On the motion of Rachel Robinette to prove the noncupa-  
tive will of John Robinette p. Mary Turley and Joseph  
Robinette of lawful age came into court and being sworn  
deposed that on the 28<sup>th</sup> day of September last when the  
said John Robinette was in his last illness and a few hours  
before his death but when he was of sound disposing mind  
and memory he called his brother Joseph Robinette to his  
bed <sup>side</sup> specially, and declared in the presence of both that he  
believed he should die - That he wished his brother Jo-  
seph Robinette to settle all his business for him and that  
he left and depend of all his Estate to Rachel Robi-  
nette his mother, during her life. and what was  
left after her death should go to his niece Rebecca Ro-  
binette And that the substance of said will was committed to  
writing in their presence within five days after it was so  
spoken. And therefore the Court being satisfied that the  
 foregoing is within the provisions of the act of assembly re-  
lative to noncupative wills, do order the foregoing to be re-  
corded as the last will and testament of the said John Ro-  
binette p. deceased.
