebuilt it at a cost of over £140, and a few years afterwards, in or about 1702, it was accidentally burnt down. In 1712 the parishes of Ickworth and Chedburgh were united, Mr. Alexander was exempted by the Bishop from rebuilding Ickworth parsonage house, and such materials of it as had survived the fire were used for the repair of Chedburgh parsonage house. Parsonage house and parson are now gone from Ickworth, and only Parson's pond is left.

All this accounts for Mr. Alexander living for a time at Horringer. I imagine him to have been a Bury man, as I have seen the name in the Registers of St. James' Parish.

The Parsonage house at Ickworth has been gone just 200 years, but a barn or out-house of some sort belonging to it was left standing, and an old man now living (1899) tells me that when he was a boy an old man told him that he recollected seeing it.

Mr. Alexander was married in Whepstead Church in May, 1691, to Frances daughter of John Frost of Duffin hall. The Frosts owned Duveton or Duffin hall in the parish of Whepstead for about 150 years, viz., from the reign of Edward VI to 1702, when they sold it to John, Lord Bristol.

BARBER.—I cannot say much about this family excepting that there were two members of it residing here in the reign of James I, and that by more than one marriage they were connected with the Jermyns of Rushbrook and the Blagges of Little Horringer. The following pedigree, which I make out from the Jermyn MSS belonging to the Suffolk Archæological Institute, from Gage's Thingoe Hundred and from other sources, will show these marriages.



Mary=Sir Thomas Jermyn Edmund=Martha Blagge

I imagine that the eldest Edmund in the above pedigree is he who had one child baptized in Horringer Church, viz., Sarah in 1612, but I am not quite certain about it. The Jermyn MSS give him ten children, but no Sarah among them. Sir Thomas Jermyn, the constant friend and patron of Bishop Bedell, seems to have married one of them. Another, John, went to Virginia. Another, Matthew, was killed in the Civil War. Another, the second Edmund, who married his first cousin Martha Blagge, was a Poor Knight of Windsor. Another, Ann, married Frederick Cornwallis.

Nicholas Barber was married here in 1617 to Mary Birle, and had three children baptized here between 1620 and 1625. Where his place is in the above pedigree is not clear. Possibly he was a son or nephew of the first Edmund, or he may have been a much younger brother. He seems to have left Horringer in 1624 or 1625, and gone to Chevington, as he had a son baptized there in 1625, and his wife Mary was buried there in 1626. I can say no more about him except that Mary his daughter seems to have married William Bedell, the eldest son of the Bishop, (see Bedell), and that a Nicholas Barber who may have been his son was married at Whepstead in 1662 to Martha Trowle.

Edmund and Nicholas, neither of whom were buried here, do not seem to have been living here at the same time, but one succeeded the other, and so they may have successively occupied the same house. Where that house was I cannot say, but possibly it was the house which 130 years afterwards was occupied by Frederick Hervey, who was afterwards Bishop of Derry. (See Hervey.)

SAMUEL BATTELEY.—During the time of the Civil War and the Commonwealth there was an apothecary at Bury St. Edmunds, named Nicholas Batteley, bringing his children to the font in St. James' Church. Having had the

kind permission of the Rev. George Hodges to search the registers of that parish I have found John 1646, Nicholas 1648, Thomas 1655, William 1659, Henry 1661. Of these John and Nicholas were sufficiently distinguished to find a place in the Dictionary of National Biography.* Both were clergymen and antiquarian authors. John became Archdeacon of Canterbury, where he was buried in 1708; and Nicholas, after being Rector of Nowton from 1680 to 1685, became Rector of Beakesbourne in Kent, and died in 1704. I imagine that there was another brother, Samuel, though I cannot find him in the Register of Baptisms in St. James Church. But as the times were troublous it is perfectly possible that he may have been forgotten to be entered. A sister, Mary, buried in 1654, certainly was forgotten, and it will be seen that there is a long interval after Nicholas, during which he may have been born. At any rate, whoever's son he was, he was born at about this time. In 1682 he was married to Mary Bright in Nowton Church, where his brother Nicholas was then Rector; in the course of the next 14 years he had five children christened at St. James'; he was churchwarden of that parish in 1686; on Jan. 1, 1697, his wife was buried; a year or two afterwards he married again, had a son Nicholas baptized at St. James' in 1699, and then seems to have come and settled in Horringer. He had a son Samuel baptized there in Feb. 1701/2. Under July 15, 1714, Lord Bristol records in his diary, "My good friend and honest neighbour Mr. Samuel Battely dyed at his house in Horringer." I have not been able to make out where that house was. In January, 1712, Mr. Joseph Weld, Recorder of Bury and its representative in Parliament, died suddenly. Lord Bristol's eldest son, Carr Hervey, for whom the seat was hoped, was abroad on a long tour, and so Mr. Samuel Batteley was chosen to fill the vacancy. Lord Bristol wrote him a letter of congratulation, and wrote to his son Carr at Venice, saying, "Serjeant Weld dyed suddenly of an apoplexy last week, so that Bury is unprovided of a Recorder and a Burgess. Mr. Turnor solicits to supply ye former vacancy, and I believe Mr. Battelly will accept ye latter as your trustee till your return, which he has already kindly signified to be his only purpose in medling with it."

*This Dictionary gives the year of their births as respectively 1647 and 1650, which is not quite correct according to the Registers. It also states that Nicholas was Rector of Newton, which should be Nowton. I will take this opportunity of correcting a mistake of my own. In the Notes to the Contents of Vol. 3 of Lord Bristol's Letterbooks the Rev. Mr. Battely to whom Letter 853 is written is said to be Nicholas, Rector of Nowton. It is not him, but his nephew (or son) John, who lived for a time at Horringer and held several livings in the neighbourhood.

(Letters 374. 375.) Three months afterwards Mr. Battely was seriously ill in London, and his death was expected every minute, and the question of a successor to him had to be considered. (Letters 384. 386. 387.) However he lived on till 1714. His Parliamentary life was a very short one, as there was a general election in Sept. 1713, when Carr Hervey was chosen in his place, though he had not yet got back from his travels. Mr. Batteley though dying in Horringer was carried to Bury for burial. The Register of St. James records that on July 28, 1714, was buried Mr. Alderman Batteley.

REV. JOHN BATTELEY.—In 1714, about three months before the death of Samuel Batteley, the Horringer Registers record the marriage of John Batteley and Ann Sydey. I imagine that this John was the son of the above Samuel, though curiously just as I could not find Samuel amongst the other children of Nicholas in the Registers of St. James at Bury, so also I cannot find there this John amongst the other children of Samuel. He was a scholar of Trin: Coll: Cambridge, taking his B.A. degree in 1708. He was Rector of Troston from 1714 to 1724; Timworth 1717 to 1741; Ingham 1727 to 1741; Wordwell 1736 to 1741. He was presented to this last living by Lord Bristol. From 1726 to 1741 he was preacher or lecturer at St. Mary's, Bury St. Edmunds. He must have been residing at Horringer from 1714 to 1727, as between those dates he had nine children baptized there, viz., John, Samuel, Ann, Katherine, John, Charles, Elizabeth, Nicholas, William. The first of these died in infancy.

I don't know that he ever published anything, but in 1726 he sent Lord Bristol the manuscript of some theological work of his, which was probably intended for publication. It was acknowledged in a characteristic letter. Letter 853.

Soon afterwards Lord Bristol wrote to the Bishop of Lincoln, asking that a small prebend likely soon to become vacant might be bestowed upon "my neighbour and friend" Mr. Batteley. In a postscript he says, "Mr. Batteley is nephew to the late Archdeacon of Canterbury, and for whose learning and exemplary life and conversation I will stand answerable to your Lordship and the whole world." Letter 859.

John Batteley died at Bury in 1741. Mr. Tymms in his account of St. Mary's Church quotes the Register of that parish as recording that "he preached att both parishes forenoon and afternoon on Sunday, ye 30th of August, and died between twelve and one of the clock on the Tuesday night following, and buried Sept. 4."

Of his sons, John, Charles and Nicholas and perhaps the others were at the

Bury Grammar School. Samuel went up to Christ Church College, Oxford in 1733 and took his B.A. degree in 1737.

William was curate of Mildenhall, where there is a slab to his memory stating that he died in November, 1767, aged 38 years.

Charles went up to University College, Oxford, in 1738, B.A. in 1742, was presented by the Crown to the living of Wetherden in Suffolk, afterwards to that of Hunston in Suffolk, and died at Wetherden in 1791, aged 72 years. Charles' son, Waldgrave Batteley, was curate of Shotley for 42 years, and died there in November 1813, aged 66 years. The present rector of Shotley tells me that when he first went to Shotley there were some still living there who remembered Waldgrave Batteley. He was not a total abstainer, and his advice to his people was, Do as I say but not as I do.

REV. WILLIAM BEDELL, BISHOP OF KILMORE. — This good man was rector of Horringer from March 1616 to June 1628, and resided in the rectory house there. Two lives of him written by those who had known him well have been published, so that it is not difficult to find plenty to say about him. The difficulty rather is to condense what there is into the small space that I can afford him. One of the lives was written by the Rev. Alexander Crogy who married his step-daughter, and was first published in 1862. The other was (almost certainly) written by his son William Bedell, rector of Rattlesden in Suffolk, and was first printed in 1872 for the Camden Society. The editor, Mr. Thomas Wharton Jones, has added a great deal of valuable information, to which I am greatly indebted. I shall tell the tale of the Bishop's life as much as possible in the very words of his son. All quotations that follow are from his memoir unless otherwise stated.

William Bedell was born quite at the end of 1571 at Black-Notley in Essex, where his father and grandfather were yeomen. He was apparently the second of three sons, his father's name being John and his mother's Elizabeth (Elliston or Aliston). "They were both very charitable and mercifull; their house was seldom without one or two poor children, which they kept upon alms. Mrs. Elizabeth Bedell was very famous and expert in chirugery, which she continually practised upon multitudes that flocked to her, and still gratis, without respect of persons, rich or poor." William and his elder brother John were sent to school at Braintree, about a mile from their home. Though very fond of learning yet William "on a

"time received such a blow from his eholerick master, that he was beaten off a pair "of stairs, and had one side of his head so bruised, that the blood gushed out of "his ear, and his hearing was in consequence so impaired, that he became in process "of time wholly deaf on that side." Before he was fully 13 years of age he went up to Emanuel College, Cambridge, and was soon chosen scholar. After a studious career he took his degrees, B.A. in 1588, M.A. in 1592, and in 1593 became a fellow of his college. Early in 1597 he was ordained a priest, and there ends the first chapter in his life. It may be summed up in the words of his son, "A great student he was and a great proficient, as in all kinds of learning, so especially in Divinity. He did not only tast the liberal arts, or give them a short visit by the way, but thoroughly studied them." So he sallies forth from the University and makes his start in life well equipped.

In January, 1602, he was appointed preacher or lecturer at St. Mary's Church, Bury St. Edmunds. "His first call to the ministerial work was to St. Edmundsbury in Suffolk, where the great esteem he gained for his grave, humble and diligent discharge of that employment is yet surviving in the mouths and memories of many. His auditory there was very much consisting of men of the best quality and best abilities of judgement and learning, who yet ever received ample satisfaction in his sermons." "His prayer before sermon was not set nor fixed allways to the same form of words, but various in expressions as the time and present occasions most required; but ever in the plainest and easiest phrase of the English tongue, according to the capacity of the weakest understanding: so as the most unlearned hearer might say Amen." "His voice was low, his action little, but the gravity of his aspect was great, and the reverence of his behaviour such as was more affecting to the hearers than the greater eloquence and more pompous pronunciation of others." He was said to excell in explaining the Scriptures, and was contrasted with his successor at St. Mary's, the one making the obscurest passages very plain, the other making the plainest passages very obscure. "He had not been long there (at Bury) ere he had gained a great reverence as well from all that savoured of the power of godliness as from the gallants, knights and gentlemen, who reverenced him for his impartial, grave and holy preaching and conversation, and heard him gladly."

After five years at Bury he was appointed chaplain to the English Embassy at Venice, our ambassador being Sir Henry Wotton. He went there in the early summer of 1607. I must skip over the time spent there. It must be enough to say that he earned the respect of the most eminent Venetians, formed friendships

there which lasted for life, studied hard at the Italian and other languages, and came back to Bury after an absence of nearly four years. He was probably back in Bury by March 1611.

He had formed a friendship at Venice with an eminent Venetian physician, Dr. Jasper Despotine. [See Despotine in these Notes.] This gentleman returned to England with Sir Henry Wotton and Dr. Bedell, and came to Bury with Bedell and started a practice there. They lodged together "in the house of one Mr. Nunne," and Bedell taught the Italian doctor English. Bedell's friends at Bury were very well pleased to see him return to his duties in St. Mary's Church. I don't know whether Mr. Nunn's house can be identified or not.

About a year after his return from Venice, on Jan. 29, 1612, Bedell was married in St. Mary's Church to Leah Mawe. She was the widow of Robert Mawe, Recorder of Bury, who had been buried at St. Mary's in June 1609. Mrs. Mawe had five children by her first marriage, of whom the eldest was now only seven years old. He must have left Mr. Nunne's now, and one would like to know where in Bury he did live. Of the five little Mawes, the eldest, Nicholas, was sent to Bury Grammar School and became a physician. John and Robert died young. Leah and Edward afterwards came with their mother and step-father to Ireland.

In March 1616 Sir Thomas Jermyn of Rushbrook presented him to the living of Horringer. He accepted it gladly because he felt that his voice was too weak for so large a church as St. Mary's. "The place being near Bury and the congregation there not very great, but such as his voice might reach, he accepted the presentation." There was a little hitch at first. The fees for institution payable to the Bishop of Norwich's officials were then very high, and Bedell absolutely refused to take the living if he had to pay them, as he considered practically it would be buying his preferment. Eventually the Bishop, Dr. Jegon, gave way and left it to him to pay what he thought fit.

His son gives us an account of his manner of life at Horringer. "His manner was to rise very early (commonly at 4 winter and summer), and so to retire presently to his study; where he would be so fixed till prayer-time, that if anything . . . did happen to call him down, he would be even angry with the messenger (wife, child or servant) of any such occasion of interruption." He had three seasons for prayer, morning, noon and evening. At noon he read and expounded a chapter before prayer. Some little time was devoted to the education of his children, as well as to his own studies and duties. "Some little recreation he used to take before dinner

or supper; which for the most part was planting, transplanting, grafting, and inoculating, and sometimes digging in his garden." "In his dress he was a great lover of plainness, both for the matter and fashion; never changing the fashion in all his life. His rules were easiness for the stirring of his body and serviceableness, avoiding all vanity and superfluity." He wished his children to be dressed according to the same rules as himself, while his wife preferred them to be smarter; but he got his way. His son tells us of "his behaviour to the beggars, bedlams and travellours that use to come to men's doors. These he would not fail to examine, mixing both wholsom instructions and severe reproofs. Nor rested he there; but if they had any passes to travel by, he would be sure to scan them throughly, and finding them false or counterfeit, his way was to send for the constable, and after correction given according to law, he would make them a new pass and send them to the place of their last settlement or birth. This made him so well known among that sort of people that they shunned the town (Horringer) for the most part; to the no small quiet and security of him and all his neighbours." We are then told how the Lord's day was kept, and of his sermons forenoon and afternoon, and of the public catechizing of the young whereby both they and their elders profited alike. And we are told "of his constant use of private admonitions and reproofs, which the some stomacked at, yet they durst not openly despise. The poorest of all he had a tender care over in this respect, whom he used bountifully to relieve every year. The others he entertained at his table once a year all through the whole parish, with whom he would be very cheary, and yet in so pious and profitable a manner that their minds and souls were no less feasted than their bodies." He was most particular about preserving the rights of the Church and keeping all rectorial buildings in good repair. "He left behind him a book to his successours, giving them a clear and exact "account what dues to expect from the parishioners, and some light for clearing "of controversies and difficulties about tithing that might afterward arise." He had a long lawsuit with Mr. William Lucas of Horscroft, "one of the chiefest of his parish." He was given to understand that Mr. Lucas had certain pieces of ground in his possession which rightly belonged to the rectory of Horringer. He was told so by some who could remember when the grounds did do so, and he proved it by searching the rolls and records of the manor, the lord of the manor having given him leave to do so. But when he told Mr. Lucas of this, Mr. Lucas denied the right of the Church and refused to give them up. The suit began and lasted ten years. In the end the award was favourable to the Church. Not

the same land, but the same amount of land more conveniently situated for the rector, was given up by Mr. Lucas. This lawsuit caused Mr. Bedell to make some study of the law, and in consequence he was often chosen as arbitrator by his neighbours in their disputes. (See Lucas.)

A Parliament being called while he was at Horringer, two ministers had to be chosen to represent the diocese of Norwich in Convocation, one for Suffolk, one for Norfolk. Whilst many were scheming to get themselves elected, Bedell refused to move in the matter. In spite of it he was chosen. He was sorry when he heard of it, saying that "he knew he should but loose his time, and sit "there and tell the clock, without doing any good as to what the present exigencies of "the Church did most require."

But the time is now coming when he must say Good bye to Horringer, and not to Horringer only, but to Suffolk and England. The next fifteen years of his life are given to Ireland, and this last chapter in his life I must run through very quickly.

In May 1627, by mandate of King Charles I, he was nominated Provost of Trinity College, Dublin. Probably Sir Thomas Jermyn, who had sat under him in St. Mary's Church at Bury, and who had presented him to the living of Horringer, had something to do with this appointment. In July 1627 he started for Dublin and was admitted to the office. He returned to Horringer in September to settle his affairs there and to fetch his family. In June 1628 he resigned Horringer and quitted it and England for ever.

They were in all seven souls who moved from Horringer Rectory to Trinity College, Dublin. There were himself and Leah his wife; there were his two stepchildren Leah and Edward Mawe; there were his own three children, William, John and Ambrose. William and John had been born in Bury, and are in St. Mary's Registers; Ambrose was born at Horringer and will be found in these registers. The oldest of these five was Leah Mawe, 22 years, the youngest was Ambrose Bedell, 9 years. One child, Grace Bedell, was left behind, in Horringer Churchyard; she had died in 1624 just under 10 years of age.

Just two years after his first nomination to the office of Provost, but only one year after he had settled down at Dublin, he was through the efforts of Sir Thomas Jermyn appointed to the united Bishopricks of Kilmore and Ardagh. That was in May, 1629. He was not anxious to be promoted and hesitated before he accepted the offer. It troubled him that he would have now as a Bishop to

use more state. "His own wisdom prompted him to some conformity to the Episcopal rank, and his friends were sollicitous lest he should render himself contemptible or lie under sinister censures by coming too much behind other Bishops in state and gallantry. And therefore he took a middle way, rising a little but differing very much in outward splendour from the rest of his order. He never wore silk, only his girdle, chimier and tippet were of that material. Never wore bever, castor or demi-castor, but allwaies felts. He used not to ride up and down the streets of Dublin about his occasions, with his three or four men attending, as was the common usage of the Bishops there, but allwaies walked with only one man. And tho' in this practice he did discontent some, and suffered the gibes of the more lordly prelates and their followers, yet he could not be altered."

Mr. Clogy, who did not know him till he became a Bishop, but lived a good deal with him from then to his death, says, "When others of his order were either galloping in their coaches or prancing upon their vaporing stone-horses through the streets of Dublin, he was never seen in a coach in city or country, nor a horse-back in the city; but walking with his servant after him, save when he rode publiatus in his scarlet robes in Parliament, or attended the Lord Deputy to church upon the Lord's day, as the manner of all prelates was in their pontificals. . . His habit was grave, in a long stuff gown not costly but comely; his stockings wollen; his shoes not much higher behind than before."

My limited space only allows me to say of the next 14 years that all through them he followed the same simple and fearless course of conduct. There were many evils to be attacked and reformed, and he went at them in his gentle but determined way without fearing any man. He incurred some opposition, but he incurred a great deal more of love and respect from all sorts and classes of people, Roman Catholics as well as Protestants.

Writing to a friend soon after his appointment he says of Kilmore, "My cathedral church is such another as Horningerth was, but without steeple, bell or font. You can imagine the rest." His son describing Kilmore says, "Kilmore itself was but a meer country village, of good large bounds, but so thinly inhabited that no where in the whole parish was any street or part of a street to be found. There was a competent number of English, but the Irish were more than five times their number, and all of them obstinate Papists. The Bishop's house joined close to the church, being built upon one of the highest hills in the countrey; not near any neighbour of any quality by a mile."

After about three years he resigned Ardagh and was Bishop of Kilmore only. So little in sympathy was he with the idea that Ireland was merely to exist for the benefit of England, so little did he approve of the English-made law obliging

the Irish to learn English, that as soon as he got into Ireland he set to work to learn the Irish language himself, he taught it to his own children, he tried to get his clergy to set up Irish schools in their parishes, he was careful to place clergy who could speak Irish in all those places where Irish was the language known, he printed a summary of Christian doctrine in Irish, and then he had an Irish version made of the Old Testament. Up to his time there was only an Irish version of the New Testament. In all things he tried to act for Ireland as an Irish Bishop should act, and not merely as an Englishman imposed upon the Irish by England and acting solely for England.

Mr. Clogy describes his hospitality which was of a genuine though not showy kind. "His castle was furnished with things not superfluous, ornamental and splendid, but good and necessary for common use. His table with plenty of good provision at all times; whereunto there was great resort, as to a place of greatest hospitality in all that county; half an Irish beef a week, besides other provision, a great part whereof was given to poor Irish families. At Christmas he had the poor Irish as well as rich British to sit and feast about him, both men and women, that dwelt next unto him, that scarce had any whole clothes to their back, nor could understand a word of English, and were strangers to such civil and plentiful entertainment."

