

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PREFACE.


EXPLANATIONS.

- III. John Lennington (Third Generation.)



INTRODUCTION.



Our New Jersey progenitor, Benjamin Chamberlain, was born, we are told, in Connecticut in 1746. But the descendant who contents himself with viewing abstractly the one hundred sixty-one years intervening to the present time learns only the simple lesson of subtraction and gains no insight into the significance of pioneer life with which those years began, nor of the extraordinary fulness and complexity with which these present days are silhouetted against those years.

The date carries us back to the reign of George II, when the population of England was a million less than that of the state of New York to-day, which it approximately equals in area. It was the "reign of common sense;" a nation whose long and steady political growth had given fixt form to a large part of its present civic doctrine, but whose agricultural and manufacturing and scientific development had not, in the main, much more than commenced.

The year 1746 antedates by a decade the beginning of English cattle breeding, and by a decade and a half the completion of England's first canal that involved any considerable engineering skill; by more than twenty years it antedates Arkwright's spinning-jenny and the power spinning machine, and by nearly forty years Cartwright's power loom, and Watt's steam engine. It antedates by more than half a century the beginning of English stage coaches and the completion of the first of those roads over which they were to travel at the wonderful rate of ten miles an hour. At the end of three-quarters of a century the steamboat is working; and the Stockton and Darlington Railway, in 1825, is first opened for the carrying of passengers.

In Scotland, at the middle of the eighteenth century, the customs and ways of the middle ages had scarcely ceased to exist. The country life was not much different from that which had prevailed in England in the time of Chaucer. The improvements in agriculture—the one chief industry of sustenance—had not yet commenced. A dozen or more of bony cattle, hitched by straw ropes, drew their clumsy

plows, while a mob of shouting and driving peasants attended. The fields were unenclosed. There were no roads, except between the largest towns. There were no vehicles to necessitate them. Having made no improvements upon the devices used at the time of Cæsar's invasion, they used carts with large wooden disks, or resorted to sledges. The making of wheels was not understood. Food—as might be inferred—was scanty and coarse, and of little variety. The shoes and stockings which only a few knew were worn even by them only for holiday attire. The cottages had dirt floors, and no windows. The country inns were but mean hovels, with rooms, attendants, and food—all dirty. The servants wore neither shoes nor stockings. The tables were uncovered. Drink was served in a tin cup, handed from mouth to mouth. It is little surprising that a favorite proverb was, "The mair dirt, the less hurt." The city inns, tho slightly better, were still miserable in the extreme. All thru the eighteenth century the streets of Edinburgh were filthy—tho virtually there was but one street. Into it every kind of household dirt and refuse was thrown, with only a chance rain to wash it away. Traveling could not have been pleasurable, and was rarely undertaken. A sixty-mile trip to Edinburgh required several days.

Then, in Scotland, came a change like a resurrection. In England the steam engine had been utilized. Coal beds led the steam engine up into Scotland. Manufacturing followed the steam engine, and population followed manufacturing. Thence came improvements in agriculture, for the productiveness of the soil must now be increased to support a growing and prospering population. The Scotch mind was never dull and prosaic. Their idealistic and imaginative temperament enabled them quickly to foresee the advantages to accrue from the new order of things, even as they already saw it profiting the English on their south. The intellectual life felt the stimulus. Instead of being wasted further upon the very intense but narrow field dominated thruout the middle ages by the subtle theological dialectic, practical problems were now attacked. The Scotch mind suggested the Bank of England. Adam Smith's "Wealth of Nations" gave to political economy an awakening such as it had not received since the days of Aristotle, and placed it upon its modern basis.

Great as has been the development of England and Scotland during the last century and a half, it is but slight compared with that of our own country—or of our own land, better to say. In 1746 thirteen separate colonial dependencies of the mother country fringed the middle Atlantic coast of

North America, with only a hazy, unsurveyed, and disputed boundary on its westward, to be given precision, in part, only as a result of the long and eventful struggles of the French and Indian War. Fort Du Quesne, now the site of the city seventh in population in the United States, was then in possession of the French, as was also the fertile Ohio valley, which it commanded. George Washington was a Virginia boy of fourteen, and Daniel Boone a twelve-year-old who had been born in the wilderness along the Delaware River. One of the colonies had a newspaper, the *North American*, a weekly that had been started in Philadelphia seventeen years before, as the *Pennsylvania Gazette*, by the industrious young printer of twenty-three, Benjamin Franklin. Eight years should yet elapse before Franklin's plan for the union of the American colonies should be unfolded in the first Colonial Congress, at Albany. In a quarter of a century the stage coach was advertised to make the trip from New York to Philadelphia in a day and a half; and four years later—one year before the Declaration of Independence—there was established a new convenience, a weekly mail between Boston and Philadelphia. America had four colleges previous to 1746—Harvard, William and Mary, Yale, and the University of Pennsylvania—while a fifth, Princeton, was founded that year; yet none of them, for a century to come, to compare favorably in essential points with the best city high schools of to-day.

