
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
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
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


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


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INTRODUCTION.

The facility of ready reference which distinguishes this book gives it especial value, and will no doubt be properly appreciated.



THE STATE OF TEXAS.

EARLY SETTLEMENT.

Although Texas is called a new State, it will in 1885 be two centuries old. On the shores of Natagorda Bay, February 18th, 1685, landed a band of white men. About one year later, on March 20th, 1686, the first organized effort was made to establish a colony; a number of monks from the old and moss-grown monasteries of Spain established a mission on the banks of Lavaca river. These missions, which were of a semi-military character, were soon established from the mouth of the Rio Grande into what is now California. To these hardy, zealous monks from Catholic Spain, then, belongs the honor of making the initial efforts towards the civilization and settlement of the Lone Star State of to-day.

LOCATION AND EXTENT.

This great State—great in area, great in natural advantages, great in present prosperity, greater in future prospects, grand in its early history, its noble defense against the Mexicans when it was an independent Republic, greatest in much that is noble of any State in the American Union—is comprised within the twenty-sixth and thirty-eighth degrees of latitude, and between the seventeenth and twenty-eighth degrees of longitude west from Washington. The vastness of this State will be better understood by the statement that it contains 274,366 square miles of territory, which is subdivided into two hundred and twenty-six counties, fifty-six of which number are unorganized. The area of Texas is five times greater than that of Illinois; seven times that of Indiana, and equals in extent Iowa, Wisconsin, Missouri, Ohio, Vermont, and New Hamshire, combined, with the Granite State of Massachusetts thrown in. The number of acres in the State is more than 175,594,000. Eight hundred miles from east to west, and 700 miles from north to south is another measurement of the Imperial State of Texas.

ADMITTED TO THE UNION.

The Province of Texas—the 'Lone Star Republic,' so called because of her banner bearing but a single star—after enjoying for about a decade of years a freedom won upon many a bloody field, became the State of Texas in 1848, by being admitted to the Union.

POPULATION AND TAXABLE PROPERTY.

In 1850 the population of the State was 212,000, and the assessed value of taxable property, not including slave property, was \$33,332,115. Ten years later (1860) the population had increased to 604,215, and the assessed value of all property, slaves only excepted, was \$164,338,138. During the next ten years the civil war occurred, but not-withstanding this, the population in 1870 was found to have increased to 818,579, while the assessor's books showed the value of all property liable to taxation to be \$170,473,778. The United States census of 1880 gave the State a population of 1,591,749, and the assessed value of the property for the same year was \$318,970,736. In 1881 the value of the taxable property was \$357,000,000. The number of live stock for this year (1881) was: horses and mules, 952,491; cattle, 4,037,837; sheep, 3,262,104; goats, 329,808; hogs, 1,854,239.

The bonded debt of the State of Texas, August 31, 1883, was \$4,119,898.82.

TIMBER AND FOREST.

It is authoritatively stated that between Texarkana and Baird, on the T. & P. Ry, and between the first named place and Whitesboro, there is growing to-day enough timber of a merchantable character to supply not only Texas, but the State of Kansas and the entire prairie country for years to come. Beyond the Pecos river, in the far west, are great forests of cedar and pine of immense growth. When this portion of the State shall have been settled, these forests will prove of the utmost value. Bordering Texas on the east are the vast forests of Louisiana, as yet almost unknown to the woodman's axe. It has been officially said that there are sixteen varieties of oak in the State, of which the red or Spanish oak often reaches a height of 100 feet and a circumference of twenty feet at the base. The very abundant white oak does not grow quite so tall, but often exceeds it in diameter. It grows all over Northeastern Texas. Of other trees there are three species of elm, three of maple, five of hickory—including the pecan, two of mulberry, two of persimmon, one of sycamore, three of magnolia, two of hackberry, several kinds of willow, four of pine, two of cypress, several cedars, etc. Texas has the finest pineries in the world. The long leaf pine and the loblolly are the most common varieties. Some of these trees grow as tall as 180 feet, and have a diameter of 2 - 3 feet. Pitch pine is abundant in some of the counties of Eastern Texas. Along the streams of Northern Texas, the cypress grows abundantly. West of the Colorado River, the mountain or highland species of this tree fringes most of the streams. Many specimens of the common cypress measure 25-30 feet in girth and make valuable lumber. Cedar grows to enormous sizes in Western Texas, and many red cedars have a length of 120 feet and a thickness of 3-4 feet. Live oak grows taller in Texas than elsewhere, often having a straight stem forty feet before a limb is reached. Pecan and hickory trees attain great size and in company with the various species of oak make an abundant mast. Ash of several varieties, Bois d'Are, mulberry, hackberry and cottonwood are found in quantity along the river banks. The prevailing timbers are post oak, black jack, Spanish oak, cedar and live oak in the uplands; skin oak in sandy patches; mesquite on level prairies, and hickory, ash, sycamore, walnut, hackberry, cottonwood, etc., along the streams. The apparently bare prairies in the counties further west, generally have an abundant supply of fuel under ground. In prairies crossed by running streams, there is plenty of timber that will go a good way towards house building.



RESOURCES.