In October 1641 the rebellion broke out in Ireland suddenly and with great fury. At first nothing of the Bishop's was touched, he being greatly respected. A great multitude of English fled to his house at Kintore, and there he kept them, having much cattle and much grain. After a time the rebels, if that is the proper name to give to those who are contending against intolerable tyranny, drove the English refugees away and seized the Bishop's cattle. The Bishop was allowed to stay in his own house till about Christmas, when he and his two sons were carried away by the rebels to Loughwater Castle, where there were neither glass windows nor wooden shutters. After about three weeks there they were set free. The Bishop could not return to his own house at Kilmore because the Roman Catholic Bishop had stepped into it and was occupying it. But a Mr. Sheridan whose house was a mile off from it kindly took him and his sons in. At the end of January, 1642, the Bishop was taken ill, probably in consequence of the hardships of the last few months, and on Feb. 7 he died. He was buried at Kilmore, the rebels attending the funeral and firing a volley over his grave, and showing various marks of respect.

He was a little over 70 years of age at his death. Mr. Clogy, his step son-in-

law, who was with him up to the last as well as his own two sons, says in his memoir, "His eye was not dim nor his natural force abated; only he had some kind of deafness in his left ear, occasioned by a fall down stairs in his childhood. I remember that when walking abroad with him and his two sons the week before he sickened, in returning back he leapt so nimbly and vigorously over a broad ditch that amazed us all, and put us to a stand to follow him. He never used spectacles; nor lost one tooth; nor any decay of his hair, save in the colour; his gray hairs being found in the way of righteousness were as a crown to him; his beard was long and broad. I never knew any razor to pass upon his face, which was beautiful, with more majesty and gravity than my tongue can express."

Mr. Clogy says elsewhere, "Though his stature was tall his voice was low and mournful, both in praying and preaching."

We have already seen him digging in the garden at Horringer. The digging went on after he became a Bishop. Mr. Clogy says that though otherwise of great strength and health of body, above many, yet during the last few years he had occasional attacks, which he endured with great patience. "The greatest antidote against it, which he found by experience to do him most good, was digging in his garden in a morning. Laying aside his gown he would dig for half an hour or thereabouts; and being a little heated he found mitigation of his pain. . . . He had brought with him out of Italy such curious instruments for racemation, engraffing and inoculating, that I saw him once teach his gardener how to use them; and when he put the graft into the stock most neatly only tied it about with a seare cloth."

The seven souls who had moved from Horringer to Dublin in 1628 had been made less in number by death before these last troubles came. At Christmas, 1634, his second son John had died. Soon after Christmas, 1637, his step-daughter Leah Clogy had died, about a month after her marriage to Mr. Alexander Clogy, one of the Bishop's biographers. In March, 1638, his wife had died. So that there were left only Edward Mawe, his stepson, and William and Ambrose, his own sons.

Edward Mawe was ill when the Bishop was dying, and whether he died also or recovered is not known.

Ambrose Bedell, the only one who was born at Horringer, married in Ireland before the rebellion broke out; his wife was Mary, daughter of Peter Hill, Sheriff of Down; he served as a Captain in Col. Arthur Hill's regiment, who was his

wife's uncle; after the Restoration he had a grant of lands made to him in Cavan and Antrim, and died there in 1683. He left no surviving children.

William Bedell, the biographer and eldest son, was born in Bury early in 1613. He was ordained by his father in 1634 and presented by him to the Vicarage of Kinawley in the diocese of Kilmore. After his father's death he left Ireland for good and returned to England. He first went to visit his uncle at Black-Notley, and then he went to stay with his father's old Venetian friend at Bury, Dr. Despotine. Whilst there Mr. Hinde, the rector of Whepstead, disappeared in a curious way and left no one to take his duty. He furnished himself with horse, pistolls and sword, and borrowed some money, and went on a journey proposing to return before long. But he did not come back, and so there was no one to take the duty at Whepstead. William Bedell was asked by some of the Whepstead people to preach there, and he was appointed by Parliament to do so, this being during the Commonwealth. After doing it for about a year he was appointed Minister of Rattlesden, and there he remained for 26 years, being buried there in March, 1671.

Mr. T. W. Jones,* the editor of his memoir of his father, says his wife appears to have been a Mary Barber, but he could not find out much about her. I think that she must be the Mary, daughter of Nicholas Barber gent, whose baptism on April 4, 1620, is in the Horringer Registers. (See Barber.) It look as if the attachment, or at any rate acquaintance, had begun when they were children together at Horringer, and his moving into Ireland had not caused him to forget her, but he had seized the opportunity of a visit to England to make her his wife. As they were married before the rebellion broke out in Ireland in 1641, she could have hardly been out of her teens before she became Mrs. Bedell. I cannot say where the Barbers lived in Horringer, but her father appears soon after her birth to have been living in Chevington. And as subsequently one of the Barbers was married at Whepstead, there may be some connection between that and the previous fact that some of the Whepstead people had asked William Bedell to come and preach to them.

*While expressing my great obligation to Mr. Jones' careful and thorough work, I will take the opportunity of correcting a small error. In a note at p. 130 he says that Sir William Hervey married Suzan, daughter of Sir Robert Jermyn, and that this marriage brought the Jermyn property, including Horringer, to the Herveys. But in reality this marriage had nothing to do with it. How the Jermyn property did eventually come to the Herveys will be seen in the preface to this volume.

William and Mary Bedell had eight children, of whom the eldest, Leah, was baptized at Whepstead in 1643, and the other seven at Rattlesden, viz., William, John, James, Ambrose, Penelope, Agnes, Isabella. John succeeded his father as Rector of Rattlesden, but died the following year, 1672. Mr. Jones has gone very fully into the history of the Bishop's descendants, and it appears that there are none now of his name and lineage.

GEORGE INNES BEVAN came to live at Horringer house about the year 1840. He was the only son of George Bevan, and married his first cousin, Rachel, daughter of Robert Bevan of Rougham. Several children were baptized here, of whom George, 1842, went into the army, attained to the rank of General, and died in 1898. Mr. Bevan left Horringer in or about 1860 and went to live at Godmanchester.

DOROTHY BLAGGE.—The Blagges came to Little Horringer hall in the reign of Queen Elizabeth, in or about 1570, and they remained there about 70 years; two generations of them were baptized here. Some little account of them must therefore be given.

There was in the reign of Henry VIII an Essex family named Badby. One of them, Thomas Badby, lived in St. James's parish at Bury, and for a short time possessed the site of Bury Abbey, which had not long before been abolished. He was the son of William, and had a sister named Dorothy, who was a maid of bonour.*

Dorothy Badby was married three times.

Her first husband was Sir George Blagge, the son of Robert Blagge. Robert was a Baron of the Exchequer in the early part of the reign of Henry VIII, and some account of him will be found in the Dict: of Nat: Biog:. His son George by a second marriage was a great favourite with Henry VIII, and was knighted; he was nearly killed at the siege of Landreci, and nearly burnt afterwards as a Protestant heretic. He died in 1551.

Her second husband was Richard Goodrick, a native of Yorkshire and nephew of Thomas Goodrick, Bishop of Ely. Richard Goodrick will be found in the Dict: of Nat: Biog:. He died in 1562.

Her third husband was Sir Ambrose Jermyn of Rushbrook, who had lately obtained the manor of Great Horringer. Sir Ambrose died in 1577, and last of all Dorothy died also. She was buried at Rushbrook in 1594. Sir Ambrose had purchased Little Horringer in 1562 from the Lucas family of Horsecroft.

By his first wife Sir Ambrose had had a son Robert, and a daughter Hester. By her former husband, Sir George Blagge, Dorothy had had a son Henry and a daughter Judith. Robert Jermyn married Judith Blagge, and Henry Blagge married Hester Jermyn, which made a very pretty complication.

Sir Robert Jermyn, who succeeded Sir Ambrose in 1577, settled Little Horringer upon Dorothy for her life, she being both his step-mother and his mother-in-law. Soon afterwards Little Horringer is found to be the property of her son Henry Blagge, who had married Hester Jermyn. Apparently he was living there before that, as he was married here in 1571. It is not quite clear how he came into possession of it; but as the site of Bury Abbey had come to him from his mother's family, the Badbys, and as that site is afterwards found to be the property of Sir Robert Jermyn, Mr. Gage guesses that there may have been an exchange of properties, Henry Blagge taking Little Horringer and Sir Robert Jermyn taking Bury Abbey. At any rate, however that may have been, Henry Blagge was settled there before 1574.

HENRY BLAGGE had two children baptized here, viz., Dorothy in 1574, and Thomas in 1579, who died an infant. Another son, Ambrose, was not baptized here. Henry was buried at St. Mary's in Bury in 1596.

AMBROSE BLAGGE was married here in 1608 to Martha Barber of Bury St. Edmunds. (See Barber.) She was buried here in 1624, and he married secondly Margaret Snelling, a widow. That he resided here continuously is proved by his having twelve children baptized here between 1609 and 1635, viz., Harry, George, Thomas, Katharine, Ann, Martha, Judith, Humphry, by his first wife, and Ambrose, Henry, Edmund, Margaret, by his second wife. Of these Harry, Humphry, and Edmund died in infancy. George died in 1611, aged 20. Martha married her first cousin, Edmund Barber. Judith married Thomas Covel of Great Horringer. (See Covel.) Margaret, the youngest child of all, died with her name unchanged in 1720, aged 85. Her tombstone is in the church, No. 18, but her age and date of death are there left blank. Thomas

heads the next paragraph. Ambrose himself, the father of all these children, died in August, 1662, when he must have been 80, if not 90. He was not buried here.

THOMAS BLAGGE, the third but eldest surviving son of Ambrose and Martha, was baptized here in 1613, and married Mary North of Mildenhall. He was a groom of the bedchamber to Charles I, and when the civil war broke out in 1642 he at once raised a regiment for the king's service. Probably his native village and the neighbourhood largely helped to fill the ranks of this regiment. His regiment suffered at the battle of Naseby in 1645. He afterwards was Governor of Wallingford, which after a long siege surrendered to the Parliament army but obtained very good terms. After the death of Charles I in 1649 he joined the young Prince Charles. After the battle of Worcester in 1651 he fled with Prince Charles and about sixty others. Having fled about 25 miles they reached John Penderel's house at Boscobel. Here they separated. Charles entrusted his watch to Lord Wilmot and his diamond badge as a Knight of the Order of the Garter to Col. Blagge, and after climbing up trees and many narrow escapes managed to take ship at Shoreham and get out of the country. Col. Blagge pursuing his flight in another direction hid the badge for safety sake; but was soon taken prisoner and carried to the Tower of London. Whilst there somebody managed to find the badge and bring it to him. Not long afterwards he managed to escape from the Tower and was able to restore the badge to Prince (or King) Charles. The badge was a sacred thing in the eyes of every Knight of the Garter, and honour was concerned in the keeping of it. This particular badge had probably an additional sacredness from having been the one worn by Charles' father at his execution. Hence Col. Blagge's responsibility was great.

The Colonel died within 6 months of the Restoration, on Nov. 14, 1660, and was buried in the north transept of Westminster Abbey. There was formerly a monument to him there, but it no longer exists. The long Latin inscription on it has been preserved.

He left a widow, who survived him about 10 years, and four young daughters. Charles II and his brother, the Duke of York, do not seem to have forgotten the services of Col. Blagge after his death. His two daughters, Mary and Margaret, both became Maids of Honour to the Duchess of York, and after her death in 1671 Margaret became Maid of Honour to Queen Catharine.

MARGARET BLAGGE.—Any temptation to give an account of her must be resisted, because strictly speaking she does not belong to Horringer, and I do not know that she ever could have been there. She was born in 1652, after that her father had left Horringer for court and camp. It must be enough to say that she must have been of a really excellent character. Brought up from early girlhood in the not very healthy atmosphere of the Court of Charles II, she laid down for herself the strictest possible rules of conduct and managed to conform to them with undeviating steadfastness. In 1675 she quitted her post as Maid of Honour to the Queen of Charles II and married Mr. Sidney Godolphin. Three years afterwards, Sept. 1678, she died a few days after the birth of her first child. She was buried at Breage in Cornwall. Her husband was afterwards created Earl of Godolphin. The child who lost his mother at his birth was Francis, 2nd Earl of Godolphin. Both father and son were distinguished statesmen.

The life of Mrs. Godolphin (Margaret Blagge) was written by her great friend and admirer, John Evelyn the diarist; it remained unpublished till 1848, when it was edited by Bishop Samuel Wilberforce. The continual stream of exaggerated praise which runs through the biography spoils it. It would have been better if more facts had been given and left to speak for themselves. To this life and its notes I am chiefly indebted for the account I have given of Col. Blagge. Mary, the daughter of the 2nd Earl of Godolphin, and granddaughter of Margaret Blagge, married the Duke of Leeds. The present Duke of Leeds is consequently descended from the Horringer Blagges. A portrait of Col. Blagge was at Gogmagog Hills near Cambridge in 1848, and a portrait of Mrs. Margaret (Blagge) Godolphin was then at Wootton, the property of Mr. Evelyn, the descendant of the diarist.

I have had no opportunity of examining title deeds, and so I cannot say exactly how or when Little Horringer passed from the Blagges to the Gipps's. I presume it was by purchase. The latest baptism of a Blagge here was in 1635; the earliest baptism of a Gipps was in 1645. I presume that the Blagges went and the Gipps's came between those two dates; but it is only a presumption, and there is slight evidence that Margaret Blagge's mother may have been here in 1651, when her husband was fleeing after the battle of Worcester. It is this.

Thomas Hervey, the father of the first Earl of Bristol, was courting Isabella May for 10 years before their marriage, which took place in 1658. Seventy-three of his letters to her during this long courtship were copied by him into a blank

book which remains at Ickworth.* His letters were mostly written from Hengrave, where his father, Sir William, was then living, Ickworth being then in an uninhabitable state, whilst she was generally staying with one or other of her relatives at Bury, Boxted, Rushbrook, or somewhere near. The correspondence and the interviews between them had to be secret and stolen, because her mother opposed the match. In one of these love letters, written I think in 1651, he says he wants her to write down something for his information and to let him have the letter as she let him have a former one, "which will not be hard to do if you will be at Mrs. Collonel Blaggs about five of ye clock on Tuesday night next, where I will not faile to meet you." But I do not know how to reconcile her being there in 1651 with the Gipps Baptisms beginning in 1645. Possibly Mrs. Collonel Blagg's means a house at Mildenhall, she being a daughter of Sir Roger North of Mildenhall; or it may mean a house at Bury or somewhere near. Or possibly the Gipps's came to some other house in Horringer before they got into Little Horringer hall. In another of these letters written during courtship, dated June 28, 1652, Thomas Hervey tells Isabella May that he had made a plot to come and see her at Bury, but that it was given out that she was gone to Horringer, so he did not go. Now if Mrs. Col. Blagge was living at Horringer in June, 1652, her daughter Margaret, born Aug. 2 in that year, would probably have been born there; but she does not appear in the Registers. However, the Registers being often defective, she may after all be a native of Horringer, in which case her biography here should have been fuller. It is very aggravating of Evelyn not to have told us.

BOKENHAM.—The family of Bokenham or Buckenham possessed manors in various parts of Suffolk from early times, as a reference to the Supplement to the Suffolk Traveller or any County history will show. One branch preceded the Drurys at Hawsted. The Horringer Registers show a John Bokenham, clerk, buried at Horringer in 1595, his wife Isabel being buried there in 1587. This must be he who was rector of Ickworth from (I think) 1566 to 1595. He may have resided at Horringer for the same reason that Mr. Alexander did just 100 years later, viz., the dilapidated state of Ickworth parsonage house; or he may have been a relic of the family who preceded the Drurys at Hawstead and whose possessions extended into Horringer, and may have lived on his own estate.

Others of the name besides this John will be found both in the Ickworth and Horringer Registers, but I cannot connect them.

There was another clerk or clergyman of the name buried at Horringer, viz., Nicholas in 1634, but I have not been able to find out what living he held.

BROOK.—For some years in the last century two brothers were respectively occupying Great and Little Horringer hall farms, William and Isaac Brook.

WILLIAM, the eldest of the two, succeeded the Goodchilds as tenant of Little Horringer hall in or about 1785. He died in 1795 aged 75 years, and was succeeded there by Isaac his son, who remained there till about 1810, when it became the home farm of the Ickworth estate. Isaac died in 1812 aged 50. Both are buried at Westley.

Isaac senior, the brother of William, was occupying Great Horringer hall farm, then the property of the Davers family, for 30 or 40 years in the last century, and died in 1801 aged 71, and is also buried at Westley. He had several children baptized at Horringer between 1764 and 1780.

One of them, ARTHUR, succeeded his father at Great Horringer hall and remained there till about 1814, when I imagine that he moved into the new house, Brooke House, which he had just built on his own property. An inscription in the church tells us that he munificently restored it. He was buried at Westley in 1859 aged 86 years. Though he was a native of Horringer, and had spent the whole of his long life there, and had built a house there and restored the church there, yet he was taken to Westley for burial. I am told that the reason was that he objected to the water which lay in the vault at Horringer church.

Another son, Thomas, lived to a great age and was buried at Horringer in 1869 aged 91 years.

Another son, Stephen, died in 1798 aged 32 according to his tombstone. It was he who for some reason or other had the marriage service repeated. (See page 129, note.)

The name is spelt sometimes Brook, sometimes Brookes. There was a John and Carr or Carolina Brook having children baptized here in 1703 and following years, but I do not see any connection between them and the two brothers, William and Isaac, who first came to reside here 60 or 70 years after that, and who were not baptized here.

REV. RICHARD BURGESS was presented to the rectory of Ickworth and Horringer by the Crown in 1869 on the promotion of Lord Arthur Hervey to the bishoprick of Bath and Wells. He was born in 1796, educated at St. John's College, Cambridge, ordained in 1820, chaplain to English residents at Geneva in 1828, and to those at Rome in 1831. In 1835 he took his D.D. degree. In 1836 he was appointed rector of Upper Chelsea, where he remained for twenty-five years. He was a prebend of St. Paul's Cathedral, and died in April 1881 at Brighton aged 85. He was the author of many publications, including sermons and works on the antiquities of Rome and a tour in Greece. A memoir of him will be found in the Dict: of Nat: Biography.

CHERRY.—See Appendix XI.

COVELL.—The Registers show that the Covells were in Horringer before the year 1600. Their estate was at the south end of the parish, where Horringer house now stands. Apparently they came to an end in the male line with Thomas Covel who died in 1715, and the estate passed to John Kettle, who (I think) had married Elizabeth Covell. His son, John Kettle, sold it in 1737 to Valentine Mumby or Mumbee of Ixworth, whose son Valentine in 1768 sold it to John Everall. It, or a part of the Covell estate, has been successively owned since then by Mr. Charles Hill Hall, Mr. George Bevan, Mr. Marriot, and is now the property of Mr. Lainson. There does not appear to be anything left of the house that the Covells lived in, the present house being the work of Mr. Mumbee with subsequent additions.

In 1599 there was baptized William the eldest of the two sons of William Covell. William sen. died in 1625, and William jun. married Alice —— very soon afterwards. Between 1627 and 1638 six children of William and Alice are brought to the font, three sons and three daughters. Something can be seen and said of all the three sons, William, Thomas and John. William, the father of these three sons, died in 1661. See tombstone No. 15.

WILLIAM COVELL, the eldest, was baptized in 1627. From his being afterwards called Capt. Covell I imagine that he took a part in the civil war which broke out in 1642. Very probably he served in the regiment which was raised by Col. Blagge of Little Horringer hall. (See Blagge.) He is not down in Doyle's Army Lists beginning at 1661, so that apparently by the time that the

war was over he had had enough of it and came back to Horringer. Between 1662 and 1671 five children of him and Mary his wife are brought to the font in Horringer church, viz., John, Ann, Thomas, Richard, Richard. Thomas and the two Richards all died unmarried, and John had only one daughter.

In 1695, when John Hervey, afterwards 1st Earl of Bristol, had lately succeeded to the Ickworth estate on the death of his father, Sir Thomas, he was acting as his steward. Whether he had been so in the time of Sir Thomas, I know not. There is a long letter written to him by John Hervey dated Jan. 1700, and beginning "Honest Will Covell." It is only interesting as showing the old manor house at Ickworth near the church tumbling to pieces, and as mentioning a meeting at the Red house, which I presume to be the Horringer inn. (Letter 190.)

He does not appear to have been a very businesslike steward. In 1702, when John Hervey was turning a farm house, the present Ickworth Lodge, into a mansion for himself, he writes to his wife to say that he cannot join her in London, because the head brick-burner at Ickworth has run away, the men can't get their wages, Will: Covell has done nothing that he ought to have done, and everything is in a state of chaos. He says that "the poor workmen follow me about in shoales, crying, We are ready to starve and can gett no money of the noble Captain: so that I've been forced to pay off all their bills myself and write all their acquittances for them." Letters 204, 206.

Apparently William Covell had a tongue, as John Hervey writing to Lady Gipps of Little Horringer hall, with whom he had lately made an exchange of land, assures her that no complaint about the terms had been made, "unless by Mr. Covell, whose tongue, Madam, I've no more command of than himself." Letter 260.

That is as much as I can glean of William, except to say that in spite of his supposed unbusinesslike ways he seems to have earned his employer's regard. His death is recorded in John Hervey's diary. "1707. April 9. Wednesday, my steward Will Covell dyed." His tombstone, No. 15, tells us that he was 79 years of age.

