PREFACE.

After much careful research I am able to place before you this book and though brief I am satisfied that it is correct, as the fragments have been gathered from reliable but widely scattered sources and carefully put together.

This little work deals more particularly with that branch of the Chipman family identified with the early settlement of Maine — a great number of the later generations still being residents of the Pine Tree State.

In some instances I have been unable to get anything more than a mere family record while in others a very complete biographical sketch is given, but in every case I have faithfully transcribed all facts obtainable.

To the notes of the late Lewis Chipman I am indebted for much valuable information. Also to the several members of the Chipman clan who have kindly given their aid:

Origin.

The name Chipman is of English origin, early exhisting in various forms such as,—Chipenham, Chippenham, Chiepman and Chipnam. The name is found quite frequently in the books prepared by the Record Commission appointed by the British Parliament and from 1085 to 1350 it usually appears with the prefix DE, as de Chipenham.

The earliest public mention of the name, which we find, is of Willielmus de Chipenham who was chairman of the commissioners in the "Hundred of Staplehou," Cambridge County England, and who by the order of William the Conqueror took an inventory of the extensive estates possessed by the Monastery of Ely in 1085. The original record of that survey is preserved among the Cottonian Manuscripts and is marked "Tiberius A. VI."




Ghipman Arms.

The arms of Chipman have in their coloring and otherwise enough appearance of antiquity to render it quite certain that the picture was made in England. The arms are described as follows,—"Upon a white shield or escutcheon a red shoulder-belt between six red stars. Seated above the shield a white leopard, on his head a red mural crown."

Messrs. Burke say,- "The crest or cognizance served to distinguish the combetants in battle or tournament," and M. Porny says,- "A mural crown was confered on him who first, at an assault, mounted the walls of a besieged town and there set up a standard." So, then, the Chipman to whom was originally awarded this coatofarms was a soldier approved and rewarded for his valor.

THOMAS CHIPMAN was born, probably in Whitechurch, near Dorchester, England about 1567; died about 1623. He owned property in Whitechurch which yielded an income of about £50 per annum. He married in 1590 ———— who died in 1637.

First Generation.

RULING ELDER JOHN CHIPMAN was born, probably at Bryans-Piddle, near Dorchester, England about 1614; died April 7, 1708.

Always brotherless and early left fatherless he sailed from Barustable, Devon County, England in May 1631, in the ship Friendship, arriving in Boston, N. E. July 14, 1631.

John Chipman was the first and only one of the name to seek a home in America and up to 1850 there was no Chipman in this country who was not descended from him.

On March 2, 1642 John Chipman brought suitagainst his cousin, John Derby, to recover money which he affirmed the said John Derby unjustly witheld from him. How this suit resulted does not appear.

John Chipman was for successive years a selectman, then in Plymouth Colony invested with the authority of a magistrate, and was often a 'Deputy to the Court' or Representative to the Legislature; and he with three assistants was designated to frequent the early Quaker meetings and "endeavor to reduce them from the errors of their wayes."

In 1646 he married Hope, second daughter of John Howland, born in Plymouth, Mass., 1629; died 1683. There stands or lately stood in the

ancient burial ground on Lothrop Hill in Barnstable, Mass., a headstone denoting where was "intered ye Body of Mrs. Hope Chipman wife of Elder John Chipman, aged 54 years who changed this life for a better ye 8th day of January 1683." In 1684 he married Ruth youngest daughter of William Sargeant, born in Charlestown, Mass., Oct. 25, 1642; died in Sandwich, Mass., Oct. 4, 1713. She had previously married Jonathan Winslow of Marshfield, a nephew of Gov. Edward Winslow, and after his decease had married in July 1677 Rev. Richard Bourne who died in 1682.

It appears that John Chipman resided in various parts of Massachusetts, but for the greatest length of time in Barnstable. His children were all by his first wife and except a son and daughter who died in infancy all survived him,—eight daughters and the two sons named below,—

Second Generation.

2. Samuel Chipman second son of John Chipman was born in Barnstable, Mass., April 15, 1661; died 1723. He built, on the paternal homestead near the Custom House upon the great road of Cape Cod peninsular, the "Chipman Tayern" which continued in the line of his posterity until 1830. He was ordained deacon of the church Sept. 1, 1706.

