Of course the numbers were taken as they were found.





10.1. THE ELECTROMAGNETIC FIELD

The electric and magnetic fields are defined by the following equations:

$$\mathbf{E} = -\nabla\phi - \dot{\mathbf{A}}$$

$$\mathbf{B} = \nabla \times \mathbf{A}$$

where ϕ is the scalar potential and \mathbf{A} is the vector potential.

The electric field \mathbf{E} is related to the charge density ρ and the current density \mathbf{j} by the following equations:

$$\nabla \cdot \mathbf{E} = \rho$$

$$\nabla \times \mathbf{B} = \mathbf{j} + \dot{\mathbf{E}}$$

These equations are the Maxwell equations in the absence of magnetic monopoles.

The continuity equation for the electric and magnetic fields is given by:

$$\nabla \cdot \mathbf{j} + \dot{\rho} = 0$$

where ρ is the charge density and \mathbf{j} is the current density.

The energy density of the electromagnetic field is given by:

$$u = \frac{1}{2} \epsilon_0 \mathbf{E} \cdot \mathbf{E} + \frac{1}{2\mu_0} \mathbf{B} \cdot \mathbf{B}$$

and the Poynting vector is given by:

$$\mathbf{S} = \mathbf{E} \times \mathbf{H}$$

The continuity equation for the energy and momentum of the electromagnetic field is given by:

$$\nabla \cdot \mathbf{S} + \dot{u} = -\mathbf{j} \cdot \mathbf{E}$$

where \mathbf{j} is the current density and \mathbf{E} is the electric field.

The momentum density of the electromagnetic field is given by:

$$\mathbf{g} = \frac{1}{c^2} \mathbf{S}$$

where \mathbf{S} is the Poynting vector and c is the speed of light.

This church was organized on the 3d of June, 1847, with twenty-five members. It now has a membership of nearly three hundred. The few at the beginning worshipped in an old school-house, with "gaping walls" and a "rotten floor;" their successors meet in a large commodious edifice of modern construction. The society has built

three meeting-houses, the first in 1848. It stood on Lincoln street, and cost about \$1,000. The second was erected in 1853, on the corner of Main and Lisbon streets. This was a substantial brick structure, and is now occupied by the Second Methodist Society. The house of worship now occupied by this society was commenced in 1869, finished at a cost of \$54,000, and dedicated May 18, 1870. This edifice is located on Bates street, head of Spruce, at the south-east corner of the Park, which it commands, on a spacious lot 150 feet front, and 200 feet deep. It is built of brick, with granite trimmings, and pressed brick beltings, laid in black cement, and has a seating capacity of between seven and eight hundred. The wood-work inside is entirely of black walnut, highly polished, with ceilings frescoed and tinted in a manner which admirably relieves the dark effect of the wood. The style of the building is English Gothic, the entire interior and exterior bearing out this structural idea, from the foundation to the top of turrets and spire, and from the floor to the apex of the roof. This Gothic expression extends to church furniture, pulpit, and organ. All in all, this society has one of the most beautiful and commodious church edifices in the State.

In the twenty-five years of the society's history, it has had four pastors, Rev. George Knox, who was one of the council at its recognition, commenced his labors as pastor in August, 1847, and resigned January, 1860. Mr. Knox was immediately succeeded by Rev. N. M. Wood, D. D. Dr. Wood closed his labors March 31st, 1866. The third pastor, Rev. George W. Holman, commenced his labors in July following, and resigned Nov., 1868. The present pastor commenced his labors in April, 1869.
