In November 1946 Miss J. Cameron, who was at that time Records Clerk to the Middlesex County Council, read a Paper on the Middlesex Quarter Sessions Records before this Society.<sup>1</sup> In the course of her remarks she mentioned that amongst the Records housed in the Middlesex Guildhall, Westminster, there was "a collection of indentures of persons willing to serve in the Plantations in 1683 and 1684, numbering a thousand, coming from various parts of the country, with details of their address and calling, especially in the 1683 returns. They were to go to Maryland, Virginia, Barbados and Jamaica." Strange though it may seem, this announcement appears to have aroused no interest at the time and nothing further was heard of these documents until Air Chief Marshal Sir Christopher Courtney drew the present writer's attention to them.

An inspection of the documents at once showed their importance and as it appeared that the indentures had never been printed an application was made for permission to print abstracts of all of them in the *Genealogists' Magazine*. This was courteously granted and our thanks were expressed to the late Lt.-Colonel W. H. C. Le Hardy, M.C., the Middlesex County Archivist, and to his Staff, for their willing help and assistance.

An examination of the documents, which are kept in two boxes, revealed that although the indentures were at some time numbered from one to one thousand many of them are now missing and an official count made in June 1948 showed that the remaining indentures total only 718. Many of the documents are damaged and portions (especially at the top) are missing. Fortunately, however, some of the particulars are repeated more than once in the documents and this usually enables the missing information to be recovered.

There are two or three different forms of printed Indenture with blank spaces which were filled in ink. For convenience of reference a specimen of each form is here printed and given a reference letter, which will be used in the abstracts to show which form of wording was used. The first form is as follows, and will be referred to as "Form A." The words in italics are the words filled in in ink in the original.

In consideration whereof the said ..... Patterson doth hereby covenant and grant to and with the said Elizabeth Fletcher to pay for her passing, and to find and allow her meat, drink, apparel, and lodging, with other necessaries, during the said term, and at the end of the said term to pay unto her according to the Custom of the Country.

In Witness whereof the parties above mentioned to these Indentures have interchangably set their Hands and Seals the day and year above written.

The Memorandum at the foot is, of course, peculiar to this case and does not occur in other indentures. Abra. Bayly and Ro: Hastings were Magistrates, before whom the Indenture had to be signed.

The second form used, which will be referred to as "Form B," is as follows:—

This Indenture: According to the Method, and by the Order and Direction of his Majestie and most Honourable Privy Council, Printed and Published in the Thirty Fourth Year of his Majesties Reign of England, &c that now is (1682) That all Servants at any time as are Free and willing to be Retained to Serve in His Majesties Plantations in AMERICA, Are to be duly Examined by any of His Majesties Justices of the Peace, and Bound accordingly, and Recorded in the Court of Sessions: Now Witnesseth, That Richard Snell from City of London Labourer Aged Twenty & seven Years, Voluntarily of Covenanteth, Promiseth and Granteth to and with Joseph Ball of

Rederith In the County of Surrey Mariner from the day of date hereof until his first and next Arrival in the Island of Barbadoes and after, for and during the Term of sever Years therein, shall and will as a Faithful Covenant Servant, serve in such Employment as he the said Joseph Ball his Executors, Administrators or Assignes shall there Employ Him to the custom thereof; In Consideration whereof the said Joseph Ball for Himself, his Executors and Assignes doth Covenant, promise, grant and agree to and with the said Richard Snell to pay for his Passage in the good Ship the Hopewell Captain Joseph Ball aforesaid Commander, or in any other Ship thither Bound, by the Order and Directions of the said Joseph Ball and to find and allow him, Meat, Drink, Apparel, Lodging and Washing necessary during the said Term. And in the End thereof, such other Allowances, as to others are Given and Granted in like kind.

In Witness, &c, the sd. part, to these present Indentures have Interchangably put there bands & Seals the fifteenth day of February Anno que Regni Caroli Secundi Regis Angliae Tricesimo Quinto Anno Domini 1682.

The third form of wording, "Form C," occurs at No. 119 and is there given in full. "Form D," slightly different from "Form B," occurs at No. 155.

In order to save space it is proposed to print the particulars in a standardised form as follows:—

- (a) The type of printed Form, i.e. "A" or "B", followed by the serial number on the document. Then will come all the information about the apprentice, Name, Town from which he came, Occupation and Age. This will be followed by the word "Signs" if he signed the Indenture or an "X" if he signed with a Mark.
  - (b) The Name, Address and Occupation of the person to whom the apprentice was bound. This is often the Master of the ship in which he was to sail.
  - (c) The place to which the apprentice was going. The number of years for which he was bound. The name of the ship in which he was to sail and the name of the ship's Master.
  - (d) The date the Indenture was signed. The names of the Witnesses, and the names of the Magistrate or Magistrates. The latter will be within brackets to distinguish them.
- Any special notes on individual Indentures will be added. Where

information is missing it must be understood that it is missing on the original document. The earlier documents are those most defective.

We now come to the first example of the third form of printed Indenture, which will be referred to as "Form C". The wording is here given in full. The words in italics are the words filled in in ink in the original.

This Indenture made the *Seventh day of Sept. 1683*: in the *thirty first year of king Charles the second &c.* Between *Elizabeth Jackson Aged 17* of the one Party, and *Arnatt Keckerbar* on the other Party, witnesseth, that the said *Elizabeth Jackson* doth hereby covenant, promise, and grant to, and with the said *Arnatt Keckerbar*: his Executors and Assignes, from the day of the date hereof, until her first and next arrival in *Virginia* and after, for and during the term of *four years*, to serve in such service and employment as he the said *Arnatt Keckerbar*:

or his Assignee shall there employ her according to the Custome of the Country in the like kind. In consideration whereof, the said *Arnatt Kerkerhart* doth hereby covenant and grant to, and with the said *Elizabeth Jackson* to pay for her passing, and to find and allow her meat, drink, apparel, and lodging, with other necessaries during the said term, and at the end of the said term to pay unto her according to *the Custom of the Country*.

In witness whereof the Parties above mentioned, to these Indentures have interchangably set their Hands and Seals the day and year above written.

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## PREFACE

The task of collecting and publishing four volumes of the ship passenger lists mentioned in Harold Lancour's bibliography was conceived while this genealogist was compiling two volumes on the ancestry of his children, *Slade-Babcock Genealogy and Ancestral Lines*. It became apparent that one of the most time-consuming and frustrating efforts a genealogist makes is the search for and through the many journals and books listed by Lancour. Thus it became the goal to publish those articles which were not in publication in readily accessible volumes, at the same time repeating enough of Lancour, with updated information, to guide the reader to the other necessary sources in print.

This has finally been completed, with the exception of the eleven volume index to Pennsylvania naturalizations and the works of the Pennsylvania German Folklore Society, which will be reprinted, in the latter case, by the Genealogical Publishing Company.

The past few years have seen great progress in this field. With this volume, which contains thirty-two of the eighty-two sources cited by Lancour, and Tepper's *Emigrants to Pennsylvania*, which contains twelve more, and with the fact that seven of the Lancour-listed sources are essentially duplicates, the task of searching for one's immigrant ancestor has been made much simpler.

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I would like to thank Carol at the Bunny Hutch in Santa Monica for making it easy to continue my work while I waited for my daughter to finish her ballet lessons, and Benn Howard of Academy West for his occasional friendly rejoinders.

This volume is dedicated to the memory of my mother, Elizabeth Timm Boyer, who passed away December 1, 1979, but who always gave me support and encouragement as long as she lived.

Following are excerpts from the article by L. Taylor Dickson.

The log of the ship "Submission," of which the following is a copy, commences the fourth day of the week, sixth day of the seventh month (September) and ends on the seventh day of the week [Saturday], the twenty-first day of the eighth month, 1682. The vessel at this day being near the mouth of the Chesapeake Bay, which appears by the entry made on the nineteenth day of October, at which time the odor from the pines was noticed, "supposing ourselves not to be within 80 leagues." Phineas Pemberton in his record states that they arrived in the Choptank, Maryland, on the second day of ninth month, 1682, thus making the voyage in fifty-eight days from port to port, the last days of the passage not being recorded in the log.

As Captain Settle was bound for another port, and the weather being overcast, it is highly probable that upon the twenty-first day of the seventh month he did not know where he was, and therefore did not complete the log.

Many of the passengers remained in Maryland for a considerable time (some of them married there), and then walked to Appoquinimink, the lowest section of New Castle County, about forty miles from the place of landing, and twenty miles south of the established town of New Castle....

Bibliographical entries in Lancour, numbered 117 through 122 and 124 are superseded by two volumes published in Baltimore by the Welcome Society in 1970, the first being *Passengers and Ships Prior to 1684*, edited by Walter L. Sheppard, and the second being George L. McCracken's *The Welcome Claimants Proved, Disproven and Doubtful, with an Account of Some of Their Descendants*, the first with 245 pages, maps, charts and indexed, and the second with 600 pages, frontispiece and index. Sheppard's volume includes reprints of articles by Balderton, Roach, Sheppard, Julliett, Pusey and others, with corrections, additions and new material. McCracken's book is described as an "exhaustive study of 304 claimants, along with a genealogies of the descendants to the third generation, with a forty-six page index." Dr. McCracken wrote to this compiler on 15 September 1977: "Only one change need be made and that is that Caleb Pusey and his family should be removed from the probable column to the proved."

An additional article, "Early Shipping to the Jersey shore of Delaware," contains sixteen ship passenger lists of various sizes for 1673-1681, thus making Sheppard's volume even more valuable.

Charles H. Browning. *Welsh Settlement of Pennsylvania*. Philadelphia: William J. Campbell, 1912 [Lancour No. 123].

This 631 page volume has been out of print for some years. Contains material which is "highly suspect," it purports to be a history of the settlement of "Welsh tract" lands granted by William Penn in 1681, containing the names of a great many emigrants and the ships on which some of them arrived. This book should be used with great caution, with all statements verified by original sources.

No ship is mentioned. The 1969 reprint is available from the Genealogical Publishing Company, Baltimore.

William L. Hull. *William Penn and the Dutch Quaker Migration to Pennsylvania*. Swarthmore: Swarthmore College, 1935 [Lancour No. 127].

This 445 page volume is the second number of the Swarthmore College monographs on Quaker history, and has been reprinted (1970) by the Genealogical Publishing Company, Baltimore. While no ship is mentioned, Hull's work does give a list of the early Dutch and German settlers of Germantown.

Ammon Stapleton. *Memorials of the Huguenots in America, with Special Reference to their Emigration to Pennsylvania*. Carlisle, Pa.: Huguenot Publishing Co., 1901 [Lancour No. 128].

This 164 page work was reprinted by the Genealogical Publishing Company, Baltimore, in 1969, but was out of print by 1977. It con-

tains an alphabetical list of immigrants believed to be Huguenots who came to Pennsylvania before 1776, largely extracted from Lancour Numbers 144 and 145. No ship is mentioned.

#### I. Die Auswanderung von 1709

Die Auswanderung von 1709 beschränkte sich nicht auf das freundlich zwischen seinen Hügeln und Wäldern eingebettete Fürstentum Nassau-Dillenburg, wo damals Fürst Wilhelm als der vorletzte seiner Linie regierte. Sie dehnte sich der Pfalz über ganz Südwürttemberg aus.

Der schon lang andauernde Spanische Erbfolgekrieg hatte auch deutliches Gebeut nicht unberührt gelassen und teile der Pfalz schwer verprüft. Etwasgleich er sich jetzt, um Vorbereitung von Prinz Eugens und Marlboroughs grossem Siege bei Malplaquet, einem erfolgreichen Ausgang verspricht, so machten sich doch seine Begleitstände auch in den nicht unmittelbar betroffenen Gegenenden mehr und mehr fühlbar: Tuerkau, zurückgehender Arbeitsverdienst, Vermehrung der ohnehin hohen Zölle, und unfehlgedessen fortschreitende Verschuldung und Verarmung der weniger Bemittelten.

Dazu war der letzte Winter ein Übergang strenger gewesen. In der Pfalz waren sehr grosse Schäden an den Weinbergen angerichtet. Im Nassau-Dillenburgischen und im Weilburgischen waren die Wintersäen verhornt und die Missernten vorausgesessen, welche sich tatsächlich einstellten. So verrichtete der Keller (Ammann) von Dreieck unter dem 15. Sept., dass die Untertanen seiner Stadt und Amts, Gott erbarme es, diesezeit keine Früchte, es möge sein Korn, Gerste oder anderes, verkaufen könnten, weilens dass Korn mehrheitlich verdorben, nur altein aus hat etwas Hafer, um „Kriegs- und Schatzungsgeleider“ (vgl. Aug. 29) zu geben. Ähnlich hatte es im Bericht des Oberschultheissen von Herborn vom 8. desselben Monats geklautet: „Keine Früchte werden diesesmal in hiesigen Amt, es geschehe dann aus Noth die Kriegs- und Kriegsgelder darvon zu bezahlen, können verkauft werden, machen die Körnermutter so gering heifte, also, wie auch ein Gemind der ander mit der Saat fortsetzen werden“ und gegen die Fasten würden „die mehrerster ihre eigene Brotrücksicht nicht mehr haben“.

Unter solchen Umständen ist es wohl begreiflich, dass gedruckte und mündliche Berichte von der mit einem Nimbus umwohnen „Insul“, verhantet damals „Sister Carolina“ als Pennsylvanien verstanden wurde, verbunden mit dem Glauben, dass die Königen von England die Über-

fahrt dahin veranstalten würde, nicht nur das allgemeine Lagesprach würden, sondern eine Volksbewegung auslösten, in welche den anderen nachzog.

Fürst Wilhelm von Nassau-Dillenburg sah diese Bewegung von Anfang an als töricht und unheilschwanger an, liess aber zunächst die, welche um Erbaubnis zum Wegzug nachsuchten, auf ihre eigene Verantwortung hinzuweisen, vorausgesetzt, dass sie zuvor ihren Verpflichtungen gegenüber ihrer Gläubiger und ihm nachgekommen waren. So heisst es in der Anweisung zur Dimission (Intbindung von Untertanenpflicht) dreier Flammersbacher vom 6. Juni: „wan Suplicanten sich von der thörichten weiten Reiss und ihrem und der Ihnen augenscheinlichem Verderben nicht abhalten lassen wollen, so lassen wir die Verkaufung ihrer Güter nach völlig bezahlten Schulden und entrichteten 10. Pfennig (zehnprozentige Vermögensabgabe) zwar geschehen, wollen aber an allem Unheil unschuldig und an keine Wiederaufnahm ins Land gehalten sein.“ Auch in der Verordnung, welche er bei den sich täglich mehrenden Gesuchen am 25. d. Monats an seine Untertanen erließ, ging er noch nicht von diesem Standpunkt ab, wenn er darin sagt: „[Es] finden sich zwar Ursachen und Mittel, selbige als- und hinzuhalten, wir wollen uns jedoch noch zur Zeit damit contentieren, dass wir an allen Ihren künftigen Ergehen und Unheil keine Schuld tragen, befehlen aber alles Ernstes, dass du dann selbst und durch Heinberger (Bürgermeister) und Vorsteher auf den Dorffschafften allen Fleises sehest, damit keiner, er habe dann zuvor seine Schuld überall richtig gemacht... auch den Lebenden Pfennig abgestattet, dimittiert und weggelassen werde.“

So nachgiebig der Fürst sich hier den Auswanderern, welche vorstehende Verpflichtungen erfüllten, gegenüber ersieht, so wenig war er geneigt, das heimliche Fortzählen zu dulden, welches meistens durch das Streben, sich einer oder der anderen Verpflichtung zu entziehen, hervorgerufen wurde und obendrin eine Verletzung des Untertanenreides mit sich brachte. So besagt ein Regierungsschreiben nach Freiburg vom 20. Juli, er habe kürlich „dem ärgerlichen, absonnen, theils auch boshaft und meinydigen, mitin leicht strafbaaren heimlichen Flüchter dero Untertanen nach der Insul Carolina zu Steuer ein scharf verpoetes Edict unter andrem dahn publiciren lassen, dass alle Ihre Güter... eingezojen und confiscret werden sollte“. Ein etwa intendierter Verkauf sei null und nichtig, Käufer und Verkäufer den Umständen nach dazu noch, mit wohlvverdienter Straffe anzusehen“.

Dementsprechend liess er denn auch z. B. die Güter des heimlich ausgetretenen Schweng von Dillbrecht einziehen, während sein Verhalten den ordnungsmässigen Auswanderern gegenüber noch längere Zeit dasselbe blieb, wenn er sich auch nicht ganz in ihre Not hineinzudenken vermochte und von seinem Standpunkt aus in ihrem Fortziehen Un dankbarkeit für alles, was er in den kriegstrüben zu ihrer Erledigung von nicht weniger als dreiviertel aller erhaltenen Dimissionsgesuche fällt nämlich in die Zeit zwischen dem 20. Juli und dem 19. August, also nach obigem Edikt gegen das heimliche

Flüchten. Als aber trotz der vielen aus Holland und England anlangenden Nachrichten über die Not der Fortgezogenen noch täglich neue August gegen die ganze Auswanderung vorzugehen und eine scharfe Verordnung folgenden Inhalts zu erlassen:

Er betrachte es als Gewissenspflicht, fortan keinem, wer der auch sei, durch seine Einwilligung bei der Auswanderung beförderlich zu sein. Diejenigen, welche gleichwohl sich nicht abhalten lassen wollten, sollten sich gewissthaft halten, dass sie niemals ins Land zurückkehren dürften, und höchstens drei Wochen zur Verkaufung ihrer beweglichen Güter hätten. Ihre unbeweglichen sollten nach Befriedigung ihrer Creditoren aber des Fiscus anheim fallen, damit sie nicht, bey diesen theuersten beschwerlichen Zeiten noch den ganzen Winter über im Lande blieben und den geringen Vorrat an Lebensmitteln mit aufzehren, und damit ihre Güter mit den darauf zuhanden seien: an andere verliehen werden könnten und dadurch diese Oners von denen, die im Lande blieben und sich ehrlich nehrten und der göttlichen Vorsehung gerne vertrauen und stille hielten, abgebracht würden. Sollten indessen Kinder von solchen an oder Verwandten in Obhut genommen werden, so sollte die Konfiskation zum Besten dieser armen unschuldigen Kinder unterbleiben.

Als diese Verordnung wenige Tage später den versammelten Heimbergen des Dillenburger Amts vorgelesen wurde, gaben sie zu erkennen, dass sie nicht erachteten, das diesweltliche künftiglich etwas revertirten. Auch die beiden weiteren Aten spricht dafür, dass die Auswanderung damals aufhörte oder doch ganz gering wurde.

Was die einzelnen Auswanderer betrifft, so finden sich die Namen der bei gegen Ende Juni dimittierten fast alle in einer Originallokalier Anordnung, während die Namen der später dimittierten und einige ohne Dimission fortgezogenen teils aus ihren Gesuchten, „List“ der wirklich fortgezogenen zu entnehmen sind. Diese Gesuche mit den dazu eingefüllten und abgestatteten Gutachten der Amtleute oder Heimberger und die „Specification“ und „List“ geben wederamt zugleich näheren Aufschluss über die Verhältnisse der Auswanderer. Danach waren es Arme oder ganz wenig bemittelte Leute, um deren Abschied, gleich anttem armen und verdorbenem auch und noch ein Gondersdorfer, gleich anderen mittel- und geldarmen Leuten, nach der Insel Carolina will. Aber heißt es auch in den Gutachten gewöhnlich entweder in Worten oder doch dem Sinne nach, sie könnten „ohne Schaden“, d. h. ohne nennenswerten finanziellen Nachteil für die herrschaftliche Kasse dimittiert werden. Dagegen ist wohl schwerlich ein Zufall, wenn bei einem Oberndorfer, welcher noch einen nützlichen Untertan abgeben könnte, ein Dimissionsvermerk fehlt. Die meisten besaßen zwar noch ein eigen Heim, wenn es

manchmal auch nur ein „klein Bäggen“ gewesen sein mag, waren aber mehr oder weniger tief verschuldet, sodass nach dem Verlauf des Übrigen wenig, mitunter gar nichts zum Mitnehmen übrig blieb. Ihre immer wiederkehrende Sorge war, woher das Brod für sich und Frau und Kinder nehmen, wie die Beschwerung, insonderheit die Kriegs- und Schatzungsgelder, aufringen. Diese lasten waren so schwer und so manigfältig, dass der Fürst selber in einem eigenhändigen Schreiben an seine Regierung von den „harte undt mit allerhand Nahmen vnd Farbe angestrichene Kriegs- und Oneragelder“ spricht, welche er womöglich gern zum wenigsten zeitweise gelindert gesehen hätte. Unter solchen Umständen darf es nicht wundern, dass nur zwei Fortziehende 50 bzw. 60 Reichsthaler mitnehmen konnten und zwei andere hundert oder etwas mehr oder weniger. Keiner hätte die Reise für sich und Familie aus eigenen Mitteln bestreitet können. Alle waren auf die erhoffte englische Beihilfe angewiesen.

Nicht wenige freilich hatten sich vor der Reise anders besonnen und es doch vorgezogen, ihr schweres Los in der Heimat weiter zu tragen. Einige davon waren schon zurückgetreten, ehe noch über ihr Gesuch entschieden war, manche bald, nachdem sie ihre Dimission in den Händen hatten. Einzelne kehrten noch unterwegs wieder um. Bei den Amtmännern Driedorf und Ebersbach zeigen die oben erwähnten Listen, wer schliesslich wirklich fortgezogen war, bei dem Amt Haiger beweist es eine ähnliche „Specification“ mit anschliessender Korrespondenz, bei den übrigen Amtmännern sind die Taufbüchlein von einigen Nutzen, lassen aber doch Zweifel übrig. Das folgende Namensverzeichnis kann daher nur auf annähernde Zuverlässigkeit Anspruch erheben. Jedenfalls sind einige nirgends aufgeführte „heimlich geflüchtete“ hinzufügen. Die Kinderzahl kann nicht überall bestimmt angegeben werden, weil die Akten sie in einigen Fällen nur für mehrere Familien gemeinsam, in anderen verschieden oder gar nicht verzeichnen. Hauptabkürzungen sind: A = Anna vor andern; Taufnamen; Dim. = Dimission; F = Frau; Fam = Familie; Hs = Hans; Joh. = Johann; Johs = Johannes; K = Kind oder Kinder; T = Taufbuch.

Diejenigen unter den Vorstehenden, welche nach mehr oder weniger langen Liegen in Holland England erreichten, erlebten dort mit allen andern armen deutschen Auswanderern zunächst die grosse Enttäuschung, dass nichts zu einer baldigen Fortsetzung ihrer Reise vorgekehrt war. Dann kam es nicht ausgeblichen sein, dass auch von Ihnen unter den Jausenden waren, welche dort zu Grunde gingen. Im Weiteren darf wohl angenommen werden, dass die Überlebenden möglichst an ihrem Nassau-Siegenschen Landsmann, den Pfarrer Joh. Friedrich Häger, mit den wir manche von ihnen am Hudson wieder finden, anschlossen und dass es ihnen zum Teil durch seinen Einfluss gelang, den reichlich 5000 zugeteilten, welche in der Provinz New York für die englische Regierung Pech gewinnen und schlechtes Land erhalten sollten. Auch das bedeutete jedoch noch keineswegs das Ende ihrer Leiden, denn sie mussten 18 Wochen von Weihachten bis gegen Ostern in den Schiffen liegen, ehe diese mit der Flotte in See stechen konnten. Laut Bericht des Londoner Pfarrers Anton Wilhelm Böhme vom 26. Mai 1710 (Canan S. 9 f.) blieben von einigen Auswandererfamilien während dieser Zeit weder Eltern noch Kinder übrig. „Die letzteren Briefe von Portsmouth / so im April geschrieben / melden / dass in einem Schiffe bey die 80 Seemeilen gestorben seyn / und dass noch bey die hundert krank liegen / deren viele den vorigen / allen Ansehen nach / folgen dörftten. Die Ursach wird theils den engen und compacten Lager-Stätten / theils der Unharmlosigkeit des Schiff-Herrn / der sie nicht mit guter und gesunder Speise versiehet / wohl aber aus der leute Todt gleich nach ihrer im Juni erfolgenden Landung gestorben.“

Nach Rupp und zwei andern oben in Vorsort aufgeführten Quellen, und dem unten abgedruckten Briefe von 1749 verteilen sich die überlebenden Nassau-Dillenburger, von denen wir wissen, wie folgt: In der Stadt New York 1710 A. Elisab. Maul, Wwe des unterwegs verstor-

benen Johs., Friedr. Maul und wahrscheinlich auch Joh. Paul Deubig, hinterlassene Witwe von Simon und Frau, dazu früher oder später Conrad Müller und Frau, in Livingston Manor am Hudson mit Pfarrer Joh. Friedr. Hügerl, Dan. Busch, Joh. Henr. Conradt, Herm. Hartmann, Henr. Hoffmann, Joh. Henr. Krantz, Conrad Martin, Joh. Georg Reiffenberg, Georg u. Joh. Schäfer, Joh. Georg Schmidt, die letzten drei wegen der Häufigkeit der Namen nicht völlig sicher, dazu aber unter den Arnold, Becker, Bender, Dietrich, Finck, Geissler, Georg, Lauer, Stahl, Theis, Weiss u. a. jedenfalls noch Familienmitglieder bekannter oder unbekannter Dillenburger, da Conrad Scholl (s. u. S. 45) 1767 noch viele Dillenburger unter den deutschen Einwanderern von 1710 in der Gegend des Mohawk fand; in Burnetsfield<sup>2</sup> 1749 Johs Müller u. seine Frau A. Maria geb. Jacob, welche auch jedenfalls Nassauerin war; in Amwell, Hunterdon Co., New Jersey 1719 oder 1720 Henr. Bäst, Joh. Phil. Peter u. dessen laut TB 1697 geb. Sohn Gottfried, welche damals jeder 50 Morgen Land, 12 Kühe und 8 Pferde besaßen (s. Goethel S. 18), und von denen der erste und dritte später als Hendrick Bäst und Goffrey Peters vorkommen, und letzter nochmals 1749 als Testamentszeugze, endlich gleichfalls in N. J. vor 1720 Marcus König (s. Chambers S. 633, 534 u. 35). — Nach Carolina durfte 1710 kein Nassau-Dillenburger hingelangt sein. Zum Schlusse geben wir zwei Teilnehmern an der grossen Auswanderung in einem 40 Jahre später in die Heimat gerichteten, abschriftlich erhaltenen Briefe das Wort:

„Unserm Gruss zuvörst. Herzliegeliester Brüder nebst allen Freunden mit ihren Familien.“

„Seytheid dass ich Anna Maria von euch ausß Thürtschland in mein Leben und Beschaffenheit euch ein wenig zu berichten. Nach Frankr. ein Nachhahn von uns in die Pfalz verreisst und in eurer Gegend zu thun hat, so habe nicht unterlassen können, um euch Freunde aufzusuchen und zu erfahren, wie es mit euch stehtet. Berichte auch, das wir im Jahr 710 zu Neujorg sind ankommen von unserer langen und beschwerlichen Reise und daselbet in der Ernde mein Mann Heinrich Heger in einer schlimmen Krankheit, da er mittag gesund und abend [todt], gestorben. Das Söhnlein, was uns in Leidschend gewohnen, Nahmens Henr. Reger, ist hier getraut [= verheiratet] und hat 11 leberdige Kinder. Im Jahr 711 habe ich wieder Johannes Müller [ist] von Rütershausen aus dem Amt Ebersbach, mitter, welche der Herr bisher bey leben erhalten, darvon 4 Söhne und 2 Töchter getraut.“

„Lehrigen meide, dass, ob schon der Zug und Anfang im Lande sehr schwer gefallen, so hat uns doch Gott gesegnet, egen Land, Brod, Vieh und Vahrung beschert, dass wir können leben und den Herrn nicht gemindert darfür danken können, wünschen also nicht mehr, in unser verlaßenes Eigpten zu wohnen, sondern, wann wir wünschen kön-

ten, wolten lieber euch zu uns wünschen. Allein es ist Niemand zu ratthen, dann die Reisse ist sehr beschwirlich und viel Ungemach unterworffen, dass Leben und Todt nicht weit von einander stehen.“

Ich habe erfahren, dass die Fürstl. Nassauischen Herrschaften waren ausgestorben bis Nassau-Ditz, möcht also von euch, liebsten Schwäger, Berichte haben, wer das Land hat und, ob es noch so sehr beschwirdet ist als damahlen. Dies behangend, haben wir von allen teutschen Auflagen ein frey Land. [Wer] gibt des Jahrs einsahl Tax, der so gering, dass mancher mehr im Zuhause verdrinckt auf einmahl, dass des Jahres Tax ist. Was der Bauer erwirkt, ist gut vor ihm. Man giebt kein Zehenden, kein Zoll. Jagen und Fischen ist auch frey, und unser Land ist sehr fruchtbar mit allem Gewächs. Ich habe 100 Acker Land von der Erde und habe 100 Acker Land daraus gekapft.

Liebe Brüder Johannes Jacob, Helmes (?) Jacob und Stiffrührer Ebert Jung und mein liecher Bruder Hans Henr. Müller, ich mögte gern wissen, wie lang meine Mutter todt ist, und ihr Schwager alle, berichtet uns doch mit Brief, wer noch lebet, wie eure Familien sind und, wie es um euer Wohlsein stehet, welches wir von Hertzzen gern wissen möchten. Dieser Franck, wann er nicht selbst zu euch kommen sollte, wird euch den Weg zeigen, wo ihr ihm Brief einliefern sollt.“

Lieber Vetter Hans Jörg Müller, Thomas Müllers Sohn, ich möchte wissen, ob Ihr lebet, ob es euch wohl gehtet, und mit wen ihr getraut seyd. Dass lasst mich wissen. Wir haben nun einander in 40 Jahren nicht mehr gesehen. Mögte Wünschen, 2 oder 3 Wochen bey euch zu seyn, um euch zu beherzigten und Gute Nacht geben. Ein und ander Sach mehr zu schreiben, wenn zu viel und kan nicht wohl aufgesetzt werden. Möchte wünschen, dass Ihr und der Franck könnten zusammenkommen, mehrs zu sprechen. Übrigens schliesse ich und wünsche euch alle 1000 Gute Nacht, ich, meine Frau und Kinder. Und alle gute Freunde, die besserer bekandt sind, sind zu 1000 mählen begrüsset und der Gnade Gottes anbohufen.“

Euer ergebenster Schwager und Freund Johannes Müller Barnesfield in der Provinz Neujorg, Colajnti von Albani, 1749 Juli 10.

P. S. Ich bitte euch nochmals um Gottes willen, lasst euch angelegen seyn und schickt mir gewiss Brief, sonst ist mein Schreiben umsonst gethan, und weiss doch nichts um euch.

P. S. Conrad Müller ist zu Neujorg mit seiner Frau gestorben, liebt noch ein Sohn, Hartmann und Dan. Busch ist auch todt. Liebt schwäger, lasst meinen Bruder in Rütershausen dass Schreiben wissen, damit er mir schreiben kann.“

II. Die Auswanderung von 1750-1755  
Zur Zeit der zweiten grossen Auswanderung, welche wiederum nicht auf Nassau beschränkt war, standen die infolge Aussterbens von vier Linien vereinigten Nassauischen Lande, zuerst unter der Herrschaft von Wilhelm Carl Heinrich Friso, Prinzen von Oranien und Erbherrhalter der Vereinigten Niederlande, und darauf unter der Vormund-

schaftlichen Regierung seiner Wittwe Anne, geb. Kronprinzessin von England, und des Herzogs Carl von Braunschweig und Lüneburg. Da diese im Ausland residierten, war es notwendig gewesen, eine besondere aus einem Präsidenten und einer Reihe von Räten bestehende Landesregierung zu verordnen, welche von Dillenburg aus das fröhliche Fürstentum Dillenburg, das Amt Beilstein und die Unterdirektionen Dier, Hadamar und Siegen verwaltete und wegen des zeitraubenden Verkehrs mit Holland und Braunschweig manchmal ohne zuvor eingeholt Genehmigung handeln musste.

Das Hauptdokument des Jahres 1730 ist die Relatio 34 vom 2. Mai, worin die Landesregierung dem Fürsten Auskunft über die bis dahin erfolgte Auswanderung giebt, ihr Verhalten derselben gegenüber dargelegt und allerunterthünget um seine Genehmigung nachsucht. „Es hatt eine Zeit hero in hiesigen Fürstenthümern, und zwar in Dillenburgischen, besonders aber in den ehemaligen sogenannten Reformist [en] Siegnischen Landesantheit und in dem Ame Beilstein eine nicht geringe Anzahl Unterthanen um Erlassung ihrer Unterthanenpflicht und Erlaubnis, nach Verkauffung ihres Vermögens nach einer oder der andern americanischen Colonie verzichten zu mögen, bey uns in der Hoffnung nachgesuchet, dasselbst Ihr Glück besser zu machen und ein reicheres Auskommen darinnen als in hiesigen Landen zu finden.“ Die Unterdirektoren und Beamten seien angewiesen worden, insonderheit den Supplikanten, welche nach Tilgung ihrer Schulden genug übrig behielten, um sowohl ihre Vermöpflichtungen gegen die Herrschaft zu erfüllen, als sich und die Ihrigen zu ernähren, die schädlichen Folgen ihrer vorhabenden Reise nachdrücklich zu Gemüthe zu führen und sie zu „mehr Coercire“ und Hemung“ ihrer Auswanderungslust darauf aufmerksam zu machen, dass ausser dem 10. Pfennig jetzt annoch 24 Abzugselder zu zahlen seien. Jenen, welche noch ein Vermögen, theils von 600 und 900, auch theils von 1000 fl. übrig behielten, hätten sie ihr Sachen um die Missoriaries abgeschlagen, andern hingegen, welche nicht denen „hürgen kaum den Leibensunterhalt zu finden vermögten, mitin andern Unterthanen zur Last zeetten, den verlangten Loschein unbedenklich ertheilet“.

„Also haben wir zu Höhe wir diesen Vorfall in tiefster Erniedrigung unterthünget einberichten sollen in der unterthünigtesten Zurversicht, höchst dieselben sothane von uns in Absicht auf den Unterthanen bestest gemacht Verfügungen in Gnaden zu genehmigen gerufen werden, als vorüber wir uns die gnädigste Entschließung in ehrenhaftigster Obliegenheit zu unser weiter unterthünigen Verhantung hiermit erbitten.“

Die Antwort beginnt im Stile der Zeit: „Von Gottes Gnaden Will-herr Carl Heinrich Prince, Prince von Orange, Prince zu Nassau pp<sup>t</sup> und ist mit der eigenhändigen Unterschrift „Prince d'Orange à Nassau“ versehen. Sie wünscht die Landesregierung, darauf aufmerksam dass Supplikanten, welche nicht leibeigen sind, nach Errichtung der schädlichen Verpflichtungen die Verziehung auf dem Lande nicht verweigert werden kann, billigt aber im übrigen ihre Bestrebungen, durch dienstame Vorstellungen besonders die tauchlichen und wohlbe-mittelten Unterthanen so viel möglich im Lande zu behalten.“

Aus den Jahren 1751 und 1752 liegen keine wichtigeren, die Auswanderung im Ganzen betreffende Akten vor, desto mehr aber aus den folgenden Jahren, wo die Rentkammer in einer Pro memoria sagt, dass „bekanntlich sehr viele Unterthanen... nach Pensylvanien oder der Orthen zu ziehen gesonnen“ und „dieselbe ihre Abreisse sehr presieren und mehrheitlich zusammen vor wollen“. Sie ist jedoch an anderer Stelle nicht der Ansicht, dass gnädigster Herrschaft daran ein Schaden zwölche, „im Lang nicht gehemelte Unterthanen auch in mehrer Anzahl als bis dahin noch geschenen, fortzuziehen“, zumal ohnehin die Nassauherbölker und fast mehrere Menschen hat, als der District wohl ernehmen kann. Uebrigens könne ja von landesrührlicher Macht wegen verordnet werden, dass die Emigranten nicht höher als ihr ermässigter Taxwert verkauft werden dürften. Dieses Mittel würde besonders Starkhemitte vom Abziehen abschrecken.

