Lineage

The COURTENAYS are one of the most illustrious families of the English nobility, and have intermarried with not a few of the Royal houses. They took a prominent part in the Crusades; and have had in GIBBON a brilliant historian. The family of COURTENAY took its name from the town of Courtenai, near Paris, about the time surnames came first to be used in France, shortly before the Norman Conquest. Sir Reginald DE COURTENAY came to England with the Duke of Normandy, afterwards Henry II of England, and Eleanor, his wife, in the year 1151, and married Hawise D'ABRINCIS, daughter of Robert D'ABRINCIS, and was succeeded by his eldest son, Robert DE COURTENAY as Feudal Baron of Okehampton,

from whom descended the long and famous family of COURTENAY, Earls of De. It is from this COURTENAY that the COURTENAYS of Newry, Ireland, came d through a most distinguished line of English ancestors.

ATHON, the son of the Châtelain de Château Reynard, who in 1000, fortified town of Courtenai, about fifty-six miles south from Paris, was the founder of COURTENAY family.

MARTIN estate 1854; President of the Louisville Gas Company from November 1853 to 1st October 1864; *m.* 13th October, 1842, Annie Christian HOWARD, *b.* 1st February, 1822, 19th July, 1912, and it is through this alliance that William Howard COURTENAY traces his line back to many distinguished colonial ancestors, among whom are two Acting Governors of Maryland, namely, Commander Robert BROOKE and Colonel Thomas BROOKE, the Rev. 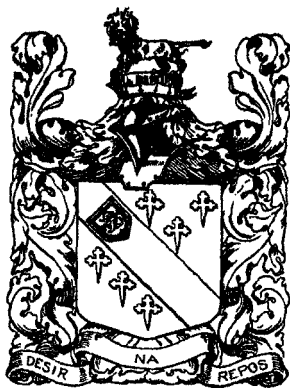