On Dec. 27, 1686 he married Sarah, the twelith child of Ruling Elder Henry Cobb of Barnstable, born March 10, 1663; died Jan. 8, 1743. Eleven children resulted from this marriage, seven of them sons as follows.-

3. JOHN CHIPMAN was born in Barustable Mass., March 3, 1670; died Jan. 4, 1756. Massachusetts he was a Magistrate, a member of the General Court, a justice of the Court of Common Pleas, 1722 and Agent of the English "Society for the Propagation of the Gospel." In Rhode Island, where he lived after 1727, he was first of the six Associates of that colony and with the other Associates and Philip Cortland and Daniel Horsemanden of the New York



Council, was a member of the Commissioners of Review appointed by royal authority in England who met at Norwich, Conn. and pronounced a decision in regard to Connecticut's course toward the Indians.

He was twice married and had seven sons and five daughters.

We shall trace this branch no further,

4. SETH CHIPMAN was born in Barnstable Mass., about 1692. On Sept. 17, 1721 he married Priscilla, daughter of Major John Bradford, born March 10, 1686. After his marriage he lived in Kingston, Mass. and was a resident of that town when it was incorporated in 1726, and for about fifteen years thereafter his name appears each year among the town officers.

In 1774 Benjamin Chipman removed from Kingston and, landing at North Yarmouth, Maine, proceeded to New Gloucester which was as far inland as any civilized people lived. In April 1779 he took up a claim in the southern part of Bakerstown, now Poland, Maine, and was the first settler at South Poland and one of the pioneer settlers of the town; its first settler, Nathaniel Bailey, came in 1768.

9. Benjamin Chipman was born in Kingston, Mass., Feb. 4, 1752; died in Poland, Me., June 18, 1838 aged 86 years. During his early life-he went on a few voyages to the West Indies and on several fishing voyages with his uncle, Capt. Seth Chipman. He married, at Taunton, Mass., about 1776, Abigal Milliken, born in Boston April 3, 1757. They first met when Miss Milliken came to borrow a quilting frame of his boarding mistress. It was a case of mutual affinity and wedlock soon followed.

Benjamin Chipman was a cooper and nailer (maker of hand wrought nails) and his great-grandson, James I. Chipman [119] now has a hammer and a saw-set made and brought to Poland by him in 1781, when with his family he moved to Poland, Maine, then Bakerstown, and settled on the place now owned and occupied by Chester E. Chipman (123) and took up a claim embracing that and several other farms. This farm has been occupied by the Chipman family in direct line from father to son ever since, a period of one hundred and sixteen years.

In coming into the wilderness of Maine at

this time with his family Benjamin Chipman proved himself the possessor of a strong will and impregnable character, for none but self-willed men could achieve what those pioneers did—the transformation of a wilderness into a home. But those early pioneers were not to be discouraged though remote from the civilized world, surrounded by boundless forests and burdened by toil and privation; hence the Poland of to-day, a town whose name has circled the globe.

Mr. Chipman went to California in 1851, returned in 1854 and has since lived in Cambridge, Mass., and vicinity. He is a director of the society of California Pioneers of New England.

Notes.

The Chipman lineage in America is easily likened to a tree; let John Chipman (1) represent the trunk, his two sons Samuel and John the main branches, their sons the smaller limbs and all the later generations the little twigs. The tree has spread out its branches until they have reached every state in the union, and as each leaf, chilled by the winds of Time, falls at the close of a noble career it is succeeded by young and thrifty ones.

A greater number of the Chipman clan in Maine are and have been farmers and mechanics and while comparatively few of them have entered the higher professions or won renown in public affairs they bear an enviable reputation for unswerving integrity. Descending from the good old Puritan stock that came to America in the Mayflower they have retained much of the uprightness which characterized those founders of New England.