Dieser Vorschlag wurde jedoch von der Regierung in ihrem Rundschreiben vom 22. März nur unvollkommen befolgt. Sie befahl darin zwar, dass jeder Verkauf „vor Amt“ geschehen müsse, gab aber gleichzeitig den Beamten auf „Inhaltsweise ohne Zwang“ zu verfahren und er durch Abmahnung der Käufer oder sonst auf schickliche Art zu erreichen zu suchen, dass die Güter „über ihr justum pretium [wahren Wert] nicht getrieben“ würden. Verkauf unter der Hand wird daher mit Konfiszierung und daneben noch mit nummarter Geldstrafe bedroht.

Im Postscriptum ad Relatio 42 vom 26. Mai legt sie darauf der Vormundschaft, welche nach dem inzwischen erfolgten Tode des Fürsten für dessen minderjährigen Sohn eingesetzt war, Rechenschaft ab: „Ungedacht der... in Wege gelegten Difficultiten [seyc!] dannach die Auswanderung dermaßen sehr stark... und, obgleich an der einen Seite viele unzulässig arm und ohne Schaden zu entbehrende Einwohner damit [fortgingen], schien... doch an der andern Seite auch angesehene Unterthanen sich die Lust dazu immer mehr ankommen zu lassen.“ Um die Emigranten vor den Misserfolgen, welche sie in „Slavroy und Irland“ brächten, zu schützen, hätte sie sie bei Bekämpfung der Missoriaries an den Commissionarium des Capitains von Walde gewiesen. Sie halte es aber noch für nötig, nach dem Exempel anderer Reichsstände zur Wahrung der Unterthanen eine gedrückte Verordnung gegen besagte Missarii zu erlassen und öffentlich anzuschlagen und lege den Entwurf einer solchen mit Bitte um baldige Genehmigung bei.

Die von Anne unterzeichnete Antwort ward, da sie sich mit Herzog Carl verständigen musste, erst am 3. August ausgefertigt. Es wird darin der Erlass der eingesandten Verordnung billigt, zugleich aber „bey allzu stark einreisendem Missbrauch der sonstigen liberates emigrandi [Auswanderungsfreiheit]“ seitens bemittelter Unterthanen der Gebrauch der „Zwangsmittel“ für unentbehrlich gehalten, welche in den unten S. 51 inhaltlich widergegebene Verordnung vom 28. Febr. 1764, Absatz 4-6 später aufgenommen wurden. Durch welche werde den Emigranten bemittelte Unterthanen wenigstens eine ziem-

liche Behinderung in den Weg gelegt, und während der Untersuchung des Urtrags seiner Grundstücke werde manchen die lust zur Auswanderung wieder vergehen oder die Zeit der Abreise verschieben, auch der unerlässlichen Kauflist der Bleibenden ein Ziel gesetzt. Im übrigen käme noch eine Erhöhung des Abzugsgeldes als ein Nebenmittel in Betracht.

Nach der Relatio 60 vom 1. September wurde nun die Verordnung gegen die Emissarii mit dem Datum des 3. August sofort gedruckt, dagegen zur Zeit von der Föhlung einer weiteren Verordnung mit den von der Vormundschaft vorgeschlagenen Zwangsmitteln abgesehen, „da auf die im hiesigen Landen kund gewordene Nachricht, dass die americanischen Colonien mit der darzu bestimmten Anzahl europäischer nurmehr angefüllt seyen und keine weiteren Colonisten auf dieses Jahr angenommen würden, seit einigen Monaten hier kein Unterthan mehr pro dimissorialibus nachgesuchet hat“. Erst 1764 wurde darauf zurückgegriffen.

Gehen wir nun den Ursachen der starken Auswanderung des Jahres 1753 nach, so zeigt der Bericht des Ebersbacher Amtmanns Bausch vom 12. Februar, dass in seinem Amt ein Brief aus Amerika die Hauptveranlassung war. „Als er vor einigen Wochen gehört habe, dass wieder so viele Leute nach der Insul ziehen wollten, habe er es anfangs nicht glauben wollen. Da er nun aber vermehre, dass „rechte wohlhabende Leute, so über 6, % und mehr hundert Gulden und Thaler“ der Ursache erkündigt und erfahren, dass solche gute Briefe aus der Insul kommen“. Er habe sich rechte Mühe geben müssen, etwas davon zu Gesicht zu bekommen, und habe zu den Zwecke des Schulmeisters angestellt, einen davon abzuschreiben. Beseitigt sei von Jochs Hayn, II u. R Hein, welcher als Kühiirt anno 1751 von Ritterhausen hinweggezogen. Weil nun dieser Hayn jederzeit ein „still und erhab Leben gefüllt“ und darin der meiste Mitgezogene nur so noch viele Verwandte hier hätten, auch des verabredeten mehr Wänden als andern noch herumlaufenden „Federwischen“ bei und machen „nicht wenig Lernen wegen des Fortzeichens“. Die Bauschsche Abschrift ist, wenn auch sehr verglikt, erhalten. Was Hayn darin schreibt, welches ein Mitteilung zwischen einem s und sz bildet, ist daher in's Transkript.

„Von diesen Lande zu berichten, so ist unter rechtmissiger Herr, dem wir geschworen haben, Wilhelm (I) der 2te, König in England. Sonsten ist unser gegenwärtiger Gouverneur vom König eingesetzt, Recht und Gerechtigkeit zu befördern und das Böse zu straffen. Es ist aber nicht wie bey euch, das die Herrschaft den Unterthanen plaget bis auf das höchste mit Geldgeben und Frohdiensten, dann wir sitzen, ruhig unter unsrer Herrschaft. Sie regieren auch nicht länger als ein Jahr. Dann werden sie oder andere wider erwählt von den Unterthanen...“

Es ist alles frey, alle Handthierung und Profession. Es ist

auch, Gott sei dankt ein fruchtbare Land mit allerley Gewächs, Frucht genug, auch allerley Frucht, als (nur) kleinen Hirschen (= Hirse) hab' ich noch gesehen. Wir haben die Zeit, die wir hier im Landt sein, lauter Wäxzenbrot gekauen. Es ist auch nicht so gar theuer. Mann kauft das Buschel um 4 Schilling, das ist bey euch 2 Kormeste, und ein Schilling ist so viel an eurem Geld als 9 alb, auch 2 Schilling ist ein Pfund. Ich habe aber schon manchen Tag 3, auch 4, auch bis 5 Schilling verdient...“

„Dahey braucht menn kein Holtz zu kaufen. Ich bin hier selber Förster. Ich und mein Bruder haben eine Stunde lang walding, das schönste Holtz. Es gibt hier allerley Holtz, viererley Fischen, Tannen, . . Walnis, Cedern, Casdanien, Hühnerapeln (??), allerley, das ich mein Lebttag in Teutschland nicht gesehen habe, auch gesund Wasser, auch gesunde Luft, auch Vieh genug.“

„Es gibt hier Leute, die 10 bis 15 Pferde haben und haben nichts mit ins Land bracht. Wer fleisig arbeitet, der kan sich hier wohl ernähren. Mann gibt ja der Herrschaft gar wenig. Ein Mann, der zwey, drey oder 400 Acker land hat, der gibt das Jahrs 2 auch 3 Schilling, und ein Schilling seind 9 alb, wie ich vorher gemeldet, auch manchmalen garnichts. Es gibt auch solche Plett preif, wer (= für den der) Geld mit ins Land bringet. Die Leute verkauffen und gehen weiter fort. Es weis noch kein Mensch, wie gros das Land ist. Europa ist dagegen als Dillenburg gegen Frankfurt in der Landkarte. Das beste Landt liegt noch wiste. Sie reissen noch bis sieben hundert Meilen und finden [kein] Ende.“

„Wann ein wohstehender Mann bey euch seine Sache zu Geld hätte und Lust, hierher zu ziehen, der kan hier in Ruhe sitzen besser wie bey euch ein Edelmann. Die Armen auch, aber sie müssen klein anfangen, dann das Land bringt Frucht genug, wann die Holtz darvon gewineint, ohne Besserung. Aber das ist das beste, wann sie ihre Pracht bezahlen können, so können sie sich darnach wohl ernähren. Ein gemeiner Taglöhner hat 2 Schilling und o Bens—12 Bens ist ein Schilling. Das ist bey euch ein halber Reichsthaler. So weit ist mein wahrhaftige Bericht von diensem Land, von Frucht, Holtz und Wasser, das schöne Obst nicht zu vergessen. Mehr Obst und Persing hat hier ein Mann als bey euch ein ganzes Dorff.“

Gottes Wort und Prediger haben wir auch zu Gehüfe, wer das gerne höret. Es wird euch wohl bewust sein, das Prediger aus dem Dillenburgischen zu uns gekommen sein. Der Wieseler ist bey uns Prediger, der Otterbein ist in der Stadt Längester“ usw. Datiert: „In der Penzelphanien im Alten Mängel bey lüthwig Haus“, (an anderer Stelle all Mengil), d. 15. Oct. 1752.

Ein anderer Brief, welcher von Bausch sechs Wochen später von ungefähr einem kleinen Mädchen auf der Gasse abgenommen wurde und im Original erhalten ist, mache wieder „viel Aufruhr“. Der Schreiber, Daniel Becker, ein Reisegenosse von Jochs Hayn, erklärt darin die Reise für beschwerlich, aber ungefährlich und sagt dann u. a.: „ich wünsche doch . . . das ihr aus der Igittische Blage komt, dan dan ich betraue euch alle in den Dillenburger Lande“. Eine Reihe

von ihm aufgerührter Handwerker könne in Amerika „fihi güt verdi-nen“. Ein Mann esse dort mehr Fleisch als sechs im Deutschland, usw., lautet „auf Rache wey im Daunschieb Liebanon“, 12. Nov. 1752, von Paulus über „Vriendam“ zu erreichen.

Im Amt Beilstein war der Ende Januar erfolgende Besuch des gleichfalls erst vor zwei Jahren ausgewanderten Joh. Chr. Schmitt nicht ohne Einflüsse auf die Auswanderung. Er war von seiner ziemlich gut bemittelten Familie, welche sich in Heidelberg Twp., Fa. niedergelassen hatte, zur Hauptsache wieder hinausgeschickt, um eine zurückgelassene Schwester nebst Mann und Kindern nachzuholen, hatte sich aber in Rotterdam vom Kaufmann und Schiffssagenten Daniel Havart bereden lassen, gegen freie Rückfahrt Auswanderer zu werben. Als die Regierung gegen Ende März davon erfuhr, wurde er verhaftet, unter starker Bedeckung zuerst nach Beilstein und darauf nach Lülenburg gebracht und dort gefangen gesetzt. Da ihm jedoch keine vorsätzliche Verführung Dillenburger Untertanen nachgewiesen werden konnte und der Hanauer Steuer, bei welcher er zwei Jahre als Knecht gedient hatte, nichts als Treue und Aufrichtigkeit bei ihm verspürte zu haben erklärte, wurde der Arrest als gemündige Strafe erachtet und er unter Abseitung folgenden Eides aus der Haft entlassen:

„Ich, Johann Christian Schmitt, gelobe und schwör zu Gott dem Allmächtigen einen leidlichen Eid, dass ich mit keinem der Nassauischen Landesunterthanen hinkünftig mich mit einem Gespräch von deren Zustand von Pennsylvania und der Gegenen einlassen, noch weni-ansprechen oder gar einen Contract desfalls mit ihnen schlesien, sondern mich dessen gänzlich enthalten, auch innerhalb 3 Tagen mich aus den hierigen landen wegheben und mich darin nicht wiederfinden lassen will, so wahr mir Gott helfe durch seinen lieben Sohn.“

Hauptquelle für die einzelnen Auswanderer sind diesmal die Tabellen, von den seit einigen Jahren her nach America weggewogenen Unterthanen, für welche die Landesregierung Formulare in die Amts- und Unterdistrikte aussandte. Diese Formulare enthielten 12 oder 13 Columns, worin neben dem Namen des Emigranten folgendes einzutragen war: das „Vatterland“, d. h. der Heimatort, desselben seine Conduite, die Stärke seiner Familie, der Wert seines Mobilia und Barschatt, seine Immotilla nebst deren Wert oder Taxa, Kaufpreis und Käufer, seine Passiva, die Beträge des 10. Pfennige und des Abzugsgeldes und das gold, welches er hat mitgenommen. Es fehlten leider die Familien von Burbach, Ebersbach, Haiger, Herborn, Siegen und Tringenstein. Bei Ebersbach wird dieser Mangel durch den Brief von Johs Hayn und die Amtsrechnungen einigermassen ersetzt. Bei Haiger und Tringenstein bieten die entsprechenden Rechnungen aber nur drei bzw. einen Namen, und bei Herborn zwar 1753 die Angabe, dass von den Einnahmen des Jahres aus dem 10. Pfennig 556, 29, 4 auf die Emigranten entfallen, aber wieder nur einen Namen.

Nach den Tabellen waren die Wegziehenden überwiegend brave, aber wenig bemittelte Leute. Unter 58 wurden 23 fleissig genannt, einer träge, 14 gut, 13 schlecht oder doch schlechte Haushalter, einer ehrbar, einer länderlich. Fast alle hatten zwar wiederum ein eigen Heim und mehr oder weniger Grundstücke, waren aber z. T. stark verschuldet, die Beilsteiner z. B. durchschnittlich mit über 50%. Nach den Tabellen und den Ebersbacher Amtsrechnungen konnten unter 80 nur 28 Beträge von über 300 Gulden mitnehmen, darunter nur 20 über 500 und 5 von 848 bis 1305. Von den 52, welche weniger als 300 mitnahmen, hatten fünf garnichts übrig behalten, vierzehn 6-75, dreizehn 75-150 Gulden.

Vergleicht man jedoch Johs Hayn's und Dan. Becker's Briefe mit der Ebersbacher Amtsrechnung des Jahres, so zeigt sich eine grosse Diskrepanz. Denn, während schon die Überfahrt für Dan. Becker und Frau, Johs Hayn und Brüder nebst Frauen und die Gebrüder Heinrich, 480 Gulden beanspruchte, und dazu noch das Geld für die Land- und Viehhäufe der drei Familienälter in Amerika hinzukommt, stehen alle dem in der Amtsrechnung nur 85 von Johs Hayn mitgenommene Gulden gegenüber. Selbst angenommen, dass Antmann Bausch die beiden Heinrich, welche Vormünder hatten, den Verarbeitenzurechnete, welche er laut Regierungsschreiben vom 23. Febr. des Jahres conniende mit Zurückführung eines Auges! entlassen durfte, so fehlt es doch bei den Übrigen an einer Erklärung.

In der nun folgenden Namensliste ist den wenigen uns bekannten Auswanderern der Jahre 1750-52 die Jahreszahl (ohne die 17) beigegeben, den vielen, welche entweder sicher oder doch vielleicht 1753 fortzogen, dagegen keine Zahl beigegeben. Bei denen, welche nach Rupp in Philadelphia landeten, ist ein R mit der Nummer der Schiffssliste hinzugefügt, wobei geringe Abweichungen in Ruppschen Schreibungen oder die Vorsetzungen bzw. Auslassung eines Johans nicht vermerkt ist. A vor andern Taufnamen ist wieder als Anna zu lesen, F, Fan und k als Frau, Familie und Kind oder Kinder.

Die vielen Vorstehenden, welche sich in R 206 finden, d. h. in der rowand ihre Überfahrt machten, waren Reisegenossen einer beträchtlichen Anzahl<sup>1</sup> von denjenigen, welche Joh. Chr. Schmitt für Daniel Havart angeworben hatte, und teilten mithin auch deren Überfahrtsbedingungen. Nach denselben erhielt jede erwachsene Person oder sogenannte ganze Fracht einen festen Schlafplatz von sechs Fuss Länge und anderthalb Fuss Breite, Sonntags 1 ½ Fleisch mit Erbsen, Reis oder Bohnen; Montags 1 ½ Mehl, Dienstags 1 ½ Speck mit Erbsen, Reis oder Bohnen; Mittwochs wie Montags; Donnertags wie Sonntags; Freitags 1 ½ Butter und 1 ½ Stückfisch mit Erbsen, Reis oder Bohnen; Samstags 6 ½ Bred, 1 ½ Käse und Erbsensuppe. Ferner: 1 Maas Bier des Tags, solange es gut bleiben kan, nebst 1 Maas Wasser, nach dem aber 2 Maas Wasser täglich. Von Morgens 6 Uhr bis Abends 6 Uhr Feuer, um darauf zu kochen und die Kranken und kleinen Kinder zu erwärmen, „insoweit es Wind und wetter zulassen“. Für durstige Kranke 2 Fass Essig und 1 Fass Brandewein, wie auch Gewürz, „damit sie nicht durch deren Ermangelung auf die See ihrer Gesundheit und Lebens beraubt werden“, wie auch die erforderlichen Medizinen.

Viel geringer als die Zahl derer, welche wir bis Philadelphia

begleiten konnten, ist naturgemäß die Zahl derer, welche wir über Philadelphia oder einen andern Landingshafen hinaus verfolgen können. Die Familie Schmitt und die Gebrüder Hayn blieben, wie wir bereits oben sahen, in Pennsylvania, während Dan. Becker sich in New Jersey niederliess. Die Gebrüder Henrich gingen dorthin oder nach New York. Johs Diehl, Maria Elisab, Goebel, Joh. Peter Russ und Joh. Adam Stahl werden ebenso wie Jost Henr. Nevel gleich in New York gelandet sein. Johs Diehl und die Goebel, welche Wilh. Seehers Frau geworden war, lebten 1787 in Canajoharie am Mohawk. Russ 1789 in Claverack (vielleicht Claverack, Columbia Co.) und Stahl um dieselbe Zeit in Rhinebeck, Dutchess Co., N. Y. Eine von letzteren nach Dillenburg gesandte Vollmacht ist sowohl auf einem deutsch- als auf einem englischgedruckten Formular ausgefertigt. Die deutsche ist datiert „im vierzehenden Jahr unserer Independence und im Jahr unsers Herrn“ usw. (1789, 10. Sept.). Liner der beiden Zeugen trägt den in unseren Tagen weltbekannt gewordnen Namen Rockefeller. Der Vollmacht liegt in den Akten an anderer Stelle die Abschrift der *Dimissorialien* bei, welche als Beispiel aus der Mitte des Jahrhunderts hier abgedruckt seien:

„Nunach Joh. Adam Stahl von Madenbüren im Fürstenthum Dillenburg aus hiesigen Landen ab- und nacher Amerikam zu ziehen gedenket und dahero um die erfordert. *Dimissoriales* gesiegmend angestanden, man auch demselben hierunter zu deferieren kein befehlen hat. Als werden ihm solche Kraft dieses hierdurch ertheilet und [er] somit der Unterthanen Pflicht, wann er zeithero hiesig gnädigster Landesherrschaft zuguten gewesen, erlassen.

In Urkund der Landes-Regierung gewöhnl. Unterschrift und vorgedruckten Insiegel. *Signaturem* (ger.) Dillenburg, d. 17ten May 1753.

L. S. Fürstl. Oranien-Nassausche zur Vormundschaftl. Landes-Regierung verordnete Präsident, Geh. Räthe, auch Geh. Justiz- und Reg. Räthe.

Jost Henr. Nevel wohnte 1767 in Cartischazery, N. Y. Nach einem Briefe von ihm an seinen Schwestersohn vom 31. Sept., von dem ein Teil in der unten S. 37 erwähnten Kinschenschen Abschrift erhalten ist, war er bis dahin von seiner Auswanderung nicht besonders befriedigt. Er berichtet darin u. a. von dem Untergang eines Auswandererschiffes mit 300 Menschen in der Norissee, von 300 Gulden, welche ihn und den Seinen die Reise nach New York kosteten, von Krieg dasebst. Von letzterem sagt er: „Wir haben 8 Jahr lang kriegt, nicht einen Krieg, wie in der Welt bräuchlich ist, sondern einen mordthätigen Krieg durch die blutige Wilden... Die haben in den 8 Jahr viel 1000 tott geschlagen bis in eine Stadt, die heist Canida (!). Es ist ein französischer Ort.“

Peter Hild und Familie sowie die Familien Ludwig und Stahl, denen

zwei seiner Schwiegersöhne entstammen, werden auf einem waldischen Schiffe direkt nach Boston gefahren sein, denn seine drei verheirateten Töchter und deren Männer und eine verwitwete Schwieger Tochter, welche 1786 Erbansprüche in Dillenburg erhoben, wohnten damals in Waldoborough, Mass. Die von ihnen eingesandte Vollmacht ist beglaubigt von Gouverneur James Bowdoin d. 16. Sept. 1786 „in the Eleventh year of the Independence of the U. S. of America“ und trägt das grosse *Sigillum Reipublicae Massachusettensis*.

### III. Die Auswanderungen zwischen 1764 und 1798

Mit dem Aufhören des siebenjährigen Krieges kam neben der Auswanderung nach andern Ländern auch die nach Amerika wieder in Aufnahme. Währnd man sie aber im vorhergehenden Jahrzehnt nur durch die eine gedruckte Verordnung vom 3. Aug. 1753 einzuschränken gesucht hatte, ging man jetzt binnen zwei Jahren mit dreien gegen sie vor.

Die erste ward von der Landesregierung am 28. Febr. 1764 ohne zuvor eingeholtte Genehmigung des Überlebenden Mitglieds der vormundschaftlichen Regierung, Herzog Carls, erlassen und ihm gegenüber in der Relatio 35 vom gleichen Datum, wie folgt, begründet. Es seien unter den Supplikanten gegenwärtig verschiedene „wohl angesessene“, besonders aber der bekannte bereits in Amerika gewesene Joh. Christ Lindorff von Langenbach Amts Beilstein und seine ganze in „wohlthuenden“ Unterthanen bestehende Familie. Da sie nicht Leibeigene seien – im Amt Beilstein kommt nur Niedershausen Leibeigenschaft – habe man ihnen die Auswanderung nicht schlechterdings versagen, sondern nur erschweren können. Zu dem Zwecke sei in der neuen Verordnung neben älteren z. T. verschärften Bestimmungen von den Zwangsmitteln Gebrauch gemacht, welche in dem vormundschaftlichen Schreiben vom 3. Aug. 1753 bereits vorgeschlagen, aber damals zurückgestellt worden seien.

Der Inhalt der neun Absätze der Verordnung ist kurz folgender:

1. Wiederholung der Verordnung von 1753.
2. Wer ohne *Dimissoriales* auswandert, verliert zur Strafe sein Vermögen.

3. Wer die *Dimissoriales* erlangt hat, „soll sich gar keine Hoffnung machen / er mag wirklich wegziehen, oder hernach sein Vorhaben anderen / und wieder bleiben wollen / als Unterthan wiederum angenommen / oder in denen hiesigen Landen geduldet zu werden / sondern er hat nebst seiner välligen Familie jene auf ewig zu räumen“, besonders keine unerzogenen Kinder zur Beschwerde des Landes zurückzulassen.

- 4-6 (neu!) Verkauf und Dimission haben in folgender Weise vor sich zu gehen: Zunächst reicht der Emigrant seinem Beamten ein Verzeichnis seiner zu verkauften Güter mit den darauf haftenden Schulden und den Namen des präsumptiven Käufers ein. Darauf untersucht der Beamte den wahren Ertrag eines jeden Stückes und setzt mit dem Emigranten und dem Käufer zusammen einen leidlichen Preis fest, von dem der letztere eidlich versichern muss, dass er ihn aus-

seinen baren Mitteln, ohne vieles dazu zu borgen, zahlen könne, erst dann ertheilt die Regierung unter Umständen die *Dimissoriales*, falls es nach ihrem Ermessen ohne Schädigung des im Lande Bleibenden geschehen kann. Werden diese Bestimmungen jedoch umgangen, so verfallen die Güter dem Fiscus, und wird der ungehorsame Käufer unnachrichtlich ebenfalls zum Emigriren angehalten.

7. Damit die Herrschaft nicht zu kurz kommt, hat der Beamte bei Ansetzung eines jeden Emigranten den Rechnungsbeamten des Ortes zu zuziehen. Andere Gläubiger haben zwei Monate ihre Ansprüche geltend zu machen. Der Käufer darf von Ablauf solcher Frist und ohne schriftliche Order vom Beamten bei Strafe zweifache Restitution des Emigranten nichts auszuladen.

8 und 9 handeln von der Aufbewahrung der Akten in der Repositor und von der Kostenlosigkeit der notwendigen Untersuchungen.

Herzog Carl genehmigte intern 26. März nicht nur nachträglich diese Verordnung, sondern stellte obendrein zur Erwähnung, ob nicht, falls das Emigrirte trübsinn fortwähren sollte, die schon 1753 von der Vormundschaft angeleitete künftliche Erhöhung der Abzugsgelder vorbehalten werden sollte. Da nun in der Tat noch verschiedene ziemlich veränderte und nicht leibengewordene Supplikanten, besonders aus dem late Seelstein und aus dem Hückengrunde, inständig auf ihrer Befreiung beharrten, wird eine solche Massnahme von der Regierung, in ihrer Relatio d. von 12. April „ohnmöglichlich notwendig“ erachtet und unter denselben Datum eine Zusatzverordnung mit folgender Hauptbestimmung erlassen:

[Die Regierung] behält sich I) in jedem vorkommenden Fall eine willkürliche Bestim- und Erhöhung des Abzugs-Geldes ausdrücklich bevor und kann sodann die zu emigrieren [sic! gesonnenen] Überlassen / ob sie gleichwohl mit weniger Mitteln ihrer eitelen Hoffnung nachfolgen wollen durch die alleinige Industrie ein besonderes Glück in ganz unbekannten Landen zu suchen". Auf diese beiden in sonstigen

Auf diese beiden in erster Linie gegen verheirathete Personen gerichtete Verordnungen des Jahres 1714 folgte am 3. Juni 1766 eine Novverordnung gegen das Auskandern Universitätsrate, welche am 17. Juli durch eine gedruckte Verordnung im Namen des nun mündig gewordenen Wilhelm I. ersetzt wurde. Anlass zur Novverordnung gab die unvermeidlichen Misüge, dass junge unverheirathete Leute unter dem Vorwande, dass sie in Amerika als Einbürgertheit jährlich 50-60 Reichstaler bare Münze seien machen könnten, zur Auswanderung verleitet würden und sich mit den „anito allenthalben im Zug“ befindlichen Emigranten heimlich aus dem Land zu machen wünschten. Der erste Teil der gedruckten Verordnung dehnt eigentlich nur die längst auf heimliche Auswanderung gesetzte Strafe der verdängniskonfiskation auf den Verlust des ihnen beizuhaltenden „so wenig von dem ihrigen weite abzudenken“ als einzigen Vorschuss darauf zu thun. Der zweite, weniger fehl schliessst sämtliche Auswanderer, ob jung oder schon älter, von künftigen Erbschaften in der Heimat aus, unter dem Vorwand, dass verschiedentlich frühere Untertanen sich

Ihnen im Nassauischen zugefallene Erbschaften selbst oder durch Bevollmächtigte nachgeholt hätten, dass aber gleichwohl keine Erbschaft vom Ausland ins Nassauische hereingekommen sei, sowie aus andern Ursachen wird verloren.

"dass nach America, Russland / oder sonst emigrende Unterthane in Zukunft zu keinerley Erbschaft mehr zugelassen / sondern davon gänzlich ausgeschlossen / fort sogleich / nach erlangten *Dimissori alieni* und geschehenem Abzug / *pro mortuis* (für tot) gehalten / und die nächst folgende Anverwandt darin berechtigt seyn sollen".

Mit all diesen Waffen, wie Bestimmung des Verkaufspreises der Güter, Beschränkung der Käufer auf die kapitalkräftigen, willkürliche Erhöhung des Abzugsgeldes, Ausschluss von allen Erbschaften, ausgerüstet, war die Regierung in den Stand gesetzt, die Auswanderung von Vermögenden grösstenteils zu verhindern. Die der Unvermögenden schwoll jedoch 1773 noch einmal so an wie nie zuvor und wurde von ihr zum Teil dem Einfluss der alle Jahr sich einfindenden Amerikaner zugeschrieben, denen gegenüber sie sich nachtlos fühlte. Sie heißtest es in Relatio 190 von 26. Juni 1773:

„Eu. Höheit müssen wir Pflichten halber unterthänigst berichten dass in diesen Jahr mehr Unterthanen, als jemahen ein Jahr geschen ist, aus hiesigen Landen nach America emigriert sind. Ob nun zwaren bisnach die Immigration den hiesigen Landen unschädlich gewesen und die Emigranten mehrtheils auss armen und in Übler Aufführung gestanden, überhaupt aber in nichts besonders vermegen den Leuthen standen, so ist gleichwohl nichts gewisser, als dass die Unterthanen durch die alle Jahr in den hiesigen Landen sich einfindend Americaner angeworben und zum Auswanderen verführt werden. Wir haben zwarn auf diese leute genaue Aufsicht gehalten, allein sie wissen, ihre Sache so einzuleutzen, dass nicht hinter sie zu kommen ist.“ Es sei aber nicht abzusehen, warum ihnen auch nur ein kurzer Aufenthalt zu gestatten sei.

In seiner eigenhändig mit W. Pr. v. Orange unterzeichneten Antwort, Haag d. 18. Juli, pflichtete der Fürst ihm mit Bezug auf diese Amerikaner bei und genehigte, dass „diejenige, welche von Zeit zu Zeit in Unsere Lande zurückkommen, arretirt und, wann sie nichts darinnes zu thun haben, sofort daraus verwiesen, diejenige aber, welche wirkliche Geschäfte dasebst haben, erst nach Verlaufen des zu deren Ausrichtung ihnen bestimmten Termini ausgeheben werden.“

Neue Verfügungen waren nicht nötig. So konnte z. B. die Regierung im Jahre 1784 der Weilburger gegenüber die gute Wirkung ihrer Emigrations-Verordnungen rühmen und im nächsten Jahr der Hanauer mitteilen, dass sie dank der angedrohten Vermögenskonfiskation zur Zeit nicht über heimliche Auswanderung zu klagen habe. Im Gegenteil ging sie dazu über, nicht nur mehr und mehr den Wegzug solcher, welche wegen ihrer Armut zur Last fielen oder zu fallen drohen, durch Wegeführung einer kleinen Beisteuer zur Reise bis an den Hafen zu begünstigen, sondern sogar die Auswanderung solcher, welche Vergehen oder Verbrechen begangen hatten, zu fördern.

Während z. B., wie wir oben S. 10 sahen, 1709 einer wegen eines noch nicht abgeschlossenen Forstrevels zurückgehalten wurde, ward jetzt einer im gleichen Fall, damit er nur nicht etwa bleibe, von seinem Kämmann ohne Rücksicht der Busse fortgelassen. Einer von ihrer ganzen Umgegend gefürchteten Diebsfamilie wurden die Abzugsgefeide ganz oder zum Teil erlassen. In mehreren Fällen wurde der Rest einer noch nicht abgesessenen Gefängnisstrafe geschenkt, wobei ein Häftling in seinem Gnaden gesuchte darauf hinweist, wie jetzt die Reise nach Amerika von so vielen angestreten werde, die sich in „verzweifelten Zuständen“ befinden. Ja, der Oberschultheiss Reichmann von Hettigen machte alles Ernstes sämtliche Insassen des dortigen Zucht- und Arbeitshauses nach Amerika schicken, wenn er den 7. Mai 1780 der Regierung schreibt: „Die im Arbeitshaus befindliche Gessellschaft von hier könnte man zum Vorteil des Publikums noch mit einer Weisesteuer dem Kämmann [nach Amerika] mitgeben, wenn sich dieselbe dazu willfährig erklären würde. Ich stelle unterthänigst an, ob nicht der Zuchthaus-Kommission aufzugeben seyr möchte, diese Zuchtlinge darüber zu vernehmen und die Erklärung ehehdiglich einzufordern.“

Mutter mit unehelichen Kindern und ehehelich Geborene, welche nicht selten auswanderten, wichen dabei, abgesehen von andern Gründen, einem starken moralischen Druck, da sie beide andauernd in den Gründungsregistern der Amtsrechnungen geführt wurden. Eine nicht verheiratet gewesen und wieder geschieden war, wollte fort, weil sie die Verantwortung nicht ertragen konnte.

Arbeitslosigkeit, Landheim und günstige Nachrichten über den Nahmossen waren der Grund für die Auswanderung mancher Bergleute im Siegelschen in den Jahren 1796 und 1797. Auch die Hämmer waren damals dort seit langer Zeit stillgelegt, und fast modern mutet die Empörung zweier Tagödheimer darüber an, dass die Hammerschmiedekunst nicht auswandern lassen wollten. So sagt der eine in seinem Gesuch:

„Sie verlangen von Tagödheimer, dass er bei Ihnen bleiben soll, sie geben ihm aber nichts zu verdienen, sobald ihr Interesse dadurch funden es für gut, Ihr Gewerbe stellen zu lassen und sofort liessen einige Rückzüge zu nehmen, alle nämner das ganze vorige Jahr hindurch mittlerweise von seinen eigenen schwanz ziehen, und wenn es dem Tagödheimer gefällig ist, will er jenen erst wieder wie sein Lasthier gebrauchen. Wir hätten doch wohl gerechte Ursache zu verüberset das vergangene müde, was wir seit 3-4 Jahren zugesetzt haben.“ Und weiter unten nach Zurückweisung der Behauptung, dass die Siegner Zunft eine besondere geheime Schmiedekunst besäße:

„Ein schwacher Mann taugt garnicht zu ihrer jetzigen Schmiederey und, wer nicht einen besonders starken Körperbau besitzt, schmiedet kaum 10-15 Jahre, so ist er schon invalide... Jeder Schlag erschüttert das Innere de Gebeine. Meiner festen Natur habe ich, Spies, es zu verdanken, dass ich nun schon 26 Jahre geschmiedet habe, aber ich fühle auch, dass ich gearbeitet habe. Vielleicht noch einige Jahre, so bin ich schon zur Arbeit untauglich, allein nichts desto weniger werde ich alsdann doch noch gern essen. Gott helfe mir aber, wenn ich auf die Dankbarkeit der Zunft, in deren Dienst ich meine Kräfte aufgeopfert habe, rechnen sollte.“ Übrigens wollten sie in Amerika die Erde bauen und nur im Notfall schmieden.

