

The Noncupation will of Jacob Gibson deceased.
We do hereby certify, that the said deceased in our
presence during his last illness when he was of disposing
mind & memory, gave all his property of every descrip-
tion whatever to his son Jacob M. Gibson for the purpose
of settling his said son to take care of his mother
during her life and called on us to take notice that
was his last will & requested us to enter it as such
before under our hands & seals the 11th day of February,
1839.

The foregoing writing purporting to be the noncupation
will of Jacob Gibson deceased was produced in court and
proved in due form of law by the oath of James Gibson
& Crawville Gibson. Whereupon the same was ordered to be
recorded as the noncupation will of said Jacob Gibson
at J. Gibson Clerk

In the name of God amen I William Page of Barren County
and State of Kentucky being of sound and disposing mind and
memory, but knowing the uncertainty of life, the certainty of
death and the uncertainty of the time at may happen to make
ordains constitute and declare this instrument my last will and
testament in manner and form following to wit -

I desire to be buried by the side of my deceased wife in the
same burying ground and the Burial to be found in with
a good prominent fence with cedar posts and good paling twenty
four by twelve feet in circumference at the discretion of my
Executor hereafter named. Item 1st to my Grandson William P.
Bridgwater I give & bequeath one tract of land lying and being on
the waters of Boyd's Creek and bounded by the lands of Ephraim
Smith, William Day & Julian Willock, and to my Grandson
Burgess Bridgwater I give and bequeath five hundred Dollars
which he becomes of lawful age and to remain in the hands of
my Executor until that time. To my Grandson George
Bridgwater I give & bequeath one hundred Dollars which he
becomes of lawful age and to remain in the hands of my
Executor until that time. To my Grand Daughter Elizabeth
Ann: Harrison I give four hundred Dollars.

To my Daughter Elizabeth Page I give and bequeath all the
tract of land whereon I now live together with all the tract I
purchased from Henry Conlacher adjoining the same excepting what
would be included on the north side by extending the line that now
divides the lands of John M. Baker and myself on the same direction
it now runs till it strikes Williams' Meads line near the creek
together with all and singular the appurtenances thereto belonging to
her own proper use and behoof, and to be so entirely under her control
that she shall be entitled to all the benefit resulting therefrom in
her own way and not be debared therefrom only as she pleases together
with all my house hold articles furniture also the following Negroes
Cath, a Negro woman and her four children to wit, Mary, Cuthbert
Adam & Sally and a boy named Bill and a small girl named Caroline
and all the crop of land except what will be left to Julian Willock
hereafter named) also her choice of any two horses or mares in my
stock she may choose to select, also her choice of all my cows
and calves taking the two she may choose, also any twenty head
of hogs in my stock she may choose, also any ten head of sheep
in my stock she may choose, and the black that stand in my
house also five hundred Dollars in silver.

To my Daughter Mary Sanderson I give and bequeath all the tract of
land where she now lives on the South side of Shays Creek with all
the appurtenances thereto belonging, also a certain part of a tract of land
which I purchased from Thomas Shaugher adjoining Julian Willock and
Dance Willock and John Moore land also a Negro woman Mary now in
her possession, Rachel a Negro woman and her two children Minerva and
Elizabeth, a Negro woman Cynthia and her two children boys John and
the other not yet named. To my Daughter Julian Willock
I give and bequeath three hundred and seventy five acres of land more
or less lying on the waters of Boyd's Creek and bounded as follows
(to wit) Beginning at an Ash corner to John Sullivan Chenee 187
E. 112 poles to a Black Oak corner to William Day Chenee N. 16¹/₂ E. 37¹/₂
poles to a poplar and Black Oak Chenee N. 70¹/₂ E. 198 poles to two
Black gums and a Dogwood Chenee S. 17¹/₂ E. 108 poles to a stake in
Sullivan's line Chenee S. 18¹/₂ E. to the beginning also a Negro
woman Lucy and her three children John Emily & Ben a Negro
man Jim and a boy Daniel also one horse or mare which
she may choose after Elizabeth's choice a foal, ten hogs as
aforesaid and ten head of sheep, also seventy Bushels of Corn
and one fourth part of the wheat that may be in hand at that
time, also to my Grandson William M. Willock I give and bequeath
one horse and saddle and bridle also my small Shot Gun & the
balance of one hundred and one hundred and one hundred
