PREFACE.

SPRINGFIELD CITY DIRECTORY for 1857-'8 is at length completed. Its compilation has demanded an arduous labor, and great pains have been taken to insure its correctness. If any errors or omissions have occurred it has been through inadvertance or misinformation. We neither invite nor repel criticism. At the outset of our enterprise we made a proposition to the city council to have the names of the streets put up in conspicuous letters, and the houses numbered. Of course the utility—the necessity—of numbered houses must be palpable to all, more especially to those familiar with the wants and requirements of metropolitan life—and, surely, Springfield is not a village in its swaddling clothes.

HISTORY OF SPRINGFIELD.

It is well that the history of the past should be written, for the past speaks to us with an earnest voice—a voice of encouragement as well as of warning; and its teachings, when heeded, will guide us aright, in the struggles incident to life. This is as true of cities as it is of men; for cities, though racked by countless varied interests, convulsed by a thousand conflicting thoughts and feelings, illustrates in its entire comprehensiveness the motto, "one of many." The prosperity of one is the prosperity of all, and the general prosperity of the whole includes the individual prosperity of each. All are alike bound to contribute their portion to the common welfare. All are required, either by the labor of the hand, or the toil of the brain to add something to the aggregate wealth of the community in which they live.

Again, it is true of cities, as it is of men, that success is the result of constant and unwearied toil. Every good thing of earth is but the result of labor. It was labor that built the blue arch of Heaven above us. It was labor that fashioned the eternal stars in their changeless beauty. It was labor that piled hill upon hill and mountain upon mountain. It was labor that spread earth's green carpet beneath our feet. It was labor that bedecked it with all its teeming flowers. It is labor that has built the gorgeous temples and the towering dome, "to gather and roll back the sound of anthems." It is labor that has whitened the ocean with its commerce. It is labor that has caused the almost thinking machine to leap from the brain of the mechanic, like Minerva from the head of Jove, full armed to do battle, as man's servant, in life's great contest. These, and all things else glorious in life, are but the result of labor.

There is a magic power in unwearied labor that almost makes it partake of the characteristics of omnipotence.

Labor has made the lightnings of heaven its amenuensis; has chained the turbulent spirit of fire to the iron car and makes him toil as a very slave. Has made all the varied and once uncontrolled elements of nature "but hewers of wood and drawers of water"—mere panderers to its necessities or its pleasures. Labor is the world's physical god, that is fast bringing the wilderness and desolations of earth back to the glories of Paradise.

All that we need as a city is the moving influence of this powerful principle in our midst. We have the energy and the nerve; the brain and the muscle; the gold and the silver. We have, indeed, all the elements of a wondrous prosperity, yet how very little has ever been done to aid Springfield in her rivalry with surrounding cities—nothing, literally nothing!

Springfield has grown, thus far, mainly by her own unaided energies—in spite of the thousand drawbacks that have impeded her progress, and the wonder is that Springfield has ever attained the position she now occupies.

With a vast majority of our good citizens there has ever seemed a strange apathy as to all things calculated to advance our interests. They have ever appeared to rely upon the fancied truth that destiny would work out the problem of our success. They seem to have forgotten the fact that "Jove helps those who help themselves." They have simply folded their arms and gazed with a listless and an idle gaze upon prize after prize won from us by our less favored, but more deserving, because more energetic, sister cities. Like Samson of old we have gone to sleep in the syren lap of the Delilah of inactivity, and, upon awakening, find ourselves well-nigh shorn of our strength, and it will be well for us if we arouse in time to guard ourselves from the fate he suffered, otherwise we may be placed in the tread-mill of adversity and become the scoff and derision of every rival.

Nature has blessed us with a beautiful and healthy locality, accessible from each and every part of the State, and we ought, and will by

reasonable effort, become the point from which all the great interests of the State will radiate.

We are, unquestionably, the centre of the greatest agricultural country in the world, and, year after year, the earth is pouring into the lap of the farmer her magic treasures.

The great political interests of the State naturally concentrate here, giving us a position and importance not realized elsewhere.

All these, and numberless other advantages, are ours, to aid us in our onward progress. Indeed, there is but one thing lacking to make Springfield the leading inland city of the State, and that is—the will to have it so.

We have all struggled too much for individual interests—lived too much for self alone—felt too little of that disposition that prompts to aid in every enterprise that tends to a general prosperity, without stopping to inquire whether it will, or will not, bring a dollar or two more to our own pockets.

