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

WORD or two of apology is due my patrons for the delay in the appearance of the DIRECTORY,—the first day of November last was the time the Compiler intended for its appearance. On the 14th day of June, 1875, I was stricken down with sickness—so severe, that the following December found me just able to be about, yet not strong enough for hardy exercise. In May, 1876, I commenced taking an enumeration of the City, but my last year's disease returning, enfeebled me so much that the work was not completed until about the first day of July following. Being my own type-setter, made it an arduous undertaking, without the lingering effects of my two summers' illness, which compelled me to stop work at different times for three or four days, and even for a week at a time. This is my apology for appearing before you at this late day.

To compensate my patrons for this unavoidable delay, I have given them some forty more pages than I first intended, and added such a variety of useful information, I am sure will be

pleasing to my many readers. See Table of Contents.

This DIRECTORY is made up so differently from other works of the kind, that the reader will be interested in almost every page. Those seeking information as to the population of our City, by adding up the first and second columns of figures, the total result will give them the number of inhabitants—the total result of the third and fourth columns will give the number of minors under 21 years of age. According to my count, I make the population a few under five thousand. This is less than many claimed. I do not claim perfection for the DIRECTORY—but I do claim that it is an improvement on all that have been previously published. That is all I claim. Over twenty-five hundred names will be found in the DIRECTORY department alone.

The "Three Score and Ten" department will be read with deep interest. For the few sketches I have obtained, the state-

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ments made therein were given by the persons named. They will please accept my thanks. Other sketches were promised, which I should have been pleased to have procured, but my continued ill health made it impossible for me to devote the time necessary to obtained the information required.

If life and health are spared, I shall endeavor to get up another work that will contain biographical sketches of all citizens over 70 years of age, not only of this city, but will also include the whole county.

Such errors of omission or commission my kind readers may discover, I respectfully ask them to overlook, for they are more annoying to the writer than to the reader.

NORMAN W. PUTNAM.

Mr. Norman W. Putnam, of Gambier, Ohio, was born in Windsor county, Vermont, on the 21st day of October, 1800. Came to Gambier in 1829. Was employed as clerk in the College Store, where he remained nearly five years. Was married to Miss Maria Douglass, in February, 1833, to whom were born ten children—seven now living.

From "Hildreth's Pioneers of Ohio," it appears that all the Putnams, of New England, descended from John Putnam, who emigrated from Buckinghamshire, England, and settled in Salem, Massachusetts, in 1634, where General Israel Putnam was born in 1717. General Rufus Putnam was born at Sutton, Worcester county, Massachusetts, in 1733. At the same place, Sutton, and not far from the same time, the grand-father of Norman Putnam was born. In regard to the exact relationship between the different branches of the Putnam family, our informant is unable to determine.

JAMES S. AND SOPHIA A. SAWER.

Mr. James Smith Sawer, of Gambier, was born in Leiston, county of Suffolk, England, on the 12th day of October, 1804. Came to Delaware county, Ohio, in 1833. Moved to Gambier in 1834. Went back to England in 1835. Was married to Miss Sophia Adams in 1836. Mr. Sawer returned to Gambier in 1836.

Mrs. Sophia A. Sawer, nee Adams, was born in Rushangles, county of Suffolk, England, on the 12th day of June, 1806. This venerable couple have been residents of Gambier since 1836.

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MOUNT VERNON.

OR a brief sketch of Mount Vernon, the compiler of this work, was in hopes of being able to have secured an abler pen than his own. In this he failed. He has been forced to become his own historian. He desires the kind wishes of his fellow-citizens for the success of an undertaking he ventured upon with many doubts and fears.

Howe's "Early Recollections of Ohio," and the Honorable A. Banning Norton's "History of Knox County, Ohio," both excellent works, has left so little to be said about the early history of our city, that it is almost impossible to write upon the subject without re-producing that upon which they both spent so much time and labor, and I do not wish to encroach upon their

"manor" more than is absolutely required.

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I quote a paragraph from Howe's "Recollections," on account of its being more condensed and to the point, than Mr. Norton's. Mr. Norton's account of the early settlement of our city, runs through some sixty pages of his work, and has so many personal anecdotes mixed up in the narrative, as to render it too burdensome for a work of this brief description. Howe writes:

"The early settlers of the county were mainly from the Middle States, with some of New England origin. In 1805 MOUNT VERON was laid out, and named by the proprietors of the soil, Who were Joseph Walker, Thomas B. Patterson and Ben-JAMIN BUTLER." Mount Vernon was named after the family residence of General Washington. "At this time the county was thinly settled. Two years after, the principal settlers were. as far as they are recollected, the Rileys, Darlings, Shrimplins, Butlers, Critchfields, Welkers, Dials, Logues and De Witts, on the Vernon river. In other parts of the county the Hurds, the Beams, Hunts and Dimick, Kerr, Avres, Houck, Dalrymple, Hilliard, the Youngs, Mitchells, Bryants, Knights and Walkers. In the spring of 1807 there were only three families living on the plat of Mount Vernon, viz: Benjamin Butler, taveru keeper, from Pennsylvania, Peter Covle, and James Craig.

early settlers of the village were, besides those named, Joseph and James Walker, Michael Click, David and William Pettigrew, Samuel Kratzer, Gilman Bryant, and Rev. James Smith, who came in 1808, and was the first Methodist elergymen."

The ruse played upon the Commissioners appointed to locate the Seat of Justice for the County of Knox, has been published and narrated so often, that it has become as familiar to all "as a twice told tale," consequently I refrain from giving it place in this sketch. Mr. Norton gives three versions of the affair, as related to him by old settlers. Clinton, the only rival for the prize, at that time, was far ahead of Mount Vernon, submitted with a bad grace, and for over five years, made great efforts to obtain a re-hearing. But all in vain.

The first store opened in Mount Vernon, was owned by Mr. Gilman Bryant, and was situated on the lot where now stands the store of Messrs. J. C. Swetland & Co., south west corner of Main and Gambier streets. "It was a little story and-a-half sycamore cabin, where he kept powder, shot, lead, whisky, etc., for sale to the Indians, and the few whites, in 1807."—Norton.

"The first brick building was erected in the spring of 1815, by Mr. Gilman Bryant."—Howe. During the past season, this old building has been demolished, and the Honorable HENRY B. CURTIS has erected on its site one of the most substantial and beautiful public buildings in Central Ohio.

"The first church, the Old School Presbyterian, (now down,) was built about 1817. It was of brick, forty feet square, and one story high; the first Pastor was the Rev. James Scott. The first licensed preacher in the county was the Rev. William Thrift, a Baptist, from Loudon county, Virginia, who came in 1807, and travelled from house to house."—Hove.

Upon the site of the church just alluded to, the Presbyterian society erected a large and substantial frame church. This last building was destroyed by fire, and a few years since the members of the church erected the present beautiful edifice. The present Pastor is the Rey, O. H. Newton.

The first boundary lines of the city I recollect of seeing, though I placed but little confidence in its reliability, was given by a Mount Vernon correspondent of the Columbus *Onio State Journal*, and appeared under date of January 9, 1869, and reads as follows:

"Mount Vernon is bounded on the north by the Fifth Ward and John H. Roberts; on the east by Gambier Hill and the but-

ter and egg wagons of George B. Potwin; on the south by the waters of Owl Creek, the Gas Works and Arentrue's brewery; and on the west by George Raymond's tannery, and Norton's Mill Race!"

February 26, 1845, the State Legislature passed an act entitled "An Act to Incorporate the Town of Mount Vernon, in Knox county," the first section reads as follows:

Sec. 1. Be it Ordained by the General Assembly of the State of Ohio, That so much of the town of Mount Vernon, in the county of Knox, as is comprised in the limits hereinafter described, that is to say, all the in-lots, streets and alleys, and other public ground bordered by the same, within the old original town plat, and its several recorded and confirmed additions, together with all fractions of lots or parcels of ground lying between the old town plat and either of said additions, especially to include such fractions or portions of ground not already laid out into town lots, as lie between the south line of Hamtramek street, and the north line of Burgess street, extended between the Hamtramek addition and Norton's addition; and so much of like ground as lies south of the north line of Chestnut street, extended east to the Coshocton road, and to include one tier of in-lots of usual size on the north side of Chestnut street, so extended as aforesaid; also embracing the following grounds—commen-cing at Lambton Square, at the junction of the Mansfield and Wooster roads; thence along the Mansfield road to the intersection of the north line of the cross street or road, to the new grave-yard; thence along the north line of said cross street to the grave-yard lot; thence north, and so running around said grave-yard lot and including the school house lot to the south east corner thereof; thence following the aforesaid grave yard street, to the east line of the Wooster road; thence southward along the east line of the said Wooster road and the east line of Gay street, as extended to North street; thence west to Main or Market street; thence north to the place of beginning, except such lots and streets in any of said plats or additions as have been vacated; Provided, That this exception shall not exclude the vacated lots and streets east of Division street, and north of Front street in the eastern addition, but the same are hereby included in the limits according to the eastern boundary of said addition, as originally laid out and recorded, be and the same is hereby created into a town corporate, to be known by the name of the town of Mount Vernon; Provided, That all ground hereafter laid out and recorded as town lots, or additions to said town, by name or otherwise, if contiguous thereto, shall, from the time of being so recorded, be included within the corporate limits of said town and constitute a part thereof.

Farther provisions of the above quoted act of incorporation, divided the town into five Wards, and allotted one Councilman to each Ward, and provided for their election; and also, for the



election of one Mayor, and one Recorder for the town at large. The first officers elected under this act of incorporation, were as follows: ISAAC DAVIS, MAYOF—JAMES SMITH, JR., Recorder—and the following Councilmen—First Ward, J. ELLIOTT—Second Ward, JOB EVANS—Third Ward, R. C. HURD—Fourth Ward, H. B. CURTIS—Fifth Ward, CHARLES COOPER.

Farther provisions of the act provided for the election of one town Treasurer, and one town Marshal, and one Street Commissioner. For these places I find that A. C. ELLIOTT was elected as Treasurer, C. L. Bennett, Marshal, and J. L. Young, Street Commissioner.

Sec. Lix. of the Municipal Code, passed May 3, 1852, provides "for the election of two Trustees for each Ward."

"Sec. XXI. Any town which by the special act of incorporation has been divided into Wards, shall be denominated a city of the Second Class, if the Council shall so determine."—Ohio Law, passed 1853.

SEC. VII., of an Act to provide for the Organization of Municipal Corporations, reads in part, as follows: "No incorporated village shall be advanced to the grade of a City of the Second Class until it shall have attained a population of five thousand."—Passed May 7, 1869.

