### EXPLANATION OF THE CALENDAR PAGES.

At the top of each page, are given the times of the Moon's Change, Full, and Quadratures; and also its Perigee and Apogee.

The 1st column contains the Day of the Month.

The 2d column contains the Day of the Week.

The 3d column shows the time of Sun-rise, or the instant of the first appearance of the upper point of the Sun's border at the horizon, the horizon being supposed level with the eye.

The 4th column shows the time of Sun-set, or the disappearance of the upper point of the sun's border at the horizon.

The 5th gives the Length of Days, or the interval between the times of sunrise and sunset.

The 6th shows the Sun's declination North or South at the instant of Greenwich mean noon.

The 7th gives the Equation of time, and shows how much a clock, regulated to mean time, should be before or after the Sun, at Boston mean noon.

The 8th gives the times of the Moon's Rising or Setting, the rising being given from Full to Change, and the setting from Change to Full.

The 9th gives the time of the Moon's Setting.

The 10th gives the Moon's Age in days and tenths of a day.

The 11th gives the Moon's Place in the Zodiac for every day, in the morning.

The 12th gives the time of High Water, Morning Tide.

The 13th gives the time of High Water, Evening Tide.

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## THE BOSTON ALMANAC,

Begun the latter part of the 65th, and the beginning of the 66th, year of the Independence of the United States of America; and the 654th year of the Julian Period; and the later part of the 505th, and the beginning of the 506th Year, since the creation of the world, according to the Jews; and the 554th year, since the foundation of Rome, according to Varro; and the latter part of the 1257th (Gmai) year, since the Hegira, or flight of Mahomet.

### ECLIPSES.

In the Year 1841, there will be three Eclipses; four of the Sun and two of the Moon.

The first will be a Partial Eclipse of the Sun, January 22d, visible only in a small portion of the Southern Ocean.

This will be a Total Eclipse of the Moon, February 5th, visible at Boston, as follows:

The third will be a Partial Eclipse of the Sun, February 25<sup>th</sup>, invisible at Boston, but visible in the North Atlantic Ocean, Iceland, and East Greenland.

The fourth will be a Partial Eclipse of the Sun, July 18th, invisible at Boston, but visible in Britain, Bay, Greenland, Iceland, the Northern Ocean, Norway, Sweden, Lapland, Finland, Russia in Europe, Prussia, Italy, Germany, Scotland, and the North of France.

The fifth will be a Total Eclipse of the Moon, August 2, invisible at Boston.

The sixth will be a Partial Eclipse of the Sun, August 15, invisible at Boston, but visible in the South Pacific Ocean, and part of the Southern Cone.

### OCULTATIONS.

The following is a list of all the occultations of Stars greater than the seventh magnitude, which take place under favorable circumstances for observation at Boston and the vicinity. Those of Stars less than the third magnitude, which take place while the sun is above the horizon, are not included. The last column gives the Star's name and magnitude, the approximate time of the Moon's apparent contact with the Star in right ascension, the Star's apparent apparent distance north or south of the Moon's center at apparent conjunction, and the Moon's Age in days. These Stars marked with an asterisk will be visible at Boston; but in general, where the distance is given north or south of the center, it will be visible in latitude further south, — where it is given south of the center, in latitudes farther north. The occultation of the Planet Venus, October 1<sup>st</sup>, was computed for the position of the State House in Boston; the others for the position of Mr. Bond's Observatory at Cambridge. Another occultation of this Planet will take place on the morning of March 26<sup>th</sup>, at 9° 45' 30", and although Venus will then be within a few days of its greatest brilliancy, it will probably be invisible to the naked eye on account of its being too near the horizon. As computed for Mr. Bond's observatory, this occultation will also pass under the following circumstances; the positions of the points of contact on the Moon's border being given for the instants of external contact.

Under ordinary atmospheric circumstances, however, to an observer elevated about 300 feet above the level of the sea, the planet's emergence will be visible, and take place under circumstances as follows: That point of the Moon's border at which the planet emerges, will

The Moon will rise at a point of the horizon, East, 24° North.

The emergence will take place at a point only five degrees from the Moon's vertex. Should the atmosphere be sufficiently clear at the time, the old moon (then within three days of change) in its thin crescent, with Venus resting on the vertex of its dark border, and the Moon apparently resting on the ocean, must present a phenomenon of great beauty and interest. West of Boston the occultation will not be visible; but the appearance afforded by the proximity of Venus to the Moon, will amply compensate the trouble of rising so early an hour. The other most interesting occultations will be those of part of the *Plough* or *Seven Stars*, September 7th. The occultations of the same group, November 27-8th, will be of little interest, as the Moon will then be within a few hours of full.

The planet Venus will be *Evening Star* till its conjunction with the Sun, May 13th, thence *Morning Star* to the end of the year. Venus will be at its greatest brilliancy April 9, and June 20.

The Earth will be nearest the Sun on the 21st of January, and farthest from the Sun on the 1st of July, and again nearest the sun on the 30th of December.

#### Height of Spring Tides, 1841.

As it is important to farmers who cultivate lands which are liable to be overflowed by very high tides, as well as to those who conduct some of the labors and operations of seaports, to know when to expect the some great tides, it has been thought advisable to insert the following table, which exhibits the height in feet and minutes of a foot at Boston, of all the *Spring Tides*, supposing them to be influenced by storms or long prevailing winds, which, as is well known, cause a great difference in the rise of all tides. Spring tides take place about the time of *New and Full Moon*, and the highest are those which happen about a day and a half after *Change or Full*, the highest of all, as will be seen by the table, taking place about the time of the Equinoxes, March and September. At these times, Equinoctial easterly storms are expected, and these are sometimes known to raise the tides to such a degree as to cause great destruction of property. The factors given in the table are for determining the height of spring tides at other ports; it being only necessary to multiply the number in table by these factors. As an example, if we would find the height of spring tide for *New Moon*, September 13th, at *Long Island*; we multiply the 11 feet given in Tide Table, by the factor 1.096, from our table preceding, and obtain 12.05' 0.95". For *Full Moon*, July 31st, we multiply the 11 feet by the factor 1.709, which gives 19.7 7.79 or 7 feet and 5 tenths of a foot.

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## JANUARY.

1. The Massachusetts Legislature met in Boston. The Senate was organized by the choice of Hon. Daniel P. King, of Danvers, President, and Charles Calhoun, Clerk. The House of Representatives was called to order by the Hon. Isaac P. Davis, the senior member from Boston, and Robert C. Winthrop was chosen Speaker, and Luther S. Cushing, Clerk. The vote for Speaker was very close, Mr. Winthrop having 239 votes only out of 472, two more than was necessary for a choice.

6. The City Government for the year 1840 was organized. The oaths of office were administered by Chief Justice Shaw, to the Mayor elect, Jonathan Chapman, who subsequently administered the customary oath to the Aldermen and Councilmen. Philip Martz was unanimously re-elected President of the Common Council, and Samuel F. McCleary, City Clerk.

13. The Committee of the Legislature appointed to count the votes for Governor, reported this day. The whole number of votes was 102,869.

There was no choice of Lieut. Governor by the People. On the 16th this report was accepted by the Senate and subsequently by the House, and the Senate having on the 17th, from the two candidates returned to it by the House, chosen Geo. Hull Lieut. Governor, on the following day, the Governor and Lieut. Governor elect, Marcus Morton and George Hull, took their oaths of office in a Convention of both branches of the Legislature.

20. James Blake was unanimously chosen City Marshal, by the Board of Aldermen, in the place of Ezra Weston, Jr., resigned.

22. Gov. Morton delivered his Message before a Convention of both branches of the Legislature.

23. From the "Annual Abstract of the Bill of Mortality" for 1839, published by the Superintendent of Burying Grounds, it appears that the number of deaths in that year was 1863—In the month of January there were 151; Feb. 159; March, 165; April, 145; May, 129; June, 126; July, 148; August, 117; September, 183; October, 156; November, 141; Dec., 159.

27. At a benefit at the Tremont Theatre this evening, the sum of \$1,072 25 was collected for the widow of Mr. H. J. Finn, who was lost in the Lexington. At the same theatre, on the 30th, \$909 was received for the relief of intelligent men.

widow of Mr. Charles L. Elie, who was lost by the same disaster.

30. A meeting was held at Faneuil Hall, to take into consideration the subject of the loss of the Lexington.—[See General Events.] The Mayor was called to the Chair, and resolutions sympathizing with the friends of those lost, censuring the owners and managers of the boat, and calling for legislative action on the subject, were offered by Geo. S. Hillard, Esq. After some speaking on the resolutions, they were unanimously adopted, a Committee of fifteen being appointed to investigate and report on the causes of steamboat disasters, and another of five to present the subject to the notice of the Legislature.