Rev. R. Manning Chipman in his pamphlet on the "Chipman Lineage," published in 1872, says of Hope, the first wife of John Chipman (1),— "Of her descendants there have been nearly or quite two thousand surnamed

Chipman. ** * These together with many more thousands from John Howland otherwise descended, trace their descent from at least four of the passengers from England to America in the Mayflower; the wife of John Howland, Elizabeth Tillie, and her parents, John Tillie and his wife Elizabeth, having, along with John Howland, come to 'New Plimouth' in that company which then so little regarded has since been so much renowned."

Some people have an idea that Chipman and Chapman were originally one and the same however an investigator need not be profound to discover that this is a mistake. They are two distinct families as widely different in origin as any two in America. Although we have cited herein one Chipman who changed his name to Chapman we are quite positive that this is the only like instance in America. Chipman, as we have shown, comes from Chipenham and should not be confounded; but perhaps we should not express surprise that the public has confounded these names when two who were once considered good authority have committed the same error.

It is a trait of human nature to take pleasure in the well-fare and honor of friends and relatives, therefore we think readers will peruse with interest these notes which deal with another branch of the Chipman family. It will be seen that the first mentioned was quite closely identified with the early history of the State of Maine.

JOHN CHIPMAN, great-grandson of John Chipman (1) through his son Samuel and Samuel's son Rev. John, was born in Beverley, Mass., Oct. 23, 1722; died July 1, 1768. graduated from Harvard in 1738 and was admitted to the practice of law. Giving to his profession abilities of a high order and pursuing it with industry and ardor his services came to be appreciated and sought for in distant localaties. At the time of his death there were only twenty-five barristers in Massachusetts Colony. He died of apoplexy with which he was suddenly seized in the Court House at Falmouth (now Portland) Me., while arguing a cause before the Superior Court of Judicature. He was the father of twelve children and the sixth we next consider.



Hon, WARD CHIPMAN was born in Marblehead, Mass., July 30, 1754; died Feb. 9, 1824. He graduated from Harvard in 1770; his graduating oration being the first delivered there in the vernacular language. He studied law in Boston under the direction of Hon. Daniel Leonard and Hon. Jonathan Sewall, Chief Justice of the Supreme Court of Massachusetts. Ward Chipman and Daniel Leonard with fifteen other names appear upon "The Loyal Address" to Gov. Gage on his departure from Boston in 1775, as "of those Gentlemen who were driven from their Habitations in the Country to Boston." Mr. Chipman went with the British to Halifax, N. S. and thence to England, being "obliged to abandon his native land on the evacuation of Boston in 1776. Having repaired to England the Royal bounty bestowed on him a pension in common with a long list of his suffering fellow-countrymen;

long list of his suffering fellow-countrymen; but a state of inaction being ill-suited to his ardent mind, in less than a year he relinquished his pension and rejoined the King's troops at New York where he was employed in the Military Department and in the practice of the Court of Admiralty until the peace of 1783.



On the first erection of this Province (New Brunswick), he was appointed Solicitor General, and continually afterward bore a conspicuous and most useful part in its affairs as an Advocate at the Bar, a Member of his Majesty's Council, a Member of the House of Assembly, a Judge of the Supreme Court, and Agent on the part of his Majesty before several Commissioners for settling disputed points of boundary with the United States, until he closed his mortal career while administering the Government of the Province as President and Commander in Chief during a vacancy in the office of Lieutenant Govenor." scription on his monument at St. John, N. B. adds to the above quoted statements the following,- "Distinguished during the whole of his varied and active life for his superior abilities and unweariable zeal, for genuine integrity and singular humanity and benevolence, his loss was universally deplored; and this frail tribute from his nearest connexions affords but a feeble expression of the affectionate respect with which they cherished the memory of his virtues." Although by the ardor of his youth and the council of gifted instructors



he had by retaining his loyalty to his sovereign become an exile from, he yet retained an affection for New England. An attestation of that affection was given by the education of his only son at the college from which he like his father and grandfather was graduated.

We find honorable mention of Daniel Chipman, a great-grandson of Dea. Samuel Chipman (2), who was a member of the Council of Censors of Vermont, a Member of Congress and the author of a "Life of Nathaniel Chipman," his brother, and another book issued two years later in 1845. He was the youngest and last survivor of nine brothers, all in public life; and died at Ripton, Vt. in April 1850 aged 85 years.
