In the name of God Amen

I Johnson Mills of Boone county and State of Kentucky
 being weak in body, but of sound mind and memory do
 make and ordain this writing to be my last will and
 testament in manner and form following "that is to say"

Item 1st I leave unto my Beloved wife Susanna Mills
 her hundred and fifty acres of land and premises
 together with the appurtenances thereto belonging
 during her natural life; and after her death... I
 give and bequeath the same to my son William Mills
 and to his heirs and assigns forever, which said one
 hundred and fifty acres is to be laid off in the follow-
 ing manner... Beginning at the most southwardly
 corner of the tract of land I now live on which is
 on the south side of road and corner to John Goff
 thence along S. Goff's line to the creek and along
 the road passing... to the creek and along
 running through the plantation to Edward Graves
 line and with his line, Thistle Harvey's and thence
 to the Beginning as well include the quantity
 of 250 acres in good form taking in the dwelling
 house and other buildings where I now live.

Item 2nd

I divide the balance of my lands amongst
 my other children... to wit: I give and bequeath
 unto my son Benjamin Mills the tract of land
 whereon he now lives which I purchased of Lewis
 Seewee containing about one hundred and twenty
 six acres, also the tract I purchased of John
 Ayler containing about fifty acres, and for him
 to extend up towards my old plantation so far
 as to include in the whole together one hundred
 and thirty three acres in good form to him
 the said Benjamin his heirs and assigns
 forever

Item 3rd

I give and bequeath unto my daughter Maria Watts the hundred acres adjoining the above mentioned 233 acres and to include my old plantation to her and her heirs and assigns forever.

Item 4th

I give and bequeath unto my daughter Melinda Graves the tract of land purchased of John Hall containing about 110 acres and also 110 acres out of the tract of I bought of Colvert making in the whole two hundred and twenty four acres to her and her heirs and assigns forever.

Item 5th

I give and bequeath unto my son Washington Watts the hundred and twenty acres adjoining the lands of John Goff Beverly Ward and the place whereon I now live containing 230 acres which is lent to my wife to him his heirs and assigns forever.

Item 6th

I give and bequeath to my daughter Virginia Watts two hundred and nine acres being the balance of the full tract whereon I live to her and her heirs and assigns forever.

Item 7th

I give and bequeath to my daughter Janetta Watts the land which I bought of John Goff and John Bush that is adjoining Stephen Robinson containing about two hundred and fifty acres to her her heirs and assigns forever.

Item 8th

I give and bequeath unto my daughter Nancy Watts a tract of land in Campbell county adjoining John Scatter containing about five hundred acres to her her heirs and assigns forever this tract if it is not so is to be made equal to some one of the other tracts given to my other children.

Item 9th

I give and bequeath unto my son Benjamin Watts one Negro man named Tom now in his possession which I value at four hundred dollars to him his heirs and assigns forever which is to be charged to him in the distribution of the property hereafter to be made.

Item 10th

I give and bequeath unto my daughter Melinda Graves one Negro woman named Nellie and her son Ambrose which I also value at four hundred dollars to her her heirs and assigns forever to be charged to her also in the distribution of the property.

Item 11th

Be the rest of my estate of every description to wit Slaves, stock of every kind, tools household and kitchen furniture &c &c debts due and demands (my last debt being first paid) I lend unto my beloved wife Susanna Watts for her use and for the use and maintenance of all my children residing with her until my son William Watts shall arrive to the age of twenty one years, at which time she shall be entitled to make choice of four negroes and as much stock and other articles as she may choose to keep out of the said estate for her sole and only use during her natural life and to be equally divided amongst all my children after her decease and all the residue of my estate to be equally divided amongst all my children named as above to them their heirs and assigns forever taking into consideration the four hundred dollars given to my son Benjamin and also the four hundred dollars given to my daughter Melinda Graves in Negroes as above stated.

Item 12 Should any part of the land which I have bequeathed to any of my children be lost or taken by any claim whatever from them or either of them. The said loss is to be a general loss and equally divided amongst them all of them. And should my beloved wife Susanna think proper (on the marriage of any of my children) to give up to them any part of the Negroes in her possession. She is authorized to do so by having them valued by good men giving to no one more than to the value of four hundred dollars -

Item 13 I authorize, appoint and request Joseph Graves to convey unto John Morris by warrant and the tract of land whereon he now lives which I bought of William Cave and receive the payments therefor and deliver them to my wife as a part of my Estate

Lastly. I appoint my beloved wife Susanna Watts my Executrix. And my son Benjamin Watts. Joseph Graves my Executors of this my last will and Testament hereby revoking all other wills heretofore made -
declaring this to be my last will and Testament this 28th day of December in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred & twelve

And on the motion of Susanna Watts Executrix and Benjamin Watts & Joseph Graves Executors therein named who made Oaths thereto respectively to can- and with Isaac Johnson. Reuben Graves and Abraham Graves entered into an Acknowledged bond in the penalty of Twenty thousand dollars conditioned respectively to faithfully execute is granted them for obtaining the a probate thereof in due form

2nd I give and bequeath to my brother Benjamin Gulamy my negro man Abraham when he the said Benjamin arrives to the age of twenty one years - and to his heirs forever -

3rd My will and desire is and I hereby direct my executor as aforesaid to hire out at the highest bidder at twelve months credit. Abraham the said Negro until the said Benjamin Gulamy and to the age of said and the money arising