30. The Overseers of the Poor reported that 81 patients had been admitted into the City Small Pox Hospital, of whom 22 had died and 37 been discharged. A large proportion of the deaths occurred among the temperate.

31. Abigail R. Gray obtained a verdict of damages against Robert Harley, a dry goods dealer in Hanover street, for a false charge of theft made against her. The damages were laid at \$70 only, to show that the object of the suit was not money.

## FEBRUARY.

16. The Anniversary Meeting of the Children's Friend Society was held in Grace Church. As a part of the exercises an orphan boy, only six years old, addressed the audience with propriety and effect. A collection of \$130 was taken up.

17. Erastus D. Stevens, a young man who kept an apothecary's shop in Merrimack Street, was killed by the excessive use of kerosene.

22. Thomas H. Perkins presented to the Library of the Natural History Society the four large volumes of "Audubon's Birds of America," bound in a style to accord with the magnificence of the work. The volumes are valued at about \$1,000.

26. William Goodrich was detected in an attempt to rob the Granite Bank. He was found in the banking room, having succeeded in opening the outer door of the safe. He said he had two companions, both of whom had made their escape while the watchman went for assistance.

26. The Whig Legislative Convention unanimously nominated Edward Everett and George Hull candidates for Governor and Lieutenant Governor of the Commonwealth at the next election. Subsequently Mr. Everett declined accepting the nomination.

## MARCH.

13. The Hon. John Lowell died at his residence in Roxbury, aged 70.—Although of late years retired from public life, he was widely known as a lawyer, statesman, politician, and writer, and as a true gentleman of enlarged and lofty sentiments. Few citizens, in this section of the country were more widely known and appreciated by intelligent men.

24. The Massachusetts Legislature was prorogued to the first Tuesday in the next January, after a session of 84 days. They had passed 97 acts and 59 resolves.

## APRIL.

1. The corner stone of a new Baptist Church in Bowdoin Square was laid, in presence of a large number of persons. Prayers were offered by Rev. Dr. Sharpe and Mr. Neal, and an appropriate and impressive address was delivered by Mr. Stow. A list of the Pastors of the Baptist Churches of the City, and copies of various religious periodicals and of the City newspapers, were deposited under the Corner Stone.

18. A child of about five years of age, son of Mr. Thomas Brown, fell from the wharf of Lowell R. Road into the water, which was then about seven feet deep; the distance from the top of the wharf to the surface being about twelve feet. He was saved by Mr. Chas. E. Gillman, who recovered the body after it had been in the water nearly eight minutes, and after life was supposed to be extinct, although judicious means for resuscitation proved successful.

20. Rev. Dr. Tuckerman, well known as former minister to the poor in this city, a devoted servant in the cause of humanity and religion, died in Cuba, whether he went during the previous December, with the hope of restoring his health.

26. Deaf in this city, Rev. John Thornton Kirkland, D. D. L. D., formerly Pastor of the New South Church, and afterwards President of Harvard University. His funeral was attended on the next day, at the New South Church, by a large assembly of the most distinguished members of the community, including many members of the Society of which he was the Pastor, and a large portion of those graduates of the University, who reside in the vicinity.

## MAY.

11. The Rev. Paul Dean, Senior Pastor of the Bulfinch street Congregational Society, resigned his connection with that Society, on account of

an urgent call to the South, where the climate is better suited to his health.

12. A large meeting was held in Faneuil Hall, to hear the report of the delegates from this City to the Baltimore Convention.

17. Was a very hot day for the season; the thermometer ranging, for a part of the day, from ninety-one to ninety-two degrees.

26. The Rev. Henry Ware, Jr., stated at the anniversary meeting of the American Unitarian Association, that a gentleman in this city or vicinity had made a donation, to be expended for the Association and kindred objects, of *fifty thousand dollars!* The name of the donor was not stated.

## JUNE.

1. The Ancient and Honorable Artillery Company paraded, under command of Capt. Macomber, and celebrated their two hundred and second anniversary. Gov. Morton and colleagues appeared in full uniform, and the day, which was as usual one of general hilarity, went off happily.

3. The steam packet ship, *Unicorn*, arrived from Liverpool after a sixteen days' passage. This was the first packet of the Boston, Halifax, and Liverpool Line. The wharves were lined by citizens, anxious to witness her arrival, and she was welcomed by salutes and a display of flags from the U. S. ship of the line *Columbus*, moored in the channel, and the revenue cutter *Hamilton*.

5. On this day, the City Council gave a dinner to Mr. Edward Cunard, the son of the proprietor of the Liverpool Line of Steam Packets, and Capt. Douglas, the commander of the *Unicorn*. The Council, with their guests, numbered about three hundred and fifty, among whom were members of the Legislative and Judiciary branches of the Government, officers of the U. States Government, the British Consul, several representatives of foreign nations, distinguished strangers, &c. His Honor, the Mayor presided, and a number of elegant speeches expressed the interest felt, in and kindly sentiments aroused by the occasion.

7. The results of a census of the city, taken by order of the Mayor and Aldermen, show the population to be 84,401. In 1835 it was 75,504, and in 1830, 61,381. The number of females above the age of 16, exceeded the males of the same age by 6,039.

12. The Whirs of Ward's, gave a splendid "tea party" on Fort Hill. This novel festival was got up with much spirit, and resembled more a national jamboree than a political party gathering.



17. Mr. Lauriat made an elegant balloon ascension from Chelsea, with a highly favorable wind and weather. He landed in Malden at about 7 o'clock, having been wafted in several directions by currents varying at different altitudes, a distance of more than 25 miles. The ascent was the highest elevation, which was over 7000 feet, 60.

24. The four-hundredth anniversary of the Invention of the Art of Printing, was celebrated in Boston by a public procession and a dinner at Faneuil Hall. It was an occasion of great interest. All connected with the art, in this vicinity, joined in the celebration.

## JULY.

2. Mr. William Phelps and his son, aged 50 and 21 years, were killed by the falling of a brick wall, part of a stable attached to the "Dix Estate," on Orange Court, which they with others were engaged in removing. They had backed a wagon into the stable for the purpose of removing some rubbish, and while they were at work there, the partition wall, about 20 feet high, fell and covered them in the ruins. They were taken out dead, probably having been killed instantly.

4. This was a very happy "Independence Day" in this City and vicinity. The Children of the Warren Street Chapel held a Floral Festival and Sale, the profits of which were given to the Poor. The National Convention was conducted as usual, and an able oration was delivered by Thomas Power, Esq. The principal celebration was by the Whigs of the four Southern Wards, who, with their numerous guests from all parts of the city and vicinity, assembled at the spacious Hall over the Boston and Worcester Railroad Depot, at an early hour in the morning, and kept up a gay and animated meeting, enlivened by various speeches, songs, etc., until late in the afternoon. The meeting then adjourned to meet again on Bunker Hill on the 10th of September. The Frizzelites in their white frocks, to the number of over two hundred, accompanied by the African Band, held a grand parade.

The Public Garden and Conservatory were thronged during the day. Mr. Lauriat made a beautiful balloon ascension from Chelsea. A splendid display of Fireworks on the Common in the evening, called out an immense concourse of people, and gave general and complete satisfaction.

15. The Britannia, the first of the large size packets of Cunard's line, arrived at East Boston in 11 days and 8 hours from Liverpool.

21. The "Cunard Festival" was held at East Boston. Dinner was pre-

pared in a pavilion for more than 2000 persons, galleries were arranged for ladies, and the occasion passed off with entire success, and to the great pleasure of all present.

## AUGUST.

1. The Britannia went to sea in a thick fog and rain.

2. The exhibition of the several Public Schools took place, and as usual, the Franklin Medals were awarded.

13. A young man named Richard Wainy lost his life by a fall from the rocks on Little Nahant, where he was climbing in an attempt to obtain some minerals.

17. The Acadia, steam packet, arrived in twelve and a half days from Liverpool, including her stoppage at Halifax.

21. Richard S. Stearns, of Salem, was thrown from a chair in Salem street, and his skull was so badly fractured that he died the next morning. His horse started at seeing a pile of bricks in the street.

23. During a heavy shower, a new unfinished house on the South Cove land, near Front street, owned by Mr. Nathan Wheeler, was struck by lightning. The fluid knocked off the top of the chimney, then ran on an iron brace leading from the chimney to the roof, where it entered the house, making a hole about four feet square, and tearing off all the plastering in the attic. It then ran down a zinc spout, and made a passage about four square through the wall in the cellar, before doing any further damage to the building. A man at work in the second story of the house, and two others about fifteen rods from the building, were knocked down; all of them recovered in a short time.

