Indefinite I William Jones of Bourbon County and State of Kentucky, being sick in body but of sound and perfect mind and memory, do make and publish this my last will and testament in manner and form following that is to say That I give and bequeath unto my beloved wife Elizabeth, the lower end of my land to include my dwelling house and one half of the land with my two work mares, a bay with a snip, the other a gray, together with the farming utensils and household furniture to have the same during her life, and at her death I do bequeath the same to to my youngest son Aaron, but at my death the above mentioned mare and household furniture is to be appraised and if the same should amount to more than Aaron's equal share he is to pay back to the rest. Likewise my wife is to have a sufficiency of food from my stock for her next years provision and one breeding cow with one third of my cattle and sheep with my team, tools and harness.

I do give and bequeath to my son Jacob my bay colt. Likewise it is my desire that the rest of my stock should be sold, and the money equally divided among all my children.

Likewise I do bequeath to my son Isaac the upper end of my land, which is to be equally divided between him and my wife.

Likewise it is my desire that my negroes shall stay on my farm for the use of all my children and they are to be equal shares in keeping her in respect. And I do hereby appoint my son Isaac executor of this my last will and testament. Verily revoking all former wills by me made. In witness whereof I have hereunto set my hand and seal.
