MAJOR ALEXANDER MACKENZIE WATSON, United States Marine Corps; *b.* 4th January, 1883, in Detroit, Michigan; *m.* 2d April, 1913, in Louisville, Kentucky, Jessie (CLARK) STRATER, dau. of James and Jessie (LA NAUZE) CLARK of Louisville, Kentucky and widow of William Edward STRATER, *b.* 28th January, 1866, in Chillicothe, Ohio, *d.* 24th May, 1908, in Jefferson County, Kentucky.



ALEXANDER MACKENZIE WATSON was educated in the public schools and at the Tamalpais Military Academy, San Rafael, California; appointed to the United States Marine Corps from the District of Columbia; commissioned Second Lieutenant 2d April, 1904; promoted to First Lieutenant 31st December 1907; Captain 14th June, 1914; Major 22d May 1917; served afloat and ashore in the United States Pacific Fleet; the United States Atlantic Fleet; the Philippine Islands; the American Legation at Peking, China; Santo Domingo and various posts in the United States. Served in the World War from 6th April, 1917, to 11th December, 1917, on board *U. S. S. Oklahoma*, and from 13th December, 1917, to 4th April, 1918, on board *U. S. S. Utah*, as Aide on the Staff of the Division Commander, Sixth Division, U. S. Atlantic Fleet, and from 8th April, 1918, to date of armistice (11th November, 1918) at Headquarters, U. S. Marine Corps, Washington, D. C., as an Assistant Adjutant and Inspector.

Lineage

The founder of this branch of the American family was originally Scotch but removed to Ireland where the immediate ancestor Christopher WATSON was *b.* in County Cavan, Ireland, as also his wife Margaret BOURLAND. Josiah WATSON, *gd. son* of Christopher and Margaret (BOURLAND) WATSON who was of Pennsylvania and Virginia, was *b.* 15th October, 1748, and *d.* June, 1828, in Washington, D. C. A memorandum in his handwriting states his paternal grandparents were Christopher and Margaret (BOURLAND) WATSON, and his maternal grandparents were Robert and Jane (ROBERTS) COUCH, but does not give the names of his father and mother. In 1771 he laid claim to 300 acres in Cumberland County, Pennsylvania, which had been evacuated to his sister Margaret WATSON, 24th June, 1763. She *d.* unmarried and intestate and her brother Josiah WATSON was granted letters of administration on her estate 25th September 1769; he was then living in Sussex County, New Jersey; *m.* Jane TAYLOR, *b.* 11th August, 1752, *d.* 10th August, 1830, in Washington, D. C., dau. of ——— and Sarah (FINNEY) TAYLOR. Her brothers were Andrew, James and Hugh TAYLOR, whose will was probated in Cumberland

County, Pennsylvania 1st February, 1782. Her sisters were Sarah TAYLOR VANCE. Her uncle, Alexander FINNEY, in his will, probated in Cumberland County, Pennsylvania, 24th January, 1767, left her land in Letterkenny Township, now Franklin County, and constituted Adam HOOPS of Carlisle, Philadelphia, Bucks County, Pennsylvania, Executor of that part of his estate. Adam HOOPS who *d.* in Philadelphia in June, 1771, was *m.* to her aunt, Elizabeth I HOOPS, *d.* 1782, in Philadelphia, and he, too, left Jane TAYLOR land in Letterkenny Township adjoining the tract left her by her uncle, Alexander FINNEY. The sons and sons of Adam and Elizabeth (FINNEY) HOOPS were Isabel HOOPS, *b.* 17th January, 1763, James MEASE, who was *b.* in Strabane, County of Tyrone, Ireland, *d.* June, 1785, in Philadelphia. He was Paymaster and Treasurer of the Continental Army in 1775; appointed in 1777 by WASHINGTON, Clothier in the Army; in 1780 he subscribed £5000 to the stock of the bank organized to supply the Army with provisions; his widow, Isabel (HOOPS) MEASE, *m.* (see above) May, 1788, Jasper MOYLAN of Philadelphia, *b.* in Ireland, son of John MOYLAN and half brother of Stephen MOYLAN, *b.* 1734, Commandant of the American Rangers. Col. Stephen MOYLAN's mother was the Countess of Limerick, his wife whom he *m.* 1778, in New Jersey, was Mary Ricketts VAN HORNE, *d.* Col. Philip VAN HORNE. Margaret HOOPS *m.* 16th September, 1772, John WALKER of Virginia, *b.* 1748, son of Dr. Thomas and Mildred (THORNTON) (MOTHER) WALKER of Castle Hill. Mildred THORNTON was the dau. of Francis (TALLIAFERRO) THORNTON and widow of Nicholas MERIWETHER HOOPS *m.* before 1771 Daniel CLARKE and they moved to New Orleans. Margaret HOOPS, *m.* 1768, Col. John SYME of Virginia, half brother of Patrick HENRY. Margaret HOOPS, *m.* 18th October, 1770, Thomas BARCLAY, Consular Agent of the United States in France at the end of the American Revolution. Robert HOOPS a member of the Legislative Council of Sussex County, New Jersey, 1778. David HENRY, Virginia and Maryland. Maj. Adam HOOPS, United States Army, *b.* 9th June, 1760, at Carlisle, Pennsylvania, *d.* 9th June, 1846 at West Chester, Pennsylvania. ——— WATSON, *m.* ——— COUCH, dau. of Robert and Jane (ROBERTS)

JOSIAH WATSON, of Pennsylvania and Virginia, *b.* 12th October, 1748, in Philadelphia (?); *d.* 28th June, 1828, in Washington, D. C., came from Pennsylvania circa 1771; settled at "Turkey Ridge" and later at "Bush Hill" near Alexandria, Virginia; was Postmaster at Alexandria from June, 1814, to April, 1821; was a member of the First Presbyterian Church in Alexandria, founded in 1772, and the Trustees authorized to raise the funds for completing the church building deed recorded 2d of October, 1800, in Alexandria shows he purchased and issued a patent for 12,687 acres of land in Powell Valley, on Clinch River,

see; besides this he had 35,000 acres of land claimed under Martin ARMSTRONG, in the state of Tennessee; 16,374 acres of military land in Tennessee; 5,063 acres of military land, HENDERSON and Company grants, state of Tennessee; 14,519 acres of military land, HENDERSON & Company grants, state of Kentucky; 50,000 in Randolph County, Virginia; land in Shenandoah and Frederick Counties, Virginia, and elsewhere; in all a total of 133,643 acres of land; *m.* 28th June, 1771, in Cumberland County, Pennsylvania, by the Rev. 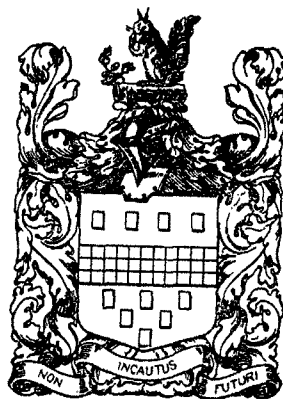