## SEPTEMBER.

9. The Fair for the Bunker Hill Monument was opened on this day. It was the most splendid and expensive one that this city, to say the least, ever known. The large Hall (Frizell Hall) was full and even crowded most of the time, through the whole week. The result showed that pleasure and profit had been well combined. The net proceeds of tickets and of the sale amounted to \$20,000 dollars. Never has a worthy object been more handsomely obtained. The days of the fair will be long remembered by very many, both of those who held it and its visitors. The best description of the table and of the ever-enduring variety of the articles displayed, was contained, and will remain as a memoir of the time, in a story paper, called the *Monument*, printed and published by himself.

11. Poston's Advertiser, said to be

the first newspaper established in Boston, Company declared a semi-annual dividend of eight per cent.

15. Dead in this city, Mr. William French, aged 96 years, one of the few survivors of the Boston Tea Party of 1773, and a Revolutionary Pensioner.

15. The Treasurer of the Bunker Hill Monument Association received a donation of ten thousand dollars for that Association, from Mr. Lawrence, Esq., the condition being that it should be paid out on which sum was promised.

## NOVEMBER.

5. The new Meeting House in Bowdoin Square was dedicated in the evening, the sermon by Rev. Mr. Hague. The Church was recognized at the same time.

19. The Royal Mail Steamer Caldonia arrived at this port on the second day. The following are the dates of the arrivals of the vessels of this line since they began to run, with the number of days occupied by the trip. The Union had a longer trip between Liverpool and Quebec than any other vessel, June 3-13, 12 days; Britain, July 15, 11-12 days; America, August 17, 12-12 days; Britannia, Sept. 11, 13, 12-12 days; Caledonia, Oct. 3, 13, 12-12 days; Acadia, Oct. 17, 12-12 days; Britain, Nov. 3, 13, 12-12 days; Caledonia, Nov. 18, 14, 12-12 days. The average length of these 100 vessels, inclusive of that of the Union, has been about 12 1/2 days. Their average length of the passages out, about 12 1/2 days.

28. Richard C. Esq., a highly respectable citizen, was found dead in his cellar. He had been for some days past superintending the erection of a furnace. He rose in the morning about his usual hour, and went up the cellar, but soon returned to his chamber for his razor, which he took up his cellar, where he cut his throat, and died almost instantly.

## OCTOBER.

2. The last night of the Ellister exhibition in Boston.

## JANUARY.

1. A riot was raised in New York, by a turbulent portion of the Fire Department, who committed the most brutal outrages in a number of police houses kept by German emigres — They were at length fired at in one house which they had surrounded, and one of their leaders, John Armstrong, a young man of 22, was instantly killed. His death seemed to co-operate powerfully with the peace of putting down the notorious disorders of his comrades.

1. Poston's Advertiser, said to be

1. According to a record kept by the American Steamship and Friend Society during the year 1839, the number of vessels lost in this year, including 51 vessels lost in the river, including 51 in the close of 1838, amounted to that year, 442. In addition to the above losses there were reported 35 missing vessels, which, according to the records, probably enter into loss.

6. Judge S. C. decided in the U. States Circuit Court, that a whaling voyage is not a long enough voyage, in the common commercial sense of the words, and that to exact a bond at the

Custom House from whalers, for the return of seamen, is not authorized by law.

10. The penny postage act went into effect in England.

11. News of the loss by fire of ship *H. H. Howe*, from Calcutta for Boston, was received at the latter place. Five persons were lost including the supercargo and two passengers. The captain and the remainder of the officers and crew, after being seven days in the long boat, landed near Penang.

13. It was decided by the Court in the case of the Africans of the Amistad, that they should be delivered up to the Executive of the U. States, to be returned to their homes in Africa; that the cabin boy, Antonio, should be delivered to the Spanish Minister as the property of the heirs of Capt. Ferrar, and that Lieut. Gedney should have \$3 1/3 per cent. salvage on vessel and cargo.

13. The steamer *Levington*, Capt. Child, was destroyed by fire on Long Island Sound. We have not space to record the particulars of a calamity, which at the time were recounted in all the public prints, and were so deeply impressed upon the whole community. By this unparalleled calamity, 55 passengers and 37 of the boat's company perished, among whom were many well known and most valuable members of society. Four only of all on board were saved.

23. One Joseph Baker, in Philadelphia, was sentenced to pay damages to the amount of \$196, for a libel, consisting in an anonymous letter, directed to a third person, charging the plaintiff with dishonesty in his service.

27. Commodore Chauncy died at Washington. He entered the service in September, 1798, and with the exception of Commanders Burton, Stewart and Hull, who entered the navy in March of the same year, he was the oldest officer in the service.

28. The National House of Representatives adopted the following addition to its Standing Rules:

*Resolved*, That upon the presentation of any memorial or petition praying for the abolition of slavery or the slave trade in any District, Territory, or State of the Union, and upon the presentation of any resolution, or other paper touching that subject, the reception of such memorial, petition, resolution, or paper, shall be left on the table, without debate or further action thereon.

That no petition, memorial, resolution, or other paper praying the abolition of slavery in the District of Columbia, or any State or Territory, or the slave trade between the States or Territories of the United States in which it now exists, shall be received by this House, or entertained in any way whatever.

29. A Mrs. Randolph, of Brooklyn, N. Y., lost her life by taking arsenic for magnesia. The apothecary who furnished the medicine, to prove his innocence in her consciousness, swallowed a portion of the powder sent to Mrs. R. In a short time he became dangerously ill and was only recovered by prompt and skilful medical aid.

### FEBRUARY.

5. The warm rains and mild weather at the opening of this month, caused a tremendous freshet on the Connecticut River and its tributaries; a great many bridges were carried down stream, and the Connecticut cut itself a new channel, for a considerable distance, in a part of its course just below Northampton.

10. On this day was married, Alexandria Victoria, Queen of Great Britain, to his Royal Highness, Prince Albert Augustus Charles Emanuel, of Saxe Coburg Gotha.

11. The "French Exchange" at New Orleans was destroyed by fire; loss about \$700,000. Sixteen persons are said to have perished beneath the falling ruins.

11. The Virginia Legislature elected T. W. Gilmer, the Whig candidate, Governor of that State, for three years from the 1st of the ensuing March.

13. Long Island Sound was freed from ice after a suspension of navigation of 27 days.

15. Thomas Carver, the friend and disciple of Thomas Paine, died at New York, aged 85 years.

16. Col. Carey, of Greene County, N. Y., made a donation of \$10,000 toward the establishment of a Collegiate Seminary for the education of common School Teachers in the 8th Senatorial District.

22. Mr. Howland Dyer, pilot of the steamer *Long Vt.*, lost his life at Castle by the bursting of a cannon, while firing a salute in honor of the day. Mr. Dyer was in command of the *Vt.* when he saved so many lives from the steamer *Royal Tier*. He was considered the best pilot on that coast.

### MARCH.

2. Colon J. Newcomb, first Teller of the Manhattan Bank in New York, associated with some \$50,000 of the funds of that institution.

3. The news was received in New York of the beginning of hostilities between the British and Chinese at Canton, by an action between two groups of war of the former and 23 war junks of

the latter, several of which were sunk, with a loss of 200 men. The British sustained no loss of life, but had little injury to their vessels, although their commanders gave credit to the Chinese Admiral for fighting bravely.

3. Mr. F. Seadwyer, upholsterer, was burnt to death, and his wife and child so much injured by the fire and explosion, as to leave no hope of their surviving, at 6 P. M. in South Liberty street, N. Y.

11. Ex-Governor Wolfe, Collector of Philadelphia, died of an affection of the heart. He was observed to falter as he ascended the steps of the Custom House, and a clotting fit brought him, but almost instantaneously sank dead.

14. The Mexican Statesman said that a little girl, a six or seven years old, residing near Liverpool in that Territory, was frightened to death by her brother, a small lad, who dressed himself in a striped bear skin and gave chase to her.

15. A boy was killed in Philadelphia by flying under the wheels of a fire engine, having tripped while he had hold of the rigging.

18. Marcus Morton and Nathan Willis were recommended as candidates for Governor and Lieutenant Governor of the Commonwealth, by a convention of the administration members of the Legislature.

21. Six children of the family of Mr. Austin Yonkers, N. Y., were turned to death by a fire which consumed their father's house. One of them, a young man of nine years, had escaped, but returning to attempt to save some of the others, perished in the attempt.

24. The U. States House of Representatives convened in session from 12 o'clock Tuesday morning to 5 o'clock Wednesday evening, using twenty-nine hours, the most extraordinary sitting of Congress ever knew. The struggle was between the Whigs who wished to be heard on the question of the bill for issuing treasury notes, and the friends of the administration, who wished to get it out of the Committee of the whole, where it was not under the control of the previous question. Twenty-nine hours is a very good "day's work" for any body of men.