During Washington's administration it was discovered accidentally that the "black stones" of the Pennsylvania anthracite coal region would burn. Over fifty million tons of hard coal are now yielded by these mines every year; while thirty other states now mine bituminous coal. Within the memory of the present generation the first oil well was sunk at Titusville, Pa., in 1858. Previously no one knew of the enormous quantities of underground oil, nor of its value. To-day two hundred important products are made from the crude oil, and it is the country's most valuable export. In electricity, during the latter half of the eighteenth century and the first part of the nineteenth is to be found the name of Franklin, with his doctrine of positive and negative charges, and the identity of lightning and electricity; of Galvani, and his discovery of the electrical activity in the contact of dissimilar metals; of Volta and Sir Humphry Davy, with their electric piles; of Faraday, with his electrolysis and induction; and of Ampere and Ohm, with their quantitative studies of the electric current: yet these are founders' names in the development of that agency at which the present age marvels.


Coal and petroleum, steam and electricity—little need be the wonderment at the industrial growth and complexity of the past few decades. The unexampled territorial growth to which reference has already been made, or this latter industrial one—either of them alone would suffice to engross the attention and challenge the energies of a most strenuous people; yet America has experienced not one alone of these, but both. For the present fast financial and industrial pace, and for the present institutional and political complexity, there is a reason.

Consider now a typical pioneer family as planted in the American soil of a century and a half ago; and as the mind runs over the course of the intervening years its probable vicissitudes will paint themselves upon the imagination with colors that are fairly true. One family, if its numbers have multiplied at the normal rate, will be much like another. The dwelling place of the son will be not always that of the father, and but unfrequently that of the grandfather. The occupations of one generation will often be those not opened to the generation before. The standards of living will show that general increase in the comforts which has been experienced by most civilized nations.

Benjamin Chamberlain's journey from Connecticut to northern New Jersey stands nearer by half a century to that made by Roger Williams thru the New England forests from Salem to Providence than it does to our own time. That it was made under more favorable conditions is to be hoped. Whatever things we may not know of his journey, there are some things of which we can be sure. The milestones that at present mark our progress—the fine roads, the steel-spanned rivers, and the tunneled mountains—were not then to be found. In New Jersey the largest city but one thru which the same trip would be likely to take one now is Paterson. But Paterson had not yet been founded, nor would be for probably a quarter of a century. The landmarks of a later period slip irresistibly into the picture.

To the contemplated readers of this book the author needs no introduction as such. They to whom it has been needful for him to go for material—and that includes the most of those members of the family who are now living—already know him for his zeal and persistency, and have commended him for that practice of accuracy without which a work of record would be of little worth. For a generation also they have known him as an esteemed friend and an inspiring co-worker.



THE CHAMBERLAIN FAMILY HISTORY.



The Chamberlain Family is one of the early families of the United States, whither pioneers of the name emigrated from England as early as 1621, in which year *Francis Chamberlain arrived and settled in Virginia.

"Henry Chamberlain, who fled from England on account of religious persecution, located at Hingham, Mass., in 1638. He died at Hull, Mass., July 15, 1674. His descendants lived in Massachusetts, Rhode Island, New Jersey and South Carolina.

"Richard Chamberlain, of Braintree, 1642, died at Sudbury prior to April 15, 1673. Descendants lived in Massachusetts, Connecticut, New Hampshire and Vermont.

"Thomas Chamberlain was made a freeman at Woburn, Mass., May 29, 1644. He died prior to December 21, 1700. His descendants lived in Massachusetts, New Hampshire, Vermont and Maine.

"Edmund Chamberlain of whom the first record we have is his marriage to Mary Turner at Roxbury, Mass., January 4, 1646 or 1647. He later removed to what is now Woodstock, Conn., where he died in 1696. His descendants lived in Massachusetts and Connecticut.

"William Chamberlain was admitted as an inhabitant of the town of Woburn, Mass., January 6, 1648. He died at Billerica, Mass., 1706. His descendants lived in Massachusetts, New Hampshire and Maine."

The descendants of these early Chamberlain pioneers have become very numerous and are widely scattered throughout the United States from the Atlantic to the

Pacific, and have contributed very materially to the development, progress and prosperity of this country. Among the early fathers of the family were many loyal Revolutionary patriots, who fought in the battles for Independence, and later wars have developed distinguished members of the family, from the private in the ranks, to officials in command. The family graces every walk in life, from the humble tiller of the soil, the work shop, to the school-room, journalism, medicine, the bar, the platform, the university and the pulpit.

As to the significance of the name of "Chamberlain," it denotes an office. However, as to the origin of the name the best description is given by Gen. Joshua L. Chamberlain, L. L. D., president of the "Chamberlain Association of America," and published by the association in their report for 1898, from which we give a brief extract as follows:

"We associate ourselves by token of a name. But names stand for things. They serve to mark, if not the essence or central idea, at least some striking peculiarity of objects, whether this be a feature, action, attribute, office or locality. A name is certainly something more than a number—a mere mark of separation; it is also a mark of characteristic identity.

"In our case the name betokens an office, and one of trust and responsibility. In our day and language it has some applications that confuse its significance. But its historical origin is clear and of singular interest. Deep-colored threads of manifold history are woven into it. Its etymology makes manifest that it has come to us through the French, and also that it has taken on a German impress; while we recognize in the substance of the word the Latin, or perhaps older even than this, the Greek *Kamera* the word for chamber, the radical idea of which is a vaulted place. This Latin form remains in Spanish, Portuguese and Italian—*camera* or *camara*. We also have the direct Latin word in English, with rather limited application."

