SAMUEL MACKAY WILSON, *b.* 15th Oct. 1871, in Louisville, Ky.; *m.* 26th Oct. 1899, in Lexington, Ky., Mary Bullock SHELBY, dau. of Edmund Pendleton and Susan Goodloe (HART) SHELBY of "Grassland," Fayette Co., Ky., a graduate of Sayre Institute (now Sayre College), Lexington, Ky., 1894; a student at Dana Hall and Wellesley College, Mass., 1894-96. (See SHELBY.)

SAMUEL MACKAY WILSON, member Board of Education, Lexington, Ky., 1904-5, 1910; Deputy Commissioner Fayette Circuit Court, Ky., 1903-8; Special Circuit Court Judge, 1908-10. Perry's Victory Centennial Commissioner for Kentucky, 1910-13. Professor of Elementary Law, Common Law Pleading, and Real Property, Transylvania University, Lexington, Ky., 1908-11. Lawyer since June, 1895. Editor and Manager Kappa Alpha Fraternity Journal, 1898-99. Chief Counsel and General Manager of Lexington & Central Kentucky Title Company. Trustee of Sayre College, Lexington, Ky., 1902-11. Vice-president and Director, Lexington Commercial Club, 1910. Vice-president Kentucky State Bar Association, 1910-11. Educated at Centre College (now Central University), Danville, Ky., 1886-91, and Williams College, Mass., 1892-93. Took course in Law Department of Centre College, Danville, Ky., 1894-95; during college career won several first prizes in oratory. Among his literary and historical work may be named: "Early Bar of Fayette County," 1901; "George Robertson" (in "Great American Lawyers"), 1908; "The Old Maysville Road," 1908; and Year Book of Kentucky Society of Sons of the Revolution, 1911. Compiled Code of Ethics of Kentucky State Bar Association, 1902-4.

Lineage

MAJOR JOSIAH WILSON, *d.* Nov. 1717. He had a brother, Joseph WILSON, and a half-brother, stepbrother or brother-in-law, William KIDD. He is said to have come from Dunbar, Haddingtonshire, Scotland, and to have first settled in Baltimore Co., on Gunpowder River. According to other accounts, he came from England. In either case, he probably entered Maryland via Virginia. By some it is thought that his father was James WILSON, of Calvert Co., Md., whose will was probated 29th May, 1672. In 1688-89, he signed the "Address from the Protestant Inhabitants of Calvert County" to the sovereigns, William and Mary. Captain in Calvert Co., 1698. Nominated by Governor for office of High Sheriff of Calvert Co., in 1699. Justice of the Peace of Calvert Co., 1700. Major in Prince George's Co., 1702. Commissioned and qualified High Sheriff of Prince George's Co., 24th June, 1702. Continued in this office till 26th June, 1705. High Sheriff of Anne Arundel Co., 1706-7-8. Was an Alderman and Incorporator of Annapolis, under first charter granted by Queen Anne, through Gov. SEYMOUR, 22d Nov. 1708. Sergeant-at-arms of Maryland Council, 1707. Again High Sheriff of Prince George's Co., 1709-10-11. Was a Delegate from Prince George's Co. to the Lower

House of the General Assembly in 1715-16-17. At his death, in Nov. 1717, he left the largest personal estate and was one of the largest landowners in Prince George's Co., with extensive holdings there and in other counties in Maryland. In 1694-5, Martha LINGAN, dau. of George and Anne (HARDESTY?) LINGAN, is supposed to have been a sister of Geo. HARDESTY, who immigrated to Maryland in 1662, and whose wife, Cecilia HARDESTY, immigrated in 1665. George LINGAN was prominent among the early Protestant inhabitants of Maryland; he immigrated about 1664; his wife, Anne LINGAN, came some time prior to 1668; was several times a member of the Maryland Assembly; was High Sheriff of Calvert Co., 1696-99, and held other offices in the Province.

JOSEPH WILSON, Jr., *b.* circa 1696, probably in Calvert Co.; *d.* in Mar. 1726/27. Commissioned Coroner of Prince George's Co., 20th June, 1726, but does not seem to have served in any other official capacity. *m.* circa 1720, Elizabeth SPRIGG, daughter of Lieut.-Col. Thomas SPRIGG, by his wife, Margaret MARIARTEE. (See MARIARTEE.) Elizabeth WILSON survived her husband, and *m.* (secondly) 1734-5, John WOOTTON, being his third wife. (See WOOTTON.) She *d.* in Nov. 1781, and is buried at South River or All Hallows Church in Anne Arundel Co., where her first husband, Turnor WOOTTON, had previously been interred.