FIRST WORK EVER DONE ON THE STREETS OF MOUNT VERNON.

Mr. Norton, in his "History of Knox County," pages 95-6, gives this description of the first work ever done on the streets of Mount Vernon:

"Jonathan Hunt informs us he was one of the volunteer workers on the streets, at the time the Commissioners came on, (to locate the county seat,) and that Gilman Bryant sort of bossed the work, and, being a cripple, he tended on them, and gave out the whisky and water, cheering them up as he came around, saying, 'work like men in harvest, but keep sober, boys.'—Mike Click, and John Click, his brother, drove the oxen. Mike was a bully hand with a team, and made them tear up stumps, haul logs, plow, and scrape, as necessary. Men never worked better on a road than that force then did. They chopped down trees, cut off logs, grubbed, dug down rough places, filled up gulleys, burned log heaps, and made a wonderful change in the appearance of things. It was the first work ever done on the streets of Mount Vernon."

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MOUNT VERNON'S PRESENT BOUNDARY LINES.

N the 2d day of March, 1870, our City Council passed "An Ordinance Defining and Establishing the Corporate Limits of the City of Mount Vernon, Ohio." The provisions of this Ordinance, I doubt not, will be new to most of my readers, and as a part of the current history of our beautiful City, the compiler of this work feels constrained to re-produce it here entire, for the information of our citizens. The provisions of the Ordinance reads as follows:

SEC. 1. Be it ordained by the City Council of the City of Mount Vernon, That the City Corporation Line of the City of Mount Vernon be, and is hereby established by the following described lines, to-wit:

Beginning at the south-west corner of the north abutment of the bridge at the south end of Main street, and running thence S. 533°, E. 20 50-100 rods along the stone wall south of John Cooper's Steam Engine Works, to the south-east angle thereof. Thence N. 832°, E. 5 16-100 rods to the south-east angle of John Cooper's fence, on the west side of Gay street. Thence S. 83½°, E. 12 40-100 rods to the south-west corner of the Factory addition. by the courses and distances bounding the south side of said addition to the south-west corner of Curtis' and Byer's lot, being lot No. 34 in said addition. Thence N. 83\frac{1}{4}\circ\text{, E. 25 80-100 rods, continuing along the south line of said addition. Thence N. 74\footnote{100}, E. 32 60-100 rods along said south boundary, and by the same course to a point on the east line of Ridgely street, and near the south line of Water street. Thence N. 2, E. 1 36-100 rods on east line of Ridgely street to a point on the south side of the Springfield, Mount Vernon and Pittsburg Railroad line. Thence S. 80°, E. 38-100 rods to a White Oak 28 inches diameter, S. 731°, E. 21 52-100 rods S. 64°, E. 27 16-100 rods along the south side of said railroad line to the center of Allen Beach's alley. Thence N. $1\frac{3}{4}$ °, E. 28-100 rods along the center of said alley to a point 12 rods south of the south side of Gambier street. Thence S. 73½°, E. 114 40-100 rods on a line parallel with the south side of Gambier street to the east line of Clinton township. Thence N. 23, E. 94 50-100 rods on said township line to the south side of the new Gambier road. Thence N. 88', W. 37-100 rods along the south side of said road to a point in line with the east side of Center Run street. Thence N. 2°, E. 98-100 rods along the east line of Center Run street to the center of Coshocton road. Thence N. 70², E. 14 12-100 rods along the center of said road to John Flynn's south-east corner. Thence N. 17½°, W. 13 92-100 rods to said Flynn's north-east corner in the center of the "Harkness road." Thence N. 88°, 20° W. 166 86-100 rods along the center of said road to the south-east corner of Mrs. Plimpton's lot, known as "Round Hill." Thence N. 2°, E. 41 90-100 rods along the east side of said lot, to a point in line with the north side of Cur-

tis street. Thence on said line N. 89°, W. 43 50-100 rods to the east side of McKenzie street. Thence N. 2°, E. 24 84-100 rods to the south line of land owned by the heirs of Rev. James Scott's deceased. Thence N. 31½°, E. 36 50-100 rods across said Scott's land, 10 feet north of the stable, and along the north-east side of an alley, across and to the west side of the Wooster road.— Thence on the west side of said road N. 40½°, E. 13 40-100 rods to the north-east corner of John McGibney's lot. Thence N. 49½°, W. 12 40-100 rods along the north line of said lot, to the northwest corner thereof. Thence N. 88½°, E. 26 50-100 rods along the north side of land owned by John McGibney to the east side of the Cemetery. Thence N. 2, 10, E. 39 80-100 rods on the east side of the Cemetery to the north-east corner thereof. Thence N. 88°, 50°, W. 18 92-100 rods on the north line of said Cemetery to the east line of the Catholic Cemetery. Thence on said east line N. 2', 10', E. 8 60-100 rods to the north-east corner of said Cemetery. Thence S. 76³, W. 43 8-100 rods along the north side of said Cemetery and Mrs. Pollock's lots, to the west side of the Mansfield road. Thence along the west side of said road N. 14°. W. 25 75-100 rods to the south side of a road on the north side of lands owned by Widow Trimble's heirs. Thence continuing along the south side of said road S. 763°, W. 39.80 rods to the angle Thence S. 68°, W. 24 rods along the south line of said road, to a point in line with Mr. Flaharty's east line. Thence on said east line N. 15‡, W. 12.60 rods to said Flaharty's north-east corner. Thence S. 72, W. 25.84 rods along the north line of Flaharty's lot to the east end of the alley north of the tannery.— Thence across the east end of said alley N. 22°, W. 0.76 rods to the north side thereof. Thence S. 72°, 11.68 rods on the north line of said alley, and to the west side of Sandusky street.—Thence on the west side of said street N. 21°, W. 6.80 rods to the Thence on the north side north-east corner of John Cassil's lot. of said lot S. 683°, W. 60.25 rods to the west side of the Baltimore Thence along the west side of said railroad and Ohio Railroad. to the north line of Norton's North-Western addition. S. 68³°, W. 10 rods to the north-west corner of said addition.— Thence S. 41½°, E. 25.50 rods along the west side of said addition to the west side of said railroad. Thence along the west side of said rail-road by the curves and tangents thereof 156.50 rods to a point 4 feet west of the west end of the race bridge abutment and 9 rods north of the north line of Chestnut street. Thence N. 881°, W. 60.23 rods through lands of George K. Norton, James Rogers and others to the east line of lands owned by heirs of John Mitchell, deceased. Thence N. $1\frac{5}{4}$ °, E. 7.20 rods on said Mitchell's east line to the north-west corner of said land. Thence N. 89°, W. 73.62 rods along the north line of said John Mitchell's, Silas Mitchell's, John Gotshall's, Sapp and Rogers' lands to the north-east corner of lands formerly owned by Samuel Hook-away. Thence S. 1½°, W. 91.62 rods along the east line of said land and through lands of Israel and Devin, to a point 83 rods south of the south line of Wood street extended. Thence S. 89°, E. 115.14 rods to the west line of lot No. 10 in Norton's Southern

Thence south 2°, W. along the west side of lots 10 and 11, 6.35 rods to the south-west corner of lot No. 11, the same being on the south line of said Southern addition. Thence S. 89°, E. 8 rods on the south line of said lot No. 11, to the west side of Norton street. Thence N. 2', E. 8 rods on the west side of said street. Thence S. 89', E. 19 rods along the south side of lots marked "S. Gray" on city map, to the west side of the Baltimore and Ohio Railroad. Thence S. 584°, E. 22 rods along the west side of said railroad to a point on the north side of the old Thence S. 64°, E. 35.48 rods along the north side of the

SEC. 2. That William McClelland, the City Solicitor, be and hereby is directed to prosecute the proceedings necessary to effect the annexation contemplated in Section first of this Ordinance.

SEC. 3. That the foregoing Ordinance shall take effect and be in force from and after its passage and due publication.

Things to be Remembered.

A pound avoirdupois is equal to 7,000 grains.

If a stone be dropped from the hand, it will fall through 16

feet during the first second of time.

Steel is the strongest metal, but gold is the most malleable; for a cubic inch of gold can be beaten out so as to cover the floor of a room 50 feet long and 40 feet wide.

The diamond is the hardest solid; that is to say, it can scratch

everything else, but nothing else can scratch it.

A cubic inch of water weighs nearly 252 grains; and, therefore, four cubic inches weigh nearly 1,000 grains.

100 cubic inches of air weigh 31 grains.

100 cubic inches of carbonic acid weigh 47 grains. 100 cubic inches of hydrogen only weigh 2 grains.

The pressure of the atmosphere will support a column of mercury 30 inches high, and a column of water more than 30 feet high. Sound travels through air at a velocity of about 1,100 feet in one second of time.

If a musical string vibrates 50 times in one second, it emits a deep, low note; if it vibrates 10,000 times in one second, it emits

a shrill, high note.

The heat required to melt a pound of ice would heat 79 pounds of water one degree. The heat required to boil away a pound of boiling water would heat 537 pounds of water one degree.

The spark from a Leyden jar lasts only the twenty-four-thou-

sandth part of one second.—Prof. Balfour Stewart.

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LITERARY AND OTHER SOCIETIES.

E quote from Norton's "History of Knox County." page 270, "The first Society of a literary character, established at Mount Vernon, was the 'Polemic Society,' in 1815, which was kept up until 1817, and included among its members the more talkative and social citizens. It was converted into a Thespian Society, and was well sustained for many years. Theatrical performances were generally gotten up every winter, for a number of years, and were very creditable to those concerned. The object was to spend the long winter evenings agreeably—not to make money. Lawyers, Doctors, Merchants, and Students. lent a hand as occasion required. Among the active and valuable upon the boards, were Dr. R. P. Moore, Philo L. Norton, J. W. Warden, Charles Sager, T. G. Plummer, Jacob Davis, Wm. Smith, S. W. Hildreth, S. W. Farguhar, Eli Miller, Henry B. Curtis, T. W. Rogers, Isaac Hadley, John Colerick, J. S. Banning, and Calvin Hill. The exhibitions were usually at the Court House, or at the Golden Swan Inn. (The Golden Swan Inn building is now known as the Swetland and Banner office corner.—White.) The clothing, equipments and scenery, were of very rich material. One of the old actors says-' it was most splendidly illustrated with georgeous parahernalia in most profuse variety and transcends representation."

In 1816 "The Mount Vernon Library Society" was formed. In 1821-2 the young bachelors of the town formed "The Mount Vernon Literary Society." In 1830 "The Mount Vernon Lyceum" was organized, and was well sustained for many years.

