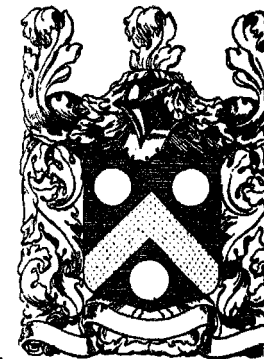

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WILLIAM MARSHALL BULLITT, *b.* 4th March, 1873 at Louisville, Kentucky; *m.* 31st May, 1913, at Stockbridge, Massachusetts, Nora IASIGI, *b.* 23d August, 1881, at Boston, Massachusetts, dau. of Oscar and Amy Gore (WALKER) IASIGI.

WILLIAM MARSHALL BULLITT was educated in Louisville private schools; Lawrenceville School, New Jersey (Class 1890); B.S., Princeton University, 1894; LL.B. University of Louisville, 1895; Solicitor General of the United States 15th June 1912 to 11th March, 1913, resigning at the close of the Taft administration. Counsel in various important cases in the Supreme Court of the United States notably those involving the constitutionality of the War Time Prohibition Act, the Eighteenth Amendment, the Federal Farm Loan Act, the Income Tax Law as applied to the salaries of the President of the United States and the Federal Judges, the Newspaper Publicity Act, the Kentucky Insurance Premium Tax Act and the Anti-Removal Act; the "Cotton Corner," and the United States Steam Machinery cases; in active practice especially in insurance, banking and general corporate matters; edited Bullitt's "Codes of Practice," 1899; Director and Member of Executive Committee, Fidelity and Columbia Trust Company; Director and Counsel, Citizens Union National Bank, Citizens Union Fourth Street Bank, Kentucky Title Company, Chairman Board of Public Safety of Louisville from November, 1907, until May, 1909, when he resigned; Delegate from state-at-large to the Republican National Conventions of 1908 and 1916; Republican nominee for the United States Senate in 1914 (defeated at election); active in organization of Plattsburg movement for military preparedness (1915-1918); Member Executive Committee Military Training Camps Association, and chairman of Kentucky during the War; Major, American Red Cross, Deputy Commissioner for France 1918-1919. Mr. BULLITT descends from many distinguished ancestors among whom are William RANDOLPH of Turkey Island, Virginia, Col. Gerard FOWKE, Capt. Randolph BRANDT, Dr. Gustavus BROWN, of Maryland; Col. John HENRY, Col. William CHRISTIAN, Maj. Thomas WALKER, Col. Joshua FRY, the Rev. James KEITH, and Col. Thomas MARSHALL, all of Virginia. Colonel FRY was *b.* Somersetshire, England; educated at Oxford; commissioned Colonel and Commander-in-Chief of the Virginia forces in 1754; General WASHINGTON being Lieutenant-Colonel under him. Mr. BULLITT is the gr. gr. nephew of both Patrick HENRY and Chief Justice MARSHALL.

Lineage

JOSEPH BULLITT, the Huguenot ancestor of the BULLITT family in America, was one of the early settlers of Charles County, Maryland. He was *b.* prior to 1653, and it is believed that his father was born in the province of Languedoc, and left France as a young man to escape the persecutions which preceded and followed the revocation of the Edict of Nantes. On 15th November, 1676, Joseph BULLITT witnessed the will of one Elizabeth LILLY in Charles County, Maryland (see Will Book 4, page 155, Land Office, Annapolis), and he purchased land near Port Tobacco, Charles County, Maryland, where he *d.* in March, 1692; he *m.* circa, 1685, Elizabeth BRANDT, *d.* in Maryland prior to March, 1694, when her will was probated, she was the dau. of Capt. Randolph BRANDT, *b.* in Barbadoes, West Indies, *d.* in Maryland, February, 1698.

BENJAMIN BULLITT, Gentleman; *b.* in Charles County, Maryland, 28th April, 1693; *d.* in Fauquier County, Virginia, 9th January, 1766; *m.* (firstly) 1737, Elizabeth HARRISON, she *d.* 1757, dau. of Hon. Thomas HARRISON, *b.* 1665, *d.* 1746, of "Chappawampsic," Stafford County, Virginia. Benjamin BULLITT was Justice of Prince William County, Virginia, in 1743.

