Finding my health very bad, and my time
here very uncertain, I think it my duty to make
a statement of my will respecting the little prop-
erty I possess least any contention should hereafter
arise concerning it through such defect. —
Be it known therefore to all whom it may concern
that I wish to dispose of it as follows, ^{And} as
as my loving wife Nancy has through life since
our Union borne the heaviest ^{part} of the burden by
faithful and industrious toils, I think it just
and proper that she shall inherit all our Estate
both real and personal, nothing doubting her sincere
attachment and regard to her daughter Nancy
Finnell and her son Thomas Finnell. And should
the said Nancy and the said Finnell or either of
them or any other children the said Nancy Finnell
may have, Out live my said wife Nancy, it is
my desire they or either of them should inherit
what may be left after the death of my said wife
Nancy. Bequeathing at the same time two dollars
to William Mason as a token of my esteem for his
friendship. The amount of property nearly as follow-
to wit, One hundred and fifty acres of land, One
horse, two mares and One Colt, sixteen head of
cattle, Hogs, two Beds & bedding with other
furniture and farming utensils. At the same
time it shall be at the option of my said wife to
dispose of the above named property either by
public or private sale as she may find most con-
venient at any time hereafter without interference
real or tractable from any person or persons whatever.
And she also appoints the said Davis Carneal Esq.
my Executor in all matters relating to this Will and
the intended distribution thereof that is to say
that my wife shall have the benefit of the plan-
tation & stock &c, uninterruptedly during her life.