The shipments over the Texas & Pacific, International and Great Northern, Missouri. Kansas & Texas, and the Trinity and Sabine railways, not including the vast traffic over the St. L., Iron Mountain & Southern railway, during the past current year, show 551,706,462 pounds of lumber, 55,296,983 pounds of grain, 9,843,503 pounds of wool, and cotton amounting to 620,883 bales. When the vast products of the whole State are aggregated the showing reaches more nearly the grand territorial proportions of the State. The following tabular statement is as nearly correct as any census report ever

These facts clearly exhibit the capabilities and resources of Texas. These agricultural and industrial products are but the initial efforts of a comparatively sparse population, but when the sources of industry rise to their just and inviting proportions, the figures given, large as they are, will be many times doubled.

RAILROADS.

When the war closed, in 1865, only 100 miles of railroad were in operation in the State. On September 30, 1883, there were in operation 6,465 miles, 2,245 miles of which had steel rails.

RAIN FALL.

The table on opposite page shows the mean annual rainfall, in inches and hundreths of an inch, as registered at 26 stations in Texas and 1 in Louisiana, of the U.S. Army Signal Service, for the periods set opposite the names of the several stations respectively. It will be observed that all the stations in Texas, except Galveston, are situated west of the meridian of longitude 96° 30' west of Greenwich. The record for Shreveport, La., is given as being the station nearest to and as approximately indicating the rainfall throughout the northeastern section of Texas.

MINERAL SPRINGS-WINTER RESORTS.

Among the inviting features of the State are the numerous mineral springs, with their medicinal and health giving qualities. The better known of these springs are those at Lampasas, 60 miles northeast of Austin; the Palo Pinto springs, in Palo Pinto county, seven miles from Millsap, on the Texas & Pacific railway; Sour Lake, on the Texas & New Orleans railway, 60 miles east from Houston; Burdett's Sour Well, near Luling, on the G., H. & S. A. railway, in Southwestern Texas; Wootan Mineral Wells, in Robertson county, three miles from Bremond, on the H. & T. C. railway; and the Sutherland springs, 25 miles east of Sau Antonio. To all of these may be added Caldwell's mineral springs, in the county of Caldwell, and near Luling; the white sulphur waters of Grimes county, known as Kellum's springs, and situated about twenty miles from Bryan, on the Houston & Texas Central railway; and the Piedmont springs, on the line of the same road, near Navasota. Others might be referred to, and a much more elaborate description of them given, together with the refreshing healthfulness of the climate, charming scenery, and all that adds to the comfort and attractiveness of their surroundings. They are the inviting winter resorts of the country, and thousands from the rugged climate of the North would largely add to their health and years if they would but visit them.

EDUCATIONAL.

There are now maintained in the State 5,048 public schools, 3,900 of which are for the white, and 1,148 for the colored population. The number of children enrolled in school and receiving free tuition is 142,325, of which number 104,591 are white, and 37,734 colored. The number of children of scholastic age unable to read is 10,598, the number of white children coming under this head being 5,632; the colored, 4,976. The total scholastic population is 274,466.

MINERALS.

COAL.—The carboniferous rocks extend over a large area in the northwestern part of the State. These are the true coal-bearing rocks of other States and countries. Good coal for the use of the blacksmiths of the country is found in beds at and near the surface. The coal formation of Texas extends from the Red river in Clay and Wichita counties through Archer, Young, Jack, Throckmorton, Jones, Haskell, Shack



Stephens, Callahan, Eastland, Coleman, Brown, Concho, McCulloch, San Saba, Mason, Llano and Burnet counties. The five last named counties are also largely composed of rocks older than the carboniferous. The above is given as the result of explorations

made in the geological survey of the State.

IRON.—In Llano county, about fourteen miles northwest of the town of Llano, is a large bed of magnetite or magnetic oxide of iron, rising to the height of about two hundred feet above the bed of Jackson creek which runs at its base. Large veins of the ore in granite rocks extend across the bed of the creek into the hills beyond. The iron hill is covered with large blocks of solid iron ore, many of several tons weight, enough being loose to supply a large manufactory of iron for many years, for those huge loose masses almost cover many acres. Indeed a large portion of the hill appears to be a mass of solid iron. Burnett, Llano and Mason counties abound in iron ores, both magnetites and hematites—ores enough to make iron to supply the wants of the country for ages. The tertiary rocks of Eastern Texas abound largely in ores both hematites and limonites. Cherokee county alone has iron enough in its hills and valleys to make sufficient iron for the country for many years. Such ores also abound in Robertson county; also near Jefferson, where they have lately been smelted to a considerable extent. These ores are peculiarly rich, yielding, on an average, 50 per cent of metallic iron.

COPPER.—Copper ores are found in veins in the granite and metamorphic rocks of Mason and Llano counties. Rich copper ores scattered over the surface have been found to a large extent in Archer and some of its adjacent counties, extending westward into Haskill county. Copper ores in large fissure veins abound in the Chinati mountains

in Presidio county.

Marble—The lower silurian rocks of Burnet, Llano and San Saba counties contain very good marbles of various shades of color, white, black and clouded. Granites suitable for building and other purposes, also abound in these counties. The cretaceous rocks which extend over a large portion of the western and northwestern sections of the State, being mostly limestones, have large beds of rocks suitable for building purposes, and these have been extensively used in building in Austin and other cities and towns of the State.