The man who lives for himself alone, who encases himself entirely in a cold-hearted selfishness, is a miserable failure—a poor, pitiful abortion, that came into the world unfinished, bringing with him all the worst part of humanity, with none of its better, redeeming qualities, and such monsters, wherever found, are but the scorn of angels and the contempt of men, and angels and men alike smile when the earth reclaims them to remould them into something more congenial with Nature's general harmony. But how different with the man of the large heart and the generous soul. No shadows darken around his pathway. He makes his own sunshine wherever he goes;—prosperity and gladness attends his footsteps, and communities bless his presence. Of this last character of men our city is full; they have acquired more than enough of means for all life's useful purposes;—may we not now hope to see them struggling in concert to

infuse into our city a renewed vitality—one that will lead it on to the fulfillment of a glorious destiny.

ITS JUDICIARY.

The first Circuit Court, after the organization of Sangamon county, was held at the house of John Kelly, on the first day of May, 1821. Hon. John Reynolds, judge; Charles R. Matheny, clerk; John Taylor, sheriff; Henry Starr, prosecuting attorney.

The Court continued in session very nearly all of one day, and adjourned until Court in course, which was on the second Monday in the month of October following.

John Reynolds (more generally known as the Old Ranger) presided as judge of the Sangamon circuit, until the April term, A. D. 1823, when he was superseded by the Hon. Thomas Reynolds.

At the next term, however, which was in the month of October, A. D. 1823, we again find the Old Ranger on the bench, who continued to preside until the May term, 1825, when we find John York Sawyer upon the bench as judge.

Nothing extraordinary seems to have disturbed the usual routine of Circuit Court business until the 27th day of September, A. D. 1826, when there was a special term called to try Nathaniel Vannoy for the murder of his wife—Peggy Vannoy. It appears that he was indicted upon the 27th, tried and found guilty on the 28th, and sentenced on the 29th to be “hanged by the neck, until he was dead.” Nathaniel Vannoy was hung on the 20th day of November, A. D. 1826. This is the only murder conviction which has ever taken place in this county since its organization, being a period of more than thirty-seven years. Our limits will not permit us to pursue any farther this portion of our history.

ITS EXTENSION.

It may not be known to many of our citizens that the original name of Springfield was Calhoun, nevertheless this is true.

The plat of the town of Calhoun was recorded December 5, 1823. Who made the survey, or for whom the survey was made, or what was the date of the survey, the record does not show.

We simply find the plat of record, without note or comment. How little did they then dream of the brilliant future that was awaiting the little town that they were forming into shape and giving to it a "local habitation and a name."

The town of Calhoun embraced all that portion of the present city in the following boundaries: Beginning at the north-east corner of lot number one (1), in block number one (1), on Madison and Seventh streets, thence running west to First street, thence south to Monroe street, thence east to Seventh street, and thence north to the beginning, containing twenty-three blocks.

The next plat of record that we find purports to be a survey of "that part of the town of Springfield given to the county by the proprietors." Here, for some reason unexplained, the name of Calhoun was abandoned, and from that time on, by common consent, our present city bore the name of Springfield. This plat was recorded on the 19th day of December, A. D. 1825. This survey was made by Tom M. Neale, surveyor, by order of the Sangamon County Commissioner's Court.

For the purpose of greater certainty, it appears that the County Commissioners of Sangamon county, together with the original proprietors and their legal representatives of Springfield, procured T. M. Neale to re-survey the town, which was done on the 18th day of June, A. D. 1833, and the plat of such survey recorded on the 9th day of November, A. D. 1836.

The first addition to Springfield was laid off by John Taylor, and recorded January 22, A. D. 1827, as John Taylor's West Addition, and the various subsequent additions were recorded in the following order:

TOWN AND CITY GOVERNMENT.

Up to eighteen hundred and thirty-two, no disposition had been evinced by the inhabitants of our then little town to throw around it any of the restraints attendant upon police regulations, it had been permitted to grow and spread in untrammelled freedom, in the spring of that year, however, a different spirit developed itself, and on the second day of April, A. D. 1832, our first organization as a town was effected. We subjoin a list of our first town officers:

Under the fatherly care of these, and their successors in office, Springfield continued to grow and prosper until 1840, when a more ambitious disposition illustrated itself, and the humble garb of a town organization was cast aside for the more stately habiliments of a city government.

In the legislative session of 1839 and '40, a bill to charter the City of Springfield was passed, which was submitted to the inhabitants of the proposed city on the 6th day of April, 1840, and by them adopted. The first election for city officers under the charter was held on the 20th day of April, following the adoption of the charter.

The election resulted in the choice of the following

ITS POPULATION.

There are no records, within our knowledge, by which we can discover the population of Springfield, definitely, at any time prior to the year 1840. The population then, as shown by the United States

Marshal, numbered two thousand five hundred and seventy-nine.

In 1845 the population exhibited a small advance over 1840.

In 1848 it had increased to three thousand nine hundred and twelve.

In 1850 the population numbered five thousand one hundred and six.

