

Benjamin Fittore's Will

Boyle County Ky Aug 31st 1849

Know all men by these presents that I Benjamin Fittore, late of Lexington Ky but now in Boyle County Ky, bearing in mind the frailty of my body and the uncertainty of human life, being sound in mind and body, do constitute and appoint this to be my last will and Testament, as hereinafter stated (viz) In the first place I wish my body to be decently buried and my funeral expenses to be paid out of any money I may have on hand or in Bank. Secondly, It is my will that my colored man Michael Clark and his wife Jennie and their children shall be fed and regularly maintained according to law immediately after my demise. I also give to Michael Clark, the following notes or accounts (viz) the whole amount due me by W. Baldwin of Lexington also the amount due me by W^m Matthews of Bourbon County, near Hot Rock, also all the money I may have in Bank, these notes or accounts will be found in my trunk at Mr Charles Lexington. Lastly, I give and bequeath to James B. Alder, an Englishman, now living at S. F. Southern's Factory, in Boyle County Kentucky, all the notes or accounts I hold as Benjamin Fittore of Franklin County. I have four trunks two at Mr Charles, and two at B. Boyle. All four of the above trunks I give to my colored man Michael Clark. In conclusion I do hereby constitute and appoint James B. Alder my Executor to carry this my last will and Testament into effect.

Dennis Wedgemans Will

In the name of God Amen. I, Dennis Wedgemans of the County of Boyle and State of Kentucky, do hereby make this my last will and Testament in manner and form following to-wit: Item the first, I desire that all the perishable part of my estate be disposed of if necessary and the money arising thereupon to be appropriated to the payment of my debts if any, and my funeral expenses should my perishable property be insufficient, then such real estate as I may have be sold for such purpose. Item the Second, after the payment of my just debts and funeral expenses, I give my wife Susan Wedgemans one third part of my estate both real and personal for and during the term of her natural life, and after her decease, I give the same to my Child Rosetta Robertson and her heirs forever and in the event, I should have other Children or her heirs born of my wife Susan Wedgemans then my estate to be equally divided between the said Robertson Rosetta and such Child or Children to them and their heirs forever. In witness whereof I have hereunto set my hand and seal this 7th day of February in the year of our Lord 1850