About the year 1830, a regular "Amateur Dramatic Association" was organized, and continued in existence until about 1840. The representations took place in the second story of the Huntsberry building, now known as the "Old Masonic Hall." At that time the whole of the second story was one large room, and, for Theatrical purposes, answered very well. The prominent members were, F. J. Zimmerman, Wm. Thompson, James Blake, James Smith, E. C. Vore, Benj. F. Smith, Benj. Colopy, N. N. Hill, Thomas Shaw, David Brentlinger, Elijah Stevens, Alex. Elliott, and Jacob B. Brown. One farce gave our citizens great amusement, and is often spoken of yet, viz: "Raising the Wind." Among the cast of characters, now recolleced, were—"Jeremy Diddler," F. J. Zimmerman; "Peggy, the beautiful Maid at the foot of the Hill," was well sustained by Thomas Shaw. David Brentlinger was the company's Singer and Ventriloquist. The Orchestra consisted of N. N. Hill, Benj. Colopy and Alex. Elliott. Stage Managers, B. F. Smith and F. J. Zimmerman.

In 1834, a "Mechanics' Society" was organized, which continued in operation until 1840. In 1839, a society called the "Franklin," was formed for mental improvement.

"In 1850, Zohar Blair, Noah Hill, Robert Thompson, Daniel Clark, and Samuel Davis, started 'The Mechanics' Mutual Protection Association,' which, after two years, was merged in the Brotherhood of the Union, and continued till 1854."

In December, 1849, several gentlemen of Mount Vernon set about getting up a Historical Society for Knox County, and, in 1850, a constitution was drawn up and signed by "thirty-two gentlemen, fourteen of whom," writes Mr. Norton, "have passed way from earth. Twelve years have passed by, the society long since was numbered with the things that were—and this—(the "History of Knox County,")—comes the nearest to being a report of any thing that yet has emanated from any of its members."

Mr. Norton gives the names of the members of the Historical Society, which we take pleasure in copying, viz:

Buckingham, G. W. Morgan, C. Delano, Walter Smith, M. W. Stamp, N. N. Hill, George Browning, Matthew Thompson, J. C. Ramsey, J. N. Burr, Samuel Israel, W. Beam, J. W. Vance, W. H. Smith, John C. Stockton, D. Potwin, John W. White, J. H. Peacock, Samuel Mower, John W. Russell. Hosmer Curtis was chosen President; G. Bryant, Vice President;

R. C. Hurd, Treasurer; Rev. J. Muenscher, Corresponding Secretary; M. E. Strieby, Recording Secretary; R. R. Sloan, Cabinet Keeper.

In 1856, Rev. Dr. Muenscher formed a new "Mount Vernon Library Society," that continued in existence till some time in 1864.

In 1856, Dr. T. Eugene Clark, Robert Buck, J. Q. Buck, Wm. A. Bounds, Thomas Wilson, C. Springer and John W. White, associated together, and formed "The Atheneum," for Amateur Theatrical representations. They were assisted by Mrs. J. Q. Buck, Miss Irene Swan, and Miss Sallie Swetnam, of Cincinnati, and Miss Julia Irvine of New York city. The association continued for two years, and numerous performances were given the citizens.

On the evening of Monday, February 16, 1874, an association of young ladies and gentlemen of this city, gave an Amateur Dramatic entertainment, at Wolff's Hall. The pieces selected were the popular drama entitled "All that Glitters is not Gold," and the laughable farce of "The Quiet Family." The Banner, of February 20, speaking of the first night's performance, says: "The house was crowded to overflowing, and every thing passed off to the entire satisfaction of all concerned. The audience were so well pleased with the performance, that it was repeated, by general request, on the next evening."

On the evening of May 4, 1874, the same association placed upon the boards the pleasing drama of "Down by the Sea," and the roaring farce of "Raising the Wind." This entertainment was given under the auspices, and for the benefit of the "MOUNT VERNON SILVER CORNET BAND." The performance of these two pieces gave as much, if not more, satisfaction, to the audience, than the performances of February 16, and 17, 1874.

On the evening of February 25, 1876, the same association presented to our people, at Kirk Hall, "The Honeymoon," for the benefit of the "Soldiers' Monument." The city newspapers of the day claimed that the members of the association surpassed their previous performances. The play, by request, was repeated the next evening. The Programme of "The Honeymoon," was thought worthy, by the committee, of a place in the Corner Stone of the Monument.

As an act of justice to the ladies and gentlemen composing the "Amateur Dramatic Association," of this city, as the proceeds of ALL their entertainments, were devoted to charitable and benevolent purposes, the compiler of this brief sketch, begs leave to record, for preservation, their names, which are as follows, viz:

In the winter of 1876, some of the scholars of the Mount Vernon High School, formed "The PI Delta Psi Society," and held weekly meetings. On the evening of May 26, 1876, the Society gave a Grand Dramatic Entertainment at Kirk Hall. The entertainment was highly appreciated by a large and intelligent audience. The Programme was an excellent one. Among the performers were Charles M. Pepper, Samuel R. Gotshall, Flora Stephens, Emma Shaw, Ella Shaw, Charles W. Doty, Sue Miller, May Snook, Kate E. Swetland, Jessie White, A. Wm. Marsh, Harrie Martin, Louis Lane, Frank Harper, Clara McFarland, Jennie Chapman, Mary Sapp.

June 28, 1876, the scholars of "Saint Vincent De Paul's Parochial School," of this city, gave a delightful entertainment at Kirk Hall. The only drawback to the Programme was its extreme length, which must have been fatiguing to the youthful performers, ranging in age from seven years to fourteen.

At death, each member's family will receive back the amount paid on death assessments, together with the contributions of his or her class.

A NOBLE PHYSICIAN.

ISHOP BEDELL, in an Address to a graduating medical class, dwells upon the influence of conscientiousness in a Physician. He gives the following interesting anecdote as an illustration of what he means by that moral quality:

"I was very ill in Chamounix, under the shadow of Mont Blanc. Those grand ice pinnacles, that majestic dome of snow, those slow-creeping glaciers, that brawling Arve, give to the valley—itself 4,000 feet above the sea level—an atmosphere which invalids resort to for health, and strong men for the luxury of breathing in. Men are not expected to be ill there.

"So there was no physician resident nearer than Geneva,—a long day's journey. But a physician had taken a house at Chamounix for the summer, waiting with his family until a lucrative situation, for which he had applied, should be open to him. He was in daily expectation of being summoned to his new

home, when he was summoned to my bedside.

"He found a case of typhus fever. He watched and nursed me like a brother. During long weeks of semi-consciousness his presence met every moment of need. After about a month he received the welcome message that his new home was ready. He replied that he would come immediately, for his patient was recovering.

"But his patient relapsed. Again dangerous symptoms set in. And in the midst of them came a letter indicating that great anxiety existed for his presence at his new home. He asked for a little delay, expecting to be speedily relieved; but the symptoms were aggravated, and the disease unbroken.

"A telegram arrived, summoning him in a week. The week passed. He replied to it that his patient needed care a few days

longer.

"He was not an unknown man. Trained in the Jesuit College at Turin, in the same class with Cavour, the great statesman of Italy, he devoted himself to medicine, and afterward taught it, in the medical Faculty of that city. During the Crimean war he was the head of a medical staff on the field. He had solicited the position which was now open to him, and had expected it anxiously. He was a devoted Roman Catholic, an Italian, having no ties nor any particular sympathy with an American and a Protestant.

"But his patient needed him. He stood between him and death. There was no one within a long day's journey to take that place. And, therefore, when the next telegram arrived, that he must come within twenty-four hours or the position would be given to another applicant, he calmly telegraphed in reply—his patient needed him. He would sacrifice the place, but not his duty.

"That was conscientiousness. And I write the name of Charles Dupraz high on the scroll of my grateful recollections of noble men—Physicians."

SPONTANEOUS COMBUSTION.

T is now well known that many substances, under certain combinations, will take fire of themselves, upon the principle known as spontaneous combustion.

Cotton, saturated with linseed oil, has been known to inflame within two hours.

Canvass, painted with white lead and oil, dried, rolled, and put under cover, burned in a few hours.

An old packing sheet, smeared with oil, took fire.

Cotton Rags, on which oil had been spilled, took fire while being delivered from a cellar.

Dirty Rags, upon which workmen have wiped oil from their hands; these, thrown into a heap, are pretty sure to heat and ignite in time.

Linseed Oil, dropped upon wool, has caused several fires.

The paint and oil room of a carriage shop burst into a flame; cause, wood work smeared with flax seed oil.

Bituminous coal has burned spontaneously, and caused several large conflagrations.

Wool, greased for carding, ignited in a few hours.

Linen rags, in paper mills, undergoing fermentation, require careful attention.

A species of fireworks known as "red fire," purchased on the fourth of July, and not used, subsequently ignited and set fire to the house.

A man seated himself upon an empty oil barrel, which had been standing for some time upon the side walk, exposed to the sun. Wishing to light his pipe, he struck a match upon the barrel, when the gas, with which it was filled, exploded, severely injuring the temporary tenant.

THE PRESIDENTIAL ELECTORS.

T the first and second elections (1788 and 1792) all the electors appointed voted for Washington, who was the only President ever chosen by an unanimous vote. At the third election (1795) 139 electors were appointed, 71 of whom voted for John Adams and 6s of whom voted for Thomas Jeferson—electing Adams by a majority of only two votes. The electors did not divide by States or "colleges," as is shown by these facts: The people in North Carolina appointed 12 electors; 11 of them voted for Jefferson and 1 for Adams. In Virginia 21 electors were appointed: 20 voted for Jefferson and 1 for Adams. Of the 11 electors appointed in Maryland, 4 voted for Jefferson and 7 for Adams. Of the 15 appointed in Pennsylvania, 14 voted for Jefferson and 1 for Adams.

At the fourth election (1800) occurred the famous contest between Jefferson and Burr, each of whom received 73 votes, given by electors appointed in nine States. The 12 electors of New York, the 21 of Virginia, the 4 of Kentucky, the 3 of Tennessee, the 8 of South Carolina, and the 4 of Georgia, all voted solidly for both, intending that one should be President and the other Vice President, but not expressing any choice between them. The 15 electors of Pennsylvania gave to each of them 8 votes, and 7 others each to Mr. Adams and Mr. Pinckney. The 10 electors of Maryland divided equally between Jefferson and Burr, and also equally between Adams and Pinckney. The North Carolina

electors were similarly divided.