1854 the population was six thousand two hundred and eighteen ;

And in 1855 we had reached the number of seven thousand two hundred and fifty.

Our present population, we have every reason to believe, largely exceeds ten thousand, with every indication of a steady advance, at an increased rapid rate, for many years to come.

The character of our population is extremely varied. We have representatives of almost every nationality beneath the sun ; yet, varied as it may be, it meets and mingles in the struggles incident to existence, with perhaps as little discord as any people throughout the world. Every man in our midst who has evinced a reasonable industry, coupled with care and prudence, has a home of his own, and humble though it be, yet, nevertheless, it is a "home"—and what costly palace is *more* than that.

ITS FIRST SETTLEMENT.

Sometime previous to 1820 (the exact date not known) a family by the name of Kelly, settled in what is now the west part of the city. They were the first white inhabitants that disturbed the Indian in his peaceful possession. The first house was built by John Kelly, and was situated on the same spot where now stands the old frame dwelling, known as the "Garret House." Another one of the Kelly's built close to the spot where now stands the residence of Mrs. Trotter, and the third reared his humble cabin close to, if not upon, the identical place where Archer G. Herndon, Esq., now resides. The second family, if we are correctly informed, came here in the spring of 1820, and

settled in that part of the city known by the old inhabitants as "Newsomville," situated a little south and east of "Hutchinson's Burying Ground." Their names were Duggett. No other settlements were made in, or immediately around, what is now Springfield, until the spring of 1821, when several families were added to the "infant colony."

It is not our purpose to describe the toil and the labor they endured ; the difficulties and the dangers they surmounted—the deprivations and miseries they suffered ;—it is not our purpose to portray these, though it were well to have it done, to teach all "grunblers" of the present day ;—those who are continually croaking of the "hard times" and the difficulties by which they are surrounded, this one great truth—that their hearts ought to be continually filled with thankfulness for the ten thousand blessings they enjoy, compared with that band of pioneers, who prepared for us a pleasant place, in the then wilderness, and who are now sleeping very quietly over yonder, in the "Old City Grave-yard"—and *there* let them rest! Let no Vandal hand disturb their last repose. What though the city surrounds the "hallowed old spot"—spreads upon every hand—until that "grave-yard" becomes its very centre—still let the old pioneers rest. It is the place chosen by them, before most of us were born, and there, as one by one the old hero's gently passed to the "dreamless sleep," the tottering survivors laid them down to rest, in the chosen spot, by the side of those that had gone before, and *there*, we say again, let them rest,—rest in peace, until the GREAT MASTER himself shall arouse them from their slumber. Wall in that "Old Grave-yard," wall it in well, and never let the sacriligious hand of avarice molest them in their "last peaceful home."

ITS SOCIAL LIFE.

It would be a pleasing duty for us, did our limits permit, to describe the social life of Springfield a quarter of a century ago. What a strange contrast it would present to its social life now! Then an Arcadian simplicity gave a charm to its rural existence. Shut out

as Springfield was from nearly all the world—no town, of any size, within a hundred miles—no telegraph to flash its lightning news—no railroad to wake the echos as its cars thundered along—none of life's refinements or its luxuries, and barely enough of its necessities—the few inhabitants of Springfield lived (what would be called now) a strangely unsophisticated and monotonous life; and yet their's, in the main, was a gladsome existence. It is true that there was less refinement, but then there was more humanity—less intellect, but more heart—less fashion, but more sociability. That was an age of calico dresses and sun bonnets—wool hats and jeans coats. That age has passed, and with it, we are constrained to believe, has gone much of life's honest simplicity. In its stead, however, has come a more glorious period—an age of intellect, thought, and power—an age wherein man is asserting his supremacy over the traditions of the past—an age in which man is asserting his high birthright, proving his kindred and relationship to the ETERNAL ONE;—for in this age man himself has become a very god, and the wild elements cower in gentle subservency to his will. The past was an age of heart and soul—this of intellect and brain. We are content with the change. Give us rather the cold, bright glories of the present than the warmer, but misty darkness, of the past.

ITS IMPROVEMENTS.

Want of space compels us to sum up, in a few brief sentences, a sketch of the improvements of Springfield. All the original houses were simply "log cabins," and years went by before such a thing was known as a frame house. The first brick house built still stands. It was built by John Taylor as a store-house. It is the little brick situated at the south side of Jefferson street, a little west of the residence of William Carpenter, Esq.

Springfield originally consisted of a little cluster of log cabins, situated in the neighborhood of the Gas Works. It was a long time be-

fore the town made any progress in the direction where the principal part of the city now is.