24. The steamer *Bunker Hill* from New York for New Haven, was run ashore to keep her from sinking, having been struck by a squall and split amidships.

25. James Wood, who was tried in Philadelphia for the murder in the preceding September, of his daughter, Mrs. Peas, was acquitted on the ground of insanity.

There were several large fires this month in different parts of the Union. One in Newark, N. J., loss \$10,000, one

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in Newark, N. J., which destroyed 15 or 20 houses; the rainfall, except in the same place (about \$4,000) was also general; the most severe, a heavy rain storm in Chepachet, R. I., was about \$30,000, and another at Dover, N. H., loss about \$10,000.

### APRIL.

1. Dr. Disney, the first teller of the Bank of Virginia, at Roanoke, was discovered to have also mixed with \$35,000. He afterwards returned to Roanoke to trial, by a judge of the circuit, and a preliminary investigation was held, but the cause has not yet come on for argument.

3. Several firemen lost their lives by the fall of the walls of a building, during a fire in New York, which destroyed buildings Nos. 92 and 94, Exchange street.

9. A very curious case of attempted murder and suicide occurred at North Brookfield, in the State of Whipple Bartlett, who is described as being a master of his disposition, appears to have cherished feelings of revenge against a few individuals, and determined to carry them out. He secured a load of wood and deposited it in a pasture in Brookfield, and left a trunk containing all his clothes and other property at the spot. Having converted a few other articles into money, he took a wagon and went to North Brookfield, where he attempted to collect the sum due him, and when he failed, to shoot the debtors with a pistol. In one instance he was prevented, in another he wounded, though not seriously, his object, and seeing him fall, took to his wagon and drove to the place where the wood was piled. Having placed the trunk upon the pile he set it on fire, and putting himself so as to fall upon it, blew it up and was blown to pieces. ## MAY.

4. The Whig Young Men's Convention was held at Baltimore, (Md.) There were upwards of 6000 delegates present, and every State in the Union was represented.

4. By the fall of a bridge on the Catskill and Canajoharie Railroad, in Durham, N. York, a whole train of five cars was precipitated into the creek, a dozen or more persons being killed. In this manner they说, the fire gradually increased, until the Island at about three in the afternoon, when they strike the ship Clifton, from Liverpool, bound to New York, on board of which the crew and passengers of the burning ship were received with all possible despatch. There were 33 passengers, of whom 8 were women and children, and the crew consisted of 28 officers and men. They saved nothing except the clothes they had on, and a few light articles of small value. There were \$70,000 in specie on board. The passengers presented a beautiful silver cup to Capt. Antony, as a grateful acknowledgement of the coolness, energy, and presence of mind, which he displayed, under these most trying circumstances.

29. A freshet in the Savannah River, caused a great loss of property. The loss at Hamburgh was estimated at \$500,000, and that at Augusta from \$500,000 to \$1,000,000.

## JUNE.

2. The State of Pennsylvania decreed a direct tax to cover the debts and expenses of the Government. The following are the leading principles of taxation. One mill on every dollar of real and personal property now subject to county rates and levies; and on all other personal property, including stocks, one half mill on each one per cent. of dividends, interest and profit accruing thereon. One per cent. on furniture costing over \$500. One per cent. on pleasure carriages, and from 1 to 50 cents on watches, &c. It was computed that the tax would put into the Treasury upwards of \$1,600,000 per annum, which is enough to make up the deficiency of revenue and pay the interest on the public debt.

2. Mrs. Martha Johnson, who died in Salem, left \$25,000 to the Massachusetts Lunatic Hospital, in trust for poor patients from the County of Essex, and an annuity of \$200 to Jno. Briscoe, the deaf, dumb, and blind girl at Hartford.

10. An audience of gondoliers respectively approached, accidentally stumbled into the splendid China store of Mr. Tyndall in Chestnut Street, Philadelphia, and broke one of the large plate glass windows. He walked into the store,

and having coolly inquired what damage he had done, was informed that the plate glass cost twenty dollars. He presented a hundred dollar bill and received his change, eighty dollars, and walked off as if nothing had happened. The note proved to be counterfeit, so that it would appear the stranger was willing to break an expensive glass for the sake of breaking his bill.

17. A great Whig Convention was held at Worcester, at which Mr. Lawrence, of Birmingham, presided. There was a collision on the railroad between 2 trains of cars employed in conveying delicacies, but the result of it was much less serious than was at first represented. But two persons were much hurt, and neither of them dangerously. 28. A little girl about seven years old, came to her death in Yonkton, S.D., by the most extreme cardiness with regard to gunpowder. With a brother about her own age, she had gone into a chamber, in which was a box containing fourteen pounds of powder, with a candle of fire, to "blow some powder." The boy held the candle while his sister blew it. He then threw it into the box and ran. The explosion resulted in the death of the little girl after enduring the most excruciating pain for about three hours. The boy escaped, only having his hair somewhat burned.

## JULY.

4. The celebrations of the 4th in this part of the country, were mostly peaceful. The great patriotic celebrations were held at Lynn, Lexington, Larre, Quincy, etc. and the whist gatherings at Salem, Dedham, Braintree, Concord, and many other places. Each seemed to give full satisfaction to those of each party who joined in them. We cannot hope, however, that another year, when perhaps the fervor of political excitement may be a little reduced, that the celebration of a national jubilee may not be made the opportunity of increasing the differences of feeling between neighbour and neighbour.

In New York the firing of guns, pistols and crackers was carried beyond all former examples, and the day was set on fire in some half dozen places, and many accidents and injuries occurred, some of them of a very sad character. Several lives were lost in the fire which occurred.

The Sum Treasury Bill was signed by the President at 12 o'clock, noon.

7. Commodore Elliot who was tried in Philadelphia by Court Martial, on sundry charges, was sentenced to a suspension of his functions for 6 years, and the withholding of his pay for two years. The President struck off the last clause, so as to confine the punishment to a suspension of duty, leaving the Commodore on full pay.

8. Morton, the *Hyena*, died in London, a consistent quack. He took fifty pills on the day of his death, and refused to see a physician, saying that if the pills would not cure him, nothing would.

13. An Irish laborer in N. Haven, in digging a foundation, cut across a canal containing a stone pier 20 feet wide, and other pieces of wood, all bearing date prior to the year 1758.

15. A Mr. McKeown received \$5,323 damages against Messrs. Neil, Moore & Co., stage coaches proprietors in Ohio, for injuries resulting from the upsetting of one of their coaches, while in the charge of a driver incapable of managing the horses.

23. A startling collision occurred at sea between the steamboats *Nova*, *Carcass* and *Governor Duer*, about 60 miles south of Williamsburg, while the boats were each making at the rate of from 12 to 14 knots an hour. It resulted in the entire loss of the former boat, with the passengers' baggage and L. Stiles M.D., but, fortunately, no lives lost.

24. Two individuals who were concerned in a riot at Philadelphia on the evening of the 27th, were on the 29th tried and found guilty, and sentenced the one to ten, and the other to seven years imprisonment in the penitentiary. They have no reason to complain of the "law's delay."

## AUGUST.

3. The action of Heaviside against Dr. Lardner, came on at Lewes, in the County of Sussex, the first week in August. It appeared in existence, that the defendant, an accomplished and elegant man, of great literary attainments, had employed all the resources of his mind to accomplish the seduction of Mrs. Heaviside, who was the daughter of Col. Sykes, of the Lancasters. Mrs. Heaviside has three children, two girls and a boy. The eldest girl was 11 years old, the second 13, and the boy 6. The young parties, it appeared, elapsed from Dr. Lardner's house, and remained at the Strand, London, where they finally discovered living in Paris as man and wife. The plaintiff followed them, found them in Belgium at Louvain, where he and his companion resided at a very pretentious establishment upon the Dyle. Many letters were found, containing strong language from all parties, that the illicit intercourse had been on a grand scale by the art of Dr. Lardner, and the boy rendered a verdict of *negligent thousand pounds*, for the plaintiff.



Dr. Lardner and Mrs. Hevesi afterwards, having lived for a time in Paris as man and wife, came to this country, where their progress was well marked by the numerous newspaper notices of their visits to the theatres of different cities.

5. The Baptist Meeting House in Lancaster, Mass., was destroyed by fire.

17. The ship *Francois*, Jones, of New York, from New Orleans for Liverpool, with a cargo of between 500 and 600 lbs. of tobacco, and 600 bales of cotton, was struck by lightning in lat. 23° 45', lon. 89° 58', and soon after was discovered to be on fire. As soon as possible, every opening from below was closed tight, and the small course altered for Havasu, at which port she arrived on the 19th inst. She was there scuttled, and the fire extinguished.

