In the name of God Amen I Michael Brammiller of the County of Warren & State of Kentucky being weak in body but of sound mind & disposing memory for which I thank God and calling to mind the uncertainty of human life and being desirous to dispose of all such worldly estate as I have please God to bless me with, I give & bequeath the same in manner following that is to say I give to Elizabeth Brammiller my wife the tract of land that I own now lying on with all the lands belonging to me that joins said tract, and all other property belonging to me that is not disposed of in this will during her life, at her death Joseph C. and Barbara H. Brammiller is to inherit the above named land & property equally divided between them & I desire that as much of my perishable property be sold after my decease as will pay all of my just debts & to my son Peter S. Brammiller one hundred & seventy one acres land in Warren County Ky on the waters of Falling Timber Creek bounded as follows Beginning at two saplings a poplar and beech rock between Eli Brammiller South east corner thence South 214 poles to a stone in the original line between him & Miller Mally thence north the same west 75 poles to two sugar tree thence North 122 poles to a buckeye & beech corner to Eli Brammiller thence with his line north 62 & 77 poles to another of his corners a stone in the field thence another of his lines North 62 & East 121 poles to the Beginning & to my son Eli M. Brammiller one hundred & five acres of land lying in Warren County Kentucky on the waters of Falling Timber Creek to Beginning on a sugar tree & beech thence South 50 poles to two saplings a beech and poplar with a rock set between them thence South 62 & West 121 poles to a rock in the field thence S 62 W 77 poles to a buckeye & beech in the original line thence North 142 poles to a sugar tree white Oak & spaw thence East 175 poles to the Beginning & to my son John W. Brammiller the tract of land I bought of John W. Kelly lying in Warren County Kentucky on the waters of Falling Timber Creek and bounded as follows Beginning on Henry Reatons corner on a hickory & beech thence at 80 E 112 poles to a stake in John Garnetts line thence north said line South 179 poles to a double beech tree thence W 80 poles to two beech trees

corner to said Kelly thence with his line North 10 West 160 poles to the Beginning & to my daughter Polly S. Brammiller one hundred and twenty acres of land lying in Warren County Kentucky on the waters of Falling Timber Creek decided to me by William Anderson bounded as follows tomt Beginning on a hickory & beech thence at north 80 East 192 poles to two beeches & a sugar tree thence at north 10 West 100 poles to a hickory beech and white walnut thence South 80 West 192 poles to two beeches, and poplar thence South 10 East 100 poles to the Beginning and also one bed bedstead and furniture folding table and chest one horse saddle & bridle a cow and calf some head of sheep & I do hereby constitute and appoint Elizabeth Brammiller my wife to execute this my last will & testament in witness whereof I have unto set my hand this 3^d day of July 1843

Kentucky do hereby make Constitute and appoint this my
last will and testament in manner and form following viz
1st I will and direct that my executors hereafter named
proceed directly after my death to pay off all my debts &
funeral expenses out of what money may be due & owing me
which if not sufficient I hereby direct and will that they
sell off on a reasonable credit so much of my perishable
and personal estate as will be sufficient for that purpose
to be selected by my wife or as she can most conveniently spare
2nd I will and bequeath unto my beloved wife Sally
the use benefit and profit of all my estate remaining
after the payment of my debts & expenses both real personal
and mixed during her natural life with permission to
her to sell any or all the perishable or personal estate
she may see cause and after returning to herself one
third of the proceeds of such sale to divide the balance
of the proceeds equally between the heirs & devisees here
after named in this will - 3rd I will and bequeath
that after the death of my wife Sally that my executors
hereafter named proceed in a reasonable time to sell
all my real estate, negroes with their subsequent increase
and whatever perishable and personal estate may remain
unsold at my wife's death on such credit as they may
think best and to divide the money arising from such
sale equally between my children Elizabeth D. Clark

Exon what he is owing me for paying a security debt

that my executors shall have preference and a lien on any
portion or interest that my son William J. Pace may have
in my estate over any other creditors of his as he is dead
and left no issue I can't conceive nor do I wish his cred-
itors to have any part of my estate, but if they can legally
contrary to my wishes and desire, I wish my executors spend
first as he is owing me two hundred and eighty dollars
with interest for at least ten years security money I had
to pay for him which the note taken in will show for
themselves - 7th I lastly constitute and appoint my
son John J. Pace and my son in law Joseph Glazebrook
executors of this my last will and testament hereby revoking
all former wills or codicils and desire that no security
shall be required of them - Witness my hand & Seal this
the 12th April 1843