Der andere erklärt u. a.: „Die bürgerliche Gesellschaft, worinnen ich lebe, muss mich entweder ziehen lassen, oder sie muss mir annehmliche Mittel angeben, wie ich mich und meine Familie ernähren soll, denn ich bin nicht ein Glied von ihr, dass ich vor Mangel umkommen müsse.“

Ein Kuriosum ist die Auswanderung von drei Rittershausenern, welche 1000-2000 Gulden im Vermögen hatten. Sie wird herbeigeführt durch einen später als Fälsching nachgewiesenen und auch heute noch deutlich als solche erkennbaren fingierten Brief aus Amerika, welchen der eine sich von einem Schulmeister in Eibelshausen hatte anfertigen lassen, um seiner nicht zur Auswanderung geneigten Frau Lust zu machen, mit ihm zu ziehen. Er enthielt eine dringende und endgiltige Aufforderung herüberzukommen seitens seines Vektors Joh. Jost Hoffmein, welcher es zum Major und zu grossem Besitz gebracht habe, während ein anderer Rittershäusern dritten gar General geworden sei. Da den Lande durch diese Auswanderung ein sehr beträchtlicher Geldverlust drohte, gab die Landesregierung sich alle erdenkliche Mühe, sie durch den Amtsman daran zurückzuhalten. Sie wies ihm an, die Männer mit ihren Ehefrauen und erwachsenen Kindern vor sich kommen zu lassen und hoffte, wenn der Brief auch zuverlässig sein sollte, die Gefährlichkeit ihres Vorhabens und die grosse Ungewissheit ihres künftigen Schicksals vorzustellen, da sie zusammen mit ihren Familien und Gütern entweder schiffbruch leiden und verkommen, jederly ihre Verwandte, die sie jetzt rechnen, mitteler Zeit verstorben seyn oder in Kärtzen versterben oder doch in ungünstige Gestände gerathen könnten. Im Falle sie aber trotzdem auf ihrer Absicht beständen, ihnen zu eröffnen, dass sie 20% ihres Vermögens pro Fisco zurücklassen müssten und sich nicht die mindeste Hoffnung zu machen hätten, dass sie oder ihre Abkömmlinge... jemahnen als Untertanen wieder aufgenommen würden. Abkommung und Drohung waren in diesem Fall natürlich gleich vergeblich.

Die Akten sind angefüllt mit in der Mehrzahl vergeblichen aber trotzdem mitunter mehr als einmal wiederholten Versuchen der Auswanderer oder ihrer Angehörigen, zurückgelassenes Vermögen oder angefallene Erbschaften vor dem Zugriff des Fiscus zu retten. Bei solchen, welche jung auf die Wanderschaft gegangen waren und später

die Auslieferung ihres Vermögens beantragten, kam es eventuell daran, ob sie *cum animo secessandi*<sup>1</sup> ausgetragen waren oder von Anfang an Auswanderung beabsichtigt hatten. Bei denen, welche Erbsansprüche machten, hing es davon ab, wie es mit der Anwendbarkeit der Verordnung vom 17. Juli 1768 stand, welche die Justizkanzlei bereits in ihrem Promemoria vom 12. Jan. 1786 am liebsten auf am 2. Dez. 1793 sogar, dass bei der in den Nassauischen Landen stehenden Übervisierung die Imigrationsstrafen überhaupt verschont werden sollten.

Ein Beispiel erfolgreicher Durchsetzung von Ansprüchen beim Fischturm bietet Joh. Jacob Diehl im Frühjahr 1768, obwohl er während der Zeit durch den arglosen und überfrifigen Amtmann Kinen von verhaftet wurde. Zunächst brachte Kinen nämlich in Erfahrung, dass die Regierung zahlreiche Briefe aus Amerika sei, und veranlasseten abgeliefert waren, zu beschlagnahmen. Während diese als noch drei bereits angeliefert auf, schrieb sie teilweise ab oder liess sie abschreiben und versuchte nun mittels des einen für Amerika günstig nachzuweisen, dass die andern beiden, welche von Auswanderern befehlt waren, geschrieben seien, um Diehl bei der Welle, die sie verlaufen lassen, dass er ein oder zwei Prediger und Wünsche. Er, Kinen, gestattete sich deshalb gleichzeitig Unterhändigung junger Leute nochmals im Lande publiziert zu werden. Da zur Zeit auch mehrere Dutzend jungen Leute zur Auswanderung veranlasst wurden, machte die Regierung sich gefänglich einzeln und befrüchteten zu eignen und liess Diehl rechtfertigen sich jedoch durch Beberendung der ihm von zwei evangelischen Gemeinden mitgegebenen Berufungen von Predigern und Standes, so dass er unter Anerkennung hervorgegangenes Misserfolg, im Falle er doch Leute zur Auswanderung veranlasst, schenker der Haft entlassen und ihm die Annahme der Prediger freigestellt wurde. Auch liess er sich durch die anfängliche Abweisung seiner Maria Elisabeth Seher, geb. Siebel, seitens des Bruders Johannes und der schäfchen und ruhte nicht, bis er alles ektemmissig ordnet und seinem Monatsfrist durchgesetzt hatte. Für ihn selber war dabei welcher seiner origineller Fassung wegen hier wiedergegeben sei:

„Nachdem Vorsitzer dieses Johanna Jacob Diehl zu Rehe nach America zu reissen willens ist, und dann hiessiger Orten gesunde und frische Luft und nicht das Mindeste von einer ansteckenden Seuche

zu verspielen ist, Alss wird jedes Orts Obrigkeit nach Standes Gebühr hiemit ersucht, vor eingangs gedachten Johann Jacob Diehl alder Orten pass- und reparieren zu lassen, welches in dergleichen Fällen wiederum beobachtet werden soll, in Urkund des hierunter getruckten Amtssiegels:

Beilstein d. 17ten Junij 1765

L. S. Fürstl. Oranien-Nassauisches Vorm. Amt hierselbst

A. Jeckeln, Rath und Amtmann

Hauptquelle für die Namen wären diesmal die spezifizierten Sonderberichte über die Einnahmen aus den 10. Pfennigs- und Abzugsgeldern gewesen. Da jedoch kein einziger von diesen erhalten zu sein scheint, ist man im wesentlichen auf die Gesuche um Dismissionen oder Vermögens- bzw. Erbschaftsausleferungen angewiesen. In den daneben in Betracht kommenden Amtsrechnungen fehlt bei den verhältnismässig wenigen Namen Übereins noch oft das Auswanderungsziel. Auf die Fälle ist daher im Folgenden in solchen Fällen ein Fragezeichen davor gesetzt, wenn auch z. B. 1773 kaum ein anderes Land außer Amerika in Frage kommen dürfte. Das Auswanderungsjahr, diesmal vielfach fraglich, wird wieder mit Auslassung des Jahrhunderts gegeben. Die Hauptabkürzungen sind dieselben wie oben S. 9 u. 24.

Dabei die Weise der Auswanderer lässt sich diesmal weniger mehr mitteilen, als dass sie außer über Rotterdam oder Amsterdam zu Letzt auch mitunter über Hamburg erfolgte. Unheimittelte junge Leute konnten sich nach dem Aussage des alten Broitzt in seinem Bericht am 5. Aug. 1778 bis an den Hafen durchschetteln, während die Kreise nach wie vor in Amerika abverdient werden konnte.

Was ihre Schicksale dort betrifft, so nahmen drei an dem Freiheitskriege teil, und zwar Herzl und Joh. Henr. Rickas auf Nationalaler und Hilarius auf englischen Seite. Herzl starb in Fort Washington, Hilarius soll in Amerika desertiert sein, und Rickas besuchte später die Heimat noch wieder. Von den übrigen wissen wir, dass 2 sich in Maryland ansiedelten, 11 in Pennsylvania, 1 in New Jersey und 8 in New York. Lediglich beabsichtigte Niederländer sind hier nicht mit aufgeführt.

In der Grafschaft East more wohnten 1791 A. Maria (oder Barbara) Erdmann, geb. Meusek, und Phil. Stähler.

In Philadelphia lebte 1785 Friedr. Wilh. Klemann, 1789 eine Wirth und 1791 Susanna Elisa, geb. Metzler als Frau des Fabrikanten Carl Bartholomaeus; in Tujepack zur gleichen Zeit deren Mutter A. Elisa, als Frau von Moritz Joseph in Reading 1784 Sebastian Weber; Frau A. Marg., geb. Kuntze, in Marden Creek, Berks Co 1771. Sebastian haussien mit seiner Frau Elisa, geb. Reinhold; in Saltz Krick' 1792. Vollmacht von Lancaster, 1802 Joh. Jost Hoffmein, welcher in dem genannten Brief (s. o. S. 36) als Major und begitterter Landseiter vermeldet ist und nun als "arme Kreis" um die Auslieferung in Memfeld oder Münsf. N. J., 8 Meilen von Burlington und 28 von Philadelphia, 1791 Joh. Henr. Philippus mit Frau u. 5 K; Samuel,

In der Stadt New York waren 1789 Henr. Hees und der ehemalige Husarenkorporal Post, welcher dort eine Handlung betrieb; in Canajoharie oder Nachbarschaft 1767 der oben ausführ. beschrechte Joh. Jacob Diehl; in einem Orte, welcher in den Akten fast ganz durchstrichen ist, 1789 Jost Henr. Franz; in Wallkill, 25 Stunden von New York, 1767 Johs Hees; in Grossen Flooth<sup>13</sup> zur selben Zeit Adam Bengel, Conrad Scholl, Henr. und Phil. Schmidt. Scholl schrieb am 20. Sept. an seinen Eidam und Hees am 2. Nov. an seinen Vater. Von beiden Briefen sind Teile in der oben S. 37 erwähnten Kinesischen Abschrift vorhanden.

Hees ist Lehrer. Er schätzt sich übergücklich, jährlich 152 Reichsthaler Schulohn nebst mindestens 40 Rthl. Nebenverdiensten zu haben, d. h. „an baarem Gelde 172 Rthl., dabei einen freyen Tisch“, was nur zu begreiflich ist, wenn man bedenkt, dass der Metzsteiner Schulmeister, allerdings laut Amtsrechnung von 1722, nur 9 Gulden „Dienerbesoldung“ erhielt. Er ist überhaupt ganz begeistert von Amerika. Selbst wenn jemand seine Überfahrt dort abverdiene müsse, tue er besser, in Amerika 3 oder 4 Jahre zu dienen als in Deutschland, vor immer in Armut und Not! „Für einen, der nur „Bauerwerke“ tun könnte, sei 100 Rthl. ein geringer Jahreslohn.“

Scholl ist Landmann. Der Eingang seines Briefes ist von Wichtigkeit für die Dillenburger Auswanderung nach der damaligen Provinz New York im allgemeinen, wenn auch seine Bemerkung, dass die 1710, also vor 57 Jahren, Eingewanderten noch meistens am Leben seien, natürlich der Einschränkung bedarf. Er beginnt:

„Wir sind nicht auf Hasenlober's Land gangen, sondern wir sind vor uns selber und wohnen bey den hintersten Einwohnern hinter denen Wilden, also nichts als Deutsche wohnen, welche anno 1710 sind hereingekommen und noch mehrtheils bei leben sind und viel Dillenburger sind. Wir ziehen aber noch den Herbst etwas näher nach dem Meer zu, also unser 20 Familien haben Land gekauft, alle miteinander Dillenburger, worunter meine nächste Nachbarn seind, die beyde Brüder Philip und Heinrich Schmidt von Langenaubuch und Joh. Adam Bengel, welche auch alle mit einander noch frisch und gesund sind. Wier vier haben so viel Land fast wie die ganze Ferdinandiner Gemeinde erb- und eigenthümlich“. Weiter unten sagt er dann Tochter und Schwiegerson: „Ihr müsset nicht dencken, dass wir euch in der Egyptischen Dienstbarkeit auch lassen, dann ihr müsset auch hierher, dann hier ist Land genug und frey und sehr gutes Land, dann unser Brod ist nichts als Waitzen, vom korn wissen wir nichts.“

Ausserhalb der Jahre 1709, 1750-53 und 1764-98 sind im 18. Jahrh. nur ganz wenige Auswanderer<sup>14</sup> in den Dillenburger Akten verzeichnet. In den ersten Jahren des folgenden Jahrhunderts schwächt aber ihre Zahl noch einmal bedeutend an.

Absesehen von mancherlei geringen Abgaben gab es 1709 die Mai- und Herbstbede oder -heft, ursprünglich eine Heeressteuer, die zu Schulz und Laurentii fällige Herrrenschatzung, die grosse ordinäre Schatzung, die Kriegsgelder und die Fourage Zulagsgelder für die am Mittelrhein auf Postierung gestandene Kavallerie, letztere drei im Amt Herborn im Betrage von rund 3335, 4112 und irrfähl. rund 194, korrigiert 139 Reichsthalern.

Das bei Veranlassung der grossen Schatzung beobachtete Verfahren war, dass zunächst der Schatzungsfuss des Jahres und damit der Betrag eines Herrenzehls festgesetzt wurde. The following translation of an article published originally in Germany was made by Don Yoder.

The number of Palatine church-registers with annotations on 18th century emigrants, is small. The following list is comprised of emigrants from villages in the southern part of the Palatinate: Bellheim, Freimersheim, Freishach, Gommersheim, Minfeld, Oberlustadt, Ottersheim, Weingarten, Westheim, and Zeiskam. Readers should note that a few of the emigrants in this list from Minfeld were mentioned in Friedrich Krebs and Milton Rubincam, *Emigrants from the Palatinate to the American Colonies in the 18th Century* (Norristown, Pennsylvania: The Pennsylvania German Soci-

ety, 1953); and several emigrants from Minfeld, Niederlustadt, Oberlustadt, Ottersheim, Weingarten, Westheim, and Zeiskam appear in Dr. Krebs' articles, "Pennsylvania Dutch Pioneers", in *The Pennsylvania Dutchman* for Spring 1956 and Summer 1956. In each case fuller information is given in the present article. Emigrants from Ottersheim are completely omitted in the translation because they have been covered completely in the *Dutchman*.]

The sources of the references to emigration are the Lutheran church-registers of Freimersheim, Freishach, Gommersheim, Minfeld, Weingarten; the Reformed church-registers of Zeiskam and Oberlustadt, the latter serving for both Oberlustadt and Niederlustadt; the *Ausfahrtelikten Gommersheim*; the Electoral Palatine Archives (Aktion Kurpfalz) for Westheim; and the Archives of the Johannite Order in the Palatine State Archives in Speyer; as well as materials in the *Heimatstelle Pfalz* in Kaiserslautern.

As far as possible, the birth or baptismal and marriage dates of the emigrants, and parents' and wives' names, were added to the basic emigration data, from the church-registers. In most cases, also, it was possible to locate the emigrants in the published ship-lists of arrivals at Philadelphia, the three-volume work, *Pennsylvania German Pioneers*, by Ralph Beaver Strassburger, edited by William J. Hinke (Norristown, Pennsylvania: The Pennsylvania German Society, 1934).

A word of thanks is due Pastor Dr. Kaul, who furnished the emigration data from the Lutheran church-register of Gommersheim.

The materials on the Bauersachs family, under Weingarten, are a good example of what can be done through the cooperation of Pennsylvania and Palatine genealogists....

35. ROCH, JOHANN PETER—born at Niederluststadt, August 24, 1724, son of Peter Roch, citizen and farrier at Niederluststadt, and wife Maria Anna Barbara Städler; married Margaretha Lutz. See The Dutchman, Spring 1956, p. 39.

36. FAUTH, JOHANN JACOB—born at Oberluststadt, September 7, 1738, son of Bernhard Fauth (Church Register: Fäth), and wife Katherine Haf, "went away to America about 18 years ago" (Document of March 18, 1753); married Louise Theiss, born at Oberluststadt, December 24, 1741, daughter of Johann Adam Theiss of Oberlustadt and wife Magdalena Schmitt, "who married Jacob Fauth from here and likewise went to Pennsylvania" ["welche an Jacob Fauth von daher verheirathet und ebenfalls in Pennsylvania gezogen"] (Document of December 3, 1765). Cf. also his brother-in-law, Georg Jakob Heintz.  
[Jacob Fauth arrived at Philadelphia, August 24, 1765, on the Ship *Polly*.]

37. HAUSHALTER, GEORG SIMON—arrived in Philadelphia on the Ship *Polly*, August 24, 1765, with the brothers Christian and Johann Jakob Wunder as well as Johann Jacob Fauth. Since he wrote his name immediately after Fauth in the ship's list and the name Haushalter appears in Ober- and Niederluststadt in the period involved, we may assume that the emigrant is connected with the Haushalter family listed in the Church Register of Oberlustadt. The only point of uncertainty is whether the father Jörg Simon Haushalter emigrated alone.

Jörg Simon Haushalter, resident in Ober- or Niederluststadt, married Anna Maria [—], and had the following children, born at Ober- or Niederlustadt:

1. Jörg Simon Haushalter, born March 20, 1741.
2. Christian Haushalter, born December 3, 1743.
3. Eva Maria Haushalter, born September 5, 1746; died September 29, 1746.
4. Maria Eva Haushalter, born October 27, 1749.
5. Anna Margaretha Haushalter, born March 1, 1753.
6. Johann Jörg Haushalter, born September 28, 1757.  
[Georg Simon Haushalter arrived at Philadelphia, August 24, 1765, on the Ship *Polly*.]

38. HEINTZ, GEORG JAKOB—from Rhdt unter Bltburg, married Maria Catharina Theiss, born at Oberlustadt, February 20, 1736, daughter of Johann Adam Theiss of Oberlustadt and Magdalena Schmitt, "who married Georg Jakob Heintz from Roth and went with

him to Pennsylvania..." (Document of December 3, 1765). Cf. above, his brother-in-law, Johann Jakob Fauth.

39. HOFFMANN, DANIEL—born at Oberlustadt, February 17, 1727, son of Johann Jacob Hoffmann and wife Susanna Christina Brückner; "who went to the New Land" (Document of August 30, 1758).

40. HORTER, GEORG ADAM—born at Oberlustadt, May 27, 1738, son of Jacob Horter and wife (Maria) Agnes Schland, "already gone to Pennsylvania 12 years ago" (Document of April 20, 1768). The emigration must therefore have taken place around 1756.

41. HORTER, ANNA BARBARA—married before 1753 to Georg Horter, citizen and town councilor at Oberlustadt; died before 1764. "Whereas Barbara Horter, widow and relict of Georg Horter, deceased citizen and at Oberlustadt, went from here about one year ago to the so-called New England with her son Veitlen Horter, also a son of hers named Georg Jacob Horter had gone there several years previously, so then both brothers and sisters and in-laws of hers still residing here, namely Jacob Wunder and his wife Anna Maria, and Jacob Sager, sent a manuscript letter asking her therein, since one of them had the desire to go to the above-mentioned New Land, if he could sell or convert into money the inheritance still coming to her here and bring it to her. Now since Jacob Wunder and his wife Anna Maria have likewise resolved to go to their respective mother and brothers and sisters and therefore have petitioned for permission, to convert into cash the properties of their in-laws still coming to them and take them to them," hence a complete inventory of the properties of Georg Jacob and Veitlen Horter was drawn up and the results of the sale given to the brother-in-law, Jacob Wunder, who emigrated in 1765 (Document of April 19, 1765).

Children, born in Oberlustadt:

1. Anna Maria Horter, born July 21, 1729, married Johann Jacob Wunder (q.v.).
2. Georg Jacob Horter, born July 9, 1735.
3. Johann Valentin Horter, born September 16, 1740.

[Johann Valentin Horter arrived at Philadelphia, September 26, 1764, on the Ship *Britannia*.]

42. JAHRÄUS, GEORG ADAM—born at Oberlustadt, December 27, 1746, son of Andreas Jahräus and wife (Anna) Margaretha Schmid; "who resides in America" (Document of October 30, 1766).

43. SCHMITT, ANNA ELISABETHA—daughter of Andreas Schmitt of Oberlustadt and wife Catharina Jahräus, "wife of Friedrich Dall, inhabitant of Pennsylvania" (Document of March 30, 1770).

44. SIGRIST, ANNA APOLLONIA—born at Oberlustadt, February 1, 1723, daughter of Martin Sigrist (Siegerist) and wife Catharina Schmid; "already gone to Pennsylvania 21 years ago..." (Document of October 3, 1765). She must therefore have emigrated around 1744.

45. TEIS, GEORG ADAM—arrived at Philadelphia with Georg Simon Haushalter (q.v.) on the Ship *Polly*, August 24, 1765, and his name is given in the ship's list immediately after Haushalter's. Perhaps he is identical with Jörg Adam Theiss, born at Ober- or

Schmitt, who married Georg Jakob Heintz from Roth and went with

Simon Haushalter (q.v.) on the ship *Polly*, August 24, 1760, and his name is given in the ship's list immediately after Haushalter's. Perhaps he is identical with Jörg Adam Theiss, born at Ober-

Niederlustadt, February 9, 1739, son of *Andreas Theiss* and wife Magdalena.

46. WUNDER, JOHANN JAKOB—born at Oberlustadt, January 13, 1727, son of Sebastian Wunder and wife Anna Maria; married Anna Maria Hörter, born at Oberlustadt, July 21, 1729, daughter of Georg Hörter and wife Anna Barbara. Cf. Anna Barbara Hörter, above. Children, born at Oberlustadt:

1. Jörg Adam Wunder, born January 7, 1753,
2. Anna Maria Wunder, born August 22, 1755,
3. Valentin Wunder, born April 1, 1758,
4. Maria Barbara Wunder, born October 21, 1760,
5. Christoph Wunder, born January 5, 1764.

[Jacob Wunder arrived at Philadelphia, August 24, 1765, on the Ship *Polly*.]

47. WUNDER, CHRISTIAN—born at Oberlustadt, July 13, 1729, brother of the preceding, married Catharina [—]. Children, born at Nieder- or Oberlustadt:

1. Maria Eva Wunder, born April 16, 1757,
2. Andreas Wunder, born October 18, 1751; died February 4, 1763 [should read 1761?].
3. Andreas Wunder, born December 27, 1765.

[Christian Wunder arrived at Philadelphia, August 24, 1765, on the Ship *Polly*.]

48. BAUERSACHS, PAUL—born at Weingarten, September 29, 1744, son of Johann David Bauersachs and wife Anna Maria Damian of Bobingen, settled as citizen at Freisbach and from there went to America (document of August 5, 1784).

[Paulus Bauersachs arrived at Philadelphia, December 4, 1771, on the Ship *Betssey*.]

The name Bauersachs (also spelled Bauersax in the Church Register March 8, 1806, in Center Township, now Snyder County, Pennsylvania, and is buried at the Hassinger Church Cemetery near Middleburg) according to family tradition in Pennsylvania, he had come to America in 1771. For the children of Paul Bauersachs, born in Pennsylvania, see Dr. Charles A. Fisher, "The Pennsylvania Births; see also Aaron Kern Gift, "The Hassinger Church," *The Pennsylvania German* (September 1908). Further information on the family can be had via the Reverend George E. Bowersox of McSherrystown, Pennsylvania.

49. BAUERSACHS, HANS NICKEL ("NIGEL")—arrived at Philadelphia, August 15, 1750, on the Ship *Royal Union*. It is probable that this emigrant belongs to the same family as the above Paul Bauersachs. However, there is in the Church Register of Weingarten no reference to the emigration of Hans Nickel Bauersachs, nor is his baptism

recorded. Information from Pastor George E. Bowersox, McSherrystown Pennsylvania, has cleared up the mystery:

Hans Nickel Bauersachs, son of the butcher Johann Bauersachs and wife Elisabeth "Itzgrund" (cf. below), was, according to an entry by Pastor H. M. Mühlberg in the Old Goshenhoppen Church Register in Pennsylvania, born November 14, 1702, in "Meneisdorf" and baptised there November 15, 1702. His trade was given as "tailor". According to the same entry he went in the year 1727 to "Weiserstadt, 3 hours from Speyer", i.e., Niederlustadt, married there Maria Elisabeth Gothe, daughter of Veltin Gothe and wife Eva Elisabeth, and emigrated in 1750 with wife and children to Pennsylvania.

Children, born at Oberstadt [sic] before the emigration:

1. Maria Elisabeth Bauersachs, born April 9, 1735; died before 1750.
2. Maria Barbara Bauersachs, born August 5, 1738; died June 9, 1740.
3. Johanna Valentin Bauersachs, born July 7, 1741; confirmed at Old Goshenhoppen; married December 27, 1764, to Barbara [—].
4. Jörg Adam Bauersachs, born February 26, 1744; confirmed at Old Goshenhoppen; married Magdalena Raudenzan (Routzan).

Both sons served in the Revolutionary War, and after their release from service settled in Frederick County, Maryland. References to both families appear in the records of St. David's Lutheran Church near Hanover, Pennsylvania, on the Maryland border. The family of Georg Adam Bowersox is later named in the records of St. Mary's Lutheran Church, Silver Run, Maryland, where members of his family are buried. His own gravestone and that of his wife and son Christian are at Uniontown, Maryland. Georg Adam Bowersox took the oath of citizenship to Maryland on June 19, 1779.

An inquiry to Memmelsdorf, Oberfranken, revealed that the name Bauersachs never appeared in the records there. In Memmelsdorf near Lichtenfels the relationship was proved through the researches of Pastor Löhrlein, from the Lutheran Church Register there: Johann (Hans) Bauersachs, widower, married at Memmelsdorf, November 22, 1698, to Anna Elisabeth Köhler of Memmelsdorf. Their children, born at Memmelsdorf, included 1. Johannes Bauersachs, baptised August 3, 1709, and 2. Johann Nikolaus Bauersachs, baptised November 5, 1709.

Striking is the difference between the birth and baptismal dates in the Memmelsdorf and Goshenhoppen entries. But we must realize that the entry in Goshenhoppen was not made by Pastor Mühlberg until after 1750. In Memmelsdorf for the period concerned there is no other entry to be found.

"Itzgrund": This word appears in the Goshenhoppen Church register in connection with the reference to the parents of Johann Nickel Bauersachs, after the first name of the mother. Undoubtedly it is a place name, since the *itz*, coming from Coburg, flows through

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the Memmelsdorf area and into the Main. Through the entry in the Old Goshenhoppen Church Register in Pennsylvania we have learned where the Bayersachs family of the Palatinate originated, and that Johann *Nikolaus Bayersachs* emigrated in 1750 from Niederlustadt to Pennsylvania.

*Johannes Bayersachs*, baptized at Memmelsdorf August 5, 1699, just likewise had settled in the Palatinate, for in the Lutheran Church Register of Weingarten, on June 9, 1716, is recorded his marriage to Anna Maria Hubin, native of Offenbach, single, and on November 27, 1718, the birth of the son *Hans David Bayersachs*, who married (1st) at Weingarten, February 9, 1740, Anna Maria Damian from Böhmen and after her death married (2nd) at Weingarten, January 25, 1757, to Anna Maria Lüder (Lüber) from Oberlustadt. *Johannes Bayersachs* was therefore the grandfather of the emigrant *Paul(us) Bayersachs* and a brother of the emigrant *Johann Nikolaus Bayersachs*.

50. BRINNEMER, JOHANN PETER—born at Weingarten, April 28, 1716, son of *Johannes Brinnemer* and wife *Anna Magaretha*, had "already gone away to Pennsylvania 18 years ago, without receiving permission..." (Document of March 7, 1767). According to a Power of Attorney drawn up in Augusta County, Virginia, August 15, 1766, Johann Peter Brinnemer was residing there at the time.

51. KLINGER, THEOBALD—born about 1714, married at Weingarten, citizen and town-councilor Maria Catharina (Göbler), daughter of the 1717) at Freimersheim and his wife Anna Rosina Geiss (Göbler) (died about a transfer of property of the widow Anna Rosina Geiss; according to 19, 1746, "went to the New Land seven years ago." [Debt of Klinger, age 24, arrived at Philadelphia September 20, on the Ship *Friendship*.]

52. BATTIGER, JOHANN VALENTIN—born at Westheim, August 27, 1739, son of Johann Peter Battiger and wife Anna Eva (in the acts of May 1777). [Johann Valentin Battiger arrived at Philadelphia, October 29, 1767, on the Ship *Minerva*.]

53. SCHMID, GEORG ADAM—born at Westheim, April 26, 1745, son of Andreas Schmid and wife Rosina Barbara; "resident in Pennsylvania" (Document of March 27, 1765).

54. GEISS, PHILIPP JACOB—born at Freishbach, April 12, 1712, son of Heinrich Geiss, citizen and town-councilor of Freishbach, and wife Anna Catharina; married at Zeiskam and settled there as farrier and citizen. According to an official document of November 9, 1763, they had already gone 12 years ago to America, in the Province of Pennsylvania.... For additional information, see

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Pennsylvania Dutchman, Summer 1956, page 58.

55. SCHMITT, LORENZ—citizen, surgeon and barber at Billigheim, baptized at Billigheim, January 31, 1722, son of Matthes Schmitt, citizen and town-councilor at Billigheim, and wife Anna Maria Heckmann; married at Zeiskam, May, 1748, to *Maria Helena (Magdalena) Gutz*, daughter of Johannes Gutz of Zeiskam. After his marriage he moved his residence to Zeiskam. According to the Germersheim records, Lorenz Schmitt's wife, because she wanted to go to the New Land with her husband and her two small sons, had her inheritance left back in 1751. In an official document of February 4, 1757, it is said of *Helena Schmitt nee Gutz*, that she "went away to America about 6 years ago". The wife of Lorenz Schmitt appears as *Maria Magdalena* and as *Maria Helena*. In the Baptismal Register of Zeiskam is found only the baptism of a *Maria Magdalena*. At the marriage entry "*Magdalena*" is stricken out and "*Helena*" written above. At the entry of the birth of the first child the mother appears as "*Maria Magdalena*," at the second child's birth as "*Maria Helena*." For the children see Pennsylvania Dutchman, Summer 1956, page 59.

56. SINN (SIEEN), SAMUEL—master-baker at Zeiskam, baptized at Zeiskam, August 28, 1710, son of *Johann Peter Sinn*, master-baker at Zeiskam, and wife *Anna Aschtha*. For additional details, see Pennsylvania Dutchman, Summer 1956, page 59.

57. ZWICKER, JOHANN PETER—citizen and town-councilor at Zeiskam, baptized at Zeiskam, December 21, 1710, son of *Samuel Zwicker* and wife *Susanna Barbara*. For additional details, see Pennsylvania Dutchman, Summer 1956, page 59.

It should be noted that the above is not copied absolutely faithfully in every way according to the high standards of scholarship one should expect, simply because the original contained several typographical errors which needed to be corrected. These included omissions of opening or closing quotation marks, misplaced commas, and, on the pages dealing with Oberlustadt, giving the name of Johann Jakob Wunder as such, instead of last name first, as the names were given in every other case. Nonetheless, some errors, such as the phrase, "to American," were retained, with the thought that this might have been translated from the original.

Early Emigration from the County of Heidelberg, in the Electoral Palatinate, to America 1726-27.  
Records deposited in the State Archives at Karlsruhe contain the following items:

1726-27  
Jacob Kisslinger—A poor resident of Sandhofen, to migrate to "the Island of Pennsylvania."  
Brecht, widow of Johann Brecht, and her two sons Stephan and Michel Weil, a resident of Dossenheim.  
Daniel le Vent, a resident of Hockenheim.  
Michel Diel, a citizen of Mannheim-Seckenheim.  
florins, 55 kreuzers.  
Michel Boettie (Bettle), citizen of Mannheim-Seckenheim, upon payment of 36 florins, 48 kreuzers, to the new country.  
Boettie arrived in Philadelphia on the *William* and Sarah and took the oath of allegiance 21 Sept. 1727.  
Johann Jacob Cate, resident of Walldorf, to "the island of Pennsylvania;" arrived on the *William* and Sarah, took the oath of allegiance 21 Sept. 1727.  
Christian Miller, resident of Walldorf, "to the island of Pennsylvania,"—identical with either Christian Miller, arriving on the ship *Molly*, oath of allegiance 30 Sept. 1727, or Christian Miller, arriving on the ship *James Goodwill*, oath of allegiance 27 Sept. 1727.  
Johann Alexander Diebendorfer, resident of Schriesheim; arrived on the *William* and Sarah, oath of allegiance 21 Sept. 1727.  
Anna Marie Will, resident of Schriesheim.  
Jacob Mueller, resident of Mannheim-Neckarau.  
Andreas Zimmermann, resident of Meckesheim.  
Johann Andreas Hill, resident of Mannheim-Sandhofen.  
Christoph Walther, resident of Dossenheim, undoubtedly identical with the Christopher Walther who arrive on the ship *William* and Sarah 18 Sept. 1727.

Emigration from the County of Heidelberg 1741-1749.  
The records of the county of Heidelberg on file in the General State Archives at Karlsruhe contain the following items:

1741  
Valentin Zweisig (Weissig), resident of Mauer, upon paying a fee of 5 florins, 30 kreuzers, was permitted to emigrate with his wife and four children "to the new land." "Valdin (Valentin Zweisig)" arrived in Philadelphia on the ship *Molly* 16 Oct. 1741.  
Michael Müller, resident of Mauer, upon paying an emigration fee of 5 florins, was permitted to emigrate with his wife and five children. Michael Müller arrived on the ship *Molly*, 16 Oct. 1741.

Joseph Fabian, resident of Mauer...arrived...on the ship *Molly*.... Jacob Hessel, resident of Schatthausen, made application for a permit, and presumably got it, but there seems to be no record of him arriving in Philadelphia.

Jacob Mueller—a cooper from Wiesloch, with the assistance of the town authorities, received permission to emigrate.

1742  
Christoph Geister (Geiser?) of Eschelbronn was released from the status of a serf so that he might emigrate. "Christof Geiser" arrived in Philadelphia 21 Sept. 1742.  
Indigent brothers Michael and Dieter Danner of Walldorf were permitted to emigrate. They landed as Michael and Dietrich Danner on the ship *Robert and Alice*; took oath of allegiance 24 Sept. 1742.

1743  
Caspar Hauck, resident of Helmstadt, received a permit to migrate "to the island of Pennsylvania."  
Dieter Mueller, a baker, and Jacob Hoffmann, a shoemaker, both of Zuzenhausen, were permitted to leave without paying the usual fee because of their being poor. Jacob Hoffman arrived on the ship *Rosannah*, oath of allegiance 26 Sept. 1743.

Abraham Schwann, from Schriesheim.  
Hieronimus Trautmann, Johannes Trautmann, Bernhard Tuebinger (Tuebinger) [and] Georg Hoffstaetter all from Schriesheim, after paying the ten per cent tax on the possessions they were taking out with them, received permits to emigrate. "Hieronimus Trautmann and Bernhard Tuebinger" arrived in Philadelphia on the ship *St. Andre* 7 Oct. 1743.

1744  
In the year 1744 permission to emigrate was given to Johann Esaias Stein from Zuzenhausen with wife, one stepson and three stepdaughters.  
Johann Adam Krehebuel from Bammental with his wife and three children.  
Georg Weicker from Speichbach with his wife and two children, and Conrad Lang, from Speichbach, with his wife and four children.

Conrad Lang, from Spechbach, with his wife and four children.

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A group of persons from Zuzenhausen, namely Anna Maria (Regina) Heymann, single; Georg Kirsch and his wife and two small children; Anna Dorothea, widow of Georg Licht(n)er and her 16 yr old son; two single men Johann Jacob Kirsch and Conrad Kirsch. During the next few years the number of permits practically reached the zero point. [The War of the Austrian Succession of 1740-48 ended with the Treaty of Aix la Chapelle.—Ed.] In 1747 there was one permit granted, namely to a young man who had been exempted from military service, Christian Rupp, from Daudenzell. He was obliged to pay his ten Pfennig tax amounting to 11 florins and an additional fee of two florins 40 kreuzers for an emergency locker. Christian Rupp arrived in Philadelphia on the ship *Restaurator*, oath of allegiance 9 Oct. 1747.

Veit Meister, born at Bargen, son of Georg Bernhard Meister, married at Ort Hoffenheim, near Sinsheim, in 1744, and at that time paid 3 florins to receive a certificate of manumission. In 1787 the government of Dilsberg published a statement that he and his wife and children had emigrated to America in 1751 arriving in Philadelphia on the *Shirley* 5 Sept. 1751.