GYPSUM—On the headwaters of the Red river and its tributaries is one of the largest gypsum formations known, extending for hundreds of miles and affording inexhaustible

supplies. Gypsum in all its forms is here—alabaster, silenite, etc.

SALT—At the Grand Saline in Van Zandt county, near the Southern Pacific railroad, about one hundred miles east of Dallas, salt is extensively made from salt springs, where there is an unlimited supply of water, one gallon of which gives one pound and one-third of a pound of salt. Salt wells are also at Graham, in the southern part of Young county. Salt is also procured in shallow lagoons of the Gulf of Mexico, between Corpus Christi and Brownsville, as well as in Western Texas, at Horse Head crossing, on the Pecos, and in large beds in El Paso county, southwesterly of El Paso.

CONDENSED FACTS.

It is estimated that at the opening of 1884 Texas had of improved land, including cut pasture fences, 20,000,000 acres; under cultivation, 7,000,000. Three million (3,000,000) acres of corn were planted in 1882. The acreage of cotton for the same year was 2,810,113. 400,000 acres of wheat in 1882 produced 4,173,700 bushels. The cotton crop for 1882 was 608,120,000 pounds. 375,000 acres were sewn with oats in 1882; product, 9,239,600 bushels. Lampasas Mineral Springs have an estimated aggregate flow of 360 barrels every minute. Texas is now called the Imperial State. The native Texans of the State number over 900,000. In 1882 the corn crop was 63,416,300 bushels. In the increase in population between 1870 and 1880, Texas leads all the states of the Union. Texas wheat crop per acre in 1882, exceeded in value that of any other State. In timber lands Texas has more than double that of any other State. The number of church members in the State is 350,132.

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TEXAS COLLECTION LAWS.

Accounts, How Sworn to.—Open accounts should have attached the affidavit of the plaintiff, his agent or attorney, to the effect that such account is, within the knowledge of affiant, just and true, that it is due, and that all just and lawful offsets, payments and credits have been allowed. If made by agent or attorney, the body of the affida-

vit should allege the fact.

ACKNOWLEDGEMENTS of Instruments for Record may be made without the State, but within the United States, or Territories, before Clerk of some court of record having a seal, Commissioner of Deeds for Texas, Notary Public; without the United States before a Minister, Commissioner, or Charge d'Affaires, Consul General, Consul, Vice-Consul, Commercial Agent, Vice Commercial Agent, Deputy Consul, or Consular Agent of the United States, Notary Public.

AFFIDAVITS, without this State, and within the United States, may be taken before any Clerk of a Court of Record, having a seal, a notary public, or Commissioner of Deeds

for Texas.

ALIENS may acquire property rights under either of two provisions of law. (1.) They shall enjoy such rights as are or shall be accorded to citizens of the United States by the laws of the nation to which such aliens belong, or by the treaties of such nation with the United States. (2.) Aliens who become residents of this State, and shall have declared their intention to become citizens of the United States, have all the property rights in this State of citizens of the United States.

APPEALS to the Supreme and Appellate Courts for delay, will be affirmed, with ten

per cent. on the amount in dispute, as damages, together with interest and costs.

ARREST.—Arrest in aid of remedy in civil action does not lie. Assignments.—1. Every assignment shall provide for distribution of all real and personal property among all creditors, pro rata; shall pass title, be acknowledged, certified and recorded. 2. The debtor shall annex an inventory containing a statement of the account of all creditors, the place of residence, the amount and nature of debt, the consideration, and when same arose, any existing mortgage, collateral or other security, of all estate, real and personal, and the incumbrances, and of all vouchers and securities relating thereto; affidavit that same is true not to effect in any way property exempt under constitution of State. 3. Assignment may be made for benefit of such creditors as accept same; in such case benefit is restricted to those accepting, and shall release debtor from claims of those accepting. 4. Assignee shall give notice of his appointment by publication for three weeks. 5. Creditors shall make known their consent in writing within four months. 6. Assignee shall record deed of assignment, and give bond, to be approved by the County Judge. 7. Creditors accepting, shall file statement with the assignee of their accounts, supported by affidavit that same is just, and that there are no credits or offsets known to same.

8. Any creditor not accepting may garnishee excess of proceeds in hands of assignee.

9. All property conveyed or transferred to defraud creditors, may be recovered by assignee by suit. 10. Assignment shall not be void for want of an inventory. Debtor may be examined on oath as to how he has disposed of his property. 11. To conceal property from assignee to defraud creditors constitutes a felony, punishable by two years in the penitentiary. 13. The verified statement by a creditor, verified and filed, is prima facie evidence of its justness, but same may be denied and controverted in the courts. 13. Claims not due may be allowed at their discount value. 14. Assignee may be removed when incompetent, and new appointment made by County Judge. 15. Assignee shall make distribution when amount on hand will pay ten per cent. 16. Full reports of collections and disbursements must be made by assignee, the same filed and recorded with County Clerk before his final discharge.