The 12th amendment of the Constitution was an outcome of that memorable contest, requiring the electors to vote separately for President and Vice President. Under that amendment only one election took place, prior to Van Buren, in which the electors of one or more States were not divided in their choice according to personal preferences, as the following memoranda will show:

Fifth election (1804). Of the 11 electors of Maryland, 9 voted

for Jefferson and 2 for C. C. Pinckney.

Sixth election (1808). Of the 19 electors of New York, 13 voted for Madison and 6 for George Clinton. Of the 11 of Maryland, 9 voted for Madison and 2 for C. C. Pinckney. Of the 14 of North Carolina, 11 voted for Madison and 3 for Pinckney.

Seventh election (1812). Of the H electors of Maryland, 6 vo-

ted for Madison and 5 for DeWitt Clinton.

Eighth election (1816). In this election none of the colleges were divided for President, though for Vice President Connecticut was divided between James Ross and John Marshall. The candidates for President were James Monroe and Rufus King.

Ninth election (1820). Of the 8 electors of New Hampshire, 7 voted for Monroe and 1 for John Q. Adams. Excepting this one, Monroe received the votes of all the electors appointed. For Vice President, three of the colleges were divided.

Tenth election (1824). Of the 36 electors of New York, I voted for Jackson, 26 for J. Q. Adams, 5 for W. H. Crawford, and 4

for H. Clay. Of the 3 of Delaware, 1 voted for Adams and 2 for Crawford. Of the 11 of Maryland, 7 voted for Jackson, 3 for Adams, and 1 for Crawford. Of the 5 of Louisiana, 3 voted for Jackson and 2 for Adams. Of the 3 of Illinois, 2 voted for Jackson and 1 for Adams. The votes for Vice President were similarly given according to the preferences of the electors.

Eleventh election (1828). Of the 9 electors of Maine, 1 voted for Jackson and 8 for Adams. Of the 36 of New York, 20 voted for Jackson and 6 for Adams. Of the 11 of Maryland, 5 voted for Jackson and 6 for Adams. There were similar divisions

for Vice President.

Twelfth election (1832). The college of Maryland was divided between Jackson and Clay. No divisions in electoral colleges since 1832 until 1872. The death of Horace Greeley left the electors chosen in his interest free. They voted as their preferences dictated.

OUR COAST LINES.

EW persons not familiar with geography will believe that the Pacific ocean boundary of the United States has a greater extent of coast line than the Atlantic shore. The aggregate of our shore line on the Pacific is 12,734 miles, whilst on the Atlantic it is 11,860 miles, and on the Gulf of Mexico 6843 miles. California contains 1136 miles of the coast line on the Pacific, whilst she has also 272 miles of island shore and 240 miles of tide water river shore, making altogether 1648 miles of shore line. Texas has an actual coast line on the Gulf of 1249 miles, whilst Florida has 1144 miles on the Gulf, and 363 on the Atlantic, so that both exceed California in this particular. It is the annexation of Alaska that has promoted the Pacific coast to a higher figure than the Atlantic, Alaska having 9830 miles of coast line. These figures are from the Coast Survey Reports.

APPARENT AND MEAN TIME.

TIME is both apparent and mean. The sun is on the meridian at 12 o'clock on four days only in the year. It is sometimes as much as 16½ minutes before or after twelve when its shadow strikes the noon-mark on the sun-dial. This is occasioned by the irregular motion of the earth on its axis and the inclination of its poles. This is called apparent time. Mean time is determined by the equitation of these irregularities for every day in the year.

ANAXIMANDER, a philosopher, born at Miletus, Greece, B. C. 610, was the first to delineate the surface of the earth, and mark the divisions of land and water upon an artificial globe.

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SHORT BIOGRAPHICAL SKETCHES.

[The following brief personal sketches of a few of our aged and venerable citizens were collected during the summer just past, with a view of bringing before our readers the experience and trials of our pioneer settlers. The limited capacity of our little work will only permit of brief mention. The sketches are given in the order in which they were obtained.]

I—II.

JOHN AND SARAH CROWL.

Mr. John Crowl, of the Fifth Ward, was born in the then small village of Martinsburgh, Virginia, on the 6th day of April, 1789. He came to Mount Vernon, Ohio, on the 26th day of November, 1826. Mr. Crowl has been twice married. He married his present wife, May 6, 1844.

Mrs. Sarah Crowl, (wife of Mr. John Crowl,) was born in the village of ______, New Jersey, on the 16th day of December, 1793.

She removed to Mount Vernon, Ohio, in the year 1838, and was married to Mr. John Crowl, on the date above mentioned.

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III.

WILLIAM BURRISS.

Mr. WILLIAM BURRISS, of the Fifth Ward, was born in Lancashire, England, August 6, 1804. Mr. Burriss landed at the New York City Docks on the 20th day of May, 1846. The voyage across the Ocean occupied five weeks. Mr. Burriss started on foot for the Great West, and reached Mount Vernon, Ohio, June 6, 1846. In his youth he learned the trade of blacksmith.

IV.

SAMUEL TAYLOR.

Mr. Samuel Taylor, of the Second Ward, was born in the town of Troy, State of New York, on the 14th day of April, 1800. Mr. Taylor removed to Mount Vernon, Ohio, on the 7th day of June, 1839, and has been a resident of the place ever since. During a residence of thirty-seven years, he has lived in only four houses—thirty-five of the thirty-seven years, he has spent in his present residence. By profession Mr. Taylor is a cooper.

V.

NANCY ROBINSON.

Mrs. Nancy Robinson, (the mother of Mrs. Jacob Earnest,) of the Fourth Ward, was born December 25, 1792, near Frostburg, Maryland. In Ohio, she first located at Dunville, Knox county, and came to Mount Vernon, October 16, 1866.

VI.

SAMUEL DUNCAN.

Mr. Samuel Duncan, of the Second Ward, was born in Doylestown, Pennsylvania, on the —— day of April, 1801. Mr. Duncan came to Ohio when 20 years of age. The exact date of his arrival in Mount Vernon is unknown, but he claims to have resided here thirty-two years. Accurate dates in Mr. Duncan's career could not be obtained, as no record of events was kept by his family.

VII.

DANIEL McGRADY.

Mr, Daniel McGrady, of the Fourth Ward, was born November —, 1792, in Londonderry, Ireland. He came to New York city in the year 1816, and to Mount Vernon, O., September 15, 1838. Mr. McGrady served three years as a private in the British Army prior to his emigration to America.

VIII---IX.

JACOB AND NANCY BOOZE.

Mr. Jacob Booze, of the Second Ward, was born August 10, 1796, in the county of Washington, Penn. He first came to Mount Vernon, June 7, 1831. Mr. Booze has been married three times, and is the father of thirteen children, eleven of whom are still living—eight in Ohio, (three in Knox county,) one in Indiana, and two in Missouri. He married Miss Nancy Byers, (his third wife.) December 7, 1852.

Mrs. Nancy Booze, (wife of Jacob Booze,) was born January 29, 1807, in Harrison county, Ohio, within a few miles of Cadiz, the county seat. She came to Knox county in April, 1822; married Mr. Booze December 7, 1850, and took up her residence in Mount Vernon in April, 1874.

X.

GEORGE C. LYBRAND.

Mr. G.56 ee C. Lybrand, of the First Ward, was born June 16, 1792, in the city of Philadelphia, Pa. He came to Mount Vernon in April, 1823. In the earlier days of our city, Mr. Lybrand took a prominent part, and was, at one time, an active and energetic merchant. His means were freely used, not so much for his own immediate aggrandisement, as for the growth and prosperity of the place of his adoption. The "Lybrand House," (now known as the "Rowley House,") was, at the time of its erection, considered one of the most extensive public buildings in Central Ohio; this house, and the large brick tenement block located on east Front street, are standing monuments of his public spirit and enterprise.

XI-XII.

JOHN AND MARY MILLER.

Mr. JOHN MILLER, of the Foarth Ward, was born June 9, 1799, in Fredericktown, Maryland. He married Miss Mary Deems, of Cumberland, Md., July —, 1822. He came to Mount Vernon, August 10, 1835.

Mrs. MARY MILLER, (nee Deems,) was born July 28, 1802, in Cumberland, Md. She murried Mr. Miller, at the time stated above, and cume to Mount Vernon with her husband in 1835.

XIII.

ALBERT MITCHELL.

Mr. Albert Mitchell, of the First Ward, was born on the 31st day of October, 1805, in the village of Blandford, Mrss. On seeking a home in the Great West, his father came to Ohio, and located in Granville, Licking county, November 1st, 1806, when Albert was a little over one year of age. Albert came to Knox county in April, 1824, and in May, 1825, he located in this place, and Mount Vernon has been his home ever since.

XIV.

WILLIAM FORDNEY.

Mr. WILLIAM FORDNEY, of the Fifth Ward, although not strictly coming under the head of "Three Score and Ten," as to age, yet his long residence in Mount Vernon justly entitles him to a place with those more venerable in age. For forty-two years this city has been his abiding place, forty-one of those forty-two years have been spent in his present home, on upper Mulberry street. For the first years of his residence here, it was not unusual for him to stand in the back door of his house of a morning and shoot enough rabbits for breakfast and dinner, for between Mulberry street and the Sandusky road was a dense forest of trees and hazel bushes, the latter so closely packed as to prevent the passage of any thing larger than the smaller wild animals then so numerous. If appetite demanded a change of flesh for food, Mr. Fordney had only to change position and go east, for between Mulberry and Main street, was another forest, abounding with squirrels, many of whom fell victims to his gun. Vernon in 1834, although at that date quite a thriving town, and Mount Vernon in 1876, so far as permanent improvements are concerned, none but the earlier settlers have a correct idea of the vast contrast between the two periods named.

Mr. Fordney was born in the fown of Lancaster, Pennsylvania, on the 21st day of January, 1812. In 1833 he married Miss Ann Barber Nagle, also of Lancaster, Penn. On the 28th day of November, 1834, he and his wife cast their lot with the people of this city. Mrs. Fordney died in this city on the 5th day of June, 1859. To them were born eight children, five of whom are still

living.

XV.

RUSSELL T. CRANDALL.

Mr. Russell T. Crandall, of the Fifth Ward, was born in the town of Burlington, Unadilla county, New York, on the 5th of January, 1802. Mr. Crandall came to Knox county, Ohio, in the year 1829. In the spring of 1876, Mr. C. was elected assessor for the Fifth Ward.

XVI.

NANCY HALL.

Mrs. NANCY HALL, of the Second Ward, was born January 1, 1798, in Shenendoah county, Virginia, near Aspey Ferry. She came to Mount Vernon in 1872.

XVII.

MARY CARTER.