Beginning 1749 the number of permits for migration to America from the county of Heidelberg increased rapidly.

Emigration from County of Heidelberg 1737, 1738, 1751, and 1754. The authorities of the County of Heidelberg, Electoral Palatinate, granted permission to a number of persons to emigrate to America, upon payment of manumission fees. Such a fee freed the nobleman.

Notable is the fact that of a considerable number of persons who received permission in 1751 relatively few can be identified in the lists of ships' passengers arriving in Philadelphia. There are two probable explanations: 1. not all ships from Holland or England came to Philadelphia; 2. some passengers died on board ship during the voyage.

Following are some emigrants:

1737  
Christian Ewig, resident of Wilhelmsfeld, upon payment of a manumission tax of 50 florins, received permission to migrate with his wife and three children to "the island of Pennsylvania." Arrived on the *Townsend*, took oath of allegiance Oct. 1737.

Casper Wedel, resident of Wieblingen (modern Heidelberg-Wieblingen), upon payment of a manumission tax of 9 florins 54 kreuzers, received permission to emigrate to "the new land."

Johann Georg Arnold of Zuzenhausen, district of Sinsheim, pay-

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ment of 10 florins as a manumission fee, was granted permission to emigrate with his wife and children, arrived Philadelphia on the *Elisabeth* 30 Oct. 1738.

Johann Leonhard Notz, resident of Zuzenhausen, upon payment of 28 florins as a manumission fee, permitted to emigrate. "Lenhart Notz" arrived on the ship *Two Sisters*, took oath of allegiance Sept. 1738.

Johannes Roehrer, a resident of Mauer, district of Heidelberg, upon payment of 10 florins as a manumission fee, permitted to emigrate to America with his wife and children. ... (Johann Gottfried Rehner) arrived on the ship *Robert and Alice* 11 Sept. 1738.

For the year 1751 there is an unusually large number of emigration permits:

Peter Benninger, a resident of Epfenbach, district of Sinsheim, with wife and four children, apparently without payment of the usual manumission fee.

Heinrich Beck, a resident of Epfenbach, district of Sinsheim, with wife Anna Margaretha and son Johann Joerg. The latter was required to pay 11 florins for manumission and 10 florins for unpaid taxes.

Adam Buckle (Bickle), a schoolmaster of the Reformed Church at Spechbach, district of Heidelberg, permitted to emigrate with his wife and children gratis, because he was poor.

Beckenbach, ——, widow, a resident of Litterbach, applied for a permit on behalf of herself and her children. After long negotiations, she paid 130 florins as a manumission fee and 17 florins and an additional 30 florins to satisfy the ten Pfennig tax on the value of what she took with her. "Casper Beckenbach, Georg Adam Beckenbach, George Leonhardt Beckenbach," all arrived on the ship *Janet* 7 Oct. 1751.

Elizabeth Hild, daughter of a citizen of Handschuhsheim (modern Heidelberg-Handschrusheim) after paying a fee of five florins received a permit.

Johannes Schilling, a serf, residing at Richardshausen, district of Sinsheim, paid five florins as a manumission fee and thirteen florins for the ten Pfennig tax; arrived on the ship *Phoenix* Sept. 1751.

Andreas Wetzstein, resident of Gauangeloch, district of Heidelberg, paid ten florins as manumission fee and nine florins to satisfy the ten Pfennig tax. Permitted to emigrate with wife and two children.

Samuel Schweigert (Schweikert), resident of Bargen, district of Sinsheim, after paying ten florins, received a permit.

Leonhardt Scheid, resident of Schriesheim, district of Mannheim, received a permit. At the same time Adam Heinrich Hoffmann, a former resident who had departed without paying his manumission fee, was declared free. (A relative may have paid it for him.)

1738 Johann Georg Arnold of Zuzenhausen, district of Sinsheim, was permitted to emigrate to "the new land." He paid 54 kreuzers.

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Johann Michael Roesch, a day-laborer of Possenheim, district of Heidelberg, permitted to emigrate with his wife and children without making any payment. Peter Lever, from Heiligenkreuzsteinach, Nicolas Zimmermann, from Altneudorf.

Balthasar Koenig, Joerg Happes, Johannes Wagner, Joerg Luecker-four citizens of Schoenau, district of Heidelberg, permitted to depart without paying the usual fees, because of their scant means. "Georg Licker, Baltzar Koenig, Johannes Wagner and George Happes" arrived on the ship Queen of Denmark 4 Oct. 1751. In 1753 there are two cases on record:

Johannes Masselmann, an Anabaptist from Zuzenhausen, district of Sinsheim, secured a license to marry the daughter of Samuel Peter, an Anabaptist, of Meckesheim, and also a permit to emigrate to America. "Hans Masselmann" arrived in Philadelphia on the ship Patience 17 Sept. 1753. Georg Martin, resident of Neunkirchen, district of Mosbach, received a permit for himself, his wife, and three children. "Joerg Martin" arrived in Philadelphia on the ship Edinburgh 14 Sept. 1753.

In 1754 the following were permitted to emigrate to America: Joseph Bubigkoffer-an inhabitant, not a citizen, of Rohrhof, near Bruehl, district of Muenheim, received a permit gratis because of his poverty. "Josef Bubigkoffer" arrived in Philadelphia on the ship Brothers 30 Sept. 1754. Niclaus Federolff, of Possenheim, district of Heidelberg, received a permit to emigrate to South Carolina with his wife and three children.

Johannes Krauss, day-laborer of Bruchhauserhof (modern Bruchhausen), Sandhausen, district of Heidelberg, was permitted to depart with wife and children without paying the usual fees.

Philippe Leyser, widower from Aiglserhausen, district of Mosbach, and his six children were permitted to emigrate without paying the usual fees, because of his having no means.

David Mueller, resident of Altneudorf, district of Heidelberg, was permitted to emigrate gratis.

Jacob Schifferdecker, resident of Nuenkirchen, district of Mosbach, paid the usual fees, and received a permit; arrived in Philadelphia on the ship Monetta 22 Oct. 1754.

Catharina Zimmermann of Moosbrunn, district of Heidelberg, secured

A hasty examination of the records of the government of Wurttemberg for 1749-50, now on file at State Archives in Ludwigsburg, revealed a number of entries concerning persons who had expressed the desire to emigrate to America i.e., Pennsylvania. A few of them could be identified in the lists of Strassburger-Hinke: Andreas Hertler, from Obriedgisein, county of Balingen; arrived in Philadelphia on the ship Dagoc 29 Sept. 1750.

Gottlieb Mittelberger, from Einzwingen, county of Vaizingen. He

petitioned that his divorce be hastened, so that he may be able

to take a certificate of divorce with him to Pennsylvania." He

made a round trip and published a book about it, *Gottlieb Mittelberger's Voyage to Pennsylvania in the Year 1750 and his return voyage to Germany in the year 1754.*" (Frankfurt/Main, and Leipzig 1756, 110 pp.).

Hans Jerg Feilber, from Baach, county of Schondorf, petitioned that

he be permitted to emigrate with his wife to Pennsylvania. Ar-

Arrived on ship Patience 11 Aug. 1750.

Hans Martin Herre, from Zillhausen, county of Balingen, son of the

local magistrate and tax collector Simon Herre. According to a

record dated 6 May 1765 Hans Herre had married in 1743 Anna Maria

Sassler. In 1749 they and three children "had emigrated to the

American island of Pennsylvania." "Hans Martin Herr" arrived in

October 1749 on the ship Fane; oath of allegiance 17 Oct. 1749.

In 1765 Hans Herre re-visited his old home, to get his share in

the settlement of an estate. For 100 florins he quit-claimed his

share to the other heirs. When he was about to return to Penn-

sylvania, the Wurttemberg government demanded an emigration fee

of 43 florins, 65 Kreuzer, and 4½ Heller. He did not pay it.

In the year 1770 he petitioned the government to cancel the

charge, but it refused. Finally his relatives had to pay the

charges.

Peter Leyer, from Heiligenkreuzsteinach; Jacob Heichert, from Heddeshach, district of Heidelberg; Nicolas Zimmermann, from Altenaudorf.

These three and their wives desired to emigrate. It is of interest that one of the three couples did not get the desired permit, because his wife was a Roman Catholic, and "in the land to which they plan to emigrate the exercise of the Catholic religion has not been introduced."

Balthasar Koenig, Joerg Happes, Johannes Wagner, Joerg Luecker—four citizens of Schönenau, district of Heidelberg, permitted to depart without paying the usual fees because of their scant means. "Georg Licker, Balthasar Koenig, Johannes Wagner and George Happes" arrived on the ship *Queen of Denmark* 4 Oct. 1751.

In 1753 there are two cases on record: Johannes Müsselmann, an Anabaptist from Euzenhausen, district of Simshain, secured a license to marry the daughter of Samuel Peter, an Anabaptist, of Meckelsheim, and also a permit to emigrate to America. "Hans Müsselmann" arrived in Philadelphia on the ship *Patience* 17 Sept. 1753.

George Martin, resident of Neunkirchen, district of Mosbach, received a permit for himself, his wife, and three children. "Joerg Martin" arrived in Philadelphia on the ship *Edinburgh* 14 Sept. 1753.

In 1754 the following were permitted to emigrate to America: Joseph Rubikoffer—an inhabitant, not a citizen, of Rohrhof, near Bruch, district of Mannheim, received a permit gratis because of his poverty. "Joseph Rubikoffer" arrived in Philadelphia on the ship *Brothers* 30 Sept. 1754.

Niclaus Federolf, of Dossenheim, district of Heidelberg, received a permit to emigrate to South Carolina with his wife and three children.

Johannes Krauss, day-laborer of Bruchhauserhof (modern Bruchhausen), Sandhausen, district of Heidelberg, was permitted to depart without paying the usual fees. Philippe Leyer, widower from Aghausen, district of Mosbach, and his six children were permitted to emigrate without paying the usual fees, because of his having no means.

David Mueller, resident of Altenaudorf, district of Heidelberg, was permitted to emigrate gratis.

Jacob Schiffendorfer, resident of Nuenkirchen, district of Mosbach, paid the usual fees and received a permit; arrived in Philadelphia on the ship *Marietta* 22 Oct. 1754.

Catharina Zimmermann of Moosbrunn, district of Heidelberg, secured

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both a license to be married and one to emigrate. Johann Stephan Martin, son of a citizen in Neckarkirchenbach, district of Mosbach, received munition after having emigrated. "Ians Steffan Marthin" arrived in Philadelphia on the ship *Shirley* 5 Sept. 1751.

A hasty examination of the records of the government of Württemberg for 1749-50, now on file at State Archives in Ludwigsburg, revealed a number of entries concerning persons who had expressed the desire to emigrate to America, i.e., Pennsylvania. A few of them could be identified in the lists of Strassburger-Hinke:

Andreas Hester, from Oberdigisheim, county of Balingen; arrived in Philadelphia on the ship *Osgood* 29 Sept. 1750.

Gottlieb Mittelberger, from Enzweihingen, county of Vaihingen. He "petitions that his divorce be hastened, so that he may be able to take a certificate of divorce with him to Pennsylvania." He made a round trip and published a book about it, *Gottlieb Mittelberger's Voyage to Pennsylvania in the Year 1750 and his return voyage to Germany in the year 1754.* (Frankfurt/Main, and Leipzig, 1756, 110 pp.).

Hans Jerg Feilner, from Baach, county of Schondorf, petitioned that he be permitted to emigrate with his wife to Pennsylvania. Arrived on the ship *Elisabeth* 5 Sept. 1751.

Johannes Iso(n)wein, from Baltmannsweiler, county of Schondorf. Arrived on the ship *Patience* 11 Aug. 1750.

Hans Martin Herre, from Zillhausen, county of Balingen, son of the local magistrate and tax collector Simon Herre. According to a record dated 6 May 1765 Hans Herre had married in 1743 Anna Maria Sässler. In 1749 they and three children "had emigrated to the American island of Pennsylvania." "Hans Martin Herre" arrived in October 1749 on the ship *Fane*; oath of allegiance 17 Oct. 1749. In 1765 Hans Herre re-visited his old home, to get his share in the settlement of an estate. For 100 florins he quit claimed his share to the other heirs. When he was about to return to Pennsylvania, the Württemberg government demanded an emigration fee of 43 florins, 65 Kreuzer, and 4½ Heller. He did not pay it. In the year 1770 he petitioned the government to cancel the charge, but it refused. Finally his relatives had to pay the charges.

Sebastian Kron, native of Esseheim, district of Mainz, "migrated as  
early as [1748] from there to America." Advertisement of County  
of Oppenheim, Palatinate, .. Jan. 1776, published in OFZ 30 Aug.  
and 14 Dec. 1776. "Hendk Crown" arrived on the ship Hampshire 7  
Sept. 1748.

Weit Meister, son of the deceased court employee at Bargen (district  
of Sinsheim, Baden) Georg Bernhard Meister "migrated as early as  
1751 with wife and children from the village of Hoffenheim  
belonging to the Baron of Gemmingen, district of Sinsheim, to  
America." Advertisement of the government of bisbier, Electoral

Bernhard Dietrich Herter, born at Schwalmig, under the rule of the

wife Maria Margaretha, nee Schlesiger, and six children named.

Christian about 30 years old, Maria Magdalena 24 years old, Margaretha 22 years old, Sara 20 years old, Johannes 18 years old, Eberhardt about 16 years old, from their home to Pennsylvania. Announcement of the Council and state officials, also the Burgo-master and the court at Bonnigheim in the "Eibergau" Württemberg, 27 Oct. 1777, published OPZ 16 March 1778. The Lutheran churchbook at the Evangelical parsonage Meishausen contains the following: Johanna Dietrich Reiner, son of Friedrich Reiner, citizen and cooper at Schwägmen, was married 9 Oct. 1719 to Maria Margaretha Schleicher, daughter of the citizen and cobbler Schleicher. Their children, listed in the Evangelical churchbook, were: Johann Christian, b. 10 April 1718; Maria Magdalena, b. 21 Sept. 1720; Maria Margaretha, b. 12 Feb. 1723; Maria Sara, b. 2 May 1724; Georg Philipp, b. 30 Jan. 1727, d. 5 May 1729; Anna Maria, b. 9 June 1728, d. 8 June 1729; Johannes b. 15 July 1730; Eberhardt Friedrich, b. 23 March 1733. "Johan Dietrich Reiner" arrived on ship *Fane* 17 Oct. 1749.

Emigrants from Oppenheim 1742-49.  
The records of the county of Oppenheim, in the former Electoral Palatinate, which are now filed in the City Archives at Oppenheim on Rhine, contain information about a few persons who emigrated during the first half of the 18th century. They furnish evidence concerning

The former county of Oppenheim included the present city of Oppenheim, the market place Nierstein, and the villages of Daxheim, Schwalbsburg, Oberingelheim, Niederingelheim, Daxweiler, Saarschwanheim, Gorswinternheim, Wackerheim, Freimarktheim, Bubenheim, Elsheim, Staadtzen, and Eschenheim. The many immigrants from Eisenheim are not included in the following list, because they have been published. In order to avoid repetition we will list only the date of the permit, the name, the residence, the fees paid, the ship, and the date of arrival in Philadelphia.

1742 Permits and manumission certificates to the following residents of Stadtdecken, namely, Lorentz Blaes, Peter Westerberger, Johann Kiel, Friedrich Mengel, and Johannes Daum, "to emigrate to Pennsylvania, where they have friends residing." On 3 Sept. 1742 on the ship *Loyal Judith* "Lorentz Place, Johannes Kuehl, Johannes

Permits granted 17 April 1742, to Friedrich Pfeil, Johann Lehn, residents of Gross-winternheim. They arrived 3 Sept. 1742 on the same ship.

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certain residents of Oberingelheim, namely, Philip Oderheimer, Peter Weitzel, Ulrich Strassburger, and the widow of Nicolaus Doerr, had "recently sent their sons, whose names had been entered on the latest conscription list for military service, to the new land, and with the knowledge of the entire town, had given each of them 100 florins and some food for the voyage." The chief magistrate of the village of Oberingelheim was held responsible by the higher authorities. Johannes Oderheimer, Johann Paul Weitzel, Sept. 1742 on the *Loyal Judith*. The last named returned to Germany October 1769.

25 February 1743 permit granted to Philip Hardt of Niederingelheim, upon payment of 10 Pfennig; permits to Nicolaus Runkel and Nicolaus Kellier of Wackerheim. They arrived 2 Sept. 1743 on the *Loyal Judith*.

3 February 1748 permits "to migrate to the island of Pennsylvania" after paying 15 florins and 10 florins for manumission certificates and the usual 10 Pfennig fees, to Friedrich Platz (Plotz) and Adam Immaeußer (Immenhauser) of Stadecken. They arrived on the ship *Hampshire* 7 Sept. 1748.

9 March 1748 permit to Franz Graff (Grove), with wife and two children, Bartel Kraemer with wife and five children, Adam Weiss with wife, all from Grosswinterheim, and also Wilhelm Leymeister with wife and children from Schwabenheim, all upon paying the 10 Grosswinterheim without such payment. They arrived 7 Sept. 1748 on the *Hampshire*. Their names are given as Frantz Grove, Johann Wilhelm Leymeister, Wolfgang Wolff, Hans Jacob Ostermann, and Johann Adam Weiss.

29 April 1748 permit to Johann Bischoff from Grosswinterheim, "who was so in debt that he had to sell all his property and did not know how he would be able to support himself." He arrived on the same ship, the *Hampshire* 7 Sept. 1748.

14 May 1748 permit to Johann Jacob Runkel and Friedrich Hammer from Wackerheim. The former paid 40 florins, the latter 10 florins. Both arrived with the preceding on the *Hampshire*.

Christian Ramb from Elsheim paid 43 florins for a permit. But his name has not been found on the ship's lists.

21 March 1749 permit to Philipp Haber with wife and three children from Stadecken paid 54 florins for manumission and 54 florins for the 10 Pfennig tax; arrived 27 Sept. 1749 on the *Isaac*.

16 April 1749 permit to Nicolaus Reisinger from Niederingelheim, upon paying the 10 Pfennig tax; arrived 26 Sept. 1749 on the *Dragon*.

29 April 1749 to three men from Oberingelheim, Adam Doerr, upon payment of the 10 Pfennig tax, Anton Oster and Wendel Runkel, gratis, "all three being indigent and having bad records." Doerr arrived 9 Sept. 1749 on the *St. Andrew*. Oster arrived 26 Sept.

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on the *Dragon*. Runkel remained in Oberingelheim, altho the authorities were anxious to get rid of him.

14 May 1749 permit to Friedrich Bohr from Wackerheim, after paying ten florins, arrived 9 Sept. 1749 on the *St. Andrew*.

Christian Meckel from Elsheim had some difficulties. His oldest son was not emigrating with him. The authorities insisted that his share of his father's estate be retained and safely invested for him. Christian with wife and three younger children arrived 27 Sept. 1749 on the *Isaac*.

29 April 1749 Philipp Merz, locksmith, from Nierstein, upon paying the 10 Pfennig tax, arrived 15 Sept. 1749 on the *Edinburgh*.

Ulrich Jordan (Jordte), an Anabaptist from Haxthausenhof near Ingelheim, also paid the 10 Pfennig tax. He arrived 9 Sept. 1749 on the *St. Andrew*.

The Roman Catholic widow Catharina Pfeiffer from Esseheim migrated "without permission of the authorities, secretly, to Pennsylvania". Therefore whatever possessions she had left behind were confiscated. Johann Rooss and Abraham Schweikart from Niederingelheim also emigrated "secretly," and their property was confiscated.

Immigrants to America from the region now a part of the Palatinate and that of Nahe and Hunsrück. The records are now filed in the Archives at Speyer.

John Georg and Christian, sons of Conrad Stribeck, citizen and woolspinner in Hornbach, district of Zweibrücken, by his first wife Elisabetha Schaeffer, and their mother's brother together with their grandmother Elisabetha Schaeffer migrated as early as 1735 into the new land, with the knowledge and approval of His Highness. Since the grandparents were still living and the children had not received any inheritance from their mother, they were reported to have taken with them the portion derived from their grandmother. Elisabeth Shever, Jerich Stribeck, Christian Stribeck, arrived on the ship *Pennsylvania Merchant* 18 Sept. 1735.

Samuel Mauss, son of the official Friedrich Mauss of Hornbach and his wife Susanna Mueller, former citizen of Zweibrücken, migrated to America "about 1754." He arrived 14 Sept. 1755 on the ship *Edinburgh*.

Philip Wild, son of the citizen and tanner Nickel Wild of Hornbach and his wife Anna Maria, "about four years ago migrated to the new land with the knowledge, recognized and to be recognized, of the government. Before his departure he sold his... inheritance to his brother Conrad Wild at Oberhausen." Deposition made 3 May 1760.

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Catharina Henge, daughter of the deceased citizen and tanner ("Kötgerber") Samuel Mueller at Hornbach and his wife Maria Margaretha Mauss, had been married to Georg Henge and had had a son, named Philipp (now sixteen). She was divorced from her husband "pro adulterii." Later she went to America, where she after having made the necessary legal depositions was married to a man named Fischer. (Emigrated before 31 Jan. 1777.)  
 Ludwig Leiner of Hornbach, "emigrated as a wool weaver." According to deposition of his brother Georg Leiner he died in 1784 in America.  
 Philipp Bley, son of the citizen and cooper Hans Werner Bley of Hornbach and his wife Elisabeth Huber, "twenty-two years ago went into Alsace and married at Trachenbrom, from where he removed to America." Deposition made in 1770; (hence Philipp migrated about 1748).  
 Daniel and Balthasar Zutter, sons of Benedikt Balthasar Zutter of Hornbach, woolspinner, "left secretly and migrated to America." (Deposition 7 June 1763.) Daniel and Balthasar Zutter arrived on ship "Graue" 1 Nov. 1763.  
 Theobald Raaff "eight years ago ran away from Eisenbach, district of Kusel, and emigrated to America. He left nine children behind, of whom three are in the ducal orphanage at Homburg." (Deposition 29 Jan. 1777.) Theobald Raaff arrived 26 Oct. 1768 in ship "Ceres." Note: Raaff could not have been born in Eisenbach, because the proof of his migration was filed in Hornbach, Breisgauhach district of Homburg, in the Saar, and his wife Elisabetha. He established himself as a tailor in Philadelphia. Which Paul Hochstraser and his sister Catharina signed 23 Jan. 1764 at Albany, Province of New York, they were living there. In the year 1761 a Jacob Hochstraser emigrated to America, presumably he was a brother of Paul, for local records show that Paul Heinrich Haller, son of the citizen and tailor Jacob Haller of Walhausen, district of Zweibrücken, and his first wife Elisabeth Moser, "deserted from the old Ducal Guard and emigrated to Pennsylvania." He migrated about 1748 without having secured permission. Therefore his property, i.e., an inheritance amounting to 100 florins was confiscated by the government of Zweibrücken. Presumably identical with Heinrich Haller, 18 Aug. 1750, on the ship St. Andrew.  
 Anna Appolina Vogelsang, daughter of the citizen Nickel Gentes at Breitfurt, (district of Homburg, Saar), was married to Georg Vogelsang, the younger, (apparently, also a resident of Breitfurt) living in America. (Deposition 6 May 1765.) Presumably "Georg Vogelsang" who arrived 21 Oct. 1761 in the "Snow Squirrel".  
 Georg Neu, inhabitant and citizen at Breitfurt (d. 18 July 1756)

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[141] and his wife Christina Margareta Gentess had the following children:  
 1. Joseph Neu, "who about 18 years ago migrated to America and is about 40 years old."  
 2. Peter Neu, "who also some five years ago removed to America and is about 30 years old." (Deposition, 8 Feb. 1758.)  
 Hermann Schmidt, citizen and court employe ("Gerichtsmann") at Breitfurt, had:

1. Mattheis, "living in America."
2. Georg, unmarried, 30 years old, in America. (Deposition, 7 Oct. 1760.)

Jacob Welker, son of Wilhelm Welker of Breitfurt, "who according to report has gone to America," emigrated before 4 Dec. 1777, either "Jacob Welker," who arrived 26 Oct. 1768 in the ship "Crawford" or [the same] who arrived 17 Sept. 1771 in the ship "Minerva."

Heinrich Kunz of Boeckweiler (district of Homburg, Saar), "Heinrich Kunz, son of the deceased citizen ("Gemeindeman") of the same name, at Boeckweiler, left this land anno 1764 and, according to report, in defiance of the highest existing ordinance migrated to America." Notice in the *Frankfurter Kaiserliche Rechts-Öber-Amtszeitung* of 17 Sept. 1787. According to local records Heinrich Kunz had learned the trade of wagon maker and had gone out in 1764 as a wandering journeyman. On 25 August 1768 he wrote a letter to Jonathan Heger from Canageschick, Maryland, which was the last anyone in his home town received from him. Johannes Keller, son of Daniel Keller of Boeckweiler, was reported to be "established in the new land and married." He emigrated before 10 Oct. 1776.

Children of Wilhelm Schunk of Walshain, district of Homburg, Saar, and his wife Catharina Schwartz, namely: Johannes, Catharina, Elisabeth, Maria, Simon, have been in America the past nine or ten years." Record 18 Oct. 1781.

The following names of emigrants to America from the region of Alz and Hunsrück were copied from the Lutheran churchbooks at Hoeffelsheim and Loetzenhausen and from the Reformed church books at Lindsbach.

Johann Georg Reitzel (Reutzel), a cobbler at Hoeffelsheim, district of Kreuznach, and wife (Anna) Sybilla had children:

1. Anna Maria, b. 2 Aug. 1720. "This parish child migrated to the new land."
2. Maria Wilhelmina, b. 2 Sept. 1734, "went with her father into the new land. 1741."
3. Johanna Peter, b. 28 Oct. 1737, "went with his parents 1741 into the new land."

"Johann Georg Reitzel" arrived 17 Oct. 1741, aged 45 years.

Johannes Wolffskehl, m. 19 Nov. 1730 at Hoeffelsheim to Anna Maria Viel; children born at Hoeffelsheim:

1. Elisabetha, b. 28 Dec. 1733.

2. Anna Margaretha, b. 18 Nov. 1735.  
 3. Maria Agnes, b. 27 Jan. 1738.  
 All three "went with their father into the new land 1742." "Johannes Wolffskehl," 3 Sept. 1742, ship *Zoyal Judith*.  
 1. Maria, 28 Feb. 1711 "to the new land 1742" (wife of J. Wolffskehl, cf. above).  
 2. Johan Jacob, b. 22 Nov. 1718 "Went 17 May 1767 into the new land."  
 Johann Michael Rech, b. 1 March 1751 at Hoeffelsheim, son of Johann Conrad Rech, and his wife Anna Margretha. "Children and parents went to the new land."  
 Catharina Elisabetha Schnee, b. 27 Aug. 1730 at Loetzenhausen, district of Lelli, Mosel region, daughter of Johannes Schnee and his wife Maria Margretha. "Emigrated to Pennsylvania 1751."  
 Maria Catharina Hoff, b. 26 May 1732 at Loetzenhausen, daughter of Johann Dieterich and his wife Susanna Elisabetha: "This person and her husband have gone to Pennsylvania."  
 Johann Wilhelm Lutz, b. 12 Sept. 1732 at Loetzenhausen, son of Pennsylvania 1751.  
 Matthes Luettz and his wife Elisabetha Catharina, "left for Pennsylvania 1751."  
 Anna Elisabetha Frantz, b. 25 March 1735 at Loetzenhausen, daughter of Johann Nicol Frantz and his wife Maria Elisabetha: "said to have migrated to Pennsylvania 1751."  
 Elisabetha Catharina Heyl, b. 4 Jan. 1735 at Hundsbach, district of Kreuznach, "The father of this child has gone to Pennsylvania."  
 The following names of emigrants were found in "Akt Zweibruecken III No. 3358, Act concerning dismissal...of subjects as well as the exporting of property acquired at marriage (Heirats gut), and the payment of the ten penny tax (1484-1792)," in the Archives at Speyer.  
 Johann Nickel Bever, b. at Kleinach, district of Bernkastel, son of Matthias Beyer, also Johann Georg Bartges, son of Matthias Hartspohnheim to migrate from Trarbach to Pennsylvania "in order to perfect themselves in the trade they have learned. But if they do not return within three years, they will have to purchase their manumission, and in the mean time their prospective inheritance here is being held as a forfeit."  
 Michael Bartges, a tanner by trade, was permitted to depart for Pennsylvania on similar conditions. "Michael Bartjes," ship *Two Brothers*, 15 Sept. 1748.  
 Johann Nickel Neu, son of Christoffel Neu, a weaver by trade, and Johann Peter Feilten (Fehiten), son of Conrad Feilten, a cobbler by trade, received permits to emigrate to America on similar conditions. "Peter Feite," ship *Two Brothers*, 15 Sept. 1748.  
 Johann Conrad Lahm, a tailor by trade, son of Peter Lahm[,] also John Michel Neu, linen-weaver, son of Philipp Neu, also Matthias Bayr, son of Matthias Bayer, Sr., all of Kleinach, were granted permission by the government of Trarbach 26 April 1741 to go to

Pennsylvania, on condition that they either return within two years or pay their manumission fees.  
 That all of them emigrated is proved by the records. However, Matthias Bayer and Johann Michel Neu are said to have died soon after their arrival in America.  
 "Johann Konrad Lahm," aged 22 years, arrived 20 Nov. 1741, in the ship *Europa*.  
 Johann Peter Hehn or Henn, son of Nicol Hehn of Horbach, district of Bernkastel, according to a report of 11 March 1746 to the government at Trarbach, "emigrated anno 1741 to the so called new land."  
 Maria Catharina Lahm and Nickel Lahm, children of Matthias Lahm of Oberkleinich (district of Bernkastel) according to a report of the magistrate of Kleinich to the government at Trarbach 8 May 1741, "desire to migrate to the new land."  
 "Johann Nicklaus Lahm" arrived 29 Sept. 1741, ship *Lydia*.  
 "It is to inform you that during the past year two young fellows under the pretext of completing their journeyman's stage (in learning their trade) emigrated to the so called new land. One, Johann Peter Lorentz, is a native of Hochscheid, the other, Johann Peter Lahm, is a native of Oberkleinich." Report of a local magistrate to the government of Spomhlem 12 May 1744. An entry in the records of the government at Trarbach confirms that both had emigrated in 1740.  
 "Peter Lorentz and Peter Lahm," 27 Sept. 1740 arrived in Philadelphia on ship *Lydia*.

Frank Reid Differdinger, "The German Immigration into Pennsylvania through the Port of Philadelphia, and 'The Redemptioners', The Pennsylvania-German Society Proceedings and Addresses, 19 (1900), 113-114 [Lancour No. 142].

Lancour refers, in entry No. 142, to two lists, the first being from pages 40-41, a list of the passengers on the William and Sarah, William Hill, Master, which is also reproduced in full and in Strassburger [Lancour nos. 145 and 146]. The second list, copied below, is also available in the reprint of the 324 page volume of Proceedings available from the Genealogical Publishing Company of Baltimore.

This list is from a newspaper advertisement published in Philadelphia eleven days after the Britannia arrived in Philadelphia, 18 September 1773, reflecting the possibility, as Differdinger put it, "that at that particular time the Redemptioner market was not as brisk as it might have been, and that special efforts were necessary to work off the human cargo."

Here is a partial list of the passengers on the already named ship Britannia, prepared in the office of Messrs. Joshua Fisher & Sons, showing the amount of the passage money due by each, as well as some additional expenses incurred by them on the voyage, most probably for provisions, which were never over-abundant and generally insufficient.

The original of the foregoing interesting document is among the manuscript collections of the Historical Society of Pennsylvania. Rupp, in his *Thirty Thousand Names*, gives the names of the pas-

gers on the *Britannia*, but not all of them. This list gives additional ones.

Charles R. Roberts. "Germanic Immigrants Named in Early Pennsylvania Ship Lists." *The Pennsylvania German Society Proceedings and Addresses*, 39 (1918), 5-20 [Lancour No. 143].

Between the years 1683 and 1727, how many persons of Germanic origin settled in Pennsylvania will probably never be known. Some writers have estimated the number as high as 50,000. The Crefeld colony under Pastorius came in 1683. In 1694 Johannes Kelpius came with his band of 40 pietists. Daniel Falkner and others arrived in 1704. In 1705 a number of German Reformed residing between Wittenberg and Halberstadt, fled to Newland and then to Holland, and in 1707 sailed for New York. Their ship was carried into Delaware Bay and they eventually settled along the Musconetcong and the Passaic in New Jersey, in what is now known as the German Valley. In 1708 the Kocetherthal colony came to New York, most of whom afterwards came to Pennsylvania. In 1709 a colony of Swiss, principally Mennonites, settled in Lancaster county.

In September, 1717, three ships arrived at Philadelphia with a total of 363 Palatines. In 1719 Jonathan Dickinson wrote, "We are daily expecting ships from London which bring over palatinates, in number about six or seven thousand." On August 30, 1720, the ship *Laurel* arrived with 249 odd Palatinates. Between the years 1708 and 1720, thousands arrived.

The Provincial Council, by a resolution adopted September 14, 1727, required shipmasters to make lists of all immigrants and that the immigrants sign an oath of allegiance to the King of England. Harrisburg. It was on March 6, 1903, that I saw these original lists for the first time. They were in the library proper, as the Department of Public Records had not yet been established. The first ship record of whose passengers was kept by the Colonial Government, was the *William and Sarah*, which actually arrived about September 12, 1727, and not September 18th, and on September 21st, not more than 51 of the 317 passengers, 109 of whom were men, signed the oath of allegiance. Rev. Dr. Hinke, in Volume 27, has shown us what errors there are in the published lists.

Immigrants Named in Ship Lists  
The leader of this band was Rev. George Michael Weiss, a Reformed clergyman, born in 1700 at Eppingen, in the Palatinate. Michael Diel, Rudolf Wellecker, George Kremer and Heinrich Weller located in Philadelphia. Those who settled in Goshenhoppen, now Montgomery county, where John Frederick Hillegs, born in Alsace, Nov. 24, 1685, died Jan. 6, 1765; John George Welcker, born Feb. 6, 1697,

died March 8, 1782; John Huth, who died suddenly in Philadelphia on Aug. 14, 1759. His funeral text was: "Mein Leben ist abgerissen wie ein Weber spuill." Michael Zimmerman and Benedict Strohm. David Schultz in his journal says that Strohm's wife died in April, 1757, and on June 14, 1757, he married again, at the age of 62, a girl of fifteen. John George Bowman, Sebastian Smith and Ulrich Stephen settled at Skippack and John George Schwab and Leonard Seltenreich in the Conestoga valley.

John or John Michael Diffenderfer, the ancestor of the founder, or one of the founders, of this society, Frank Reid Diffenderfer, was born Jan. 10, 1695, at Neresheim, near Heidelberg, in the Chur Pfalz, and died in 1778 in Lancaster county. Alexander Diffenderfer, an ancestor of the writer, died in 1768 in what is now Lehigh county. They were the sons of John Deubendorffer, born Oct. 8, 1663. The family came from Diereldorf, six miles northeast of Zurich, Switzerland, formerly Dieboldorf, anciently Tobelindorf. The family is mentioned as early as 1150 and in 1229 Cuno von Diereldorf, Knight, is mentioned in a document of the cloister at Linckenberg as a witness.