THOMAS COVELL, the second son, was baptized in 1634. There is a beautifully executed Survey of Ickworth done by him in 1665, and showing exactly the extent and the boundaries of eighteen farms among which the present park, being temporarily disparked, was divided.* The map made to accompany

this Survey most unfortunately cannot be found. The John Hervey for whom this Survey was made held office in the Court of Charles II, and was uncle to the John Hervey who was created Earl of Bristol and from whose Letters and Diary I am frequently quoting. Whether Thomas Covell acted as his steward or not I do not know. I presume that he did. There is also at Ickworth a beautifully executed map of Little Saxham hall, then the property of the Crofts, made by this same Thomas Covell.

The only allusion to him that I can see in Lord Bristol's Diary is under 1704. April 24. "Thomas Covell and myself executed ye deed for exchange of land in Buckstal." Buckstall is also mentioned in an account of the admeasurement of Ickworth park pale, entered into the above Survey book in 1702. "From the old gate way of Mr. Thomas Covels back lane end round Buckstall to Covels corner at the market stile is 175 rods." I take it that Buckstall is somewhere near the gate called Hammond's gate and the old brick-field. It would also appear from these last two quotations as if Thomas Covel occupied the Covel family estate, though he was the second son. Where William lived I know not. It is unfortunate that the rates printed in Appendix VI should be torn off just as they reach the Covels. In 1664 Thomas Covel married Judith Blagge, sister of Col. Thomas Blagge. (See Blagge.) As the Gipps's had before this arrived at Little Horringer, the Blagges must have left it, so I do not know where Judith Blagge could have been living at the time. But at any rate Thomas Covel and Judith Blagge had both been baptized in the same church and had spent the days of their childhood within a mile of each other. They were married by license. The license was taken out in the Bishop of London's Office.* Both their ages are stated to be 30. In reality she was rather more, being 44. They do not appear to have had any children.

I have nothing more to say about them except that the inevitable end came to them in due course. He died in 1715 aged 81, and with him the Covells of Horringer came to an end; she died in 1707 aged 87. Both their names will be found on a stone within the church, No. 18.

JOHN COVELL.—We now come to the youngest and most distinguished

of the three brothers. A life of him will be found in the Dict: of National Biography, to which I am mainly indebted for the following account. His baptism will be found in these Registers under April 14, 1638. He first went to the Bury Grammar School, and then in 1654, when he was about 2 days short of 16 years, he went up to Christ's College, Cambridge. In due course he took his degrees and became a fellow of his college. Having taken orders he was appointed in 1670 chaplain to the Levant Company, and also acted as chaplain to Sir Daniel Harvey and Sir John Finch, successive ambassadors to the Porte. He resigned this appointment in 1676 and reached London in 1679, the intermediate time having been spent in travelling. His journals of his travels are in the British Museum. He was a botanist and sent home rare plants.

On getting back to England he resided at his college. In 1680 the Bishop of Ely presented him to the sinecure rectory of Littlebury in Essex, and in 1681 his college presented him to the rectory of Kegworth in Leicestershire. In 1681 he was also appointed to succeed Ken as chaplain to the Princess of Orange, and went to reside at the Hague. In 1685 an intercepted letter of his caused him to be instantly dismissed and sent back to England. In 1688 he was appointed Master of Christ's College, and there he remained till his death in 1722. That same year he had published a folio volume entitled, "Some account of the present Greek church," the result of his chaplain days at Constantinople.

One can imagine that he may sometimes have come over from Cambridge during the latter part of his life to see his native place and his kinsfolk who remained there, but otherwise Horringer could not have seen much of him after he had left the Grammar School. There are two letters written to him by John Lord Bristol in Dec. 1706 and Dec. 1707, but there is not much in them. From the first of them it appears that he had lately paid Lord Bristol a visit at Ickworth, and had afterwards composed some verses which he attributed to the influence of the air of Ickworth park, a little compliment which no doubt gratified Lord Bristol. The verses appear to have been in honour of some great hero of the day, probably the Duke of Marlborough. Letters 266.272. From the account of Dr. Covel in the Dict: of Nat: Biog: it appears that among his numerous journals and other manuscripts at the British Museum there are a few attempts at poetry.

He was buried in his college chapel where there is an inscription to him; and the college possesses two portraits of him, one painted by a German, Valentine Ritz, and the other by Sir Peter Lely. He was never married.

There was a family named Coel at Debden in the 17th century, but I do not think that they had anything to do with the Covells of Horringer, nor even that the name is the same.

REV. HENRY CRASKE.—In 1729 Rev. Henry Craske of Reed was married here to Elizabeth Ray of Bury. He was a son of William Craske, a brewer of Bury St. Edmunds; educated at Bury Grammar School and Caius College, Cambridge; ordained in 1715; presented by John, Lord Bristol, to the livings of Anwick and Brauncewell in Lincolnshire, and by Col. Norton, M.P. for Bury, to the rectory of Shotley in Suffolk in 1730. He was also Rector of Fordham in Essex. He was preacher at St. James' church, Bury, from 1723 to 1743. He was chaplain to Lord Bristol, and was one of the royal chaplains. He is mentioned now and then in Lord Bristol's letters, and appears to have committed the sin, which in Lord Bristol's sight was unpardonable, of not giving him political support in Bury.

The rectory of Shotley became vacant in 1730, and Lord Bristol applied for it for his own son Charles Hervey. Letter 917. But Alderman Ray of Bury had also applied for it for his son-in-law, Henry Craske. And the patron, Col. Norton, being M.P. for Bury, and not wishing to give any offence there, presented Henry Craske. In July 1733 Lady Bristol writes to her husband from Tunbridge-Wells and says, "That wretched fellow Craske has preached here, but did not remember you in his prayer, which was taken notice of, but I suppose he forgot he was your chaplain or that you raised him." (Letter 967.) I presume that the prayer in which he should have expressly mentioned Lord Bristol was the bidding prayer, now seldom heard.

In Dec. 1738 Lord Bristol writes from Ickworth to his son Lord Hervey in London, and says, "The present state of affairs in the Corporation of Bury being brought into great confusion by the imprudent, unpopular management of his Majesty's new chaplain, Mr. Craske, in favour of Col. Norton's interest." He died in 1743.

DAVERS.—The family of Davers properly belongs to the volume which will contain the Rushbrooke Registers; but as they possessed and resided in Horringer, a short account of their origin must be given here. In the reign of Charles I the forced loans and other arbitrary measures were causing many people to leave the country and cross the seas in order to find a freedom which they could not find at home. A volume edited by Mr. Camden Hotten and published in 1874 gives

several lists of those who went out, taken from MSS in the Public Record Office. There is one list giving the names and ages of 78 persons who went out to the Barbadoes in the ship Falcoln in April, 1635. They are mostly men under 30, many in their teens. Amongst them is Robert Davers, 14 years. There is nothing to show whether he was with friends or by himself. He is the only one of his name in the list.

Further on in the same volume is another list. It is 44 years later than the above list, being dated Dec. 23, 1679. It is a list of the owners of land in the parish of St. George's in the island of Barbadoes. They are 122 in number, owning between them 9569 acres, with 111 white servants, and 4316 negroes.

The first two names on the list are

Robert Davers Esq. 305 acres, 8 white servants, 200 negroes.

Mr. Robert Davers jun. 47 acres, — . —

I take it that Robert Davers Esq. in the later list is the Robert Davers, 14 years, of the former list, and that in the course of 44 years the usual half-crown which the boy took out in his pocket had fructified into 305 acres and 200 slaves.

Very soon after the date of this last list he must have returned to England with young Robert, and bought Rougham, near Bury St. Edmunds, for he was made a baronet by Charles II in May 1682.

Burke (Extinct Baronetcies) says that he made a fortune in the Barbadoes and was made a baronet in consideration of his own and his father's losses for the royal cause. But I expect that is merely imagined in order to give him a more aristocratic origin. He went out before the civil war began, probably a friendless and penniless boy.

He died in or about 1688. His son Robert, the Mr. Robert jun. of the second list, succeeded him as second baronet. This Robert must have been born in the Barbadoes and have come home with his father. Whilst living at Rougham he married his next door neighbour, Mary Jermyn of Rushbrooke. They were married in Rushbrooke church in Feb. 1682. Mary Jermyn was the eldest of the five daughters and co-heiresses of Thomas, Lord Jermyn. This marriage eventually brought the Rushbrooke property to the Davers family, and the second Sir Robert Davers of Rougham became Sir Robert Davers of Rushbrooke.

This Sir Robert Davers of Rushbrooke had several children, two of whom were for a time resident in Horringer, viz., Admiral Thomas Davers, and Isabella. Isabella will be found in these notes under Moyle.

ADMIRAL THOMAS DAVERS.—We have seen that the Blagges had Little Horringer hall from about 1570 to about 1640. We shall see that the Gipps family succeeded them and had it from about 1640 to about 1720. Not having title deeds before me I cannot give exact dates. The next owner after the Gipps's seems to have been Thomas Davers. How he got it I don't know, but I presume by purchase. He seems to have done something to the house; probably he put in sash windows, which were then a comparatively new fashion; for in 1736 Lady Bristol was rebuilding the family house at Bury, now known as the Court House; and being in London she writes to her husband at Ickworth to ask him to get from Capt. Davers the agreement that he had made with his glazier to guide her in making an agreement with her glazier. Lord Bristol writes back that he has constantly asked Capt. Davers for it without effect. At last he is able to get it and send it to his wife. "You have been so very urgent about the enclosed account, that I gave Capt. Davers no rest, wherever I mett him, till he found it for you." Letters 1022, 1023, 1025. Soon after 1751 George, Lord Bristol, bought Little Horringer from the widow and son of Thomas Davers for £6600. He pulled down the old hall, and a farm house arose in its place just outside the moat. (See Goodchild.)

Thomas Davers was born about 1689 and went into the navy. A short account of his professional life will be found in Charnock's Biographia Navalis. From this I learn that in 1734 he commanded the Grafton of 70 guns, one of the fleet under Sir John Norris. In 1739 during the war with Spain he was appointed to the Suffolk, and sent with Sir Chaloner Ogle to the West Indies on the expedition against Carthagena. After the failure of that enterprize he remained there. He returned to England in 1742, and in the course of the next two years became rear-admiral of the red and vice-admiral of the white. In the latter half of 1744 he was appointed commander-in-chief of a squadron ordered out to Jamaica, where he staid till his death. In April 1745 he was promoted to be vice-admiral of the red. He died at Jamaica of yellow fever on Sept. 16, 1746. (Charnock says 1747, but his tombstone says 1746.) He appears to have done what he had to do with zeal and ability, without doing anything very remarkable.

There is a letter from John, Lord Bristol, written to him in Oct. 1743, during one of his short stays in England. Lord Bristol says that he hears that the time is coming when justice will be done him and he will get a flag, "and the bearer, my grandson Augustus, being more ambitious of being your Captain than of any other present preferment, if you would be so good as a neighbour and relation to think him worthy of that

honour, the obligation would be too great to be ever forgott by, Sir, your most affectionate friend and humble servant, Bristol." Letter 1184. So we can picture young Augustus with this note in his hand walking over from his grandfather's house, Ickworth Lodge, to the Admiral's at Little Horringer hall.

Admiral Davers was buried in Jamaica, and there in St. Andrew's church is a monument erected by his wife with a very long inscription. The inscription is printed in Capt. Lawrence Archer's Monumental Inscriptions of the British West Indies. From it one learns that he died in his 58th year after 40 years of service, that he married Katherine, only daughter of William Smithson of Yorkshire, an heiress, niece to Lord Jermyn and Lord Dover, by whom he had three sons and twelve daughters, of whom only one son and three daughters survived him. It would appear from that that his wife was his cousin on his mother's side. Being a naval man his fifteen children will probably be found scattered about in a good many Registers. The Horringer Register of Baptisms has five of them, viz. Mary 1732, Mary 1735, Henrietta 1736, Mary 1738, Isabella 1742. Of these Isabella and the three Maries were all laid in Horringer churchyard within a year of their birth. Thomas was the one surviving son of the Admiral. He was educated at Bury Grammar School. Perhaps it would have been better for him if he too had been laid in some churchyard within a year of his birth. Like several of his Davers cousins, he seems to have been of an eccentric and unhappy turn of mind and to have come to an untimely end. The Gentleman's Magazine for 1767 says that he built at great expence a little fort on the Thames near Blackwall known as Davers' folly, and that shortly before putting an end to his own life he wrote this on a card: Descended from an ancient and honourable family, I have for fifteen years past suffered more indigence than ever gentleman before submitted to; neglected by my acquaintance, traduced by my enemies, and insulted by the vulgar, I am so reduced, worn down and tired, that I have nothing left but that lasting repose, the first and dernier inheritance of all.

The name Davers was sometimes written Danvers. It is so written on Admiral Davers' monument in Jamaica, and in some of the early volumes of the Gentleman's Magazine. Admiral Davers signs his name, T. Davers, in one of the Horringer Parish books as having attended a vestry meeting on Easter Monday, 1737. The letters are very large, each one as large as the initial one.

JASPER DESPOTINE.—This gentleman, a native of Venice and for many years a resident in Bury St. Edmunds, came to be married at Horringer church, and so a note must be made of him.

We have already seen how that when Bedell returned to Bury from Venice early in 1611, he was accompanied by an Italian physician named Despotine. He had begun a friendship with him at Venice which lasted through life. Despotine had become a Protestant, probably under his influence, and now came and started a practice at Bury while his friend was preaching at St. Mary's church. They lodged together at the house of Mr. Nunne, wherever that was. Bedell taught the Italian physician the English language, without which he could not have got on with his patients. Bedell was married in the following year, but remained in Bury four years more, when he was appointed to Horringer. Three years later, in 1619, Despotine was married at Horringer church, apparently coming there in order that the ceremony might be performed in the church of his old friend. His wife, Susan Brand, seems to have belonged to a wealthy clothier's family, who had property at Boxford and Edwardston in Suffolk. Dr. Despotine had three daughters baptized in St. Mary's church, and his practice in Bury prospered.

His will, dated Dec. 1648, proved July 1650, has been printed among other Bury wills by the Camden Society, edited by that useful local historian, the late Samuel Tymms. He there speaks of himself as "an alien borne, but divers yeares since by the king's favour made free denizen." He wishes his body to be buried in the night privately by the body of his daughter Isabel. His other two daughters and his wife were still living. He leaves £10 to the poor of Bury, £5 to the poor of Nedging in Suffolk, where he had an estate, and various other legacies, including £5 to William Bedell of Rattlesden, the son of his old friend.

Dr. Despotine's daughter Catherine was married to Sir John Poley, Knt. of Bury St. Edmunds, who was third son of Sir William Poley, Knt. of Boxted by his wife Ann, daughter of Sir Robert Jermyn of Rushbrooke. Sir John was buried at Boxted in 1664, and Catherine his widow in 1670. They had four sons and a daughter baptized at St. Mary's in Bury St. Edmunds. The second son was christened Despotine.

JOHN FOWLER DOVE succeeded Mrs. Gedge at the Hopleys (see Gedge) about the year 1834, and died there in Oct. 1866 aged 79 years all but three days.

See Tombstone No. 206. He had been a London printer and publisher. Pitman's School Shakespeare and Pitman's edition of John Lightfoot's works were amongst others printed by him at St. John's Square, London, in and about 1820.

DUKE.—Only one of this name enters into the Horringer Registers, viz., Jermyn Duke, baptized in 1571.

The Dukes were settled at Brampton in Suffolk for 200 years or more till a little before 1600, when they moved to Benhall.

The above Jermyn Duke, whose parents names are not given, must be a younger son of Edward and Dorothy Duke.

Edward Duke was the last of Brampton and the first of Benhall, which he bought. He died in 1598. Dorothy his wife was a daughter of Sir Ambrose Jermyn of Rushbrooke who married Dame Blagge (see Blagge), and sister of Sir Robert Jermyn who married Hester Blagge, and aunt of Sir Thomas Jermyn who befriended Bishop Bedell. There is a very good brass of Edward and Dorothy Duke in the chancel of Benhall church. Sixteen children are represented on it, marching two and two. Jermyn Duke seems to have been the sixth of eighteen children. The eldest was Ambrose, whose son Edward, created a baronet in 1661, is said to have had twenty-nine children, in spite of which the baronetcy became extinct on the death in 1732 of Edward his grandson, the third baronet.

Ann Jermyn, a sister of the above Dorothy Duke, married William Tyndale, son of Sir Thomas Tyndale, a Norfolk knight, and she was buried at Horringer in 1574.

Another sister, Margaret Jermyn, was married in Horringer church in 1569 to Thomas Dyton, a Lincolnshire gentleman. A child of this marriage was baptized at Rushbrooke.

Another sister, Hester, as we have already seen (under Blagge) married a sort of half-brother, Henry Blagge of Little Horringer hall.

Where these other connections of the Jermyns lived, Duke, Dyton and Tyndale, who seem to have dropped into Horringer and out again directly afterwards like falling stars, I don't know. But it is possible that they may have occupied the late Abbot's house, Great Horringer hall, before it became a farmhouse. Or if that had already been a farm-house in the Abbot's time on account of the nearness of Little Horringer hall, which would have made another residential house unnecessary, then there may have been some other residential house in the

parish belonging to the lord of the manor, who lent it or let it to one or other of his daughters or sisters.

SOPHY DUNCOMBE.—No Duncombes will be found in the Registers; but as a certain Sophia or Sophy Duncombe resided for a time in Horringer I make a note about her. She was the daughter of Sir John Duncombe, Knight, and her mother was Elizabeth, daughter of Sir Humphry May. Sir John was sent to Parliament to represent the Corporation of Bury from 1661 to 1679. Lady Duncombe was a sister of Isabella May, whom Thomas Hervey, then living at Hengrave, courted secretly for nine long years. During the courtship Lady Duncombe's house at Bury was one of the places where they contrived to meet without the knowledge of Lady May, who forbid the courtship. This was in 1651 and following years. The Registers of St. James' parish, and, I think, also those of St. Mary's, show Sir John and Lady Duncombe residing in Bury between 1650 and 1660. In 1661 Lady May, the enemy to the courtship, was buried at St. Mary's, Bury. As Thomas Hervey and Isabella May eventually married, their son John, first Lord Bristol, was first cousin to the children of Sir John Duncombe. There is frequent allusion to them in Lord Bristol's letters, and it is only from these letters that I know that Sophy Duncombe resided at one time at Horringer.

In 1718 Lord Bristol writes from Ickworth to his wife in London, and says he has not time to write much, because Sir John Holland from Bury had dined with him and stayed till near night, and after he was gone he and his daughter Betty had walked over to take leave of Mrs. Duncombe, and came home by moonlight. And Lady Bristol answers that she is much hurt, because instead of telling her how miserable he is without her, he only tells her how agreeably he is spending his time "with polite Sir John all day and mad Sophy at night."

In 1720 Sophy Duncombe seems to have been still at Horringer, as he writes from Ickworth that "she has been here all this evening." In 1731 she was no longer there, as he writes to his cousin saying that the only thing wanting to make Ickworth perfectly pleasant "is to have you again in our neighbourhood at Horringer;" but apparently she had then left it for good. She led a gay life at Court and elsewhere, and some letters from her to Lady Sundon will be found printed in the Sundon Correspondence. In 1749, 1750, when Lord Bristol was past 80 and she could not have been less, there are letters from him to his son

Felton, from which it appears that she was then in great poverty. She died with her name unchanged. Where she lived in Horringer I cannot say. She probably was not a tenant of Lord Bristol's, as very little indeed of Horringer at that time belonged to the Ickworth estate. It has mostly been acquired since then. (Letters 524, 526, 598, 937, 1323, etc.)

EWIN.—This family lived in Horringer for 111 years, from 1634 to 1745, and then the place knew them no more. There were three successive John Ewins, father, son, and grandson. The first one came here in 1634, was married here in that year and again in 1645, and died, both he and his wife, in 1675.

The second John was born in 1634 and died in 1703.

The third John was born in 1669 and died in 1745. His two sons, John and William, had both died before him, and only daughters survived him, so that the name died out here.

The second of these three Johns occupied Great Horringer hall farm (see Appendix IV), and I have little doubt but that they all three did in succession, though there are no lists of ratepayers to prove it. Possibly the first John was the first tenant of Horringer hall after it became a farm-house. The owner of Rushbrooke, to whom it had come soon after the Abbot of Bury had been extinguished for ever, would not want another residential house so near Rushbrooke, and it would be found more convenient to turn it into a farm-house, and possibly John Ewen No. I was the first farmer who lived there.

Susan, a daughter of the third and last John Ewen, married Castell Goodchild, who was the first tenant of Little Horringer hall after that became a farm-house. (See Goodchild.)

Another daughter of the third John Ewen had the name Delariviere, or Dyllavera as it is written. For the origin of this christian name in Horringer see Appendix XII.

The name Ewin is occasionally in the Registers spelt Eurn.

There is a picturesque group of tombstones belonging to this family between the two paths on the south side of the church, Nos. 23 to 29.

SAMUEL FIRMIN.—In Feb. 1738/9 will be found the baptism of Thomas son of Samuel and Sarah Firmin. From the Jermyn MSS in the library of the Suffolk Archæological Institute I learn that in 1830 there died aged 93 years John

H. Firmin of Bricked house, Hawkedon. He gave Dr. Jermyn, who had been curate at Hawkedon, a pedigree of his family. From this pedigree it appears that there was a Rev. John Firmin of Stanstead, who amongst other children had a son Samuel who lived at Dean farm, Hawkedon. This Samuel had a son Samuel who lived at Horringer and was buried at Bury. Thomas whose baptism was at Horringer in after life lived at Hatfield Broad Oak. John of Bricked house, brother to the elder of the two Samuels, was father of John who gave the pedigree to Dr. Jermyn.

REV. EDWARD FORSTER.—In 1702 will be found the marriage of Richard Forster and Hester Ernesby. Richard is there a mistake in the original register for Edward. His death at the age of 37 happened in 1704, hers in 1717. Their gravestones are Appendix II, No. 5.

