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of them be furnished with eighty dollars out of the said monies for the purpose of procuring land in that place also. And I further bequeath twenty five dollars to the use of the Gospel, to be given by Executors in such way and manner as they shall think most proper.

And finally I do hereby will, ordain, constitute and appoint James Houston and William Rogers Executors of this my last will and Testament, revoking and disannulling all former wills by me made - declaring this to be my only last will and Testament.
