JOHN CABELL BRECKINRIDGE, b. at Cabell's Dale, Kentucky, 21st January, 1821; d. 17th May, 1875, at Lexington, Kentucky; Major in Kentucky Volunteers, 1847; serving in the war with Mexico; elected to Congress, 1851; and again 1853; Vice-President of United States, 1857–1861; United States Senator, 1861; appointed Brigadier-General in the Confederate States Army 1861, and Major-General, 1862; Secretary of War, 1865; at the Democratic Convention in Charleston, South Carolina, in 1860, he received seventy-two votes as a candidate for the Presidency of the United States against one hundred and eighty cast for Mr. LINCOLN, thirty-nine for John Bell and twelve for Stephen Douglass. He took his seat in the United States Senate 4th March, 1861, where he announced the election of Abraham Lincoln to the Presidency before both houses of Congress. Spurning a proposition made

In 1865 was appointed by President Davis, Secretary of War; assisted President Davis in his flight at the collapse of the Confederacy and himself escaped to England where he remained until 1868 when he returned to the United