Joseph Albright settled in Macungie township, now Lehigh county, where he died in 1744. Some of his descendants removed to Northumberland county. Daniel Levan settled in Maxatawny township, Berks county, where he died in 1777.

On the ship *Adventure*, October 2, 1727, was Ulrich Rieser, born April 9, 1709, who died Sept. 9, 1784, in Lower Milford township, now Lehigh county, and John Dieter Bauman, who settled first in Marlboro township, Philadelphia county, where he operated a grist mill and about 1755 removed beyond the Blue Mountains, to Towameng township, now Carbon county, where he died in 1762.

The ship *Friendship*, October 16, 1727, had among its passengers Joseph Eberhard, a native of Switzerland, who settled in Lower Milford township, now Lehigh county, was one of the founders of the Great Swamp church and at his death in 1760 left each of his six sons a large farm. His brother, Michael Eberhard, settled just over the county line in Milford township, Bucks county, where he died in 1772.

On the ship *Mortonhouse*, August 24, 1728, was Clement Dunkelberger, who died in 1782 in Berks county. His son John removed to Mahanoy township, Northumberland county. Also, Heinrich Wilhelm Billinger from Wurtemberg, who settled in Bucks, now Lehigh county.

On the ship *James Goodwill*, Sept. 11, 1728, came Rev. John Caspar Stover, Sr., a native of Frankenberge, in Hesse, a Lutheran clergyman, who located in Virginia, went to Europe in 1737, and died on board the vessel on his attempted return to America, and Rev. John Caspar Stover, Jr., born at Luedorff, in Solinger Amt, Duchy Berg, the Palatinate, Dec. 21, 1707, and died at Lebanon May 13, 1779.

Theobald Mechling, born (probably at Lambshesheim in Chur Pfalz), who settled in Lower Milford, now Lehigh county, where a descendant, a member of this society, still owns the land he took up. He

died in April, 1765. Four of his sons removed to Northumberland county and many descendants reside in Western Pennsylvania and Ohio. His brother Jacob settled in Germantown.

Egidius Grim, from Wurtemberg, settled in Bucks county, in what is now Macungie township, Lehigh county, where he died in 1761.

Martin Moser settled in Montgomery county.

Philip Moser settled in Philadelphia county, was an elder of the Skippack church in 1734 and died July 8, 1769. The town of Sellersville takes its name from the family.

Frederick Scholl settled first in Philadelphia county and in 1754 in Bucks county, where Hellertown, Northampton county, now is located. He was an elder of the Lower Saucon church and died in 1754.

On the Mortonhouse, Aug. 19, 1729, was Frederick Ludwig Marsteller, from Darmstadt. He settled on the Skippack creek in New Providence township, in Philadelphia, now Montgomery county. He was one of the founders and deacons of the lutheran church at Trappe and his name appears in Latin over the door of this, the oldest lutheran church building in America, erected in 1743. He was a warm friend of Rev. Henry Melchior Muhlenberg, who preached an English sermon at his funeral. He died October 14, 1753. His youngest son, Col. Philip Marsteller, was one of Washington's pall-bearers.

Michael Weber and his wife Phillis were also passengers on this ship. He was born in the Palatinate in 1703 and settled in Bucks county, now Upper Saucon township, Lehigh county, where he died August 10, 1745, and was buried on his own land. His widow, Johanna Felicitas, subsequently married Anthony Wilhelm Boehm, eldest son of Rev. John Philip Boehm.

Wendel Wyandt, or Wiegand, born July 14, 1709, at Frensem in the Palatinate, settled in Upper Hanover township, Philadelphia county, and died there in 1787.

Michael Borst died near Lebanon in 1741. George Adam Weidel settled near Lebanon. Jacob Seller lived at Germantown.

On August 29, 1730, came the Thistle, with Peter Miller, born at Ober and Lauden, a graduate of Heidelberg University, and son of a Reformed minister, who, in 1735, went over to the Brethren at Ephrata.

Valentin Griesheimer, from Lampheim, with his wife and four children, came with a passport given at Worms on April 28, 1730. He settled in Berks county and died in Hereford township about 1759.

Peter Pfeiffer, born at Wachbach, March 20, 1699, settled in Berks county and died in Hereford township, Aug. 15, 1784. Descendants of his settled in Cameron township, Northumberland county.

Abraham Transue, born in Mutterstadt, in the Palatinate, also was on board and settled in Bucks county. Rudolph Drach also settled in Bucks county.

gers on the ship Britannia, which arrived Sept. 21, 1731. At the head of the list is the name Johannes Bartholomay Rieger, Hochteutscher Prediger. He was born at Oberingelheim, in the Palatinate, Jan. 23, 1707, and attended the universities of Heidelberg and Basel, became pastor at Philadelphia and Germantown and in New Jersey. He died at Lancaster in 1769.

Matthias Smeisser, born at Riegelbach in 1715, died in York county in 1778.

Leonard Steininger settled in Northampton county and died there in 1753.

Michael Stocker, John Eigender and John and Hubertus Bartsch settled in Bucks County.

The ship Snow Lowther arrived October 14, 1731, with Casper Peter, born in 1698 in Zell, Switzerland, whose three sons are the ancestors of the large Peters family of Lehigh county.

The ship Samuel came Aug. 11, 1732. On board were John Helfrich, born in 1699, who settled in Upper Milford township, Bucks county, now Lehigh, and died Feb. 27, 1764.

Christian and Benedict Gehman, Mennonites, settled in Bucks county, as did also John George Kleinhardt.

Jacob Goehnau and Oswald Hostetter settled in Lancaster county. Anastasius Uhler, born in the Palatinate about 1710, settled in Lancaster county and died at Lebanon. He was constable of Lebanon township in 1769.

The ship Pennsylvania arrived Sept. 11, 1732, with 171 passengers. Paul Ritter, born in 1713, settled in Colebrookdale, Berks county, where he died Feb. 14, 1799. Henry Ritter settled in Lower Milford township, now Lehigh county, just west of the Great Swamp Church. A section of the log over the fireplace, with the date 1739, from a house built by him, is in the possession of the Lehigh County Historical Society. He removed to Salisbury township, where he died in January, 1797. Casper Ritter settled in Bethlehem township, Northampton county, where he built a mill and died in 1792.

Paul Linsen Bigler settled in Philadelphia county.

The ship Pink Johnson arrived Sept. 19, 1732. The archives gives 110 names, this photostat shows 112, there are many errors. Behn should be Bohn, Beer, Bey, Rouse, Bausch, Coplinger, Keplinger, etc. John Moessinger settled in Bucks county. With him was his son, Michael Messinger, born Nov. 10, 1719, who settled first in Bucks county and later in Forks township, Northampton county, where he had a grist mill, became prominent and was a member of the County Committee of Observation in the Revolution. He died October 21, 1791. He was the ancestor of one of the members of our Executive Committee and has many descendants in Northampton county.

Another passenger was Andreas Oberbeck, from Oberam Neustadt in the Palatinate, born about 1690, settled first at Skippack, where he was elder of the Reformed Church from 1739 to 1744; removed to Bucks county, where he died in 1765.

The first name on the list is John Steiman. He was born in 1668

at Strassburg, the son of Peter Steinman, who was married June 18, 1645, to Sara Metzgar. She was born Feb. 3, 1623. With him was his son, John George Steinman, born March 18, 1703, who settled in Philadelphia county.

John George Schm settled in Bucks county and John Dieter settled in what is now Northampton county, where he died in 1758.

The ship Adventurer came Sept. 23, 1732. On it came Mathias Riegel, born in 1709, who settled in Lower Saucon township, the present Northampton county, where he died in 1778. George Riegel, born in 1718, settled in Bucks county, and died May 17, 1798.

Tobias Moser, born 1702, settled in Bucks, now Lehigh county, and died in 1757.

George Breiner settled in Berks county.

Baltzer Bortner, born 1695, settled in Tulpehocken township, Lancaster county, and died in 1747. His son, Jacob, born in 1722, settled in 1761 in Northumberland county and died in 1792.

Mathias Wagner, born 1709, settled in Northampton county.

The ship Loyall Judith arrived Sept. 25, 1732, with Philip Jacob Acker, born 1696, who settled in Macungie township, now Lehigh county, and Henry Acker, born in 1700, who settled in Bucks county.

The ship Dragon arrived Sept. 30, 1732. Among its passengers were Peter Mattern, an ancestor of the writer, who settled in Bucks, now Lehigh county. Some descendants settled in Upper Mahanoy township, Northumberland county.

Felix Brunner settled in Lower Milford township of the present Lehigh county, where he died in 1760.

John Adam Romich, born Feb. 3, 1689, at Ruedenstein, in the Palatinate, a Lutheran and a deacon, in 1762 joined the Moravians in Lynn township, Lehigh county, and died there July 11, 1768.

Leonard Slosser settled in Bucks, now Lehigh county.

Tobias Bahl settled in Upper Saucon township, Lehigh county, where he died in 1759.

Jacob Dubb, a gunsmith, born Aug. 31, 1710, in Aesch, parish of Birmensdorf, Canton of Zurich, Switzerland, settled in Lower Milford township, the present Lehigh county. He was the ancestor of Rev. Dr. Joseph H. Dubbs.

The ship Pink, John and William [meaning the pink, John and William], arrived Oct. 17, 1732. On it were Sebastian Truckerbiller, born Aug. 1, 1715, died Feb. 1, 1795. He is buried in a field, formerly his own land, in Lehigh county. Some of his descendants settled in Northumberland county. Henry Keck, from Bavaria, is the ancestor of a large Lehigh county family.

On August 17, 1733, the ship Samuel arrived. The archives give 88 miles over it on board, with one sick, which name Rupp gives, making 89. George Ruch, Senior's age is given as 48. His tombstone states he was born in Zitzendorf, Alsace, in 1664, making him 68. He died in Whitehall township, now Lehigh county, in 1769, John Lichtenwainer, from Kreuth, in Kolberg, in Brandenburg was

buried in Bucks county, where he died in 1765. The first name on the list is John Steiman. He was born in 1668

a passenger. His passport, dated April 25, 1733, is still in existence. He settled in Bucks now Lehigh county.

Peter Troxell, from Switzerland, one of the founders of the Egypt church, Whitehall township, Lehigh county, and who is given as church censor in 1736.

Ulrich Flickinger, born 1702, died 1792, in Whitehall township.

Michael Brobst settled in Albany township, Berks county.

Peter Beisel, whose son Peter, aged 8, became a member of the Northampton County Revolutionary Committee of Observation.

Henry Roth, born in 1688, was one of the two men who gave the land for the Salisbury Church, near Allentown.

The ship Hope arrived August 28, 1733. I have here a photostat of the original list. Rupp says there are 83 over 16; he gives 81. The archives give 79. There are really 84, with some errors in the names.

David Deshler, born in 1711, died in 1792, settled in Germantown, and became a prominent merchant, noted for his honesty and integrity. "As honest as David Deshler" became a proverb. He built the Morris Mansion in 1774, which became the headquarters of Sir William Howe in the Revolution and the residence of President Washington in 1793.

Daniel Roth, a direct ancestor of the writer, born in Switzerland in 1703, died near Allentown in 1737. His son, Hon. Peter Rhoads, reared among Quakers, was a Revolutionary patriot and judge for 30 years.

Jacob Mueckli settled in Whitehall township, and died in 1769.

John Jacob Schreiber, born in Niederbronn, Alsace, in 1699, died in 1750 in Whitehall township.

Michale, Peter and Ulrich Witmer were among the passengers.

Peter Witmer, born in 1737, in Hertheim, Nassau-Dillenberg, Prussia, who in 1760 located near Port Treverton, Snyder county, where he died in 1793, was probably a nephew of these Witmers.

Ulrich, Jacob and Ulrich Lonagre, Jr., settled in Philadelphia county.

Henrich, Mathias and Bernard Feigley settled in Philadelphia, now Berks county. A member of our Executive Committee descends from one of these men.

Rudolph Schneebeli, Christian and Peter Eschelman, John Snabley and Jacob Burki settled in Lancaster county.

On the Brigantine Richard and Elizabeth, Sept. 28, 1733, were John Nicholas Saeger, born 1694, at Reichenbach, Bavaria, who settled in Whitehall township, Bucks county, now Lehigh, and died there in 1762.

Ulrich Burkhalter, from Switzerland, born 1693, died in 1762, in Whitehall township.

On the ship St. Andrew, Sept. 12, 1734, came the important Schwenkfelder colony, which I will not mention in detail at this time. Also Jacob Wildfang, who located in Philadelphia. Descendants are in North Carolina.

On the ship Mercury, May 29, 1735, was a colony of Swiss, headed by Rev. Maurice Goetschy, from Saletz, Switzerland. Rev. Goetschy was sick when the ship arrived and died the following day. His son, John Henry, born March 8, 1718, was a student at the Latin school at Zurich and began to preach to the Reformed settlers at the age of 17, not only at Philadelphia, but at Skippack, Goshenhoppen, Great Swamp, Egypt, Saucon, Maxatawny, Moselem, Oley, Bern and Tulpehocken. He was licensed to preach in 1737 and ordained in 1741 and became a pastor in New Jersey.

John Conrad Wuerz, born Nov. 30, 1706, in the Canton of Zurich, Switzerland, married Anna, daughter of Rev. Maurice Goetschy. He became school teacher, began preaching in 1742, was ordained in 1752 and died at York Sept. 21, 1763.

Ulrich Amer, born in 1699 in Switzerland, settled in Bucks, now Lehigh county.

On the ship Harle, Sept. 1, 1736, was George Zeisloff, born 1709, who, with his wife and several children, was killed by Indians in Lynn township, Northampton county, now Lehigh, March 24, 1756, only two sons surviving. His house is still standing.

John Adam Schaus, born 1704, settled in Bucks county.

The ship Princess Augusta, Sept. 16, 1736, had as a passenger George Nicholas Gauger, born 1718, who settled in Tulpehocken and whose son John Wilhelm settled in Northumberland county.

The ship Samuel, Aug. 30, 1737, brought John Troxell and his son John Peter Troxell, who was born April 3, 1719, in Switzerland, naturalized in 1748 and in 1752 built a large stone house, with a unique inscription, still standing, in which the Egypt Reformed congregation worshipped. In 1768 he sold his 410 acres and removed to Gwynedd township, Philadelphia county, where he owned a grist and a saw mill. In 1776 he removed to Maryland, where he died Jan. 25, 1799.

Frederick Eberhard, born 1697, died 1751, settled in Bucks county.

Philip Fenstermacher, born in the Palatinate Feb. 27, 1715, died in Longswame township, Bucks county, June 15, 1790. This is the last ship list given in the Colonial Records.

The ship St. Andrew, Sept. 26, 1737, brought many who settled in Eastern Pennsylvania.

John Erdmann, from Pfungstadt, Hesse Darmstadt, settled in Bucks county.

George Frederick Newhard, from Zweibruecken, born 1700, died Nov. 29, 1765, another ancestor of the writer, settled in Whitehall township, Bucks, now Lehigh county. His brother, Michael Newhard, born Feb. 9, 1715, died March 10, 1793, settled in the northern part of the same township, and George Newhard, born 1720, died 1800, settled in Allen township, Northampton county.

Balthazar Beil settled in Upper Saucon township, Bucks, now Lehigh county, as did also John Appel, from Pfungstadt.

George Kern settled in Whitehall township and Philip Seger set-

tled in Lehigh township, Northampton county.

Martin Kecher, born at Holtzenhausen, Nassau Dillenberg, died about 1762, settled in what is now Lehigh county.

On the ship Winter Galley, Sept. 5, 1738, was Christopher Heller, born in 1688 in Petersheim, in the Palatinate. He settled in Northampton county, where he died in 1778. With him was his son Simon Heller, born June 18, 1721, died May 20, 1785, who settled in the same county.

On the ship Glasgow, Sept. 9, 1738, were the following:

Mathias Fenstermacher, born in 1678 in the Palatinate, who settled in Berks county.

Franz Guidner, who settled in Bucks, now Lehigh county.

John Pontius, born in 1718 in Alsace, settled in Tulpehocken, Berks county. Several of his sons were pioneers in the Buffalo Valley.

September 11, 1738, came the ship Robert and Alice, with John Nicholas Schneider, who was evidently a well educated man, as he wrote a fine hand. He settled in what is now Lehigh county, where he was a Justice of the Peace in Colonial times, when still a part of Bucks county.

The ship Queen Elizabeth arrived Sept. 16, 1738. Here were Reinhard Laubach, aged 70, and his son Christian Laubach, born 1699, died Nov. 19, 1768, who settled in Lower Saucon township, Northampton county.

Anthony Lerch, born Sept. 20, 1720, died Aug. 28, 1793; his brother Pancratius Lerch, who died in 1794, and Peter Lerch, with their father, Andreas Lerch, aged 50, who all settled in Lower Saucon.

The Thistle, Sept. 19, 1738, brought Lorentz Guth, from Zweibruecken, who settled in Whitehall township, was the founder of the Berlin Reformed Church and died in 1770.

The ship Friendship came Sept. 20, 1738, with Jacob Follmer, born in the village of Rossrog, Wurttemberg in 1698, who settled in the Schoharie valley, New York, and later followed Conrad Weiser to Tulpehocken, where he died in 1762. His son Michael located on Masterton Run, in Northumberland county, 1773, was the organizer of Follmer Lutheran Church in Turbot township, and died Sept. 29, 1793. He bequeathed £15 to the Dutch Lutheran Church, £10 towards teaching the poor children. His son, George Jacob Follmer, settled in 1773 in Turbot township, now Montour county. He was a member of the Assembly from Northumberland county in 1776 and 1777, reelected in 1796, 1798, 1799, 1800 and 1801. In 1799 he received 3569 votes and Simon Snyder received 3047. Both were elected, as the two highest.

In 1802 he was elected State Senator and died in office Aug. 24, 1804, and is buried at the Follmer Church. During one winter of the Assembly, two or three young lawyers, a little vain of their learning, interlarded their speeches with long quotations from Latin authors. This gave offense to Jacob Follmer, who in reply, remarked that as it was the fashion to make speeches in

from Latin authors. This gave offense to Jacob Folmer, who in reply, remarked that as it was the fashion to make speeches in

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unknown tongues, he was to be excused if he spoke in the Delaware Indian dialect. This put an end to the Latin quotations.

On the ship Saint Andrew, Oct. 27, 1738, came John Rinehard Benz, who died in Northampton county in 1758. Michael Seider, born March 6, 1709, died Dec. 8, 1785, who settled in Upper Saucon township, then Bucks and now Lehigh county; John Nicholas Stahier, who died in September, 1794 in Northampton county, and George Bibighausen, born Sept. 3, 1708, in Elshof, in Wittgenstein.

The ship Bilander Thistle, Oct. 28, 1738, brought Conrad Merkam, who settled first in Berks county and later in Carbon county.

Peter Steckel, born 1719, settled in Whitehall township, where he died in 1784. His son, Daniel Steckel, died at Bath, Northampton county, aged 101 years and 17 days.

Samuel Eberhard Kopp, born in Lindenfingen, Wurtemberg, Jan. 8, 1700, settled in Bucks county, now Lehigh, where he died March 2, 1757.

On the ship Charming Nancy, Nov. 9, 1738, came Peter Butt, born in 1718, in Hertzogberg, Bavaria. He settled in Berks county and died March 18, 1780.

John Jacob Kuntz, born Feb. 19, 1692, at Niederbronne, Alsace, settled in Berks county. His son, Bernhard Kuntz, born Dec. 3, 1723, died July 14, 1807, settled in Northampton county. They are ancestors of one of our Executive Committee members.

On the ship Samuel, Nov. 27, 1739, came Joseph Biery, from the Canton of Bern, Switzerland, born 1703, who settled in Berks county and died in 1768. Also Casper Doll, born Feb. 2, 1724, died Feb. 4, 1793, in Plainfield township, Northampton county.

The ship Royal Judith arrived Nov. 25, 1740, with Frederick Wilhelm Nagel, born in 1713, who settled in Moore township, Northampton county, where he died Nov. 29, 1779.

These ship lists, up to the year 1775, if published and edited with notes as the example here given, would make a valuable addition to the history of the Pennsylvania Germans. At the July meeting of the Executive Committee I made the suggestion that this be done and that photostatic copies be made of all the lists. At the request of the Committee, I have therefore given the society this paper.

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PENNSYLVANIA GERMAN PIONEERS

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This volume, with material from the second edition of 1876, was reprinted in Baltimore in 1975. However, it contains many errors and the researcher is advised to consult Strassburger and Hinke [Lancour No. 146] instead.

William Henry Egle, ed. *Names of Foreigners Who Took the Oath of Allegiance to the Province and State of Pennsylvania, 1727-1775, and with the Foreign Arrivals, 1786-1808*. Harrisburg: E. K. Meyers, 1892 [Lancour No. 145].

This work, volume 17 of the second series of the Pennsylvania Archives, was reprinted in Baltimore in 1976 with a forward by Dr. George E. McCracken. It should be used in conjunction with the work of Strassburger and Hinke [Lancour No. 146].

Ralph Beaver Strassburger. *Pennsylvania German Pioneers; a Publication of the Original Lists of Arrivals in the Port of Philadelphia from 1727 to 1808*, edited by John William Hinke. Norristown: Pennsylvania German Society, 1934 [Lancour No. 146].

This three volume work was prepared with great care, volume 2 containing facsimiles of all signatures of those taking the oath of allegiance and the oaths of abjuration. The first and third volumes only have been reprinted (Baltimore, 1975).

William John Hinke and John Baer Stoudt, editors. "A List of German Immigrants to the American Colonies from Zweibruecken in the Palatinate, 1728-1749," *The Pennsylvania German Folklore Society Yearbook*, 1 (1936), 101-124 [Lancour No. 147].

This title along with other publications of the Pennsylvania German Folklore Society is planned for publication by the Genealogical Publishing Company of 111 Water Street, Baltimore, MD 21202. 404 emigrants destined for Pennsylvania and Carolina are listed.

Fritz Braun. *Auswanderer aus der Umgebung von Ludwigshafen a. Rh. auf dem Schiff „Thistle of Glasgow“ 1730*. Neustadt an der Aisch: Buchdruckerei Ph. C. W. Schmidt, 1959 [Lancour No. 148].

Mitte June 1730 durfte das Segelschiff „Thistle of Glasgow“ unter

Kapitän Colin Dunlop Rotterdam für die Fahrt nach Amerika verlassen haben. Es waren 77 Familien oder Einzelpersonen an Bord, insgesamt 260 Personen. Am 19. Juni 1730 hat das Schiff in Dover angelegt und nach 72tägiger Fahrt ist es am 29. August 1730 in Philadelphia eingetroffen. In den „Mitteilungen zur Wanderungsgeschichte der Pfälzer“ 1955, Folge 5, wurde ein Namensverzeichnis der Auswanderer dieses Schiffs abgedruckt. Die Liste ist seinerzeit aus den 508 German Pioneers“, Norristown, Pa., 1934, veröffentlichten Schiffslisten ausgewählt worden, weil die Passagiere zum grossen Teil aus Orten um Ludwigshafen ausgewandert sind. Für 13 der auf dem Schiff genannten Familien oder Einzelpersonen konnten damals Herkunftsorte genannt werden.

Was kann heute, 6 Jahre nach Abdruck jener Namensliste, über Passagiere des Schiffes „Thistle of Glasgow“ berichtet werden? Die für die Wanderungsforschung wertvollsten Angaben, die Herkunftsorte der Auswanderer, fehlen leider in den genannten Schiffslisten. Sie fehlen auch in den Namenslisten der Einwanderer, die im Court House zu Philadelphia den Untertanenbrief für das Vaterland abliegen hatten. Die allgemeinen Bemerkungen zu den Listen der einzelnen Schiffe enthalten Angaben über den Namen des Kapitäns, den Abfahrtsort, etwaige Zwischenlandungen und über den Zeitpunkt der Ankunft des Schiffes in Philadelphia. Vielfach sind auch allgemein gehaltene Herkunftsvermerke gemacht, die aber bestenfalls territoriale Begrenzungen des Herkunftsgebietes zulassen. Neben Angaben wie „Passagiere“ oder „Fremde“ ist der Begriff „Pfälzer“ oft zu lesen; diese Herkunftsvermerke heissen „Zwei-Pfälzer“, „Württemberg“, „Altmühl“ oder ähnlich. Dass bei dem Wort „Pfälzer“ nicht an die heutige Pfalz, sondern an alle damals zur Kurpfalz gehörenden Landesteile gedacht werden muss, ist selbstverständlich. Das Wort ist im weitesten Sinne zu verstehen und schliesst nicht aus, dass auch Auswanderer aus anderen deutschen Gauen unter ihnen sein können. Für das Schiff „Thistle of Glasgow“ heiss es, dass die Passagiere „Pfälzer“ seien.

Wer sich mit Familiennamen beschäftigt, kann das Herkunftsgebiet der Passagiere eines Schiffes schloss aus dem Auftreten von Namen, die für einen bestimmten Teil unseres Vaterlandes charakteristisch sind, sehr stark einengen. Selbst für die Pfalz lässt sich unterscheiden, ob es sich um die Vorderpfalz oder um den Westrich, um die Südpfalz oder um die Nordpfalz handelt.

Die Erörterung zeigt ausserdem, dass sich auf den einzelnen Schiffen Passagiere oder Gruppen von Passagieren in jener Zeit fast immer aus eng begrenzten Gebietsteilen Deutschlands zusammen geschlossen haben. Es gibt vielerlei Ursachen, die neben den allgemeinen Auswanderungsgründen dazu Anlass gewesen sind: Die Wirkungsreiche der Werber, die Notwendigkeit des Zusammenschlusses von Verwandten und Freunden, um sich in der Fremde behaupten und durchsetzungsfähigkeiten, das Vertrauen zu bestimmten Persönlichkeiten mit

Mordart, was im 18. Jahrhundert der besseren Verständigung wegen ein nicht unseßlicher Gesichtspunkt war.

Wenn also die Schiffslisten grösstenteils auch nur die vor- und Familiennamen der über 16 Jahre alten männlichen Einzelauswanderer oder Familienoberhäupter enthalten—nur in einzelnen Listen sind zusätzlich auch Frauen und Kinder oder das Alter der Auswanderer angegeben—, so bleiben noch genügend Wege offen, um über die Herkunft der Passagiere ein ständig klarer werdendes Bild gewinnen zu können.

Schon 1953 konnte vom Verfasser die Meinung vertreten und belegt werden, dass die Herkunft der Auswanderer auf dem Schiff „Thistle of Glasgow“ im Raum Ludwigshafen zu suchen ist. Die weitere Nachforschung hat dies bestätigt und gezeigt, dass die Auswanderer in einem verhältnismässig eng begrenztes Gebiet um Ludwigshafen beheimatet waren. Nachdem durch derartige Überlegungen und durch die Zusammenfassung von Lebensdaten aus der Pfalz und aus den USA, besonders aus Pennsylvanien und Maryland, das Herkunftsgebiet umrisssen war, konnten einige systematische Nachforschungen in pfälzischen Kirchenbüchern vorgenommen werden. Sie zeigten ein recht befriedigendes Ergebnis und der Verfasser hegt die Hoffnung, dass er dem Kreis der Leser in Thufe der Zeit mit weiteren Ergebnissen rechnen darf. Sehr auffallend sind die verbindungschaftlichen Beziehungen unter den Auswanderern, die durch Eheheirat vor und nach der Auswanderung zustande gekommen waren.

An diesem Beispiel kann gezeigt werden, was aus dem zunächst mageren Gerüpte einer aus den Vornamen und Ziffern bestehenden Schiffsliste gemacht werden kann. Die Zusammenfassung der Ichbersdaten aus der Pfalz, aus Amerika und selbst aus der Schweiz liefert reichhaltigen Stoff für die Wiederherstellung in Vergessenheit geratenen Familienzusammenhänge, sie trägt aber auch dazu bei, das Wissen über die Wanderungsgeschichte der Pfälzer zu erweitern. Die Arbeit lässt deutlich erkennen, dass die noch nicht ganz sesshaft gewordenen Zuwanderer aus der Schweiz verhältnismässig stark an der Auswanderung beteiligt waren.

Es werden alle Namen der Passagiere aufgeführt, auch wenn über einzelne Namen noch keine Ergänzungen vorliegen. In der Schreibweise der Namen hält sich der Verfasser an die Veröffentlichung von Strassburger und Hinke. Da für die Passagiere des Schiffes „Thistle of Glasgow“ drei Listen vorliegen—eine Schiffsliste und zwei Eidesleistungen—werden Abweichungen in der Schreibweise der Namen angegeben. Von beiden Listen der Eidesleistungen in Philadelphia sind Abdrücke der Originalunterschriften vorhanden, sofern die Auswanderer nur ein Handzeichen angebracht haben, ist dies nach den Familiennamen durch ein „x“ oder durch den als Handzeichen verwendeten Buchstaben in Klammern angegeben.

JÖRG Johann(es): Vgl. HAS Ludwig.

HS Ludwig (Ludwig, Loudwick): Aus den Aufzeichnungen im Kirchenbuch der lutherischen Gemeinde Hassloch kann eindeutig nachgewiesen werden, dass Johann Georg Ludwig HAAS (HAS) 1730 nach

Amerika ausgewandert ist. Der Auswanderer hat sich in den beiden Eideslisten selbst als „Johann JÖRG ludwig Haas“ eingetragen. Die Listen sind zweispaltig angelegt. Da der Auswanderer für seinen Namen beide Spalten in Anspruch genommen hat, waren die Herausgeber des Buches „Pennsylvania German Pioneers“ sich nicht klar darüber, ob es sich um einen Auswanderer mit drei Vornamen handelt oder ob es zwei Auswanderer mit den Namen Johan JÖRG und ludwig HAS sein könnten. Die Verfasser hatten keine Möglichkeit zur Aufklärung des Eintrags und haben deshalb zwei Auswanderer, JÖRG und HAS, in den von ihnen veröffentlichten Listen aufgelistet. Nach dieser Klarstellung kann Johan JÖRG als Auswanderer gestrichen werden.

Johann Georg Ludwig HAAS (HAASS) wurde am 31. 7. 1701 in Hassloch als Sohn des Abraham Haas getauft. Im gleichen Ort fand am 23. 1. 1725 seine Eheschließung mit Anna Margaretha STAHLER, Tochter des Ackermanns Johann STAHLER und der Anna Margaretha Pfarrer bei der Eheschließung im Kirchenbuch den Vermerk „1730 in die Insul Pennsylvania gezogen“ nachgetragen.

Johan Balthasar, \* 1. 9. 1727.

SIMMUND (SIMONUT, SIGMOND) Bernhardt (Bernard): Für die Jahre 1734 und 1739 ist sein Aufenthalt in Philadelphia, Pa., belegt. Er gehörte zu den Organisatoren der ersten reformierten Kirche in Philadelphia und war 1739 einer der Kirchenältesten.

DIEHL (THEIL) Hans Jacob: Er dürfte sehr wahrscheinlich aus der Umgebung von Hassloch ausgewandert sein.

DEUNKE (L) Johann(es) (Joannes): 1739 war er einer der Kirchenältesten der Falkner Schwäbisch-reformierten Kirche (Falkner Swamp, Montgomery County, Pa.). Vgl. REIMER Friedrich.

BADER (BATTER) Christoph (Christof, Christopher)  
OHLER (OHLER, OLER) Johann Peter (Petter): Er stammt aus Meckenheim und war kurz vor der Auswanderung am 5. 4. 1730 in Hassloch FISER (vgl.) Pate.

GRAU Leonard (Löhhart, Lönhard)

HESS (HES) - Jeremias (Jeremias): Mit seiner Frau Anna hatte Jeremias HESS bereits ein sehr bewegtes Auswanderungsschicksal hinter sich, denn genau 21 Jahre zuvor war er schon einmal mit seiner Familie zur Auswanderung nach Amerika aufgebrochen. Erst mit vielen seiner Landsleute erreichte er das Ziel Amerika nicht. Von Holland aus war er auf dem Segelschiff nach London im Lager Schwarze Heide aufzuhalten. Da es an Schiffsräumen für Amerika fehlte, wurde er mit einer Gruppe von Pfälzern nach Irland in die Grafschaft Limerick weitergeleitet. Der 1713 durch den Pfarrer seiner Frau Anna bei der am 29. 12. 1709 in Irland getauften Anna

Maria HEIM, Tochter des aus Mutterstadt stammenden Hans Paul(us) HEIM und der Anna VOLK, Taufzeugnis war, beweist die Anwesenheit des Jeremias HESS in Irland ebenso wie der Nachtrag bei seinen eigenen in Mutterstadt geborenen Kindern Hans Conrad und Elisabeth „mortuus in Irland“ - „in Irland gestorben“. Als Jeremias HESS am 2. 6. 1709 in St. Catharins/England registriert wurde, war er 34 Jahre alt. Außer der Frau werden zwei Söhne im Alter von 7 und 5 Jahren und eine Tochter von 2 Jahren genannt. Bei dem Rücktransport nach Holland im Jahr 1711 heißt es „Jeremias HESS und 3 Personen“.

Als dem Ehepaar nach der Rückkehr weitere Kinder in Mutterstadt geboren wurden, erhielt einer der Söhne den Namen des in Irland verstorbene Bruders Johann Conrad.

Auf dem Schiff „Thistle of Glasgow“ erreichte die Familie des Jeremias HESS endlich das erste Ziel.

Die Frau, die Johann Valentin GRIESEMER am 17. 7. 1712 in Lampertheim geheiratet hat, hieß Anna Margaretha ANDREASS.

In ihrer neuen Heimat in Pennsylvanien bevorzugten die Griesser das Leben als Farmer ausserhalb geschlossener Siedlungen. Sie schlossen sich in Familiengemeinschaften zusammen und verfügten bald über eine eigene Wasserversorgung, über eigene Mühlen und Kelteranlagen, sie besaßen eigene Weinstände und hatten sich Werkstätten wie Schmiede, Schuster und Tattlerie eingerichtet. Zu ihren Wohngebäuden und ausgedehnten Ländereien gehörte ein eigener Familienfriedhof. Die Griesser zählten zu den angesehensten Familien um Oley, einem Ort und einem Tal zwischen Allentown und Reading in Berks County, Pennsylvanien. Hereford war der erste Ansiedlungsort, später Goshenhoppen.

Wer heute als Pfälzer durch dieses vor nahezu 250 Jahren überwiegend von Pfälzer Landsleuten besiedelte Gebiet kommt, fühlt viele Dinge, die ein heimisches Gefühl aufkommen lassen: Es sind Anordnungen und Bauweise der aus dem 18. Jahrhundert erhaltenen Wohnhäuser und Nebengebäude, von denen einzelne noch mit schwäbischen Schieferziegeln gedeckt sind, die Blumen- und Gemüsegärten bei den Wohnhäusern, die mächtigen Rosskastanien oder vereinzelt auch alte Birnbäume beim Haus, die Menschen mit uns vertrautem Gesichtsaussehen und Lebensgewohnheiten.

In dem Oley benachbarten Spangsville steht noch eine alte Mühle mit der Aufschrift „D. L. Griesemer and E. Griesemer Mill 1847“. Sie ist gegenwärtig im Besitz von Henry Wagner. Etwa 5 Kilometer westlich von Spangsville erinnert der Ort Griesemerville an die aus Lampertheim eingewanderte Familie. Griesemerville ist nach einem Enkel des Auswanderers, Peter GRIESEMER, benannt, der als erste Häuser des Ortes ein Hotel und ein Geschäftshaus gebaut hatte. Letzterer, ein Sohn des Caspar, war in I. Ehe mit Esther HOCH, einer Tochter des Daniel HOCH (Schweizer Herkunft) und der Mary BERTOLLET, verheiratet. Die Bertolet wiederum waren aus Chateau-d'Œx im Kanton Waadt, Schweiz, nach Minfeld/Pfalz eingewandert und von da nach Amerika weitergezogen.

