As the judgments of God are in the land and I may be suddenly called from time to eternity, it is proper for me to make a true statement of my affairs; (as follows) D. F. Robertson

My note in Bank for \$200. will be due the 1st of Nov next

I owe Mr. C. Cooper \$137.50 due Jan'y 1st 1850

Balance for Rent to D. Reed 120.66 including 1848 & 1849

Stephen Moyers Esq. of Shelby 50.00 - no Interest to be paid on it

J. H. Caldwell & M. Roberts 11.63 - I paid \$5.00 of this July 16th 1849 ~ \$519.79

There is due to me the following sums

James Garrett's note - \$220.00 after deducting D. Reed.

G. Cornelius note 20.00 -

In acct for Auction in Balances to be seen in my little

Black Book for 1849 with reference to other books of former date. 240.15

Major Daniel & Wife 20.00

I have in Cash 75.00 my note to S. Moyers for \$50. to be paid out of it \$575.15

In my favor \$55.36

There are many small debts due me; Honest men will remember them and pay to those I leave behind for I made no acct of them - D. F. Robertson

The County Court of Boyle will owe me \$85. at Nov Court next for keeping Mary Donner, \$70. of which is to be paid to Miss Nancy Carner for her Board - the balance is mine - D. F. R.

Brother John H. Caldwell promised me to settle my affairs at my decease: in him all may Confide. I wish him to sell all I leave, my Books Household & Kitchen furniture & pay every debt I owe - The foregoing is a true list of all I do owe - My son & daughter will take my aged Companion with my two little Orphans & treat her, with whom I have lived 47 years, with every mark of affection & bring up the Orphans in the fear of the Lord - be kind to the negroes & make them to know their duty & perform it. I have labored hard for them & been a Slave of Slaves during my life. That God who has upheld me for life will protect those I leave behind if they trust in him - I leave the World at peace with all mankind & hope to meet many in Heaven where I expect to rest freed from sorrow, grief, and sin. As regards my burial Br. Hoch knows my wish, he has it in writing - Should there be objections to my being laid where I have long desired to be (I hope there may be none) then place me in his own burial-place in the Cemetery - I desire to remain two nights at my dwelling after my decease before Interment - Lord Jesus receive my departing spirit

McIntosh by Will

Boyle & Commonwealth of Kentucky being of sound mind & disposing memory, do make & publish this my last will & Testament, hereby revoking & making void all former wills by me at any time heretofore made. It is my will - First. That all my just debts be paid - Second. I do give, devise, & bequeath to my wife Sidonie A. McIntosh one half of all my Estate, real, personal & mixed whether in possession, remainder or reversion which shall remain after the payment of the aforesaid liabilities, to have & to hold to her own proper use & behoof, forever - Third. I do give, devise & bequeath to my son James M. McIntosh & to my infant daughter Catharine C. McIntosh the other remaining half of my Estate real, personal & mixed, whether in possession, remainder, or reversion which shall remain after the payment of the aforesaid liabilities, the 1st half to be divided equally between my 1st son James & my 1st daughter Catharine to have & to hold to their own proper use & behoof forever - subject however to the following conditions, to wit - Should my 1st son James die before he shall have become Twenty-one years of age leaving neither wife nor Heir of his body & my 1st wife surviving him, then his fourth of my Estate is to go to & vest in my 1st wife Sidonie - But I wish it to be distinctly understood that should my said son James live to the age of Twenty-one years then the One-fourth of my Estate is to be his, absolutely & without qualification. And should my 1st infant daughter Catharine die before she shall have become Twenty-one years of age leaving neither Husband nor Heir of her body - & my 1st wife Sidonie surviving her - then the One-fourth of my Estate is to go to & vest in my 1st wife Sidonie - but it is here also to be distinctly understood that should my 1st Daughter, Catharine, live to the age of Twenty-one years then the fourth of my Estate is to be hers absolutely & without qualification. Fourth. I do hereby constitute & appoint my 1st wife Sidonie A. McIntosh - Executrix of this my last will & Testament & guardian of my 1st infant daughter Catharine - & Duncan. V. Clinch of Georgia guardian of my son James