He was of Queen's College, Cambridge, B.A. in 1689. In 1690 he was appointed to the living of Badley near Stowmarket, the old possession of the Poleys, which was just then passing by inheritance from them to the Gipps family of Little Horringer hall. (See Gipps.) I notice in the Graduati Cantabrigienses that Queen's College was the college to which many of the Poleys went. Therefore some college acquaintanceship may have led to Edward Forster being appointed to Badley. And as Lady Gipps, the widow of Sir Richard Gipps and the daughter and heiress of the last Poley of Badley, was at this time residing at Little Horringer hall, that may be somehow the cause, direct or indirect, of his living at Horringer.

His wife, Hester Ernesby or Arnsby, seems to have been one of a family that was connected with Horringer for a short time. She could hardly be the Hester daughter of Richard who was baptized in 1687, but she might be a daughter of John Ernesby whose name is on tombstone No. 20. That John appears to have come down in the world, but he married the daughter, probably more or less of an heiress, of Josias Wright, and Mr. Forster may have lived on his wife's copyhold or lifehold estate. Josias Wright's lands are mentioned in Thomas Covel's Survey of Ickworth made in 1665, and a careful examination of that Survey might locate them exactly. They seem to have lain on the Horringer side of Ickworth and the Ickworth side of Horringer. Possibly he was in part a tenant of the Gipps's.

Edward Forster seems to have been a man of studious habits, and though dying

at the early age of 37 he held the living of Badley for 14 years. Badley is a picturesque little church, both in itself and in its situation. It has not yet been ruined by a hard, unfeeling, priggish kind of restoration, as many Suffolk churches have, and its flat monuments have not yet been covered over with encaustic tiles, as they have been in St. James' Church, Bury St. Edmunds!!!

REV. JOHN FRENCH.—He was educated at Christ's College, Cambridge, B.A. in 1712. In 1721 he was appointed rector of Great Saxham, which he held till his death. From 1727 to 1745 he was reader at St. Mary's, Bury. From 1744 to 1758 he was preacher or lecturer at St. James'. In Feb. 1758 he was appointed by Sir Robert Davers to the rectory of Horringer on the death of Dr. Symonds. He held it till his death, but never resided here. He died in Jan. 1767, aged 77 years, and was buried at Great Saxham, where there is a gravestone for him, for Elizabeth his wife who died Aug. 1772, aged 77, for Rev. Robert French, his son, an old Bury Grammar School boy, who died June 1771, aged 42, and for Christina Parkinson, his daughter, who died Oct. 1802.

PETER GEDGE.—On Thursday, July 11, 1782, appeared No. 1 of the Bury Post and Universal Advertiser. It opened with an address from the proprietors, signed Green, Gedge, Deck & Co.

Green was William Green, a printer and bookseller in Cook Row. He also sold medicines which were largely advertised.

Deck was Philip Deck, a book and print seller at the Post Office in Bury. He had "a pleasing collection" of some thousands of volumes, and printed a catalogue. He also sold coins, seals, paintings, etc. I regret to state that he also sold medicines.

Gedge was Peter Gedge, a young man lately come to Bury from Norwich, and nephew to William Green. As he afterwards became a resident in Horringer he must have a note. He was the grandson of Peter Gedge of Old Buckenham in Norfolk, and son of Peter Gedge, a manufacturer, of Norwich. His mother was Alice Chase, daughter of William Chase, the first publisher and proprietor of the Norwich Mercury, and the ancestor of many journalists.* Sarah Chase, sister to Alice Chase, was married to William Green, the Bury bookseller.

^{*} I am indebted to Mr. Arthur Johnson Gedge of Baldock for Gedge pedigrees. He tells me that as late as 1864 the *Worcester Herald*, the *Norfolk Chronicle*, and the *Bury Post* were all owned and conducted by descendants of this William Chase. I am also indebted to Mr. H. R. Barker for a reference to Rev. F. S. Growse's History of Bildeston, which contains a Gedge pedigree.

Peter Gedge was born in August, 1758, and so was under 24 years at the time of the starting of the Bury Post. In Oct. 1784 the death of William Green was announced at the age of 52. He left two daughters, Margaret and Sarah. In March 1785 Sarah Green was married to her first cousin, Peter Gedge, who immediately afterwards is announced as printer of the Bury Post and as succeeding to William Green's business. At the same time the title of the paper is changed to the more modest one of Bury Post or Suffolk and Norfolk Advertiser, and the day of issue is changed from Thursday to Wednesday.

Sarah Gedge died on Dec. 3, 1793, aged 31 years. Her mural tablet in St. Mary's Church tells us that "she was a mirror in which personal beauty was seen only to reflect the still more resplendent qualities of her mind." Mr. A. J. Gedge tells me that he recollects a portrait of her by Gainsborough (?), representing "a most fascinating and charming personality."

Peter Gedge married secondly Ann Johnson. She was the only child of James Johnson of Bury St. Edmunds, 1723-1791, a former Alderman of Bury. Her grandfather James Johnson, and her great grandfather Jacob Johnson, were both mercers of Bury. By this second marriage he had several children. (1) Ann, 1797 to 1824, when she was buried at Horringer. (App: II, No. 1; App: III, No. 143.) (2) Rev. Joseph, 1799 to 1893, rector of Bildeston. (3) Johnson, 1800 to 1863, who succeeded his father in the conducting of the Bury Post. (4) Rev. Sydney, 1802 to 1883. Of this last there is a memoir in the Dictionary of National Biography, from which I learn that after being educated at the Bury Grammar School and St. Catharine's Coll: Cambridge, he became curate of Runcton in Norfolk; from 1835 to 1859 he was second Master of King Edward's School at Birmingham; from 1859 to 1875 he was vicar of All Saints, Northampton. He was a Liberal in politics and a great supporter of the C.M.S. His name will sometimes be found as officiating in Horringer Church. His son, Sydney Gedge, now represents Walsall in Parliament.

What year Peter Gedge came to live at the Hopleys in Horringer I have not been able to find out. He first appears in 1806 as paying a yearly rent of £8 10s. to the Ickworth estate, which in 1815 was increased to £28 19s. In the Horringer Rate-book for 1813 he is rated at £34 a year, and in 1815 at £48. Earlier rate-books do not appear to exist. He was present at a vestry meeting at Horringer on Dec. 18, 1817, when it was decided to accept Mr. Arthur Brook's offer to restore the church at his own expense. On Jan. 7, 1818, he died

"suddenly at his cottage at Horningsheath," aged 59 years. His political principles were those of Charles James Fox, whom he is said to have resembled in personal appearance. Though buried at Horringer a tablet was put up to his memory in St. Mary's Church at Bury with this inscription, "To the memory of Peter Gedge, printer, who first established the newspaper published in this town. He died Jan. 7, 1818, aged 59 years. Like a worn-out type he is returned to the Founder, in hopes of being recast in a better and more perfect mould."

I imagine that his widow, Ann Gedge, continued to occupy the Hopleys till 1833, as her name is in the rate-book till then. In 1834 it is gone, and that of John Fowler Dove takes her place. In 1829 Johnson Gedge was appointed churchwarden of Horringer. Ann Gedge died at Bury in April 1840, aged 70 years, but was brought to Horringer for burial.

There had been a family named Gedge living in Horringer 180 years before Peter Gedge came there, but I do not know if they were of the same stock. The descendants of Peter Gedge appear to be very numerous now.

GIPPS.—The Gipps family succeeded the Blagges at Little Horringer hall. I have already said (see Blagge) that as the Blagge baptisms leave off at 1635 and the Gipps baptisms begin at 1645, the one must have gone out and the other come in between those two dates, unless the new-comers had some other house in the parish for a time and so they over-lapped. I don't know that it was so nor that it wasn't. Not having title deeds before me I am rather in the dark. But as Mr. Gage had title deeds before him and does not temporarily put them anywhere else, I presume that they came straight to Little Horringer hall not long before 1645, the Blagges having by that time sold it and gone.

RICHARD GIPPS.—The first to come was Richard, who according to Mr. Gage was the son of Richard of London, Judge of the Sheriff's Court. The wife of Richard the Londoner was Margaret, daughter of Valentine Pell. The wife of young Richard of Horringer was Martha Seaman of Yarmouth.

Richard and Martha had nine children baptized here between 1645 and 1657, viz., Margaret, Richard, John, Thomas, Elizabeth, George, Martha, Mary, Elizabeth. He was buried here in 1663.

SIR RICHARD GIPPS.—Of those nine I can only follow the path of Richard. He was baptized in June, 1646. I see no more of him till 1676, when

Charles II came to pay his third visit to Lord Crofts at Little Saxham. Richard Gipps went there to meet him and came back Sir Richard, having been knighted. In November of that same year he was married by licence at St. Martin's-in-the-Fields to Elizabeth Poley, he being 30 and she 22. Elizabeth Poley was the daughter and heiress of Sir Edmund Poley of Badley. Her father was already dead. Her mother, Lady Poley, was a Crofts of Little Saxham. Apparently that visit to Little Saxham had brought him a wife as well as a knighthood.

Sir Richard had three children baptized here, viz., Richard in 1677, Elizabeth in 1679, Katharine in Jan. 1681/2. Katharine was a posthumous child, as Sir Richard had died in the previous September, aged 35. Lady Gipps survived him over 30 years, dying in 1715. Her mother, Lady Poley, had died at Badley in 1714, when she must have been of a great age.

Elizabeth, the daughter of Sir Richard, married her cousin Anthony Crofts of Little Saxham, and was buried there in 1753.

MAJOR RICHARD GIPPS.—This Richard, the only son of Sir Richard, and the fourth consecutive Richard counting the Londoner, was baptized here in 1677. If he inherited his father's estate at Little Horringer and his mother's at Badley, he ought to have been well off. But judging from his selling everything he was not. In the account of The Ancient Families of Suffolk by Sir Richard Gipps of Welnetham, who was a distant cousin of Sir Richard of Horringer, this is what he or his editor says of the Horringer Gipps's. Having said that the Gipps family was antiently seated at Ipswich, but afterwards divided into two branches, he says, "Sir Richard Gipps of Horningsheath in Thingo Hundred was of the younger house; but sold his estate. Upon which his son Richard Gipps Esq. went into the army, and proved a brave officer; but was basely discharged upon party-pique, and is now seated at Badley in Bosmere Hundred."

I do not know anything of Richard Gipps' military career except that he seems to have attained to the rank of a Major. According to Mr. Gage and the Supplement to the Suffolk Traveller he sold land at Fornham All Saints and Fornham St. Genoveve, the latter being the estate afterwards acquired by the Duke of Norfolk. The above quotation represents Horringer as having been sold by his father. But I do not see how that could have been, as Lady Gipps continued to reside there for more than 20 years after her husband's death, and Lord Bristol's letters show him exchanging land with her and her son. Letters 226, 242, 260.

With regard to Badley, the Supplement to the Suffolk Traveller says that Major Richard Gipps sold it to Ambrose Crawley; but Lord Arthur Hervey, in a paper on the Poley family read before the Suffolk Archæol: Institute in June 1859, mentions a letter at Boxted written by a Poley to a Croftes in 1767 as saying that Badley passed by inheritance to William Crofts, son of Anthony who married Elizabeth Gipps, Major Richard's sister. No two statements ever seem to agree together, and unless one has actual title deeds before one it is difficult to say what did happen, and not always easy even then.

The Registers of Fornham All Saints contain an entry of the baptism of Edmund son of Richard Gipps in Jan. 1711/12. I imagine that Richard to be the Major, and that this Edmund died young, and that the line of Sir Richard of Horringer came to an end with his son the Major. He is mentioned as living at Badley in 1722, but that is the last that I know of him.

Badley is well worth a visit. Its church, between Stowmarket and Needham Market, is placed in green fields far away from any road; it has not yet been unfeelingly and priggishly restored like many Suffolk churches, and its flat monuments have not yet been broken up or covered over with new encaustic tiles. I suppose they will be some day.

But I have not quite done yet with the Horringer Gipps.

VALENTINE GIPPS.—Directly Richard Gipps, the father of Sir Richard, left off bringing his children to be baptized, Valentine began to bring his. He brought two, viz., Sulyard in 1659 and George in 1661, in which year he lost his wife Jane. Who this Valentine was I don't know, but I imagine from his christian name that he must be a son of Richard the Londoner, and uncle of Sir Richard. Where in Horringer he lived I can't imagine.

JOHN GIPPS.—Much earlier still, sixty years at least before Richard the son of the Londoner first came to Little Horringer hall, viz., in 1580 and thereabouts, there was a John Gipps bringing his children to be baptized here; but who he was and where he lived I know not. I imagine that he must be an ancestor of Sir Richard of Horringer, because in the herald's Visitation of Suffolk, 1561 (edited by Mr. Metcalf in 1882), I see an account of the Moore family of Stansted. It is there stated that John Moore, grandfather of Christopher Moore who represented the family in 1561, married Margaret Poley of Badley, and that their daughter marriage John Gipps of Horringer. So this early marriage of a

Gipps with a Poley of Badley makes it likely that Sir Richard who married a Poley of Badley was a descendant. I have often noticed that in early times, when there was less freedom of movement, a connection by marriage between two families has generally been preceded by a still earlier connection, or in other words they married cousins of some degree or other. I have nothing to do here with Sir Richard Gipps of Great Welnetham except to say that he must not be confounded with Sir Richard of Little Horringer. As they were born within two years of each other, were both knighted by Charles II, and both lived within three miles of Bury, it is easy to mix them up. They were cousins, but I don't know how near. A short account of Sir Richard of Welnetham will be found in the Dict: of Nat: Biography. He was born in 1644 and died in 1708. The latter part of his life was spent in Suffolk in genealogical pursuits. There is a good engraved portrait of him in the library of the Suffolk Archæological Institute. He was on very bad terms with his neighbour, John Lord Bristol, he being a high Tory and Lord Bristol a Whig. There was a desperate quarrel in 1702 about a may-pole and politics. See Lord Bristol's letters, Nos. 209, 210, 211, 213. There was another political quarrel with Mr. Richard Gipps in 1710, after both Sir Richards had passed out of reach of politics. See Letter 325. And as both Sir Richards had a Richard for son and heir and successor, it is a little difficult to say whose this was. But as the Richard of Welnetham would have been only about 18 at the time, it is probably the son of the other Sir Richard, viz., the Major.

The "old Mrs. Gipps" who is mentioned in letters dated 1734 from Lord Bristol to the Bishop of Norwich (Nos. 991, 996) must I think be the widow of John Gipps, rector of Brockley in 1686, a non-juror of 1689, and consequently deprived and reduced to great poverty, and brother to Sir Richard of Welnetham. If so she was aunt to John Giles Gipps, rector of Brockley and Chevington from 1726 to 1734, in which year he died.

There is a letter to Lady Gipps, No. 260, from which I have already quoted (under Covel), about an exchange of land that Lord Bristol had made with her. This would be the widow of Sir Richard of Horringer.

It is curious to notice what a very favourite name Richard was in both branches of the Gipps family, Welnetham and Horringer. Generation after generation kept it up.

CASTELL GOODCHILD.—Admiral Thomas Davers died in 1746. Soon after 1751 his widow and son sold Little Horringer to George, Lord Bristol, who

gave £6,600 for it. He pulled down the hall, and a farm-house arose just outside the moat, probably built with the old materials of the house in which the Abbots of Bury, the Blagges, Gipps's and Davers's had successively resided. The first, or at any rate an early tenant of this farm-house seems to have been Castell Goodchild of Nowton, who in 1739 had married Susan Ewin, daughter of the tenant of Great Horringer hall. As he was churchwarden of Horringer in 1745, he must either have occupied the Little Horringer hall lands before Lord Bristol bought them and pulled down the hall, or possibly he may have succeeded his father-in-law, John Ewin, at Great Horringer hall farm, who died in 1745, and then afterwards shifted to Lord Bristol's new farm-house at Little Horringer. Between 1745 and 1778 he constantly served the office of churchwarden. He seems to have had only one daughter, Bridget, who in 1774 was married to Thomas Orbell of Risby. Castell Goodchild died in April, 1782, aged 61 years. His widow carried on the farm for another two years and died in July, 1784, aged 73 years. The yearly rent of the farm in 1782 was £180. The next tenant was William Brooks, who paid yearly £270.

From the Ickworth Survey of 1665 and from the Ickworth Registers there would appear to have been three successive generations of Goodchilds occupying a farm in Ickworth park between 1640 and 1720, i.e. during the time when the old manor house near Ickworth Church was gradually falling to pieces from neglect, and while the park was disparked and divided into eighteen farms. Of these eighteen farms Arthur Goodchild's was the largest, containing 159 acres. These farms disappeared when John Lord Bristol came to live at Ickworth and recreated the park. On June 4, 1723, Lord Bristol writes from London to Lady Bristol at Bath, and says that he has heard from William Oliver, his land steward, that the cheese chamber at Ickworth has been broken into, and upon search being made fifteen cheeses had been found in Larner's house, "who conscious of his guilt has made his escape out of our poor old Constable Goodchild's hands, and left his wife and children to be maintained by your most affectionate longing husband, Bristol."

I do not know that Castell Goodchild was a descendant of these early Ickworth Goodchilds. Another Horringer Goodchild was James, who married Mary Eagle in 1791 and died in 1815 aged 52. He had several children, one of whom, Thomas, was for many years gardener to Lord Arthur Hervey at Ickworth Lodge, and died in 1876 aged 73.

REV. ROBERT GOODRICK .- He was appointed rector of Horringer in 1629, and was buried there in 1660. By his wife Margaret he had ten children baptized here between 1637 and 1653. As the patronage of Horringer at this time belonged to the Jermyns, and as the thrice-married Dorothy Badby had brought about a connection between the Goodricks and Jermyns (see Blagge), I imagine that this Robert was a connection, perhaps a descendant, of Richard Goodrick or Goodrich, Dorothy's second husband. The Commonwealth brought evil days upon him. This is what we are told of him in Walker's Sufferings of the Clergy, 1714, "Robert Goodrick, Horninger, R. He also suffered much in other kinds, and dying before the Restoration left 6 or 8 small children and a very disconsolate widow, who was afterwards relieved by the charity of the Corporation for Ministers' widows." Walker is not quite correct in saying that he died before the Restoration, as he died about four months after it. After the entry of his burial in the Registers there is a word written that I could not at first make out, and printed it with a query. I have since made out that it is satus, an abbreviation of sequestratus. I imagine that two of his sons, Robert and Henry, went up to Pembroke College, Cambridge, and took their degrees, Robert B.A. 1660, D.B. 1671, Henry B.A. 1666. Another son, Nathaniel, had children baptized here, and another son, John, was buried here in 1702.

LYON GOODRICK.—In 1578 will be found the baptism of Lyon, son of Richard Goodrick, gent. I take it that this Lyon was a grandson of the thrice-married Dorothy by her second husband Richard Goodrick, and therefore was brought to Horringer Church from Little Horringer hall. In Mr. Venn's Biographical History of Caius College is a Lionel son of Lionel Gooderick, of North Creak, educated at Ely School, admitted to Caius College in 1623. The elder of these two Lionels must be the infant Lyon of the Horringer registers. Thomas Gooderick, Bishop of Ely, who died in 1554, was uncle of Richard Gooderick who married Dorothy Blagge, and that accounts for young Lionel being educated at Ely School. A memoir both of Thomas Gooderick the uncle, and of Richard Gooderick the nephew, will be found in the Dict: of Nat: Biography.

GOULD.—See Appendix XI.

GRIGBY.—Joshua Grigby seems to have resided here for a short time, as his daughter Lucy was baptized here in 1763.

There were four Joshua Grigbys in succession, father, son, grandson and great grandson, so that it is easy to confuse one with another.

Joshua No. 1 was a solicitor at Bury St. Edmunds, and was buried at St. Mary's in 1725, aged 66.

Joshua No. 2 was a solicitor and town-clerk of Bury and died in 1771, aged 80 years. He was buried at St. Mary's. His wife was Mary Tubby of Norfolk, whose mother was niece and co-heiress of Archbishop Tenison. This Mr. Grigby bought lands at Whepstead and thereabouts, some of which (Westwood etc.) he immediately sold to John, Lord Bristol, and some of which (Plumpton etc.) were eventually sold to General Sir Thomas Hammond.

Joshua No. 3 was educated at Bury Grammar School, became a barrister, married Jane Bird of Coventry, built the present mansion at Drinkstone, was M.P. for Suffolk from 1784 to 1790, died in 1798 aged 67 years, and was buried at Drinkstone. His address to the electors will be found in the *Bury Post* of April 1, 1784. From his remarks on the need of reform I imagine he was a liberal.

Joshua No. 4 was twice married but died without children in 1829, and was succeeded at Drinkstone by his nephew Thomas Harcourt Powell.

The above Lucy who was baptized at Horringer was daughter of No. 3 and sister of No. 4. She married Mr. Powell, and their son Thomas Harcourt Powell succeeded his uncle, the last Joshua. Thomas Harcourt Powell, late of the Scots Guards, died Aug. 1892 aged 71, and was buried at Drinkstone. The generation to which his mother, Lucy, belonged was an unfortunate one. Her sister Elizabeth married John Wombwell and died in July, 1784, aged 25 years, from injuries received in a crowd in Westminster Abbey. Her brother George, Captain in the 11th Regiment, was on board a transport ship which was run down off Falmouth in 1811, and he perished with 233 others. The fate of her brother Charles is unknown.

My authorities for these statements are the Jermyn MSS., Tymms' History of St. Mary's Church, Supplement to the Suffolk Traveller, Lord Bristol's Letters, Nos. 1285, 1288, 1292, 1306.

MARY HANDS.—She was the daughter of Thomas Moyle (see Moyle), one of the many Jermyn and Davers cousins who for a time found a home in Horringer. All I know of Benjamin Hands, her husband, is what I learn from

her tombstone, No. 97. What she had to do with the Spencelys who share that tombstone with her, I do not know.