ATTACHMENTS issue, on bond in double amount of debt being given, and affidavit of plaintiff; that defendant is justly indebted to plaintiff, and the amount of the demand; that attachment is not sued out for purpose of injuring or harassing defendant; that



plaintiff will probably lose his debt unless such attachment is issued; and stating, further, either of following grounds, that the defendant (1.) Is not a resident of the State, or is a foreign corporation, or is acting as such. (2.) Is about to remove permanently out of the State, and has refused to pay or secure the debt due the plaintiff.
(3.) Secretes himself so that the ordinary process of law can not be served on him.
(4.) Has secreted his property for the purpose of defrauding his creditors. (5.) Is about to secrete his property out of the State, without leaving sufficient remaining for the payment of his debts. (7.) Is about to remove his property, or a part thereof, out of the county where the suit is brought, with intent to defraud his creditors. (8.) Has disposed of his property, in whole or in part, with intent to defraud his creditors. (9.) Is about to dispose of his property with intent to defraud his creditors. (9.) Is about to convert his property, or a part thereof, into money, for the purpose of placing it beyond the reach of his creditors. (11.) That the debt is due for property obtained under false pretenses.

CHATTEL MORTGAGES, to be valid as to creditors, and as to purchasers without notice, must be accompanied by immediate delivery, followed by actual and continued change of possession of property, unless the same, or a true copy thereof, is filed in the county clerk's office of county where property situated, or in county of residence of mortgagor. Mortgages held to be mere security for the debt, and must be enforced by sale of property; sale of property, upon death of mortgagor, must be enforced through

probate court.

COMMERCIAL TRAVELER, Tax Upon.—Every commercial traveler must pay an annual tax of \$35 to the State Controller; no county, city or town can levy any such tax; and persons soliciting for religious, library or historical books or maps, or for nurseries, are exempt from the State tax.

Corporations, in suits by, not required to prove corporate existence, unless defendant deny same by sworn plea. Private corporations for all purposes of business,

except banking, may be created under the provisions of the general law.

Courts.—Terms and Jurisdiction.—Federal Court, two terms each year, at Dallas, Waco, Graham, Galveston, Tyler, Jefferson, Brownsville, San Antonio, and Austin; jurisdiction, where matter in dispute exceeds sum or value of \$500. District Court, two terms each year, generally; in Dallas County four, and in Galveston and Bexar, five terms; jurisdiction exclusive as to land titles, and where value or sum over \$1,000, exclusive of interest; and concurrent with County Court from \$500 to \$1,000. County Court, six terms each year; jurisdiction exclusive from \$200 to \$500, except in a number of less populous counties, where its jurisdiction in commercial claims has been abolished. Instice's Court, term each month; jurisdiction to \$200.

Justice's Court, term each month; jurisdiction to \$200.

EXECUTIONS, from District and County Courts, issue after adjournment, and may, on application of successful party, issue twenty days after judgment, if no supersedeas bond has been filed and approved; from Justice's Court, eleven days after judgment; in latter, may be stayed ninety days; in all, upon plaintiff, his agent or attorney, making affidavit to certain facts, shall issue forthwith. No redemption of land sold under

execution.

EXEMPTIONS.—By the Constitution of 1875 (became the organic law third Tuesday of April, 1876), the homestead of a family not in a town or city consists of two hundred (200) acres of land, which may be in one or more parcels, with improvements thereon. In a city, town or village, it consists of a lot or lots not to exceed \$5,000 in value at the time of their designation as the homestead, exclusive of improvements, provided the same be used as a home, or as a place to exercise the calling or business of a head of a family. The homestead is protected from forced sale except for taxes, or for the purchase money, or for improvements thereon, and in this last case, only when the work and materials are contracted for in writing, with the consent of the wife, given in same manner as required in making a sale of homestead. In case of the death of the husband, the widow and children have one year's support from the estate, and if the property exempt by law does not exist in kind, a sufficiency of the estate may be sold for cash, to raise allowance for homestead, not to exceed \$5,000, and for other exempt property not to exceed \$500. All household and kitchen furniture, all implements of husbandry, all tools and apparatus belonging to any trade or profession, all books, five milch cows and calves, two yoke of work oxen, two horses and one wagon, one carriage or buggy, twenty hogs, twenty sheep, all provisions and forage on hand for home consumption, and sundry other articles, are also exempt.

GARNISHMENTS.—All debts due defendant can be garnisheed except current wages.



Garnishment may issue at time of filing suit by proper affidavit and bond, or after judgment without bond.

Insolvency.—No insolvent law in Texas.

INTEREST.—Legal, eight per cent; conventional up to twelve per cent. Open accounts, no rate agreed upon, legal interest from January 1st thereafter. Judgments bear rate stipulated in contract sued upon. Usury forfeits all interest: not indictable.

Insolvent and Assignment Laws.—A general assignment, by insolvent debtor, must be recorded; have annexed an inventory, under oath, of all creditors; their residence; sum, and consideration due each; how evidenced; place created, collateral securities held by creditors; with statement of debtor's entire estate, giving values. Insolvent debtors mey make assignments for benefit of such creditors only as will accept their pro rata in discharge of all liability. Any creditor having reason to believe such debtor has concealed his property, may have him summoned before District or County Judge, and examined under oath, etc. Any attempted preference of one or more creditors shall be deemed fraudulent and without effect. Concealment by debtor of his property from assignee, or transfer of property previous to and in contemplation of assignment, with intent to defraud creditors, is made a felony.

