to bestow upon me with my wife and bequeath the same in
manner and form following Which I gave and bequeath to the
Buckley Creek Manse of the said county of Warren to be
made use of by the said Manse for the support of the benefit
of the said institution in such manner as may seem most
advantageous to the said Manse I do give and bequeath
By my hand my Gray horse called Tiger with my saddle Bridle
and harness and all appurtenances thereto ^{belonging} my beloved
Brother Joseph Roberts -
and I will and bequeath my Gray horse called the
Duke of Cambridge to my Brother Francis Roberts -
And after a full discharge of all my inst. debts and
funeral expenses It is my will and desire that all my land
in Warren county State of Kentucky and town lot in
Edmondson Warren county Kentucky together with all
Balances or Balances of my personal or real Estate to be
equally divided between my own Brothers and sisters With the
exception of one acre of land on Williams right of
Summersville Green county Ky and my Big Boat a cloak
Which I will and bequeath to Edward Mudd of Summersville
Green county State of Kentucky and lastly I do hereby
Constitute and appoint my Brother Joseph Roberts the
Sole Executor of this my last will and Testament, hereby
revoking all other former wills or Testaments, by me hereto
fore made I Witness Whereof I have hereunto set my hand
and affixed my seal this Seventh day of September in the Year
of our Lord One Thousand eight hundred and Twenty eight

In the name of God Amen I, Charles W. Wadsworth
 of Barren County in the State of Kentucky being
 in perfect health of body and of sound and disposing
 mind memory and understanding considering the vicinity
 of death and the uncertainty of the time thereof and
 being desirous to settle my worldly affairs and thereby to
 the better prepare to leave this world, whereof I shall
 please God to call me home do therefore make & publish
 this my last will and testament in manner and
 form following, that is to say, First, and principally
 I bequeath my real estate the tract of land lying in
 and my body to the earth to be decently buried
 at the discretion of my Executors hereinafter named
 and after my debts and funeral charges are paid
 I give and bequeath as follows: I give and
 bequeath unto my son Daniel Wadsworth of Buchanan
 County in the State of Virginia One dollar & Ten
 Cents and bequeath unto my Daughter, Mary who
 she last time that I heard from her, resided in
 the State of Georgia, one dollar & Ten Cents. I give &
 bequeath unto my son Charles Wadsworth of Barren County
 in the State of Kentucky One dollar & Ten Cents
 I give and bequeath unto my son, Michael Wadsworth in
 the State of Virginia One dollar & Ten Cents and
 bequeath unto the heirs of my Daughter, Mary deceased
 who formerly lived in the State of Virginia ten
 shillings each namely, John Daniel & Elizabeth
 Wadsworth, Martha Wadsworth I give and bequeath unto the
 heirs of my Daughter, Mary ten shillings each namely
 Thomas, Lucy & Mary Wadsworth I give and bequeath
 unto my Daughter, Lucy Moulton of Barren County

in the State of Kentucky one dollar & Ten Cents and bequeath
 unto my Grand son, Thomas W. Wadsworth (the eldest son of my
 son, Charles Wadsworth) all my claim rights and profits that is
 and hereafter would be due to me from my son, Daniel Wadsworth
 for the sale and use of my land during my life here being in
 Buchanan County State of Virginia on the waters of Buchanan
 Creek where I formerly had a part of a tract of plantation
 I sold out my son, Daniel Wadsworth also mentioned and content
 with an article of agreement with him what I told of agreement
 I gave him the bonds of my Daughter, Mary Moulton for
 her for me and some time afterwards I sold her for it
 and she said that she had lost her husband's estate that she
 could not find it at that time. And also that part of
 my plantation which I sold to her my dwelling house
 which that I left in her the son, Wadsworth and use about
 which part there was no writing drawn between us but which
 now it is considered that the use be made of it, beareth
 indicating the concept to her part of the dwelling house and
 saying he has moved off the land and also five pounds
 that he was to collect for me from Mary. But I the price of
 two cows, one one calf that I left with him the said
 Daniel Wadsworth I also the price of my wheel and half of one chair
 two that I own I two powder dishes that I left in the care
 of the son, Daniel Wadsworth my son. And for the time I live and
 regard that I hear for my slave named Grandson the W.
 Wadsworth which he has singularly minded, by his good morals
 and tender care ever, and in my declining years I
 have fully given granted and bequeathed unto him all
 the property here mentioned in price of it if it should
 or may have been sold since an of a destroyed since my
 departure from the State of Virginia which was in the
 year of our Lord 1807 together with the money he has for
 his wife's share of my land and house and lands
 And further more I do hereby give grant & bequeath
 unto my said Grandson the W. Wadsworth all the money
 that is due me from my son, Charles Wadsworth namely for
 a gift a price that I sold in some Virginia to Kentucky
 which he sold for about fifty dollars also for a large
 amount which I drew out in the City which he
 sold for fifteen dollars also ten dollars in
 cash that I sent him in my arrival at his
 home in the year above mentioned I also give
 him in cash that I cannot have a few more