REV. JOHN HARRISON.—I have nothing to say of him except that he was appointed Rector of Horringer in 1558, and buried there in 1581. Mr. Gage has got the date of his appointment quite wrong, being misled by a mistake in the Tanner MSS.

Being the first rector presented after Bury abbey had come to an end, he may be looked upon as the first Protestant rector. He was presented by Ambrose Jermyn. He was also the first rector appointed after the consolidation in 1548 of Great and Little Horringer.

TOM HARVEY .- On pulling tombstone No. 87 up out of the ground into which it had sunk, I found it had an inscription stating that Tom Harvey died on May 12, 1752, in his 54th year, after having served John, Lord Bristol, upwards of 45 years. He appears to have been a native of Westley, though more than one of the family will be found in the Horringer registers. He must have entered Lord Bristol's service when only 8 years old, and succeeded Robert Wildman as coachman in 1721 when he was about 22 years old, and remained till Lord Bristol's death in 1750. His wages were £7 a year. Lord Bristol left him by will a year's wages and an annuity of £5, but as he only survived his old master about 16 months he did not get much benefit from it. He and Robert Wildman were coachmen to Lord Bristol and his father for 71 successive years. Tom Harvey is frequently mentioned in Lord Bristol's letters as the bearer of letters, and must have known the road between Ickworth and London pretty well. When Lady Bristol or anybody else had to be fetched from London or sent there, they seemed to have thought no more of sending a great lumbering coach all the way from Ickworth than we should think of sending a dog cart two or three miles to a railway station. Letter 572 shows the danger of the journey. In Oct. 1719 Lady Bristol has got to be fetched from London. Lord Bristol writes from Ickworth that Tom Harvey has orders to start on Friday morning, and Welch Tom and Mr. Morris will go too and return with her on Monday. "I can never consent to have you attended by two horsmen only; three horsmen will deterr any band of highway men from attempting you, wheras having but two may invite one."

REV. HENRY HASTED was the son of Roger Hasted of Bury St. Edmunds, surgeon, by his wife Elizabeth (Craske). He was born in 1771 and educated at the Bury Grammar School and Christ's College, Cambridge, 6th wrangler, B.A. in 1793. In October, 1802, he was elected preacher or lecturer at St. Mary's Church, which office he held for 40 years, resigning it in 1842. In March, 1803, he was appointed to the rectory of Ickworth-cum-Chedburgh, which he resigned in 1832. In 1808 he was appointed to the rectory of Bradfield Combust, which he resigned in 1832. In 1812 he was appointed to the rectory of Braisworth, which I believe he held till his death. In April 1814 he was appointed to the rectory of Horringer, which he held till his death in 1852. He married Mary Ann only daughter of Rev. John Ord, D.D., of Fornham St. Martin, who died Oct. 2, 1810, aged 34 years. By her he had two children, viz., Henry John, who was appointed to the rectories of Bradfield Combust and Little Welnetham in 1832, and afterwards to the rectory of Sproughton;* and Mary Ann Elizabeth who married Capt. G. H. Heigham, 4th Dragoon Guards.

Mr. Hasted seems never to have resided at Horringer, but lived in his own house at Bury, No. 108, Northgate Street. His portrait by J. G. Strutt, now in the possession of his granddaughter, Miss Heigham, was engraved by C. Turner. In Feb. 1852 he published a volume of "Sermons for Lent and Easter." "To my parishioners, whom from age and infirmities I am now no longer able to address from the pulpit, or administer to in the church, I dedicate these sermons, as a token of my continued remembrance, and of my affectionate solicitude for their welfare."

He died that same year, Nov. 26, 1852, aged 81 years, and was buried at St. James'. He was greatly beloved in Bury and the neighbourhood, and £1,400 was raised by public subscription for the endowment of a ward in the Suffolk General Hospital to be called by his name, and for the erection of tablets in the the churches of the town.

NICHOLAS HEATH or HETHE.—He was presented to the rectory of Great Horringer in Sept. 1393 by the Abbot of Bury, but held it for less than a year. I presume that he was a member of the family of de Bruario or de Hethe, who held Little Saxham for seven generations, from about A.D. 1200 to about 1400. Branches of the family were also at Bury, Mildenhall, and elsewhere in the neighbourhood.

A certain Agnes Tamworth, who died in 1437, was successively the wife of Thomas de Ickworth who owned Ickworth, Nicholas Heth of Bury St. Edmunds, and Edmund Lucas of Westow. She had Ickworth till her death. Her only son Ralph de Ickworth dying young, there was a dispute as to whose Ickworth should be after her death. The Abbot of Bury, the Heth family, John Brockley and Sir William Drury all put in their claim. The matter was submitted to arbitration and decided in favour of Sir William Drury. His cousin, Henry Drury, somehow became possessed of it, whose daughter and heiress marrying Thomas Hervey brought it to the family which still possesses it just 490 years after the award of the arbitrators. I do not know that Nicholas Hethe, the rector of Great Horringer, was the same man as the second husband of Agnes Tamworth, but it is possible that he was. He was only an acolyte when presented to Horringer, and may not have proceeded any farther.

REV. ARTHUR L. C. HEIGHAM was appointed to the rectory of Horringer and Ickworth in 1881, which he resigned in 1883. Being a son of Capt. G. H. Heigham who married Miss Hasted he was a grandson of a former rector. Since leaving Horringer he has been rector of Englefield in Berkshire.

HON. and REV. FREDERICK HERVEY, Earl of Bristol and Bishop of Derry. This very extraordinary man was a resident in Horringer for a few years, and therefore a note must be given him.

He was the third son of John, Lord Hervey, by his wife Mary (Lepel). This is the announcement of his birth and baptism in the Diary of his grandfather, the first Earl of Bristol. "1730. Aug. 1. Saturday. My daughter in law Lady Hervey was delivered of a son. The Prince of Wales, the Duke of Richmond and the younger Dutchess of Marlborough answered for him on ye third of September following, and named him Frederick."

The obituary notice of him in the Gentleman's Magazine, 1803, says that he was educated at Mr. Newcome's school at Hackney. He was also at Westminster school, where his father, uncles and elder brother had been before him. There is a letter to him from his grandfather, dated Ickworth Park, Dec. 13, 1746, beginning, "My very hopefull Grandson, and saying, you need make no question of my being glad to see you at every breaking up of your school; and if I cannot say the same as to your brother William, tis not for want of having an equal natural affection for him." But there is nothing in the letter to show at what school he then was. Whilst school boys he

and his brother William had for tutor Mr. Edmund Morris, afterwards Rector of Nutshalling or Nursling in Hampshire. Lady Hervey's Letters to Mr. Morris were edited by Mr. Croker in 1821. In a letter dated Ickworth, April 25, 1744, she says to him, "I am extremely pleased with all you say of Frederick, for I value your judgement; he has certainly very good parts and great application, and will, I am persuaded, make a considerable figure in the world. I have heard from him of late pretty often; he is a very agreeable, entertaining correspondent. His scheme of study and travelling, as you relate it to me, seems to be a very good one." He is only 13 years old when he makes these schemes of study and travelling.

In 1747 he proceeded to Benet alias Corpus Christi College, Cambridge, his younger brother William being there with him. His grandfather's letters to him show him still there in April 1750. The Dean of Hereford was master of his college, and Mr. Castle I imagine to have been his college tutor. On asking his grandfather to allow him 20 guineas to get the services of an additional tutor, it was granted. Mr. Heaton was the additional tutor. The 20 guineas were always sent from Ickworth to Cambridge "by the carrier."

Carriers in old days were used for more various purposes than they are now. I have heard my father tell a story, which I think he had from Mr. Hasted, of a countryman who had made a proposal of marriage to a young woman in a neighbouring village, and who said that he had told her that he did not care much which way it was, but she was to send him word how it was to be "by the carrier."

A letter from Lady Hervey to Mr. Morris gives additional evidence of his studies at this time. Writing from Ickworth on Aug. 23, 1749, she says, "Frederick is with them (the Phipps's) for a few days; I believe he studies very hard, and I am glad of it; but I agree with you there should be a mixture of amusements with it, otherwise he may be a deep scholar, but never an agreeable companion." The Phipps's were then living at Horringer. (See Phipps.) Whilst at Cambridge Frederick thought he had discovered an original portrait of his grandmother by Vandyke. Lord Bristol was rather sceptical about it, and as the picture is not at Ickworth I presume that its authenticity was not proved and that he would not buy it. Letter 1354.

He must have left Cambridge in 1750 without taking a degree, and one loses sight of him till Aug. 10, 1752, on which day he was married in Rushbrooke Church to Elizabeth Davers, daughter of Sir Jermyn Davers of Rushbrooke. He was just 22, and she was 19.

I have already given some account of the Davers family (see Davers), but they belong properly to the Rushbrooke Registers and not to those of Horringer. It must be enough to say here that Elizabeth Davers was niece to Admiral Thomas Davers of Little Horringer hall, and that her father, Sir Jermyn, was grandson to the first baronet, who I have supposed to have gone out to the Barbadoes in 1636, a little boy of 14 years, friendless and with only half-a-crown in his pocket. The prosperity which attended the Davers's in the middle of the 17th century deserted them in the middle of the 18th century, and one after another they came to untimely ends, so that a Bury lady writes to her friend, 'Tis surprising how that family goes off. (See Symonds.) This marriage added a considerable estate to the Ickworth property. But that result did not come about till 50 years afterwards, and I do not think it could possibly have been foreseen at the time. For Frederick had two elder brothers, and Elizabeth Davers had four brothers and an elder sister. Of her brothers,* Robert went to America in a pique, courted death and got killed in a boat by some Indians in 1763. Henry shortly before that shot himself on board ship. Thomas, rector of Little Whelnetham, shot himself in 1766 in his mother's house on the Angel Hill, I think the house near the Abbey gate, now occupied as a young ladies' school. Charles succeeded to the estates and baronetcy and died without legitimate issue in 1806. Mary died unmarried in the house near the Abbey gate in 1805. On the deaths of these last two the Rushbrooke property, including the manor and advowson of Horringer and the site of Bury Abbey, passed to their nephew, Frederick William, afterwards first Marquis of Bristol. But in 1752 it would have been impossible to have foreseen that Frederick would have succeeded to the Ickworth estate, or that his son Frederick William would have succeeded to the Davers' estate, and so brought the two estates into one. So the marriage must have been for love and not for the sake of joining two neighbouring estates. One may hope that there was some love at first, as there was very little afterwards.

After his marriage in 1752 the next thing I know about him is that he became M.A. in 1754. He had left Cambridge without a degree, but as a nobleman's son he had the right to one without examination, and he now took it. He had been intended for the Bar, but had changed his mind and gone into the Church. He

was ordained in July, 1754. Lady Hervey writes to Mr. Morris from Lord Stanhope's at Chevening on July 18, 1754, saying, "Your old friend Frederick is this day come from Ely the Reverend Mr. Hervey."

And now must have begun his residence in Horringer judging from the date of his children's baptisms. He had four children baptized at Horringer, viz., George in 1755, John Augustus in 1757, Elizabeth Christian in 1758, Frederick Clayton in 1761. Three other children were born after these, and not baptized here. So one may fix his residence here as being from the time of his ordination in 1754 to 1761 or soon afterwards.

I have tried to make out for certain where his house was, but have hardly succeeded. My mother tells me that Mr. Hasted used to say that it was a little to the right directly after you have entered the park through the Horringer gate, near a pond which is still there. There are now no sure signs of a house having stood there, though there are signs of old enclosures. If it stood there, its position near the church would make it look as if it were the old Great Horringer manor house. But I have always understood that the old hall or manor house was the farm-house on the Bury road. It might have been a house belonging to his brother George, who was then the owner of Ickworth, or it might have been a house belonging to his wife's brother, Sir Robert Davers, who owned Horringer manor. If it stood near this pond, though it would have been within Ickworth park pale now, it would not have been within Ickworth park pale then, for the park has extended in that and in every other direction since then, and swallowed up fields and houses which formerly lay outside of it. It might have been the house which the Phipps's had lately been occupying, and in which as an undergraduate he had stayed with them, though that does not make one much wiser, as one does not know where their house was. (See Phipps.)

Of the above four children who were born in this house and baptized at Horringer, George died in boyhood and was buried at Spa. Some years ago his brother tried to find out the exact spot of his burial, but could not, as apparently the burial of Protestants was not recognized. Frederick Clayton must have died before 1769, when another Frederick was baptized, who was afterwards first Marquis of Bristol. Of John Augustus and Elizabeth Christian I give some account below.

Whilst residing at Horringer, say from 1754 to 1762, he does not appear to have had any post or duties whatsoever; and no doubt while Horringer was his head-

quarters, some time was given to foreign travel. We have already seen him making out a scheme of travel when only a boy of 13; and in the Life of Alexander Humboldt we see him as keen as ever in his travelling schemes when little short of 70 years of age. So it is not likely that he stayed at Horringer doing nothing. In 1756 he was made a clerk of the privy seal, which is a lay office. In 1763 he was made a chaplain to the king. In 1766 he was at Naples during an eruption of Vesuvius, and going to look too close was hit by a stone. In 1766 his eldest brother George, second Earl of Bristol, was appointed Lord Lieutenant of Ireland, which he resigned a few months later without ever having gone there. He just held the post long enough to be able to nominate Frederick to the bishoprick of Cloyne. That was in Feb. 1767. So his first parish was a diocese. Exactly a year afterwards he was promoted to the rich bishoprick of Derry.

I have no space to give details of his life in Ireland and must pass them over. But as we have already had one Irish bishop in these notes, Bedell, I can't resist comparing or rather contrasting the two. Probably they were as different from each other as any one man can be from any other. I gave some extracts showing Bishop Bedell dressing with almost an excess of plainness and simplicity; and when the offer of a bishoprick was made to him he was unwilling to accept it, because he feared lest he should have to part with some of his simplicity and plainness of life.

Frederick Hervey had no such fears. Here is Mr. Lecky's account of one of his appearances at Dublin: "Dressed entirely in purple, with diamond knee and shoebuckles, and with long gold tassels hanging from his white gloves, he sat in an open landau drawn by six noble horses caparisoned with purple ribands. Dragoons rode on each side of his carriage which proceeded slowly through the different streets amid the cheers of a large crowd, till it arrived at the door of the Parliament house. . . . The Volunteers presented arms; the bands played the Volunteer march, then with a defiant blast of trumpets the procession proceeded on its way."

The one revelled in simplicity, the other revelled in show. That is only one difference out of many. But with all their differences one can't help seeing something that was common to both. By different routes, by different processes of thought, they sometimes arrived at a common end. If they had been contemporary, one can imagine the Bishop of Kilmore and the Bishop of Derry

taking the same views, giving the same votes, on some questions. They were poles asunder in nature and constitution, and yet they might have agreed together while disagreeing with others from whom they differed less. I imagine that both went to Ireland to do their best for Ireland and not for England, though really what was best for Ireland would be best for England. Both accepted a post in Ireland, both were sent to Ireland by England, and when they got there did their best for the country to which they were sent without considering only the interests of the country that sent them. I don't think that either of them would have sympathized with the idea that any one country is only meant to be an appendage of another, or only meant to exist for the sake and for the glory of another, or that the wishes and interests of one are to be subordinated to those of another. Such an idea is only a modified form of the idea that the black man is meant to be the slave of the white.

And another point common to these two Irish bishops is that both to an extraordinary degree won the regard of all sorts of men. The rebels coming to fire a volley at the funeral of Bishop Bedell with the very guns that they had got to shoot down his fellow countrymen has its parallel in Roman Catholics uniting with Churchmen and Protestant dissenters to set up a monument in Ickworth park to the Bishop of Derry. When one thinks of the last fifteen years of the Bishop's life, one may well wonder how ever that monument got to be set up. However, there it is. And it is a testimony to the fact that while he was at his best, though there was something shabby and shady even then, yet there was also something broad and liberal and far-seeing. For whilst the narrowest and blindest of men may get the applause of one sort, they cannot unite the applause of opposite extremes. Only men of some breadth can do that. But of course any comparison between the two is only possible when Frederick Hervey was at his best. And his best, such as it was, did not last long. He deteriorated, and then no comparison is possible. I must hurriedly set down the remaining dates of his life.

He went, as I have said, to Derry in the early part of 1768. For the next few years he was in Ireland, and threw himself into his work with great zeal. He showed much public spirit in reclaiming bogs and making roads; he tried to make the clergy reside in their parishes, and he showed care for superannuated curates. He also began to build two enormous palaces in his diocese, at Downhill and Ballyscullion.

His and his wife's letters recently published in "The Two Duchesses," edited by Mr. Vere Foster, show that from June 1777 to the end of 1779 he was abroad.

In December, 1779, by the death of his brother Augustus, Lord Bristol, he became Earl of Bristol and owner of Ickworth.

Soon after this there arose the Volunteer movement in Ireland. The American war had caused the English troops to be withdrawn from Ireland. Protestants in the north asked for more to be sent to safeguard the country against the French. More could not be sent. Thereupon Volunteers sprung up. In a little while the movement spread through the country, and there were 100,000 of them, Roman Catholics and Protestants, united to maintain the freedom of their country and to reform its Parliament. The Bishop of Derry of course became a Volunteer. He was desirous to be elected President of the Volunteer convention, but just failed. If he had been elected, war with England would probably have been the result, as he was utterly reckless and very ambitious. A satirical engraving of him published in 1784 represents him as The Irish Patriot, with a fire brand in his hand and the devil sitting on his shoulder. During 1781 and 1782 he seems to have been chiefly at Ickworth. It was in 1782 that the scheme of the Suffolk ship was being pushed forward, which he warmly supported. (See App: IX.) Arthur Young tells us in his autobiography that he had a general invitation to dine with him every Thursday the whole time he was there, which he did. Professor Symonds, son of the late rector of Horringer (see Symonds), Sir John Cullum, and the Rev. G. Ashby, rector of Barrow, were often there too. No two men could be more different than the Bishop and Arthur Young, but their common interest in agriculture, and the Bishop's power of being agreeable when he chose, enabled them to be very friendly together. Young says, "In my life I never passed more agreeable days than these weekly dinners at Ickworth. The conversation was equally instructive and agreeable."

When the Bishop returned to Ireland, I think quite at the end of 1782, Lady Bristol did not return with him, and I think they can seldom have met again. She lived henceforth chiefly at Ickworth. It was just 30 years since they had been married in Rushbrooke church, and the wonder is not that they separated now, but rather that they had gone on together for so long. For the Bishop's virtues, such as they were, were of a public and not of a private kind. They consisted of enlightened views on public questions rather than of those virtues which conduce to the happiness of a home. And whilst he could be profusely liberal in

public gifts, he could be incredibly mean at home. And probably whilst he could be charming in society, he could be odious at home. So there is no need to find any one single quarrel, any one single act or word, to account for their henceforth walking apart, and parting from one another 17 years before death parted them. But tradition enables one to see what was the talk of the household at Ickworth and the village of Horringer at the time.

Some years ago there was living at Horringer a worthy couple, Mr. and Mrs. James Byford. They had been married in Ickworth church in 1826, and occupied a small farm of Lord Bristol's in Sharpe's lane alias New road, which took its name from the former tenant who was Mrs. Byford's uncle. Mrs. Byford had been a servant girl at Ickworth as her mother had been before her; and I recollect hearing her say forty years ago or so that her mother used to say that whilst she was living in service there the Bishop and his wife went out for a drive together, and in the course of the drive something was said, something passed between them, and they came home and never spoke to each other again. And the coachman alone knew what was said, and her mother was always trying to get him to tell, but he never would.

Looking at these Registers to see how far they supported the possibility of that story, I find that Susanna Lanham (Mrs. Byford's maiden name) was baptized in 1801, and that Elizabeth Sharpe (her mother's maiden name) was baptized in 1762; so that in 1782 or 1783, the year of the Bishop's sojourn at Ickworth and separation from his wife, she probably would have been in service there.

The Bishop then early in 1783 returned to Ireland alone, and for a time found something to interest him in the Volunteer movement and in politics of a stormy kind. I imagine that by this time mere episcopal or diocesan work had completely lost any attraction for him. In 1785 he was at Bath, being a sufferer from gout. In 1786 he was abroad for a year or two. In 1790 he was back in Ireland, and received addresses from the Corporation, Citizens, and Volunteers at the opening of the bridge at Derry. In 1792 he paid a visit to Ickworth to see after the new house which he was just beginning to build there, and which an Irish clergyman, Rev. Joseph Sandys, was appointed to look after. In 1793 he went abroad and never came back alive. In November 1797 he proposed to Alexander Humboldt an elaborate expedition to Egypt. Humboldt considered him half mad, though he recognized his great abilities, and gladly accepted the proposal. War prevented its being carried out. In 1798 he was arrested by the French

republicans in Italy. Two large portmanteaus of suspicious papers being found in his rooms he was thrown into prison at Milan. His enormous collection of works of art at Rome which were intended for his new house at Ickworth were seized. 343 artists of all nations signed a petition to the French, asking that in consideration of the Bishop's services to art and artists these might be restored to him. But in spite of it Ickworth never got them. He died at Albano on July 8, 1803; his body was brought to England, and the Ickworth registers record his burial on April 21, 1804.