Ein anderer Enkel, Jacob GRIESEMER, war Hauptmann im Unabhängigkeitskrieg.

Es darf angenommen werden, dass Wilhelm HEIM ein Bruder zu Anna Margaretha HEIM, Ehefrau des Hans Philipp GROSSKOST, ist. Außerdem liegt es nahe, dass er auch ein Bruder zu Hans Paul HEIM ist, der bei Jeremias HESS genannt wurde. Letzterer ist mit seinem am 10. 7. 1712 in Mutterstadt geborenen Sohn Johannes oder Hans und weiteren Familienangehörigen auf dem Schiff „James Goodwill“ am 27. 9. 1727 in Philadelphia angekommen. Hat er den Verwandten die Anregung zur Auswanderung gegeben?

Jahrhunderts genannt. Peter FEDEROLF ist am 15. 8. 1784 in Pennsylvania gestorben und wurde wie seine Frau auf dem privaten Friedhof auf der eigenen Farm, die vermutlich zu Hereford Township, Berks County, gehörte, begraben. Einer seiner Söhne, Jakob FEDEROLF, wurde am 16. 2. 1742 in Hereford Township, Berks County, geboren. ROTHERMEL Johann: Er wird in keiner der drei Listen genannt; das ist verständlich, denn er ist nach den Aufzeichnungen der Familie FEDEROLF während der Überfahrt gestorben und auf hoher See bestattet worden.

Unter den Nachkommen des Auswanderers war lange Zeit die Meinung vertreten, dass der Herkunftsstadt Wachbach in Holland zu suchen sei, bis Abraham ROTHERMEL zwei Europareisen in den Jahren 1908 und 1910 aufklären konnte, dass es sich um Wachbach bei Bad Mergentheim handelt. Er weiltete 1910 selbst in Wachbach und hat im Dezember 1911 vor der Historical Society von Berks County über den Erfolg seiner Nachforschungen berichtet. Über Johann ROTHERMEL und seine Nachkommen liegen mehrere Veröffentlichungen vor. Eine alte Familienbibel ist 1880 leider durch einen Brand in Philadelphia vernichtet worden.

1. Jungkier, Johann Nicklas—of Moerschbach (Kreis Simmern), "who has gone to the Island of Pennsylphianen," pays in taxes two florins for the tithe.

2. Muehleissen, Johann Jacob—of Pleizenhausen (Kreis Simmern), "intends to go with wife and child to the New Land." He is, with his wife and child, freed from vassalage on payment of a manumission tax of 16 florins and a further tax of 15 florins for the manumission.

3. Stiehl, Abraham—of Steinbach (Kreis Simmern), "has made up his mind to go to Pennsylvania"; is, with wife and four children, freed from vassalage on payment of 32 florins for manumission and 29 florins for the tithe. [Johann Abraham Stiehl, Ship Patience, August 11, 1750.]

4. Doerter (Dorten), Johann Anton—of Laubach (Kreis Simmern), "who has gone to the Island of Pensylphania," pays, with wife and six children, 59 florins for manumission and 53 florins tithe.

5. Brach, Nickel—of Ravensbeuren (Kreis Zell, Mosel), "who went to Pensylphania," pays 20 florins for the tithe.

6. Cuntz, Nickel—of Unzenberg (Kreis Simmern), "who has gone to the Island of Pensylphania," pays 100 florins for the tithe. [Johann Nickel Cuntz, Ship Patience, August 11, 1750.]

*From Hueffelsheim (Kreis Freudenbach)*

7. Wolfskehl, Anna Margaretha—born 11-18-1735 at Hueffelsheim, daughter of Johannes Wolfskehl and wife Anna Maria, "went with her father to the New Land." Elisabetha Wolfskehl, born 12-28-1733 at Hueffelsheim to the same parents, "went with her father in 1742 to the New Land." Maria Agnes Wolfskehl, born 1-2-1738 of the same parents, "went with her father to the New Land." [Johannes Wolfskehl, Ship Loyal Judith, September 3, 1742.]

8. Reitzel, Maria Wilhelmina—born 9-2-1734 at Hueffelsheim, daughter of the shoemaker Johann Georg Reitzel and wife Sybilla, "went with her father to the New Land in 1741." Johann Peter Reitzel, born at Hueffelsheim 10-28-1737 to the same parents, "went with his parents to the New Land in 1741." [Johann Georg Reitzel, Ship Molly, 10-17-1741.]

*From Hornbach (Kreis Zweibrücken)*

9. Pfaff, Theobald—who disappeared eight years ago from Eisenbach and emigrated to America, leaving nine children behind, of whom three are at present housed in the prince's orphanage at Homberg" (Document dated 1-29-1777). [Theobalt Pfaff, Ship Betsy, 10-26-1768.]

*From Hornbach (Kreis Zweibrücken)*

10. Strobeck, Johann Georg und Christian—sons of Conrad Strobeck, citizen and weaver at Hornbach from his first marriage with Elisabetha Schaeffer, "who both after their mother's death went to the New Land in 1735 with their grandmother Elisabetha Schaeffer and their mother's brother, with the knowledge and permission of the most gracious authorities, and since the grandparents were still alive [and] said children consequently had nothing yet of their maternal inheritance, they have taken the grandmother's inheritance along." [Elizabeth Schaefer, Jerich Strobeck, Christian Strobeck, Ship Pennsylvania Merchant, September 18, 1735.]

11. Bley, Philipp—son of the citizen and master cooper, Werner Bley of Hornbach, "who married here (i.e., Hornbach), but ten years ago went to the District of Kleeburg in Alsace and later on, with the permission of the most gracious authorities, went to America." (The emigration to America took place around 1748-9.) Werner Bley's wife was Elisabetha Huber.

12. Maus, Samuel—son of Frederich Maus, councilor of Hornbach and his wife Susanna Mueller, "went to America" around 1754. [Samuel Maus, Ship Edinburg, 9-14-1755.]

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13. Henge, Catharina—daughter of Samuel Mueller, citizen and tanner at Hornbach, and his wife Maria Margaretha Maus, "who was divorced on the grounds of adultery from her husband (Georg Henge, to whom she had a son named Philipp, and afterwards went to America, where, according to a letter which reached here, she married a man named Fischer)." (The emigration took place around 1766.) According to another document her son is also said to have gone to America.

14. Leiner, Ludwig—of Hornbach, "went abroad as woollenweaver," and "is reported in 1784 to have died in America."

15. Zutter, Daniel and Balthasar—sons of Benedict Baltzer Zutter, woolspinner at Hornbach, "secretly disappeared and went away to America" (document dated 6-7-1763). [Daniel Zutter, Balthazar Zutter, Ship Chance, 12-1-1763.]

*From Brunsbach (Kreis Homburg, Saar)*  
16. Hochstrasser, Paul—son of Samuel Hochstrasser of Brunsbach and his wife Elisabetha, "who has now established himself as master tailor in Philadelphia" (Document dated 4-18-1761). But according to a letter of Attorney dated 1-23-1764, Paul Hochstrasser, breeches maker, with his sister Catharina, was resident in the city of Albany, province of New York. [Paulo Hochstrasser, Ship Edinburg, 9-14-1753.] The Jacob Hochstrasser who emigrated in 1767 was perhaps a brother of Paul's since the latter had a brother by that name.

*From Walsheim on the Blies (Kreis Homburg, Saar)*  
17. Schunk, Johannes, Catharina, Elisabetha, Maria and Simon—children of Wilheilm Schunk of Walsheim and wife Catharina Schwarz, "have been for nine or ten years in America" (Document dated 10-18-1781).

*From Albisheim (Kreis Kirchheimbolanden)*  
1. Johann Engel Morgenstern, born at Albisheim September 20, 1726—son of Johann Philipp Morgenstern and wife Maria Rosina—residing in Pennsylvania. [Johann Engelbert Morgenstern, Ship St. Andrew, September 3, 1749.]  
2. Abraham Brubacher—son of Jacob Brubacher from his first marriage—"in Pennsylvania" (Document dated 1763). The Brubacher family, of Mennonite background, was in the 18th century located in the region of Albisheim, also in the Mennonite settlement of Ibersheim, near Worms.

3. Jacob Berg—son of Jacob Berg of Altenkirchen and wife Anna Margaretha Wagner—blacksmith by trade, went to Pennsylvania without manumission, along with Johann Theobald Schramm—son of George Schramm of Altenkirchen—in the year 1769. The property of both of them, namely an inheritance which came to them later, was on that account confiscated by the Government of the Duchy of Zweibruecken, Berg was referred to in the documents as a blacksmith at Middle-

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town, near Frederick, Maryland, while of Theobald Schramm is known only that after his arrival in America he worked as a hostler in Philadelphia. [Jacob Berg, Theobald Schramm, Ship Minerva, October 15, 1769.]

*Appenhofen (Kreis Berzabern)*

4. Margretha and Sibilla Wintz—daughters of Georg Wintz of Appenhofen—"who are by this time living in the New Land" (Document dated February 10, 1752). One of them was married to Thomas Schley of Frederick, Maryland.

5. Margretha Kuhn—daughter of Nicklaus Kuhn, citizen of Appenhofen, and his wife Elisabetha Nickler—was, according to official declarations, married at Billingsheim to Friedrich Wuerthsbacher (or Wirthsbacher), who was a physician born in the region of Heilbronn (Wuerttemberg), and went with him to America in 1764. [Friedrich Wuerthsbacher, Ship Hero, October 27, 1764.]

6. Georg Michel Banz, tailor by trade, and his sister Catharina Banz, both from Appenhofen, the former single, the latter married to Peter Brunner of Klingenberg, went to Pennsylvania without issue about 1748. A letter still extant in the Speyer Archives describes Georg Michel Banz as settled in Frederick County, Maryland, Johann Peter Brunner in the neighborhood of the town of Frederick. [Peter Brunner, Ship Albany, September 2, 1749.]

*From Asenheim (Kreis Ludwigshafen)*

7. Franz Balthasar Schalter—son of Johann Georg Schalter (died 1754) of Asenheim and his wife Elisabeth—went to Pennsylvania shortly after his father's death, in order to inherit here the property of his brother of his father, who had already been a long time resident in Pennsylvania. After the death of his uncle he stayed in Pennsylvania. On November 16, 1767, he wrote from Alsace Lothringen, Barks County, to his relatives, that he renounced his share of the inheritance, which he would have had a claim on from home, and wishes only that a clock and a Bible be sent over to him. With him went Johann Georg Baerstler, likewise from Asenheim, to America, but later returned home again. [Franz Baltzer Schalter, Jorge Boerstler, Ship Edinburgh, September 30, 1754.]

8. Jacob Neff—son of the Anabaptist (Mennonite) Peter Neff of Asenheim and his wife Veronika Roesch—"absent in America" (Document dated May 27, 1789). [Jacob Neff, Brig Betsy, October 15, 1785.]

*Billigheim (Kreis Bergzabern)*

9. Bernhard Kney—son of Philipp Kney of Billigheim and his wife Maria Margaretha Hutmacher—"who has gone to the so-called New Land" (Document dated May 10, 1755).

10. Anna Margaretha Degreiff—daughter of the councilor Jacob Degreiff of Billigheim—"is married in the New Land" (Document dated May 12, 1755).

*Boeckweiler (Kreis Homburg, Saar)*

11. Johannes Keller—son of Daniel Keller, of Boeckweiler—"established and married in the New Land" (Document dated October

19, 1776).

12. Heinrich Kunz—"son of the deceased citizen of the same name, of Boeckweiler and wife Maria Margaretha Hock"—removed himself from this country in 1764 and according to report that has reached here went to America without permission, contrary to the present governmental order! (Frankfurter Kaiserl. Reichs-Ober-Amts-Postzeitung, 2-13-1787). According to the documents Heinrich Kunz was a cartwright and from a letter dated August 21, 1768 we learn that he was living with Jonathan Heger in Canageschick in Maryland.

*Breitfurt (Kreis Homburg, Saar)*

13. Jacob Welker—son of Wilhelm Welker of Breitfurt—"who according to report, has gone to America" (Document dated December 4, 1777). [Either Jacob Welcker, Ship Minerva, September 17, 1771, or Jacob Welcker, Ship Crawford, October 26, 1768.]

14. Anna Appollonia Vogelgesang—daughter of Nickel Gentes, magistrate and citizen of Breitfurt—"married to Georg Vogelgesang, Jr. evidently also from Breitfurt," resident in America" (Document dated May 6, 1765). [Georg Vogelgesang, Ship Squirrel, October 21, 1761.]

15. Matheiss and Georg Schmidt—children of Abraham Schmidt, citizen and magistrate of Breitfurt—"in America" (Document dated October 7, 1760).

16. Joseph Neu—son of Georg Neu, resident of Breitfurt and his wife Christina Margaretha (Gentes)—"went to America" around 1753.

17. Johann Otto Neu—son of Wilhelm Neu of Breitfurt and his wife Anna Margaretha—"now residing in the New Land" (Document of May 19, 1767). His brother Johann Simon Neu, "also residing in the New Land" (Document of May 19, 1767).

*Dannstadt (Kreis Ludwigshafen)*

18. About the year 1748 Rudolph Drach and his sister Anna Maria Drach from Dannstadt, both single, went to America, where they married and had children. In the year 1768 they requested, through a power of attorney, the surrender of their property on payment of the tithe. Their property was, however, not surrendered, but confiscated according to the Emigration Edict of the Electoral Palatinate.

*Edenkoben*

19. Philipp Carl Haas—son of Johann Georg Haas—intended in the year 1748, to go, with his wife and five children, to the New Land "on account of a better fortune." [Philipp Carl Haas, Ship Patience, September 16, 1748.]

20. Anna Elisabetha Seyffert—daughter of Johann Gottfried Seyffert of Edenkoben—"married to David Delater, who went to Pennsylvania" (about 1740). [David Delater, Ship St. Andrew, October 2, 1741.]

21. Anna Catharina Gleich—daughter of the master miller Henrich Gleich of Edenkoben—"went to Pennsylvania" (about 1756).

22. Johann Georg Croissant and his sister Anna Catharina Crois-

sant—children of Jacob Croissant of Edenkoben—"who went to Pennsylvania." (about 1756).

23. In a Property Inventory of Ellerstadt from the year 1781 it is reported of Johann Caspar Huber—son of Michael Huber of Ellerstadt and his wife Anna Barbara—"living in Philadelphia and 44 years old; he has been absent from here 18 years." [Casper Huber, Ship Chance, November 1, 1763.]

*Elschbach (Kreis Kusel)*

24. Johann Georg Jung—son of Hermann Jung of Elschbach and his wife Anna Margaretha—"living in the New Land" (Document dated 1754).

*Freckenfeld (Kreis Germersheim)*

25. Johann Hahn—son of Jacob Hahn of Freckenfeld and his wife Petilia Eichenlaub—"went to the New Land." Conrad Hahn, brother of the preceding, single, "to the New Land." Johann Jacob Hahn, brother of the two preceding emigrants, "in the New Land." The latter was baptized at Freckenfeld February 9, 1727. An Inventory of September 11, 1754, lists all three persons as emigrated before that date.

26. Georg Dierwaechter, baptized at Freckenfeld, February 15, 1724, and Johann Ephard Dierwaechter—sons of Peter Dierwaechter of Freckenfeld and his wife Anna Catharina Hummel—"who both went to the so-called New Land or Pennsylvania" (about 1751). [Ephard Dierwaechter, Ship Janet, October 7, 1751.]

27. Margaretta Apfel—daughter of George Apfel of Freckenfeld and his wife Anna Catharina Gruber—"wife of Michael Herman, former citizen at Candel, who went to the New Land" (Document dated 1755). [Presumably Michel Hermann, Ship Richard & Mary, September 30, 1754.]

28. Georg Bauer—son of the citizen and beadle Jacob Bauer of Freckenfeld and his wife Anna Catharina Klein—"who went to the New Land" (Document dated June 10, 1761).

29. Michel Reyer—son of the cooper Theobald Reyer of Freinsheim and his wife Anna Maria Held—"who went away in the year 1756 to Pennsylvania."

30. Johann Nicolaus Bach—son of Sebastian Bach, who died at Freinsheim in 1753—"who is now, however, in Pennsylvania" (Document dated June 25, 1768). Nicolaus Bach was a resident of the city of New York, as appears from a letter written from there. [Fossil by Nickel Bach, Ship Adventure, September 25, 1754.]

31. Johann Peter Weilbrenner—son of Georg Daniel Weilbrenner, citizen and master butcher at Freinsheim and his wife Catharina Hib—went to America in 1753 and settled at Boucherville near Montreal. In a document dated at Montreal, June 12, 1781, he renounced his share of the property that had fallen to him, in favor of his brothers and sisters. At the same time there was in Montreal Johann Jacob Maurer, born at Kriegsfeld in the Palatinate,

Captain of the Second Battalion of the King's Royal Regiment, of New York. In a letter of his brother, from Heidelberg, he is "described as overseer of the Royal British ships in Canada."

Freisbach (Kreis Germersheim)

32. Johann Thomas Kern, baptized "at Freibach, September 19, 1700, son of Peter Kern of Freisbach"—went to Pennsylvania"—married at Freisbach, February 17, 1753, Maria Margaretha, daughter of Michel Jopp of Ottersheim. Children, born at Freisbach: 1. Johann Christoph, born January 25, 1753—"to Pennsylvania." 2. Anna Elisabeth, born November 20, 1753—"to Pennsylvania." 3. Johann Thomas Kern, Shin Samuel, born December 25, 1755.

35. Peter Lugenbuehl, son of Kilian Lugenbuehl of Grossbundenbach—"who emigrated to America in the year 1750." [Peter Lugenbuehl, Ship Brotherhood, November 7, 1750.]

36. Georg Peter Eckel, son of Michael Eckel of Grossbundenbach and his wife Anna Catharine Keller—"in America" [Document dated March 22, 1764]. [Georg Peter Eckel, Ship Richard & Mary, September 26, 1752.]  
37. Juliana Bach, daughter of Albrecht Bach, Sr., of Alstadt—who was married to Johann Georg Eckel at Grossbundenbach, the New Land, U.S.A.

Jacob Treibelbiss from Hassloch, "went away to the New Land some thirty years ago" (Inventory of 1764). Johann Jacob Treibelbiss was born April 10, 1709, at Hassloch, son of the carpenter Jacob Treibelbiss and his wife Anna Margaretha. [Johann Jacob Dreibelbiss, Ship Mary of London, September 1735.]

George Jacob Kaeufner, son of Johannes Kaeufner of Heuchelheim and his wife Catharina Elisabetha, "in Pennsylvania" (Document dated May 4, 1757). Cf. the Weiss family, under Muchihofen.

According to a report of the Village-Mayor of Irmenach, dated March 11, 1740, to the Government of Trarbach, Johann Peter Hein (or Henn), son of Nicol Hein of Horbruch, had "gone away in the year 1741 to the so-called New Land."

Samuel Maus, son of the councilor Friedrich Maus of Hornbach and his wife Susanna Mueller, "former citizen of Zweibruecken, but went ten years ago to America" (Inventory of 1765). [Samuel Maus, Ship Edinburgh, September 14, 1753.] See Dutcher, Winter 1954.

Hueffelsheim (Kreis Kreuznach)  
Anna Maria Reutzelie, born at Hueffelsheim August 2, 1720, daughter of the shoemaker Johann Georg Reutzelie and wife Anna Sybilla, "this child of the parish has gone to the New Land."  
Johann Jacob Viel, born at Hueffelsheim November 22, 1718, son of

Theobald Viel, "went on May 17, 1767, to the New Land." Maria Wolfskehl, born at Hoeffelsheim February 28, 1711, daughter of Theobald Viel and wife Anna Margaretha, married at Hoeffelsheim, November 19, 1730, Johannes Wolfskehl, and "went to the New Land in 1742." Johann Michel Rech, born at Hoeffelsheim March 1, 1751, son of Johann Conrad Rech and wife Anna Margaretha, "parents and children to the New Land."

Hundsbach (Kreis Kreuznach)  
Elisabetha Catharina Heyl, born at Hundsbach January 4, 1755,

who (the widow) went to the so-called New Land" (about 1755); Carl Medart, her brother, "who also (about this same time) went to America"; Valentin Medart, brother of the two preceding, "who also went to the New Land" (Document dated May 19, 1758).

Johann Valentin Clementz, son of Sebastian Clementz of Ilbesheim (1695-1765), went to the so-called New Land" (about 1754).

Hans Georg Kast, son of Hans Georg Kast of Ilbesheim and his wife Margaretha Doerner, "who traveled to America already in the year 1755." The Manumission Protocols of the Duchy of Zweibruecken

give the year of emigration as 1749. However, the emigrant is presumably Hans Jerg Kast, Ship Edinburgh, September 16, 1751.

Anna Barbara Klund, daughter of Johann Adam Klund, master shoemaker at Impflingen, "who went to the New Land" (about 1753).

Adam Hahn, lineweaver, "who already in the year 1753 went to the so-called New Land." He was the son of Johann Niclaus Hahn and his wife Anna Catharina Hahn.

Julianna Clementz, daughter of Johann Adam Clementz of Ilbesheim and his wife Anna Maria Knoll, and wife of Valentin Zahnissen, "who went to the so-called New Land" (about 1754). According to the ship lists her husband came along: Vallentin Zaneichel, Ship Barclay, September 14, 1754.

Maria Catharina Doerner, daughter Bernhard Doerner, citizen and master shoemaker of Ilbesheim and his wife Catharina Pfuster, "who was married to Niclaus Fass and is in the New Land." [Nickel Fass, Ship Royal Union, August 19, 1750.] Jacob Doerner, her brother, "who likewise went to the so-called New Land." [Jacob Doerner, Ship Phoenix, November 2, 1752.]

Peter Frutschy, of Ilbesheim, after the death of his wife Anna Regina Oberl, went with his daughter Elisabeth (born at Ilbesheim April 11, 1747), "secretly, and contrary to the governmental prohibition, to the New Land." [Johann Peter Frutzuy, Ship Neptune, October 7, 1755.]

Wilhelm Michael, master shoemaker of Ilbesheim, "went to the so-called New Land" (about 1754).

Sebastian Doerr, son of Jacob Doerr of Ilbesheim and his wife Maria Catharina, "who learned the cooper trade and became a journeyman in the year 1749 and from here traveled to America."

[Impflingen (Kreis Landau)] Margaretha Bossert, daughter of Johannes Bossert of Impflingen and his wife Margaretha, "who went from here (Impflingen) to America" (Document dated February 19, 1755).

Kandel (Kreis Germersheim) Ludwig Einsel, baker, born at Kandel June 28, 1726, "at this time established in America, in the Province of New York, at Rhinebeck." [Johann Ludwig Einsel, Ship Duke of Bedford, September 14, 1751.]

Johann Diether Beyerle, son of the blacksmith Simon Beyerle of Kandel and his wife Anna Catharina Einsel, "who has been now for some years in America" (Document of 1782). [Dieter Beyerle, Ship Crawford, October 14, 1769.]

Geo. Leonard Zoller, son of Leonard Zoller, citizen of Kandel and his wife Maria Odilia Weiss, "now 19 years absent and in America" (Property Inventory of 1784). [Geo. Leonard Zoller, Ship Hamilton, October 6, 1767.]

Friedrich Beyerle, son of Johannes Beyerle of Kandel and his wife Anna Maria Stoll, "now (1789) 16 years absent and his wife unknown." This is presumably Frederick Beyerle, Ship Union, September 30, 1774.

Anna Elisabetha Faubell, daughter of Niclaus Bald, citizen of

Johann Dieter Roedel, son of Georg Simon Roedel of Kandel and his wife Anna Apollonia, "now in America" (Document dated 1789). His brother Georg Friedrich Roedel was "also in America."

Of the six children of Jacob Burg, shoemaker at Kandel and his wife Apollonia Einsel, a document dated August 8, 1792, reports them all "absent in America." Their names were Philipp Jacob Burg, Elisabetha Margaretha Burg, Maria Elisabetha Burg, Johann Georg Burg, Maria Catharina Burg, and Maria Margaretha Burg.

*Kleinbundenbach (Kreis Zweibruecken)*

Maria Catharina Gerlinger, daughter of Philipp Jacob Gerlinger of Kleinbundenbach and his wife Agnes Kaercher, married to Andreas Dreiner (born at Dienringen in Alsace), emigrated (before 1752) to America. Both were living in Whitemarsh Township, Philadelphia County, Pennsylvania. [Andreas Dreiner, Ship Phoenix, September 15, 1749.]

Nickel Kaercher of Kleinbundenbach, "has gone to America now many years ago" (Document dated 1796). Presumably John Nicklas Kargher, Ship Richard & Mary, September 15, 1752.

*Kleinich (Kreis Bernkastel)*

Johann Nickel Beyer, son of Matthias Beyer of Kleinich, along with Johann Georg Baertges, son of Matthias Baertges from the same place, are permitted by the Sponeh Government of Trarbach, April 1748, "to go away to Pennsylvania," in order to perfect themselves in their chosen trade. Yet in case they do not return within three years, they must buy themselves free of vassalage, toward which end their coming inheritance is sequestered. Under the same conditions, with a permit dated May 14, 1748, Michael Baertges, brother of the above Georg Baertges, tanner by trade, was able to emigrate to Pennsylvania. [Michael Baertges, Ship Two Brothers, September 15, 1748.]

On the same proviso, with permit dated March 18, 1748, Johann Nickel Neu, son of Christoffel Neu of Kleinich, weaver by trade, likewise Johann Peter Velten (Fehlten), son of Conrad Velten of Kleinich, shoemaker by trade, were permitted to emigrate to America. [Peter Feltz, Ship Two Brothers, September 15, 1748.]

According to a permit from the Trarbach Government, dated April 26, 1741, Johann Conrad Lahn, tailor, son of the tanner Peter Lahn of Kleinich; likewise the lineweaver Johann Michel Neu, son of Philips Neu from the same place; and Johann Matthias Beyer, son of Johann Michel Neu from the same place; and Johann Matthais Beyer, son of the mason Matthias Beyer of Kleinich, were permitted to emigrate to Pennsylvania. Yet in case they did not return in two years, their manumission had to be paid (cf. above). The emigration of all three persons is documented in the official records. Matthias Beyer and Johann Michel Neu are said, however, to have died soon after their arrival in America. [Johann Konrad Lahn, Ship Europa, November 20, 1741.]

*Klingen (Kreis Bergzabern)*  
Andreas Frohnhaeuser, son of Mathes Frohnhaeuser and his wife  
Maria Catharina Altschuh, "who has been in the New Land 25 years"  
(Inventory of 1774).

Michel Stuebinger, son of Andreas Stuebinger of Klingen, is "now  
in the so-called New Land" (Document dated September 15, 1756).  
Georg Fischer, son of Philipp Fischer of Klingen and wife Anna  
Barbara Pauli, "is in the New Land" (Document dated July 15, 1786).

*Kuebelberg (Kreis Kusel)*

Johann Adam Wagner, son of Theobald Wagner of Kuebelberg and wife  
Barbara, "married at Schmittweiler," is "in the New Land" (Document  
dated 1758).

*Lachen (Kreis Neustadt)*

Jacob Trueb, son of David Trueb of Lachen and his wife Catharina  
Elisabetha Hammann, "residing in Pennsylvania" (Document dated  
September 29, 1772). Anna Barbara Trueb, sister of Jacob, "likewise  
residing in Pennsylvania" (Document dated September 29, 1772).

Maria Catharina Theobald of Lachen, daughter of Johannes Theobald  
of Lachen, wife of Peter Hammann, went to Pennsylvania in 1764  
with her second husband Jacob Sauerheber from Hassloch and the  
children of her first marriage. Johann Jacob Sauerheber was a  
resident of Maiden Creek Township, Berks County, Pennsylvania.  
[Jacob Sauerheber, Ship Hero, October 27, 1764.]

Maria Elisabetha Schuster, of Lachen, left her homeland unmarried  
at the age of 20 years, "now for thirty or more years away from  
Lachen and gone to America" (Property Inventory of 1784).

Andreas Jaeger went from Lachen to America in the year 1764 and  
took his niece Catharina Kercher (or Kercher) with him. The latter  
married in America Johannes Brunner of Passyunk near Philadelphia.  
Andreas Jaeger lived in Upper Paxtang, Lancaster County. [Andreas  
Jaeger, Ship Hero, September 26, 1764.]

*Lambach (Kreis Zweibruecken)*

Maria Eva Trautmann (married) and Georg Trautmann, children of  
Henrich Trautmann of Lambach and his wife Susanna Heinz of Lang-  
wieden, "have gone to the New Land" (Document dated April 9, 1749).  
[Hans George Brautman, Ship Princess Augusta, September 16, 1736.]

*Lambach (Kreis Frankenthal)*

Jacob Hoenich of Lambach, former resident (but non-citizen) of  
Lambach, who wants to go to Pennsylvania or to the New Land, is,  
on account of his meagre property, permitted gratis, likewise his  
stepdaughter Anna Maria Hauck, yet the latter must pay 12 florins  
to buy herself out of vassalage and 10 florins for the tithe (Pro-  
tocols of the Oberamt of Neustadt, 1764). [Jacob Hoenick, Ship  
Hero, October 27, 1764.]

*Limbach (Kreis Homburg, Saar)*

Jacob Leibrock, son of Johane George Leibrock of Limbach, "who  
had resided at Bischweiler (Alsace), but has now gone to Pennsyl-  
vania" (Document dated March 13, 1752). [Jacob Leibrock, Ship  
Patience, September 9, 1751.]

Philip Carl Koch, son of the Reformed pastor Georg Friedrich  
soch of Limbach, "who has learned the bookbinder's trade and has  
been about 14 years in America" (Inventory of 1790, which places  
his emigration therefore about 1776).

Johann Henrich Oberkircher, son of Wilhelm Oberkircher of Limbach  
and his wife Maria Margaretha Keller, "who about 12 years ago left  
his wife and children behind and secretly escaped from here" (In-  
ventory of 1783). [Presumably Henrich Oberkircher, Ship Sally,  
October 31, 1774.]

*Loetzebeuren (Kreis Zell, Mosel)*

Catharina Elisabetha Schnee, born at Loetzebeuren August 17, 1750,  
daughter of Johannes Schnee and wife Maria Margaretha, "went away  
to Pennsylvania in 1751." (Reference in Lutheran Church Book of  
Loetzebeuren).

Anna Margretha Dieterich, born at Loetzebeuren October 4, 1750,  
daughter of Johann Nicol Dieterich and wife Susanna Elisabetha,  
"this person has gone to Pennsylvania with her husband" (*Ibid.*).

Maria Catharina Hoff, born at Loetzebeuren May 26, 1752, daughter  
of Frantz Hoff and wife Anna Elisabetha, "went to Pennsylvania"  
(*Ibid.*).

Johann Wilhelm Luetz, born at Loetzebeuren September 12, 1752,  
son of Matthess Luetz and wife Elisabetha Catharina, "went away to  
Pennsylvania in 1751" (*Ibid.*).

Anna Elisabetha Frantz, born at Loetzebeuren March 25, 1755,  
daughter of Johann Nicol Frantz and wife Maria Elisabetha, "went to  
Pennsylvania in 1751" (*Ibid.*).

*Mannweiler (Kreis Rockenhausen)*

Valentin Froellich, son of Johann Henrich Froellich of Mannweiler  
and wife Anna Margaretha, "now absent and with his wife Apolonia  
nee Rapp as well as two children gone away to the New Land" (Docu-  
ment dated May 22, 1723).

*Mausbach (Kreis Zweibruecken)*

Daniel, Georg and Jacob Weber, sons of Philipp Weber of Mausch-  
bach, "went to America" around the year 1750, "without previously  
being manumitted from vassalage by our most gracious authorities."  
[Possibly Johann Daniel Weber, Ship Isaac, September 27, 1749.]

*Minderslachen (near Kandel)*

Anna Barbara Bohlander, daughter of Georg Beverle, citizen of  
Minderslachen, and his wife Anna Catharina Roth, married to Johann  
Adam Bohlander of Minderslachen, "who went together to the New  
Land" (about 1755). [Johannes Bohlander, Ship Good Intent, October  
5, 1754.]

Joseph Fetsch, son of Christian Fetsch of Minderslachen and his  
wife Barbara Himmiller, "who is said actually to be residing in  
Philadelphia" (about 1774). [Joseph Foetsch, Ship Union, September  
30, 1774.]

*Minfeld (Kreis Germersheim)*

Georg Michael Gross, unmarried, and Anna Maria Gross, children of  
Frantz Gross of Minfeld, "went to the New Land" (about 1751).

Hans Erhard Fosselmann, son of Ludwig Fosselmann of Minfeld and wife Maria Margaretha Schaeffer, "who now thirty years ago went to the so-called New Land" [Inventory of 1762]. [Hans Erhart Vosselmann, Ship John and William, October 17, 1732.]

Maria Elisabetha Kauffmann, sister of Erhard Fosselmann, married to the mason Johann Kauffmann, "who (about 1750) went to Zweibruecken and (about 1750) to America."

Maria Koenig and Abramann Koenig, children of Frantz Koenig, farm-steward of the cloister at Minfeld, "went to the New Land" about 1752.

Rachell Bouquet, daughter of the citizen and farm-steward of the cloister at Minfeld, "who went off single to the West Indies," Rosina Bouquet, sister of Rachell, wife of Hans Georg Hoffmann, "who likewise went to America." Matheus Bouquet, brother of the two preceding, "who likewise went away, single, and in common with the above mentioned, to America." The emigration of all three is noted in a document dated February 26, 1762.

Jacob Haen of Minfeld, "went to the New Land" (Document dated 1761). [Jacob Haen, Snow Ketty, October 16, 1752.]

Niclaus Oth, son of Michael Oth of Minfeld and wife Maria Margaretha Fosselmann, "in New England or America" (emigration about 1754). [Presumably Johann Nicolaus Ott, Ship Phoenix, November 1, 1752.]

#### Moersbach (Kreis Zweibruecken)

Michael Binckle (Benczlik), son of Hans Binckle of Moersbach, "went to America" (about 1734). The family was of Swiss origin—the official papers mention an aunt of the emigrant who died in Canton Berne. [Hans Michael Hingley, Ship Oliver, August 26, 1735.] Johann Adam Traub and Jacob Traub, sons of Heinrich Traub of Muehlhofen and his wife Maria Catharina Roeller, "who both went to the so-called New Land a year ago (1754)." [J. Adam Traub, Jacob Traub, Ship Barclay, September 4, 1754.]

Valentin Jung, son of Peter Jung, citizen resident at Muehlhofen and his wife Magdalena Fine, "who went to the so-called New Land" (about 1736). [Valentine Young, Ship Charming Nancy, October 8, 1737.] Johann Jacob Jung, brother of Valentin, "who also went there" (about 1749). Maria Catharina Jung, "who also went married Caspar Baer, and afterwards went there (i.e., America) with Jung, brother of the preceding, "who went there too." (Document dated September 15, 1756). [Johann Adam Jung, Ship Two Brothers, September 14, 1749.]

Benedict Forster, son of the citizen and master miller Ludwig Forster of Muehlhofen and his wife Anna Juditha Reuther, "to the New Land" (after 1746). [Benedict Forster, Ship Neptune, September 30, 1754.]

