NOTES.

- (a) Richard, afterwards "Humanity" Martin, was called to the Irish Bar in Easter Term, 1781, and chose the Connaught Circuit in 1783. He did not however practice, in fact held only one brief, and that with a special object, in the case of *In re George Fitzgerald v. George Robert Fitzgerald*, commonly called "Fighting Fitzgerald." For a full and particular account of his famous duel with this celebrated fire-eater, see Sir Jonah Barrington's *Personal Sketches of His Own Time*, vol. ii, pp. 133-147, 8rd ed.
- (b) By an oversight the second name of the "Princess of Connemara" has been omitted. The full name is "Mary Letitia."
- (c) The word "De Tour" in the name of Edward De Tour Gonne Bell should be so spelt, and not "Detour."
- (d) As the question is often asked how the estates were lost to the family this appears to be a proper place to answer it. The estates were not mortgaged till the time of Thomas Barnewall Martin, who having broken the entail, borrowed from Thomas Wentworth Beaumont, Esq., of Bretton Hall, Yorkshire, and Hexham Abbey, Northumberland, M.P., a sum which eventually, on April 12, 1847, with several judgments amounted to £37,475. Thomas subsequently, by mortgage dated Feb. 10, 1847, raised from the Law Life Assurance Society of London the sum of £160,000 at $4\frac{1}{2}$ per cent. interest if paid promptly, but at 6 per cent. if not, and from lefty, but at the same time impolitic motives, voluntarily assumed the debts of his father and grandfather, thus burdening his only child with the outlawed liabilities of two generations, commencing in fact so far back as 1775! Mr. Beaumont, thinking the security ample gave precedence to the company, and took a second mortgage for the sum above mentioned on April 12, 1847, in order to allow Thomas to accomplish this object, and Mary and her mother in an unhappy hour, also postponed their claims under the marriage settlement. The famine years came on, not only were no rents paid but Mary and he spent very large sums in buying immense quantities of clothing and meal and distributing them among their poorer stricken people, giving at the same time continuous employment to hundreds of labourers. Thomas died a martyr in the cause of his tenantry, as he took the famine fever in the workhouse at Clifden while visiting unfortunates who had been stricken down with a most malignant type of that dreadful disease, and expired after an illness of fifteen days. His last words were "My God! what will become of my poor people!" The Law Life took possession

of the estate in November, 1848, when the occupants left the Castle. A survey was made of the property and it was advertised for sale in London, under the powers of sale in the mortgages, on Tuesday, August 7, 1849, and four following days. This sale did not take place as negotiations were on foot by a number of gentlemen to form a company and buy in the estate, which however fell through. By the above survey, even after three generations of reckless extravagance, during which the estates in the other counties within mentioned and those in the east of the county Galway and also many large portions in the west had been sold, there nevertheless yet remained, in round numbers, 197,000 statute acres! After the mortgagees took possession and after the commencement of proceedings in the Encumbered Estates Court about five thousand acres were disposed of by private sale to various parties. The proceedings in the Encumbered Estates Court were commenced on June 27, 1850, by petition filed on that date by Henrietta Jane Hawks Beaumont and Richard Beaumont, executors of Mr. Beaumont, and they, in spite of advice to the contrary, forced on the sale (though it was a very bad time for it to be) the market being glutted with encumbered estates, and in consequence when the sale took place, as it did by order of the trustees of the Court on Wednesday, July 14, 1852, the estates were bought in by the Law Life for the nominal sum of £186,000, as their claim at that time exceeded £200,000, the Beaumont executors by their obstinacy lost their claim. The unsold portion of the estate at that time was 192,000 statute acres. By order dated Nov. 9, 1853, the Manor of Clare, owse Claremont, was sold together with all the "manoral rights, privileges and advantages thereto incident," together with the right to hold Courts Leet and Baron "as the same were granted to Captain Richard Martin by Letters Patent," and the right to hold fairs and weekly markets at the town of Clare, and to levy tolls and customs thereat, and to hold a Court of Pie Poudre during the continuance of such fairs, etc., and the rights to hold fairs, and a similar Court at the town of Roundstone, part of said estate. The right to the tithes of the parishes of Killanin and Kilcummin was sold still later. The company realized handsomely out of the property. After disposing of 32,000 acres for £75,000, the remaining portion, 160,000 acres was sold in 1871 to Mr. Richard Berridge of the firm of Meux & Company, brewers, Tottenham Court Road, for about £200,000, in whose family it yet remains, almost wholly uncared for and neglected, and cursed for nearly 40 years by the iniquitous rule of the absentee.

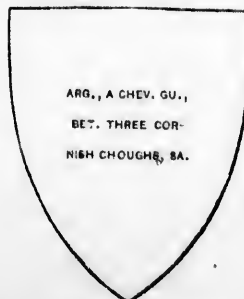

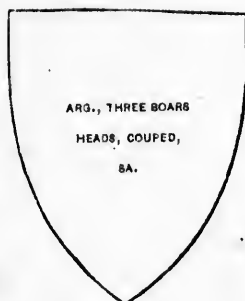

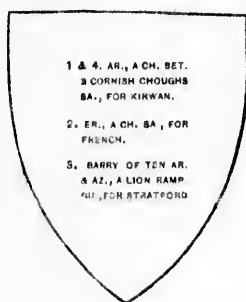