Mrs. Mary Carter, of the Fifth Ward, was born in Georgetown, (now a part of the District of Columbia,) June 22, 1805. Mrs. Carter came to Knox county, Ohio, in 1840.

XVIII.

JANE HENEGAN.

Mrs. Jane Henegan, nee Miss Jane Shaw, of the Third Ward, was born on the 10th day of March, 1804, in Sixside, near Carron Hill, Parish of Old Monkland, Lanarkshire, Scotland. On the ——day of ———, 18—, she married Mr. William Henegan, of the Parish of Killmackshalgan, county of Sligo, Ireland. Mr. H. was born on the 4th day of February, 1803, and died at Keokuk, Iowa, on the 17th day of August, 1870. Mr. and Mrs. H., with their family, came to Mount Vernon in 1853.

The subject of this brief sketch, with her husband and family, left Glasgow, Scotland, September 16, 1849—Liverpool, England, September 18, and arrived at New Orleans, U. S. A., on the 20th day of December following, thus the voyage, between the port of departure, and the port of dis-embarkation, appears to have been thirteen weeks and four days in duration. To vary the interest, and to add to the perils of those "who go down to the sea in ships," we find that the vessel, upon whose deck the lives and fortunes of our hardy emigrants were placed, was eastaway in a storm, and thrown upon the shores of an island now called Concon, situated near the barren coast of Yucatan, South America. The passengers and crew were detained twenty-eight days upon that desert island.

During their forced residence upon the island, the passengers and crew, imitating the people of the country in which most of them were seeking a new home, organized a government and made laws for their own protection, and unanimously elected Mr. William Henegan the first Governor of the State of Concon, South America. The necessity of this organization was soon

apparent.

The island of Concon, for its favorable and safe harbors, was one of the favorite rendezvous of the piratical vessels making those waters their cruising grounds. One of those sea rovers passing the island, the captain seeing the wrecked ship of our emigrants, determined to take possession, rob it of all the rigging and stores left upon it, (the passengers and crew, while waiting

for rescue, living in tents upon the shore.)

To allay suspicion, the pirates also landed, and pitched their tents a short distance from those of our shipwrecked friends, as though they wished to rest awhile from their bloody and murderous career. One of the crew of the wrecked ship, wandering over the island one day, being aweary from his long and difficult tramp, threw himself down behind some rocks, and fell asleep. How long he had remained in that unconscious state he knew not. He was finally awakened, by hearing voices in conversation, apparently, immediately above him. Listening for awhile, he gathered enough of their conversation, to convince him that the voices belonged to some of the crew of the piratical vessel, and that the rascals were detailing to themselves their plans for attacking the unfortunate voyagers and sacking

the wrecked vessel. After the departure of the loquacious pirates, the sailor made his way to his own camp, and detailed the

plot of the pirates to Governor Henegan.

After a consultation with his Council, the Governor formed his plans of retaliation, which were to capture the pirate vessel, and put to sea with his little colony. This was "carrying the war into Africa," with a vengeance, yet, under the circumstances,

was perfectly justifiable.

The Governor's plans were well laid, and would have been successfully carried out, had not one of the passengers betrayed the Governor's plans to the pirate chief. The pirates immediately struck their tents, and began their retreat to their boats, and thence to their vessel. In the melee that insued, the pirate captain was wounded so severely, as to compel his crew to take him upon their shoulders. In this condition, with their helpless captain, the pirates reached their boats and made for their vessel. When upon her deck, they hoisted their sails, and put out to sea, leaving our shipwrecked friends in possession of their diminutive Republic, and like Alexander Selkirk, they could say—

> "We are monarchs of all we survey, Our rights there are none to dispute."

Mrs. Henegan is now residing with her son John, on cast High Street, the only survivor of nine children.

Of Mr. William Henegan, permit me to say a few words. Mr. H. commenced Rail Roading at the age of 18, and so continued up to the time of his death, in 1870. He was Superintendent of Construction over many Railroads, both in Scotland and in England, and acted in that capacity for the first Railroad ever In the construction of the Cleveland, Mt. Vernon and Columbus R. R., Mr. H. took an active part, and his labors at that time were highly appreciated. The road was then known as the Springfield, Mt. Vernon & Pittsburgh R. R. Hard times came, and the work on the road was suspended. Nearly three and twenty years passed ere the work on the road, under the new organization, was resumed. Under the auspices of the new Company, his son John completed laying the track, between Sunbury and Kinderhook, the job his father had commenced twenty-three years previous.

XIX.

WILLIAM BROAT-HURST.

Mr. WILLIAM BROADHURST, of the Fourth Ward, was born May 10, 1798, in the village of Bolton, Lancashire county, England. He emigrated to America in 1816, leaving the English docks on the 21st day of March, and arriving in Philadelphia on the 11th day of May, making the voyage seven weeks and two days. Mr. B. has been twiced married, his first wife being Miss Isabella McCreury, of Steubenville, Ohio, to whom he was married on the 12th day of April, 1823. His second and present wife was Mrs. Louisa C. Bates, of St. Louis, Missouri, to whom he was married on the 10th day of December, 1865.

XX.

THOMAS EVANS.

Mr. Thomas Evans, of the Fourth Ward, was born on the 24th day of July, 1797, in Berks county, Pennsylvania. He removed to Northumberland county, same State, in 1812. From Northumberland county, he came to Ohio, in 1841, and settled in Mount Vernon, and has resided in the city or immediate vi-

cinity ever since.

Mr. Evans has been married four times, and has had born unto him twelve children—by his first wife two—by his second wife nine—and by his third wife one. Five of his children are still living, and all are residents of Ohio. Three reside in the town of Delaware, one in Morrow county, and one in Knox county. Thomas Evans, Jr., of Delaware, is proprietor of "The Signal," an ardentadvocate for a political Prohibition party, and was, at the late Presidential election, the Prohibition elector for this, the 9th, Ohio district.

The fourth wife of Mr. Evans, was Mrs. Naomi Young, widow of Lewis Young, of this city. This last marriage was celebrated

in September, 1855.

XXI.

JOSEPH JACOBS.

Mr. Joseph Jacobs, of the Fourth Ward, was born September 25, 1802, in Philadelphia, Pa. Mr. Jacobs removed to Newark, Ohio, in 1833—from thence to Granville, Ohio, 1834,—and from thence to Mount Vernon in 1835. Mr. Jacobs has been married twice. His first wife was Miss Elizabeth Pholeman, of Philadelphia, and his second was Miss Eliza James, of Ohio.

XXII.

GEORGE ADAMS.

Mr. George Adams, of the First Ward, is by profession a wagon maker, and continued to work at it until about a year since. He was born on the 25th March, 1798, in the village of Rushangles, county of Suffolk, England. On the 26th day of March, 1820, he married Miss Elizabeth Harnwell, of Bressingham, county of Norfolk, England. There were born unto Mr. Adams and his wife Elizabeth, thirteen children, five of whom died between the ages of one and three years. Mr. Adams and his family emigrated to America in the year 1852. They left England on the 27th of May, and landed in New York on the 8th day of July, thus making the sea voyage six weeks in duration. Mr. Adams settled in Mount Vernon in the year 1853. His wife Elizabeth died October 2, 1862. On the 20th of November, 1870, he married, for his second wife, Mrs. E. O. France, nee Wood, widow of the late Mr. Herman E. France, of this city. The present Mrs. Adams was born in the State of Vermont.

XXIII.

ELIZABETH BYERS.

Mrs. ELIZABETH BYERS, nee Cglesby, of the Third Ward, is a native of Pennsylvania. She was born on the 14th day of February, 1788, in Chester county. Removed to Crawford county, Pa., in 1820. In July, 1844, located in Newark, Ohio, and in 1854 took up her residence in Mt. Vernon. Mrs. Byers is the mother of seven children, four of whom are still living, two being residents of this city, Joseph M., and Miss Margaret, and two are citizens of California. The grand children number fifteen.

XXIV.

MARY BEACH.

Mrs. Mary Beach, nee McNeal, of the Fourth Ward, was born in the town of Goshen, Litchfield county, Connecticut, on the 14th day of December, 1782. She married Mr. Martin Beach, of her native town, on the 14th day of October, 1802. Mr. and Mrs. Beach removed to Mount Vernon in September, 1832. There were born unto them ten children, seven of whom are still living. Mrs. E. H. Sprague is the only child living in Mount Vernon. A son, Mr. Levi Beach, and a daughter, Mrs. William H. Hawkins, are residents of Knox county. Mr. Martin Beach died in Mount Vernon, on the 23d day of April, 1859.

XXV.

LEVI BEACH.

Mr. Levi Beach, of Miller township, (son of Martin and Mary Beach,) was born in Goshen, Connecticut, on the 4th day of August, 1803. Mr. Beach married on the 8th day of July, 1824, Miss Martha Mills, of Mount Morris, Livingston county, New York, to which place his father's family had removed. Mr. Levi Beach and family came to Ohio in the year 1837, and settled in Knox county.

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XXVI.

ABEL HART, SR.

Mr. ABEL HART, Sr., of the First Ward, was born September 22, 1794, in Tiverton, Rhode Island. In May, 1817, he came to Ohio, walking from New York city to Pittsburgh: at Pittsburgh he took flat boat for Marietta, Ohio. In the spring of 1818 he commenced work at Cincinnati, and remained there until the following fall, when he came to Knox county. In 1819 he retarned to Cincinnati and remained there until 1820, when he went to Parkersburgh, Virginia. After a stay of a few months in Parkersburgh, Mr. Hart went to Nantucket Island, Mass., where he was married, on the 29th of June, 1823 to Miss Mary Harris. Mr. Hart remained in Massachusetts until 1835, when he moved his family to Mount Vernon, Ohio, arriving on the last day of October, 1835.

In the spring of 1836, Mr. Hart built a house on the corner of Gambier and McArthur streets, where he has resided ever since. Mr. H. was one of the Charter Members of the Knox Mutual

Insurance Company, and was a Director of the same for twentyone consecutive years from its organization.

Mr. H. became a Free Mason, June 24, 1820, at Parkersburgh. Joined the Methodist Episcopal Church in 1821.

Mrs. Mary Hart was born on the Island of Nantucket,

Mass., July 29, 1790. Died February 25th, 1864.

Unto Mr. and Mrs. Hart four children were born, all boys, still living—Isaac, William R., Marshall and Abel. Isaac is now a resident of Jasper county, Missouri, Marshall is a citizen of Ross county, Ohio, and William R., and Abel, Jr., reside in this city. Abel Hart, Jr., is a Lawyer by profession, and is the present representative of Knox county in the lower branch of the Ohio Legislature.