22. In Albany, by the fall of the draw of the State street canal-boats bridge, from 10 to 80 persons, and 3 or 4 horses and carts were precipitated into the basin. They fell about twenty feet into 12 feet of water. The number of those lost is not ascertained to be twenty-three. A doctor, who was the cause of the collapse of the crowd, under the weight of which the draw gave way, was taken hold of in the water by a man in a small boat; but he lost the hand of the man, who was attempting to save him, and the bold being released, he was drowned.

27. A young lady at Nantucket, by a complaint before a justice, recovered twenty dollars and damages for a kiss, inflicted on her in a street of that town.

#### SEPTEMBER.

2. A pleasure boat in the harbour of Portland, when returning with a party from a visit to the U. S. squadron, then in that harbour, was struck by a squall, upset, and sunk. By this accident, notwithstanding the extreme possible assistance, five young ladies, between the ages of 11 and 18, lost their lives.

13. Some anti-slaveholders in Cornish, N. H., to avenge themselves upon the Rev. Mr. Burroughs, the Baptist Clergyman in that town, for his having exchanged with a colored Clergyman on the previous Sunday, introduced a black ram into his pulpit before the commencement of the services. Upon finding his pulpit thus proscenoped, Mr. Burroughs retired to another part of the church, and upon this text read his audience such a treat of doctrine, that it was thought the perpetrators of the joke would be soon induced to claim the credit of it.

15. A Convention of the friends of the existing administration was held

at Springfield. Three or four thousand delegates were present, and Mr. Chase, of Berkshire, was chosen President.

29. A melancholy incident occurred in Brooklyn, New York, which is yet, wrapped in mystery. A fine girl, only twelve years old, named Maria Phelps, only daughter of Mr. Phelps of Warren street, went from home in the forenoon, and was seen no more until evening, when he was found in a vacant lot near Bergen street, lying dead on the ground, with a large incision in the carotid artery, the infliction of which must have caused immediate death. The extreme youth of the deceased, forbids the supposition that he would have committed suicide, and at the same time, it is impossible to imagine a motive which should have induced any person to murder him.

#### OCTOBER.

18. William H. Rossy, of Carlisle, Pa., put an end to his life at Brammer's Hotel, Baltimore, by shooting himself in his right eye. Mr. R. was a member of the last, and recently elected to the present, Congress from the thirteenth Congressional District of Pennsylvania.

27. There was a slight fall of snow in Boston, but a much more severe one at the North and West of us. At Hartford the snow fell to the depth of nearly six inches, so that the Hartford and New Haven Railroad cars became laid up. At Guilford, N. H., at six o'clock on the morning of the 26th, the snow was seven inches deep, and was still falling. At Nashua it fell to the depth of four or five inches. At New York there was rain but no snow, and the weather cleared off cold.

31. A boy about nine years old, in Baltimore, lost the sight of both his eyes by the discharge of a small cannon. Another boy applied the match while he was looking into the muzzle

#### NOVEMBER.

12. Professor Davis of the Virginia University was killed by a pistol shot from a masked student, who was engaged with others in a noisy College row. He survived the wound 48 hours. The student guilty of the act has since confessed.

14. In the *Habeas Corpus* case of D'Hauteville, argued at great length before the Court of General Sessions in Philadelphia, the Court delivered its opinion. It decided that the custody of the child must be at the discretion of the Court, and giving it in this instance to the mother.

22. The snow storm of this week extended along the sea coast as far

south as Virginia. It was said that at and near "Atacon, N. J." there was a very heavy fall of snow—12 inches deep on a level.

26. The remains of General Hugh Mercer, who died at Philadelphia in consequence of wounds received in the battle of Princeton, Jan. 3, 1777, and

was buried in Christ Church yard, Philadelph., were interred on the 24th, and on this day a funeral service in the Laurel Cemetery was attended by a great concourse of people. The remains were very imposing, and an impressive address was delivered by Wm. D. Reed, Esq.

#### Fires in Boston during the year 1840.

##### JANUARY.

1. Building No. 2 North Market street, occupied as a cigar factory and clothing establishment. Damage considerable.

12. House No. 173 Tremont street, opposite the Tremont House. The fire was confined to the upper part of the house, and most of the furniture was removed.

13. Provision Store corner of Tremont and Elliot st. Damage slight.

##### FEBRUARY.

21. Building Nos. 22 and 24 Central st., occupied by Augustus Brown and Elmer & Edwards, both with stocks of dry goods. The goods were considerably damaged by the water, smoke and flames.

26. A stout 5 A. M. wooden building on the corner of Cushing and Charter Row, built by Kimball & Copp as a W. J. Goods store, and John Charlton, as a Jems shop. Nearly the whole contents of the building were destroyed. K. and C. were insured \$3,000, and Mr. Charlton had some insurance.

26. 10 P. M., grocery store of Spaulding & Moulton, under the church in Broadstreet st. Extinguished with little loss. Fully covered by ins.

##### MARCH.

22. A small shanty in N. Market st. Loss trifling.

24. Joseph Chapman's hat and cap store, No. 5 Cornhill st. The building owned by E. & S. Palmer, was not much injured, but the stock, valued at about \$1,200, suffered considerably both from fire and water. Insured.

31. Printing office of Mr. Oaks, in the fourth story of Huskiss's building, corner of Court and Howard sts.

##### APRIL.

We believe the engines were not called out at all during this month.

##### MAY.

There were several alarms, but the engines were only set upon the occasions of the night burning of the roof of a building, at 1 P. M. Burning of some hay

in a stable, doing the tailing trifling damage.

##### JUNE.

2. A small stable on Canal street, attached to the wood wharf of Mr. Coffin, and soon afterwards set fire in a stable on Friend street. Both fires attributed to incendiaries. Soon after another building, situated on Brighton street, and owned by Mr. G. Taylor and occupied as a carpenter's shop by Theo. Burr, was set on fire—\$500. Building burned.

23. Stable in North Market street, owned by Mr. Bradstreet et al., occupied by Messrs. White and South truckmen. The building and its contents were nearly consumed. There were no horses in the stable at the time. Fire attributed to incendiaries.

25. Workshop of John Ross, tailor, in Thorndike's building, Congress sq. The fire, attributed to an incendiary, was soon subdued, with little damage.

##### JULY.

3. Store No. 34, Tremont Row, owned by Mr. Philip Carter. The fire originated in the third story, occupied by Mr. Gale, writing master. The floor below was occupied by E. Ashton—a natural history room—and the linen was care of Benjamin Jacobs, whose stock was considerably damaged by water. The building also was much damaged.

11. Store of W. L. Harting, South Boston. It was a large wooden building, and was destroyed with nearly all the stock. Stock, \$2,000. \$2000. A wheelwright's shop adjoining, received some injury.

##### AUGUST.

4. Carpenter's shop in Haworth st. Supposed to have been set on fire. Damaged \$1,000.

17. Haworth's Exchange saloon, caught by the hand of a match. Damaged \$500.

23. Gardner's 12th & Duxbury, in Hall House st., partially destroyed, with 100 lbs. of flour and several mosaics. The fire originated in Edwards' carpenter's shop, opposite. The referee of Mr. Bowes, a man who was wholly destroyed, loss 12,000, cover-



ed by insurance. It is believed that the distillery was struck by lightning.

#### SEPTEMBER.

**2.** Building No. 62, Commercial st., the principal loss was in the stock of Mr. Lincoln, mathematical instrument maker, which was however insured. The fire caught from the flue of a cooking stove in a front cellar.

**25.** Distillery in Distil House Square, belonging to Bernard J. Trail, with the store rooms, warehouse, out houses, etc., were destroyed, with a considerable quantity of molasses & rum. Loss about \$12,000—no insurance.

A large double three story dwelling house, owned I occupied by John M. Barnard, No. 10, Hawkins street, at the bottom of Charlton street, was burned down, the furniture saved. A large double three story house adjoining, No.

Hawkins street, was also destroyed—furniture saved. This also belonged to Mr. Barnard, insurance \$6,000 on both houses. A large dwelling house, No. 5 Hawkins street, owned by widow Moore, and occupied by her and another person, was also destroyed. Also a two-story dwelling house in the rear. The stable, and out-buildings attached to the distillery of Augustus S. Homes, at the corner ofivers street, were also burned down.

Opposite B. & T's distillery is a large dwelling belonging to A. H. Bowman, who also has a distillery belonging to W. French, both of which were somewhat injured, and saved with much difficulty from being burnt. A house in Distilhouse Square, owned by Mr. Balger, and occupied by a number of families, was considerably injured, and the furniture was damaged.

