give my last will and testament. It is my desire that all my just
debts be paid out of my Estate. Then I give to my son William one negro
girl named Jenny to him and his heirs forever this said girl and her
future increase I give to my aforesaid son William as a consideration
for moneys he hath paid for me and services rendered. I also give to said
son William one negro boy Phillis to him and his heirs forever. Then I give
one negro boy by the name of Parcel to my son Hugh Williams during his
natural life and in case the said Hugh Williams should have issue then and
in that case I give the aforesaid Parcel to him and his heirs forever. Then
I give to my son James William one negro boy named Washington to him
and his heirs forever I give to my son Ethel Williams one negro named
Pernely to him and his heirs forever I give to my son George Williams
one negro girl named Nancy to him and his heirs forever. It is my desire
that my executors shall pay unto my said son George thirty dollars as I
think the girl I gave him not of equal value to those I gave the rest of my
children I give to my son Henry Williams the tract of land I now live on
at the decease of my wife Harriet Williams. I also give to my son Henry one
negro boy ^{named} Ben to him and his heirs forever. Then I give to my beloved wife
Harriet Williams during her natural life the plantation I now live with all
the appurtenances and benefits thereunto belonging. I also give my wife all
my household and kitchen furniture to her and for her use during her
natural. I also give to my said wife one negro man named Jeff one
negro man named Moses one negro woman named Aniah with her
three children Heriot Kevin and Jordan with her future increase
for the benefit of my said wife during her life. It is my desire that my
man Jeff at the death of my wife be set at liberty with an injunction on my
executors to see that he may not suffer for diet and clothing. It is my
further wish and desire that my man Martin shall have the liberty
of choosing his master among my said children as their paying
value to the rest of my children in the annual instalments he reser-
ving his proportion. It is my further wish and desire that my woman
Aniah with her present and future increase that are not heretofore
bequeathed I give to my son Henry W Williams as his paying the value
to two disinterested appraisers in the annual instalments to the rest
of my children or his reserving to himself his proportion. I give to my
daughter Sarah Carter one negro girl named Emeline to her and her
heirs forever this girl I give to my daughter Sarah for services she
rendering to raise my family more faithfully than any of the rest.
I also give to my daughter Sarah Carter one negro girl named Harriet to her
and her heirs forever. I give to my daughter Valinda Martin one negro
girl named Betty to her and her heirs forever. I give to my grand daughter
Dorcas Comstock one negro girl Peg on bed and furniture and one horse
one saddle ^{and} fifty dollars value. I also appoint and constitute my son
Henry Williams in trust to receive and hold the said property in possession
until my said grand daughter may arrive to the age of twenty years
or marry. The balance of my estate presently and real I have
to be equally divided between all my children. Then I hereby
appoint and constitute my wife Dorcas Williams my and

my son Henry M. Williams my executor of this my last will and testament
 do testimony whereof I hereunto set my hand and seal this 25th day of October