XXVII.

HENRY W. BALL.

Mr. Henry W. Ball, late of the Second Ward, was born near the town of Bedford, Bedford county, Pennsylvania, on the 29th day of October, 1803. [Mr. Ball died on the 18th day of August, 1876, since this sketch was written.] Mr. Ball was twice married: both wives have passed from earth. Mr. Ball came to this city in June, 1834, and resided in his late residence, corner of Mulberry and west Gambier streets, thirty-six years, and was a regular voter in the Second Ward for the same length of time. Mr. Ball had born unto him nine children, seven of whom are still living. Four of them,—Frederick M., and Dallas, and Mrs. Dennis Corcoran, and Mrs. Sumuel Chisholm, are citizens of Mount Vernon, and Mrs. William Harding, who resides near Gambier, this county.

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XXVIII.

DR. TRUMAN WARD.

Dr. TRUMAN WARD, of the Third Ward, was born in the county of Rutland, in the State of Vermont, on the 19th day of July, 1805. His parents removed to and settled in Miller township, Knox county, Ohio, in the month of February, 1815, when the subject of this sketch was only ten years of age. This gives the Doctor, boy and man, at this date, a continuous residence of sixty-two years in Knox county. Dr. Ward removed to Mount Vernon in 1836. The Doctor chose for his help-meet and companion through life, Miss Eliza Maxfield, of this city, to whom he was married on the 1st day of November, 1827, To Dr. and Mrs. Ward nine children were born-six of whom are still with us in the flesh. Of the living, his daughters, Mrs. Sherman Pyle, Mrs. Dr. S. C. Thompson and Miss Victoria, and his sons Byron and Alonzo, are residents of this city, and Frank is a citizen of Mansfield. One of his sons, Jonas, died while serving his country during the late rebellion, as a private in the 96th Reg. O.V.I., while encamped about Vicksburg. Three sons of Dr. Ward were engaged in putting down the late rebellion.

XXIX.

MELVIN WING.

Mr. Melvin Wing, of the Third Ward, was born in the village of Queensbury, Glenn Falls county, State of New York, on the 8th day of July, 1804. Came to Ohio, November 2, 1816, with his father's family, and settled in Milford township, Knox county. In 1830 Mr. Wing took up his residence in Clinton township. In 1869 he removed to Mount Vernon, having purchased his present residence, corner Gay and High streets. On the 12th day of April, 1838, Mr. Wing married Miss Elizabeth H. Ash, of Clinton township, formerly of the State of Virginia. Mrs. Wing died in this city, on the 17th day of April, 1874. Of children, five were born unto them—four of whom are still living, viz: Edward, of Garrett City, Indiana, James and Maria, of this city, and William who resides on the home farm, on the Granville road.

XXX.

JOHN TRIMBLE.

Mr. John Trimble, of the Fifth Ward, is a native of Ohio, having been born on the 20th day of September, 1806, in Fairfield county. Fairfield county embraced, in 1806, the territory now known as the counties of Fairfield, Licking and Knox. During the year 1809, Mr. Trimble's parents removed to Knox county, and settled upon a farm in Morris township. In 1834, Mr. John Trimble removed to Mount Vernon, and in the spring of 1835, took up his residence in his present home on the Hill, on the west side of Mansfield Avenue. Of the county, Mr. Trimble has been a resident sixty-eight years, and of Mount

Vernon forty-three years, and has lived forty-two years in his present residence.

Mr. Trimble has been married three times. His first wife was Miss Nancy E. Drake, of this town. This marriage took place July 15, 1835. Mrs. Nancy Trimble died October II, 1836. The second wife was Miss Eliza Day, of Morris township. This marriage was celebrated on the —, day of —, 18—, Mrs. Eliza Trimble died on the 27th day of April, 1866. Again Mr. Trimble took to himself a help-meet, and on the 27th day of March, 1872, Miss Ruth H. Boyd, of Mount Vernon, became Mrs. Ruth 11. Trimble. Six children were born unto Mr. Trimble, one by his first wife, and five by his second. The children are all living at this date.

IXXXI.

JOSEPH S. MARTIN.

Mr. Joseph S. Martin, of the First Ward, was born in the town of Huntingdon, Pennsylvania, on the 25th day of November, 1803. Mr. Martin, with his parents, came to Mount Vernon in the month of April, 1811, when he was only eight years old. Mr. Martin has been married twice. His first wife was Miss Susan Thomas, of Delaware county, Ohio, to whom he was united on the 16th day of April, 1826. Mrs. Susan Martin died in this city in the month of August, 1852. In the month of December, 1854, Mr. Martin espoused, for his second wife, Mrs. Mary Barton, of Mount Gilead, Morrow county, Ohio. Mrs. Mary Martin died in 1869, near Mount Gilead, while on a visit to her bro-Mr. Martin is the father of eight children—four sons and four daughters,-borne to him by his first wife, all of whom are living with the exception of one son, James, who was killed at the battle of Gettysburgh, Pa., July, 1863. He was wounded on the 3d, and died the next day, July 4, 1863. Of the living children, Mrs. Elias Rutter, Mary and J. P. B., (Piney.) are residents of this city, and Caroline and Ella, are at present residing in Baltimore, Maryland, while one son, Charles D., is a resident of Lancaster, Ohio. Charles D. is a Lawyer of eminence, and, as a politician, has already made a reputation second to but few of the young men of our country. He represented the Lancaster district in the lower house of Congress for two years.

XXXII.

JAMES HUTCHINSON.

Mr. James Hutchinson, of the First Ward, although only a few months past his 67th birth day, is one among the few old citizens of our city, and has been a resident for over fifty-six years. Mr. Hutchinson was born near Baltimore, Maryland, on the 16th day of August, 1809. His parents came to Mount Vernon in the month of October, 1820. On the 13th day of July, 1830, he married Miss Sarah Stahl, of this city.

In 1837, Mr. H. erected the large brick dwelling, (now owned and occupied by Mrs. Abbott,) near the corner of Gay and Front streets, and resided there for many years. In 1850 he built his present large and commodious brick residence, south east corner of Gay and Gambier streets, and in 1873, erected his store, a

fine three story brick, on south Main street.

Mr. H. informs me, that in 1820, there were only seven brick houses in the town, and of those seven, three only now remain to mark the past. The building on the north east corner of Mulberry aud Vine streets, now occupied by Matthias Kelly, Grocer, is one; another is the old Fifth Ward School House and Masonic Hall, on north Mulberry street; the third has been so improved and modernized that its past appearance is but scarcely recalled to mind even by but a comparatively few of the oldest residents, and to others its very existence is forgotten. At that time, what is now Mr. Joseph M. Byers' pleasant residence, north west corner of Gay and Vine streets, was but a small one story brick building, built upon the east end of the lot. That old building is yet there, and still it is not there, for the modern improvements have completely hidden it from view. At that time, this little brick was occupied by William Vore, a teamster. the year 1825, Vore picked up and brought home a young lad named Lewis, whose father had been recently hung in Pitts-burgh, for mail and other robberies, committed in the mountains. One day Mr. Vore returned home from hunting wild pigeons and Thoughtlessly he left his gun standing in the chimother game. ney corner, without first examining to ascertain whether the load had been discharged. The Lewis lad picked up the gun and went into the yard to play soldier. While thus engaged, Joseph Glaze, the little son of a neighbor, who lived in a log house on the lot on east Vine street, now known as the Dr. Officer lot, came to Mr. Vore's for a bucket of water. Young Lewis, pointing the gun at Joseph, told him he was going to shoot him, pulled the trigger—the gun went off, lodging twenty-five shot in poor Joseph's breast. Joseph started for home, and when about half-way between Vore's and his father's house, fell dead in the road. His body was picked up by his sister Elizabeth, and carried into his father's house. Miss Elizabeth Glaze afterwards married, and became the mother of Anson Sprague, of this city.

Another incident of Mr. Hutchinson's boyish days, is ever fresh in his memory. In 1827 Mr. H. and his young companions were keeping Hallow-E'en in the usual fashion; (my readers all know what kind of a fashion that is.) On the north west corner of Vine and Mulberry streets stood a hewed log house, occupied by the family of George Lowe, one of the inmates being James Lowe, a bachelor brother of George. James Hutchinson, although fully armed and equipped, had passed the Lowe house without firing a cabbage-stock, and had got nearly to High street, when he heard the discharge of a gun. On going back to Vine street, he found that James Lowe had fired a rifle at the boys, the ball hitting one of the legs of Ben Roberts just below the knee. was one of the boys engaged in the frolic. This occured Friday evening. The poor boy was kindly treated by the physicians, and the wound dressed. On the Sunday following amputation was found necessary. In the afternoon this was-performed by Dr. Maxfield. But it stayed not the Destroyer-poor Ben died that night. From that day to this, Mr. II. says, he celebrated no more Hallow-E'ens. James Lowe, a few years afterwards, was killed by a runaway team while hauling stone for Peter Davis, south of the creek.

Of the limits of the town, in 1820, his present residence was the eastern boundary, West street the western, and the lot now owned by the Hon. Samuel Israel, the northern. East from the lot now owned by Dr. McKown, to that now owned by C. Peterman, Esq., and all south of Gambier street to the creek, was known as Shaw's addition, and was, at that time, a famous resort for the Indians to practice their games, such as shooting at a mark, running, jumping, and wrestling. Near where the pest house was built in 1875, Mr. H. says, in 1820, were to be seen the ruins of several Indian wigwams, and near by stood three large orchards of wild Plums, which orchards became, in the proper season, a favorite resort for the youth of both sexes, who had a penchant for the juice of the wild Plum, or to whisper

sweet nothings to willing ears.

XXXIII.

MARTHA ELLIOTT.

Mrs. Martha Elliott, of the Third Ward, relict of Mr. Samuel Elliott, was born in Philadelphia, Pennsylvania, September, 1799. Moved to Mount Vernon in 1829. She has lived since 1831, (forty-five years) in her present residence on east High street, on the lot next east of the Court House. Mrs. Elliott is now in the 77th year of her age, and in the enjoyment of good health: in fact can do most any thing that a lady of forty can do, when strength and mind are required to work together. Mrs. Elliott, at the present writing, is visiting the Centennial Exposition at Philadelphia, and enjoying the society of the few remaining companions of her youth. Ten children were born unto Mr. and Mrs. Elliott, seven of whom are still living.

XXXIV.

BENJAMIN KERR.

Mr. Benjamin Kerr, of Pleasant township, was born in what is now Licking county, Ohio, on the 14th day of April, 1800. He married Miss Rose Elliott, of this town. Seven children were born unto them.