#### Biographies of Eminent Men,

Written by Alen Bradford, Esq., for the Boston Almanac.

**Rev. THOMAS THACHER,** was the first minister of the Old South church, as it has now been long called. This church was founded in 1674, by successors of the former congregation of the later meeting Rev. John Davenport, from New Haven, to their minister. Davenport was deemed very rigid in some things, and would baptize no children, unless the parents were in full communion with the church, while many at that time, were in favor of baptizing the children of parents who had been baptized, and made a profession of their faith in Christ. At that period there was a warm dispute on this subject, and good men were to be found on either side, contending earnestly, that each was right. When Mr. Davenport was installed in Boston, a large part of the first church separated, and formed a new church and society, now the Old South. Mr. Thacher had been sometime the minister of Weymouth, before he was ordained over the church in Boston. He was a good scholar, an able divine, and a physician of reputation, in that day. It was not uncommon then for the clergy to study and practise medicine. This was true of Rev. Leonard Hooper, sometime President of Harvard College, and of Rev. Isaac Chauncy, a son of President Chauncy. Mr. Thacher came early to Massachusetts, and was a man of liberal education. He married a daughter of Mr. Col. John Partridge of Dorchester, in Plymouth Colony, and the respectable father of the name of Thacher in New England, including many able ministers of the gospel,

trace their descent from him. He was minister of the old South Church about eight years, and until his death.

**Rev. JOHN DAVENPORT,** referred to in the former article, was minister of the first church about three years, and died suddenly. He was born a theologian, and published some works in poetic divinity. He zealously contended against what he called a dangerous innovation, the baptism of children whose parents were not members of the church, though professing their belief in the Christian religion, and of other life and conversation.

**Rev. JAMES ALLEN,** was settled as a colleague with Mr. Davenport, in the first church, Dec. 1655; and continued several years, after his death, until 1710; though most of that time there was another pastor of the church. He had been an ordained minister in England; and was one of those ejected 1651-52, soon after the restoration of Charles II, when the puritans and non-conformists were treated with great severity and injustice. He had the character of a scholar and an able divine. While in Boston, he was highly esteemed, as a faithful pastor, and as exemplary Christian. He was an overseer of Harvard College, many years; and always consulted the welfare and prosperity of that institution. With Mr. Allen, Rev. John Greenbridge was several years associated, in the ministerial office, over the first church. He too, retired from England, at the present of intolerance and

persecution already mentioned under King Charles II; when a large number of worthy ministers were prohibited from preaching in that country, because they did not conform to the rites and forms of the established church, nor approve of the principles taught among the Puritans. Mr. Greenbridge lived only four or five years after his settlement in Boston; but left a good name as a Christian and Christian minister.

**EZEKIEL CHEEVER,** the grammarian and schoolmaster, passed the last years of his life in Boston. He came early to New England, and lived twelve years at New Haven, in the useful employment of instructing youth, who were well classed scholars; and he published a Latin grammar, called "The Accidence," which was in general use in teaching the Latin language, for more than a century. He lived to a great age, being nearly thirty at his decease in 1715. When he left N. Haven in 1550, he removed into Massachusetts Colony, and was sometime teacher of youth in Ipswich; thence he removed to Charlestown, where he continued nine years, in the same employment. He then settled in Boston, and kept a grammar school for thirty-eight years, with great reputation as a classical scholar. His pupils were usually left for prepared for College, than those of any other instructor of that period. Mr. Cheever wrote on the Scripture prophecies; and he was esteemed an able theologian, as well as a most exemplary Christian. Cotton Mather preached his funeral sermon, and did well by his pastor and teacher thirty-seven years before. He was a Christian of the old fashion, says Dr. Mather, "an old New England Christian." His son was the first minister of Marblehead.

**Rev. INCREASE MATHER,** a son of Rev. Richard Mather, of Dorchester, was the second ordained minister of the second church in Boston, at the north part of the town, and was settled

A Mr. Mather was the first, settled a few years after Rev. Mather; but was soon superseded by the brighter rising star, and little has been recorded of him.

in 1665. The church had been formed several years, and had 100 members for a time occasionally. He was educated at Harvard College, and was eminent as a scholar and a divine. He had the reputation, also, of being an able metaphysician, and churchman. He early wrote against the doctrine of chance of bearing children, whose parents were not members of the church. His father, then living, took the other side of the question, and seems to have been more liberal in his sentiments than the son. It is not uncommon that men become more liberal as they advance in life, and their knowledge increases—Mr. Mather was sometime President of Harvard College, but continued to be the pastor of the North Church. In 1665, while Andros was tyrannizing over the colony, Mr. Mather went to England, as agent in its behalf. He embarked privately, as he was not sent by the authority, but by the respects of many respectable individuals. Soon after he arrived in England, he received a tract from the Soc. for the Propagation of the Gospel, which gave him the name of that kingdom. He soon treated with royal authority, the king, and procured a new charter for Massachusetts, in which equal privileges and powers, in most respects, to those in the first charter which had been granted by King James, in 1655, just before Andros was made Governor. In the new charter, however, the king returned the privilege of appointing the governor, lieutenant-governor, and secretary of the province. After his return from England, Mr. Mather continued President of the college for several years, when he resigned the office, rather than leave his people, it being then ordered by the overseers that the president should live in Cambridge. He was the first minister who received the degree of D. D. from Harvard College; and no other person had him honored with it for upwards of fifty years afterwards. Mr. Mather lived to 85, and died 1723, senior pastor of the 2d Church in Boston. He was the father of the celebrated Cotton Mather, who was also a very learned man, but not so judicious and wise as the parent.

**Rev. CHARLES MORTON** came from England to Massachusetts towards the end of the 17th century. He was one of the most popular of his day, and was much sought after to come to N. Eng. by the expectation of being president of Harvard College, which stood out distinct and independent of Boston. But before he arrived, another was appointed. He then settled over the church in Cambridge, and there remained till his death, in 1708, aged 72. He was



however, chosen one of the corporation, and was sometimes styled vice-president. He excelled most men of that period in the knowledge of mathematics and natural philosophy. There was a textbook on physics, used in the college for some time, which was written by Mr. Morton. He also delivered lectures on the subject to some of the members of the College, at his house in Charlestown. His great knowledge was favorable to liberal views in religion, and he had a more tolerant and charitable spirit than most of his clerical brethren. His successor called him "very reverend", and says, "he was very greatly celebrated both in Old England and in New." Other writers of the generation next after him, also spoke of him as a man of general literature, and one of the greatest scholars who had then visited and resided in the colony. "He had a happy talent for winning youth to the love of virtuous learning, by his pleasant conversation and a familiar way of explaining difficult subjects. He had a sweet natural temper, and a generous public spirit." One of his essays has the title of peacemaker, and one was published in the Philosophical Transactions, in 1763.

**EDWARD GIBBONS** was distinguished as an enterprising man, as a resourceable merchant, as a brave soldier, and a judicious legislator. He had landed estates at Wimblington, but resided chiefly in Boston. Perhaps Wimblington was then a part of Boston, as Noddle's Island has always been. He was one of the Representatives from Boston in 1638, and for ten years afterwards. In 1644, he was chosen Major General of the militia, or commander-in-chief under the Governor, of the military force of Massachusetts; and in this station he was commanded for nine or ten years. He had great firmness and decision of character, both as a civil magistrate and a military officer. He engaged largely also in commercial pursuits, and in the prosecution of his plans of this kind, he visited the West Indies with a vessel of his own, in part, and furnished a large amount of goods to a French trader in the then Nova Scotia, the most of which he lost, and was thus reduced to poverty, when advanced in years. In some of his trading enterprises he was associated with Mr. Mervier, who lived on Noddle's Island, and who was living there when Boston was settled in 1639.

**ROBERT KEAYNE** arrived at Boston in an early period of its settlement, and was long a prominent citizen of the town. In 1638, four years after the first General Court in Massachusetts,

he was one of the Representatives from Boston, and the same year was chosen Speaker. He was a Representative from the town for seven years after, though not without the intervention of some years. Mr. Keayne was also distinguished as a military character. He was the first commander of the artillery company, now known as the *Ancient and Honorable*. The company was formed in 1638-39, and proved a nursery for young men of military taste. And at that period it was necessary for the safety of the Colony, to have armed and disciplined force, as some tribes of Indians were always hostile towards the English settlers. The officers and most of the company were of respectable families, and peculiar privileges were granted the corps by the General Court. Captain Keayne favored and promoted the project making a settlement in New England two or three years before the Massachusetts company came; and was one of the merchant adventurers who assisted the Plymouth people in 1626. There is thus full evidence of his being a zealous puritan, and an early promoter of the plantation at Boston and the vicinity.

