 be paid and burial charges and the remainder of
 my estate I leave as followeth.

And in the first place unto my best beloved wife
 Susannah, I leave a decent support during
 her natural lifetime. Then, I leave unto my beloved
 children Eliza, Samuel, and Robert, the remainder
 of my Estate real and personal excepting to Susan-
 nah I leave the dollars when she shall
 become of age. And I do leave my trusty sons
 Samuel, and Robert Executors of this my last
 will and testament, as Witness my hand this 9th
 day of December 1832.

In the name of God. Amos Thomas Bute of
 the County of Boone and State of Kentucky, being of
 lawful age and sound in mind, but aware of
 the instability of all earthly things and knowing
 that it is appointed for all men once to die, have
 determined to dispose of all my earthly possessions and
 for this purpose I do by these presents make the
 following disposition thereof (to wit.)

1st It is my will that after my decease my body
 should be buried in a decent and Christian like
 manner.

2nd To my step son Thomas Bute I do give and
 bequeath all my goods and chattels of whatever
 kind they may be and all debts which may be
 owing me at my decease, but not until all my
 just debts and funeral debts are paid.

3rd To Thomas Madden I do give and bequeath
 all my landed property, or real estate in the
 State of Kentucky of whatever kind it may be
 and also all claims for land to which I may
 be entitled to in said State of whatever kind it
 may be to him and his heirs forever in consider-
 ation of the great care and attention paid me
 in sickness by said Madden.

4th I do by these presents appoint the said
 Thomas Madden and Thomas Bute Executors
 of this my last will and Testament but it is
 my will that neither of said Executors be required
 to give security for the discharge of their duties as
 executor unless it should so happen that the
 one should wish to interfere in the management
 of the business in relation to the property hereby
 bequeathed to the other it being my intention that
 it should not require both executors to inherit one
 with his rights under this will, but that each
 will act only so far as relates to the property be-
 queathed him in testimony whereof I have here-
 unto set my hand this 27th day of March 1834