Franz Weiss, Abraham Weiss, Hans Peter Weiss, and Daniel Weiss, son of Jacob Weiss of Muehlhofen and his wife Margaretha Kessler, "which four children went one after the other to America; news of

them received now and then" (Property Inventory of March 16, 1763). According to official declarations of the end of April, 1750, Abraham Weiss is said to have gone with wife and children to America, from Moersheim, where he was working as a farmer. Frantz Weiss "is reported to have gone away, a single man, with his brother Abraham Weiss, to America." According to the Acts he was born April 9, 1705, at Barbelroth in the Palatinate. For Hans Peter Weiss (born May 5, 1712, at Barbelroth) the same emigration data apply as for his brother Frantz. [Johann Peter Weis, Ship Anderson, August 21, 1750.] Daniel Weiss, Ship Barclay, September 14,

[Daniel Weiss, Ship Barclay, September 14, 1754.] Daniel Weiss, daughter of Mattheis Mans of Muehlhofen and his wife Eva, "wife of Daniel Weiss, who went off the beginning of 1754 to New England." [Daniel Weiss's wife, who left Muehlhofen in the year 1754 and went to America] (cf. Daniel Weiss). Catharina Weiss (born October 6, 1709, at Barbelroth), "went to America with her husband (Kaufuer of Heuchelheim, q.v.) and Frantz and Abraham Weiss to America."

Barbara Hauswirth, daughter of Adam Zimpelmann, assistant judge of Muehlhofen, "wife of Christian Hauswirth from here (Muehlhofen), who went with her husband to America in the year 1753." [Christian Hauswirth, Ship John and Elizabeth, November 7, 1754.]

Johann Jacob Kochler, son of the assistant judge and citizen Andreas Kochler at Muehlhofen and his wife Anna Catharine Zimmer, "who now over thirteen years ago traveled to the so-called New Land" (Property Inventory of 1763). [Jacob Kochler, Ship Phoenix, September 25, 1751.]

Anna Elisabetha Meister, daughter of Peter Meister of Muehlhofen and his wife Anna Maria Kessler, "went away single from Muehlhofen to America" (Document dated June 18, 1754).

#### Mutterstadt (Kreis Ludwigsburg)

Balthasar Reymer of Mutterstadt is permitted to go to the New Land with wife and children, but must pay the tithe on his property that he is taking out of the country (Protocols of the Oberamt of Neustadt, 1753). [Balthasar Reimer, Ship Brothers, September 30, 1754.]

#### Niederlustadt (Kreis Germersheim)

Peter Roth, son of the blacksmith Peter Roth of Niederlustadt and his wife Maria Barbara Stadler, "who went to Pennsylvania in the year 1753 and left in this neighborhood at Offenbach his wife, Margaret nee Lutz, besides a little son, Friedrich Roth, aged eight years." [Johann Peter Roth, Ship Rowand, September 19, 1753.]

Andreas Ott, son of Georg Ott of Niederlustadt and his wife Catharina Groh, "went to the New Land" (about 1750).

#### Niedermesau (today Missau, Kreis Kusel)

Gertrud Franck, daughter of Johannes Franck of Niedermesau and her wife Anna Catharina Rheinberger of Otterberg, "married to Henrich Kohl in the New Land"; her sister Anna Maria was "married to

Valentin Hoffmann in the New Land" (Document dated April 1, 1762).  
*Oberkleinich (Kreis Bernkastel)*  
 According to a report of the Village-Mayor of Kleinich to the Government of Trarbach, dated May 8, 1741, Maria Catharina and Nickel Lahm, children of Matthias Lahm of Oberkleinich, want "to go to the New Land." [Johann Nicklaus Lahm, Ship Lydia, September 29, 1741.] In a report to the Sponheim Government, dated May 12, 1741, the Village-Mayor of Irsenach wrote: "I wish herewith to report that in the past year, as I recently learned, two young apprentices have gone to the so-called New Land under the pretense of completing their apprenticeship. One of them, by the name of Johann Peter Lorentz, was born in the village of Hoschidt (=Hochscheid), the other, Johann Peter Lahm, was a native of Oberkleinich." According to an entry of the Government of Trarbach, dated 1740, they were both described as actually emigrated "to the New Land." [Peter Lorentz, Peter Lahm, Ship Lydia, September 27, 1740.]

*Oberlustadt (Kreis Germersheim)*  
 Daniel Hoffmann, son of Jacob Hoffman of Oberlustadt and Christina Brueckner, his second wife, "who went to the New Land" (Document dated August 30, 1758). [Either Daniel Hoffman, Ship Neptune, September 30, 1753, or Daniel Hoffman, Ship Robert and Alice, September 5, 1759.]

Johann Jakob Fauth, son of Bernhard Fauth of Oberlustadt and wife Katharina Haf, "went to America" (about 1765). [Jacob Fauth, Ship Catharina Heintz, daughter of Johann Adam Theiss of Oberlustadt and wife Magdalena Schmitt, "who married Georg Jakob Heintz of Rottmania." Louisa, her sister, "married Jacob Fauth from here and likewise went to Pennsylvania."]

Georg Adam Horter, son of Jacob Horter of Oberlustadt and Agnes Sonland his wife, "who now 12 years ago went to Pennsylvania" (Property Inventory of 1768, which places the date of emigration about 1756).

Basic to genealogical research in this country are the eighteenth century immigrant lists being assembled by scholars abroad. Dr. Friedrich Krebs, one of the principal researchers in Germany today, here concludes an article which was begun two issues back. The areas from which so many thousands emigrated two centuries ago.

*Oberlustadt (Kreis Germersheim)*  
 Barbara Horter, "widow of Georg Horter, deceased citizen at Oberlustadt, left here about a year ago for the so-called New England with her son Veltin Horter. Also there was a son of hers by the name of Georg Jacob Horter who went to the above-mentioned New England several years ago" (Inventory of 1765). [Johann Valtin Horter, Ship Britannia, September 26, 1764.]

Georg Adam Jahraus, son of Andreas Jahraus of Oberlustadt and his

wife Margaretha Schmid, "residing in America" (Document dated October 30, 1786).

Anna Elisabetha Schmitt, daughter of Andreas Schmitt of Oberlustadt and his wife Catharina Jahraus, "wife of Friedrich Doll, inhabitant of Pennsylvania" (Document dated March 30, 1770).

Anna Apolonia Sigrist, daughter of Martin Sigrist of Oberlustadt and wife Catharina Boehm, "went to Pennsylvania" (about 1744).

*Oberniesau (today Niesau, Kreis Kusel)*

Nickel Lang, son of Johannes Lang of Oberniesau and wife Anna Catharina, "went to the New Land" (about 1735) with wife and children, from Waldmohr, where he was then residing. His step-sister Eva Rosina Jacobi, daughter of Martin Jacobi of Oberniesau, went to America at the same time, presumably with her brother, and was there married to Friedrich Steffinger. Her sister Catharina Jacobi went "to the New Land" with her, along with her husband Valentin Neu. [Fallendin Neu, Nickel Lang, Ship Harle, September 1, 1756.] Christian Hammel, son of Bernhard Hammel of Oberniesau, "went to the New Land in 1734 as an apprentice butcher."

*Obersweuzen (Kreis Frankenthal)*

Paul Fried, son of the Anabaptist (Mennonite) Peter Fried of Obersweuzen, "went to the New Land" (Document dated June 6, 1747).

Johann Jacob Fuchs, son of Georg Heinrich Fuchs of Obersweuzen, "who is in the New Land" (Document dated June 17, 1758).

Lorenz Beck, of Obersweuzen, "in the New Land" (Document dated 1771). [Johan Loretz Beck, Ship Hero, November 27, 1764.]

*Ottersheim (Kreis Kirchheimbolanden)*

Henrich Lebkuecher, son of Johann Adam Lebkuecher of Ottersheim, "last summer (1755) for the second time went to the New Land, with-out paying the tithe." [Henrich Lebkuecher, Ship Lydia, September 20, 1743.]

*Ottersheim (Kreis Germersheim)*

Conrad Doll, son of Georg Doll of Ottersheim and wife Anna Margaretha Weinheimer, "this man is in America" (Document dated March 21, 1753).

Georg Kunz, son of Valentin Kuhn of Ottersheim, "is said to reside in the New Land," according to a letter written April 26,

1747 from "Carlsbad" (Charleston) in South Carolina."

*Rohrbach (Kreis Bergzabern)*

Philipp and Andreas Boudmont, sons of Philipp Boudmont, citizen of Rohrbach (died 1762), "who both are in the New Land for the 12th year" (Inventory of 1762). [Andre Baudmont, Ship Osgood, September 29, 1750.]

Peter Dorst, son of Peter Dorst of Rohrbach and his wife Maria Catharina, "who is in the New Land" (Document dated May 12, 1762).

Hans Georg Hoffmann, son of Georg Bernhardt Hoffmann of Rohrbach

and his wife Maria Elisabetha, "married in the New Land" (Document dated January 14, 1765).

Adam Beckenbaub, son of Jacob Beckenbaub of Rohrbach and wife Anna, "who went about 15 years ago to the New Land" (Property

Inventory of 1766). [Hans Adam Beckenbaub, Ship Neptune, September 30, 1754.]

Hans Peter Hoffmann, son of Hans Georg Hoffmann of Rohrbach and wife Margaretha, "who has now been living in the New Land over nine years" (Inventory of 1742). [Presumably Johann Peter Hofman, Ship Dragon, September 30, 1752.]

Rumbach (*Kreis Pirmasens*)

Margaretha Catharina Bley, daughter of Jacob Neuhard, assistant judge at Rumbach and his wife Anna Barbara, "married to Adam Bley, citizen here (at Rumbach) and in the Spring (1753) emigrated to America with her husband (and) Bley."

Georg Michael Schaeffer, son of Heinrich Schaeffer, citizen at Rumbach and his wife Anna Maria Schneider, "who has been a citizen here at Rumbach and emigrated secretly to America in the year 1766."

Susanna Catharina Schaub, Heinrich Schaub, Maria Dorothea Schaub, children of Balthasar Schaub of Rumbach, "emigrated to America" (Document dated June 23, 1770). [Henry Schaub, Ship Sally, November 10, 1767.] Of Susanna Catharina Schaub the records report, "now married to Jacob Neuhard the blacksmith, citizen at Rumbach, and several years ago emigrated to America" (Document dated 1770). Of Maria Dorothea: "Now married to Georg Michael Schaeffer, citizen here and likewise gone to America with the above mentioned."

St. Julian (*Kreis Kusel*)

Johann Henrich Altmann, mason, son of Henrich Altmann of Sienbachenbach, married at St. Julian, January 18, 1746, to Maria Barbara Soffel, born at St. Julian October 5, 1723, daughter of Bernhard Soffel of St. Julian and wife Maria Engel, "both emigrated to Pennsylvania with six children May 15, 1764." Children: born at St. Julian: 1. Maria Sara, born July 6, 1747. 2. Anna Margaretha, born November 20, 1749 ("died on the way to America in 1764"). 3. Maria Elisabetha, born August 14, 1752. 4. Maria Catharina, born December 11, 1754. 5. Johann Nicol, born March 3, 1764 ("died on the way to America in the same year"). 6. Anna Elisabetha, born August 27, 1760. All references from the Lutheran Church Book of St. Julian.

Children, born at St. Julian: 1. Johann Georg, born March 11, 1760. 2. Maria Magdalena Elisabetha, born November 25, 1762. 3. Johann Peter, born November 10, 1757. [Abraham Jacob, Ship Richmond, October 20, 1764.]

[Abraham Jacob, Ship Richmond, October 20, 1764.] Johann Nicol Grimm, widower, married (1st) at St. Julian November 27, 1736, to Anna Elisabetha, widow of Adam Jeckel; married (2d) at St. Julian May 25, 1751, to Maria Magdalena, daughter of Johannes [—] Dicks of Baumholder, "both migrated to Pennsylvania with [—] children, May 15, 1764" (Reference in Lutheran Church Book of St. Julian). Johannes Heill, son of Michael Heill, resident and citizen at Waldmohr and his wife Maria Catharina Schaeffer, "went to the New Land" (Document dated March 10, 1745).

Philipp Nickel Balbierer, son of Henrich Balbierer of Waldmohr and his wife Maria Barbara, baptized March 22, 1712, at Kleinottweiler, went to America in 1750 with the family of Franz Kunz. [Philipp Nickel Balbierer, Ship Edinburgh, August 13, 1750.]

Valentin Blum, blacksmith, "by trade a nailsmith, in the New Land," likewise his sister Eva Elisabetha, who was married to him. [Valentin Blum, Ship Richmond, October 20, 1764.]

Walhausen (*Kreis Zweibruecken*)

Heinrich Haller, son of the citizen and master tailor Jacob Haller of Walhausen, from his first marriage with Elisabeth Moeller, "deserted from the old Ducal Body Guard and emigrated to Pennsylvania." This emigration took place around 1748. His property, specifically an inheritance which later fell to him, a sum of 102 florins 11 batzen and 6 pfennig, was therefore confiscated by the Zweibruecken authorities, since his emigration took place without manumission. Peter Brummeler, baptized at Weingarten April 28, 1726, son of Johannes Brummeler and wife Anna Margaretha, "went away to Pennsylvania without previous permission" about 1749. According to a power of attorney authorized by him, dated August 15, 1766, Peter Brummeler was settled in Augusta County in the Province of Vir- ginia.

Weisenheim am Sand (Kreis Neustadt)  
Anna Barbara Reitenbach, daughter of Jacob Reitenbach of Weisenheim am Sand and his wife Gertrud Keller, was taken along to America in the year 1764 by the brother of her father Michel Reidenbach of Weisenheim. In America she married Michel Tauer. Michel Reidenbach's first emigration took place about 1744. In the year 1764 he returned to Weisenheim, to receive an inheritance had died in Pennsylvania. His brother Johann Heinrich Schmidt went to America in 1754. From him there is a letter from Philadelphia, received November 21, 1754, which describes the sea voyage and trip across to America.

Children, born at Zeiskam: 1. Agatha Geiss, born September 29, 1747. 2. Johann Jacob Geiss, born December 27, 1748. 3. Maria Barbara, born January 5, 1750. According to official records the family went to America about 1751 and according to a power of attorney of Philip Jacob Geiss, dated May 28, 1763, was settled in the Township, Berks County, Pennsylvania. (Philip Jacob Geiss' ship Phoenix, September 25, 1751.) Philip Jacob Geiss, born at Zeiskam June 4, 1753, son of Frederick Eberhardt, master weaver, and his wife Elisabetha, at Zeiskam, "who has gone away to America" (Document dated June 22, 1772). [Presumably Andrew Eberhardt, ship Bannister, October 21, 1754.]

Lorentz Schmitt, surgeon and barber, son of Mathes Schmitt, citizen at Billigheim, married at Zeiskam, May 14, 1748, Maria Helena Ruth, daughter of Johannes Ruth of Zeiskam. After his marriage Lorentz Schmitt was surgeon and barber at Zeiskam. Children, born at Zeiskam: 1. Johanna, born May 25, 1749, "has gone to the new Land"; 2. Philipp Peter, born September 22, 1750. Source: Reformed Church book of Zeiskam. According to governmental records Maria Helena Schmitt, nee Guth, intended in 1751 to go with her husband and their children to the "New Land" and on that account had given inheritance paid out to her. According to another reference dated 1757 they had "gone away to America about six years ago." [See "Kraut, Ship Phoenix, September 25, 1751.]

Johann Peter Zwicker, citizen at Zeiskam, married at Zeiskam August 9, 1753, Maria Magdalena Haffner. Children, all born at Zeiskam: 1. Johann Peter, baptized May 24, 1756, "went to the New land with his father and mother". 2. Magdalena, baptized August 4,

In the Reynell Papers, recently acquired by The Historical Society of Pennsylvania, is an Invoice of goods shipped from London, July, 1738, on board the *Elizabeth*, Edward Kervell Master, for account of Daniel Flaxney and consigned to John Reynell, a Philadelphia merchant; this being the following indentured passengers: Listed as "7 servants"—

- John Richards, Gardner, 4 years
- Edu. Hancock, Butcher, 4 years
- Nth. Manton, Surgeon, 4 years
- Goo. Goodman, Butcher, 4 years

The passages, at £5. each, were charged on invoice at £35.0.0 and the "Clothes £c." at £3. each, or £21.0.0, making a total of £50.

This is the first instance which has come to my attention where servants were entered on an invoice; and I have examined hundreds of such papers for the early eighteenth century.

The Lutheran Church Register of the village of Staudernheim, in the Nahe Valley near Bad Kreuznach in the Northern Palatinate, belongs in the rare category of Palatine church books which contain a notable number of references to 18th century emigrants.

In the case of emigration, the minister—in the classical Latin of the clergy and the university—added a note to the record of his lost parishioner's baptism—"Americanus factus"—"became an American."

Emigration from 18th century Staudernheim involved three destinations—America, Prussia, and Poland. Some ninety persons left the village for America in the years 1738-1750, with the high point coming in the years 1739 and 1741, when entire families left together for Pennsylvania.

But there was also emigration into Prussia, sponsored by the Hohenzollerns in their attempt to build up Brandenburg and Pomerania. This movement (30 persons) took place in 1747 and 1748 and other unlisted years, and the pastor designated his loss with the Latin phrase "Borusseus factus"—"became a Prussian"; for this emigration see Otto Gebhard, *Friederizianische Pfälzerkolonien in Brandenburg und Pommern* (Stettin, 1939).

Emigration to Poland (Galicia), involving fifteen persons from Staudernheim, took place around 1783 and 1784. It is significant that there are in this list some cases of one member of a family heading westward across the Atlantic to Pennsylvania, another turning up later in the German-speaking settlements of Eastern Europe.

The Latin and German phrases given in parentheses are quotations from the original church register; the materials in brackets giving arrivals in Philadelphia are, as usual in our emigrant lists, from the colonial ship-lists as published in Strassburger and Hinke *Pennsylvania German Pioneers* (Norristown, Pennsylvania: The Pennsylvania German Society, 1934). [Readers should note also that the emigrants are arranged by family, and that in not every case did the head of a family emigrate].

The materials have been translated from Hugo Fröhlich, "Auswanderer im lutherischen Kirchenbuch von Staudernheim an der Nahe," which appeared in *Witterungen zur Wanderungsgeschichte der Pfalz*, edited by Dr. Fritz Braun of the *Heimatstelle Pfalz*, Kaiserslautern, and published as a supplement to *Pfälzische Familien- und Wappenkunde*, 1954, to whose editorial board we are grateful for the privilege of reprinting these unusual materials.

Vorliegende kurze Zusammenstellung gibt ein Verzeichnis der Auswanderer nach Nordamerika (Pennsylvania) an Hand der Einträge und Marginalien im lutherischen Kirchenbuch von Thaleischweiler.  
Solche Auswanderungsvermerke sind besonders wertvoll, weil sie in den Kirchenbüchern nur selten anzutreffen sind, jedoch eine sehr wesentliche Quelle für die Erfassung der Auswanderung des 18. Jahrhunderts bilden. Die betr. Kirchenbücher enthalten sowohl im Heirats- wie im Taufregister Einträge; leider weist jedoch das Heiratsregister gerade für die wichtigen Jahre 1751/53 eine Lücke auf. Die Kinder der Auswanderer wurden versuchsweise auch mit aufgenommen, wenn nicht im Kirchenbuch bis zur Auswanderung ihr Todestag nachgewiesen werden konnte. Wie in den Veröffentlichungen Gerbers über die Auswanderung aus Württemberg aus Kirchenbüchern des 18. Jahrhunderts stellt auch hier die Handwerker einen erheblichen Prozentsatz der Auswanderer, da diese in Amerika in jener Zeit sehr gesucht waren. Dass Belehrte wegen verfrühter Konkubination oder Mütter mit unehelichen Kindern auswanderten, ist ebenfalls nicht selten. (Vgl. auch Gerber: „Beiträge z. Auswanderung nach Amerika im 18. Jahrhundert.“ Stuttgart 1928 S. 4).  
Was die zeitliche Gliederung der Auswanderung betrifft, so kann man eine kleine Wanderung um 1738/39 und zwei größere um 1749/50 und 1763/65, die als Hauptauswanderung unterscheiden.

Again we turn to the local government records of Germany for information on eighteenth-century emigrants to Pennsylvania. The source of the present emigrant list is the Protocols of the Districts (*Oberämter*) of Heidelberg and Mosbach, which in the eighteenth century were part of the dominions of the Electors of the Palatinate, but today form part of the state of Württemberg-Baden.

These emigrants from the Electoral Palatinate had to pay a fee for their manumission from vassalage, besides the additional tax of the "Tenth Penny" or Tithe, (*Zehnten Pfennig*)—the tenth part of their property. Those without property were however manumitted gratis.

We have included in this list persons whose destination was not expressly stated as "America," if their names could be found in the Pennsylvania Ship Lists of the particular year involved. As far as

Johannes Euler, citizen and master blacksmith at Hohensachsen (Kr. Mannheim), is manumitted upon payment of 10 florins (gulden) for the Tenth Penny. [Johannes Euler, Ship *Patience*, September 19, 1749.]

Leon[hard] Eberle, of Eiterbach (Kr. Heidelberg), may go to the "New Land"...with his wife and three children, with the permission of the electoral government, upon payment of 4 florins to buy himself out of vassalage, and 40 florins for the additional tax.

Jacob Grauer [Krauss], inhabitant of Daisbach (Kr. Sinsheim), is, on account of his poverty and propertyless state, manumitted gratis in order to go to the New Land with his wife and children. [Jacob Krauss, Ship *Dragon*, September 26, 1749.]

Philipp Georg Müller, of Meckesheim (Kr. Heidelberg), is permitted to go to the New Land with wife and two children, upon payment of 10 florins for the additional tax. [Pipf Georg Müller, Ship *Chesterfield*, September 2, 1749.]

Johann Michael Müller, of Meckesheim (Kr. Heidelberg), leaving behind the Tenth Penny on his Property, may go to Pennsylvania in the hope of better luck.... [Johann Michael Müller, Ship *Speed-well*, September 26, 1749.]

Jacob Frey, of Wieblingen (today part of Heidelberg), may go free upon payment of the Tenth Penny. [Jacob Frey, Ship *Dragon*, September 26, 1749.]

George Lintz, Philipp Brenner, and Georg Kumpff, from Asbach (Kr. Mosbach), receive permission to emigrate to the New Land, upon payment of the Tenth Penny. Georg Lintz must also pay 10 florins for his manumission. [Jerg Lintz, Hans Philipp Brenner, Ship *Patience*, September 19, 1749.]

Wilhelm Besch, from Mittelschefflenz (Kr. Mosbach) may go to Pennsylvania.

Jacob Behr and Martin Treibel, from Eberbach (Kr. Heidelberg), may go to [New] England upon payment of the Tenth Penny. [Johann Jacob Behr, Martin Treibel, Ship *Jacob*, October 2, 1749.]

Peter Ehret, from Mittelschefflenz, may emigrate to New England upon payment of the Tenth Penny.

Adam Ludwig and Jacob Bender, from Burken (Neckarburken), receive permission to emigrate to New England. [Hans Adam Ludwig, Ship *Patience*, September 19, 1749.]

Peter Spohn, from Scholbrunn (Scholbrunn, Kr. Mosbach), may go to New England upon payment of 14 florins for manumission from vas-

salage and 14 florins for the Tenth Penny. [Peter Spohn, Ship *Patience*, September 19, 1749.]

Michel Zilling, from Mittelschefflenz, wants to emigrate to New England. [Michel Zilling, Ship *Patience*, September 19, 1749.]

Johann Battenfeld, from Michelbach (Kr. Mosbach), receives permission to go with his wife, two sons and three daughters, to the New Land, upon payment of the Tenth Penny at 50 florins. [Johannes Battenfeld, Ship *Two Brothers*, August 28, 1750.]

Johann Adam Eberle, from Eiterbach (Kr. Heidelberg), is manumitted upon payment of 10 florins for manumission and 9 florins additional tax. [Adam Eberle, Ship *Brothers*, August 24, 1750.]

Johann Georg Ganshorn, from Bammalten (Kr. Heidelberg), baker, may emigrate gratis. [Hans Jörg Ganshorn, Ship *Two Brothers*, August 24, 1750.]

Johann Mathias Gerner, of Helmstadt (Kr. Sinsheim) wants to go to the so-called New Land. [Johan Matthes Gerner, Ship *Two Brothers*, August 28, 1750.]

Johann Georg Koberstein and Johanna Georg Ludwig, of Zudenhausen (Kr. Sinsheim), are permitted to go to the so-called New Land with their wives, Anna Catharina and Maria Margaretha; yet the former must pay 3 florins, the latter 2 florins 36 kreuzer Manumission Tax. [Hans Georg Koberstein, Johan George Ludwig, Ship *Osgood*, September 29, 1750.]

Johann Friedrich Mueller, of Meckesheim (Kr. Heidelberg), is permitted to go to the so-called New Land, upon payment of 2 florins on his property of 20 florins.

Johann Adam Wolfarth, an orphaned citizen's son from Spechbach (Kr. Heidelberg), is released from vassalage upon payment of 20 florins and granted the right of emigration on payment of 18 florins additional tax. [Johann Adam Wolfart, Ship *Brothers*, August 24, 1750.]

light on the difficulties faced by the Palatine serfs of the 18th Century when it came to emigration.

In many respects, the emigrants of those earlier times had, even from the side of the authorities, to struggle with much greater difficulties than the emigrants of the present day, whose departure is rather encouraged by the state. For their release from bondage as subjects and their manumission from serfdom, a special duty had to be paid, besides the so-called "Tenth Penny," a sum to the extent of 10% of the emigrant's property. Yet emigrants with no means were "manumitted" anyway. But for secret emigration, the penalty was mostly the confiscation of the property. There are these facts to be noticed in the following.

From Edenkoben, then under the rule of the Electoral Palatinate, there emigrated in the 18th Century, according to the Protocols of the Bailiwick of Neustadt, a comparatively large number of persons. Actually the number may have been still higher, due to secret emigration. Many of these emigrants' names can be located in the Pennsylvania Ship Lists.

For instance, in 1750 Jacob Körner of Edenkoben, who was going to Pennsylvania with his wife, was released from serfdom gratis, likewise in 1751 George Krauss, with wife and two children. In 1752 Nicolas Leonhard, who had secretly emigrated around 1749, requested manumission so that his inheritance could be handed over to him. His request was granted, yet he had to pay 35 florins (guldens) for his manumission, for the "Tenth Penny" 31 florins, and for the Military Treasury, in lieu of military service unrendered, 7 florins. His brother Wilheil Leonhard, who later also wanted to emigrate, was described as an "ill-behaved and absolute petitioner" (*ohnmürtiger und läderlicher Supplicant*), so that his request for emigration could be granted with no difficulties at all.

In 1752 Martin Grün, Heinrich Schenkel, and Christoph Müller went to "Pennsylvania." They had to pay all the aforementioned duties, except Martin Grün who, because of his having no property, was manumitted without charge. But the request for emigration met with great difficulties in the case of the three stepdaughters of Martin Grün—Anna Barbara, Maria Elisabetha, and Maria Catharina Frank—who were such good workers, at the best age for working, and so plainly valued by the Electoral Government that they received manumission reluctantly and only after long struggles.

For the same year, 1752, a great emigration year, Philipp Carl Schenkel and Jacob Weide of Edenkoben also went as emigrants to North America; all manumitted gratis on account of their poverty. Likewise in 1752 came the departure from Edenkoben of Jacob Schus-Zweibrücken Government, with the husband of the latter. The departure of other persons, Abraham Sonntag and Jacob Schenkel, occasioned serious apprehensions on the part of the Electoral Government, on account of the competition with Pfalz-Zweibrücken, which also possessed serfs in Edenkoben.

But when the Mayor of Edenkoben reported that the Electoral Palatinate possessed 315 men and 377 women as serfs in Edenkoben, while Zweibrücken could muster only 36 men and 40 women, the right of departure was granted the petitioners for the payment of a small duty, or even gratis, "because they have so little property and cannot make a good living in Edenkoben."

Johann Adam Hartmann took the shortest road—he left the land very suddenly, for he had killed a stag on the government preserves and faced a heavy penalty! In 1764 he sailed under a false name on the Ship *Boston*, and so after his landing in Philadelphia, escaped legal prosecution!

Following our interest in determining the European homes of our Pennsylvania emigrant pioneers, we publish here a list of Palatine emigrants who came to Pennsylvania in the 18th Century, translated from Dr. Fritz Braun, "Auswanderung aus dem heutigen Stadtgebiet von Ludwigshafen am Rhein im 18. Jahrhundert," from *Landesdruckerei und drausen—Heimatstelle Pfalz—Mitteilungen zur Wanderungsgeschichte der Pfälzer*, series 5 (1953), pp. 25-51. We have not included in this list the emigrants who moved eastward into Eastern Europe into the German settlements in Galicia, the Banat, the Batschka, nor the few who came to French Guiana.—D. I.

1. Bayer, Catharina, daughter of Adam and Marie Bayer of Oppau, married April 1729, Conrad Netzel, born 1697 in "Waldsiefer," emigrated 1720 or earlier to Pennsylvania.

2. Bechtel, Franz Ludwig, from Oppau, born circa 1699, died York County, Pennsylvania, August 1778, married before 1732, Susanna [—], Reformed, came to Pennsylvania on the Ship *Winter Galley*, September 5, 1738. The family were Moravians and lived for awhile at Bethlehem, Pa., with branches in York County and North Carolina.

3. Büttner (Bittner), (Johann) Caspar, Lutheran, married at Maudach, June 14, 1729, Maria Elisabetha Minich, daughter of Jean Noe Minich of Dannstadt and wife Johanna. Arrived at Philadelphia on the Ship *Thistle of Glasgow*, August 29, 1730. On the same ship was Johannes Munch (Hans Minich), the father-in-law. In 1763-4 Peter Büttner of Maudach emigrated to Cayenne in French Guiana. From the Dannstadt Church Registers, furnished by Dr. Eyslein.

4. Eichert, Christian, from Oppau, a Mennonite, received permission gratis in 1752 to emigrate to Nova Scotia, with wife and two children. From the *Neustadter Oberamtsprotokolle* (Protocols of the District of Neustadt), Palatine State Archives, Speyer, furnished by Dr. Friedrich Krebs.

S. Glatz, Heinrich, of Oppau, who appears in records of 1752 as wanting to go to Pennsylvania, was "unumitted gratis on account of his having no property." From the Neustadter Oberamtsprotokolle.

6. Hergott (Hergot), Johann Peter, citizen of Oggersheim, received in 1754 permission to emigrate to Pennsylvania, with his wife and children. The tax granted upon payment of 60 florins tax paid 30 florins for his step-son, Christoph Braun. They arrived at Philadelphia on the Ship Two Brothers, August 28, 1750. On the same ship was Balthasar Loeffel (Loefler), q.v., also of Oggersheim. From the Neustadter Oberamtsprotokolle.

7. Joachim Friedrich, and wife, of Edigsheim, received permission in 1764, upon payment of the "Tenth Penny or Tithe," to emigrate to Pennsylvania, and arrived at Philadelphia on the Ship Britannia, September 26, 1764. From the Neustadter Oberamtsprotokolle.

8. Keppler, Simon, of Oggersheim, emigrated to America in 1754, arriving in Philadelphia on the Ship Nancy, September 14, 1754. In 1753 he petitioned for the remittance of his inheritance, which was granted after paying a double portion of the Tithe. From the Neustadter Oberamtsprotokolle.

9. Loeffel (Loeffler), Balthasar, of Oggersheim, received permission in 1750 to emigrate to Pennsylvania, on paying 19 florins for the Tithe. He arrived at Philadelphia on the Ship Two Brothers, August 28, 1750, with Johann Peter Hergott (q.v.). From the Neustadter Oberamtsprotokolle.

10. Nieck (Nick), Anna Regina, born at Rheingönheim, April 22, 1737, died at Lititz, Pennsylvania, March 10, 1768. For seven years she was in service in the Fenstermacher Family (from Meisenheim) in Lititz, Pennsylvania.

11. Reuther, Anna Margaretha, of Oppau, daughter of Hans Jacob Reuther, married Abraham Reiber of Sandhofen, arrived at Philadelphia on the Ship Zraxon, October 17, 1749. The Reiber Family settled in Goschenhoppen, Pennsylvania, in the house of Hans Bauer, and inquired after the family of Franz Ludwig Beroth (q.v.), according to Anita L. Eyster, "Notices by German Settlers in German Newspapers," Pennsylvania German Folklore Society, Volume III (Allentown, 1938). According to the Oppauer Nahrungszeitet for June 12, 1718, Hans Jakob Reuther, aged 47, had the following family: (1) Mathes, aged 19; (2) Catharina, aged 15; (3) Susanne, aged 11; (4) Anna Margaretha, aged 9; and (5) Hans Stefan, aged 3, baptized January 27, 1715. Anna Margaretha was therefore 40 years old at the time of her emigration.

12. Sachs, Daniel, of Oggersheim, received permission in 1751 to emigrate to Pennsylvania, with wife and children, upon payment of a Tithe of 16 florins. From the Neustadter Oberamtsprotokolle.

This short new list of Palatine emigrants of the eighteenth century is derived from an extract from the Protocols of the District of Neustadt in the Electoral Palatinate for the year 1750. Since these government protocols contain only the record of permission to emigrate, and, strictly speaking, do not prove emigration itself, it is quite necessary for the historian and genealogist to search the respective church registers to determine whether the supposed "emigrant" actually left the community or not.

In the present instance this further research has been omitted, since most of the persons who applied for permission to emigrate actually do appear in the ships' lists of emigrants landing at Philadelphia. Our references to ships and dates appended in brackets after almost every item, are naturally from Strasburger-Hinke, *Pennsylvania German Pioneers* (Norristown, Pa.: The Pennsylvania German Society, 1924).

The few persons whose names do not appear in these official lists, can be assumed also to have emigrated, yet the cautionary statement is always necessary. The Protocols of the District of Neustadt are part of the holdings of the Palatine State Archives at Speyer. -4. K.

1. Jacob Ackermann, citizen at Weidenthal, is permitted, along with his wife and three children, and upon payment of 10 florins for the "Tenth Penny" [Zehnter Pfennig], to go to Pennsylvania. [Jacob Ackermann, Ship Anderson, August 21, 1750.]

2. Peter Franck and Jacob Brickert, inhabitants of Lachen, are permitted along with their wives and children, and upon payment of the "Tenth Penny" which amounts to 27 florins for the former and 5 florins 30 kreuzer for the latter, to go to Pennsylvania. [Jacob Bricker, Ship Sandwich, November 30, 1750.]

3. Mathias Brückert, of Lachen, is permitted to go to Pennsylvania gratis. [Mathias Brückert, Ship Brotherhood, November 3, 1750.]

4. Philipp Rheinhard Gassmann, the citizen of Winzingen [today part of the City of Neustadt], is permitted, along with his wife and three children, to go to Pennsylvania. [Philipp Gassmann, Ship Sandwich, November 30, 1750.]

5. Johannes Guscha, of Weidenthal, is permitted, along with his wife and two children, to go to Pennsylvania gratis.

6. Peter Hergott, the citizen of Oggersheim, is permitted, along with his wife and children, upon payment of 60 florins supplementary tax and 30 florins for his stepson Christoph Braun, to go to Pennsylvania. [Peter Hergott, Ship Two Brothers, August 28, 1750.]

7. Balthasar Loeffel, of Oggersheim, is permitted, upon payment of 19 florins for the "Tenth Penny," to emigrate with his wife to

Pennsylvania. [Balsasar Löffler, Ship *Two Brothers*, August 28, 1750.]

