and in case she should marry I do appoint Jonathan May my Executor
to take into possession all my estate both real & personal & to keep it until
the death of my Wife Elizabeth then to divide it equal between my two children
F. M. May's heirs & George May and in case that George May should never
have any heirs, at his death my will is that his half of my estate shall go
equally between Valentine May & Jonathan May. And as I am not to be
regard of the Court that they do not require Security of Jonathan May
my Executor, believing he will discharge his duty. For the record I have
after the death of my Wife Elizabeth that there shall be a Sale of all my property
according to law. And hereby revoking & disannulling all and every
former Will and do declare this to be my last Will & Testament.