But what kind of a lingo is this which makes the derivative *camarlingo* in Italian, *camarlengo* in Spanish and *camerlengo* in Portuguese? How got in here that old High German *lenc*,—itself a curious compound,

the *l* denoting frequency and the *enc* or *ing* marking some personal relation to the thing signified by the main stock word—as here, an attendant of the chamber; in what station, whether high or low, being determined not by the word but by its associations in social, and even political conditions? The over-reaching Germans had taken this word *camera* from the conquered Southern peoples, and at a time when it already showed two marks of the popular transformation which since produced the languages of southern Europe known as the Romance, as is seen in the Pompeian inscriptions in the first century of the Christian era. The short, unaccented vowel in the penult syllable disappeared, and a final unaccented vowel also disappeared, or was represented by a mute *e*, whatever the original vowel—that poor little knock-about unaccented *e*, so easily dropped when you didn't like him, and so easily made to stand when you wanted something which wasn't much! This would give *came* a combination the German could not get over so easily, as he could the Rhine, so took for a ferryman that easy-going *e*, and put in another *m* to make him stay there. This makes the German word *kammer*, and putting on to that the *lenc* makes the old High German derivative, the feudal *kamerlenc*, later becoming *kammerling*. This word the conquering Germans bore back to the Mediterranean shores, where we see it taken up by the Southern tongues each in a fashion of its own. Early in the Provencal we find it quite German, *camarlenc*, and soon *camarlenc*,—prototype of our own “chamberlain.”


This shows how the letter *l* with its final syllable got into the word. But how did the letter *b* get in—a letter nowhere appearing in the Southern or Northern forms of the word, but which in French strangely comes to take the place of the middle *e* in them? This gives us a look at the effect of local cross-currents on a passing language. The mighty outflowing of dissolving Rome flattened down with its own debris and spread to discharge itself by more mouths than the Tiber or the Po, the Rhone or the Rhine. First to the street Latin; then taking its way by force of nature more than by military or political direction, or anything in the will

of man. This *camera* was tossed about among the different dialects of re-peopled of old Gaul, some of which, as the Provencal in the South, and the Picard and speech of the Ile de France in the North, did not tolerate the junction of the *m* and *r* brought about by dropping the intermediate *e*, as we have seen, in such spoken word as *camra*; and by a physiological "law,"—in which physical geography and psychic race-tendency had no doubt their part—required the facilitating flux of the letter *b* to help mix these liquids to suit them. So we find in these dialects, for instance, *cambra* (Provencal) and *cambre* (Picard.)

But what about this *ch* at the beginning, with a new sound, neither Latin nor Spanish—unheard of before? We have remarked the occasional form *chamarlenc* in the old Provencal. This heralded what became a settled "law" in French. It is well known that in this language the initial *ca* of the Latin is replaced by *ch*—usually attended by the softening of the *a* into *e*; as in the familiar instances, *cheval* from *caballus*, *chef* from *caput*, *cher* from *carus*, *chez* from *casa*—*chez moi*—house of me—at my house. But observe that when this initial comes before two consonants, the *a* stands, not changed into *e*—as in *charme* from *carmen*. And in the Isle of France, where was brewed the modern French language, this law of the *ch* prevailed.

And observe the reflex influence of this upon the German. For that great king of the Franks—who in the fifth century gave the name to France—this thoroughly German Emperor, with his capitals at Aachen and Ingelheim, this Karl Magnns, was to the Trouveres of France, "Charlemagne." Reciprocally, in old High German of even earlier days, we find *chamerline* grafted from the French.

At length the law of language was reversed. Or rather, alien forces which could not affect the vital law of birth came to determine what finished form should have most vitality and power. The election of Hugh Capet, Duke of France—meaning then only the region tributary to the little island on which Paris stands—to be king of all the turbulent provinces scarcely held together under Charlemagne himself, made all those




provinces France and Paris their capital, and this set in motion the causes which made the dialect of the little Ile de France prevail over those of Normandy and Picardy in the north, and Burgundy in the east, and in the course of events overcame the beautiful language of the south—the Languedoc, the Provencal of the Troubadours—and made itself once for all the French Language.”

“So we have our name accounted for; the stuff of it is from old Rome; fused in the reactions of race and circumstance; forged and welded beneath the thunderblows of Goth and Frank and Hun; baptized and tempered in the fire-flooded fields and weird smithies of Northman and Saxon; emblem of trusted office in the appointments of feudal courts old and wide as the empire of Charlemagne; brought at last to England by the Normans mingled of so many bloods. Hence its place in the literatures of all races taking manly part in the evolution of modern history. The track runs red, with love or blood, through all the story.”




1. Benjamin Chamberlain. b. about 1746-7; d. Nov. 29, 1816, aged 69 years. He came from Connecticut, and located near Sparta, in Sussex Co., N. J. some time prior to 1767, on the farm now owned and occupied by Samuel H. Maines, a great-grandson. It is said a brother came with him, named John Chamberlain, who also settled in Sussex County. Of the immediate ancestry of Benjamin and John Chamberlain, we have been unable to learn anything. It is quite probable that they were descendants of one of the early pioneers of the name who emigrated from England to America and settled in one of the New England states.

