In the name of God Amen, I Isaac Full of Bourbon County and State of Kentucky being in reasonable health of body, and of sound mind and memory, do make and Ordain this my last Will and Testament in manner following, viz.

First. It is my will and desire, that when I sleep in death, my body be buried wherever it may be most convenient, in a decent and Christian manner, and that some one of my brethren in the sacred ministry preach a sermon on the occasion to my surviving friends. Secondly. It is my will and desire that the expences of my burial and all my just debt, if there be any, be as punctually and promptly paid out of my estate as justice and propriety may demand.

Thirdly, I give and bequeath unto my adopted daughter Eliza Full Simpson one feather bed and furniture; one horse saddle and bridle which at this time would be valued at about sixty dollars; one cow and calf, three ewes and lambs, one breeding sow, to be hers and her heirs lawfully begotten of her body; but if she should depart this life without such issue, I will that what may then remain of these legacies shall be equally divided between my beloved wife Betsey Full and my son John Rankin Full.

Fourthly, I give and bequeath unto my beloved wife Betsey Full one third part of the residue of my personal property, except my library, to be hers and at her disposal and