It may seem strange that Springfield ever had a rival for the county seat; yet, nevertheless, she had a very formidable opponent—one that contested the matter with her most bravely—one who, for a long time, counted sure upon victory; but, alas, for that rival now!—there is nothing left but its name, and that name is Sangamon. If we are correctly informed, not a single house is left in Sangamo Town to tell the sad history of its disappointed hopes—its desolation and decay.

The first tavern that Springfield could boast was kept by a person named Price. It was situated on the place where now stands the residence of Charles Lorsch. It was an old-fashioned, two-story log house. We sometimes hear the over-fastidious complaining of our present hotel accommodations. All such should have spent a week at "Price's Tavern," and, we predict, that they would grumble never again.

The first tavern of any pretension was the old "Indian Queen Hotel," built by our townsman—A. G. Herndon. It was the same house subsequently enlarged and improved by Joel Johnson, and was burnt to the ground several years ago.

The first store for the sale of dry goods in Springfield was opened and kept by Elijah Iles. It was situated upon the same ground now occupied by the residence of our old friend—John Hay.

In 1837 the seat of government for the State was removed from Vandalia to Springfield, and the first session of the Legislature here was in the winter of 1839 and '40. The Senate held its session in the Old Methodist Church, and the House of Representatives met in the Second Presbyterian Church.

For the last several years Springfield has advanced with a steady and healthy growth, and is destined, we believe, to be the finest inland city in the State.

Springfield has been strangely exempt from casualties. The only fire of any note we ever had was two years ago last May, when the west side of the square was mainly burnt; but, phoenix-like, it has arisen from its own ashes in renewed youth and beauty.

The most important event to Springfield was the completion of the Alton and Sangamon Railroad, now the Chicago, Alton and St. Louis Railroad. The completion of that road breathed into us a new life, and, lately, the extension of the Great Western Railroad's connections to Toledo, has been of incalculable benefit to our city. We want two other railroad connections—the Springfield and Keokuk Railroad, and a railroad in a south-eastern direction, striking the Central Railroad at, or near, Vandalia. Give us these, and no man can predict to what position Springfield will attain.

CONCLUSION.

Our proposed task is done. We have already extended this brief history, perhaps, beyond what prudence and good taste will justify.

To us it was a pleasant theme—a thousand memories of our boyhood have been crowding upon us, and we hope to be forgiven, if over these pleasing recollections we have lingered too long. But let us turn from the past—it is gone from us, and gone forever! The facts that compose its history are fixed and changeless—we cannot change them if we would. The great mistake which, as a city, we have made, it would be useless to regret. But the future is all our own. Its history we can shape as we will—our destiny is in our own hands, and we can make it, if we will, a glorious one. Then, let us one and all, go forth, each to his appointed task, with a higher hope and a loftier aim. Let all miserable local considerations be forgotten—let all rise superior to the degrading promptings of a wretched selfishness—let the common heart pulsate for the common good—let a manly city pride ennoble every bosom, and, with a generous and gallant rivalry, let us all struggle to promote a general prosperity, and then Springfield will become—what she ought long since to have been—our pride and our boast!

This road was commenced in the month of August, 1850, and was then known by the title of the “Alton and Sangamon Railroad.” During the summer of 1851 the work on it was nearly suspended, by reason of its financial difficulties. In December, 1851, the work was vigorously resumed, and, under the contract of B. Godfrey, Esq., it was finished from Alton to Springfield, and opened for traffic on the 10th of September, 1852. On the 18th of October, 1853, it was opened to Bloomington, and on the 1st of August, 1854, the first train run through to Joliet, since which time it has been doing a regular business between Chicago and St. Louis.

The managers of the road have encountered many difficulties, and seen hard times in money matters, but they now have a bright future. On the first day of October, 1857, J. A. Matteson (then governor of the State) accepted the presidency of the company; and through his extraordinary energy, superior capacity, and great application to business, connected with his well-established personal character and influence, he has succeeded in establishing the credit of the road, both in a financial and a commercial point of view, on a firm basis.

The mutterings and grumbings that were heard from one end of the line to the other during the years of 1854, '55, and '56 are no longer heard. The business community are rejoiced in their transactions with the agents of the road. The farmers along the line have been, or are being, settled with, for the stock that has been killed by the trains; and what by many—less than one year since—was regarded as a curse, is now hailed as a blessing.

One other thing—which is of some importance to many of our citizens: Gov. Matteson will cause new certificates of stock to be issued to all the *bona fide* stockholders, and its productiveness cannot admit of a question or a doubt—the increase of business on the road being large and constant.

We are under obligations to V. Hickox, Esq., who has been connected with this road, in various capacities, since its first inception, for the above list of officers and brief history of the road up to the year 1854. May his shadow never grow less! And long may the managers, officers, and stockholders of the St. Louis, Alton and Chicago Railroad live to enjoy the well-earned fruits of their labor.