JUDGMENT LIEN.—In Federal, District and County Court, judgment is a lien on debtors' real estate in any county where an abstract of judgment shall be filed and recorded in a book kept for that purpose, in the office of County Court Clerk. Lien takes effect from date record and index of abstract, and continues for ten years, unless plain-

tiff fails to have execution issued within twelve months after judgment.

LIMITATION TO SUITS.—Written contracts, four years; accounts, other than open accounts between merchant and merchant, their factors and agents, two years. Mortgage lien barred with the debt, but new promise which revives debt, and which must be

in writing, revives mortgage,

MARRIED Women can not bind themselves, nor their separate estate, by making, drawing, accepting, or indorsing negotiable instruments. Her separate estate is not liable for husband's debts; nor for her own contracts, except for expenses incurred for its benefit, or for necessaries for herself and children. Property owned by wife before marriage, or acquired afterwards by gift, devise, or descent, remains her separate property. That acquired after marriage, except as above, or by sale or exchange of separate property, is community property.

MORTGAGES ON REAL ESTATE.—Must be recorded in office of County Clerk to operate as constructive notice. Little used in this State; trust deed has taken its place.

Notes and Bills of Exchange.—The liability of any drawer or indorser may be fixed, by instituting suit against the acceptor or maker, before first term of District or County Court, to which suit can be brought, or before second term, showing good cause why not brought at first term; within jurisdiction of justice, suit must be brought within sixty days. Protest: Such liability may also be fixed by protest, according to the custom of merchants. The holder of a protested draft or bill, drawn by a merchant in this State, upon his agent or factor without the State, may recover ten per cent. damages thereon, besides interest and costs. Days of grace (three) allowed on all negotiable instruments.

PARTNERSHIP.—Limited partnerships, for transaction of mercantile, mechanical, manufacturing and other business, except banking or making insurances, may consist of one or more general partners, being jointly and severally responsible as by law, and one or more special partners, who shall be liable only to the extent of their contributions; done by a certificate, signed by the parties, containing the partnership name, nature of business, names of general and special partners, distinguishing each as such, with places of residence, the amount of stock contributed by each special partner, and the term of same. The certificate must be signed and acknowledged and recorded in County Clerk's office, etc. Partner guilty of fraud in partnership affairs liable to indictment.

REPLEVIN.—All personal property seized and levied on under execution may be

replevied by owner giving proper bond.

STATUTE OF FRAUDS AND FRAUDULENT CONVEYANCES.—No action shall be brought whereby to charge any executor or administrator upon any special promise to answer any debt or damage out of his estate; (2) or whereby to charge the defendant upon any special promise to answer for the debt, default or miscarriage of another person; (3) or to charge any person upon any agreement made upon consideration of marriage; (4) or upon any contract for the sale of lands, slaves, tenements or hereditaments, or the making of any lease thereof for a longer term than one year; (5) or upon any agree-



ment which is not to be performed within the space of one year from the making thereof, unless the promise or agreement upon which such action shall be brought, or some memorandum thereof, shall be in writing and signed by the party to be charged therewith, or some person by him thereunto lawfully authorized.

Surrs, Where Brought.—A defendant may be sued in the county in which the contract sued on by its terms is to be performed, or in county of his residence, at option of plaintiff. Thus a note, payable at Dallas, may be sued on in Dallas county, though defendant reside in another county. This enables parties to concentrate their col-

lections.

Taxes.—Non-residents may pay State and County taxes to the Comptroller of the State, at Austin, on or before January 1st, next after assessment. Taxes are a lien upon land until paid. Taxes become delinquent, and forced collections of same begin on and after 1st day of March next succeeding the year for which they are assessed. Owner has two years within which to redeem land sold for taxes, by paying to purchaser double the amount paid for the land. By the act of April 20, 1882, persons are allowed one year from that date within which to redeem from the State all lands hitherto bought in by the State for taxes, upon payment of the original tax and taxes thereafter accrued, with eight per cent. interest, and all costs, and five per cent. commissions to the collector, under such rules as shall be prescribed by the Comptroller.

TRUST DEEDS.—Used generally in this State in place of mortgage on real estate. Trustee can foreclose according to the terms of the instrument without proceedings in court. Also generally used in place of chattel mortgage on personal property of any

kind.

VENDORS' LIEN.—The vendor of real estate has a lien on same for unpaid purchase

money in hands of any and all parties who have actual or constructive notice.

Wills.—The right to dispose of every kind of property by will prevails in this State. The testator must be 21 years of age, or upwards, and of sound mind; must be signed by testator, or by some other person in his or her presence, and by his or her direction. If not wholly written by the testator, to be attested by two or more credible witnesses, above age of 14 years, subscribing their names in his or her presence. Non-cupative wills are recognized in this State, proven by three credible witnesses that the testator called on some person to take notice of same; not proven after six months unless the testimony, or the substance thereof, shall have been committed to writing within six days after making the will.

LANDS.


State School lands can be bought at a minimum price of \$1 and \$2 per acre, according to the water supply, payable in 20 annual installments, with \hat{S} per cent. interest. Pine timbered lands are held at \$5 an acre, cash.

University lands can be bought in tracts of 80 and 160 acres, at a minimum price of \$1.50 per acre, on the same terms as School lands.

Asylum lands are for sale in tracts of 160 acres, on the same terms as University lands.

