It would appear from his arms that Matthew Bayne was a leader of the family of Bayne, of Culloden Earth, near Kingwall, County Ross & Cromarty, Scotland. The same arms, as given above, (with the crest "proper"), were registered by Sir Donald Bayne, 5th Laird of Culloden, in the Court of the Lord Lyon King of Arms, c. 1672 (Public Register of All Arms & Bearings in Scotland; Vol. I, p. 249).

The Baynes of Culloden were a sept, or sub-clan, of the great Clan Mackay. They descend from Ian Bheann (i.e., "John the Fair"), nephew of Angus MacIver, chief of the clan Mackay, (d. 1429). Ian's descendants kept the name "Bheann" (or Bayne) as their family name. The name appears variously as Beau, Bain, Bain, Bains, Baines, Bayne, Bayns & Baynes. Matthew's name appears in the records as Beau, Bayne, & Baynes.

II. William Bayne (or Bayn), of Washington Parish, West-
moreland Co., Va., planter, (Will dated 15 Feb. 1778; prov-
ed; 27 Oct. 1778) — is said to have been "killed" in the
War of American Independence. In his Will he speaks
of himself as "being sick and weak"; perhaps from
the effects of wounds received in active service.
In his will he mentions his "wife Elizabeth Bayne", &
"my children", but names only one child, his heir,
"Supernis. I give and bequeath unto my Son John
Bayne my Land, also our negro man named NICK
... the said negro to be his property at the age of

Twenty-one years." — William Bayne mar. Elizabeth, daughter of Adam Weaver, (she is mentioned in the Will of her father, 3 Nov. 1770, her brother, John, 28 July 1783, & in that of Eliz. Quisenberry, 23 May 1784, who makes bequests to "Ann Weaver" and to "her daug. Elizabeth Bayn") In the record of the probate of William Bayne's Will "Matthew Bayn" (junior) is mentioned as security for his sister-in-law. Eliz. Bayn paid taxes on two slaves in 1786; her estate was settled in 1793. William Bayne's son, and heir, —

III John Bayne, planter (born, in Westmoreland Co., Virginia, in 1760; died, in Jones Co., Georgia, in 1840). His Will is dated 26 June 1839; it was recorded 2 Nov. 1840. He leaves all of his property to his widow, "Sarah". His eldest son, Charles, aged 42, was already a large landowner. He doubtless has provided for the two younger sons, John, aged 36, & Henry aged 19. In his autobiography, Col. Thos. L. Bayne, C. S. A. (1824-1891) writes: — "My grandfather, John Bayne, was from Virginia, but removed early in life to Jones County, Georgia, where he lived to a ripe old age universally loved and respected by all who knew him.... I remember to have seen him when I was 8 or 9 years old (i.e., in 1832 or 1833)." In Col. Bayne's obituary occurs the following: — "He was descended from colonial settlers of Georgia and Virginia, his grandfather having been prominently identified with the early history of Georgia, representing Jones County in the Legislature during sixteen consecutive years." (Archives of Amer. Bar Assoc. Bromwell Library, Chicago, Ill.)

John Bayne removed from Westmoreland Co., Va., to Warren Co., Georgia some time in the 1790's. According to Mrs. Jas. W. Fulghum, of Macon (a descendant) he

signed several papers in Warren County as Justice of the Peace, and witnessed the Will of Robert Washington (in Milledgeville, Baldwin County). In 1806 he sold his land in Warren County ("near White Plains 'on White's Creek'") to one John Mitchell, and removed to Clinton, in Jones County. — He served as Sheriff of Jones County, and represented the same county in the Georgia State Legislators, 1811-1821, and 1824-1830. — John Bayn married three times. The name of his first wife is unknown; his second wife was a Miss Smith; his third wife "Sarah" is mentioned in his Will. GAR.

His eldest son (by the first marriage), —

IV. Charles Bayne, (born in 1798, probably in Warren County; died in Henry County, in 1841). — His Will is dated 15 April 1840. A codicil was added 1 Feb. 1841, and he died the same month. By his will he leaves a fifth of his estate to his widow and a fifth to each of his children. — Charles Bayne, like his father, was Sheriff of Jones County. He removed later to McDonough, in Henry County, where he became in time a large property holder both in the town, and in the country surrounding it. — His grave-stone in the cemetery, at Clinton, tells the pathetic story of his first wife. — He mar. — in Jones County, 28 June 1823, Eliza (1807-1825), dau. of Charles Bowen, planter, of Butler Co., Alabama. Their only child, a son, was born in 1824, and she died the following year, aged 18. (My father once showed me her tiny wedding gown, which he had inherited). — Charles Bayne mar. — (2) circa 1835, Mary Green, by whom he had other children. The eldest son, (by Eliza Bowen), —

V. Col. Thomas Livingston Bayne, C. S. A., (Born, at Clinton, Jones Co. Ga., 4 Aug. 1824; died, in New Orleans, La., 11 Dec. 1891),

Chas L. Bayne spent his early years in Clinton, but after his father's second marriage went to live with his uncle, Col. Edward Bowen, in Butler County, Alabama, where he was prepared for college by a private tutor, a Mr. William Lowry, a graduate of Lublin University. In his will Charles Bayne appointed Col. Bowen the boy's guardian. - In Sept. 1843 young Thomas entered Yale University, graduating with high honors in 1847. For that occasion he was appointed valedictory class orator by the college faculty.

