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I my Daughter Nancy and her children and shall hold the same in trust for the use and benefit of my said Daughters and her children. Now I will and bequeath to my said Philomath Waters two hundred and fifty Dollars in ready cash five hundred and fifty which he has already received the two hundred and fifty dollars is to be paid out of my estate and paid to him by my executor. Now I do give and bequeath in addition to ~~three hundred~~ dollars which my Daughter Lydia Windward wife of John Windward has already received two negro girls one of the name of Curriet about nine years of age the other of the name of Caroline about seven years of age the two girls to be held for their use and benefit, as I hereinafter direct: That is to say and bequeath to my son Thomas W. Waters my executor the two girls Harriet and Caroline to hold in trust for my Daughter Lydia Windward and her children; and I hereby give my executor full power to hold the same in trust for the benefit and use of my Daughters and Children and to settle the same upon her and her children in such manner as he may think advisable so as to secure them to her and her heirs. Now I do give and bequeath to my son Thomas Waters one negro girl named Sarah about six years of age and five hundred dollars in cash I appoint and constitute my said son Thomas my sole executor and give him full power to carry into effect the several things herein contained for him to do. He has full power to raise the several legacies which is to be paid in cash and to discharge the same. Now I do my will and direct, and so order and direct that my negro slave named Ann who is now only nine years of age in my will shall serve my son Thomas W. Waters till she reach the forty years of age and then the remainder of her life she shall be free at a time her own disposal when her time of service has expired she shall receive as a compensation for her services one lot and furniture a cow and calf one horse and one saddle and one gun and one pair of shoes all of which shall be paid out of my estate. Now I do my will and direct that all my just debts shall be promptly paid by my executor and that the remainder of my estate after the payment of my debts and the several legacies shall be equally divided amongst my children as follows

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That one Lydia Windward wife shall have part of the annuities agreed sealed and delivered in the presence of John W. Waters this 21st of February 1820

In the name of God amen I do remember that I Maria Shuckly of the County of Monroe and State of Kentucky being weak in body but of sound perfect mind and memory do hereby declare to the Honorable God for the same do make and publish this my last will and testament in manner and form following (that is to say) first I give and bequeath unto my beloved wife Maria Shuckly all my house hold property and kitchen furniture one cow and calf and one yearling during the life of my beloved wife Maria Shuckly and after her death my Daughter Anna Oldham is to have all that I bequeath to my beloved wife and after the death of my Daughter Anna Oldham the above named house hold property kitchen furniture cow and calf and one yearling is to be equally divided among her last five children namely Subal Oldham James Oldham Calph Oldham Mary Ann Oldham Louisa Oldham the feather bed accepted which my Grandson Peter Bell Oldham at the death of my Daughter Anna Oldham is securing my Daughter Anna Oldham chooses all the above named property one feather bed excepted my Daughter Anna Oldham may give at any time after coming to her hands to either or all of the above named five last child and their posterity her last part second I want to Grandson David Chapman Carter the eldest son of my Daughter Elizabeth Carter a certain tract of land containing five acres of land more or less situated to me Maria Shuckly formerly a widow adjoining William W. Hays Survey and John Carter Survey North and South at the money that was Maria Shuckly's husband's part of the