Lands set apart July 14, 1879, to pay the public debt, estimated by the Commissioner of the General Land Office at 11,000,000 acres, are for sale in tracts of 640 acres, or less, at 50 cents an acre.

Lands owned by the several railroad companies in the State, estimated at 40,000,000 acres, are on the market in tracts to suit purchasers, at moderate prices and on easy terms.



DALLAS. This prosperous city, named in honor of Vice-President George M. Dallas, of Texas, is pleasantly located on the Trinity river, in the centre of county of the same name of which it is the judicial seat, 315 miles northwest of Galveston. 660 from St. Louis, 515 from New Orleans, and 223 from Austin. A more advantageous site for a city could not have been selected. It is on the east bank of the river in a timber belt reaching to the prairie a mile or more from the river bank; on rolling, hilly ground, supplying a natural drainage which makes the position a very healthy one. It has never had an epidemic of any kind, is far above the yellow fever level, and with its pure and bracing atmos-



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phere, both summer and winter, is one of the most desirable residence cities in the The first settlement was made here about the year 1840, by John Neely Bryan on the exact tract of land on which the city is now situated. Three years later emigrants from Kentucky, Tennessee, Missouri and Illinois came here to search for homes and found a river that knew not the sight of men save the red sons of the forest, who for long years had wandered by its margin, fished in its depths and laved in its limpid waters. In this magnificent wilderness of forest and prairie these adventurous pioneers set to work to make houses for themselves and to lay the foundations of fortune. How thoroughly they succeeded and to what an extent their anticipations have been fulfilled, is evidenced by the present prosperous condition of this "Emporium of Northern Texas." From 1846 up to 1860 its progress was dismally slow. In 1860 a disastrous fire laid waste the greater part of the city, and for the next few years during the civil war, the abomination of desolation brooded over the city. The general improvement in business consequent on the conclusion of the war, once more gave the city an upward boom, and the advent of the Houston and Texas Central Railway in 1872, marked the dawning of an era of prosperity and almost like magic, Dallas sprung from a village to a city of almost Metropolitan proportions; her population in less than a year increasing from 1,500 to over 7,000. Five railway corporations have already reached here, and have established substantial freight and passenger depots; these roads are, the M. P. Ry (E. div. & D. ex.), the H. & T. C. Ry, the D. ex. of the G., C. & S. F. Ry, and the T. T. R. R., all these lines centering here, and with their connections radiating to all points of the United States, afford Dallas means of transportation unsurpassed by any city in the State, with the exception, perhaps, of Houston. The local government is vested in a mayor and board of aldermen. A board of trade is sustained by some of the best representative men of the city, and an enterprising company have now over 40 miles of telephone in operation. The city contains 3 incorporated and 3 private banks, 2 opera houses, 2 large flouring mills, 3 broom factories, cotton, compresses and grain elevators, a factory for the production of essences, syrups, etc., large marble works, the Howard Oil Company, employing 150 men, foundries and

machine shops, agricultural implement works, an ice factory, planing mills and many more too numerous to mention, besides a very thorough representation of the learned professions, the minor trades and all other branches of commerce. Churches of the following denominations supply the religious needs of the city: 2 Episcopal, 2 Catholic, 3 Methodist Episcopal, 2 Presbyterian, 2 Christian, 2 Congregational, a Hebrew and 3 German, and there are in addition to these 8 churches for the colored people. public school system of Dallas is a source of pride to its citizens, each ward having a separate building and an efficient staff of teachers. Besides the public schools, 8 colleges and private select schools are maintained and the African population own 6 school buildings (3 common and 3 private). The various secret and benevolent societies have lodges here, the city is lighted with gas, has excellent water works, street railways, public parks, excellent of hotels, efficient police and fire departments and in fact all the attributes of a first-class city. The possibilities of Dallas, in the way of future increase and prosperity, can ? () be only partially anticipated from her mar-velous advancement in the past brief period since her real progress began, but it is cer. tain that she is as yet only on the threshold of a glorious career, which shall at no distant \(\) date astonish not only the inhabitants of a Texas but the whole civilized world. ELPASO. Or "The Pass," is a beautiful city separated from Mexico by the Rio Grande river, in the western portion of county of the same name, of which it has recently been made the county seat, 712 miles northwest of Austin. Soon after the conquest of Mexico, Spaniards of all classes scattered through the country in search of precious metals, and a party composed of explorers, traders, soldiers and priests coming down from the Sierra Madras, following the range of mountains through which the Rio Bravo Del Norte runs, they came to the amphitheatre between the mountains and the river, where they found the native Indians living in primitive innocence, raising corn and pumpkins, and basking in the sunshine of almost perpetual spring. The priests ever on the lookout for the interests of Mother Church, decided that this was the very place to establish a mission, which they did, calling it the "Mission of our Lady of Guadalupe," and the same year (1620) they built a church, this was the year in which the Pilgrims landed on Plymouth Rock. This was all confined to the west side of the river, and the town was and is known as Paso Del Norte; the east side was a dreary waste until 1827, when Don J. M. Ponce Deleon received a grant of 2 cabillions (about 160 acres), of land, and this was cultivated until the time of the Mexican war when it became the centre of military operations for a few regiments of infantry and cavalry. Several of the officers and men were married here, (f) and with traders and camp followers remained after the war waiting for the railroad. They waited until after the panic of 1873 when all railroad expectations ceased, then they left for new and old Mexico and other parts of Texas until only a very few Americans were left. With 1880 and the advent of several lines of railroad, a new era of prosperity dawned upon El Paso, and it quickly grew from a deserted town into a flourishing city. The following lines of railroad now have depots at this point: The G., H & S. A, the R. G. div. of the M. P., the Mexican Central, the Southern Pacific and the Atchison, Topeka & Santa Fe; these lines with their connections give El Paso almost unsurpassed transportational facilities for a town

