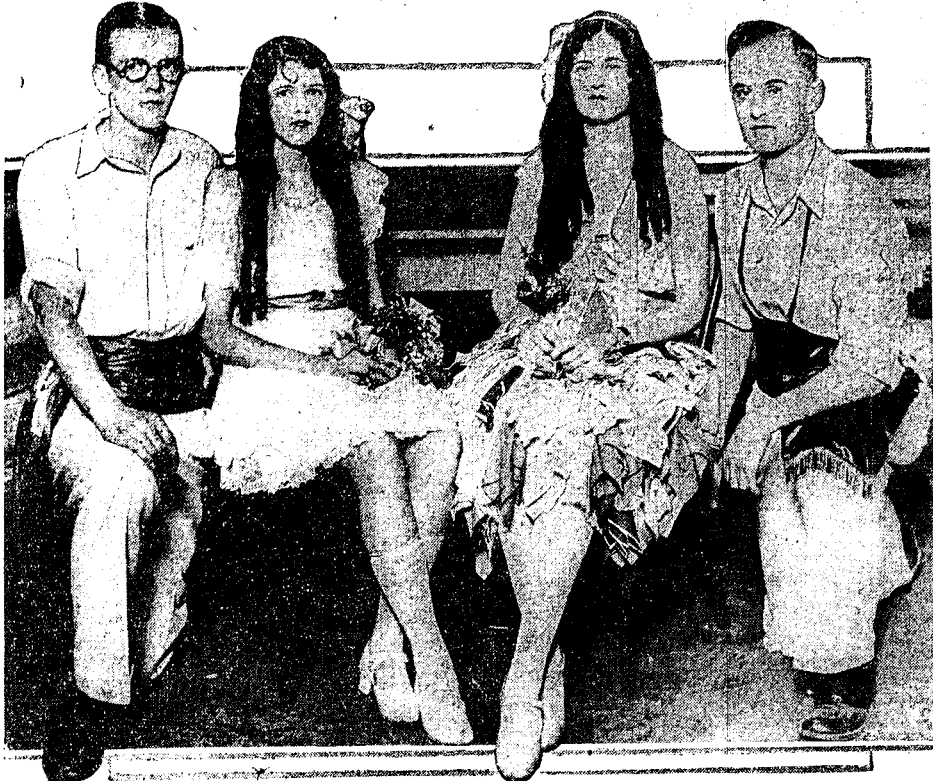


## Tech Commencement Ends With Interfraternity Fancy

GEORGIA TECH commencement was brought to a close Monday evening with the brilliant and colorful interfraternity and faculty ball given in the gymnasium of Tech.

The grand march, which the commencement dances were being held was elaborately decorated, presenting a joyous scene with the Tech colors, yellow and white, predominating.

Yellow hunting with white fringe hung at regular intervals from the ceiling and between each row of hunting hung large Japanese lanterns, hanging from these were brilliant colored lighted lanterns.

The entire outer edge of the ballroom was outlined with decorations carrying out the Japanese effect.