After a brief return to Alabama, Col. Bayne went to New Orleans to study law with Thos. Allen Clark (firm of Eliell & Clark) and was admitted to the Bar in 1850. In turn he became Mr. Clark's partner, and in 1852-53 was acting City Attorney. - In 1861 he enlisted in the historic Fifth Company of the Washington Artillery, was wounded at Shiloh, honorably discharged, and returned to his family to recover. When well enough he journeyed to Richmond, where he was appointed Captain of Artillery, and assigned to ordinance duty with his wife's brother-in-law, Gen. Josiah Gorgas, (father of the famous sanitarian, Gen. William Crawford Gorgas) Chief of Ordnance of the Confederate Government. He was Commission Major, and then (19 Feb. 1864) Lieutenant Colonel, and appointed Chief of Foreign Supplies. (GAR)

When it became necessary to evacuate Richmond, Col. Bayne left with the other officers of the government for Danville, Va., where he remained until the surrender of Gen. Lee, at Appomattox, and then removed to Charlotte, N. C., where the Confederate government was virtually dissolved. - He then returned to New Orleans, where he resumed the pract-

ice of law with his former partner Mr. Clarke. Clarke retired in 1878. Col. Bayne came in time to be recognized as leader of the Bar in New Orleans. He was offered a judgeship by President Grant on condition that he join the Republican party. He declined. In 1888 he was elected Vice President of the American Bar Association. He was one of the originators, and was for a long time president of the Washington Artillery Association.

"Col. Bayne has for many years been regarded as one of the foremost lawyers of New Orleans, and while his learning and professional ability won for him the respect of the legal fraternity, his sterling qualities as a friend, a gentleman, and a citizen secured for him the sincere esteem and hearty good-will of a very large circle of warm personal friends." (Obituary, quoted above).

Col. Bayne was born 22 Dec. 1853; Anna Maria (born in Mobile, Ala., 19 Feb. 1835; died, in Chicago, Ill., 11 July 1879), daughter of the Hon. John Gaylor of South Carolina, former Governor of Alabama (1831-35).

VI. Thomas Livingston Bayne II, lawyer, (Born at Cambridge, Maryland, 24 July 1865; died, in New Orleans, 20 Aug. 1934). - Some time before the fall of Richmond, Col. Bayne sent his wife, who was expecting, through the enemy lines to friends in Cambridge, Maryland, on the "Eastern Shore" and there her third son was born. Mrs. Bayne had rejoined her husband, in New Orleans, early in 1866, for the child was baptized there 28 Jan. of that year. - He received his early education at Mount St. Mary's, Emmitsburg, Maryland, and

at the Hopkins Grammar School, New Haven, Conn.; entered Yale University in 1883, but left in sophomore year while at Yale distinguished himself in athletics as a famous quarterback. (Later as a young married man in New Orleans, c. 1893, he organized the first football team at Tulane University, choosing the colours - olive green & light blue - as the college colours). After a year of law at the University of Virginia, he returned to New Orleans to enter his father's law firm, "Bayne, Neigns, & Bayne." Chas. L. Bayne II, mar. - in New Orleans, 30 Mar. 1891, Maria Theresa ("Pretchen") Müller (born, in N.O., 17 Jan. 1869; died, in New York, 13 Jan. 1950), dau. of Herr August Gerard William Müller (a native of Dresden), planter, United States Senator, & Secretary of State for Louisiana (son of the Hon. Wilson Cary Nicholas, Governor of Virginia, a descendant of Robert "King" Carter, of "Carterman", 1663-1732). Their issue, -

Dom William Wilfrid Bayne, O.S.B., (born, in New Orleans, 21 May 1893), educated in the South; studied art in New York; served as hospital attendant, U.S. Navy, (World War I), entered the Benedictine Order (English Congregation), in Scotland, in 1931 (Abbey of St. Benedict, at Fort Augustus), returned to the Benedictine Priory of St. Gregory the Great, Portsmouth, Rhode Island, in 1934; ordained Priest, in 1937 (Providence Cathedral). Has taught Latin, Greek, history & Christian doctrine, in the Portsmouth Priory School; in charge of school dramatics, 1947-1958; has practiced heraldic designing for prelates, monasteries, convents and schools since 1941; member of

the (British) Order of the Crown of Stuart; Chaplain of Justice, in the Order of St. Lazarus of Jerusalem; honorary Vice-President of the American Society of Heraldry; has contributed articles to the Catholic Encyclopedia, "The Coat of Arms" (quarterly of the British Heraldry Society), Liturgical Acts, and the American Benedictine Review.

(VII) Col. Hugh Aiken Bayne, Lawyer. (born, in New Orleans, 15 Feb. 1870; died, in New Haven, Conn., 24 Dec. 1954) youngest son of Col. Thos. L. Bayne & Anna Maria Gay; graduated from Yale 1892; Bachelor of Laws, Tulane University, 1894; (Honorary Doctor of Laws, Tulane, 1946); practiced law in New Orleans until 1898; removed to New York, where he practiced as a member of the firm of Strong & Cadwallader, 1905-1914. In 1917 accompanied Gen. Pershing to France, with the rank of Major; in 1919 commissioned Lieutenant Colonel; 1919-1928, member of the American Reparations Commission; 1921, selected as one of a committee of three appointed to decide to whom the famous treasure of the Order of the Golden Fleece should rightfully belong. Col. Bayne received the Distinguished Service Medal, and the ribbon of the Legion of Honour. After World War I he practiced law for a while in Paris. He lived in his retirement in New Haven.