HENRY WRIGHT WILSON, *b.* circa 1725, at Annapolis, Md.; *d.* 1777-78, near London, in Bedford (now Campbell) Co., Va. Under the will of his father, JOSEPH WILSON, Jr., he became the owner of one-half of "Landover," one tract of his family estate in Prince George's Co. He was well educated and adopted medicine as a profession, probably studying with or under his cousin, Dr. John SPRIGG, his uncle, Thomas SPRIGG, III. He removed to Virginia about 1760, before which time he had acquired considerable property, but the bulk of it was lost, it is said, in an unlucky sea-venture, either by piracy or shipwreck. Removed from Chesterfield Co., Va., to Bedford Co., Va., about 1772, and at the outbreak of the Revolution allied himself with the patriots who were espousing the cause of the colonies. His half-brother, Dr. Thomas Sprigg WOOTTON, was one of the signers of the "Association of the Freemen of Maryland," adopted 26th July, 1775, as well as the Declaration of Independence. Dr. WILSON's death was due to typhus "fever," contracted while attending, as a volunteer physician and surgeon, to the sick in the Revolutionary Army. He *m.* (firstly) in Maryland, his second wife, Ann WILSON, only child of Josiah WILSON, son of Joseph WILSON of Calverton, a brother of Major Josiah WILSON; *m.* (secondly) in Chesterfield Co., Va., 1755, Agnes LACY, *b.* in Hanover Co., Va., 3d Dec. 1738, *d.* in Cincinnati, O., 1826, dau. of William and Elizabeth (RICE) LACY. His widow, Agnes, *d.* (secondly) 6th Feb. 1779, John TEMPLIN, a farmer of Bedford Co., Va., in circumstances, who *d.* in Lincoln (now Mercer) Co., Ky., in 1788. Rev. JOHN TEMPLIN, a son of John TEMPLIN, by a former marriage, was the first Pres-

byterian minister to preach a sermon in Kentucky, which he first visited in 1779. The TEMPLINS and WILSONS and others, of their kindred, settled permanently in Kentucky in 1781.

III. JOSHUA LACY, *b.* 22d Sept. 1774.

JOSHUA LACY WILSON, D. D., *b.* 22d Sept. 1774, in Bedford Co., Va.; *d.* in Cincinnati, O., 14th Aug. 1846. Lived in Lincoln and Mercer Cos., Ky., from 1781 to 1795. Then purchased a small farm in Jessamine Co., on which he lived for a year. Entered the Kentucky Academy at Pisgah, in Woodford Co., in 1796, having the Jessamine Co. farm to pay for his schooling. Remained at the Kentucky Academy a year. Then studied in a private school conducted by Rev. William Patton, an Irish schoolmaster of ability, but of intemperate habits. For two years living he was principal of an academy in Frankfort, Ky., during a part of which he also studied law. Later he acted as a tutor in the family of Capt. Abraham Smith, in Jefferson Co., and then he began the study of theology under Rev. James McCreary, whom he assisted in the conduct of a private school carried on by him on Grass Creek in Jefferson Co. Was licensed to preach, by the Transylvania Synod, at Spring Hill, Tenn., on 8th Oct. 1802. In the spring of 1803 he left the home of Capt. HITE, and moved to Bardstown, Ky., where he resided continuously until his removal to Cincinnati, O., in the spring of 1808. Was ordained at a Meeting House in Mercer Co., Ky., by the Presbytery of Transylvania, 8th Nov. 1804, and thereupon took charge of the Bardstown and Big Spring Churches, which he had been called the preceding April. On 8th Mar. 1808, he received an invitation to visit the Presbyterian Church at Cincinnati, which he did. About 1st Nov. 1808, he received a call to fill that pulpit. He accepted, after resigning his churches in Kentucky, and on 28th May, 1808, he was duly installed as pastor of the Church in Cincinnati, the first, and at that time the only, Presbyterian Church in that city. He held this pastorate, without interruption, until his death. In 1805, as a member of the Commission of the Kentucky Synod, appointed to inquire and adjust, if possible, the ecclesiastical disturbances in the Cumberland Presbytery. This commission, composed of the very ablest Presbyterian preachers in Kentucky, has been pronounced "one of the most interesting and important convocations ever known in the American Church." He received the degrees of A. M., in 1812, and D. D., in 1823, from Cincinnati College, where for some time he acted as professor of Moral Philosophy. In connection with Dr. Daniel DRAKE, he had been largely instrumental in founding this institution, and he was Chairman of its Board of Trustees. From 1839 to 1844, he was one of the Trustees of Hanover College, Ind., and was one of the chief promoters of the Lane Theological Seminary. He was likewise a member of the celebrated "College of Teachers," organized in Cincinnati by its leading thinkers in 1831. He was a member of the American Association of that city; many times a delegate to the various judicatories of the Presbyterian Church; frequently officiated as a moderator of Presbyteries and Synods, and in 1839, was Moderator of the General Assembly of the Old School Presbyterian Church. Dr. WILSON's writings were chiefly of a theological and polemical nature. He lived in the age of the pamphleteer, and much of his literary work appeared in that form. For several years he edited the "**Pandect**" and the

"Standard," both religious newspapers, of which he was the founder, and he was some time associate editor of the "Presbyterian of the West." In the great controversy which divided the Presbyterian Church in 1837, Dr. WILSON bore an active and prominent part, and was one of the signers of the celebrated "Act and Testimony," which signalized that division. Though he had been favorable to the plan of Dr. Lyman BEECHER at the head of the Lane Seminary, he subsequently became so much dissatisfied with what he believed to be Dr. BEECHER's peculiar theological views that he prosecuted him for heresy, both before the Presbytery and the Synod of Cincinnati in Oct. 1835. Regarding the action of the Synod in the case as unlenient, he carried an appeal to the General Assembly of 1836, but was subsequently induced to withdraw it, on the ground that there was another case pending before the Assembly, involving the principle which he wished to have decided. This pleasant business was conducted throughout without any personal animosity or single unkind word, according to his distinguished adversary's own admission.