It is not known whom Benjamin Chamberlain married. He was a farmer and shoemaker, and evidently a member or adherent of the Presbyterian church of Sparta, close to which his remains were buried.

The Presbyterian church of "Hardiston," as it was then called, was organized in 1786, and worshiped in the house of Robert Ogden until 1790, when the church building was erected, and after the township of Sparta was set off from that of "Hardiston," the church changed its name to that of the First Presbyterian church of Sparta. The name of Benjamin Chamberlain, however, is not found among the list of the early members of the church.

It is a tradition of the family that Benjamin Chamberlain joined the colonists in the Revolutionary war and no doubt served his country well.

The children of Benjamin Chamberlain were as follows, viz.: Phebe, Hannah, Elizabeth, Polly, Isaac, Joseph, Samuel, Abraham, Jacob, Jabez, Elias, Noah.

His tombstone in the Sparta Presbyterian grave yard bears the following inscription, viz.:

“IN MEMORY OF
BENJAMIN CHAMBERLAIN.
WHO DEPARTED THIS LIFE
NOVEMBER 29, 1816
AGED 69 YEARS

Now stop and think as you pass by
This is the ground where you must lie
Death and the grave your doom must be
O think on death and follow me.”

II. Phebe Chamberlain, "of Byramtown," b. April 17, 1767; d. January 31, 1807; m. Thomas Lennington,* Esq. in 1788. He was b. at Elizabethtown in 1769.

Mr. Lennington was a school teacher and taught at Deckertown and Franklin a number of years. He was constable for the township of Hardyston twenty-one years. In 1804 he moved to Sparta, and bought the property now (1879) owned by Isaac Goble and carried on distilling and the forge business until 1814, when he sold out, and then purchased a property at Hamburg and lived on it five years, when he again sold out. He then moved to Ohio with all his family except his son John. This was about 1820. Presby. C.: Phebe, John, Elias, Isaac, Polly.

III. Phebe Lennington, b. —; d. June 7, 1875; m. James Stockdale, November 25, 1825. He was b. at Antrim, Ireland, and d. at Antrim, Ohio, August 4, 1889. Merchant and farmer. Presby. C.: Mary, Lydia, Moses, Jane, Martha, James, Elizabeth, Elias, Margaret, Thomas, Sylvanus.

His father desired that he should enjoy the benefits of a good education, and to accomplish this a teacher was hired from Connecticut, and he was instructed in the common branches of learning, as also in the Latin and Greek languages. At the age of fifteen he entered a law office in New York city, but remained only three months, the legal profession not according with his wishes. On his return home he apprenticed himself to a wheelwright, and after serving his time he commenced business in Sparta and conducted it for forty years. In 1815 he bought the present (1879) Lennington property, built the house still standing and there he died. He was appointed Justice of the Peace by the New Jersey Legislature, which office he held twenty-one years. In the course of his long life he was appointed to different township offices which were filled with credit to himself and constituents. He had a good mind, a well formed head, large brain, great mental capacity and force; he had a great deal of will power. During his life he was engaged in the settlement of a large number of estates, had good business qualifications, and by dint of industry gathered round him enough to keep him in easy circumstances during the decline of life. He used at all times good language,

had great conversational powers and had a large fund of anecdotes. May 18, 1831, he united with the Presbyterian church of Sparta, and in October of the same year he was elected Ruling Elder of that church. In doctrine he was a rigid Calvinist. C.: Elizabeth, Hilah, Sarah, Rachel, Jane, John.

It is thought there was another son, Peter, who went South, of whom nothing further is known. The family however, could not say with certainty that the grandmother's name was Hannah Chamberlain.

It was further thought that the grandfather married a second wife, but it was not known whether the father Patrick was by the first or second wife, but as he was born about 1817, he was presumably by the first wife who may have been Hannah Chamberlain.





Volunteers, was elected Orderly Sergeant of said company and being a non-commissioned officer was appointed by the Colonel, postmaster of the 27th Regiment N. J. Volunteers and served ten months. He was at the battle of Fredericksburg, Va., in December, 1862, and after the engagement the regiment was taken down to Newport News, Va., where it did picket duty until the latter part of March, 1863, when it was transferred to the Army of the Cumberland and was taken down through the Blue Grass region (Kentucky) to Tennessee, crossing the Kentucky and Cumberland rivers. 





Joseph Chamberlain first lived at and operated the Hopewell Forge in Sussex County for some time, and later purchased the forge property at Russia, Morris County, N. J., where he continued the manufacture of iron until his death. He became possessed of considerable property in Jefferson, the first record was 84 acres, purchased April 6, 1826. His next purchase was made September 11, 1826, which consisted of several tracts of land, in all 620 acres. On June 28, 1827, he purchased another tract of 23.6 acres. He is said to have owned in all about 800 acres.

Joseph Chamberlain was an old line Whig. It is related that he owed a man a large sum of money, and was asked if the party would come to him and say, "Mr. Chamberlain, if you will vote the Democratic ticket, I will give you the debt," would you do it? To which he replied, "No, but I would kick him off my ground for offering such a thing." He was struck by lightning in his house during a thunderstorm, and was instantly killed.

