in body knowing that it is appointed for all men once
to die to Ordain this my last Will and Testament. My Soul
I bequeath to God who gave it my body to the dust to be buried

To my wife Coleman my eldest son I bequeath one hundred
acres of land one cow and furniture and one cow & calf to
him and he as for ever To my son Coleman my second son
I bequeath one fifty acres of land to him this as for ever
To my son Coleman my youngest son I bequeath one fifty acres
of land to him and he as for ever To my eldest daughter I bequeath
one fifty acres of land to her
To my daughter Mary Coleman my youngest daughter one cow
& furniture one cow and calf and four head of sheep to her
for as for ever To my son Coleman my second son I
bequeath one third part of my land during her life To my son
Coleman my second son one cow & calf with the household furniture
to be at her disposing given under my hand this 11th day of
August one thousand eight hundred and eight