XXXV-XXXVI.

ISAAC AND ESTHER GRANT.

Mr. ISAAC GRANT, of the Fifth Ward, is a native of New Hampshire. He was born in the town of Lyme, Grafton county, on the 6th day of July, 1795. On the 20th day of February, 1820, he removed to Orleans county, Vermont, where he resided until his emigration to the West. Mr. Grant and family came to Ohio, January 25, 1854, and took up their residence in Mount Vernon. He married Miss Esther Chamberlain, of Troy, Orleans county, Vermont, on the 10th day of February, 1822.

Mrs. Esther Grant, nee Chamberlain, of the Fifth Ward, was born in Wethersfield, Vermont, on the 20th day of March, 1799. In the month of March, 1808, Miss Chamberlain, with her parents, removed to Troy, Orleans county, Vermont, and remained there until 1854, when she, in company with her husband and family, came to Ohio. While residing in Troy she was united in marriage to Mr. Isaac Grant, on the 10th day of February, 1822. Three children were born to Mr. and Mrs. G.: a son, Benjamin, and two daughters, Martha A., now Mrs. George M. Bryant, and Miss Sophia, all of whom are residents of this city.

XXXVII.

NANCY KINDRICK.

Mrs. Nancy Kindrick, nee Morrison, of the Fourth Ward, was born in Pittsburgh, Pennsylvania, on the 18th day of October, 1796. On the 2d day of January, 1817, Miss Morrison married Mr. R. Kindrick, of Pittsburgh. In 1839, Mr. and Mrs. K., with their family, removed to Knox county, Ohio, and settled on a farm in Wayne township. During the year 1853, the family took up their residence in Mount Vernon. To Mr. and Mrs. K., five children were born, four of whom are still living—one, Gardiner, is a citizen of Illinois, while three, Reuben N., Miss Sarah and Mrs. Jane Norton, are citizens of Mount Vernon. Mr. Kindrick died in this city, in the 82d year of his age, honored and respected by all.

XXXVIII.

THOMAS KERR.

Mr. Thomas Kerr, of Clinton township, (brother of Benjamin Kerr,) was born in Fredericktown, Knox county, O., on the 24th day of September, 1803: (this was before the formation of the county.) He married Miss Martha Montgomery, of this county, but formerly of Fayette county, Pennsylvania. Two children were the issue of this marriage,—a girl and a boy.

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XXXIX.

DR. JOHN W. RUSSELL.

Dr. John W. Russell, of the First Ward, is one of the most eminent Physicians and Surgeons in the State, and has long en-The Doctor is a native of joyed his wide spread reputation. Connecticut—Canaan, Litchfield county, being the place of his birth, which occurred on the 28th day of January, 1804. Doctor has been married twice. His first wife was Miss Eliza Beebe, of Litchfield, Connecticut, to whom he was married in the spring of 1828. Shortly after their marriage, Mr. and Mrs. R. came to Ohio, and stopped at Sandusky city: but in the fall of 1828 (November) came to Mount Vernon and cast their lot Five children were the issue of this marriwith our people. Five children were the issue of this marriage, only two of whom are now living—William B., and Mrs. Eliza Cooper, the esteemed wife of Col. William C. Cooper. about twenty-eight years the Doctor and his family resided in the building where his office is now located, west side of Main, between the Public Square and Chestnut street, and for twenty years he has resided in his present residence on east Gambier Mrs. Eliza Russell died in the month of November, 1871, after a peaceful wedded life of more than forty-three years. For his second wife Dr. Russell married, July 31, 1872, Miss Ellen Brown, at that time a resident of San Francisco, California, but formerly a citizen of this city.

XI.

FREDERICK J. ZIMMERMAN.

Mr. Frederick J. Zimmerman, of the First Ward, is a native of Maryland. He was born in Hagerstown, of that State, on the 24th of June, 1807. In the early fall of 1816, his father and family removed to Mount Vernon, and settled in a log house then situated where the residence of Mrs. John Irvine now stands, in the Second Ward. His father, Mr. Godlive Zimmerman, died in this city, February 22, 1845. For many years old Mr. Zimmerman kept tavern where Mr. T. B. Mead's Grocery Store now is. This old tavern building was removed, and Mr. Montgomery Brown erected a large brick edifice on the site of the old Zimmerman tavern. No doubt many of our old citizens remember the "Zimmerman tavern." Like others of the old gentleman's nationality, Mr. Z. dearly loved his pipe or a good eigar. At that early day, tobacco was a luxury not easily obtained; but the old gentleman was equal to the emergency, as his son Frederick can avouch for, for many a horse-back trip has he taken to Lancaster, Ohio, an older settlement, to procure the weed his father loved so well. Judging from personal feelings, for a good eigar, or a pipe full of pleasant flavored tobacco, is one of my weaknesses, but few of the smokers of the present day. would take so great a trouble upon themselves.

Mr. Zimmerman informs me, that, at the time his father came here, (1816), there was not a brick house in the village. The brick house on the corner of Vine and Mulberry streets, now owned and occupied by Mr. M. Kelly, was, at that time, in course of erection, the walls having reached the second floor.

Mr. F. J. Zimmerman was married July 7th, 1835, to Miss Sarah Colopy, of this city. Miss Colopy was born in Virginia. Ler parents came to Ohio, and settled in Miller townsh'p, Knox county, and afterwards removed to Mount Vernon. Seven children were born unto Mr. and Mrs. Z.—six of whom are now living—two reside in this city, one in Akron, one in Jackson, Michigan, one in Chicago, and one in Mount Holly, this county.

Mr. Zimmerman was Post-Master of this city some five years, under the administrations of Pierce and Buchanan, Mr. Z. built the house he now resides in, on cast Front street, and has dwelt

therein for over thirty years.

XLI--XLII.

MARY AND CATHARINE PRATT.

The Misscs Pratt, of the Fourth Ward, are both natives of Pennsylvania, who, with their father, William Pratt, came to Ohio, in May, 1819, and settled on what was then known as the Vore farm, one and a half mile west of Mount Vernon, where the family resided until 1863. William Pratt, the father, died in December, 1829. Mrs. Elizabeth Pratt, the mother, died in March, 1853. The two sisters, the subjects of this brief sketch, removed, in 1863, to Mount Vernon, as stated above, and now reside on west high street, a few doors west of the Baltimore and Ohio Railroad Depot.

Miss Mary Pratt was born at the Indian Manor Farm, Lancaster county, Pennsylvania, on the 17th day of January, 1797.

Miss Catharine Pratt was born in Franklin county, Pennsylvania, near the Maryland State Line, on the 10th day of March, 1807.

XLIII—XLIV.

MR. AND MRS, E. S. S. ROUSE.

Mr. E. S. S. Rouse, of the Third Ward, was born of Revolutionary stock, in Pittstown, county of Rennselaer, New York, on the 28d day of February, 1795. Served in the war of 1812, in Captain Davis' Company, Colonel Carr's Regiment, General Eddy's Brigade, New York Militia. Came to Ohio in 1818; settled in Muskingum county in 1822; moved to Knox county in 1832, and to Mount Vernon in 1850. Residence for the last ten years, on east High street.

Mrs. P. M. Rouse, wife of Mr. E. S. S. Rouse, is a native of Augusta, New York. Was born October 10th, 1798. Mr. and Mrs. R. were married March 1, 1820. They have raised a family of three sons and two daughters, all of whom are adults and married. This aged and venerable couple can now count their grand children and great-grand children by dozens, and may live to see the fourth generation of their descendants.

XLV.

ISAAC HADLEY.

Mr. Isaac Hadley, of the First Ward, is a New Yorker by From the age of fifteen he has been a citizen of Mount Vernon, and has been nonored by his fellow-citizens, not only with their confidence and respect, but he has been placed in offices of profit as well as of honor, and faithfully and honorably

has he discharged the duties of his several posts.

Mr. Hadley was born in the town of Willsborough, Essex county, New York, January 14, 1795, within sight of the waters of Lake Champlain, since made famous by Com. McDonough's victory, September 11, 1814. In 1810, Mr. Hadley's father, with his family, came to Ohio, and settled in the county of Knox. His father, Mr. Smith Hadley, was born August 14, 1765, and died February 4th, 1850, aged 85 years, 5 months, and 20 days.

November 9, 1825, Mr. Isaac Hadley was married to Miss Sarah Davidson, of Mount Vernon. Miss Davidson was born in Knox county, on the 22d day of November, 1805, and deceased January 16, 1873, in the 69th year of her age. To Mr. and Mrs. Hadley were born seven children, six of whom are still living four reside in this city, one in Iowa, and one in Bellaire, Ohio.

Mr. Hadley's public life has been a remarkable one, having, for twenty-four years, held commissions, either from the President of the United States, or from the Governor of Ohio. one time, Mr. H. was acting as Sheriff and Post-Master, at the

same time, for four years.

April 28, 1830, Mr. H. received the appointment of Deputy United States Marshal, and served as such for four years. During that time he took the census of Knox county, and in the discharge of that duty, he visited every house, and every family,

at that time within the limits of Knox county.

August 12, 1831, Post-Master General Barry appointed Mr. Hadley Post-Master for this place, and he served in that capacity for about nine years. In 1832 he was appointed by General Bevans, Deputy Sheriff. In October, 1834, Mr. H. was elected and commissioned Sheriff of Knox county, and in October, 1836, he was re-elected, (without opposition,) thus, with his own four years, Mr. H. was acting as Sheriff for six years.

Mr. Hadley was appointed Clerk of the Court of Common Pleas, April 13, 1839, and served seven years, that being the Con-In 1834, Governor Robert Lucas commissionstitutional limit. ed Mr. Hadley as Paymaster of the Volunteer Brigade of Knox

county, with the rank of Major.

April 30, 1863, Mr. Hadley was appointed and commissioned by the President of the United States, Commissioner for the Thirteenth Ohio Congressional District, composed of the counties of Knox, Licking, Muskingum and Coshocton, and served as such until the close of the rebellion, and was honorably discharged.

Notwithstanding his four score years, few men in the prime of their manhood, can compete with Mr. Hadley in the discharge

of the duties of every day life.

XLVI.

LEONORA DEBENHAM HARNWELL.