**JOHN LEVERETT** was Governor of Massachusetts from 1673 to 1719. He had been deputy governor when Bellngham was chief magistrate; and when he succeeded that able statesman, was several years younger than some of the assistants. He had also been Major General in the Colony, and was often employed in other public business. He was the principal of a board of commissioners appointed to govern Maine, at that time under the jurisdiction of Massachusetts, though other claims were set up to govern it. The administration of Gov. Leverett has been represented as "wise, just, firm and liberal." He was several years a Representative from Boston in the General Court, and in 1651 was Speaker of the House. As one of the popular leaders and magistrates, he may notice the unpopularity as yet shown to his memory, at his funeral. The civil and military parade on the occasion was greater than before known in the country. One of his sons was Judge of the Superior Court in Massachusetts, and afterwards many years the able and popular president of Harvard College, in the early part of the last century.

**SIMON BRAIDSTRETT**, who succeeded Leverett as chief magistrate, was an inhabitant of Salem and not of Boston, so we only refer to him, therefore, as a public character in the Colony. He came over with the first company in

1630, when he was quite young, and soon after he had finished his education, which was at one of the universities in England. His character was very respectable, both for party and talents. He was one of the assistants, and in 1651 was an agent for the Colony to the court of Charles II. When Simon became governor in 1679, he was an old man, but he was in that and several years before the arbitrary Andros was appointed by King James II. He survived others of the first company, and left a son who was a settled clergyman in Clermont town.

**SAMUEL SEWALL**, a citizen of Boston, near the close of 16th and in beginning of 17th century, was a distinguished character both as a lawyer and judge, and as a general scholar. The father of Judge Sewall was one of the early freemen of Massachusetts, and a worthy character, and the family has been numerous and respectable. Samuel Sewall held the very responsible and honorable office of chief justice of the Superior Court of the Colony for several years. He had the character of an able and upright judge, but that period few if any Massachusetts were so learned in the law as may have been in later times. Rev. Dr. Sewall, pastor of the Old South Church was his son, and two of the family, Stephen and Samuel, have been chief justices of the highest judicial tribunal, another a judge of some court, and two held the office of attorney general in the Province. Judge Sewall was also some years one of the Supreme Executive Council in Massachusetts; but at a later period, not however till the revolution, it was considered that the office of judge was incompatible with that of a member of the executive. And by our state constitution, a judge of Supreme Judicial Court is properly ineligible as a member of the legislative body. He published a work on that mysterious book, the *Apocalypse*, but without giving much satisfaction by his explanations and conjectures. Judge Sewall

held a journal of events and occurrences, which he considered a duty of course, but it was never published, but the manuscript has been often quoted by historians in referring to the period when the author lived. He died in the year 1730, past 80 years of age.

**Rev. SAMUEL WILLARD** succeeded Mr. Thaxter, as pastor of the South Church in 1678, and continued in that station 30 years. He had been settled at Groton, a few years before them a new frontier settlement in Massachusetts, and was obliged to flee with most of the inhabitants, on account of the general war against the English, at the instigation of Philip, sachem of Mount Hope. Mr. Willard was a learned and orthodox divine, according to the theology of his time of that day. He published a "body of divinity", which is scarcely read or known at present. He was some years vice-president of Harvard College, and acted as a presider of that seminary. His memory is always highly cherished by scholars and laymen, as one of the learned men of that age. Like Dr. Mather he resided in Boston, to be among the people of his charge, but often visited the college to converse with the pupils and teachers, and to assist in its literary labors. Several occasional sermons written by Mr. Willard, were published, and were deemed sound, judicious, and useful discourses. They cover much reading and reflection. Mr. Willard did not favor the prosecution against the pretended witches in 1692; it seems he thought it a delusion and an error, while Dr. Mather and many other clergymen approved of the severe and cruel treatment of such those most unfortunate persons, who were charged with aiding a covenant with the devil. Rev. Joshua More, also their preaching in Boston, was strongly opposed to the prosecutions against the accused, and issued a paper to reprove Jacob Willard, a few years after that period, the worthy secretary of the Province, was his son.

**Fire Department of the City of Boston, 109**

WILLIAM BARNICOAT, *Chief Engineer.*

The whole department, embracing not far from 500 members, is under the immediate control of the chief engineer and his lieutenant. The fire department of Boston is a numerous one. There are 16 engines, and about 10,000 feet of hose, in excellent condition. All belonging to the department are paid for their services, the entire expense of personal service is about \$33,000 annually; and for the entire support of the department, including apparatus, nearly \$50,000. It would be a difficult undertaking to particularize all the advantages accruing to the city from the organization of this invaluable institution. Many thing

is imperiously required to perfect the system, it is a constant trial to increase the strength of the fire. Unnecessary fatigue, loss of time, and expense, and the like, are among the greatest trials which afflict the city. The cost of apparatus is high. In New York, and in neighboring cities, there is a watchfulness always kept, night and day, in an elevated position, where he has a clear view of the whole town, to strike the fire bell on the first intimation of alarm. When a similar measure is adopted in Boston, it will at once be an advantage to be a great public convenience.

**Boston Post Office.**

NATHANIEL GREENE, *Post-Master.*

From small beginnings in the early history of Boston the Post Office has become an extensive establishment, requiring the most orderly division of labor to ensure regularity in the dispatch of letters and packages which are not only designed for all sections of the United States, but even Europe. Since the line of steamboats commenced running between Boston and Liverpool, the business has been exceedingly increased, and an enlargement of the office necessarily followed to meet the demands of

## LOWELL.\*

(Written for the Boston Almanac, by Eliza Fuller, Esq., of Lowell.)

This City comprises a small territory, not exceeding two miles square. The easterly part of Chelmsford in the County of Middlesex, was incorporated into a town by the name of Lowell, in March, 1826. Ten years afterward, in 1836, the town became a chartered City. Before the city was created, a small section of Tewksbury had been annexed to the town.

The population on the territory in 1820, was less than 200, and the valuation of the property not exceeding \$10,000; in 1830, the census shows a population of 20,961 souls, and the assessed valuation places the property at \$12,400,000.

No Courts were held in Lowell, till 1837. In September of that year the Court of Common Pleas held a term in the place, its city hall having been erected at its own expense, and contributed \$10,000 as a donation to the County toward the erection of a jail. Since that time the Common Pleas, and Supreme Judicial Courts, hold each one term annually at Lowell. If courts come tardily, it is not to be inferred that lawyers—heaven's best gift—come with equal reluctance. On the contrary, they were among the pioneers of the settlement. At this moment the profession numbers twenty-five counsellors and attorneys, headed by the Sheriff of the County, two Deputy Sheriffs, some score of Constables, thirty-five Justices of the Peace, and one Justice of the Police Court.

Nor is the legal art abundantly supplied. For the regular breed members of this twenty number above twenty-five, who are an honor to their vocation, and a blessing to the community.

The religious advantages have kept pace with other improvements. All denominations of Christians, known in New England, are represented in the city by able clergymen and large congregations. There are fifteen churches, supplied with skilled ministers, besides three or four congregations, who

\* The Petition for an Act of Incorporation prayed, that the north-easterly part of Chelmsford, might be incorporated as a Town, by the name of "Lowell," The General Court incorporated the town, contrary to the prayer of the petitioners, christened it "Lowell," in honor, it is said, of the late Francis Lowell, Esq., one of the founders of the manufacture,

have constant preaching in Nella, but who have not yet erected themselves. The churches are well situated, occupying a state of room for all convenience, honorable to the community.

The city has been in a condition adequate to its wants. The Lowell Bank, with a capital of \$100,000, was established in 1831. It was organized chiefly to facilitate the financial affairs of the manufacturers, contractors, most of which pay their operators in bills of the bank.

Lowell Fire Department was incorporated in 1839, and organized on the same plan with that of Lowell. The city entire except from the area of any homicide, is protected by the department, at an opportunity to acquire or take fire.

The amount of business done in Lowell, apart from the value of the removal of man substance, is inconsiderable in comparison to the population. There is no wholesale business deserving the name; and the retail trade is confined to meeting the wants of citizens and others in the immediate vicinity. While the facility of intercourse with Boston sends much of the trade of that century, which would otherwise be transacted at Lowell.

The construction of a Railroad to Boston was one of the earliest projects for the advancement of Lowell. The Boston and Lowell Railroad was incorporated in 1839. Sixty rods were made, and the road completed with a single track, passenger cars being run on it from June 1, 1841. It ran from Boston to Lowell, and also to the village of Leominster, the last constructed railroad in the country. The charter of incorporation of the railroad, however, since 1837, has been suspended. The road has not been used as a railway, nor will be completed to Leominster, and will be completed to Lowell in 1841.

