To her I will one barrel horses four years old against the 15th day of April next with a blag for his life him foot white to his pastern joint One saddle and bridle and saddle bags One bed and headboard and clothing. The reason I James Burns will this to my daughter is because she has had a great deal of trouble with me and my Companion her mother.

To Nancy Birds my daughter, One horse and One Cow, and five hives of sheep and One English gallow Miller and one dollar, Every Burns my son One dollar.

Secondly. I do order and bequeath to my son, Abram I. Ball all the landed property I possess for himself and his heirs forever.

Thirdly. I order and bequeath that all my personal Estate or more after property be equally divided among my four children.

To wit. Benjamin I. Ball, Francis Dyer, Hannah Granden and Abram I. Ball each an equal part. I do hereby order and appoint Benjamin I. Ball and Abram I. Ball, my Executors to see that this my last will & Testament be complied with and executed according to the true intent and meaning thereof. John Rye of Boone County and State of Kentucky being at this time of sound mind and in my proper senses but knowing the uncertainty of all human affairs and the certainty of death do make and appoint this my last will and testament.

1st My will and desire is that all my just debts including my funeral expenses be first paid.

2nd I have given to my daughter Sally Kendall one negro girl named Lucy worth three hundred dollars and to my daughter Sally Willis one negro girl named Mary worth three hundred dollars and I have given to my daughter Elizabeth one negro girl worth three hundred dollars, also my young man two years old last Spring a foal of my own sowing mare and the good bed and furniture.

3rd I give to my two sons William Rye and Sandy Rye three hundred dollars each together with the good bed and furniture each making them equal with my three daughters aforesaid.

4th To my daughter Nancy Craig I leave three hundred dollars to be left in the hands of my Executors or administrators or some other person or persons properly authorized to manage the same, together with all other money or property that may fall to her from my Estate which money and property I wish managed to the best advantage for the interest of my said daughter and the proceeds regularly paid over to her but do not wish the money or property at any time placed

at her disposal. Nevertheless should it at any time appear to those that have the management of said money or property absolutely necessary for her support, in that case sufficient may be drawn from the principal to supply any such deficiency and no more, and at the death of her my said daughter all the remaining money and property the personal effects of my estate I wish to be equally divided among the legal heirs of her body.

5th I also give to my three grand children Merice Caroline and Whitmire children of John Rye and the following I leave to wit. to Merice Rye, and Caroline Rye fifty dollars each and to Whitmire Rye two hundred dollars.

6th To my beloved wife Sally Rye I leave for her use and benefit during her life the following property one negro boy named Ralph and one girl named Susan together with all such stock household and kitchen furniture as she may choose to keep, and at her death the two negroes Ralph and Susan I leave to be equally divided between my two sons William & Sandy.

7th I also appoint my son William Rye and a wife Sally Rye Executor and Executrix to this my will.

Given from under my hand and seal this twenty seventh day of August one thousand eight hundred and thirty four.
