balance of my Estate in her full possession during
her natural life or Widowhood and after the death of
my well beloved wife Sarah Ann Annow Smith it is my
will that my land and personal Estate be then sold
and equally divided amongst my well beloved Children viz
Mary Languecker William Annow Smith Rebecca Sam-
riott Alexander Annow Smith John Annow Smith Man-
nel Annow Smith Elizabeth Annow Smith Sundry Annow
Smith Levina Annow Smith Alva Annow Smith James
Annow Smith and Sny Annow Smith Also I leave my
well beloved wife Sarah Ann Annow Smith Executrix to

First, I give and bequeath to my beloved sister Abby Langston, all the land which was left to me by the will of my brother John Clarke, to her and her heirs forever, Also my negro woman named Melly one changeable silk dress, one white cambric dress, two calico bed quilts and one white counterpane of snowball figure to her and her heirs forever.

Secondly, I give and bequeath to my beloved sister Margaret Bell my horse and one feather bed to her and her heirs forever.

Thirdly, I give and bequeath to my dear niece Ruth Wilson, one feather bed, with turrelled tick, one pair of sheets, two blankets and a red flannel quilt, one black silk dress, also one bow to her and her heirs forever.

Fourthly, The ballance of my wearing apparel and bed ding of every description to be equally divided between my two sisters Abby Langston, and Margaret Bell, and my niece Ruth Wilson.

Lastly, I do hereby constitute and appoint my Brother in law Abraham Langston Executor of this my last will and testament, In witness whereof I have hereunto set my hand and seal this sixteenth day of May, one thousand eight hundred and fourteen, 1844