The distance from Boston to Lowell is more, for a passenger to deliver, the passenger car must run a day long way. The car is even larger than a stage coach, and runs upon the road to meet the passenger train. The passenger, who goes to Lowell, may pass through Boston, and make a stop-



an hour and a half. The mid-day trains make no stops except one for dinner, and make a trip in one hour and a quarter. Merchant train, post and freight, and passenger trains; the price of transportation is two dollars a ton for common merchandise, and one dollar and a half a ton for coal and other contract materials. The income for freight has sometimes exceeded that from passengers, and at all times approaches almost to an equality.

Ten miles below the city, Andover Branch Railroad unites with Lowell and Boston Railroad. The Andover Branch was opened to Exeter, N. H., in 1810, and is under contract for completion to Dover, N. H.

The Lowell and Nashua Railroad centres at the same passenger depot in Lowell, and runs passenger and other cars at times to meet the trains to and from Boston.

In addition to these facilities, Lowell has lines of stages running in every direction, affording a quick and economical intercourse with all parts of the country.

The means of intellectual cultivation are abundantly supplied in Lowell. For in building up a city with unexampled rapidity, its founders have realized that the mind, not less than the body, had claims on their liberality, and these claims have not been forgotten.

A voluntary association, called a Lyceum, was formed many years since, for the purpose of procuring courses of lectures, and giving opportunity for debates, and has been well sustained to the present time. A few months ago, the Lowell Institute was formed to promote nearly the same ends. There are two newspapers, each published three times a week, taking opposite sides in politics, two weekly general newspapers, from the same offices, and three other weekly papers devoted to religion and literature; and a few months ago, a Magazine, called the "Oscill," wholly written by operatives, was established under the direction of an able clergyman, which does credit to the contributors.

The most remarkable institution is the Mechanics Association. Some intelligent mechanics formed a Society, and obtained an act of incorporation as early as 1815, before the town was incorporated. This object was to furnish opportunities of improvement. For ten years afterward the proprietors of Locks and Canals gave them a lot of land in the heart of the city, wherein the Association erected a large, lock office, to the completion of which all the manufacturing companies contributed with liberal hand. The Mechanics Hall occupies a central position, opposite the

railroad depot; has a spacious hall for lectures, in which the association procures one or more courses to be delivered annually. The association has a library, exceeding 2,000 volumes, arranged—News and Reading Room, supplied with the best newspapers from all parts of the country, and the most approved periodical publications. The room is always open, and subscription to it is cheap, so every one can afford to be a subscriber. In the same building, rooms are provided for charitable and other philosophical purposes, and a collection of 4,000 mineralogical specimens is placed in them.

The system of Public Free Schools will show the regard which the citizens have for good education, and the liberality with which they apply money for its promotion. The whole amount raised by taxation in Lowell to meet the expenses for 1810 was \$50,600, of which 17,500, being more than one third, was appropriated to the support of schools, to be expended for teachers, and supplying fuel. Besides which the city erected in 1810, an elegant edifice for the High School, which cost, including the land, \$28,000; and two houses for Grammar Schools, costing together, more than \$30,000, including the land.

Twenty-four public free schools are now in operation, divided into three grades. Twenty-two are primary schools, taught excepting by females, giving children the first rudiments. Each primary school has one teacher, and averages sixty pupils.

Six Grammar Schools receive the pupils from the Primaries. In four of the Grammar Schools there are two males and two female teachers, each in one male and one female teacher, and in the other, a single male teacher.

The High School is designed to complete the school education. It is divided into a male and a female department, with a male principal in the former, and female principal in the latter. Two male instructors are also employed, who teach the mathematics, languages, and English branches indifferently in both departments. In this school, young men are tried for say of the colleges; and all the pupils have opportunity to pursue such studies and classical studies to any extent which they desire.

Originally the Catholics, who were less than one eighth of the population, were averse to the public schools, and would not send children to them, but they shall be taught with honesty. To obviate this difficulty, Catholic teachers were employed for these schools, whom would best accommodate the Catholic population. The experiment proved

successful. Catholic parents afterwards sent their children promptly to school, and their priests have exerted the best influence on the subject. At this time, five primary schools have Catholic teachers, and are wholly supported by children of Catholic parents; and one grammar school has its three teachers and all its pupils Catholics. There is a number of pupils in Catholic schools in the city above 1,000, and no school in the city shows from quarter to quarter greater improvements, and exerts a greater influence on the character and minds of their pupils. No restriction, however, is imposed on Catholic parents; they may send children to Protestant schools, if they prefer it, and some few avail themselves of the privilege.

The whole number of pupils in all the schools, exceeds four thousand. The two grammar school houses erected in 1810, will be filled with schools in 1811.

The project of using the waters of the Merrimack River at Pawtucket was for manufacturing purposes, originated in 1820. Previously, the Pawtucket canal, which supplies the mills in water, had been cut, by a corporation created in 1792; the canal was intended to transport boats, mules, and teams, around the falls. It was a mile long, from the Merrimack above the Falls, and ended in the Concord River, just above its junction with the Merrimack. The canal is hardly two inches long.

Soon after the project was conceived, the Pawtucket Canal passed into other hands, who used the original corporate name of "Proprietors of Locks and Canals on Merrimack River," in 1822 commenced enlarging and deepening the canal, and putting it in a fit condition to become the feeder of such manufactures as might subsequently be erected. A road dam was then run across the Merrimack River, which obstructed and turned the waters into the canal. This dam has been made more effective from time to time, as additional mills required a greater supply of water. Still the dam is not total; it has been, found, by measurement, that water enough runs to waste in the dry season to drive twenty-five mills. It is now in contemplation to put a right dam across the falls, and to let the water over a dam, parallel to Merrimack River, and thus save the whole amount of waste water.

The Proprietors of Locks and Canals on Merrimack River, are a corporation, or trust of men, who own the manufacturing establishments in Lowell. They own the Pawtucket Canal, which supplies water power to

the mills, and banks and mills on both sides of the river, in the whole water power of the Merrimack and its tributaries. The company is owned and controlled by men of the best experience. They have an extensive machine shop of brick, stone, iron, wood, steel, mill, planer, moulder, with ample workshop, barns, and tool-houses. They give a constant employment to the men, and their families who emigrate are the mechanics for the mills, the cars and locomotives for the railroads, the carts and buggies for the roads, which are sent to every part of the Union.

When a new corporation is created, it contracts with the Proprietors of Locks and Canals, for the land and water power, amounting to 100,000 dollars, a platted number of rods, and a certain annual rent is paid. They correspond with the Proprietors, and at the desired number of rods, and 100,000 dollars with machinery ready to go, a sufficient quantity, ware, and labor is made sufficient for all operations, and the mills. For the water is given gratis, and the new corporation has but little concern in the management, except to observe that every thing is done according to contract, and are first made ready to run.

The arrangement gives ample compensation to the proprietors of the 100,000 rods of Locks and Canals, and enables the new company to appear in the market, at the lowest rates. The machinery can be easily manufactured, for a sum of 300,000 dollars without trouble.

All the mills, ware, carriage, and teaming houses, except the residence houses of the proprietors, are private, rented and let to others.

Even now, the town is composed in mostly, with about 10,000 people, \$1,000,000, are now in the water power of the Pawtucket Canal, and the Merrimack. The following statement will give some idea of the extent of the manufacturing done in Lowell.

For manufacturing purposes, 200 chaldrons of smith's coal are consumed in a year; 11,450 tons of anthracite coal, 500,000 bushels of charcoal, 3,510 cords of wood, 3,000 barrels of flour for starch, 600,000 pounds of starch, 63,289 gallons of oil, of which 5,000 gallons are olive oil.

There are several other manufacturers not included in the above statistics. The Lowell Bleachery has a capital of \$39,000; the Whitney Mills, having a capital of \$100,000, manufacture milled blankets. Oliver M. Whipple, Esq., has the most extensive powder mills, and manufactures the best gun powder in the United States. Private companies have also flannel mills, paper mills, taffeta mills, planing machines, an iron foundry, flour mills, and saw mills, the

whole capital vested in which cannot be less than half a million.

The average wages of female operatives, exclusive of board, is two dollars a week, some of them earn double that amount; the males earn, on an average, eighty cents a day, exclusive of board. All the corporations and private companies pay their hands one month in advance, but there are corporations paying out weekly. The total amount of wages paid to operatives in each month is \$150,000, on an average; a very considerable portion of which is deposited in the Lowell Savings Institution, by the receivers.

The Massachusetts Mills, incorporated in 1837, have two mills now in operation; their other two mills, with the boarding houses, are erected, but will not be filled with machinery, and run until the spring of 1841.

The foregoing statistics will be found substantially accurate, and to range somewhat within the truth.
