Know all men by these presents that I William Hamilton of Bourbon County and State of Kentucky do make and Ordains this my last Will and Testament in the manner following that is: I give to my daughter Nelly Blair ten Shillings, I likewise give to my son Alexander ^{Hamilton} ten shillings, I also give to my son Thomas Hamilton ten shillings, I also give to my son Robert Hamilton thirty pounds to be paid in Horses or cattle at their values. I also give and bequeath to my son Samuel Hamilton the plantation whereon I now live on Taylor Creek containing one hundred and twenty Acres of Land, together with all improvements and profits arising from the same. I also give all my stock of Horses of cattle Hogs and sheep so long as my wife Isabella shall live and my son Samuel Hamilton shall

take care of his mother so long as she lives providing sufficient clothing bedding washing and boarding with all other necessaries, and at her death he shall pay to my Daughter Lily Hinman ten shillings in property and in like manner at the death of my wife my said son Samuel shall pay to each of the above mentioned legates the several sums there mentioned in property and then the whole of my Estate that remaining both real and personal shall be his own and all the Household furniture and farming utensils of every description shall be his - I do also by these presents appoint my son Samuel Hambleton Executor of this my last will and Testament. In Testimony whereof I have hereunto set my hand and seal this 29th day of March in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred. -