He was buried in the Headley graveyard, near Milton,

but has no tombstone bearing any inscription. Letters of administration on his property were given August 9, 1836, to William Headley, administrator.





The first business venture of Abraham Chamberlain prior to marriage was rafting lumber from the vicinity of Milford, Pa., down the Delaware river to Philadelphia. The return trips on these occasions were made on foot the entire distance from Philadelphia to Sparta, a distance of 100 miles; the time for the return trip occupying two days.

It is asserted that immediately after returning from one of these long walks from Philadelphia, he found things were not going straight with his rafts, therefore he immediately saddled a horse and rode to Milford, Pa., to look after the matter.

After marriage, Mr. Chamberlain settled on the Shores place near Russia, Morris Co., N. J., and engaged in the carpenter trade. On June 1, 1821, he and Ephraim Adams in partnership purchased the Petersburg forge property of Peter Van Winkle and Thomas Van Antwerp, New York merchants, who through their attorney, Sylvester D. Russell, had purchased it at sheriff's sale, and engaged in the manufacture of iron, in which he continued until his death. He also engaged in farming, and owned and operated a grist mill, plaster mill and saw mill at Milton, and also a saw mill at Petersburg. About 1840, he built a distillery at Petersburg and operated it until his death. His landed property consisted of 500 or more acres.

His death was caused by a wheel in the distillery falling on him breaking both his legs, from effects of which he died. Mr. Chamberlain and wife in their earlier days attended services at the Oak Ridge Presbyterian church. They were blessed with eight children, viz.: Caroline, Maurice, Horace, Amos, Lewis, Elizabeth, Almeda, Jane.



He was a lifelong resident of the vicinity where he was born, and had for more than half a century been identified with its political, social and business affairs. By profession he was a surveyor, but he also owned and cultivated the large farm upon which he lived. In his professional capacity his services were in great demand, and he doubtless knew more about the lines and titles of property in the vast area of country embraced in the counties of Morris, Passaic and Sussex than any living person, making his opinion of great weight in the courts, and in the settlement of estates. He was also connected with the iron industry in early life, in the days of charcoal forges, several of which he operated at

various times. His knowledge of the history of forge operations on the upper Rockaway and Pequannock rivers was considered valuable and the sketches of them contained in the History of Morris County are largely based upon the information he furnished. Possessing great natural abilities, combined with a large degree of self culture, and being withal a man of uncompromising honesty, he was looked upon by those about him as a leader in their affairs and was frequently called upon to represent them in public and business affairs. He filled many local offices, was a member from his township upon the grand jury many times, and in 1851 was elected to a seat in the New Jersey Legislature. Had he been at all solicitous for public preferment he would doubtless have been called to still higher positions. As a citizen he will best be remembered for the sterling integrity of his character, the kindness of his disposition and his large capacity for rendering service to those about him. 

Such schooling as the community was able for a few months of the winter to provide, the teacher "boarding around" as good part of his recompense, Mr. Chamberlain took advantage of until the age of fifteen. Then it fell to his lot to take charge of his father's grist mill. Eastern milling was then at its best. The importation of grain and feed from the west was not yet a factor, and this part of Morris County was seeing the best days of its development. The demand for the output of the mill was good. The hours were long, the business profitable, and the decline which was later to set in had not yet begun.

In 1870 he was placed in charge of the feed and flour mill owned by the Chester Iron Company, at Hacklebarney, N. J. This position he kept until 1873, when he was employed as engineer at the Hedges mine, which had been opened a short time before at Chester, N. J., by the Taylor Iron Company.

When the blast furnace was opened by the same company at Chester Furnace, N. J., in 1879, Mr. Chamberlain was transferred there, and given the position of chief engineer. This position, varied and complex as were the demands made upon the ingenuity and resourcefulness of one who should fill it successfully, he retained until the works were taken down in 1890. Then he accepted a position as engineer at the Fulton Silk Mill, at Paterson, N. J.

Mr. Chamberlain's interest has always centered in machinery. His application has been, to an unusual degree, a continuous one for thirty-five years. His vacations have been short and rarely taken. In 1896 he took sufficient time from his duties to visit friends

and relatives in Ohio. He is one of the three founders of the Chamberlain Rennon, and has contributed very largely to the success which has so far attended it. After completing the brief district school course, he engaged in the feed and flour business, having rented a grist mill for the purpose. The grinding and carting he did himself, and by dint of industrious application and long hours, though yet but a boy, he made the business a success. But the great shipment of grain from the west now commenced, and his enterprise shared the general decline of eastern milling. Foreseeing the result and having a taste for railroading, he began the study of telegraphy. Constructing a telegraph line from his mill to a few neighbors' houses his spare moments he diligently applied in making himself proficient as an operator. After perfecting himself for the work by a short period of apprenticeship with the New York, Susquehanna & Western Railroad, he was made agent at the new station just then opened at Paterson, N. J. He entered the employ of the company there May 1, 1882. It was no slight compliment to the capability of a young man of twenty, brought up four miles from a railroad, to be placed in charge of the station at the road's largest intermedial city. On December 1, 1900, he was appointed agent at Hackensack, N. J., where a modern and commodious station had just been completed.