of its size. It now contains 5 churches, a public school, a library, 2 large opera houses, gas and water works, an efficient fire department, a telephone exchange, 2 street railways, one of which runs into Mexico and is the only international street railway in the world, 2 national banks, a custom house, grist mills and cotton gins, a smelter, a number of stores, and 3 newspapers, the Herald and Lone Star both weekly, and the El Paso Times, daily, the latter receiving associated press despatches. The situation is delightful, the thoroughfares are wide and beautiful and are studded with handsome private residences and business blocks. Fruits of all kinds, but especially grapes grow well here, and the excellence of El Paso wine is too well known to need comment. The surrounding mountains abound in minerals, and from its advantageous position as the gateway of Mexico, it is destined to become the most important city of the southwest. Tel., W. U. FORT WORTH. Named in honor of General Worth, who achieved fame ailings during the Mexican war, is located on the south bank of the Trinity river, and is almost encircled by the West and Clear Forks of that stream. It is in the central portion of Tarrant county, of which it is the judicial seat, 198 miles northeast of Austin, 253 southwest of Texarkana, 95 southwest of Denison City and 89 northwest of Waco. Fort Worth, for transportational facilities, is unsurpassed by any city of its size in the State. The R. G. and E. divs. and the W. sec. of the M. P. Ry, the Ft. W. & D. C. Ry and the G., C. & S. F. Ry, all have depots here, and afford, with their connections, means of shipment to all parts of the United States. It is sometimes known as the "City of Wells," from the fact that there are Mouldin more than 100 artesian wells within its limits, which furnish the best water for all purposes. The city contains a court house, erected at a cost of \$50,000, a handsome jail, 4 national banks, the First National, Fort Worth National, City National and Traders' National, all of which have gained the entire confidence of the business men of the town, several first-class hotels, 3 planing mills, door and blind factories, 2 flour mills, a broom factory, a cotton compress, an elevator, 2 foundries, a soda water manufactory, marble works, a mattress factory, several brick yards, an ice factory, and many more too numerous to mention. Of Churches of the following denominations: Baptist, Catholic, Christian, Episcopal, 2 Methodist Episcopal, Cumberland and Old School Presbyterian, and 3 for the colored population are sustained. The schools of the city are the boast and pride of its people, being as good as there are in the State, both public and private; the Catholic High School, which has just been completed, is a magnificent structure, and is capable of receiving over 300 pupils. The city is lighted with gas, has a good system of street railways, a handsome opera house, erected at a cost of \$40,000, and capable of seating 1,400 people, a telephone exchange, which adds wonderfully to the business facilities of the city, the Holly system of water works, which, with the aid of an efficient and well equipped fire department, preclude the possibility of any serious conflagration, a number of wholesale houses, special and general stores, and a thorough representation of the learned professions and all other branches of commerce. A railroad hospital is here, built

for the benefit of the employes of the entire Gould system of roads, which center here. It has been constructed with reference to the needs of this warm climate, thorough ventilation being secured to every part of it. The press is represented by the Fort Worth Daily Gazette (morning, democratic), the Daily Democrat (evening), the Texas Live Stock Journal and the Wool Grower, both weekly publications. following secret and benevolent societies have lodges here: Masons, Odd Fellows, K. of P., K. of H. and Ladies of H., Legion of Honor, C. K. of A., G. T., K. of G. R., and the A. O. U. W. The exports, which are numerous and valuable, consist of cattle, sheep, wool, hides, horses, mules, ponies and cotton. This city has had no sudden boom, it has grown steadily and surely, thanks to the energy and enterprise of its business men, until it now holds the proud title of "Queen City of the Prairies." Gratifying as must be this result to those who have spent some of the best years of their lives in trying to advance the interests of this city, it is evident, that the past is only a forecast of the future, and that the next few years will show a very marked increase in its size and population. GALVESTON. The judicial seat of county of same name, is situated on Galveston island, 50 miles southeast of Houston and 216 southeast of Austin. From its location it is popularly known as the Island City, and is the leading commercial city and port on the west gulf coast. Galveston island, which first became known