- II. Thomas, *b.* 1730; Captain of the 1st Virginia Regiment, French and Indian War, under command of General WASHINGTON, at that time a Colonel; visited the Falls of the Ohio as surveyor, 1773; *d.* unmarried in Fauquier County, Virginia, February, 1778.
- III. Elizabeth, called "Seth" in her father's will; *b.* 1731; *d.* 1790; *m.* John COMBS; had issue.
- IV. Benjamin, *b.* 1733; Lieutenant in the "Patriot Blues," commanded by SPOTSWOOD; killed, aged twenty, in an engagement with Indians, shortly after BRADDOCK's defeat; unmarried.
- V. CUTHBERT, *b.* 1740, of whom below.

HON. CUTHBERT BULLITT, *b.* 1740, in Fauquier County, Virginia; *d.* at "View Mount," Prince William County, Virginia, 27th August, 1791; studied law and practised in Prince William County; Delegate to Virginia Assembly, 1777 and 1787, and at one time Speaker of the House; Member of the Virginia Convention of 1775-176-1778, and of Prince William County Committee of Safety; in 1777 appointed, with six others, Commissioner to ascertain loss by fire Norfolk, Virginia, sustained at the hands of the British; elected 27th December, 1788, by joint ballot of the Senate

and House of Delegates, Additional Judge of the General Court of Virginia; commissioned by Lord DUNMORE, in 1773, to survey land at the Falls of the Ohio with his brother, Capt. Thomas BULLITT, *m.* circa 1760, Helen SCOTT, *b.* in Overwharton Parish, Stafford County, Virginia, 7th June, 1739, *d.* in Prince William County, Virginia, 15th or 16th September, 1795, dau. of Rev. James SCOTT, *b.* Dipple Parish, Elgin, Scotland; *d.* at "Clermont," Prince William County, 1782; he *m.* 1738, Sarah BROWN, *b.* at "Rich Hill," Charles County, Maryland, 29th August, 1715; *d.* in Virginia. Sarah BROWN was sister of Dr. Gustavus Richard BROWN of "Rose Hill," who, with Dr. DICK and Dr. CRAIK attended WASHINGTON in his last illness.

COL. ALEXANDER SCOTT BULLITT, *b.* at Dumfries, Virginia, 1762; *d.* at "Oxmoor," Jefferson County, Kentucky, 13th April, 1816; *m.* (firstly) October, 1785, Priscilla CHRISTIAN, *b.* in Virginia, circa 1770, *d.* at "Oxmoor," 11th November, 1806, dau. of Col. William CHRISTIAN, who emigrated to Kentucky, 1783-1784, and his wife, Anne (HENRY) CHRISTIAN sister of Patrick HENRY. Colonel BULLITT *m.* (secondly) Mary (CHURCHILL) PRATHER, widow; issue, Thomas James BULLITT and Mary, or "Polly" BULLITT, both *d.* young. Col. Alexander Scott BULLITT was member of Virginia House of Delegates, 1783; moved to Kentucky in 1783; commissioned by Patrick HENRY, Governor of Virginia, as major in the militia of Prince William County, 16th May, 1785; County Lieutenant of Jefferson County, 2d May, 1786; appointed one of the Trustees of Louisville by the Virginia Legislature; President of the Court-Martial, 21st March, 1787, which tried and convicted Col. Hugh McGARY; member of the Kentucky Convention at Danville, 1788; delegate to the Constitutional Convention, 1792, at Danville, and, with George NICHOLAS, drafted the first Constitution of Kentucky, which was then adopted; elected one of the forty electors on the first Tuesday in May, 1792; was then chosen one of the eleven State Senators and, upon the assembling of the first Kentucky Legislature at Lexington, 4th June, 1792, was elected Speaker of the Senate and re-elected for twelve successive years (1792-1804), when he retired from public life; President of the Constitutional Convention which met at Frankfort, 22d July, 1799, and framed the Second Constitution of Kentucky, that continued in force until 1850; elected 5-7th May, 1800, the first Lieutenant-Governor of the State.
