Item. First, for the great love and esteem I have for my son David Crispinberry, I give and bequeath to him fifty acres of land more than his equal share with the rest of my Children to be laid off so as to include the dearing made by him on the line separating my land from that of John Dimean. Item second, I give & bequeath to my son Benjamin Crispinberry fifty acres of land also more than his equal share with the rest of my Children to be laid off adjoining that of Davias and belloial his fifty acres and the line separating the lands of Windell Cook and Nathaniel Grune and mine.

Item. Third. I leave to my loving wife Franky Crispinberry all the ballance of my tract of land including my farm and dwelling house with all my farming utensils house hold furniture stock & horses, cattle, sheep, hogs & poultry during her natural life, and at her death all the loan to my wife, it is my will and wish to be equally divided amongst my children, Rachel Brown, Anna Archer, Sulema Crispinberry, Kitle, Crispinberry, Davia Crispinberry, Polly Crispinberry and Benjamin Crispinberry. My grand children is to have one eighth part of s^c property to be divided amongst them, Lucy Reale, Landon Robinson, James Robinson, Mariah Hedges, Stephen Robinson and Sally Hedges to them and their heirs and assigns forever, with this exception that the estate both real and personal be bequeathed to my daughters as aforesaid is only left to them during their natural life and then to the heirs of their body. 3rd I hereby appoint my sons Landon Robinson James Robinson, and Stephen Robinson the Executors of this my last will and testament. R. Bent They divided and partitioned the land that the said deceased Richard Bent possessed of into five equal parts (the dower previously had been taken off) as it respects the quantity that being the number of heirs. Lot 1st To Joseph Lancaster and wife, beginning at three beech trees thence East 54 1/2 poles to two beech trees thence South 109 poles to a sugar and beech trees thence West 54 1/2 poles to the beginning containing thirty seven acres and twenty poles.
