To my son Benjamin Click I give to him David, and all that he has before received.

I do give to my daughter Mary Ann Korman fifty acres of land where she now lives to be laid off long ways on said lot and three negroes Milly, Martha Ann and Rachel with all she has received.

To my son Isaac Click I do give to him one hundred acres of land of the same lot of Mary Ann Korman's also two negroes Benas and Charles, and her increase for ever. To my son Jacob Click I do give to him the farm I now live on supposed to be seventy five or eighty acres, and also one negro, Grawill forever.

Also my youngest daughter Margaret Finnell I do give to her eighty acres of land bounded by Robert Finnell & John Robinson and Joseph Hughes, and also three negroes, Emeline and her child and Pelinea.

And to my daughter Eliza Rink I give her Carolina so long as she lives, and after her, to be given to her two sons John and Thomas Rink I do also give her eighty acres of land where the widow Schum now lives after her decease.

I now come to my dear wife Elizabeth Black I leave to her the whole of my estate real and personal to be hers so long as she remains my widow. In witness whereof I have signed my hand and seal this 21. October in year of Lord 1835.