Mrs. Leonora Debenham Harnwell, of the First Ward, nee Miss Debenham, was born August 16, 1799, at Rickinghall, Suffolk, England. On the 29th of May, 1834, she married Mr. Adam Harnwell, of Redgrave, Suffolk, England. In March, 1841, Mr. and Mrs. H. left England for America. In the fall of 1843 they settled in Knox county, and for thirty-three years have been numbered among our best citizens. Three children were born unto this worthy couple, two sons and one daughter, only one of whom is now living, Benjamin, who is one of the prominent merchants of Gambier. The recent death of Mr. Adam Harnwell, which took place at his late residence on Gambier Avenue, August 4, 1876, has left this venerable lady almost alone in this her hour of mourning and of sorrow. Mr. Harnwell was 70 years of age at the time of his decease.

XLVII. JOHN POWER.

Mr. John Power, of the Fifth Ward, was born in Washington county, Pennsylvania, on the 17th day of November, 1805. Mr. Power came to Ohio in 1833, and settled in Wayne county: from Wayne county he removed to Coshocton county, and from Coshocton he came to Mount Vernon. September 26, 1833, he married Miss Matilda Settle, of Brown township, this county. Nine children were born unto Mr. and Mrs. P., eight of whom are still living, three girls and five boys. Of the boys, John B., Thomas N., James W., and Samuel, reside in this city, and George C. is a citizen of Wooster, Ohio, and is Clerk of the Court of Common Pleas of Wayne county. Of the girls, one, Miss Nancy, married a Mr. McCoy, and removed to Kansas, and two, Miss Melvilla C., and Miss Martha A., reside with their parents on east Burgess street. George and John are married.

XLVIII.

JAMES CAMERON.

Mr. James Cameron, of the Fifth Ward, is a native of Ireland, and was born in the county Derry, in the year 1801, the exact date and month we cannot ascertain. Mr. Cameron arrived in New York in 1851, and in 1852 came to Mount Vernon. In Ireland, Mr. C. was a farmer, while in America, the land of his adoption, he has followed Railroading, most of the time under Mr. William Henegan and his son John.

XLIX.

ARTHUR G. RUNYAN.

Mr. Arthur G. Runyan, of the Fifth Ward, was born in Fleming town, county seat of Huntington county, New Jersey, October 31, 1795. Came to Ohio in 1816. Mr. Runyan has been twice married, his first wife being a native of Geneva, Ontario county, New York.

L.

NORMAN N. HILL.

Mr. N. N. Hill, of the Fourth Ward, is, by birth, a native of the Green Mountain State, having been born in the village of Cornwall, Addison county, Vermont, on the 28th day of September, 1803. His father and family came to Ohio in 1809, and settled in Zanesville, where they remained some two years, and then; in 1811, came to Mount Vernon; the subject of this brief sketch being, at that time, in the eighth year of his age, where he has resided ever since, thus giving him a residence of sixtyfive years in this village and city.

Mr. Hill married, on the 12th day of February, 1832, Miss Mary Shaw, daughter of Mr. John Shaw, of Mount Vernon. Three children were the issue of this marriage, only one of whom is now living -a son-John S., who resides on the Harkness road,

in Clinton township.

In his early years Mr. Hill taught school, and afterwards became chief clerk in the mercantile establishment of old Mr. Samuel Mott, at that time one of the oldest Lawyers in the place. Mr. Hill has been an active and prominent business man all his life—a successful merchant—an extensive produce dealer -a large purchaser and shipper of live stock—a manufacturer of woolen goods, and now the successful manager of our City Gas Mr. Hill built the large Woolen Mill at the foot of Main street, lately occupied by Graff & Carpenter, Produce Dealers, having also dug the race, and put in the water wheel. He carried on the manufacture of woolen goods, at the above place, for over eighteen months, successfully and profitably. Of late years Mr. Hill has devoted all his business energies to the management of the Mount Vernon Gas Light and Coke Company.

To few men now with us, does Mount Vernon owe more for its real prosperity, than it does to Mr. N. N. Hill.

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LI.

SARAH PATTERSON.

Mrs. Sarah Patterson, of the Fourth Ward, is now in the 73d year of her age, and is one of those active matrons, so few of whom remain with us. Reared at a period when both sexes were enured to toil and hardships, unknown to the present generation, she has preserved all her early habits, which enables her to bear the infirmities of old age with almost the characteristics

of youth full of life and laudable ambition.

Mrs. Patterson was born in Virginia, in 1804. When only two years of age, her parents emigrated from Virginia, (this was in the year 1806,) and settled on a farm within two miles of Utica, Ohio, where she remained until a few years since, when she removed to this city, and took up her residence with her son, Mr. James Patterson. A part of this farm is in Licking county, and a part in Knox county. At that time a great many Indians made the forests of Ohio their home, and Licking and Knox counties, to this day, show many signs of their former presence.

Sixty-two years ago, when the subject of this sketch was only fourteen years of age, her father being from home, she was sent by her mother to a mill located near Mount Vernon,—(the nearest mill to their farm,) for corn-meal. Sarah performed the trip on horse-back, following the Indian trail through the forests, and returned home safely with the much needed article of food. At that time there was only one log-cabin between their farm and the Owl Creek settlement, and the settlement was mostly

inhabited by Indians.

At one time, her father's family were all out of the house, at work on different parts of the farm. Imagine their surprise on returning to the house, to find their home in possession of six Indians, who had found the turnip patch, pulled up what they needed, entered the house with their plunder, scattered all over the floor the rinds, and were having a good time generally. Some were dancing, while others were turning the flax-reel, the humming of which afforded them great amusement.

hunming of which afforded them great amusement.

On one occasion, an Indian Chief named Custo, came to their home, and requested them to make him a vest—which they did. The vest required three yards of Dimity. This will give the reader an idea of the size of this son of the forest. As payment, Custo gave the family a pair of seissors and a silk handkerchief.

LII.

JOHN LINN.

Mr. John Linn, of the Fourth Ward, was born in Union county, Pennsylvania, in the year 1797, and emigrated to Ohio in 1844, and settled near Fredericktown, Knox county, and lived there until 1864, when he removed to Mount Vernon, and has resided here ever since. His home is with his son-in-law, Mr. James Patterson. Mr. Linn is enjoying remarkable good health for a man of his advanced age—now in his 80th year. At the time Mr. Linn came to Ohio, 1844, he says there was only one house on the flat between Cooper's machine shop and the old tan-yard at the foot of Lathrop's hill, as it was then called. At that time all the flat was one vast field of wheat.

LIII.

MARY BARRY.

Mrs. Mary Barry, nee Harney, of the Third Ward, was born on the 10th day of May, 1806, in the county of Waterford, Ireland. Miss Harney was married to Mr. John Barry, of the county Tipperary, Ireland, on the 10th day of April, 1829.

Mr. and Mrs. Barry, with their family, left Ireland in the fall of 1849, and reached Mount Vernon, Ohio, in December of the same year, after a disastrous voyage of over fourteen weeks. A few days after sailing, when almost in mid-ocean, after passing a pleasant day in social chat over the prospects that awaited them in their new home, and dwelling sadly and sorrowfully on the deserted homes and friends remaining behind, and building many "castles in the air," our emigrants retired to their berths to sleep, perchance to dream, of the loved ones and of the This vessel, like all others at that time, bound for the land of plenty, was crowded with hardy emigrants. To many that night "was the last of earth,"-many saw not the morrow's sun - that was to rise for them no more. Alas! when their slumbers were the sweetest, the awful cry of fire! aroused the sleepers, and awoke them to a struggle for life, at that moment the sweetest "boon to mortal given." The vessel was doomed! Every effort was made by the captain and crew to quiet the fears of the panic stricken passengers, in many instances, without effect.
The strong minded and the healthy, in hours of safety, became almost imbecile and helpless, while the weak and sickly became suddenly endowed with a strength and presence of mind that showed their strength came from a source not human. Some, in their panic, to escape death by fire, sought it in the waves that laved the vessel's sides. Every boat was soon launched and loaded with precious freight-rafts were hastily made and soon crowded with the unfortunates, and then entrusted to the mercy of the winds and the waves. On the second day after leaving the burning vessel, the boats and rafts were all relieved of their precious loads. Then, and not till then, were many weary hearts made glad with joy, for their dearly loved ones were saved, but, alas! many wept, and would not be comforted, for their dear ones were not. Two children of Mr. and Mrs. Barry were numbered with those who perished.

Five, of the eight children, born to Mr. and Mrs. Barry, are still living. Mrs. Barry now resides with her daughter, Mrs. John Henegan, corner of High and McArthur streets, where

she is surrounded with every comfort.

JAMES WARNER MILLER.

Mr. James Warner Miller, of the Third Ward, was born in Windham county, Vermont, near Battleboro', on the 8th day of July, 1807. In the fall of 1814, he removed with his father, mother, and three brothers, to what is now Miller township, Knox county, Ohio. His father-settled in the woods. At that

time only two families resided in the territory now within the

boundary of the above named township.

The subject of this brief sketch encountered all the hardships consequent to the clearing up a new farm in a dense forest. At the age of twenty-two he left his father's farm, and entered a store in Mount Vernon as a clerk. On the 18th day of December, 1833, Mr. Miller was married to Miss Mary G., a daughter of the late Mr. Gilman Bryant, of this city. They have raised a family of ten children, all of whom are living.

As a farmer, as a clerk, as a merchant, Mr. Miller has stood pre-eminent as a careful, prudent, and successful man, and has, by his energy and fair dealing, accumulated enough of this world's goods, to render him independent, and to surround himself with all the comforts the decline of life may require.

Mr. Miller is a shrew business man, and knows how to secure customers, and, what is still better, knows how to keep them. If an article of merchandise, however small and valueless, and he has it not in his store, is called for twice, by different customers, he immediately orders a small lot, and his customers are supplied—they must wait—for no other establishment in the city could furnish the articles wanted.

Although nearly seventy years of age, time sits lightly on his shoulders, and to-day, he has all the appearance of a man in the

prime of life.

LV. JAMES MARTIN.

Mr. James Martin, of Monroe township, is one of our forehanded farmers, and is well known by all our citizens. He is a native of Pennsylvania, having been born in Washington county, of that State, on the 7th day of February, 1807. He came to Mount Vernon, Ohio, June 18, 1818. At that time, Mr. M. states, there were no churches in the village, as it was only a small place. The first work he performed here, was raising potatoes on the piece of ground whereon the Methodist Church now stands, on north Mulberry street. Another piece of work he often alludes to, was his ploughing down of the old Court House, then standing on the north-east quarter of the Public Square.

Mr. Martin married, on the 12th day of April, 1832, Miss Sarah Rigg, formerly of Washington county, Pennsylvania. Miss Rigg came to Mount Vernon in the year 1830. To them were born two children, both of whom have deceased. Mr. Martin, his wife and six grand-children, now reside on his beautiful and fertile farm, on the Coshocton road, a short distance from the

corporation line.

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
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