Mr. Chamberlain resigned his position on February 1, 1907, still comparatively a young man after a quarter of a century's experience in railroading. His business career from the beginning has been one of remarkable assiduity. During the summer of 1891 he asked for and was granted a vacation of one week. In 1904 he was given a month's vacation, together with a railroad pass permitting him to visit the principal cities of the middle west. These thirty-seven days constitute the only mentionable breaks in the service of twenty-five years continuity.

He has purchased a coal and grain business at Dundee Lake, N. J., and to this he is now giving his attention.

Chamberlain, in trying to rescue him, also fell overcome by gas. Then two painters also went down to their deaths in trying to rescue Chamberlain and Bulmer. All efforts to revive the men proved futile.

William F. Bulmer graduated at the Clinton (N. J.) High School at the age of sixteen, and was a good, bright and brave young man.

IV. Bertram B. Chamberlain, b. May 20, 1877. Enlisted as a soldier May 2, 1898, in Company M, 2nd Regiment N. J. Volunteers., and was sent to Jacksonville, Fla., remaining there until the following September, when he was discharged. On May 17, 1899, he enlisted in the 1st N. Y. Infantry, and was sent to Cuba on the transport Dixie, landing at Havana and traveling 120 miles by railroad to Pinar del Reo, where he was assigned to Company H, 1st Infantry. He did garrison duty there for three months, when he was taken sick with typhoid fever and with two hundred other sick men was sent to Fort Leavenworth, Kansas, where he soon recovered and did duty there for a short time. He was then assigned to Company B, 1st Infantry, and was sent to Jefferson Barracks, Missouri, for about two months, when they were ordered to China, and left at once, arriving at San Francisco August 2, 1900, where they awaited orders to sail. They embarked on the transport Logan for China, but on arriving at Honolulu they were ordered to proceed to Manila, where they arrived in good condition, making the trip from San Francisco to Manila in thirty-two days. They remained in Manila two days, and were sent to the Isle of Marinduque to rescue Company F, 29th U. S. Volunteers. They landed at Santa Cruz under a heavy fire, fought all day, drove the insurgents out into the mountains and rescued Company F. They were then sent to the Island of Samar, where General


Smith was having all his trouble, and where they remained until March 14, 1902, taking part in thirty-two engagements on that island.

Mr. Chamberlain returned to San Francisco on the transport Warren, making the trip in twenty-eight days after which he crossed the continent by rail arriving in Dover, N. J., June 17, 1902. In 1904 he again enlisted in the 28th U. S. Infantry, was sent to San Francisco and assigned to Co. K. About a month later the entire 28th was ordered to Fort Snelling, Minn., where he did garrison duty for one year and was then transferred to Co. D., 18th Infantry, at Fort Leavenworth, Kansas, where he is stationed at the present time, February 3, 1906.



FIRST CHAMBERLAIN FAMILY REUNION,
HELD AT OAK RIDGE, N. J., AUGUST 5, 1905.



The first reunion of the Chamberlain family was held in the grove belonging to Amos Chamberlain, at Oak Ridge, N. J., on Saturday, August 5, 1905. The weather was all that could have been desired, and the descendants of the Sussex County pioneer, Benjamin Chamberlain, who located near Sparta, and died there in 1816, gathered to the number of about 200 from all the near by communities of Oak Ridge, Milton, Newfoundland, Rockaway, Petersburg, Morris Plains, Woodport, Port Morris, Wharton, Dover, Netcong, Paterson, Perth Amboy, Hackensack, Orange, Ogdensburg, Newark, Sparta and Franklin Furnace, N. J.; Brooklyn, Middletown, Campbell Hall and Utica, N. Y., and other places.

Old and young came to see their relatives, many of whom had not seen each other for many years, and in that respect the day was a very social affair, the time being spent in social intercourse and renewing old acquaintances.

Two large tables were spread for dinner, loaded with toothsome edibles prepared by the ladies, to which the descendants present did full justice.

The music for entertainment was furnished by the Milton Cornet Band, all the members except one being Chamberlain descendants.

After dinner the descendants gathered in the pavilion and an address of welcome was made by Henry L. Chamberlain, of Orange, N. J. The historical address was delivered by Rev. A. J. Fretz, of Milton, who is connected with the Chamberlain family by marriage.

After the addresses it was suggested to form a permanent organization of the family, and on motion of Raymond Chamberlain a committee of three was

appointed to confer and nominate a president. The committee appointed were Charles Chamberlain, of Woodport; Andrew W. Chamberlain, of Morris Plains, and Wesley Chamberlain, of Newfoundland. They soon had their report ready and presented the name of Pierson M. Chamberlain, of Netcong, N. J., for President, and he was unanimously elected, and responded with a cheerful address of acceptance in which, among other declarations, he said that none of the descendants of Benjamin Chamberlain had ever disgraced themselves by having their names enrolled on prison records, but had ever been quiet, law-abiding citizens of our great commonwealth. Henry L. Chamberlain, of Orange, was elected Secretary, and Rev. A. J. Fretz, Historian.



