MARY CODY.

II. Mary Cody 2 (James 1), m. George Lumpkin of Halifax Co., Va. She was an Episcopalian and a most excellent woman.

George and Mary (Cody) Lumpkin reared four children: (1) John 3, (2) Joseph 3, (3) Robert 3 and (4) Mary 3. (1) John 3 was b. in —, Va., about 1763; m. Lucy Hopson; moved from Pittsylvania county, Va., to Oglethorpe county, Ga., about 1783 or 1784.

CODY.

It was long before the Revolutionary War that three brothers by the name of Cody left County Kilkenny, Ireland, for America.

One (given name not known), settled in Canada.

*One (given name not known), settled in Ohio, where the city of Cleveland now stands; from him Hon. William F. Cody, (Buffalo Bill) is descended.

I. James 1, the third brother, settled in Va., on James River, not far from Richmond. He afterwards moved to Halifax county, Va., and from there to Halifax county, N. C., where he lived for a number of years.

After the close of the war, about 1789 or '90, he removed to Warren county, Ga., (then a part of Wilkes Co.) and his wife both died, about 1795.

They are buried on, what is known as the old "Shouse Place," but their graves are not marked.

He married Sarah Womack. She was also a native of Ireland.

We are not able to state when or where they were married.

In religion they were Episcopalians.

Tradition says that the father of the three brothers was an Archdeacon in Ireland.

In person, James Cody was small; had fair complexion, blue eyes and light hair.

EDMUND CODY 2.

III. Edmund Cody 2. (James 1), was b. in Halifax Co.,
 North Carolina, April 29, 1754; m. Catharine Donel-
 son (date of m. not known). She was b. 1758. He
 was a soldier in the Revolutionary War. After the
 war they moved to Georgia and settled in Warren
 Co. It was then a part of Wilkes Co. They lived
 and died on the place now owned by the children
 of Thomas J. Hardaway—known as the "Bob Cody
 place," on the Columbia road. Edmund d. Jan. 20,
 1832; his wife d. Oct. 2, 1814. They are buried on
 what is known as the old "Showse Place," in War-
 ren Co., near Brier Creek. Their graves are marked.
 Edmund was a land and slave owner and was a
 "well-to-do" farmer. He was a kind master, a de-
 voted husband and father. In personal appearance,

He was clerk of the Superior Court of that county and
 the father of nine sons, all of whom and their de-
 scendants have been more or less distinguished in the
 annals of the State. He was the father of Wilson 4 and
 Joseph Henry Lumpkin 4, also of Henry Hopson
 Lumpkin 4, of Monroe county. Names of other sons not
 known.

Wilson Lumpkin 4 was b. in Pittsylvania county, Va.,
 Jan. 14, 1783. When twenty-one years of age he was
 elected as a member of the Legislature for Oglethorpe
 county, for several years continued as a member.
 Served for several years as a member of the House of
 Rep., and was a member of the Senate of the U. S. from
 1837-41. He was elected Gov. of Ga. 1831, reelected
 1833.

Gov. Lumpkin was twice m. His eldest daughter by
 (1) wife m. Middleton Pope, and was the g. mother of
 Hon. Pope Barrow 8, U. S. Senator from Georgia 1882-
 1883.

John and Lucy (Hopson) Lumpkin reared one daugh-

 from Princeton; admitted to the bar in 1820; opened
 an office in Lexington, Ga.; elected Chief Justice in

Hardaway, October 9, 1804. He was born in Dinwiddie county, Va., near Petersburg, Aug. 15, 1781. Was the son of Thomas Hardaway who was killed in the Rev. War. George W. Hardaway was a thrifty planter—land and slave owner; by his own industry and economy he accumulated a fine estate. He and his wife were members of the Warrenton (Baptist) Church. He died Sept. 3, 1858. His widow d. April 30, 1874. They lie buried not far from Mesena, on the G. R. R. The land was once owned by him, later by his son, James L. Hardaway. Their graves are marked. This couple lived happily together fifty-four years; they had born unto them eleven children:

JOHN CODY 2.

IV. John Cody 2 (James Cody 1), was b. in North Carolina about 1760. He moved to Warren county, Ga., after the Revolutionary war. He was a soldier in the war of 1812; was among the first settlers of Alabama. He m. a Miss James; d. in Pike county, Ala., in 1830.