8. Andreas Muehlschlaegel, the Reformed schoolmaster [Schuldien-  
ner] of Weidenthal, is permitted to go to Pennsylvania, but must  
first pay the supplementary tax (Tenth Penny) upon his property of  
300 florins. [Johann Andreas Mühlslägel, Ship Patience, August  
11, 1750.]

9. David Schmitt, of Weidenthal, is permitted, upon payment of 5 florins supplementary tax (Tenth Penny), to emigrate with his wife and three daughters to Pennsylvania. [David Smith, *Ship Patience*, August 11, 1750.]

Die folgenden Namen sind dem oben genannten Akt A 413 BÜ 133 (Auswanderung aus dem Oberamt Urach) entnommen. Teilweise sind die aus dem genannten Akt schon in der Abhandlung von Donald Herbert Yoder, "Emigrants from Württemberg, The Adolf Gerber lists. The Pennsylvania German Folklore Society" Bd. 10 (1945) publiziert, wobei allerdings nicht der obige Akt, sondern die Oberratsprotokolle der Quelle dienten. (Soweit die Namen in der Abh. von Yoder schon publiziert sind, wurden sie hier natürlich nicht berücksichtigt.) Der genannte Akt enthält die Namen einer grösseren Anzahl von Personen, die in den Jahren 1758/54 die Erlaubnis zur Auswanderung nach Amerika erhielten. Nicht alle, die diese Erlaubnis erhielten erscheinen in den Schiffslisten des Hafens von Philadelphia, sei es, dass sie überhaupt nicht auswanderten, was nur durch mühvolle Nachforschungen in den Kirchenbüchern festgestellt werden könnte, sei es, dass sie unterwegs umkamen und Amerika nicht erreichen, sei es, dass sie in einem anderen Hafen als dem von Philadelphia landeten. Aber auch selbst die von Hinke und Strasserbrughaegelebene Schiffslisten des Hafens von Philadelphia sind nicht vollständig und verzeichnen nicht alle dort gelandeten Schiffe.

Auf ihr Bürgerrecht mussten die Auswanderungswilligen beim Verlassen der Heimat verzichten. Außerdem wurde ihnen mitgeteilt, dass der regressus in patriam (Rückkehr ins Vaterland) ihnen nicht mehr gestattet würde. Als Motiv für die Auswanderung, soweit dies überhaupt angegeben ist, erscheint immer die materielle Not. Eine Zeitraum von 1749-1751 spricht die Tatsache, dass nach einem Bericht des englischen Ursach v. 31. 3. 1751 allein 39 Personen aus dem Ort Dettingen „entschlossen waren, nach Neu-England zu ziehen, in der Hoffnung ihre bessere Nahrung und Versorgung alda zu finden, weil sie meistestens arme Leuth und wenig im Vermögen haben“, und diese Erlaubnis unter den oben genannten Bedingungen erhielten. Berger von Dettingen, beide ungefähr 30 J., mit dem Kindern Maria Elisabetha (10 J.) und Georg Christoph (3 J.). 1751 durften Hans Jerg Spohn von Hüßen mit Familie nach Pennsilvanien ziehen (Hans Jerg Spohn, Ankunft Philadelphia, 24. 9. 1751, Schiff Neptune), desgleichen Hans Jacob Schewller, Schuhmacher zu Metzingen, mit Weib und Tochter ebenfalls nach Amerika (Neuschottland); (vermutl. Jacob Schewller, Ankunft Philadelphia, 19. 9. 1752, Schiff Edinburgh); 1752 durften endlich der Schulmeister Jacob Kohler (66 J.) mit Weib (68 J.) und einer Tochter und dem Sohn Johann Georg, Jacob Mack, Christoff Pfaff, Heinrich Schindler, Johannes Müller, alle von Donnstetten, und der Küfer Balthasar Schmid von Feldstetten („kann mit seinem Küferhandwerk auf der Alp nichts verdienen“) zu den üblichen Bedingungen nach Amerika auswandern.

1753 durfte Josias Wild, Einwohner zu Dettingen, mit Weib und Stieftochter Barbara nach Pennsilvanien ziehen. Doch wurde das mitterliche Vermögen seiner Stieftochter Barbara in Betrage von 150 fl. bis zu deren Volljährigkeit in der Heimat verwaltet. (Josias Wild, Ankunft Philadelphia, 17. 9. 1753, Schiff Richard and Mary). 1754 erhielten Gottfried Rattenauer und Jacob Salzer, beide von Dettingen, die Auswandererlaubnis nach Amerika; aber obwohl beide vor dem Zug nach Amerika dringend gewarnt wurden, „weil sie sich dadurch in den Sünderste Elend setzen würden“, landete doch Jacob Salzer mit dem Schiff Richard and Mary am 30. 9. 1754 in Philadelphia. Ebenso durfte im gleichen Jahre Hannss Martin Schäffer von Sondefingen mit den Seinen abziehen (Hans Martin Schäffer, Ankunft Philadelphia, 30. 9. 1754, Schiff Richard and Mary).

The Protocols of the Council and Revenue Chamber of Baden-Durlach, preserved in the General State Archives of Baden, at Karlsruhe, are the source for the present list of persons who received permission to emigrate.

The petitions for emigration were handled in the sessions of the Council and then referred to the Revenue Chamber, which formally pronounced the emigration and fixed the emigration taxes.

As far as the identity of the emigrants cited in the protocols is established with certainty, or probability, the dates of their arrival in Philadelphia have been noted from the ship lists published by Hinke and Strasburger and the number of the relevant lists cited in parentheses under the abbreviation HS.

Nach einem um 1775 entstandenen Aktenstück war Jacob Geigle, Sohn des Johann Jacob Geigle von Lienzingen, Oberamt Maulbronn, (heute Lienzingen, Krs. Vaihingen/Enz) vor ungefähr 24 Jahren als lediger Bursch mit der Magd des Hirschwirths von L., einer Anna Juditha Drexler, mit der er sich unterwegs trauen liess, von seinem Heimatort nach Pennsylvania ausgewandert. Zuhause soll er eine Bürgertochter namens Stumpff(in) unehelich geschwächt haben, weshalb er zu einer Gefängnisstrafe verurteilt wurde. In der Tat landete Jacob Geigle im Jahre 1751 mit dem Schiff Phoenix im Hafen von Philadelphia und leistete dort am 25. September 1751 der englischen Regierung den Treueeid. Als der Ausgewanderte dann später (um 1775)

durch einen Bevollmächtigten die Herausgabe des elterlichen Vermögensanteils verlangt, teilgerten sich seine Schwager, Conrad Muninger von Bremberg und Friedrich Link von Schmie, die das betr. Erbteil bisher verwaltet hatten es nach Amerika verabschieden zu lassen, während die Erbschaft (an 1000 fl.) zu gross und die Vollmacht durch mehrere Hände gelauft sei. Auch befürchteten sie, dass das Geld, da in Amerika bereits Kriegszustand herrsche, im Feindeshand fallen könnte. In der Tat sistierte die württembergische Regierung die Herausgabe des Vermögens bis zu einem späteren Zeitpunkt. Aus den Akten ist leider nicht mit Sicherheit zu entnehmen, ob der Ausgewanderte nicht schliesslich doch noch zu seinem Rechte kam. Nach Aussage des betr. Aktenstoffs (Staatsfilialrichter Ludwigsburg, A 213, B 320) wohnte Jacob Geigle in Middletown township, Grafschaft Cambria, Pennsylvania.

Auf eine Massenauswanderung nach Pennsylvaniaen aus der Stadt und Amt Freudenstadt im Jahre 1752 kann aus einem Aktenstück des Staatsfamilienarchivs Ludwigsburg (A 345/344 B 14) geschlossen werden; denn am 7. Mai 1752 berichtete Vogt Brästerberger von Freudenstadt an die württembergische Regierung, dass in der im vertrauten Amt mit Amt sich Haushaltungen „resolvirt“ hätten, mit all den Ihren aus ihrem Vaterlande hinweg nach Pennsylvaniaen zu ziehen. Die Seelenzahl der Emigranten wurde mit 111, ihr Vermögen, das sie mitnehmen wollten, mit 2180 fl. angegeben.

Die württembergische Regierung hatte gegen die Auswanderung der Betroffenen wenig einzubauen, alle durften nach Aufkündigung ihres Bürger- und Untertanenrechtes für sich und ihre Kinder abziehen, wasgleich die Rückkehr in die Heimat (regressus in patriam) nicht mehr gestattet wurde. (Erl. v. 13. 5. 1752). Nur bei den Kindern 1. Ehe des Tobias Finkbeiner wurde einschränkend verordnet, dass diese, falls sie ein beträchtliches Vermögen besäßen, Johannes Flait, dass er seine geistig zurückgebliebene Verwandte Anna besser anderweitig versorge als sie auf die Reise nach Amerika mitzunehmen.

In den Schiffslisten des Hafens von Philadelphia finden wir einen grossen teil der Auswanderungslustigen als Passagiere des Schiffes Duke of Württemberg wieder; das Jahr 1752 dort landete (Hünke-Strassburger Pennsylvania German pioneers" Liste 190 C) nämlich Johann Ludwig Ober, Jacob Bosch, Johann Georg Ott, Georg Ziegler, Jacob Bernhardt Schab, Johann Adam Schwab, Immanuel Friedrich Weckerlin, Tobias Baub (wohl für Buh), Johannes Flait, Johann Lockmir (für Lockmayer), Johann Georg Jayser, Michel Bach; die übrigen Auswanderungswogen werden wohl, falls sie nicht unterwegs zu grunde gingen, in anderen Häfen Amerikas gelandet sein, worüber keine Schiffslisten vorliegen.

Die Ursache der Auswanderung ist fast immer wirtschaftliche Not und Überbevölkerung des Landes; so sagt das betr. Grundbesitz habe er nicht, er auch kein Tagelöhner, so dass er nicht wisse, wie er sich mit Weib und Kind durchbringen und erhalten könne. Der Nagelschmid Johann Philipp Arzt gab an, man könne sich in Freudenstadt unmöglich ernähren, da Eisen und Kohle jedes Jahr teurer würdet und er nicht mit den ausländischen Handwerkern seiner Branche konkurrierten können, welche infolge billigerer Rohstoffe (Eisen und Kohle) billiger produzieren könnten und auf den Land und den Märkten die Einheimischen unterboten. Ähnlich klagte auch der zu Hause verbleibende Georg Christoph Westlen, ihn treibe zum Wegzug die höchste Not, da er auf seinem Bäckerhandwerk keine Arbeit und kein Auskommen finde.

"Moravian Pioneers in the Swatara Valley, 1752," The Pennsylvania Dutchman, 2 (Dec. 15, 1950), 6 [Lancour No. 179].

Undoubtedly the Moravians were the best record-keepers of all the Pennsylvania Dutch church groups. For when they established a congregation, they prepared family registers of all their members, giving vital statistics of parents and children, and, most valuable of all, telling where in the old homeland the emigrant had come from.

We print here these lists, the Catalogue der Geschwister in Swatara den 25. Oct. 1752 (Catalogue of the Brethren and Sisters in Swatara, October 25, 1752). It was painstakingly transcribed from

the original document in the Moravian Archives at Bethlehem by the late Rev. Dr. William J. Hinke.—O. Y.

Friedrich Krebs. "More 18th Century Emigrants from the Palatinate," *The Pennsylvania Dutchman*, 5 (March 1, 1954), 12 [Lancour No. 182].

From the *Oberamtsprotokollen von Neustadt an der Weinstraße (Pfalz) 1754-68* [Protocols of the District of Neustadt on the Weinstrasse (Palatinate) 1754-68], come the following new names of Pennsylvania pioneers of the 18th century:

1. Renner, Johann Jacob, of Mutterstadt, permitted in 1754 to emigrate to the "New Land" with wife and children, but had to pay the tithe on property which he took out of the country. Jacob Renner is listed on the Ship *Edinburgh*, arriving at Philadelphia, September 30, 1754.

2. Moersheimer, Henrich (Merschheimer), citizen of Lambseim, permitted 1764 to go to Pennsylvania, in return for the tithe on the property he was taking with him. Henrich Morsheimer, Ship *Britannia*, September 26, 1764.

3. Wernz, Jacob, with Jacob Braun and Andres Matheis, all of Ellerstadt, "because they are not in condition to be able further to support themselves there, they ask permission to go to the New Land." Were granted permission to leave without further ado, in case none of their property remains after satisfying their creditors, otherwise an account is to be rendered. In the Ship Lists only the name of Jacob Wernz appears, on the Ship *Jenetta*, November 5, 1764.

4. Hirschberger, Henrich, of Eppstein, Mennonite (*Wiedertäufer*), is permitted to go to the Province of Pennsylvania, upon payment of 30 florins for the Tithe. He was also permitted to take along the property which is coming to his three brothers (obviously also in America), upon payment of 156 florins. Henrich Herschberger, Ship *Crawford*, October 26, 1768.

From the *Protocols of the district of Heidelberg (1751)* we hear of other emigrants from the Odenwald. The following citizens and residents of Schoenau near Heidelberg, in the Odenwald, were, on account of their poverty, manumitted gratis: Balthasar Koenig, Joerg Happes, Johann Wagner, and Joerg Luecker. All four arrived in Philadelphia on the Ship *Queen of Denmark*, October 4, 1751: George Licker, Balzer Konig, Johannes Wagner, George Happes.

In the editor's search for the European origins of our Pennsylvania German pioneers, he has turned to a rich and hitherto untapped source—the Naturalization Papers of Aliens, preserved at the County Courthouses in accordance with a federal law of 1798.

The immigrant alien who settled in Pennsylvania after the formation of the United States Government under the Constitution had to file several papers with the Court of Common Pleas of the County in which he had taken up residence. The first of these papers was the "Declaration of Intention to Become a Citizen," the second was the "Petition for Naturalization," which was acted upon by the court, resulting in favorable cases in the naturalization of the petitioner.

The value of such papers for those interested in Pennsylvania Dutch genealogy, is that for the most part, they give us the name of the village, or at least the province of Germany, from which the emigrant came. This first article in a lengthy series of "Naturalization Records" which the editor plans to publish, comes from information copied from the original papers in the Prothonotary's Office of the Lehigh County Courthouse in Allentown.

Not all these immigrants landed on our shores before 1802—the traditional and arbitrary date after which no immigrant is considered "Pennsylvania German" by the Membership Committee of the Pennsylvania German Society. However, I have included all German immigrants who petitioned for naturalization up to the year 1820. Most of them settled among the Pennsylvania Dutch, intermarried

with them, and their descendants are indistinguishable from the mass of descendants of the Eighteenth Century Pennsylvania German Pioneers.

1) Johann Friedrich Huebener (D1), on December 22, 1812, filed the following "Affidavit & Declaration of John F. Hubner-Intention to Become a Citizen of the United States": "State of Pennsylvania, Lehigh County SS: John F. Hubner of the age of thirty eight years and upwards, a subject of the Imperial City of Hamburg, in [the] empire of Germany, now residing within the County of Lehigh and under the Jurisdiction of the United States, doth upon his oath administered according to law declare that it is bona fide his Intention to become a citizen of these United States and to renounce forever all allegiance and fidelity to any foreign prince Potentate State or Sovereignty whatsoever and particularly to the Government of the Imperial City of Hamburg aforesaid to whom he is a subject and also all orders & letters of Nobility to which he may be entitled. Sworn & Declared in open Court, Dec. 22, 1812. Signed: Joh. Frid. Hubener."

2) David Thim (D2), on December 22, 1812, filed a Declaration of Intention, stating that he was "of the age of thirty seven years & upwards a subject of West Prussia in the Empire of Germany, now residing within the County of Lehigh."

3) Samuel Heilner (D3), on December 22, 1812, filed a Declaration of Intention, stating that he was "of the age of twenty four years or thereabouts a Subject of the Principality of Wertzburg [Wuerzburg] in the Empire of Germany," now resident in Lehigh County.

4) Johann Christoph Zaenglein (D4), on February 24, 1813, filed a Declaration of intention, stating that he was "of the age of thirty seven years & upwards, a subject of Prussian Koningsberg in the Empire of Germany," now resident in Lehigh County. Sworn in open court, August 31, 1813.

5) Nicholas Dick (D5), on February 24, 1813, filed a Declaration of intention, stating that he is "of the age of twenty seven years or thereabouts formerly inhabitant of West Prussia in the Empire of Germany," now resident in Lehigh County, and offers to renounce his allegiance to Frederick IV, King of Prussia.

6) Jacob Guelich (D6), on February 2, 1814, filed a Declaration of intention, stating that he was "born in the year of our Lord one thousand seven hundred & eighty four-in Hamburg in the Empire of Germany-whence he migrated in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred & seven and has selected the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania, as the place of his intended settlement." The Prothonotary spelled his name "Gillich."

7) Michael Herlein (D10), on May 3, 1814, filed a Declaration of Intention, stating that he was "born in the year of our Lord one thousand seven hundred & fifty seven-in the County or Circle of Franconia in the Kingdom of Bavaria in Germany whence he migrated in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and five." He

offers to renounce the sovereignty of the King of Bavaria.

8) David Trexler (D11), on August 29, 1814, filed a Declaration of intention, stating that he was "born in the year one thousand seven hundred and eighty three, in the Kingdom of Wurttemberg [Wuerttemberg], whence he migrated in the year A.D. 1805." He offers to renounce the King of Wuerttemberg. The alien signed his name in German, "David Drexler."

9) Jakob Wilhelm Dechant (P9), on February 2, 1814, filed the following Petition for Naturalization. This immigrant is of especial interest in that he was a Reformed minister in Pennsylvania and Ohio for many years. "To the honorable Robert Porter Eadsire, President and his Associates Judges of the Court of Common Pleas of the County of Lehigh. The Petition of Jacob Wilhelm Dechant a native of Oppenheim in the Electorate of Mentz [Mainz] in the Empire of Germany, respectfully sheweth. That your petitioner on the twenty second day of January in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and ten, filed a declaration in the Court of Common Pleas of Northampton County in the State of Pennsylvania, stating an oath, that he was then in the age of twenty seven years and a native of Oppenheim in the Electorate of Mentz [Mainz] in the Empire of Germany, but then residing in the township of Upper Saucon in the County of Northampton & State aforesaid, & that it was bona fide his Intention to become a citizen of the United States & to renounce forever all allegiance & fidelity to any foreign prince, potentate state or sovereignty whatever & particularly to the Elector of Mentz to whom he is now subject. That more than three years are elapsed since the making and filing [of] the above declaration. That your petitioner hath never borne any hereditary title or been of any of the orders of nobility, and if any such should by means unexpected descend to him, he doth absolutely and entirely renounce the same; that he hath never been heretofore proscribed by any state, or been legally convicted of having joined the Army of Great Britain during the late [revolutionary] war. That he is now ready and desirous to take the necessary Oath required by the Act of Congress in such Cases provided. Your petition therefore prays your honorable Court to admit him to become a citizen of the United States & of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania. And he will pray, &c. Jk. Wm. Dechant. February 2d, 1814."

In another document he swears he will support the Constitution and renounce allegiance to the Elector of Mentz and to Napoleon, Emperor of France and Protector to the Rhenish Confederation. He was resident in the United States on September 2, 1805.

An affidavit of Daniel Cooper declares that the petitioner has "behaved as a man of good moral character attached to the principles of the Constitution of the United States."

Any of your ancestors in this list? We continue from The Dutchman for May 5, 1949, the list of German and Swiss emigrants who

applied for naturalization before the courts of Lehigh County, Pennsylvania, up to the year 1830. If you recognize any of your forefathers among them, write us. We would like further information on all of these families.—D. Y.

1) Henry Heinen (P12), on December 7, 1815, filed a Petition for Naturalization, stating that he was "a native of East Friesland, in Germany." On November 13, 1812, he had filed his first papers in the Court of Common Pleas of Northampton County. He renounces the King of Prussia, and denies having been in the British Army in the late revolutionary war. He further states that he was resident in the United States on or about July 30, 1804, and for nine years past has lived in Pennsylvania. He renounces the King of Prussia and the King of Hanover, "to whose dominion East Friesland has lately been annexed." John Marck or Marck testifies as to his good moral character. According to Preston Laury, *The History of the Allentown Conference of the Ministerium of Pennsylvania* (Kutztown: Kutztown Publishing Company, 1926), this immigrant was the Reverend Heinrich Heine, who from 1808-1817 served the Zionsville-Western Salisbury Parish, later removing to Gettysburg. The Prothonotary's Index refers to these papers under the name "Rev. Henry Heinen."

2) Ansel Arnold (D15), on September 3, 1817, filed a Declaration of Intention, stating that he was born March 2, 1797, in Ehenhausen in the Kingdom of Württemberg [Wuerttemberg] in Germany, whence he migrated on March 18, 1815, to the United States, selecting Pennsylvania as his home. Intends to renounce his allegiance to Frederick II, King of Württemberg. A second paper (DR13), a Report Preparatory to the Declaration of Intention, states he now resides in Berks County. He arrived at Baltimore on or about July 28, 1816. He has no parents, guardian, master or mistress.

3) Daniel Zacharias (DR45), in May Term 1818, filed a Report Preparatory to Filing a Declaration of Intention, stating that he was born in Witzenstein now in the Principality of Darmstadt in the Empire of Germany, on April 22, 1783, and owes allegiance to Francis II, Emperor of Germany. He emigrated from Wittgenstein, May 22, 1805, arriving at Philadelphia, November 28, 1805. With no parents, etc., he chose Lehigh County, Pennsylvania, as his home. In May Term 1818 he also filed his Declaration of Intention (D15), stating the same information. On September 1, 1823, he filed his Petition for Naturalization, renouncing the Emperor of Austria "of whom I was born a subject." The printer, Charles L. Hutter, vouches for his good character.

4) Henry Detwiler (D16), on May 6, 1818, filed his Declaration of Intention, stating that he was born December 18, 1795, in Langenbruk, in the Canton of Basel in Switzerland, whence he migrated April 2, 1817, to the United States. He signs his name "Dr. Henry Detwiler." He was therefore the Allentown physician, famous in the annals of homeopathic medicine in America. His Report (DR16), filed at the same time, states that he arrived at Philadelphia, July 20, 1817, and having no parents, etc., has settled in Lehigh

County. In September Term, 1823, "Henry Detwiler, M. D.", filed his Petition for Naturalization (P42), and renounced the government of the Canton of Basel in the Republic of Switzerland. John Bahl vouches for his good character.

5) Carl Friedrich Schaeffle (D17), on May 6, 1819, filed his Declaration of Intention, stating that he "is a subject of the King of Württemberg in Europe, that he belongs to the Württemberg Nation, that he was born" August 29, 1796, "in the town of Durmtenz in the County of Maulbrunn and Kingdom of Württemberg aforesaid, whence he migrated on" April 12, 1818, landing at Philadelphia, August 28, 1818. He is now 22 years, 8 months, and 7 days old, and intends to make Pennsylvania his residence. In his Report (DR17), filed at the same time, May Term, 1819, he offers to renounce his allegiance to William I, King of Württemberg.

6) Christoph Gottlieb Retzsch (D18), in May Term, 1819, filed his Declaration of Intention, stating that he was born July 15, 1796, in the town of Maerchingen in the County of Tübingen, in the Kingdom of Württemberg, whence he migrated May 29, 1817, landing at Philadelphia on October 10, 1817. His age is 22 years, 9 months, and 23 days. In his Report (DR18) he offers to renounce William I, King of Württemberg.

7) John Caspar Pfleiffer (D19), on September 6, 1820, filed his Declaration of Intention, stating that he was born at Klein Sachsenheim, in the County or Oberamt of Vaihingen, in the Kingdom of Württemberg. His age is 34 years, and he intends to make his home in Heidelberg Township, Lehigh County.

8) Thomas Mayer (D20) on September 4, 1820, filed his Declaration of Intention, stating that he was born at Neusylingen or Nestlyngen in the Kingdom of Bavaria. His age is 48 years, and he intends to settle in the Borough of Northampton [i. e., Allentown].

9) George Ising (P21), on December 9, 1820, filed his Petition for Naturalization, stating that he landed in the United States in September, 1786, and has resided for the last seven years in Lehigh County. The foreign sovereignty which he renounces in particular is that of the King of Denmark. Caspar Mayer vouches for his good character.

10) Jacob Monheimer (D26), on December 2, 1818, filed his Declaration of Intention, stating that he was born in the year 1786 in the County of Retzatzkreis in the Kingdom of Bavaria, whence he migrated in 1818. He offers to renounce his allegiance to Joseph Maximilian, King of Bavaria.

11) Gideon Ihach (D35), on September 6, 1816, filed his Declaration of Intention, stating that he was born in the Duchdom of Berg in the Circle of Westphalia, in the year 1785, whence he emigrated in 1796 and made his home in Pennsylvania. Offers to renounce the sovereignty of the Emperor of Austria. In September Term, 1823, he filed his Petition for Naturalization (P34), at which time Gustavus Ihach of the Borough of Northampton vouches for his good character, having known him from infancy; Johannes Smith of the Borough of

Northampton likewise vouches for him.

12) Gustavus Ihach [D59], on September 7, 1816, filed his Declaration of Intention, stating that he was born in the Dukedom of Berg in the Circle of Westphalia, whence he emigrated in the year 1796. Offers to renounce the sovereignty of the Emperor of Austria. In September Term, 1823, he filed his Petition for Naturalization (P40), in which he gives the years of his birth as 1791. Gideon Ihach of South Whitehall Township vouches for his good character, as does Johannes J. Schmidt of the Borough of Northampton.

13) Heinrich (Heyman) Woolf (D56), on August 31, 1818, filed his Declaration of Intention, stating that he was born April 15, 1787, in Oberdorf, in the Kingdom of Wurtemberg [Wuerttemberg], whence he migrated, May 8, 1817, to the United States. Offers to renounce the sovereignty of Frederick II, King of Wurtemberg. Signs his name in German: Heyman Woolff. In his Report (D56), filed at the same time, his name appears as "Hayman Woolff," and he states that he landed at Philadelphia, December 20, 1817, "had no parents, etc. In September Term, 1823, "Henry Wolf otherwise called Hayman Wolf," filed his Petition for Naturalization (P37), in which he signs his name in German: Heinrich Woolff. Peter Gross vouches for his good character.

14) Daniel Albrecht (P54), on May 3, 1825, filed his Petition for Naturalization, which states that "Daniel Albrecht, a native of the Palatinate of Wurtemberg [sic] in Germany, now resident in the Township of Upper Milford in the said County" of Lehigh, was resident in the United States between June 18, 1796, and April 14, 1802, and has continued to reside there ever since, having also lived in Pennsylvania for more than one year last past. Signs his name: Daniel Albrecht. Renounces the sovereignty of the Duke of Wurtemberg [Evidently he did not know that little Wurtemberg had become a kingdom]. His good character is vouched for by George Kessner.

15) John T. Hollmann (P85), on September 5, 1829, filed his Petition for Naturalization, stating that he is a native of Bremen, and was resident in the United States between April 14, 1802, and June 18, 1812, and has continued to reside here. Signs his name in English: John T. Hollmann. Renounces the sovereignty of the Government of Bremen and the Emperor of Austria. John F. Halbach and Henry Jarrett vouch for his good character.

16) Jacob Agster (P86), on September 8, 1829, filed his Petition for Naturalization, in which he states he is a native of Ilsfeld in the Kingdom of Wurtemberg, and was resident in the United States between April 14, 1802, and June 18, 1812, and has continued to reside here. Renounces the sovereignty of the King of Wurtemberg. Signs his name in German: Jacob Agster. Henry Jarrett and Conrad Neymeyer vouch for his good character.

"List of German Passengers Arrived in the Port, Philadelphia, in the Ship Margaret, from Amsterdam, C. E. Gardner, Master, September 19th, 1804. As Taken from the Original Immigrant List on File in the Division of Public Records, Harrisburg, Pa.," *Journal of the Lycoming Historical Society*, 1 (1956), 9-12 [Lancour No. 191].

This list, containing 91 names with size of household and age, place of birth, county and country of origin, occupation, and physical characteristics of the head of household, has also been printed in Strassburger and Hinke [Lancour No. 146] and in Rupp [Lancour No. 145].

"Passenger List of the Ship 'Elizabeth,' Which Arrived at Philadelphia in 1819," *The Pennsylvania Magazine of History and Biography*, 25 (1901), 255-258 [Lancour No. 192].

This list, copied from the original in the Library of the Historical Society of Pennsylvania, contains 85 names and the contractual obligations of both the passengers and the captain, concluding "Amsterdam, 4 May, 1819."

In has been reprinted in *Emigrants to Pennsylvania, 1641-1819* (see Lancour No. 183, above).

G. B. Keen. "The Third Swedish Expedition to New Sweden," *The Pennsylvania Magazine of History and Biography*, 3 (1879), 462-464 [Lancour No. 193].

This article, compiled from copies in the Historical Society of Pennsylvania of original papers in the Royal Archives, Stockholm, names emigrants who embarked on the Kalmar Nyckel and Charitas for New Sweden [now Delaware] in 1641. It has been reprinted on pages 1-3 of *Emigrants to Pennsylvania, 1641-1819* (see Lancour No. 183, above). An article by C. T. Odhner, "The Founding of New Sweden, 1637-1642," in the same volume of *PMHB* (pages 269-284 and 395-411), has not been reprinted.

G. B. Keen. "The Eighth Swedish Expedition to New Sweden," *The Pennsylvania Magazine of History and Biography*, 8 (1884), 107-108 [Lancour No. 194].

This article, compiled from a copy in the Historical Society of Pennsylvania of the original in the Royal Archives at Stockholm,

lists both males and females who set out with Commandant Hans Amundson for New Sweden on July 3, 1649. It has been reprinted on pages 4 and 5 of *Emigrants to Pennsylvania, 1641-1819* (see Lancour No. 185, above).

Louis P. de Boer. "Delaware Papers. Passenger List of Colonists to the South River (Delaware) Colony of New Netherland, 1661." *The New York Genealogical and Biographical Record*, 60 (1929), 68-70 [Lancour No. 195].

It is well known that the settlements on the South River, the Delaware, of New Netherland, often changed hands in the early days of their existence.

After the Dutch had colonies of small proportions and short duration there, the Swedes—chiefly through the guiding hand of Pierre Minuit, at one time Director-General of New Netherland,—in 1638 formed a larger and more lasting settlement there, known in American colonial history by the name of New Sweden.

During Pieter Stuyvesant's administration as Director-General of New Netherland, New Sweden, in 1655, again became part of New Netherland, the West India Company's colony on the North American continent, under the sovereignty of The High Mighty Lords, the States General of the United Netherlands.

In 1661 the West India Company transferred the ownership of the South River Colony to the City of Amsterdam, and in the records of that city, the colony is often mentioned as the "Stadt's Colonia" or the "City Colony."

All documents relative to the history of this colony from 1661 till 1664, i.e., till the year of the English occupation of all of New Netherland, are not found among the West India Company papers in the General Archives of the Kingdom of the Netherlands, at the Hague, but in the Old City Archives of Amsterdam.

From the last named collection of documents, which in its entirety deserves to be copied and translated on behalf of early American colonial history, the following data has been taken:

No date is affixed to this document, which appears to be the preliminary list probably made for the use of some official. That it antedates the following document, is shown from its place in the collection, where it is under No. 65, whereas the following paper falls under No. 88.

\* The names thus marked in the passenger-list also occur in the preliminary list given above. The preliminary list in many instances supplements this passenger-list, by giving the various places of origin of the passengers.

Jan Ramare is called Jan Roemers in the preliminary list.

There might have been a relationship between Gerrit Otte and Herman Otte, both names occurring in the passenger-list, and both persons from Accoy.

† The number of passengers was taken by "heads," who had to pay full passage, "half-heads," for whom half-fare had to be paid (these were presumably children under the age of five) and infants, who had free passage.

Forty-two and a half heads would make forty-three persons. One infant of Kier Wolters, and one of Gerrit Sandersen were exempt, but they have been accounted for in the margin, this making Kier Wolter's family amount to 8 instead of 7, and Gerrit Sandersen's family to 6 instead of 5 (4-1/2), and making a total of forty-five souls, as given in the margin.

The scribe, however, has omitted in the margin an infant of Mr. Jacob de Commer, the surgeon of the expedition, whose family although consisting of himself, his wife and two children, is counted for only three.

Correcting this error we would reach a total of 46 passengers sailing on 24 November, 1661, on "de Pumerlander Kerck," from Texel Roadsteads for Newer Amstel, Delaware.

§ As a matter of record it may be stated here that the ship remained in Texel Roadsteads for a whole week, not sailing until the 24th of November, 1661, evidently waiting for further cargoes and supplies.

An inventory of the medical outfit and surgical instruments taken by Dr. Jacob de Commer to the colony, on this ship, would be of interest to students of medical history in America.

A. R. Dunlap. "Three Lists of Passengers to New Amstel," *Delaware History*, 8 (1959), 510-511 [Lancour No. 196].

The collections of the Historical Society of Delaware include a microfilm copy, from the Archives of the city of Amsterdam, of manuscript records (in Dutch) relating to the Delaware. These records accumulated in Amsterdam during the years 1656-1664, when that city was actively interested in the affairs of the New Amstel colony. Much of this material was translated and published in volumes I and II of *New York Colonial Documents*, but several items remain untranslated and unpublished, among them documents containing the following lists of passengers to New Amstel in the years 1661 and 1662. The names in these lists should be of great interest to students of Dutch influence on the history and culture of the Delaware River area.

The first list (item 87 of the numbered items in the microfilm), dated November 13, 1661, is of passengers who came out as servants of the city's colony of New Amstel; their ship was named the *Purmerlander Kerck* ("Church of Purmerland"). The second list (item 94 in the microfilm) gives the names of those who came to New Amstel on the *Gulden Arent* ("Golden Eagle") early in 1662. The third list (item 98 in the microfilm), part of a document dated November, 1662, is also of passengers aboard the *Purmerlander Kerck*.

## NOTES TO THE INDICES

The user of this volume should be particularly careful to check every page showing bearing the name in question. The "ship lists" to Pennsylvania and Delaware happen to offer a greater duplication of names than other lists, and in a number of instances the same person is found in two or more articles. Indeed, some names will be found on "ship lists" but another article will reveal that the person in question did not actually sail on that ship.

Ships will be found listed in the Index of Ship Names under both their original names and their names in English translation if both names are given in the text. Otherwise one should inspect the index under both languages, if that may be appropriate.

The Index of Place Names is, for the most part, an uncritical organization of the place names found in the text. The user should consider the fact that many such names were misspelled by officials and emigrants, and some were misunderstood. One should look under all possible variant spellings, and all possible geographic divisions.

While in this volume each local place name is given under the heading of a specific country, in the case of foreign listings, it should be pointed out that a number of German-sounding place names are listed under France, as these villages were located in the Alsace region, now in France. It is possible that some Dutch or Belgian places will be found listed under Germany.

The Index of Personal Names should be searched very carefully by those seeking the names of specific persons. Keep in mind that many officials were not good or consistent spellers, that many immigrants could not spell their own names, and foreign accents, in some cases, might have been misunderstood. In some cases names which are similar, but distinct, have been grouped together simply because the compiler could not be sure, for example, that a Stewart should not have been listed under Stuart, and felt it necessary to compel the user of this index to check all people with similar sounding names. Accent marks have been ignored in the alphabetical arrangement out of consideration for many readers not familiar with foreign systems of arranging the alphabet. First names, spelled inconsistently in the text, have been spelled with some degree of consistency in the Index of Personal Names, insofar as was reasonable.