EXTRACTS OF THE HISTORICAL ADDRESSES
DELIVERED AT THE CHAMBERLAIN FAMILY
REUNIONS AUG. 5, 1905, AND AUG.
4, 1906, BY REV. A. J. FRETZ.



The study of Ancestry is both interesting and of great value. Its effects ought to be beneficial in maintaining the honor and integrity of a family extending through a long line of progenitors whose memory with loyal devotion should be cherished and whose virtues are worthy of emulation.

It is commendable to be familiar with one's family history, and eminently proper to preserve it for the benefit of future generations.

The history and traditions of the lives of the progenitors and their posterity will be of incalculable value

to generations yet unborn, and will be highly prized by them.

In gathering here today in the capacity of a family reunion, we renew the memories of our ancestors, as well as socially to become better acquainted with each other as offspring of a common ancestry.

As to the name of Chamberlain it probably has its origin in official positions occupied by individuals, and in course of time assumed as a family name, and as such is of quite ancient origin.

The name is seven times mentioned in the Bible. In 2nd. Kings, xxiii : 11, Nathan-melech, is mentioned as "the chamberlain." In Esther, i:10, are named the seven chamberlains that served in the presence of Ahasuerus the king. In Esther, ii:15 and 21st verses are mentioned Hegai, Bigthan and Teresh, chamberlains of the king. The name is twice mentioned in the New Testament. In Acts, xii : 20, is mentioned Blastus, the king's chamberlain, who occupied a post of honor which involved great intimacy and influence with the king. The other in Rom., xvi:23, names Erastus the chamberlain of the city of Corinth.

Officially, chamberlain is an officer having charge of the private chambers of a nobleman or monarch. One of the high officers of a court. A receiver of public money.

The Lord Great Chamberlain, of England, is the sixth officer of the crown, a considerable part of his function is at a coronation; to him belongs the provision in the House of Lords; he disposes of the sword of State; under him are the gentlemen ushers of the black-rod, yeomen ushers and door-keepers, &c.

The earliest ancestor of the Chamberlain family known to us was Benjamin Chamberlain, who together with his brother William came from Connecticut, and settled in Sussex County. Benjamin Chamberlain located near Sparta, Sussex County, on the farm now owned and occupied by Samuel Maines.

We have been unable to learn anything in particular as to the characteristics of Benjamin Chamberlain. He was born in 1746-7; died November 29, 1816, aged sixty-nine years. It is not known whom he married.

He was by occupation a farmer and shoemaker, and in religious faith a Presbyterian. It is said that he joined the Colonists in the Revolutionary War, and one account says that he was killed in the service. This is however incorrect, as it is shown by his tombstone that he died in 1816, more than a quarter of a century after the war closed, and for that length of time at least, enjoyed the freedom and liberty for which he fought.

His remains were buried in the Sparta Presbyterian graveyard and his tombstone bears the following inscription, viz.: "In memory of Benjamin Chamberlain, who departed this life November 29, 1816, aged sixty-nine years.

Now stop and think as you pass by
This is the ground where you must lie
Death and the grave your doom must be
Oh think on death and follow me."

His children were thirteen in number, viz.: Phebe, Hannah, Elizabeth, Polly, Isaac, Joseph, Samuel, Benjamin, Abraham, Jacob, Jabez, Elias and Noah.

PHEBE Chamberlain, the eldest child, was born in "Byram town," April 17, 1767; died January 31, 1807; married Thomas Lennington, Esq., of Elizabethtown, N. J., in 1788. Mr. Lennington was a school teacher and taught at Deckertown and Franklin. He was also constable for the township of Hardyston for twenty-one years. In 1804, he removed to Sparta, where he bought the property, later (1879) owned by Isaac Goble, and carried on distilling and the forge business until 1814, when he sold out and removed to Hamburg, N. J. About 1820, he removed to Ohio with all his family except his son John. The children of Thomas and Phebe (Chamberlain) Lennington were, viz.: Phebe, wife of James Stockdale, John, Elias, Isaac, and Polly, wife of ——— Shuman.

HANNAH Chamberlain, married William Buchanan. Have not been able to find trace of their descendants with certainty.

ELIZABETH Chamberlain, born about 1772; died 1855; married Noah Talmadge in 1790. Farmer at Longwood on the farm now owned by H. R. Davenport. To

them were born eleven children, viz.: David, Phebe, wife of Timothy Pierson, Daniel, Benjamin, Samuel, Elias, Cornelius, Sarah, wife of Job B. Woodruff, William, Abraham, and Hannah, wife of James Woods.

POLLY Chamberlain, married Thomas Havens, a farmer near Sparta, where John H. Chamberlain now resides. Their children were, Sarah, wife of William D. McCormick, Irene, wife of Phineas Dunn, Noah, Thomas. ———, Charles and Samuel.

ISAAC Chamberlain, as far as known died single.