There is a whole length portrait of him, seated, at Ickworth, by A. Kaufman, which has been engraved for Gage's History of Thingoe Hundred. There is an odious one at No. 6, St. James' Square, with Vesuvius in the distance, by Madam Le Brun. There are several of him at Downhill, belonging to Sir Hervey Bruce, one of them representing him as presenting his eldest son, John Augustus, to Lord Chatham, of whom the Bishop was a great admirer. Lady Arthur Hervey has a miniature of him, holding a plan of Ickworth, with Vesuvius in the distance. I do not imagine that he was in the least good-looking; tradition and the satirical engraving of him that I have already mentioned give him a good calf to his leg. He appears to have been not tall or stout, but active and strongly made. As portraits are intended to hand down a man's likeness to those who have never seen him, I think it is a very great fault in them that they do not give one any idea of a man's height. And if it would be too inartistic to have a small scale in the corner, as in a map, would it not be possible that every man's name should be on his portrait, with his age, height, and weight at the time when the portrait was taken?

The authorities for the Bishop's life are of course various contemporary magazines, newspapers, memoirs, and histories. Mr. Peter Gedge, the editor of the Bury Post, naturally kept his eyes open to the Bishop's proceedings in Ireland, and reported them for the benefit of the Bury public. The Dictionary of Nat: Biog: has an article on him, and one will be found in the Edinburgh Review for July, 1898, and in Temple Bar, September, 1898. To all of these I am indebted in varying degrees. The article in the Edinburgh is the fullest.

Lady Bristol had pre-deceased her husband by under three years. She was buried at Ickworth on Dec. 27, 1800. From her letters that have been lately published in Mr. Vere Foster's The Two Duchesses she would appear to have been a quiet and sensible woman. There was undoubtedly something very

cranky, or at least unfortunate, in the Davers's of her generation, but one cannot perceive anything cranky in her. After the separation from her husband she appears to have lived chiefly at Ickworth with her youngest daughter Louisa, afterwards Lady Liverpool, and they both busied themselves in good works in Horringer and Ickworth. The debtors in the Bury gaol were indebted to her for an annual guinea, and a school was provided for Horringer. She appears to have died suddenly. A letter from her daughter, Lady Erne, announcing her death to young Frederick Foster is given in The Two Duchesses. Lady Erne says, "It happened early yesterday morning from a spasm in her stomach. What my grief and suffering is no words can say, as no mother could be a greater loss to a daughter than she is to me." The letter is dated Oct.* 20, 1800. The suddenness of it agrees with what I have said under Howe. There is a portrait of her at Rushbrooke, but none at Ickworth. Apparently this was painted at Rome in 1778, and given to her brother, Sir Charles Davers.

JOHN AUGUSTUS, LORD HERVEY, the second but eldest surviving son of the Bishop of Derry, was baptized at Horringer in January, 1757. He went into the Navy, and in Dec. 1778 his mother writes to her married daughter. Mrs. Foster, saying that Jack was on a cruise, was delighted with his station, and was determined that Captain Hervey should be as a great a man as his uncle, the Admiral. I cannot here follow him in his naval career. He was married in October, 1779, at Quebec to Elizabeth Drummond, whose kinsfolk lived at Megginch in Perthshire. In June, 1783, he had to suppress a mutiny on board his ship, the Raisonable. The Bury Post for Oct. 9, 1783, prints a very blunt outspoken letter from him to the Admiral Lord Howe, dated Raisonable, St. Lucia, April 10, 1783, in which he criticizes Lord Howe's conduct. It is followed by another one to Lord Howe written when he reached London in the following August, and in which he more or less apologizes. A long letter from Lord Hervey to a London paper qualifying or denying his apology is given in the Bury Post for Oct. 16, 1783. In 1787 he was appointed envoy extraordinary to the Grand Duke of Tuscany. In 1791 he was promoted from envoy extraordinary at Florence to be minister plenipotentiary there. In August, 1794, a pension of £1,500 a year was granted to him for his services at Florence. He had a house at Valintine in Hertfordshire. He died on board the Zealous which he commanded,

June 10, 1796, and was buried at Ickworth, Sept. 26th. Among the "Letters to Lady Hamilton," 1814, will be found one to her from the Bishop of Derry announcing his son's death. "My dearest Emma, The very unexpected intelligence, which Prince Augustus has most delicately communicated to me, of poor Lord Hervey's decease, has quite bouleversée my already shattered frame. I would not allow your friendly mind to learn an event so interesting to me from any other hand than that of your affectionate and devoted friend, Bristol."

Lady Hervey survived him till 1818. They had an only daughter, Elizabeth Catherine Caroline, baptized at Ickworth in Sept. 1780. She married in 1798 Charles Rose Ellis, first Baron Seaford, and died in Jan. 1803. When the Bishop of Derry died in July 1803, the Earldom of Bristol and the estates thereto belonging passed to his younger son Frederick William, while the barony of Howard de Walden passed to Charles Augustus Ellis, the grandson of his elder son, John Augustus.

There is a whole length portrait of John Augustus, Lord Hervey, at Ickworth by Gainsborough, from which he appears to have been a very handsome man.

There are two portraits of his wife, both by Angelica Kaufman, one at Ickworth, and the other at Megginch.

ELIZABETH CHRISTIANA HERVEY was baptized at Horringer in May, 1758. When only 18 years old she was married to John Thomas Foster of Co. Louth. The marriage was not a happy one, and after a time they parted, he refusing even to support her. There were two sons by this marriage, Frederick and Augustus. Frederick was a wit. My mother tells me that he made the servants laugh so by his jokes at dinner that they could scarcely wait at table. John Thomas died in 1796.

Lady Elizabeth Foster married secondly in Oct. 1809 William, fifth Duke of Devonshire. He died in August, 1811. She is the second of the Two Duchesses from whom the volume so called, published in 1898, takes its title. In it will be found many letters to and from her. She must have been beautiful, clever, and perfectly charming in her manner. She inherited all her father's love of travelling and also of antiquities and works of art. She had lived abroad a good deal before her second marriage; and after the death of the Duke of Devonshire she went abroad again. From 1814 till her death in 1824 she lived almost entirely abroad, chiefly at Rome. She carried on excavations there in the Forum, and she had a

machine made for dredging the Tiber, in the hope of recovering the statues which had been thrown into it from time to time. She was an artist herself, and a liberal patron of artists. Portraits of her are numerous, at Ickworth, Chatsworth, and elsewhere. Medals in her honour were struck at her death. The Elizabeth grove in Ickworth park, sown in 1786, near the park pale on the right hand side as you come in through the Horringer gate, and therefore not very far from where the house probably stood in which she was born, is called after her. She died on March 30, 1824.

The account of her in the Dictionary of National Biography has three mistakes. (1) It gives 1759 as the year of her birth instead of 1758. (2) It represents her as a widow in 1787 and receiving a proposal of marriage from Gibbon, whereas John Thomas Foster did not die till 1796. (3) It gives 1814 as the date of the death of the Duke of Devonshire instead of 1811. A volume called Anecdotes and Biographical Sketches, by Elizabeth Duchess of Devonshire, was privately printed in London in 1863. A short memoir of her in French, by Monsieur Artaud, which is prefixed to the Anecdotes, wrongly gives the date of her second marriage as 1812.

REV. LORD ARTHUR CHARLES HERVEY,—A short note must be given to Lord Arthur Hervey as being one of Horringer's rectors. He was a grandson of the Bishop of Derry, who dying in 1803 was succeeded in the earldom of Bristol by his eldest surviving son, Frederick William, Lord Hervey. This Earl of Bristol was created Marquis of Bristol in 1826, and Lord Arthur was the fourth of his six sons. He was born in his father's London house, No. 6, St. James' Square, on Aug. 20, 1808. His mother was Elizabeth Albana, daughter of Clotworthy Upton, first Baron Templetown. He remembered a breakfast given by his uncle, Lord Liverpool, in 1814 to the allied sovereigns at Combe Wood near Kingston, when the Emperor of Russia put out his hand and said to him in good English, Give me a good spank. He remembered the opening of Waterloo bridge in 1817, when the Duke of Wellington was present with a bag of silver medals, of which he gave one to each of those who were privileged to be present. The small boy secured two, which I now possess. Soon after that his father and all the family travelled abroad for five years, whilst the building of the great house at Ickworth went on. The agricultural depression which was affecting landed proprietors then as it is now was also a cause of their going abroad.

Coming back to England in 1822 he went to Eton, Yonge being his tutor, and stayed there till 1826. In 1828 he went up to Trinity College, Cambridge, and in 1830 he took his degree. Though as a nobleman's son he had and used the privilege of being only two years at the University, yet he obtained a first class in the Classical Tripos. In Oct. 1832 he was ordained deacon at Norwich, and priest (by letters dimissory) at Peterborough immediately afterwards, and in Nov. 1832 was instituted to the rectory of Ickworth-cum-Chedburgh, which Mr. Hasted had resigned. He took up his residence at Ickworth Lodge. Ickworth Lodge was a farm-house till 1702, when John, Lord Bristol, turned it into a temporary mansion house for himself, as the old mansion house near the church had more or less tumbled down. It remained a temporary mansion house rather longer than he expected, viz., till about 1830, by which time the round house, begun in 1792, being sufficiently advanced to be habitable, Lord Bristol moved into it. The Lodge becoming vacant near about the time when Lord Arthur became rector of Ickworth, it became his residence. Not long afterwards Ickworth and Chedburgh were separated at his request. They had been united in 1712 in the time of the first Lord Bristol, because he wanted to get rid of the old rectory that stood in the park near Parson's pond. Lord Arthur, now holding Ickworth only, became in 1844 curate of Horringer to Mr. Hasted. He was also chaplain to the Thingoe Union Workhouse at Bury. On the death of Mr. Hasted in 1852 he became rector of Horringer, which was then united to Ickworth. In 1862 he was appointed archdeacon of Sudbury. In the latter half of 1869 Mr. Gladstone offered him the bishoprick of Bath and Wells, which he accepted, being consecrated on St. Thomas' day, 1869. This took him away for good from the county to which (to use his own words in an archæological address) his "affections were linked by a family residence of more than four hundred years." He had been 37 years rector of Ickworth and 17 years rector of Horringer. But his work was not yet over. He held the office of Bishop for just under 25 years, and died on June 9, 1894, aged 85 years and 9 months. He was buried in the graveyard of Wells Cathedral, his son Arthur, a Captain in the Rifle Brigade, having been already laid there in 1889. The diocese has shown its appreciation of his work and character by a noble monument placed in the south aisle of the choir of the cathedral.

Lord Arthur was a man of great industry and energy, doing whatever he did do with his whole heart and with great delight. His place in the first class of the

Classical Tripos after only two years at the University shows that he made a good use of his time and was a good scholar. His taking a part in the chief biblical works of his day, e.g., The Revision of the Old Testament, Dr. Smith's Dictionary of the Bible, the Speaker's Commentary, the Pulpit Commentary, and others, show that he retained his industry and scholarship right to the very end, to the very last week, of a long life.

But he was not only a classical and biblical student. He had a great delight in all archæological studies, and there was hardly any branch of learning that did not interest him. The same genealogical tastes which led him with the help of his eldest brother to write an elaborate history of the Hervey family, led him also to write a volume on the apparently contradictory genealogies of Jesus Christ in the Gospels of St. Matthew and St. Luke; and it also led him to pay more attention than had been paid before by biblical scholars to the numerous genealogies given in the Old Testament, and to use them for settling points of chronology.

But he was not a mere student of any sort. As a young man he had been good at high jumping, and was also one of the very best amateur tennis players of his time. He won a challenge silver racket three years following, and so kept it, and one of his sons has it now. Long before lawn tennis was ever invented he played it on his lawn at Ickworth; and long after he was three score and ten years of age he would come out and play a set on his lawn at Wells with amazing activity. He was a good rider, and a dashing driver, and enjoyed a good long spell in the open air and on the hills as much as he enjoyed his literary studies.

He was very keen, not only in acquiring knowledge for himself, but in promoting institutions which might help to spread it amongst all classes and conditions of men. He had no fear of knowledge, neither for himself nor for any one else. In 1855 he published a pamphlet, "A suggestion for supplying the Literary, Scientific, and Mechanics' Institutes of Great Britain and Ireland with lecturers from the Universities." This suggestion has since ripened into the system of University extension, whereby through their lecturers the Universities have as it were gone forth into the country instead of merely waiting for students to come to them. The Athenæum at Bury St. Edmunds being largely educational in its object, it is no wonder that Lord Arthur threw himself into it heart and soul from its very first beginning. Harrod's Directory of Suffolk, 1864, says that the Athenæum was established in 1853 for fostering literature, art, and science. It purchased the old Assembly-room from the shareholders for £2,500, and amongst its institutions

were reading rooms, courses of lectures, concerts, a museum of antiquities and natural history, a reference library, classes for elementary instruction, and an observatory for astronomical purposes. And it adds, "The high position which the Athenæum has attained among kindred institutions of the country is attributable in a great degree to the untiring interest which its noble president, the Rt. Hon. and Ven. Lord Arthur Hervey, has displayed in its behalf." Lord Arthur frequently lectured there himself, besides getting many of the most eminent men in the country to do so.

With regard to his character, I would say that he was just and considerate to others, straight and incapable of scheming or of duplicity, always self-controlled, thoroughly reasonable and practical, possessing tact and good judgment, liberal, hospitable, and kind-hearted. I am not merely stringing together all the good qualities that I can think of, but am only setting down such as I think he possessed in a high degree. In his church views and in his political views he was moderate. You might with equal truth have called him a moderate high churchman or a moderate low churchman. Perhaps, to be more exact, the former term would describe him as a Bishop, the latter as a Suffolk clergyman. But he was always free from anything like mere partizanship, and could always appreciate good wherever it was. In politics he had conservative views with liberal tendencies, but in most cases the views would have decided his vote rather than the tendencies. His manners with their mixture of natural dignity and ease were perfect. He was five feet, ten inches, in height, and always looked his full heighth. He was active and well made, and he seldom had a day's illness.

In July, 1839, he was married to Patience, daughter of John Singleton of Hazely heath, Hants, and Mell, Co. Louth. Twelve children were born, and the golden wedding was celebrated at Wells in 1889.

Lord Arthur was crippled by rheumatism during the last few years of his life, but his mind retained its youthful vigour up to the very last. He was engaged in literary work up to within a day or two of his death, the illness which terminated in a painless and peaceful death being very short. He died when on a visit to his son-in-law, Mr. Charles Hoare, at Hackwood near Basingstoke, on June 4, 1894, being about 10 weeks short of 86 years.

The chief painted portraits of him are a miniature by Ross belonging to Lady Arthur; two portraits painted by Graves when he left Suffolk in 1869, one of them now at the Athenæum at Bury St. Edmunds, the other presented to Lady Arthur by the clergy and laity of the archdeaconry of Sudbury; a portrait painted

by Sir W. B. Richmond in 1889 at the request of the city of Wells and its neighbourhood, and now hanging in the town hall at Wells.

A memoir of him by his eldest son, Rev. John Hervey, was printed for private circulation in 1896, and a forthcoming volume of the Dictionary of Nat: Biog: will contain a sketch of his life.

JAMES HOWE.—In 1742 was baptized Rebecka daughter of Thomas and Rose Gardiner. In 1764 she was married to James Howe, and in Dec. 1765 was baptized James their child. This young James was afterwards footman to Lady Bristol, wife of the Bishop of Derry, and was living in service at Ickworth Lodge when a violent ringing of the bell one night summoned him to find his mistress dying. This was in the middle of December, 1800. A letter from Lady Erne to Frederick Foster, printed in "The Two Duchesses," confirms this account of the suddenness of Lady Bristol's death, but by a transcriber's or printer's error the letter is dated October.

James Howe afterwards went to live in a cottage near Ickworth park pale and near the Bishop of Derry's monument, and there he died in 1848 aged 84 years, and was buried at Ickworth.

JERMYN.—Two members of the Jermyn family of Rushbrooke will be found among the Marriages, viz., Margaret who married Thomas Dytun in 1569, and Hester who married Henry Blagge in 1571. They were both daughters of Sir Ambrose Jermyn, sisters of Sir Robert, and aunts of Sir Thomas who sent William Bedell to Horringer and befriended him all his life. See Blagge and Duke.

Two others will be found bearing the surname Jermyn of a later date and in poorer circumstances, viz., in Marriages 1747, Baptisms 1814. They may be of the same stock, but not necessarily. The history of the Jermyn family belongs to the volume which will contain the Rushbrooke Registers.

REV. THOMAS KERRICH.—He was curate of Horringer in 1783, and rector of it from May, 1784, to his death in Jan. 1814. He was also rector of Wendens Ambo in Essex from August, 1783, till his death. Both livings were in the gift of Lord Bristol. Mr. Kerrich seems to have been educated at Trinity

Hall, Cambridge. The only degree given him in the Graduati Cantabrigienses is that of LL.B. in 1780, when he must have been about 40 years of age. In the Biographical history of Caius College Mr. Venn has confounded him with a Thomas Kerrich, rector of Banham in Norfolk. I believe them to be two different men, though contemporary. The register and the tombstone, No. 137, do not agree as to Mr. Kerrich's age at the time of his death. In the register he is entered as 73 years of age and 28 years rector, on the tombstone 76 years of age and 32 years rector. He was really rector for 29 years and 8 months.

There was a John Kerrich, a medical man of Bury St. Edmunds, who died in 1762 aged 70 years, and was buried at St. Mary's. He was of the right age to have been the father of the rector of Horringer, but I have not made out for certain whether he was so or not. For other members of the rector's family see Register of Burials and tombstone, No. 137. Mr. Kerrich was about the first to be buried on the north side of the church. There is everywhere a feeling against being buried on the north side of a church unless circumstances allow no alternative.

LUCAS.—In his History of Thingoe Hundred Mr. Gage tells us that in the reign of Henry VII, about 1505, Thomas Lucas, Solicitor General, purchased Little Saxham and built the hall. He was the son of John Lucas and grandson of Edmund Lucas, both of Westow, and further back still several of his forefathers had been Aldermen of Bury St. Edmunds.

The Solicitor General had three sons, Jasper, Henry, and John, and died in 1531. With Henry of Bury St. Edmunds, who lies buried in St. Mary's Church there, and with John of Colchester, the ancestor of Sir Charles and the three barons in the 17th century, we have nothing to do. But Jasper, the eldest, dying before his father, left a son Thomas who was grandson and heir to the Solicitor General.

THOMAS LUCAS, grandson of the Solicitor General, married Mary daughter of Sir Thomas Jermyn of Rushbrooke, sold Little Saxham to Sir John Crofts of Westow, bought Horscroft and other lands in Great and Little Horringer, and so finds his way into these Registers. He was buried here in 1595.

CLEMENT LUCAS, son of Thomas, succeeded him at Horscroft, and was buried here in 1603. He married first Mary Kempe, secondly Mary Barker of Bury St. Edmunds.

WILLIAM LUCAS, son of Clement, succeeded him at Horscroft. He married Christian, daughter of Thomas Gibson, Alderman of Norwich, and had eight children baptized here between 1609 and 1626. This is he who got possession of some Church lands, and after a lawsuit with William Bedell the rector, which ran through ten long years, was compelled to make compensation for them. (See Bedell.) His eight children were Lucy, Christian, Thomas, Gibson, William, Lydia, Jasper, Mary. I cannot follow all their careers in these short notes, but must confine myself to the successor. (For Lucy's tombstone see p. 217. Thomas, the eldest son, died in 1637 aged 24.) William was buried here in 1639/40, but Christian, his widow, survived him and married secondly Thomas Sache of Great Horringer. For her tombstone, not now visible, see p. 217. For William's see App. II, No. 3.

GIBSON LUCAS, second but eldest surviving son of William, succeeded him at Horscroft. He was baptized here in 1615 and called after his mother's maiden name. He was educated at Bury Grammar School and Caius Coll:, Cambridge. I presume that, like his father who took the Church lands, he was not a very good churchman, and that in the civil war he was a Parliamentarian, though his Essex cousins were strong Royalists. For in a tract printed in 1647, "The County of Suffolke divided into fourteene precincts for classicall Presbyteries," giving the names of the committees for each division with the names of the ministers and others, I find his name on the committee for the eleventh division, which included the Hundreds of Thingoe, Lackford, and Thedwastry, with the Corporation of Bury. But, if a Parliamentarian, I presume he became a penitent one, as in 1661 he had the degree of S.T.P. (Sacræ Theologiæ Professor) conferred upon him at Cambridge "per literas regias."

By his first wife, Elizabeth, daughter of Richard Gipps of Welnetham and aunt of Sir Richard the genealogist, he had twelve children baptized here between 1643 and 1665, viz., William, Gibson, Christian, Richard, Thomas, Christian, John, Clement, Sache, Charles, Clement, Mary. She died in 1668, and in the same year he was married at Little Saxham to Mrs. Capell, widow, of Bury St. Edmunds. From the rate for 1693, which I have printed in App: IV, it would seem that he

gave up Horscroft to his son William during his life time, and lived himself at the College, which I presume is the present College farm in Horringer. He died in 1698 aged 83. For his tombstone see App: II, No. 3.*

It appears from Dr. Gibson Lucas' will that there was a portrait of him in his scarlet robes, which he left to his daughter-in-law, the wife of William Lucas, for her life, and then to be handed down.

WILLIAM LUCAS, eldest son of Gibson, succeeded him at Horscroft, which he appears to have occupied during the last few years of his father's long life. He was baptized here in 1643. In the rate for 1699 (App: IV) he is always called Captain Lucas, but I do not find his name in Doyle's Army Lists from 1661 to 1694. His first wife, Margaret, daughter of James Cobbs of Bury St. Edmunds, died immediately after the birth of her first child Gibson, in March 1674/5. By his second wife, Ann, he had four children baptized here, besides three others buried here in infancy. With him the Lucas family came to an end so far as Horringer is concerned. Mr. Gage says that he sold Horscroft in 1706 to William Turnor of Bury St. Edmunds, from whom it has come by inheritance to the Wigsons. (See Wigson.) William died in 1716, his wife Ann having died in 1715. Those are the two last entries of Lucas in the Horringer Registers. Probably the deaths of all his nine children in his lifetime, most of them in earliest infancy, was the cause of his selling Horscroft.

