 of Barren County in the State of Kentucky being
 in perfect health of body and of sound and disposing
 mind memory and understanding considering the vicinity
 of death and the uncertainty of the time thereof and
 being desirous to settle my worldly affairs and thereby to
 the better prepare to leave this world, do hereby declare
 that I do hereby make and publish this my last will and testament in manner and
 form following, that is to say, First, and principally
 I bequeath my real estate the land of Spring Hill, Va.
 and my body to the earth to be decently buried
 at the discretion of my Executors hereinafter named
 and after my debts and funeral charges are paid
 I give and bequeath as follows: I give and
 bequeath unto my son Daniel W. Roberts of Kentucky
 in the State of Virginia One dollar & Ten
 Cents and bequeath unto my Daughter, Mary who
 she last time that I heard from her, resided in
 the State of Georgia, one dollar & Ten Cents. I give &
 bequeath unto my son Charles W. Roberts of Barren County
 in the State of Kentucky One dollar & Ten Cents
 I give and bequeath unto my son, Michael Roberts in
 the State of Virginia One dollar & Ten Cents. I give and
 bequeath unto the heirs of my Daughter, Mary deceased
 who formerly lived in the State of Virginia ten
 shillings each namely, John Daniel & Elizabeth
 Roberts of Memphis, Va. I give and bequeath unto the
 heirs of my Daughter, Mary ten shillings each namely,
 Thomas, Lucy & Sally Roberts. I give and bequeath
 unto my Daughter, Lucy Moulton of Barren County

in the State of Kentucky one dollar & Ten Cents and bequeath
 unto my Grand son, Thomas W. Roberts (the eldest son of my
 son, Charles W. Roberts) all my claim rights and profits that is
 and hereafter would be due to me from my son, Daniel W. Roberts
 for the sale and use of my land during my life here being in
 Kentucky County, State of Virginia on the waters of Sta. Albans
 Creek where I formerly had a part of a great plantation
 I sold out my son, Daniel W. Roberts all the plantation and land
 with an article of agreement with him, to wit, to let of the plantation
 I sold out the lands of my Daughter, Mary Moulton for
 her for me and some time afterwards I sold her for it
 and she said that she had lost her husband, so that she
 could not find it at that time. And also that part of
 my plantation which I sold out to her my dwelling house
 and that I left in her the Cow, W. Roberts and one about
 which part there was no writing drawn between us, but which
 now it is considered that the use be made of it, be worth
 indicating the concept to her part of the dwelling house and
 saying he has moved off the land and also five pounds
 that he was to collect for me from Mary. But I the price of
 two cows, one and one calf that I left with him the said
 Daniel W. Roberts I also the price of my wheel, and half of one chair
 two that I own. I have powder under that I left in the care
 of the said Daniel W. Roberts my son. And for the time I live and
 regard that I have for my slave named, Grandson, the W.
 Roberts which he has singularly merited, by his good morals
 and tender care ever, and in my declining years I
 have fully given granted and bequeathed unto him all
 the property here mentioned in price of it, if it should
 or may have been sold since an of a destroyed since my
 departure from the State of Virginia which was in the
 year of our Lord 1807 together with the money he has for
 the said year of my said and house and land
 And further more I do hereby give grant & bequeath
 unto my said Grandson, the W. Roberts all the money
 that is due me from my son, Charles W. Roberts namely for
 a gift of a horse that I sold in some Virginia to Kentucky
 which he sold for about fifty dollars and for a bay
 mare which I drew out in the City which he
 sold for fifteen dollars and two dollars in
 cash that I lent him in my house at his
 home in the year above mentioned. I also give
 him in cash that I cannot have a few more

several shillings for rent and also
for buying twenty two new shillings for him since
he has been in the state of Kentucky for which I charge
him two dollars each amounting to four dollars
of it lastly I have considered and ascertained
where was at President's dinner in March to be my
last will and testament and I have made
and executed all former wills to be null and
void ratifying and confirming this and none others
to be my last will and testament.
I have been and get my hair
cut and shaved my head this day of September
in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred

they signed their names as witnesses thereto in her
presence & thereupon the said writing was ordered
to be recorded as the true last will & testament of

5) In the name of God Amen. William M. Perkins
of Barren County and State of Kentucky being of sound
disposing mind and memory but knowing the uncertainty of
life the certainty of death and the uncertainty of the time of
death may happen do make certain constitution and declare this
my last will and testament in manner and form following
that I give and direct and positively order that all my
general charges to be paid by my Executors hereafter named
I bequeath to my beloved wife Lucy Wilkinson I give and bequeath
during her natural life a widowhood all that part of
the place whereon I now live that is west of the
spring for her support she and my son named William
and a negro woman named Abigail and her mother and as
long as she is called for and a brother called two cows and
two pigs and one hundred dollars in money and the portion of the mare
above mentioned she is to take choice of all my stock to the
amount of her share she at my side with their furniture
and bed clothes and all my household and kitchen furniture
of every description all which I sell the negro plantation
and to be at her disposal at her death.
I give to my son John Wilkinson and my daughter Polly Hays
Polly Hays and the children of my deceased son William Wilkinson
whose names I do not now recollect I give five shilling Sterling
each to my sons William M. Perkins Thomas Wilkinson and
Richard Wilkinson and my daughter Nancy Wilcox Elizabeth
Marshall Sarah Sedew and my Grand son William M. Perkins
son of Bully Wilkinson I give and bequeath two hundred dollars
each to be paid out of the fund arising from the sale of my
negro man Peter and my negro boy Isaac and the balance
of my stock not otherwise disposed of by this will which
my wife and stock I direct to be sold at my account to my
beloved son Miles Wilkinson and Lewis Wilkinson I bequeath as
follows to wit I give a cow two years of age and
that came out of the mare which I have given to my wife
she the cattle and saddle which she now owns and to Lewis
I give a stud colt a year old and the advantage called spawdlers
and the saddle and bridle he now owns All that part of my
plantation east of the spring I direct to be rented out and
the profit in repair for the support of my wife Lucy Wilkinson
and to supply any contingency that may arise and at the
time of my death if my wife Lucy Wilkinson or any sons
etc (as will be convenient) I desire that they should
