In the name of God Amen, I William Crispinberry, Clerk of Boone County, Kentucky, being in perfect memory and possessing my proper senses and understanding but knowing the frailties of mortality think proper to make this my last will and testament.

Item. First, for the great love and esteem I have for my son David Crispinberry, I give and bequeath to him fifty acres of land more than his equal share with the rest of my children to be laid off so as to include the deeding made by him on the line separating my land from that of John Dimean. Item second, I give & bequeath to my son Benjamin Crispinberry fifty acres of land also more than his equal share with the rest of my children to be laid off adjoining that of Davias and bellical his fifty acres and the line separating the lands of Windell Cook and Nathaniel Grune and mine.

Item. Third. I leave to my loving wife Franky Crispinberry all the ballance of my tract of land including my farm and dwelling house with all my farming utensils house hold furniture stock of horses, cattle, sheep, hogs & poultry during her natural life, and at her death all the loan to my wife, it is my will and wish to be equally divided amongst my children, Rachel Brown, Maria Archer, Sulema Crispinberry, Kitle, Crispinberry, Davias Crispinberry, Polly Crispinberry and Benjamin Crispinberry. In testimony whereof I have hereunto set my hand and affixed my seal this first day of September 1821.