From the Visitation of Suffolk, 1561, edited by Dr. Howard, I learn that John, younger brother of the Captain, was a merchant of Norwich, where he died in 1696 aged 44 years, and was buried in St. Peter's Mancroft Church. He left children whose descendants are living to-day. From this John were descended several successive Gibson Lucas's, so that both names of the divinity doctor and penitent presbyterian have been carried well into this 19th century.

^{*} Since writing this account of Gibson Lucas I have come across Mr. Venn's Biographical. History of Caius College, Cambridge, in which my suspicions of his penitence are confirmed. Mr. Venn says that he was at first a Presbyterian minister in Norwich, and afterwards conformed. And he quotes a letter from H. Paman of St. John's to William Sancroft, dated Nov. 19, 1655, saying, "Mr. Lucas is become a zealous man for the Church of England, and upon profession of his hearty repentance for what he has done against it and his resolution to preach up what he before persecuted, was ordained priest by my Lord Bishop of Norwich. The Presbyterians of Norwich in the meantime being full of rage to have lost a brother, I wish heartily we may have any cause to brag of the proselyte."

The house in which the Lucas family lived has been pulled down. The present house at Horscroft is modern; the old house, Mr. Gage says, stood north-east of it.

MANTUA.—In the Register of Baptisms this name is written Manteau, in that of Burials Mantua. John and Mary Mantua had three children baptized here, viz., John in 1655, Sherman in 1658, Mary in 1662. John the father was buried in 1671, Mary his widow and the boy Sherman in 1677. That is the whole history of the family as far as the Registers tell it. The name is apparently foreign, and I have already suggested that John Mantua may have been one of the retinue of the Earl of St. Albans, or of Queen Henrietta Maria whom he is supposed to have married, and have been settled in one of the houses in Horringer belonging to the Jermyns of Rushbrook. The date agrees very well. I have also made the rather wild guess that when the foreign John Mantua was asked by the minister, Name this child, he said Sherman, meaning to call the child Jermyn after the name of his patron, which the minister did not understand. The owner of Rushbrook at the time when John Mantua came to Horringer was Thomas Jermyn, elder brother of the Earl of St. Albans.

MOYLE.—In the Register of Baptisms will be found that of Thomas Coppinger Moyle in 1747, Isabella Moyle in 1749, children of Thomas and Sarah Moyle.

Sir Robert Davers, 2nd baronet, married Mary Jermyn, one of the five daughters and co-heiresses of Thomas, Lord Jermyn. This marriage brought Rushbrook to the Davers family. Of the ten children of this marriage Robert and Jermyn became successively 3rd and 4th baronets, and Thomas was the admiral who had Little Horringer hall. (See Davers.) Another of the ten children was Isabella, who married General Moyle. General Moyle amongst other children had a son Thomas, who in 1745 married Sarah Coppinger, and it is they who for a time lived in Horringer and had two children baptized here. Thomas was admitted at the Bury Grammar School at midsummer, 1730, and died in 1766. Sarah his wife died in 1764.

Of the two Moyle children baptized here there is not much to be said. Thomas Coppinger became a Lieut.-Colonel, died unmarried in 1788 aged 41 years, and is

buried at Lichfield. Isabella also died unmarried. There was another sister, Mary, not baptized here, who married Benjamin Hands, and was buried here in 1820 aged 65 years. See tombstone No. 97.

Where the Moyle's house in Horringer was I have not been able to make out. I imagine that it was on the Ickworth side of Horringer, somewhere between the present Horringer gate and Hammond's gate, on ground that is now either wood or just inside the park. George, Lord Bristol, who succeeded his grandfather in 1751, has entered in a book purchases made by him since his grandfather's death. Amongst them is this, "To Mr. George Boldero for house and lands belonging to Mr. Moyle in the parish of Horringer, £840." We may notice what a nest of cousins there was at Horringer while Dr. Symonds was at the rectory, Admiral Davers at Little Horringer, Mr. Moyle in his house, with Sir Jermyn Davers as patron and lord of the manor.

In vol. 3 of the Proceedings of the Suffolk Archæological Institute is a paper by Mr. Samuel Tymms on the old house in the Meat Market, Cupola house, formerly belonging to the Macro family. Mr. Tymms says, p. 379, that in 1745 it was bought by Thomas Moyle and settled according to the uses of his marriage settlement, and that it was sold by his son Thomas Coppinger Moyle to Robert Hockley, grocer.

VALENTINE MUNBEE.—Mr. Gage says that soon after 1730 John Kettle sold his copyhold estate at Horringer to Valentine Mumby (sic) of Ixworth, who built a house on it, which his son Valentine sold in 1768 to John Everatt. Everatt is an error of Mr. Gage's for Everall. This was the old Covel estate, and the house is now called Horringer house. The only Munbee or Munby who enters into the registers is the first of the above two Valentines, who was buried here in 1750. His tombstone is App: II, No. 10. The younger Valentine was educated at Bury Grammar School and Caius College, Cambridge, and admitted at the Middle Temple in 1758. About 25 years ago I recollect seeing the announcement of the death of Valentine Munbee in the newspapers. He died at Weston-super-Mare, and was, I think, a General, and over 80 years of age, so that he might have been a grandson of the Valentine who sold Horringer house.

WILLIAM OLIVER.—In 1712 William Oliver was appointed to be Ickworth land-steward. He had been in Lord Bristol's employ for several years previous to that. His predecessor as steward, William Covell, had died in 1707. (See Covell.) In 1720 William Oliver was married in Ickworth church to Ann Webster of Newmarket. After his marriage he lived in Horringer. Six of his children were baptized in Horringer church, viz., John in 1721, William and Ann, twins, in 1722, Thomas in 1724, Isabella in 1725, George in 1727, buried in 1730. Where William came from originally I do not know, nor where he was buried. Not at Horringer. He was still Ickworth land-steward in 1748, and I know not how much longer. Probably he came from Bury, and went back there to die when his life's work was ended.*

REV. JOHN OLIVER.—John, the eldest son of the above William Oliver, was godson of John, Lord Bristol, who at any rate looked after his material interests. In the summer of 1730 he went to the Bury Grammar School. In Aug. 1731 Lord Bristol writes from Ickworth to his son Lord Hervey who was at Court, and says, "Will Oliver's son will be of age fit for ye Charter-house on ye 9th of Nov. next, and if you could get but one turn for him from ye King, Queen, Prince, or any other of your great friends, I would never trouble you or them any more." Letter 931. I have not found out whether he went to Charter-house School or remained at Bury. In 1738 he went up to Trinity College, Cambridge, Lord Bristol giving him f 15 to pay for his caution money and for the furniture of his chambers. In 1742 he took his B.A. degree. I suppose he was then ordained and had a curacy somewhere not far off. One day in April, 1749, he came running over to Ickworth from Bury to tell Lord Bristol that "Mr. Davis, rector of Tuddenham dyed this morning." Lord Bristol presented him to Tuddenham, and also tried hard to get the Lord Chancellor, Lord Hardwick, to appoint him to Cavenham, that he might hold the two together. Letters 1332, 1334, 1339. But the Lord Chancellor would not consent. John Oliver remained rector of Tuddenham from 1749 to 1786. He also held the living of St. James, Icklingham, from 1767 to 1786. I presume he died in 1786. His subscription of one guinea to the Suffolk Ship (App: IX) in 1782 is printed under Icklingham, but he was not buried there.

^{*} I am indebted to Alderman J. G. Oliver, whose fathers have lived in Bury for many generations, for help in trying to connect William Oliver with them; but we could not get quite evidence enough to prove it. It therefore remains only an unproved probability.

THOMAS OLIVER.—Thomas, the second son of William Oliver, went to Bury Grammar School in Oct. 1734. Apparently his father was then living in Bury, as he is described in the Admissionum Catalogue as being of St. James' Parish in this Burgh. I don't suppose he stayed there long, as he went into the Navy. In 1740 Lord Bristol mentions him as being in the same ship with his grandson Augustus (afterwards Admiral and 3rd Earl of Bristol); and in 1748 Lord Bristol writes to his son Felton Hervey, then M.P. for Bury, asking him to use all his influence to get Thomas Oliver a lieutenancy. "He hath been 12 years at sea, four years whereof he hath been a midshipman on board the Hampton Court, Commodore Mostyn, commander, and is now at Portsmouth. He hath passed his examination at the Admiralty and obtained a certificate in form of his being qualified for promotion. His father hath been above fourty years in my service." Letters 1140, 1275. There I must drop him, not being able to follow his career any further.

WILLIAM OLIVER, Jun.—This boy went to the Bury Grammar School in Oct. 1734, at the same time as his brother Thomas, but that is all I know about him.

PEYTON.—See Skelton.

PHIPPS.—On Aug. 6, 1748, will be found the baptism of George William, son of Constantine and Lepel Phipps. This child was privately baptized at Horringer where his parents were then staying, and received into the church a month later at Ickworth, and is entered in the registers of both parishes. Nevertheless his birth seems to have been unknown by the compilers of peerages, who do not mention him. I presume that he died quite young, so that there is nothing more to say about him.

His father, Constantine, was the son of William Phipps and grandson of Sir Constantine Phipps, who was appointed Lord Chancellor of Ireland in 1710. Nineteen years after the birth of this child he was created an Irish peer, Lord Mulgrave of New Ross, and died in 1775. His mother, Lepel, was the eldest daughter of John Lord Hervey. Horace Walpole describes her when she was Miss Hervey as "a fine black girl, but as masculine as her father should be." Corr: I, 113. She died very suddenly in 1780 at the Admiralty.

This child was their second child. The eldest, Constantine John, was a distinguished naval officer, and commanded an expedition to discover a north-east

passage to Asia. Had this child lived, he might have been numbered among the distinguished natives of Horringer, as on his father's side alone he had two brothers, three nephews, and a great nephew, besides a great grandfather and his cousin, who have all got a place in the Dictionary of National Biography.

The Phipps's came occasionally to stay at Horringer, though I cannot make out where the house was. Possibly it was the same house as that in which the future Bishop of Derry spent the first few years of his married life. I think Dr. Malfalguerat, an eminent accoucheur of Bury St. Edmunds, was partly the attraction. The nearness to Ickworth was of course another. They seem to have been here again the following year, for Lady Hervey writes from Ickworth to Mr. Morris on Aug. 23, 1749, and says, "Mr. and Mrs. Phipps are now so near me, that I see them almost every day, which is a great satisfaction to me. They are both most agreeable people, and she is the best, the most amiable child that ever any parent was possessed of." p. 160. On this occasion Mrs. Phipps's brother, a Cambridge undergraduate, was staying with them and apparently studying very hard. His name was Frederick Hervey, and he was afterwards Bishop of Derry. Apparently the house, wherever it was exactly, was only a small one, as Lord Bristol writing to his granddaughter, Mrs. Phipps, just after she had left, viz., on Sept. 19, 1748, says that Lady Hervey had suggested their coming there, but "I as constantly dissuaded it, foreseeing the many inconveniences you would necessarily undergo from the incapacity of my poor cottage to receive you as I ought." Letter 1302.

THOMAS REEVE alias NOILLE.—The alias is also written Newell and Noel. He was rector of Horringer from May, 1520 to 1528, when he resigned. He was presented to the living by the Abbot of Bury. As the Abbot who presented him was John Reeve alias Noel, very likely they were brothers. Abbot Reeve, the last of the Abbots of Bury, was a native of Melford; he was elected Abbot in 1514, and in Nov. 1539 he was compelled to surrender the monastery and retire on a pension. He died four months afterwards at Bury and was buried in St. Mary's Church.

REV. THOMAS ROGERS.—A memoir of him will be found in the Dict: of Nat: Biography, but there is not much to say about him except dates. He is supposed to have been a native of Cheshire, and was a student of Christ Church, Oxford, B.A. in 1573. He was presented to the rectory of Horringer in Dec. 1581 by Queen Elizabeth. I presume that she presented him on account of the

old Bury Abbey property having not yet got settled down in the hands of its new lay possessors. In Aug. 1588 he was married in Horringer Church to Bridget Wincol. The Jermyn MSS in the library of the Suffolk Archæological Institute give a pedigree of the Wincol family, from which it appears that she was one of seven children of John and Margery Wincoll of Netherhall in Little Waldingfield, in which parish her grandfather Roger Wincol and his father had been clothiers. Her brother Isaac, also of Netherhall in Little Waldingfield, married Mary, daughter of Sir Thomas Gawdy, Judge of the Queen's Bench.

Thomas and Bridget Rogers had one child, Robert, baptized here in Oct. 1589, of whom I know nothing more.

Thomas Rogers was the author of several theological works, which were much read in their day, but for which I expect there is little demand now, and one can only marvel how anybody ever got through them. The chief of them is an exposition of the 39 Articles. He was the opponent of Dr. Bound on the Sabbatarian question, which was one of the earliest points on which the Puritans diverged from the High Church party. Dr. Bound, who was rector of Norton near Bury St. Edmunds, took the Puritan view of the Sabbath, while Thomas Rogers laid on for the High Church view. He had at one time been chaplain to Bishop (afterwards Archbishop) Bancroft.

He was buried at Horringer in Feb. 1615/6, and his wife Bridget joined him ten days later. Antony Wood says that "he was buried in the chancel of the church there, under a rough, unpolished and broken gravestone without name or epitaph."

REV. GEORGE ROGERS.—He was appointed to the rectory of Horringer just 150 years after the death of the above Thomas Rogers; but I do not expect that there was any connection between them, *i.e.*, not more than there is between all the sons of Adam. From the Supplement to the Suffolk Traveller I learn that he was a native of Bury St. Edmunds and educated at the Bury Grammar School. From there he went to Trinity College, Cambridge, was elected a fellow of his College, and took his B.A. degree in 1764. In 1765 he became curate at Horringer. In 1766 he was presented by Sir Charles Davers to the rectory of Little Welnetham, which he resigned in 1767 on being presented by Sir Charles to Horringer. He held Horringer till May 1784, when the Earl-Bishop of Derry

presented him to Sproughton. He remained there over 50 years, and died in December, 1835, aged 94. If he had stayed on at Horringer till his death he would have held it for 68 years. In that case neither Mr. Kerrich nor Mr. Hasted would have come here, and he would have been succeeded by Lord Arthur Hervey, who was already rector of Ickworth. If Lord Arthur had likewise remained at Horringer till his death in 1894, he would have held it for 59 years, and the two together would have held it for over 127 years. During the course of 125 years there would have been only once a vacancy, only once a new rector.

In May, 1768, he was married in Horringer Church to Elizabeth Drew of Horringer, by whom he had nine children baptized here between 1769 and 1783, and possibly there were others born at Sproughton. George, Elizabeth, Peter, Edward, Thomas, Lucy, James, Robert, Martha Maria, were born here, of whom Edward, Thomas, and Robert died in infancy.

He published and edited some sermons. His portrait by W. M. Bennett has been engraved.

Elizabeth Drew was the daughter of Edward and Suzan Drew. She was one of four sisters who were all married in Horringer Church respectively to Rev. George Watson of St. Mary's, Bury St. Edmunds, James Scarlin of Sudbury, and Samuel Burroughs of Stowmarket.

RUSHBROOK.—This name is fairly common in the neighbourhood of Bury. The different families who own it need not be related to each other, though they all originally took their name from the same village. The first vowel is frequently changed, and the forms Rasbrook, Risbrook, and Rosbrook are more common than Rushbrook. There is only one entry in these registers that belongs to the family of Rushbrook that now owns Rushbrook, viz., the baptism in 1849 of William Henry son of William Henry Rushbrooke. The latter, Commander R.N., was a son of Col. Rushbrook, M.P., and died in 1883 aged 68 years.

THOMAS SACHE.—He was buried here in May 1661. I know nothing more about him except that he married Christian Lucas, widow of William Lucas of Horscroft, and thus was stepfather to Gibson Lucas, D.D., the parliamentarian who turned royalist, and presbyterian who turned episcopalian. (See Lucas.)

SANCROFT.—There seems to have been one generation of a family of this name resident here at the opening of the 18th century. The name is generally spelt Sandcroft and Sondcroft. As Archbishop Sancroft was of a Suffolk family that had lands at Fressingfield, it is very possible that the Horringer Sancrofts were kinsfolk of his. His life lasted from 1617 to 1693.

SCARLIN.—In July, 1774, James Scarlin of All Saints, Sudbury, was married here to Suzan Drew, whose sister Elizabeth was already married to the Rev. George Rogers, rector of Horringer. There was a Samuel Scarlin of Sudbury, M.D., of the right age to have been his father, but I have not made out whether he was. James was buried at Horringer in 1825, aged 87 years, and Susan his widow lived on till 1844. The register of burials gives her age as 99, her tombstone gives it as 98. The epigrammatic epitaph on it, "She thought the world was like herself sincere," records two virtues on her part, and seems to have a hit at the world as well. From there being no entry of baptism of any child of theirs, I imagine they only came to live in Horringer late in life, perhaps when a Drew estate came to their possession. Tombstone No. 153.

Their son James, No. 2, married Martha Fuller, and lived here and had two children baptized here, James Mathew and Martha Susanna, which last died in infancy. James died in 1854 aged 85, and Martha in 1859 aged 80. Tombstone No. 165.

Their son James Mathew left Horringer some years before his death. His children by both marriages mostly died young. He died in 1890 aged 80 years. Tombstone No. 195.

The Rev. Walter James Scarlin, of John's Coll: Cambridge, B.A. 1867, at present represents the family, being a son of James Mathew.

SIR JAMES SIMPSON.—His name does not appear in the printed registers, as his death occurred after 1850, which is my stopping point. But as his tombstone, No. 209, is among those whose inscriptions I have recorded, I must make a note about him. He came to spend the evening of his life here, renting Brook house. From the Memoir of him in the Dict: of Nat: Biography, and from the sermon preached in Horringer Church on the Sunday after his funeral by Lord Arthur Hervey, I take the following particulars.

He was born at Edinburgh on Feb. 12, 1792, and educated at Edinburgh University. He was the son of David Simpson of Teviotbank, Roxburghshire. His military career began as early as 1808 in the Madras Cavalry. After a year or two he gave that up and returned to England. In 1811 the Duke of York gave him a commission in the 1st (Grenadier) Guards. In 1812 he was sent to Spain, and took a part in the defence of Cadiz, the relief of Seville, and the retreat from Burgos. In 1813 he returned home with his regiment. In 1815 he was ordered out again, was severely wounded at Quatre Bas and invalided. In 1826 he was appointed Lieut.-Col. of the 29th Foot, took it to Mauritius and stayed there till 1837, when he returned to England. In 1838 he became Colonel in the Army. In 1842 he was re-appointed to the 29th and took it to Bengal. In 1845 he was appointed second in command to Sir Charles Napier in Scinde. In 1846 coming home in bad health he was appointed Commandant of Chatham, and afterwards Commander-in-Chief at Portsmouth. When the Crimean War broke out in 1854 he was appointed by Lord Raglan Chief of the Staff. On the death of Lord Raglan in 1855 he succeeded to the chief command. After the fall of Sebastopol he resigned the command and returned to England. He was a brave man and one who would neglect no duty, but he was better qualified to act as a second in command than as a chief. He took Brook house in Horringer in 1860, and there he resided till his death in April, 1868, aged 76 years. In 1839 he had married Elizabeth, daughter of Sir Robert Dundas of Beechwood, Midlothian. She died in 1840.

Having run through his military career there only remains to give one or two extracts from Lord Arthur's sermon to show him from another point of view. "The greater part of this peaceful close of an active and eventful life he passed among us at Horringer. And to see his gentle presence and humble bearing and quiet demeanour, as he went in and out amongst us, who would have thought that he was familiar with rough war and its terrible glories, and had commanded armies on the battlefield. You know how kind and friendly and neighbourly he was in all his dealings with rich and poor; you know too how constant he was in his attendance in this house of prayer as long as his health made it possible for him to come to church, and what a consistent example he set us of christian virtue in all the arrangements of his life. As far as my own personal observation of his character went, and I had great opportunities of judging, I should say of him that he was pre-eminently a fast and true friend to those whom he called his friends; that he was a man of tender

heart and kind deep feelings; that he was singularly upright, sincere, true and just in all his dealings; that he was remarkably pure-minded, and that the purity of his speech corresponded thereto; that he had a genuine humility and simplicity of character which prevented his ever speaking of himself or magnifying his own achievements."

One extract more as to "his intense and childlike love of nature." "That was a book of beauty which his eyes ever loved to look upon; and I verily believe that no child ever took more delight in spring flowers and the notes and nests of birds and the other simple pleasures of the country than did this veteran commander of great armies, to whom all the pomps of oriental splendour were familiar. . . . To see him watch the rooks and mark their voice and their ways at the return of spring, to see him walk through the lanes watching the white-thorn as it began to bud, or to hear him discourse of some rare songster whose note had attracted his ear, you could hardly think it was the same person who had stormed the strongholds of the Boogtie tribes, or faced a thousand deaths in the trenches of Sebastopol."

