I do hereby constitute this my last Will and Testament. First it is my Will that out of my Estate all my lawful Debts shall be paid. Secondly it is my Will that my beloved Wife Hannah Douglass shall have one third part of all my Estate both real and personal during her natural life and as a part of which I give and bequeath to her the sum and all I now have & hereunto I care also to have the use of all the buildings pastures and property that is used in a house I give and bequeath by me to Joshua Douglass during her life and she bequeath unto her such other and further supplies as may be necessary for her support during her life as also the household furniture the other live stock not given nor hereafter applies to her use. I desire may be sold to pay my Debts. I give and bequeath all my wearing apparel to my brother William Douglass and his heirs forever. I give and bequeath to John McLanahan my sister son twenty five pounds to him and his heirs forever. I give & bequeath to Samuel Douglass my brother son twenty five pounds to him and his heirs forever. All the balance of my Estate whatsoever the one half to be Equally divided among the children of my brother William Douglass and the other half to be Equally divided among the children of Hannah Douglass my sister daughter. I give and bequeath to Elizabeth Wilson five pounds to be given her before the above division takes place and I do appoint my brother William Douglass James Clark, John Douglass Executors to this my Will. Witness my hand this 23rd day of July 1799.