JOSEPH Chamberlain, was twice married. His first wife was Susan Sayers, by whom he had three children, Almeda, wife of William Wheeler, Clara, wife of Geo. Snellgrove, and Gabriel. His second wife was Mary Dow, a granddaughter of the noted Methodist minister, Rev. Lorenzo Dow. The children by the second wife were, Mahlon, Elizabeth, wife of Stephen Brown, Hiram, Marshall, Ida, Cynthia, wife of Jacob Dewitt, Emaline and Joseph. Joseph Chamberlain, Sr., at first operated the Hopewell forge in Sussex County, and afterwards purchased the forge property at Russia, Morris County, where he continued in the manufacture of iron. He became possessed of considerable property in Jefferson township, in all about 800 acres. He died about June 1, 1836. He was struck by lightning in his house during a thunderstorm and instantly killed. He was buried in the Headley graveyard near Milton, but has no tombstone.

SAMUEL Chamberlain, married Martha Ann Davenport. He evidently lived in Jefferson township, at or near Petersburg. He purchased his first land of record in Jefferson township, January 10, 1811, from John DeCamp and wife Susan, consisting of fifty acres. This land was purchased by John DeCamp in 1810, from Ebenezer and Timothy Jayne. Samuel Chamberlain died of small-pox. C.: Noah, Catharine, wife of James Maines, Phebe, wife of Stephen Cole, and Hila, wife of John Long.

BENJAMIN Chamberlain, married Hannah Banford. He was a farmer and lived at Russia on the farm owned by Mrs. Abraham Post. He was a large man physically, and was a prominent member and deacon of the Old

School Baptist church at Milton, and was buried there. He was sick at his son-in-law's John McCledden's, and got up in the night, put on his shoes and went out doors. After coming into the house he lay down and "died with his shoes on." C.: Esther, Amelia, John, Ephraim, Susan, wife of John McCledden, another daughter married ——— Stevens, and Benjamin.

ABRAHAM Chamberlain, born April 10, 1783; died September 3, 1852; married Elizabeth Keepers, who was born in 1787; died, 1882, aged ninety-five years. She survived her husband thirty years. He settled at Petersburg where he engaged in farming, distilling and owned and operated the Petersburg forge. His death was caused by a wheel accidentally falling upon him, crushing his leg, from the effects of which he died. C.: Caroline, Morris, Horace, Amos, Lewis, Elizabeth, wife of George Lyon, Almeda, wife of Joseph W. Headley, and Jane, wife of William P. Winterbottom.

JACOB Chamberlain, (twin to Abraham) born April 10, 1783; died August 31, 1854. He was twice married. His first wife was Mary C. Halsey, who was the mother of all his children. His second wife was Margaret Mount. In early life he drove stage and carried the mail between Morristown and Newfoundland, and later was otherwise engaged as farmer, distiller and brick-maker, at Morristown. He was taken sick at night and got up and went to a door window out of which he absent-mindedly walked, falling to the ground, from the effects of which he died. C.: Isaac, Halsey, Abby, wife of ——— Neal, Emily, wife of David I. Huntington, Sarah, Jane, Martha, wife of William Shove, Harriet, wife of Joseph Stone, Henry and Marcus.

JABEZ Chamberlain, born about 1785; died 1821; married Eunice Dickerson. She died 1842. He was a tavern keeper and farmer at Succasunna Plains, N. J. He also served as constable of Roxbury township and was Captain of the "Light Horse Cavalry" in the training days. He was accidentally killed at a "logging frolic" by a tree falling on him. He was the seventh son and was called the doctor. C.: Jane, wife of John Donohue, Mary, wife of Joseph Abers, Elizabeth, wife of John Masker, Joseph, Charles, Harriet, wife of Har-


mon K. Waer, Susan, wife of Jacob Ball, Eunice, wife of Joshua Winget, and Phebe, wife of Patrick Donohue.

ELIAS Chamberlain, born January 11, 1787; died January 23, 1834; married Sarah Keepers, who was born March 11, 1793; died April 15, 1876; both buried in the Headley graveyard at Milton. He was a farmer near Milton, and lived on the farm now owned by E. N. Norman. He died very suddenly from heart disease. While sitting in a chair in his house, he fell to the floor and immediately expired. C.: David, Daniel, William, Johnson, Frances, wife of Wm. Hulmes, Caroline, wife of John J. Norman, Amelia, wife of James Norman, Albert and Nathaniel.

NOAH Chamberlain, born August 8, 1790; died December 16, 1872; was twice married—first to Ann Cox, with whom the issue was, Jane, wife of Alfred Haggerty, Rebecca, Jehiel, Aaron, Sarah, wife of Lewis Hooverd, Delila and Arthur. Noah married second wife, Ann Mains, who was born in 1793; died in 1867. The children by this marriage were, Ellen, wife of John Rose, Benjamin and George. Noah Chamberlain seems to have died a natural death from old age, aged eighty-two years.

“LADIES AND GENTLEMEN, FELLOW NAMESAKES, CHAMBERLAINS, YOUR WIVES AND FAMILIES—One year ago to-day, at our first annual reunion, I experienced one of the proudest moments of my life by being unanimously elected president of the Chamberlain family of

the State of New Jersey; but at the same time I felt that this high honor and distinguished privilege rightfully belongs to some one other than to me; some one who had done more to bring about this happy reunion, or one better qualified as a speechmaker. But as I was your choice, and as a gentleman, which I know all Chamberlains to be, unless of the gentler sex, I could do nothing but accept the position with my heartfelt thanks to you all.

"All government is based on law; law is the admission of the subject to government for the mutual benefit of all. 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
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