SKELTON.—In Dec., 1675, will be found the baptism of Katharine, daughter of John Skelton, Esq., and the Lady Payton, his wife. What they were doing in Horringer, whether residents or visitors, I have not been able to make out. But as the rector of Horringer was also rector of Boxford, Lady Peyton's old home, that may somehow account for it. (See Womack.) Sir Algernon Peyton of Peyton hall, Boxford, Co. Suffolk, and of Dodington, Co. Cambridge, succeeded to the estates on the death of his brother, Sir John, in 1660, and in 1667 was made a baronet, the former baronetcy having become extinct at his brother's death. Sir Algernon was married to Frances, daughter and heiress of Sir Robert Sewster, Knt., of Ravely, Co. Huntingdon. She is the Lady Peyton mentioned above. She survived Sir Algernon and was married secondly to John Skelton, who was a soldier. Unfortunately there were two John Skeltons in the Army at the same time between 1670 and 1690; the numerous regiments in which they served and the successive steps which they gained are given in Doyle's Army Lists for that period, but I have found it impossible to distinguish between them, and to say which was ours and which was the other. One of them was a son of Sir John Skelton, Lieut.-Governor of Plymouth, and brother of Col. Bevil Skelton who was a man of some note. Bevil and one of the two Johns were both adherents of James II after his deposition, i.e., high Tories. The memoir of Bevil

Skelton in the Dict: of Nat: Biography says that he married firstly Frances, daughter of Sir Robert Sewster and widow of Sir Algernon Peyton. But that must be a mistake. The above entry in the Horringer register makes it clear that John Skelton married Lady Peyton. Probably Bevil and John were brothers.

REV. THOMAS SMITH.—Sometimes written Smyth. I do not know anything of his parentage. In June, 1683, he was presented to the rectory of Horringer by Robert Sharpe, patron for this turn. As the register records the burial here in 1713 of Mrs. Judith Sharpe, mother of Thomas Smith, possibly Robert Sharpe was his stepfather and bought the next presentation from the Jermyn family for him. In 1685 Thomas Smith was presented by Thomas, Lord Jermyn, to the rectory of Nowton. He held Nowton and Horringer till his death in 1725. He resided at Horringer, and had six children baptized there between 1684 and 1695, viz., Mary, Thomas, Robert, Antony, Mary, Jane, of whom Mary, Antony, and Jane died in infancy. His first wife, Eleanor, was buried here in 1706; his second wife, Elizabeth, survived him and was buried here in March 1736/7. He was buried here in April 1725. Mr. Gage mentions a gravestone in the chancel of Horringer Church giving his age as 68. This is not now visible.

In 1712 was married at Horringer Thomas Smith, rector of Rougham, and Suzan Wiseman. I imagine that this Thomas was son of the rector of Horringer, baptized here in 1686.

In 1743 was married at Horringer Rev. Thomas Smith of Pakenham and Mrs. Mary Ellis of Horningsheath. He was rector of Pakenham from 1742 to 1763, and rector of Stowlangtoft from 1748 to 1763. I imagine that he was son of the rector of Rougham and grandson of the rector of Horringer. The patronage of Horringer, Rougham, Pakenham, and Stowlangtoft all belonged at this time to families that were closely connected with each other, so that it is not unlikely that a son of the rector of one should be appointed to the rectory of another. The Smiths are not an easy family to track.

THOMAS STANTON.—In 1602 Hardwick was purchased by Thomas Stanton of Bury St. Edmunds, mercer. In 1610 he sold it to Sir Robert Drury of Hawstead for 1100 pounds, who rebuilt the house, which was again rebuilt in 1681 by Sir Dudley Cullum. Hardwick being extra-parochial, Thomas Stanton seems to have made use of Horringer Church. His daughter, Margery, was

baptized here in 1602, and his son Henry in 1608, and he himself was buried here in 1634. In 1661 was buried here Thomas Stanton, who I presume was a son of the former owner of Hardwick. From his tombstone, which is not now visible but is described in Gage's History of Thingoe Hundred, we learn that he was a Major, that he was 61 years at the time of his death, and that he was of Mildenhall. He was not baptized here, having been born just before his father bought Hardwick. I presume that he took a part in the civil war. Mr. Gage says that he was a royalist who compounded for his estate in the sum of £160.

REV. JOHN SYMONDS, D.D., rector of Horringer from 1725 to 1758.* He was born in 1696, was educated at Bury Grammar School, and by parentage was thoroughly Buriensis.

For his grandfather was Henry Symonds, a rich clothier of Bury, who married Suzan, daughter of John Craske of Bury.

And his father was John Symonds of Bury, who died in 1704 when young John was only 8 years old. And his mother's maiden name was Ann Hovell, and she was sister to Richard and Thomas Hovell, two active members of the Bury Corporation.

These two uncles are now and then mentioned in the letters of John, Lord Bristol, and not being political friends or supporters of his were regarded by him with great indignation.

In Sept., 1713, Lord Bristol writes from Bath to Mr. Richard Hovell, Alderman of Bury, to thank the Corporation for returning his son and brother-in-law (Porter) as their representatives in Parliament. (Letter 436.)

In Aug., 1721, Lord Bristol writes from Ickworth to his wife in London, and says, "Yesterday I dined with ye Corporation, who received me with more universal kindness and respect (if possible) than ever, except ye two Hovells." (Letter 619.) A week later he writes again to his wife, "On Thursday next I am to treate the Corporation at the Angel in Bury; they have given the Hovells a fresh mortification by choosing a kinsman of Mr. Macro's for their Preacher in exclusion of their nephew Symonds; this, they say, they may take for offering to sett up an interest in opposition to Lord Bristol's. (Letter 627.)

In Oct., 1723, one of the two Hovells had lately passed out of reach of Lord Bristol's indignation, for writing then from Bath to Alderman Ray he says,

"Alderman Hovell being called to give an account of his past conduct, I shall leave him to that great tribunal with this short remark, that I have been young and now am old, yet did I never see any man prosper after deserting truth or his professed principles for any worldly interest whatsoever, an observation honest Mr. Hall would do well to consider of in time." (Letter 783.) But we must leave the uncles and go back to the nephew, merely expressing the hope that honest Mr. Hall was not too late.

After leaving Bury Grammar School young John Symonds, who lived with his mother at Bury in Eastgate Street, went up to St. John's College, Cambridge, where he was admitted in 1712. He was Spalding scholar and Symonds exhibitioner, and in 1716 took his B.A. degree, M.A. in 1720. In 1718 he became a fellow of his college. In Bishop Monk's Life of Bentley, p. 456, it is told that there was much heat shown in the appointment of Dr. Conyers Middleton to be librarian of the University library, and that the indignation against Symonds and another member of his college who had voted against Middleton was so great, that they were hooted the whole way back from the Schools to St. John's College.

Having survived the hooting he was in August, 1724, presented by Sir Jermyn Davers to the rectory of Rushbrooke, which he resigned in 1726. In June, 1725, Sir Jermyn presented him to Horringer and Nowton, which both became vacant by the death of Rev. Thomas Smith. (See Smith.) About 6 months afterwards, in Jan., 1725/6, he was married in Hengrave Church to Mary Spring. This marriage connected him with several of the big houses in the neighbourhood of Bury, e.g., Hengrave, Rushbrook, Pakenham and others, and surrounded him with cousins and connections of all sorts at Bury, Horringer and elsewhere, and eventually brought lands and houses to him and his children. So we must see who Mary Spring was.

She was the daughter of Sir Thomas and Merilina Spring. Sir Thomas Spring of Pakenham, 3rd baronet, was the descendant of Springs who were wealthy clothiers at Lavenham three hundred years before this, and to whom Lavenham Church owes some of its stately beauty. His wife Merilina was one of the five daughters and co-heiresses of Thomas, Lord Jermyn, of Rushbrook. As another of those five daughters had married Sir Robert Davers of Rushbrook, and was the mother of Sir Jermyn Davers, it follows that Sir Jermyn, the patron of Horringer rectory, and Miss Spring, who was now going to be married to the new rector of Horringer, were first cousins. Merilina, Lady Spring, survived Sir Thomas and

married secondly Sir William Gage of Hengrave, where she was living at the time of this marriage, which consequently took place in Hengrave Church.

Miss Spring, now become Mrs. John Symonds, was evidently a smart woman. A letter from a Bury lady to Mrs. Ross of Helmingham, dated Feb. 4, 1725/6, says, * " Mr. Symonds was married to the gay, the admired Molly Spring last week; they are yet at Hengriff, are expected to spend some time at his mother's [in East. gate St. | before they go to housekeeping; if so we must do ourselves the honour to visit these great people, but I'm determined not to go to see 'em at Horringer till I've a coach, you may guess when that will be. Her first suit a pinke sattin lined with silver tissue, the next a chint silk lin'd with white tabby, and so on, have hired six servants, 3 men in liveries, a Berlin and four horses; they must have a great deal of Oeconomy to support this figure with their fortune. Poor Mrs. King, Sir Jermyn Davers' sister, died last week, a mighty pretty woman; tis surprising how that family goes off." If the writer of that letter had been writing about 40 years later, she would have had still more reason to say of the Davers family, Tis surprising how they go off. Mrs. Symonds had been before her marriage the object of several poems addressed to her by Col. Richardson Pack and printed in his miscellany.

She had one brother, William, and one sister called after their mother, Merilina. Merilina married Thomas Discipline, Alderman of Bury, and had two daughters; from one of whom are descended Le Heups and Cocksedges; the other married John Godbold, who lived for many years in Bury and died in Oct. 1822 in the 93rd year of his age.

Her brother William succeeded their father, Sir Thomas Spring, as 4th baronet in or about 1710, and died unmarried in 1737, when the Spring property at Pakenham came to his two sisters, Mrs. Symonds and Mrs. Discipline. This was divided between them, Mrs. Symonds having New hall and the great tithes, etc., Mrs. Discipline having the old hall or mansion and the advowson.

I must wander a little from Horringer to state a very shocking fact which I find recorded in a folio MS. volume by Rev. George Jermyn giving the history of certain families, and given to my father by his son Archdeacon Jermyn. Mr. Jermyn says that the old manor house of the Springs at Pakenham passed from Mrs. Discipline to her two daughters, Mrs. Le Heup and Mrs. Godbold, and was

by them pulled down and the site sold: and when it was pulled down several of the family pictures in it were (apparently on purpose) burnt!!! However, Mr. Godbold preserved a few of them. One of Sarah (Cordell) Lady Spring he gave to Miss Casborne; another of Elizabeth (Le Strange) Lady Spring he gave to Mr. Jermyn.

To go back to the rector of Horringer. In 1737 his wife succeeded to her share of the Spring property at Pakenham. In 1738 he took the degree of S.T.P. or D.D., so that henceforth we may call him Dr. Symonds, but must not confound him with his son, the Professor. In or about 1738 his mother died at her house in Eastgate Street, Bury, and soon afterwards, I imagine in 1742, he left Horringer and went to live there. In 1742 he was appointed preacher at St. Mary's Church in Bury, having, as we have already seen, been disappointed twenty years before. He was also now made a J.P. for Suffolk.

He had eight children baptized in Horringer Church. Jermyn, the eldest, baptized in 1726, must have died young, though there is no known record of his burial. John and Thomas, twins, 1728, and Mary 1729, died in infancy. Of John, 1730, and Thomas, 1731, some account will be found below. Delariviere, 1732, married Rev. John Casborne, and their grandson, Rev. Walter John Spring Casborne, inherited the Symonds' share of the Spring property at Pakenham. Anna Maria, 1742, died in 1758 aged 16 years, and was buried in the same grave as her father.

I do not find much about Dr. Symonds in Lord Bristol's letters. There is one letter written by him from Ickworth in August, 1738, addressed to Mrs Henrietta Howard, who I think lived at Bury, and who had incurred Lord Bristol's anger by acquainting "the whole company at Dr. Symonds'" with something to his disadvantage. "I must insist upon knowing who your informant was, or whether they will make good or retract their evidence." (Letter 1089.)

I have not much more to say about Dr. Symonds. So far as one can see at this distance of time he was a very prosperous man and things went well with him. With his own estate, with the two livings of Horringer and Nowton, with the preachership at St. Mary's, with his wife's share of the Spring property and of the Jermyn property, he must have been very comfortably off. He had an estate at Horringer which he sold soon after 1750 to George, Lord Bristol, for £4,500. This may have been part of the Jermyn property which his wife

inherited from her mother, or it may have been bought by him. He kept the rectories of Horringer and Nowton and the preachership at St. Mary's till his death.

He died Oct. 12, 1757, in the 61st year of his age, and was buried in the chancel of Pakenham Church. The flat stone there tells us that "he was a wise and an honest man, a tender master, parent and husband; and, without which none can be truly great, a charitable and a sincere Christian."

Another flat stone close by is sacred to the memory of Mary his widow, last surviving daughter of Sir Thomas and Merilina Spring, who was born in 1698, and died in the 67th year of her age.

Her sister Mrs. Discipline lies not far off. She died in Nov., 1761, aged 66 years.

Their mother Lady Spring, afterwards Lady Gage, also lies there. She died in Aug., 1727, aged 52 years.

PROFESSOR JOHN SYMONDS. 1730—1807.—He was the third, but eldest surviving, son of the rector of Horringer where he was baptized. He was educated at Bury Grammar School and St. John's College, Cambridge, and took his B.A. degree in 1752, being 4th Jun. Optime. In 1753 he was elected a fellow of Peter-house, and M.A. in 1754. In 1768 he was appointed Recorder of Bury. This office he resigned in Oct. 1801, when the Corporation voted him a piece of plate of the value of £50 for his long and eminent services. In 1771, probably through the influence of the Duke of Grafton, Chancellor of the University, he was appointed Professor of Modern History, succeeding Thomas Gray the poet, and in the next year was created LL.D. and migrated to Trinity College. He afterwards travelled in France and Italy, and on his return to England built the house on the east side of Bury St. Edmunds which he called St. Edmund's hill, though the name has since been changed to the Mount. He records in his diary that the foundation stone was laid on April 2, 1773. The architect was Adam. It was built on ground which was part of his maternal grandmother's share of the Jermyn property. He was one of the small party which dined weekly at Ickworth when the Earl-Bishop of Derry made his occasional stays there. He was also a great friend of Arthur Young, to whose "Annals of Agriculture" he frequently contributed articles. He is frequently mentioned in Arthur Young's Autobiography, who mentions paying him several visits at St. Edmund's hill

during a very dangerous illness in December, 1805. He survived this illness rather more than a year, and died in Feb., 1807, aged 77 exactly, and was buried at Pakenham. He died unmarried. His house at St. Edmund's hill he sold to Mr. Cocksedge, whose son, Martin Thomas Cocksedge, married Mary Le Heup, who was granddaughter to Mrs. Discipline, the Professor's aunt. His property at Pakenham he left to the Rev. John Walter Spring Casborne, his sister's grandson.

His portrait was painted by George Ralph, and engraved in 1788 by J. Singleton. There is a memoir of him in the Dict: of Nat: Biography, which wrongly gives the year of his birth as 1728/9 instead of 1729/30. It also wrongly gives the year of his mother's death as 1774 instead of 1763.

THOMAS SYMONDS. 1731—1792.—This was the younger brother of the Professor, and like him baptized at Horringer. He went into the navy himself, and among his descendants are a large number of naval officers. Looking at the pedigree as it lies open before me I see no less than six naval officers among his immediate descendants. As one looks at it and sees R.N. after R.N. the words of the Psalm come into one's head: "These men go down to the sea in ships and their business is in the great waters." Among his sons there were two Admirals and two Commanders. Among his grandsons there was an Admiral and a naval Captain, besides a General in the Marines, and an army Captain who was drowned off New Zealand. Apparently if they did not go to sea, the sea came and claimed them.

I cannot follow Thomas Symonds in his naval career, but must content myself with saying that he was twice married, firstly to Mary Noble, who died in 1771, and was buried in St. James' Church, Bury, secondly to Elizabeth Mallet.

By his first wife he had a son Jermyn John, Commander R.N., who, as we are told by a mural tablet in Pakenham Church, "with his ship and whole crew was lost at sea in a gale of wind in October, 1796." There were also two daughters, Elizabeth who married Rev. Henry Heigham of Hunston hall, and Mary Ann who married John Benjafield of Bury St. Edmunds.

By his second wife he was the father of Admiral Thomas Edward Symonds, who died in 1868, and Admiral Sir William Symonds, who died in 1856, and Commander John Charles Symonds, who died s. p. in 1840.

There I must stop, as I have left Horringer far behind. Both the above Admirals had sons who followed their father's profession. Admiral Sir Thomas, son of Admiral Sir William, died in 1894, and it is to his son that I have already expressed my obligations. Memoirs of Sir William and of his son (not his brother) Sir Thomas will be found in the Dictionary of National Biography.

Captain Thomas Symonds died at his brother's house, St. Edmund's hill, on May 25, 1792, aged 60 years. He was buried at Pakenham and shares a mural tablet there with his son Jermyn John.

TINDAL.—See Duke.

JOHN WADKIN.—Under March 31, 1690, John Hervey (afterwards Lord Bristol) records in his diary, "John Wadkins died 11 at night at London." I think John Wadkin was his coachman, and I presume he is the John, son of Thomas and Sarah Wadkin, baptized here in Sept., 1650.

WIGSON.-We have seen that the Lucas family parted with Horscroft soon after 1700. They sold it to William Turnor of Bury St. Edmunds. Mr. Gage tells us that from William Turnor it passed to his son Henry, who left it in 1764 to William Agor, who took the name of Turner. He by will dated 1771 left it ultimately to William Seaber of Colchester, merchant, and Elizabeth his wife. William Seaber died in 1784, and his wife, who survived him, left it to her niece, Elizabeth wife of William Wigson, whose son William Bacon Wigson inherited it and died in 1872, aged 85 years. Several children of his will be found in the Register of Baptisms. See also App: II, Nos. 14, 15, 16, 17. In the earlier entries the name is written Wigson, in the later ones it is written Wigston. I recollect perfectly when and why the change was made. In 1860 my father was writing a short account of the Felton family for a meeting of the Suffolk Archæological Institute, and in his researches for it came across a family of Wigston of Leicester in the 15th and 16th centuries, which took its name from a village in Leicestershire. He told the late Mr. William Bacon Wigson that that was the origin of his name, and so the dropped t was put in again.

REV. LAWRENCE WOMACK.—He was rector of Horringer from 1662, or perhaps a year earlier, to 1683, when he was appointed Bishop of St. David's. I presume that there will be a memoir of him in the Dict: of Nat: Biog:, but his

name has not yet been reached. Mainly from Blomefield's History of Norfolk, Bentham's History of Ely Cathedral, and the Supplement to the Suffolk Traveller, I gather the following facts about him.

From 1595 to 1685 the parish of Fersfield in Norfolk had three successive Womacks for its rectors, viz., Henry from 1595 to 1609, Lawrence 1609 to 1642, Arthur 1642 to 1685. I presume that these were respectively father, son, and grandson. Lawrence was also rector of Lopham in Norfolk.

Francis Blomefield, the historian of Norfolk, was born at Fersfield in 1705, and was afterwards rector of it. His wife was Mary, daughter of another Lawrence Womack, rector of Castor, who was a cousin of the Womacks of Fersfield. He tells us that various charges were brought by the roundheads against Arthur Womack who held the living of Fersfield during the civil war and commonwealth. Amongst other things he was charged with speaking these words:

Here is a health unto his Majesty,
Pray God confound his foes,
And the devil take all Roundheads,
For we are none of those.

He was thrown into Ipswich gaol, but after a time set free. (Blomefield's Norfolk, ed. 1805, I, 112.)

Lawrence Womack, jun., the son of Lawrence and the brother of Arthur, was born in 1612, and educated at Corpus Christi College, Cambridge. In 1642 he succeeded his father Lawrence at Lopham, but was soon afterwards deprived of it. Before that he had been living at Quidenham as chaplain to the Holland family. In July, 1660, he was made a Prebendary of Ely Cathedral. In 1661 he had the degree of S.T.P. conferred upon him per literas regias, and was presented to the rectory of Horringer by Sir Thomas Jermyn. His institution is dated July, 1662, but his predecessor, Robert Gooderich, had died in 1660, and his name appears in the registers in Jan., 1661. He buried his wife Ann here in 1665. The child Ann, whose birth and her mother's death came together, died in Oct., 1685, aged 19 years. Another child, Mary, died in infancy. No children survived him. and his cousin Mary, who married Francis Blomefield, was his heir. In 1660 he was appointed Archdeacon of Suffolk (Gage says of Sudbury), and also made a Prebendary of Hereford Cathedral. He also had the living of Boxford in Suffolk. Boxford belonged for many years to the Peytons, and Sir Algernon Peyton lived there. So possibly Lady Peyton may have been on a visit to him when her child

Katharine was born, or she may have brought the child to Horringer to be baptized by her old friend. (See Skelton.)

Lawrence Womack remained rector of Horringer till 1683, when he was appointed Bishop of St. David's. He was the author of several controversial works directed against the Puritans. He died in March, 1686, aged 73, and was buried in St. Margaret's Church, Westminster, "where is a white marble monument affixed to one of the pillars at the west end of the church" with an inscription. So writes Bentham in 1812. I have not ascertained whether it is still there.

WYMARK.—This name must not be confounded with the preceding one, though when carelessly spelt Wymock it gets very like it. There appear to have been two generations of a family of this name living here from about 1730 to about 1780. Their farm-house seems to have been near Horringer Green, which I take to mean not what is called Horringer Green now, but the old sheep green towards Horringer house. In 1775 John Whymark, jun., rented 188 acres from Lord Bristol, paying yearly a gross rent of £130. By 1781 the farm was broken up and divided among several tenants. The house stood empty for a time, the window tax being paid by Lord Bristol as it was in his own hands. Seventeen shillings was the annual amount of that. The Bury Post for Aug. 19 and Sept. 9, 1784, gives details of the new window tax just then imposed. From this I gather that a tax of 17 shillings in 1781 would imply a house with 12 windows. The new window tax of 1784 would have increased this to 35 shillings. I think the house was then pulled down. While it stood empty horses coming to Horringer fair were turned into its yard the night before at a payment of 2 pence each. There were generally from 30 to 40. After a few years all traces of Wymark's disappears. The family seem to have gone into Reed and Whepstead.

In the late Mr. Beckford Bevan's little book about St. James' Church at Bury St. Edmunds, Edward Wymark, draper, is mentioned as giving £10 in 1521 to the glazing of the west window of that church.