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356 to the Spaniards about 1525, is an irregular and peculiar sandy formation extending along the coast northeast to southwest about 35 miles, and separated from the mainland by Galveston bay. When Texas was a province of Mexico this island was a mere sandy reef without human habitation, and long before it was thought of for commercial purposes it became the rendezvous of one of the most notorious outlaws and pirates of modern times. Jean Lafitte took possession of the island in 1817, where he ruled supreme, and whence he committed his numerous and still famous depredations on the high seas until early in 1821, when the brig Enterprise, under command of Lieutenant Kearney, arrived in the offing with demands from the United States government that Lafitte abandon the island at once, which was done without resistance, and the future city of Galveston was laid out in the spring of 1838. Consulting reliable authority, it is gathered that in 1838 this embryo city had thirty or forty houses and an estimated population of 1,000. From this period its growth has been gradual but sure to its present dimensions and importance. In all respects Galveston has assumed the proportions of a thriving maritime city, with churches, custom house and other public buildings which compare favorably in cost and style of architecture with any city of the same size in the country. Hitherto a great drawback to its growth has been the obstructions of the bar at the entrance of the harbor. The south channel separating Galveston and Pelican islands, and flowing out and around the eastern portions, forms the harbor of Galveston. In this channel and the inner roads the water measures 30 feet. After rounding the point and about 5 miles southeast of the city, the water begins to shoal and forms what is known as the outer bar. This bar, some five hun-dred yards in width, consisting of a deposit of sand held in solution, with an average depth of 14 feet of water at mean low tide is the obstruction to the harbor. The United States government has, however, undertaken the work of deepening the same, and a movement is now on foot to induce the government to enter into a contract with Captain James Beads to effect the improvement of the entrance to the harbor on terms similar to those upon which he secured deep water for the city of New Orleans. The proposition has the support of the entire State, and it is probable that before very long work on this

will be commenced. The commerce of Galveston is very large, as it is the recognized outlet for an extensive and very productive portion of the state. Enormous quantities of cotton, grain, hides, wool and other articles of export, pass through this port every year, annually aggregating in value \$30,000,000. In round numbers the yearly receipts of cotton will foot up 800,000 bales; total exports of cotton yearly to foreign countries—chiefly to Great Britain—480,000 bales, and exported annually coastwise and to domestic ports, 300,000 bales. These figures are given as evidence of the wonderful progress of Galveston in the last few years, not alone as a cotton port, but keeping pace in numerous other articles of commerce. The estimated total value of exports for the year 1881 was nearly \$25,000,000, \$250,000 in oil cake, and the direct importation of coffee from Brazil exceeded 50,000 sacks. Since that time there has been a very marked increase in all branches of trade and commerce. The number of foreign vessels annually visiting Galveston is about 250, representing a total tonnage of 175,000, besides nearly 500 vessels engaged in the coast trade. Very few cities of its size have as good banking facilities. There are two national banks, 2 other incorporated institutions, and as many private firms. It has been estimated that the annual amount of exchange sold by these institutions reaches nearly \$40,000,000, and the annual disbursements \$150,000,000. While Galveston makes no great pretensions of being a manufacturing point, it is taking rapid steps in that direction. The prominence of the city as a cotton market caused the erection of several huge cotton compresses, with a combined capacity of over 1,000,000 bales per season. Conspicuous among other interests are several flouring mills, oil factory, foundry and machine shops, sash and blind factory, barrel factory and many others made apparent in the full business list following this sketch. Galveston's facilities for communication with all sections are ample and continually being enlarged. The first one to recognize the future importance of this gulf city was the sagacious Charles Morgan, whose steamer Columbia touched here in 1837—the pioneer vessel in a line of palatial steamers plying between this port and New Orleans and other points east and west. The Houston Direct Navigation Co., under the same management, run a line of tugs and barges between

Houston and Galveston, connecting at the former place with the railway system of the State. The G., H. & H. div. of the M. P. Ry and the G., C. & S. F. Ry both run to this point, crossing the bay at a point a little west of the city, and, with their connections, affording means of transportation to all parts of the United States. As a resort for both summer and winter, no place has greater attractions than Galveston. Its equable climate, its freedom from epidemics for the past 15 years, and the rigid sanitary means enforced, make it one of the healthiest cities in the world, as statistics will prove. Chief among its attractions for pleasure-seekers are its wealth of fish and oysters, crab, shrimp, plover, duck, etc., tropical fruits, magnificent surf bathing free from dangerous undertow, and its wide, hard beach running 30 miles down the island, forming the finest boulevard in the world. Situated in the very apex of the gulf, with the best harbor on the coast of Texas, and an open highway to the sea and with all the most favorable auxiliaries to prosperity a splendid future for this city is assured. The government of Galveston is vested in a mayor and board of aldermen (elected bi-ennially). The city has efficient police and fire departments, and a capital system of water works for fire purposes, the pipe distribution covering the business portion of the city. It is expected that within 18 months this will be supplanted by a fresh water supply which will embrace the entire city limits. Its religious and educational advantages alone serve to mark it as a refined, progressive city, and almost every known secret or benevolent organization, both white and colored, are here represented. The city enjoys the benefits derived from excellent gas and electric light works, and has all the other attributes of a first-class city. The press is represented by the Galveston News (daily and weekly), leading paper of the State; established 1842, company incorporated 1881, A. H. Bels & Co, publishers. A. H. Bels, president; T. W. Dealey, secretary and business manager. The enterprising management of this great paper have just finished the most commodious and complete newspaper office in the South. The building is a massive, three story, fire proof structure, designed and arranged with especial reference to issuing a paper like the Galveston News. In every department attention has been given to the matter of accommodation and comfort for the work-

ers on the paper. New presses, new type and a new outfit generally are on hand, and when put into service will make the News the handsomest paper in the South. The other papers are the Evening Print, Texas Post, (daily and weekly, German), Civilian (daily), Opera Glass (Sunday), the Chritsian Advocate and several others.
