children and her increase during my natural life
and one Ivory horse called a May and one pole on
William Thompson of Nashville for three hundred
Dollars. I have also devised to George Johnson
Wife of Thomas Callahan of Stump and the
half of her body one house and lot adjoining to it in
the town of Glasgow in on Street which purchased
by me of said Thomas Callahan and now occupied
by C. Allen Leary also one negro man named Israel
negro woman young and Hannah her two half my
flock of cattle one hand at my death and one
Dogs little French dog and bequeathed to Nathaniel
Nichols Parks one negro man named Sam. and his
son Caloun and all my hogs, Kitties, F. fish &c give
are bequeathed to John J. Minn one hundred and
half dollars amounting to his Dollars & twenty five
cents to be paid to him by my Executors whenever I
shall shall collect and have together at and the
same time that amount in six and of one cent
pieces I will all my debts at my decease my funeral
expences and the Bequest to John J. Minn as to
be laid out of the property herein bequeathed to
John J. Minn & his heirs &c. I do hereby constitute & appoint
General James Parks Executor of this my last will & testament
and request and direct that he shall not give any
kind of security as my Executor.

equally divided among the three also I do bequeath
part of my Catharine's Bonds to be my
Executors, whom I appoint as executors of this
my last will and testament hereby making

 in the County of Barren declared his last will & testament
 as follows, having called upon Isaac Farnsworth.
 He takes notice that such was his last will & testament.
 That I will that my son Samuel I have nominated
 on my estate and at least at convenient time of my son
 of my farm and all my estate both real & personal
 and do give my estate ^{proportionally} to my children for the
 benefit of all my child in, I will that he take my
 the youngest children that I not named or educate
 better or care and, I will that he take them
 in the same way that I have done for my children
 that have left me and as my son & I am younger.
 Children comes of age a married child that they
 receive of my estate, the same amount that I have
 given to my children that are of age in money or
 property and when my young children die, I
 will that they have received their full share as aforesaid.
 And that the balance of my estate then in the hands of
 my son & I will be equally divided between all my
 children. I will that my wife Rebecca Harris receive
 the same property that she had when I was her
 first wife. I will that my wife Mary Harris and my

In The name of God Amen I George Yates of the
 County of Barren State of Ky hereby make and declare
 this my last will and testament that the Twentieth
 fourth day of April in the year of our Lord one thousand
 eight hundred and twenty nine I have nominated
 my son to be my executor and my body to be buried
 to be decently buried at the discretion of my Executors
 my will and desire is that my estate shall be disposed
 of in the following manner I will that as soon as I shall die
 after my death my Plantation continue to be planted
 up and after my daughter Caroline C. Yates had
 an equal portion off such property as I have given
 to those who have left me, and the property of
 them that have left me except my daughter Mary
 Beards shall be made equal, all my property
 except my land and negroes to be sold and I will
 that my daughter Mary Beards and my son
 John Yates and my son & daughter Mary Beards
 and Caroline C. Yates my negroes which shall be
 equally divided amongst those four named children
 for their legal heirs of their body but fully subject
 them with the balance that may be coming to her to
 be held in trust for my executor for her sole benefit
 exclusively during her natural life and after her
 death, to the lawful heirs of her body my will &
 desire is that my land shall be rented in such manner
 as to have it taken off until my son Charles Yates
 becomes 19 years of age then to be sold upon one two
 three years credit my son & daughter Mary Beards and
 Charles Yates shall be educated for common school
 which shall be paid for out of the money arising from
 Rents, Sales of my Property and after they have
