Full Confidence in the mercies of my God
I undersigned John Savary born in Lyon in France
came to America in the year one thousand seven
hundred and eighty three and became some years
after a citizen of the United States, by my oath of allegi-
ance at Morganstown in Virginia State and now settled
in Millersburg Bourbon County Kentucky State
being on the point of starting for New Orleans and long
serving in case of natural or accidental death, to
leave after me a full, free and irrevocable declaration
of my permanent intentions.
