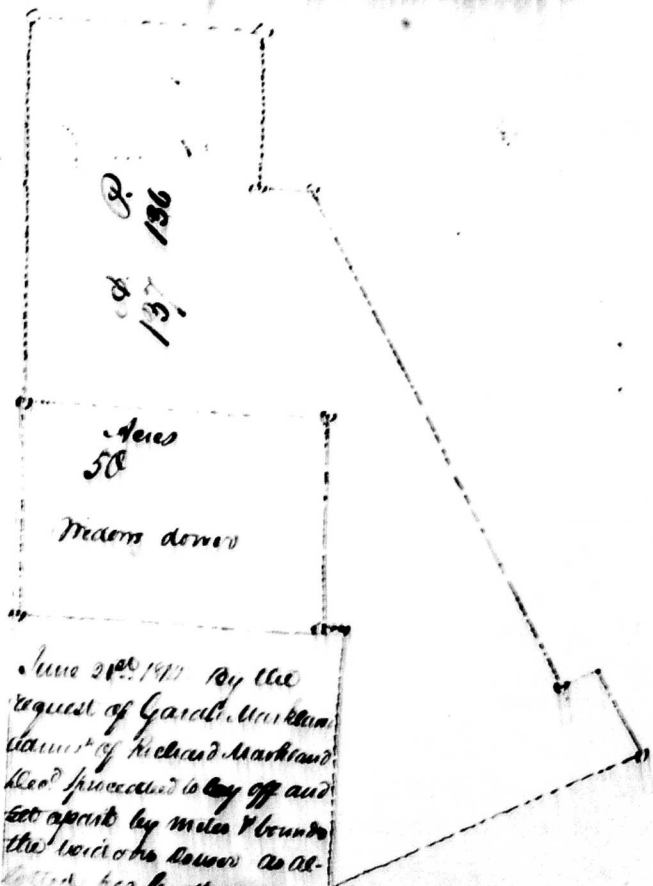


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Agreeable to said Order we allotted to the

being sick and weak in body, but of sound mind
memory and understanding, and considering the
certainty of death and the extreme uncertainty of
life, and to the end I may the better be prepared
to leave this world, whenever it shall please God
to call me hence, do therefore make and declare
this my last will and Testament in manner
following to wit. — First and principally I
commit my soul into the hands of Almighty
God my Creator hoping for pardon and
remission of all my sins; and to enjoy everlasting
happiness in the world to come; my body I commit
to the earth to be decently interred at the discretion
of my executors hereafter named. I nominate
& appoint William H. Hays and William Hickers
to be executors of my last will & Testament with full
instructions that all my funeral expences I just debts
to be paid as soon after my decease as conveniently may be.
Next I give & devise all my mortgages land tenements
and hereditaments whatsoever situate lying & being
in the County of Boone & State of Kentucky (which I
purchased of Edward Goudin the wife of John
Leigh Becken) with their appurtenances unto my
dear wife Mary Brown for and during her life,
and from and after her decease I give & devise the
same to my youngest son Thomas Brown and his
heirs. To my son Thomas Brown I give & bequeath
a little negro girl named Malinda. To my son
William Brown I give and bequeath a negro
called Nelson. To my son James Brown I give
